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Cadiz, Decemb. 17.

**T**HE *King-Fisher*, Captain *Johnson*, sailed out of this Port some days ago for *Madeira*; whence he is shortly expected back. The Indulto of the Galeons is not yet concluded; but the President and Commerce are in daily Consultation about it.

*Rome, Dec. 22.* The Courier that was lately sent to *France* with the Project of an Accommodation is come back, but brings no other Answer, that we hear of, than that the King will consider of it. In the mean time the French Cardinals endeavor to alter some things in the said Project which the Court of *France* will not consent to; But the Pope's Ministers think there have already been Advances enough made on their side to bring Matters to an adjustment, and that it does not consist with the Dignity and Rights of the Church of *Rome* to yield any thing more. The Pope has given Orders to the Legats of *Romagna* and *Bolegnia*, to provide for the German Troops quartered in *Lombardy*, whatever they desire for their Money; and that the Convents and Religious Houses shall contribute as well as others towards their Subsistence. The Congregation of the Inquisition met this Week to proceed against several Persons accused of Quietism, some of which are Condemned to Imprisonment for life, and others for term of years; and all to abjure their Errors. On Monday last was held a private Consistory, where nothing was done but the proposing of Bishops for several vacant Churches.

*Genova, Dec. 22.* The Galley of this State, which carried Monsieur *Rabennac* the French Envoy to *Leghorn*, is come back. They write from *Milan*, That the Duke of *Modena* had agreed with General *Capriani* to give a Sum of Money in lieu of Winter Quarters for the German Troops. The said General demands 200000 Doppies of the Great Duke of *Tuscany* on the same account.

*Venice, Jan. 28.* The Preparations for the War are continued here with great application; but as yet the Senate have not made choice of a General to Command their Land Forces. The Elector of *Bavaria* intends in a day or two to return towards *Germany*.

*Vienne, Jan. 3.* Divers Officers have this Week received Commissions from the Emperor to raise new Troops, which they are to have compleat, upon pain of being cashiered, by the end of *April*. The Recruits that are making by the States of the Hereditary Countries are advancing with very good Success: Great Magazines are providing; And they have begun to work on the Gallies and Barks which are to serve on the *Danube*. We are told from the Bockade of *Great Waradin*, by Letters of the 22d inst, That the Imperialists had again taken a Turk in the disguise of an Hungarian Hussar, who was coming back from *Temeswar*, whither he and three other Persons were lately sent, with Letters from the Batta of *Great Waradin*, requesting the ill con-

dition the Garrison was reduced to, and pressing very earnestly that the promised Succors might be haltned to them. One of these, by the report of the Prisoner, was an Officer who went forward on the same Errand towards *Adrianople*, but he knows not what became of the other two. He confirms all our former Accounts of the want the Turks at *Great Waradin* are in of Provisions, and Fuel, and that they cannot hold out much longer. Since this we have fresher Advices from *Hungary*, which say, there had happened some Disorder at *Great Waradin*, between the Janifaries and their Officers; The first grew impatient under the Miseries they suffered, and were resolved to Surrender, but the Officers would not hear of any Capitulation, and had seized upon the Chief Promoters of it, however 'twas believed that if the relief which they pretended to be in daily expectation of, did not come very quickly, they would be forced to comply with the Garrison. The Imperialists continue from the New Fort to play their Cannon and Bombs upon the Castle, where, as they understood by a Defector, divers were killed and Wounded on the 23d inst; and among the rest, an Aga of the Janifaries had his Leg shot off. The Ottoman Envoy's have begun to send away their Baggage towards *Turkey*, and will themselves follow the next Week. The Countess of *Teckley* has leave to return to her Husband, and prepares to set wife for her Journey; which she will take under the same Convoy that conducts these Envoy's to the Frontiers. On the 29th of the last Month, the Marquis *di Prié*, Ambassador from the Duke of *Saxony*, made his Publick Entry into this City, being received about a League from hence by the Prince of *Schutzenburg*, Great Marschal of the Court, and conducted hither with a great Train of Coaches, and all the Honours that are given to Ambassadors of Crowned Heads. And on the 31st his Excellency had Audience of their Imperial Majesties, and the King of the *Romans*.

*Brasport, Jan 9.* On the 7th instant, the Lord Ambassador *Hubert* proceeded from hence on his Journey towards *Vienna*. Three Regiments of *Saxe Gotha* are arrived in *Frankonia*, and as still, they are to continue their march towards the *Lower Rhine*. The Count *de Saxe* is expected at *Elbogen*, to Command the Imperial Forces in the absence of General *Capriani*, who is going to *Vienna*. We hear from *Munich*, That they have summoned in a great many Peasants to work on the fortifications of that place.

*Cologne, Jan 3.* The Palace here is preparing for our Elector, who intends, as they write from *Munich*, to come hither about the middle of the next Month. The Elector of *Bavaria*, his Brother, will, 'tis said, accompany him, and from hence go on towards *Holland* and *Flanders*. The Letters from *Genova* of the 23th inst advise, That the Swiss Cantons of *Berne* and *Zurich*, have since the taking of *Montmelian* by the French, offered that Republick such a farther Number of Troops as they should think
