The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by the five hundred and eighty-second and five hundred and eighty-third sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-law made under Part X of that Act, do within its district all or any of the things specified in the first-named section, but that a Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have made certain Byelaws with respect to the contribution to be made towards the pilotage funds of the Liverpool District by the masters and mates of vessels holding pilotage certificates granted in pursuance of the said Act, which Byelaws are in substitution for the Byelaws for the same purpose already made by the said Pilotage Authority, and approved by Order in Council of the eighteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, for a period of three years from the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight:

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are reasonable

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify His consent to the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, for a period of three years from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and one.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

BYE-LAWS made by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, the Pilotage Authority of the Port of Liverpool, pursuant to "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," section five hundred and eighty-two.

1. The following Bye-law shall commence

and take effect from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and one.

2. Every master or mate who holds a pilotage certificate granted in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Acts, enabling such master or mate to pilot any ship or ships within any part of the district over which the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, as the Pilotage Authority, has jurisdiction, shall contribute towards the pilotage fund of the said district, as follows, that is to say:—

(a.) Every such master or mate to whom a pilotage certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or who shall have obtained a renewal of any certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or ships therein specified drawing seventeen feet of water and upwards, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of three pounds three shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent of the pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a pilotage certificate.

(b.) Every such master or mate to whom a pilotage certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or who shall have obtained a renewal of any certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or ships therein specified drawing less than seventeen feet of water, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of two pounds two shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a pilotage certificate.

The contributions above mentioned shall be payable to the Treasurer for the time being of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board at the time when the fee for the granting or for the renewal of the certificate of such master or mate is payable.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England did in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts 1860 and 1898, namely the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and forty-two, and of the Act of

the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three duly prepare for the purpose of being laid before Her said late Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts 1860 and 1898, namely, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two and of the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Your Majesty chapter twenty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices within the metropolis and within the city of Westminster and diocese of London, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of All Saints Knightsbridge and the benefice (being a vicarage) of the Holy Trinity, Knightsbridge, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the patronage of the said benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge is vested in the Rector for the time being of the rectory of the parish of Saint Margaret in the said city of Westminster.

"And whereas the patronage of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge is vested in the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter in Westminster.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Mandell Bishop of the said diocese of London has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals are prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act and are approved by the said Mandell Bishop of London and are assented to by the Reverend Joseph Armitage Robinson, Doctor in Divinity a Canon of the said Collegiate Church of Saint Peter in Westminster and the present Rector of the said rectory of the parish of Saint Margaret in the said city of Westminster as the patron of the said benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge and by the said Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter in Westminster as the patrons of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knights-bridge and the same proposals are also assented to, subject to certain modifications, by the Vestry of the new parish of All Saints Knightsbridge and by the Vestry of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge.

"And whereas it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter referred to should be made

as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said Mandell Bishop of London as such Bishop and the patrons of the said two benefices and the vestries of the said two new parishes respectively, are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Mandell Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Joseph Armitage Robinson (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with

the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter in Westminster (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme set their common or capitular seal) and with the consents of the vestries of the said new parishes of All Saints Knightsbridge and the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge (in testimony of which consent this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the Chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof we recommend and

propose:--

"1. That the said benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge and the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge be united into one benefice under the style of 'The benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge' which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect, and if such benefice shall not then be vacant the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge whether such avoidance shall be caused in the manner contemplated by clause five of Part IV of this scheme or otherwise.

"PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and certain officers of the same, and certain matters connected therewith or with the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the Church of All Saints Knightsbridge shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of

the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the font the communion table and the sacramental plate or any portion thereof used in the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall if the Bishop of London shall approve, be offered to the incumbent and churchwardens of the church of the new benefice hereinafter mentioned and if accepted by the said incumbent and churchwardens shall be transferred to the church of such new benefice but if not so offered or accepted then such font, communion table and sacramental plate or any portion thereof which shall not be needed for, the church of the said new benefice shall be transferred to any other church or chapel or churches or chapels within the diocese of London which the Bishop may select.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the whole of the carved work and fittings and furniture now in the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall with the approval of the Bishop of London be transferred to the church of the new benefice hereinafter mentioned but if the whole or a part of such carved work fittings and furniture shall not be needed for such church that which is not so needed shall be sold and the proceeds to arise from such sale shall in such case be added to the proceeds to arise from the sale hereinafter recommended of the materials and site of the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge.

