INCOME TAX.

WHEREAS it has become necessary to renew
the list of persons to supply vacancies amongst

passed in the thirty-eighth year of the reign of
Her late Majesty, intituled "The Births and
Deaths Registration Act, 1874," I, Reginald
MacLeod, C.B., Registrar-General of Births,
Deaths, and Marriages in England, have, with the
sanction of the Local Government Board, ordered
and declared that on and after the 1st day of
April next—

(1.) The Middle Temple shall be separated
from Strand Sub-District of Strand Registration

District, and shall be added to and form part of
St. Sepulchre Sub-District of London City
Registration District;

(2.) The parts of Furnival's Inn and St.
Sepulchre (Middlesex) Parishes, which under the
provisions of the London Government Act, 1899,
will be added respectively to St. Andrew, Holborn
below the Bars, and St. Sepulchre, Newgate-
street Parishes shall cease to form part of
Holborn Sub-District of Holborn Registration
District, and shall be added to and form part
of St. Sepulchre Sub-District of London City
Registration District; and

(3.) The part of Whitechapel Parish which
under the provisions of the above-mentioned Act
will be added to St. Botolph Without Aldgate
Parish, shall cease to form part of Goodman's
Fields Sub-District of Whitechapel Registration
District, and shall be added to and form part of
St. Botolph Sub-District of London City Regis-
tration District.—Witness my hand this 12th day

To the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of
Dwygyfylchi, in the County of Carnarvon;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the Parish of
Dwygyfylchi, according to the last
census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas at a meeting of the Vestry of the
said Parish held, pursuant to public notice in
that behalf, on Friday, the 21st day of Decem-
ber, 1900, it was resolved,—

"That the Local Government Board be re-
quested to issue an Order under their
hands and seal, authorising the Overseers
to enter into an agreement under the pro-
visions of the Act 13 and 14 Victoria,
cap. 57, for power under Section 1 of the
Act to hire a Vestry Room. . . ."

And whereas We, the Local Government
Board, have received an application in writing
from the Overseers of the said Parish pursuant
to the above-cited Resolution:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers
given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We
hereby Order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the Vestries Act, 1850,
as relates to the providing of a room or suitable
buildings for the purpose of holding Vestry or
other Meetings shall forthwith be applied to and
be put in force within the said Parish of Dwygy-
fylchi.
