

south-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by the footpath leading from Low Laiths Farm towards Gawthorpe and extending thence generally westward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading from Flushdyke towards Gawthorpe and extending thence south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to a point at or near to the junction of Gawthorpe Bridle-lane with Dewsbury-road such point being directly opposite to the north-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-eastern boundary of the house and premises situate on the south-western side of Dewsbury-road aforesaid at a distance of six chains or thereabouts north-west of the junction of the last-named road with Church-street and now in the occupation of Messieurs John Lund Gerald Oldroyd John Bedford and Alfred Bedford and extending thence that is from the middle of the said Dewsbury-road south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of five chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the said wall or fence) to a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Church-street to Chickenley Heath and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of twenty-two chains and a half or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe from the new parish of Saint Peter Earl's Heaton aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Peter Earl's Heaton which is bounded upon the north upon the east and upon the south-east by the said new parish of Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe from the new parish of Saint Peter Earl's Heaton aforesaid at the point where the said boundary is crossed by the footpath leading from Love-lane to Chickenley and extending thence first westward and then northward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Chickenley-lane and extending thence north-westward and in a straight line for a distance of fourteen chains and a half or thereabouts to a point at the north-eastern angle of the Syke Ing Mill in the middle of the stream known as Chickenley Beck (thereby passing between the Crown Hotel and a pumping station or pumping engine) and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts (thereby passing under Wakefield-road) to a point on the northern side of the said road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter Earl's Heaton from the new parish of Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe aforesaid.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul Hanging Heaton which is comprised within the limits of the ancient township of Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe."

And whereas the said representation has been laid before and approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pur-

suant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Wakefield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared for the purpose of being laid before Her said late Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the thirteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Trinity Dover, and of the new parish of Christ Church Hougham-in-Dover, both in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the first day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one and published in the London Gazette upon the fourth day of June in the same year a part of the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin in the town of Dover in the said county of Kent and diocese of Canterbury aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church or chapel called Trinity Chapel situate within the limits of such parish and the same was called 'The Trinity District.'

"And whereas by a Deed or Instrument dated the twenty-third day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four being under the hand and seal of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William then Archbishop of Canterbury a part of the parish of Hougham situate within the liberty of the borough of Dover in the said county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury aforesaid was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church called Christ Church Hougham-in-Dover.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the sixteenth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-first day of the same month the boundaries of the said district chapelry called 'The Trinity District' were altered by adding thereto a portion of the parish of Saint James Dover in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And whereas both the said district chapelry called 'Trinity District' now commonly known as Trinity Dover and the said particular district of Christ Church Hougham-in-Dover have each of them under the provisions of the Act of the nine-
