With great gallantry got to close quarters with the enemy, killing one and wounding two. I regret to say that he lost two killed and three wounded, and the remainder were taken prisoners. This attack, made on his own initiative, was of very great assistance in detaining the enemy. Enemy themselves stated they had 180 men on the kopje.
