ELECTIC LIGHTING ACTS, 1882 and 1888.

BOARD OF TRADE ELECTRIC LIGHTING REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE FOR ENSURING A PROPER AND SUFFICIENT SUPPLY OF ELECTRICAL ENERGY.

Principal Regulations.

1. IN these Regulations the expression "Principal Regulations" means the Regulations for ensuring a proper and sufficient supply of electrical energy made by the Board of Trade under the Order, and referred to in the letter from the Board of Trade to _____ of the _____ day of _____.

Amendment of Regulation 5 of Principal Regulations.

2. Regulation 5 of the Principal Regulations shall be read as if the following provision were added at the end thereof :—

"Provided that so long as effect is given to the next following Regulation, the Undertakers shall not be bound under this Regulation or any Regulation corresponding thereto, previously made, to comply with any condition which has been or may be imposed thereunder, the effect of which is to prohibit any change in the pressure of the supply to any premises, except with the consent of the consumer."

Amendment of Regulation 6 of Principal Regulations.

3. Regulation 6 of the Principal Regulations shall be read as if the following provision were added at the end thereof :—

"But where the consumer withholds his consent after the Undertakers have offered to comply with the general terms and conditions imposed by the Board of Trade (County Council) (local authority), and, if not required to do so under those terms and conditions, also to pay the reasonable cost of or incidental to the change (including compensation for any loss or damage incurred in consequence of the change), the Undertakers may appeal to the Board of Trade, and that Board may, if they think fit, give their consent to the change on such terms and conditions as they impose, and the consent of the Board so given shall for the purpose of this Regulation have the same effect as the consent of the consumer."

"The Board of Trade may, if they think it necessary in any case, refer to a single arbitrator appointed by them to determine what terms and conditions it would be proper to impose under this provision in case the consent of the Board is given."

"Any such arbitration shall be subject to the like provisions as an arbitration in pursuance of a special Act under Part I of the Board of Trade Arbitrations, &c., Act, 1874, and shall also be subject to the provisions of the Arbitration Act, 1889, as if the arbitration were pursuant to a submission, except that the powers under the last-mentioned Act with respect to the costs of the reference and award shall be exercised by the Board of Trade instead of by the arbitrator."

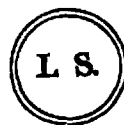

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Modification of former Orders and Alteration of Boundaries of Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) The Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 and the Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1901 (Nos. 2 and 3), are hereby modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

(2.) The Scheduled District for the purposes of the above-mentioned Orders and this Order shall after the commencement of this Order be the District described in the Schedule to this Order.

Movement within Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is marked as required by this Article and accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(2.) Every animal moved under this Article shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following :

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow \blacktriangle about six inches long on the left hind quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow \blacktriangle on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition namely:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

Movement into Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter.

3. An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises outside the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place to which the animal is to be moved.

Provisions as to Licences under this Order.

4.—(1.) A Licence under this Order shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or his agent authorized in writing for its purpose to the effect:

- (i.) that the animal is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and
- (ii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;

and every such Declaration shall be annexed to the Licence granted thereon.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the slaughter-house to which the animals are to be moved, and shall be in the form set forth in the Schedule to the Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 (No. 2) or to the like effect.

Provision as to Movement and Slaughter.

5. Every animal moved with a Licence under this Order shall be moved by the nearest available route and shall be slaughtered after its arrival at the slaughter-house without unnecessary delay.

Offences.

6.—(1.) If an animal is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is not marked as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so marked, shall, each according to and in

respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and one.

Short Title, &c.

8. This Order shall be read with the Orders mentioned in Article 1 of this Order, and may be cited as the Essex (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 (No. 4).

(Formation of Joint Water Board; Construction of Waterworks; Taking of Lands and Waters; Supply of Water in the Urban and Rural Districts of Biggleswade and elsewhere; Rates, Rents, and Charges; Borrowing of Money; Issue of Stock; Exercise of Powers by Constituent Authorities; Incorporation of Acts; and other matters.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the present Session by the Biggleswade Urban District Council (hereinafter called the Urban Council) and the Biggleswade Rural District Council (hereinafter called the Rural Council), or by one of them, for an Act for all or some of the following purposes and objects (that is to say):—

23. To provide for the settlement of any question which may arise between the Board and the constituent authorities, or between the constituent authorities.

24. To incorporate with amendments all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts; the Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847; the Arbitration Act, 1889; the Public Health Acts; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1845 and 1863; and any Act or Acts varying or amending those Acts.

Gloucestershire.—An Area comprising the petty sessional division of Gloucester, in the administrative county of Gloucester; and also comprising the city of Gloucester (15 March, 1901).
