

such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; and provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation should be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation was so considered; provided always, that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the incumbent and the vestry clerk of such parish:

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1855," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas in pursuance of "The London Government Act, 1899," the powers of the vestries in the Metropolis have been transferred to the Councils of the Metropolitan Boroughs:

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1900," it was enacted that the powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the Burial Acts should be transferred to the Local Government Board.

And whereas the Local Government Board after giving to the incumbent of the parish hereinafter mentioned and the Town Council of the Metropolitan Borough of Lambeth ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, have made a representation stating that they are of opinion that so much of the Order of Her late Majesty in Council of the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, as relates to the churchyard of the district church of Saint Mark Kennington, in the parish of Lambeth, should be varied, in respect of the said churchyard, by the substitution of the words "and forthwith and entirely in the churchyard" for the words "and, with the reservation of rights in private vaults and family graves, to cease at once in the portion of the churchyard which has been already used for burials, and wholly and entirely, with the same reservation, at the end of twelve months" contained in the said Order.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventh day of August next:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish or parishes affected by such representation one month before the said seventh day of August.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard of *Saint Nicholas at Wade*, in the county of *Kent*, be further postponed until the thirtieth day of *September*, one thousand nine hundred and one.
