His Majesty's Body Guard of the Hon. Corps of Gentlemen at Arms, with their Axes reversed, under the Command of the Lieutenant (Colonel Sir Henry Oldham); Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant (Lieut.-Colonel Henry Fletcher); Sub-Officer (Lieut.-Colonel John Glas Sandeman).

His Majesty's Royal Body Guard of Yeomen of the Guard, with their Partisans reversed, under the command of the Lieutenant (Lieut.-Colonel Sir Horatio P. Vance), Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant (Colonel Reginald Hennell, D.S.O.), Exon (Major E. H. Elliot).

On arrival at the Chapel the Commander-in-Chief, Adjutant, and Quartermaster Generals, Deputations from two German Regiments, Aides-de-Camp, together with General Pole-Carew and his Staff, ranged themselves on either side of the steps leading to the West Door of the Chapel.

The Pursuivants, Heralds, Ulster and Lyon Kings of Arms, then moved up the Nave of the Chapel, ranging themselves on either side of the entrance to the Choir, and Norroy, Deputy Garter King of Arms, passed into the Choir to be in readiness to pronounce the Styles of Her late Majesty.

At the West Door of the Chapel the Royal Remains were received by—

The Archbishop of Canterbury,

The Archbishop of York,

The Bishop of Winchester, Prelate of the Order of the Garter,

The Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor of the Order of the Garter,

The Dean of Windsor, Registrar of the Order,

with the Canons, Minor Canons, Lay Clerks and Choristers of St. George's Chapel.

The Procession moved up the Nave headed by the Choir and Clergy, and the Opening Sentences of the Burial Service were chanted by the Choir.

The Gold Sticks and White Staves proceeded on either side of this Procession into the Choir.

Behind the Coffin, which was immediately preceded by the Earl Marshal, The Lord Steward, and The Lord Chamberlain, walked The King, the other Members of the Royal Family, the Royal Representatives and the remainder of the Procession; those who had ranged themselves outside the West Door falling in after the suites of the Special Envoys.

His Majesty The King, Chief Mourner, stood at the Head of the Coffin.

The Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household took his place at the Foot of the Coffin.

The Lesson was read by The Bishop of Winchester.

The Sentence "I heard a voice from Heaven" was read by The Dean of Windsor, and after the Lord's Prayer the Anthem "How blest are they" was sung.

The Prayers were read by The Archbishop of Canterbury.

William Henry Weldon, Esquire, Norroy, Deputy to Garter Principal King of Arms, pronounced the Styles of Her late Most Sacred Majesty of Blessed Memory:—

"Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy,

"the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, Victoria by the Grace

"of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the

"Faith, Empress of India, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

"Let us humbly beseech Almighty God to bless with long life, health and honour, and all

"worldly happiness, the Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, Our

"Sovereign Lord, Edward, now, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great

"Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and Sovereign of

"the Most Noble Order of the Garter."

"GOD SAVE THE KING."

The Anthem, "Blessed are the departed," was then sung, and the Archbishop of Canterbury pronounced the Benediction.

The Foreign Representatives who were especially accredited for the occasion, and the Ambassadors and Ministers, were accompanied by Colonel the Hon. Sir William Colville, K.C.V.O., C.B., Master of the Ceremonies, the Hon. R. Moreton, Marshal of the Ceremonies, and R. F. Synge, Esq., C.M.G., Assistant Marshal of the Ceremonies, and were presented with their Suites to His Majesty after the Ceremony.

His Majesty's Body Guard of the Hon. Corps of Gentlemen at Arms was on duty in the Choir of the Chapel, the Yeomen of the Guard being on duty in the Nave.

Eighty-one minute guns were fired in the Long Walk at Windsor as the Procession left Windsor Station.
