**HE** following Address was presented to His Majesty at Saint James's Palace on the 20th ultimo :-

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please Your Majesty, WE, the Chancellor, Doctors, and Masters of the ancient and loyal University of Dublin, desire to express to Your Majesty our sense of the irreparable loss we have all sustained—a loss which touches Your Majesty more deeply than us all. We venture to express our sympathy with Your Majesty's domestic affliction, and our warm appreciation of the largeness of heart wherewith the voice of the nation has been accepted and echoed in the recent messages addressed to Your Majesty's people.

This Royal foundation, established and endowed by Your Majesty's ancestors, has hitherto done no discredit to their long-continued favour. We humbly desire to seek from Your Majesty a continuance of the like grace and sympathy. For our part, we shall continue to show to the Crown of England that unswerving devotion which has been the watchword of our progress through many generations and through troublous times, while we have sought to educate the youth of Ireland in learning, in piety, and in the duties of good and honest citizens. Your Majesty has already received from our

University the highest honour we are able to confer. We now desire to offer our heartfelt expression of devotion, and our prayer that Your Majesty may long reign over us in peace and in prosperity.

#### BOARD OF TRADE ELECTRIC LIGHTING REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE FOR ENSURING A PROPER AND SUFFICIENT SUPPLY OF ELECTRICAL ENERGY.

#### Principal Regulations.

1. In these Regulations the expression "Principal Regulations" means the Regulations for ensuring a proper and sufficient supply of electrical energy made by the Board of Trade under the Order, and referred to in the letter from the Board of

Trade to cf the day of .

#### Amendment of Regulation 5 of Principal Regulations.

2. Regulation 5 of the Principal Regulations shall be read as if the following provision were added at the end thereof :---

"Provided that so long as effect is given to the next following Regulation, the Undertakers shall not be bound under this Regulation or any Regulation corresponding thereto, previously made, to comply with any condition which has been or may be imposed thereunder, the effect of which is to prohibit any change in the pressure of the supply to any premises, except with the consent of the consumer."

#### Amendment of Regulation 6 of Principal Regulations.

3. Regulation 6 of the Principal Regulations shall be read as if the following provision were added at the end thereof :---

"But where the consumer withholds his consent after the Undertakers have offered to comply with the general terms and conditions imposed by the Board of Trade (County Council) (local authority), and, if not required to do so under those terms and conditions, also to pay the reasonable cost of or incidental to the change (including compensation for any loss or damage incurred in consequence of the change), the Undertakers may appeal to the Board of Trade, and that Board may, if they think fit, give their consent to the change on such terms and conditions as they impose, and the consent of the Board so given shall for the purpose of this Regulation have the same effect as the consent of the consumer.

"The Board of Trade may, if they think it necessary in any case, refer to a single arbitrator appointed by them to determine what terms and conditions it would be proper to impose under this provision in case the consent of the Board is given.

"Any such arbitration shall be subject to the like provisions as an arbitration in pursuance of a special Act under Part I of the Board of Trade Arbitrations, &c., Act, 1874, and shall also be subject to the provisions of the Arbitration Act, 1889, as if the arbitration were pursuant to a submission, except that the powers under the last-mentioned Act with respect to the costs of the reference and award shall be exercised by the Board of Trade instead of by the arbitrator."

> ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 29TH APRIL 1901.)

ESSEX (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1901 (No. 4).

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of former Orders and Alteration

of Boundaries of Scheduled District.

1.--(1.) The Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 and the Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1901 (Nos. 2 and 3), are hereby modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

(2.) The Scheduled District for the purposes of the above-mentioned Orders and this Order shall after the commencement of this Order be the District described in the Schedule to this Order.

#### Movement within Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter.

2.-(1.) An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is marked as required by this Article and accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(2.) Every animal moved under this Article shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

- Cottle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow  $\bigwedge$  about six inches long on the left hind quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.
- Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow  $\bigwedge$  on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition namely:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red c.lour.
- Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

#### Morement into Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter.

3. An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises outside the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place to which the animal is to be moved.

Provisions as to Licences under this Order.

4.—(1.) A Licence under this Order shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or his agent authorized in writing for is purpose to the effect :

- (i.) that the animal is not affected with Footand-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and
- (ii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;

and every such Declaration shall be annexed to the Licence granted thereon.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the slaughter-house to which the animals are to be moved, and shall be in the form set forth in the Schedule to the Essex (Footand-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 (No. 2) or to the like effect.

Provision as to Movement and Slaughter.

5. Every animal moved with a Licence under this Order shall be moved by the nearest available route and shall be slaughtered after its arrival at the slaughter-house without unnecessary delay.

#### Offences.

6.-(1.) If an animal is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is not marked as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so marked, shall, each according to and in

respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.



(kermation of Joint Water Board; Construc-tion of Waterworks; Taking of Lands and Waters; Supply of Water in the Urban and Rural Districts of Biggleswade and elsewhere; Rates, Rents, and Charges; Borrowing of Money; Issue of Stock; Exercise of Powers by Constituent Authorities; Incorporation of Acts; and other matters.)

OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the present Session by the Biggleswade Urban District Council (hereinafter called the Urban Council) and the Biggleswade Rural District , the Council (hereinafter called Rural Council), or by one of them, for an Act for all or some of the following purposes and objects (that is to say) :

1. To constitute a Joint Water Board (hereinafter called the Board) consisting of representatives from or appointed by the Urban Council and the Rural Council (who are hereinafter jointly referred to as the constituent authorities), for the purpose of constructing waterworks and of supplying water to the constituent authorities and others, and to incorporate the Board and to confer upon them all such powers and privileges as may be necessary

or expedient. 2. - (8) An aqueduct (No. 6), consisting of one or more lines of pipes, situate in the parishes of Henlow, Clifton, Meppershall, Shefford, Sonthill, and Shefford Hardwick, commencing in the parish of Henlow by a junction with aqueduct No. 5 at or near the junction of the road leading from New Town to Clifton with the road leading from Langford to Henlow, and terminating in the parish of Shefford Hardwick at or near the junction of the roads 4 chains or thereabouts measured in a northerly direction from North Bridge, in the parish of Shefford.

5. All the works hereinbefore referred to will be situate either in the urban or rural district of Biggleswade or in both and wholly in the

county of Bedford. 6. To authorise the Board and the Rural Council to deviate in the construction of all the works proposed to be authorised by the intended Act, both vertically and horizontally, to the extent shown on the deposited plans and sections, or to be defined in the intended Act.

7. To empower the Board and the constituent authorities to acquire by compulsion, for the purposes of the intended Act, lands and hereditaments and easements and rights in or over any lands and hereditaments in the parishes, districts, and county aforesaid.

8. To exempt the Board and the constituent authorities from the operation of Section 92 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, and the provisions of that Act relating to superfluous lands, and to make other amendments in the Lands Clauses Acts in their application to the intended Act.

9. To empower the Board and the constituent authorities to purchase by agreement lands, buildings, and hereditaments and easements, and rights in, under, and over lands, to confer full powers upon them with reference to the retention, holding, user, sale, leasing, exchange, and disposal of lands, and to make provision for transferring to the Board any lands acquired by the constituent authorities.

10. To authorise the Board and the constituent authorities on any lands belonging to them or over which they may acquire ease-ments, to make, maintain, alter, renew, and repair wells, adits, tunnels, drifts, shafts, reservoirs, roads, bridges, approaches, drains, manholes, ways, tanks, basins, gauges, meters, filters, filter beds, embankments, dains, sluices, chambers, outfalls, discharge pipes, aqueducts, culverts, cuts, channels, conduits, mains, pipes,

apparatu«, appliances, buildings, houses, water towers, washonts, water softening tanks and apparatus, rails, sidings, works, and conveniences, and to confer upon the Board and the constituent authorities full power and right at all times of approach and access to the works aforesaid, or any of them, or for obtaining and distributing water for the purpose of their water undertaking, and to authorise the Board and the constituent authorities to enter into and fulfil agreements with the Postmaster-General with regard to telegraphs and telephones.

11. To authorise the Board and the coustituent authorities to lay down, maintain, alter, and renew mains, pipes, culverts, dis-charge pipes, and other waterworks, telephone or telegraph conductors, wires and posts and other works, in, through, along, under, across, and over highways (whether dedicated to the public or not), streets, roads, streams, paths, and railways, and for those purposes to extend to such works all or any of the provisions of the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863, and to empower the Board to break up and interfere with any roads, streets, highways, footways, bridges, canals, towing paths, railways, tramways, sewers, drains, rivers, streams, brooks, watercourses, colverts, pipes, and tele-

graph and telephone posts, wires, and pipes. 14. To authorise the constituent authorities to supply water within their respective districts, or parts thereof, as may be prescribed. by the intended Act.

15. To empower the Board and the con-stituent authorities, and any local authority, company, or person within or beyond the limits of the intended Act to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements in relation to the supply of water by the Board in bulk or otherwise.

The prevention of waste, undue consumption, and contamination of water; the entry of premises supplied with water; the testing and stamping of fittings; the execution of works in connection with the supply of water; the pressure at which water is to be supplied and the exemption of necessity to supply in certain cases; separate communication pipe for each house supplied; the payment of water rates and charges by owners of small houses; trade supply; supply of houses partly used for trade and large public institutions; power to provide and let on hire meters and fittings; connections with, disconnections from, and injury to meters, service pipes, mis-user of water; bye-laws and regulations; and the imposition and recovery of

penalties, forfeitures, and damages. 17. To authorise the Board and the constituent authorities to levy or impose rates, rents, and charges for the supply of water and for the hire or use of meters, fittings, apparatus, and things, and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from the payment of rates, rents, and charges.

To provide for the payment of the costs, charges, and expenses of and incidental to the promotion of the Bill, and to empower the constituent authoritics to contribute their share of such costs, charges, and expenses, and any sums which they may be required to contribute to the Board out of their respective general district rates and other rates, and to provide that in the case of the Rural Council such expenses shall be deemed to be special expenses.

23. To provide for the settlement of any question which may arise between the Board and the constituent authorities, or between the constituent authorities.

24. To incorporate with amendments all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts; the Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847; the Arbitration Act, 1889; the Public Health Acts; the Local Loaus Act, 1875; the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1845 and 1863; and any Act or Acts varying or amending those Acts.

Plans and sections of the intended works and plans of the lands intended to be taken for the purposes of the Act, together with books of reference to the plans and copies of this Notice as published in the London Gazette, will, on or before the 30th day of April instant, be deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Bedford at his office in Bedford, and on or before the same day a copy of so much of the said plans, sections, and book of reference as relates to the urban district of Biggleswade will be deposited with the Clerk to the Urban Council at his office in the district, and a copy of so much thereof as relates to each of the parishes named in this notice (other than the parishes of Biggleswade, Astwick, Edworth, and Shefford Hardwick) will be deposited with