"4. That upon the union taking effect if the

tables of fees used in the two churches be alike in all 1 particulars the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united new parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united new parishes as if the same were one new parish.

"5. That if upon the union taking effect the persons who are at the present time church servants of the church of All Saints Knightsbridge shall at that time hold their respective offices such persons shall be church servants of the united benefice but no church servant of the united benefice shall have any larger estate and interest in his office than he possessed in his original office

before the union.

'6. That upon the final closing of the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge the register books of baptisms marriages and burials of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall be transferred to the church of the united

"7. That if upon the union taking effect there shall be any monuments tablets and antiquities in the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge which shall not be claimed by the persons who under the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act have a right to claim them then so many of such monuments tablets and antiquities as the Bishop of London may direct shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

"PART III. As to the endowments of the said two benefices we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further

recommend and propose:-

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties revenues and income constituting the endowments of the vicarage of All Saints Knightsbridge shall be transferred to and annexed to the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect all the properties revenues and income constituting the endowments of the vicarage of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall be transferred to and annexed to the new benefice hereinafter mentioned.

"PART IV

"As to a certain new church and district we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further

recommend and propose-

1. "That out of the proceeds of the sales hereinafter recommended a new church be erected on a site which has been offered for sale by Your Majesty's Commissioners for the Exhibition of the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one and which is situate in Prince Consort-road within the limits of the new parish of Saint Stephen South Kensington within the metropolis and in the diocese of London aforesaid.

"2. That when such church has been built out of the proceeds of the sales hereinafter recommended it shall be consecrated by such name and style as may appear to the Bishop of London to be

expedient.

"3. That we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners shall have full power (if we think fit) to advance the sums necessary for the purchase of the said site and for the erection of the said new church out of the funds under our control and that any sums so advanced and interest in respect thereof at the rate of three pounds per centum per annum shall be repaid to us out of the proceeds of the sales hereinafter recommended.

"4. That an ecclesiastical district within the

to or constituted for the said new church under some or one of the Acts of Parliament administered by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and authorizing the assignment or constitution of such

"5. That upon the assignment or constitution of such district the then incumbent (if any) of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge if he be willing and if he be not in the opinion of the Bishop of London disqualified by age or otherwise) shall be appointed the first incumbent of the said new church and district and upon his being instituted or otherwise becoming such first incumbent the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge shall become vacant and the union hereinbefore recommended shall thereupon take effect as contemplated by clause 2 of Part I of this Scheme. "PART V.

"As to the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge and the site and appurtenances thereof and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials and site of the same church we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose:

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge be

"2. That subject to the provisions contained in Part II of this scheme the site and materials of the said church shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sales to be made as aforesaid of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church shall form one aggregate fund, and shall be applied in payment of the sums necessary for the purchase of the site for the said new church and for the erection of such new church, and of all sums due to us in respect of moneys which may have been advanced as contemplated by clause three of Part IV of this scheme, and if the amount of such fund shall be sufficient for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of a parsonage house (or the purchase enlargement or alteration of any existing house suitable with or without enlargement or alteration for a parsonage house) within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the parsonage house of such new district, and the remainder (if any) of such fund shall be added to the endowment of the incum-bent of the said new church and district to be erected and constituted as recommended in Part IV of this scheme.

" PART VI.

"Upon the subject of patronage we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose :-

"1. That the patronage of the united benefice shall be vested in the said Joseph Armitage Robinson as Rector of the said parish of Saint Margaret in the city of Westminster and his successors rectors of the same parish.

"2. That the patronage of the said new church and district shall be vested in the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter

in Westminster and their successors.
"Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which limits of the metropolis shall be legally assigned by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of the Holy Trinity Knightsbridge and of the site thereof together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for t'.e space

of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before and approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighteenth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words and figures

following, that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Finchley, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London between that benefice and three other benefices name'y the benefice (being a new par sh and vicarage) of the Holy Trinity Finchley, the benefice (being a consolidated chapelry) of All Saints East Finchley and the benefice (being a district) of Saint Andrew Alexandra Park, which three last-named benefices are also situate in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Arthur Foley Bishop of London, is the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Finchley, and also cf each of the said three benefices of the Holy Trinity Finchley, All Saints East Finchley, and Saint Andrew Alexandra Park

"And whereas the said benefice of Finchley is now full of a clerk, the rector or incumbent of the same being the Reverend William Saint Hill Bo irne Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas he the said William Saint Hill Bourne with the concurrence of the said Arthur Foley Bishop of London is desirous that the apportionment hereinafter recommended and pro-

posed should be effected.

