The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. W HEREAS it is expedient that the operation of the Order in Council dated the eighteenth of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and made pursuant to "The Land Transfer Act, 1897," should be further postponed as regards the city of London : Now it is hereby ordered and declared that the said Order is to be read and to take effect as if instead of the words "first of May one thousand nine hundred and one" the words "first of January, one thousand nine hundred and two" had been inserted in the Schedule thereto. PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," as amended by "The Pluralities Act, 1850," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear " to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect " to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be "represented to him by the Bishops of any two "diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that "one or more benefice or benefices, and one or "more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese " or dioceses, being either in the same parish or " contiguous to each other, and of which the "aggregate population shall not exceed one "thousand five hundred persons, may, with " advantage to the interests of religion, be united " into one ben-fice, the said Archbishop of the " Province shall inquire into the circumstances of " the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear " to him that such union may be usefully made, " and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that " the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sine-" cure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages " respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such " consent being signified in writing under the hands " of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop " shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry " and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter " directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, " a statement in writing of the facts, and in other " cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid repre-" sentation to be affixed on or near the principal " outer door of the church, or in some public and " conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sine-" cure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any " person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, " may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing " under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the " said Archbishop, against such union ; and if no " sufficient cause be shown within such time, the " said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and con-" sent aforesaid t) Her Majesty in Council, and " thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to make and issue an Order or Orders " for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or " rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, " with cure of souls, for ecclesiaetical purposes " only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Mnjesty in Council a certificate in writing, learing date the thirty-first day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned Frederick, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to to Your Majesty in Council,—

"That the Right Reverend Alwyne Lord Bishop of Ely as Bishop of the dioc-se within which are situat: the rectories of Rushbrooke and Little Whelnetham both in the county of Suffolk having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and is not of inconvenient extent and that the Most Honourable Frederick William John Marquess of Bristol being the patron or person entitled to present to the rectory of Rushbrooke the same being now vacant and also to the rectory of Little Whelnetham if the same were now vacant consents to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefics with notice
