THE following Address was presented to His Majesty at Saint James's Palace on the 12th instant:-

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, Your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled, approach Your Majesty with dutiful assurance of devotion to Your Majesty's Crown and Person.

At this time of universal sorrow we desire to express our deep sympathy with Your Majesty in Your grief at the death of Your Royal Mother, our late Most Gracious Queen. We cannot express too strongly our sense of the loss which has in that sad event been sustained by the Church, by the Nation, by the Empire, by the whole world, and we receive with heartfelt thankfulness the assurances which Your Majesty has graciously given that it is Your desire to follow in the footsteps of so great and good a

We regret that troubles in South Africa and in China should have saddened the close of Her reign, but we can never forget that these troubles were the occasion of an outburst of loyal feeling and warm affection from all parts of this vast Empire unexampled in our history. Her reign has left us a heritage of united attachment to the throne, which we humbly trust may ever continue to animate Your subjects, and which we doubt not will be further strengthened by the visit of the Heir Apparent and His Royal Consort to Australia, New Zealand, and Canada, graciously sanctioned by Your Majesty in the interests of the Empire, even at a time when it may add some anxiety to the burden which Your Majesty has to bear.

We acknowledge with devout gratitude to God the increasing activity of the Church at home, and, in consequence of that activity, its wonderful expansion abroad during Her Majesty's reign, nor can it be doubted that the Church's activity was largely due to the care which Her Majesty bestowed on all that concerned the Church's work whenever opportunity offered.

We thankfully recognize the profound influence which Her personal character and example have exercised upon the life of Her subjects throughout the Empire.

We look forward with strong hope to the use which the Church of England will make of the openings now before her for the spread of the dear Mother's death.

Gospel over the whole world. The facilities for obeying our Lord's last command are such as the world has never seen before, and this country, beyond all others has the means of reaching all nations and giving them the message of the Gospel, and we humbly trust that she will not be slow to discharge the duties imposed on her by her unique position.

We rejoice that Your Majesty will be supported in Your high responsibilities by a Gracious Consort whose sympathy with the poor and suffering and with every good cause, has greatly endeared Her during so many years to the hearts of the whole people.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty. The Humble Address of the Convocation of the Province of York.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Convocation of the Northern Province, think ourselves happy in the possession of our ancient right of address to the Crown, inasmuch as it enables us to express at this time to Your Majesty our sincere and loyal attachment to Your Throne and Person. We especially desire to record the profound sense of our national loss, and the unfeigned and respectful sympathy which we in common with all lands and peoples desire to tender on the death of Your Revered Mother, our much beloved, long honoured, and most gracious Queen. Her name will ever be associated with the longest reign in the annals of our history, with a period of unexampled prosperity, and with an undreamed of extension of our Empire. Under Her faithful guardianship our Church has widened the scope of its activity at home and has extended its work far into distant lands. Under Her wise and sagacious rule, measures have been passed which have proved of lasting benefit to the people, more especially to the labourer and the artizan, the woman and the child. Her devotion to duty, Her truthfulness of character, Her noble example of life and the unsullied purity of Her Court did much to keep high the standards of public life and private conduct. Her unfailing sympathy and Her simple womanliness of heart created a tender and unique attachment to Her Throne and Person among the millions of Her subjects, and the impressive spectacle of a world-wide sorrow which Her death evoked will remain a lasting evidence of the resistless power and influence of the simple virtues when expressed with constancy in a faithful and devoted life.

We desire therefore to offer the homage of our. sorrow and of our sympathy in the inestimable loss which has befallen our Empire and Your

Majesty's Royal House.

While giving expression to our sense of this great sorrow, we desire to record our unshaken loyalty to Your Majesty's Throne, and our earnest conviction that the experience of a grief in which all have shared will tend to cement those bonds of affection and devotion which during the last sixty years have grown strong between the Throne and the people of this Realm.