"And whereas there are held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for and for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Finchley and as part of the endowments of the same benefice a sum of nineteen thousand five hundred and eighty-six pounds twelve shillings and ten pence Metropolitan Three pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Stock and also a sum of two hundred and seven pounds one shilling and two pence India Three pounds per centum per annum Stock.

"And whereas it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that after transferring to or for the benefit of the vicar or incumbent of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity, Finchley to or for the benefit of the incumbent of the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints East Finchley, and to or for the benefit of the minister or incumbent of the said district of Saint Andrew Alexandra Park such portions of the said sum of nineteen thousand five hundred and eighty-six pounds twelve shillings and ten pence Metropolitan Three pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Stock as are hereinafter mentioned and are specified in the Schedule to this scheme appended, the said benefice of Finchley will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley Bishop of the said diocese of London is of opinion and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Finchley, the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints East Finchley, and the said district of Saint Andrew Alexandra Park by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Finchley which is hereinafter recom-

mended and proposed.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury as such Archbishop (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal Seal) and with the consent of the said Arthur Foley Bishop of London, acting as such Bishop, and also as such patron of the said benefice of Finchley of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Finchley of the said benefice of All Saints East Finchley and of the said benefice of Saint Andrew Alexandra Park as aforesaid (in testimony of which consent he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal) and also with the consent of the said William Saint Hill Bourne as the Incumbent of the said benefice of Finchley (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted. Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same all those separate sums of stock (being part of the said sum of nineteen thousand five hundred and eighty-six pounds twelve shillings and ten pence Metropolitan Three pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Stock) which are specified in column II of the Schedule to this scheme appended, and which at present are held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for

and for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said benefice of Finchley shall as from the dates mentioned in column III of the said Schedule and set opposite to the respective sums of stock specified in column II as aforesaid be transferred from the said benefice of Finchley to the benefices mentioned in column I of the said Schedule and set opposite to the respective sums of stock specified in column II as aforesaid and shall as from the dates mentioned as aforesaid in

column III of the said Schedule be annexed to such benefices respectively and form part of the endowments thereof.

And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty chapter sixty - three duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighteenth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the ixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Alajesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty

chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to certain Rural Deaneries within the three Archdeaconries of Rochester, of Southwark, and of Kingston-upon-Thames, all in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by virtue of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the thirtieth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and published in the London Gazette on the tenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine the areas of the several Rural Deaneries of Beddington, of Godstone, of Kingston, and of Reigate were arranged and set forth and were in the same Order expressed to be within the Archdeaconry of Southwark in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid.

"And whereas by another Order of Hersaid late Majesty in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-second day of the same month, the said Rural Deaneries of Beddington, of Godstone, of Kingston, and of Reigate, were severed from the said Archdeaconry of Southwark, and were formed (together with the Rural Deaneries of Barnes and of Streatham) into and became a new Archdeaconry, to wit, the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid.

"And whereas by another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-sixth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six and published in the London Gazette on the second day of July following the Rural Deaneries within the said Archdeaconry of Rochester and the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames were rearranged and set forth.

" And whereas it has been represented to us by

the Right Reverend Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to certain of the Rural Deaneries within the said three Archdeaconries of Rochester, of Southwark, and of Kingston-upon-Thames within the said diocese are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve the transfer in certain cases of certain parishes or cures or churches from one Rural Deanery to another Rural Deanery and also involve the formation of one new Rural Deanery to wit the Rural Deanery of Dulwich in the said Archdeaconry of Southwark and of three new Rural Deaneries to wit the Rural Deaneries of Caterham, of Richmond, and of Wandsworth, all in the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames afore-

said.

