, of the rectory of the said parish of Little Ilford and with the consent of the Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose in the University of Oxford, as the patrons of the vicarage of the parish of East Ham aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties. have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Eccleslastical Commissioners for England humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Little Ilford and of the said parish of East Ham which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said Uhurch of Saint Barnabas, Little Ilford, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, Little

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, Little Ilford, comprising:-

"I. All that portion of the parish of Little Ilford, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which is bounded upon the south and upon part of the west by the parish of East . Ham upon the remaining part of the west by the new parish of All saints, Forest Gate, both in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-east and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, Forest Gate from the parish of Little Ilford aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries White Post-lane over the Liverpool-street line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway and extending thence southeastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the loop line which cooneces the said line of railway with the Fenchurch-street line of the same railway and extending thence generally southward along the said loop line for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Little Ilford from the parish of East Ham aforesaid at or near the junction of the said loop line with the Fenchurch-street line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of East Ham which is bounded upon the north-east by the parish of Little Ilford, upon the north by the new parish of All Saints Forest Gate aforesaid, upon the west by the new parish of Saint Stephen, Upton Park in the county and diocese afore-aid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Stephen, Upton Park from the parish of East Ham aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries Katherine-road over the said Fenchurch-street line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of fifty-five chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of East Ham from the parish of Little Ilford aforesaid at or near the

ju ction with the hereinbefore mentioned loop line which connects the said Fenchurch-street line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway aforesaid with the said Liverpool-street line of the same railway."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.