We know well, and we have heard with gladness, Your Majesty's reverent resolve to walk in the steps of Your Revered Mother and of Your Illustrious Father. We have noted with pleasure the deep and increasing interest which Your Majesty has long taken in the welfare of the people, in the care of the sick and the housing of the poor; and the untiring and sympathetic efforts on behalf of our suffering and wounded countrymen made by the Noble Lady who shares Your Throne, our gracious Queen Alexandra.

While expressing anew our loyalty and attachment to Your Majesty on ascending the Throne

Majesty in the high responsibilities of Your exalted station. We trust that under Your Rule the hearts of all Your People may be knit together in brotherly union and concord, and that moved by reverence of spirit they may in true devotion of conduct co-operate with Your Majesty in fulfilling the high duties to which our race and nation seem by God's Providence to be called. Our hope and prayer is that Your Majesty may long be spared to see the peaceful consolidation of Your Empire, and under its influence the recognition throughout the world of those principles of just government, rational liberty, and personal rectitude, which We owe to the teaching of our Divine Master. this end We pray that the faith of Christ, to which the character of Our People owes so much, may be widely diffused over the world, and more sincerely manifested amongst ourselves, to the peace of Your Throne, the welfare of nations, and the benefit of mankind.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be "separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archibishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archibishop.

" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district within the diocese of such Arch-" bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the " case may be, may be advantageously separated "from any parish or mother church, and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be " united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that "any extra-parochial place may with advantage "be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said "Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme "in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his " consideration) describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be "effected, and how the changes consequent on " such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties " interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make "an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Richard Lord Bishop of Llandaff hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the nineteenth day of December one thousand nine hundred to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"We Richard, Bishop of Llandaff, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act 1838 (one and two Victoria, chapter one hundred and six) do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Glamorgan and diocese of Llandaff the benefice or perpetual curacy of Llangeinor, the parish whereof contains a population of about three thousand. The net annual value of the said benefice of Llangeinor arising from all sources is ninety-four pounds or thereabouts.

"2. There is in the same county of Glamorgan and diocese of Llandaff the benefice or vicarage of Llandyfodwg, the parish whereof contains a population of seven thousand or thereabouts. The net annual value of the said benefice of Landyfodwg arising from all sources is sixty-two pounds or thereabouts.

"3. That representations having been made to us by the respective incumbents of Llangeinor and Llandyfodwg, we the said Bishop did cause full enquiries to be made into the expediency of altering the boundaries of the said parishes, and it was duly reported to us that by reason of its geographical position the position of the said parish of Llandyfodwg immediately contiguous to the parish of Llangeinor, and which is edged red on the plan annexed hereto, containing a population of five thousand persons or thereabouts might

by the incumbent of Llangeinor who resides in the valley where the bulk of such population is resident, whereas the incumbent of Llandyfodwg resides in his parish at a distance of about four miles therefrom, and con-equently it would be to the religious interest of the population there situate that the portion so edged red upon the plan should be separated from the said parish of Llandyfodwg and annexed to the said parish of Llangeinor for ecclesiastical purposes thus enabling the incumbent of Llandyfodwg to concentrate his energies upon that portion of his parish in which he is so resident.

"4. It appears to us the said Bishop of Llandaff, and we do hereby represent that under the provisions of the Pluralities Acts 1838 and 1887 the portion of the said parish of Llandy-fodwg hereinbefore referred to may be advantageously separated from the parish to which the same now belongs and be annexed to the parish of Llangeinor and the following is the detailed

description thereof :-

"The boundary of the new portion of the parish of Llandyfodwg to be taken over to Llangeinor Parish starts from a point which is called Crug yr Afan (where the four parishes of Llangynwyd, Llangeinor, Ystradyfodwg and Llandyfodwg meet). # FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1901.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

### Animals from the Republic of Chile Prohibited.

1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, it shall not be lawful to land any animal brought from the country of the Republic of Chile, and the First Schedule (Prohibited Countries and Parts of Countries) to the Foreign Animals Order of 1896 shall be read and have effect as if that country were included in the list of prohibited countries and parts of countries mentioned in that Schedule.

### Interpretation.

2. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1896.

### Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and one.

# Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the Foreign Animals (Amendment) Order of 1901.