Now therefore with the consent of the said diocese of Edward Stuart Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this scheme), we the said Eccle-iastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazett-d Order one new Rural Deanery shall be formed within the said Archdeaconry of Southwark partly out of the Rural Deanery of Clapham and partly out of the Rural Deanery of Camberwell both in the said Archdeaconry of Southwark and the said new Rural Deanery shall be called "the Rural Deanery of Dulwich" and shall be included in and form part of the said last-named Archdeaconry; and also that three new Rural Deaneries shall be förmed within the said Archdeaconry of Kingstonupon-Thames, viz. :-(1) The Rural Deanery of Caterham shall be formed partly out of the Rural Deanery of Godstone and partly out of the Rural Deanery of Beddington both within the last-named Archdeaconry, (2) the Rural Deanery of Rich-mond shall be formed out of the Rural Deanery of Kingston in the same Archdeacoury and (3 the Rural Deanery of Wandsworth shall be formed out of the Rural Deanery of Streatham in the same Archdeaconry; and also that the parish or cure of Burstow shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Reigate to the Rural Deanery of Godstone aforesaid that the parish or eure of Malden with Chessington shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Beddington to the Rural Deanery of Kingston aforesaid, and that the parish or cure of Ifield shall be transferred from the Rural Deanery of Gravesend to the Rural Deanery of Cobham in the Archdeaconry of Rochester aforesaid.

And we further recommend and propose that as from the day aforesaid the said Rural Deaneries of Cobliam and of Gravesend in the said Archdeaconry of Rochester, of Camberwell, of Clap-ham, and of Dulwich in the said Archdeaconry of Southwark, of Beddington, of Caterham, of Godstone, of Kingston, of Reigate, of Richmond, of Streatham, and of Wandsworth, in the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames shall comprise and consist of the parishes or cures or churches the names of which are set down in humbered order in the raid Schedule under the names of such Rural Deaneries respectively and shall belong to and be and form part of the respective Archdeaconries under the names of which they appear in the said Schedule and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the

Archdeacon of the same Archdeaconry and of the Rural Dean of the same Rural Deanery and shall not belong to or be or form a part of any other Archdeaconry or Rural Deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other Archdeacon or Rural Dean.

"And we further recommend and propose tha nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"And with the like consent of the said Arthur Foley Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified as aforesaid), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul, Portman-square situate as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend William Barker Prebendary of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul. in the city of London Rector or Incumbent of the Rectory of the said parish of Saint Marylebone shall continue to be such Rector or Incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Paul Portman-square situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said William Barker, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

Countersigning of Bills of Health, April 25th,
1901.

In consequence of questions arisen at the various sanitary stations, as to the application of

the regulations referring to the issue and countersigning of bills of health, and the payment of the duties ordered by the tariff in the sanitary regulations of October 27th, 1899. Having taken under consideration Articles 91, 92, 93, and the tariff of the said regulations;

The Director-General of Health in conformity with the said articles, has thought it convenient

to order :-

1. A bill of health should only be issued when a vessel begins a voyage, in accordance with Regulation 8 of the Royal Order of March 31st, 1888. It is understood that in the case of coasting and ocean-going vessels, even when they leave in ballast, a bill of health should be issued to them, which will be exchanged gratuitously for others, at the Spanish port where cargo is taken on board.

2. The bill of health of vessels from abroad will be countersigned at all Spanish ports where

the voyage does not terminate.

3. The word "visado" used in Article 92 of the said regulations, must be understood in the sense of "refrendo" countersigned. It is understood that the vise, in its real sense, is the statement signed by the Consuls in foreign bills of health to certify to the signature of the authorities is uing the bills, and to the sanitary condition of the port of departure.

4. If the ship Captains produce bills of health issued at any foreign port touched at, on account of the original document having been taken away, in spite of the voyage not being finished, the Chief Officers of sanitary stations will examine the log book for the exact data about sanitary matters, in the same manner as is done with vessels that are exempted from having bills of health, mentioned in Article 90 of the said regulations.

5. The payment of the duties for the issue of bills of health is only carried out at Spanish sanitary stations, where the vessel begins the voyage or leaves in ballast, in the case mentioned in Regulation I, and not for others issued abroad. The duties for countersigning are imposed at the first Spanish port at which the vessel touches when coming from abroad, when the voyage is not finished and the vessel has not put into harbour in distress.

In other Spanish ports touched at the countersigning will be gratuitous.
