

of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Llanfair-ar-y-bryn situate within the limits of the parish of Llantrisant in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Llantrisant and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Andrew Llwynypia in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and of such new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Llantrisant, and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Llanfair-ar-y-bryn situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff, as such Bishop, and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said parish of Llantrisant, and of the vicarage of the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid (in testimony whereof he the said Bishop has signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Llantrisant and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Llanfair-ar-y-bryn situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Dinas and Pen-y-graig.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Dinas and Pen-y-graig comprising:—

"All those two contiguous portions of the parish of Llantrisant and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Andrew Llwynypia both in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the Rhondda River is joined by the stream called Nant-graig-ddu and where the boundaries of the consolidated chapelry of Cymmer and Porth in the said county and diocese of the said parish of Llantrisant and of the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid all meet and extending thence generally southward along the boundary which divides the said parish of Llantrisant from the consolidated chapelry of Cymmer and Porth aforesaid for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the point where the said boundary strikes the road leading from Pen-y-graig towards Llantrisant

and bends sharply towards the south-east and extending thence south-westward and in a straight line for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts across the neighbouring wood or coppice to the spring situate on the south-western side of the said wood or coppice and forming the eastern source of the stream which flows past the Cil-Ely Colliery into the Ely River and extending thence first westward then south-westward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts to the point where the same stream is crossed by the bridge or culvert which carries the Ely Valley branch line of the Great Western Railway over such stream and extending thence in a direction due west and in a straight line for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts to a point on the stream called Nant-Caer-gwerlas distant sixteen chains (measured in a direct line) south of the house called Lluest-Owen and extending thence first north-westward and then westward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts to its source and extending thence northward and in a straight line for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to a point at an angle in the boundary which divides the said parish of Llantrisant from the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid distant five chains (measured in a straight line) south-east of Ffynnon Ely and extending thence that is, from the last-described point first westward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts (thereby passing to the south-west of Carn-y-Celyn) to the point where the said boundary bends sharply towards Gilfach-gôch and extending thence that is from the last-described point northward and in a straight line for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts to the point where the road leading from Gilfach-gôch to Llwynypia crosses the stream called Nantgwyn and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the point where it joins the Rhondda River aforesaid and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named river for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the point where the said Rhondda River is joined by the stream called or known as Nant-Ffrwd-amws which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia from the parish of Llantrisant as aforesaid and extending thence generally eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of seventy-four chains or thereabouts (thereby following the middle of the last-named river) to the firstly herein-mentioned point where the same river is joined by the stream called Nant-graig-ddu as aforesaid and where the boundaries of the said parish of Llantrisant of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia and of the said consolidated chapelry of Cymmer and Porth all meet as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been laid before and approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct
