

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, January 5.

**O**N Monday last the Cardinal de Fourbin had a long Audience of the Pope, to whom he delivered a Letter from the French King (which he had received that Morning by Expres) on the Subject of the Differences between the two Courts. The Congregation of Cardinals, appointed for the Examination of this Affair, met the next day, and again yesterday, when after a long discussion of the Points in Question, they came finally to this Resolution, That the Pope's Bulls should be dispatched for such of the French Bishops as had not assented at the Assembly of the Clergy in 1682, nor signed the four Propositions against the Authority of the Church of Rome. For what concerns the others, the Matter remains in the same state it was; as do likewise that of the Regale; But the Pope will make a Solemn Proclamation for saving the Rights of the Church. This Expedient was first proposed by Innocent XI, which the French then rejected, though they now seem very willing to give into it; and do withal assure the Pope that Circular Letters have been already written to all the Bishops of France, whereby they are left at Liberty to Conform, in the Matter of the four Propositions, to the Orders and Sentiments of the Pope. This day an Expres was sent hence by the Cardinal de Fourbin to give the French Court an account of the Success of his Negotiation. 'Tis now believed that the Pope will shortly make a Promotion of Cardinals.

**Milan, Jan. 2.** We hear that 5000 Recruits are coming from Germany, for the Emperor's Forces, that served the last Campaign in Piedmont, and that part of them are already arrived at Coma. General Caraffa has Published an Order in Monferrat, forbidding the Country People to carry any Provisions to Casal on pain of Death. The Treasurer of the German Troops is returned from Genova with the Money paid him by that Republick, on account of their Contributions for exemption from Winter Quarters. Our Governor has received Orders from Spain to make New Levies for reinforcing the Army of this State.

**Turin, Jan. 8.** General Caraffa continues at Milan to settle the Contributions about Winter Quarters. The Great Duke has Paid the Sum he agreed for; and the Republick of Lucca is said to have given 10000 Crowns. Here is a talk, that the French are drawing some Troops together in Provence, and that they have a Design again upon Com, but without any certainty; In the mean time, we continue to fortifie that place, and to provide it with all things necessary for its defence. Our Troops that marched lately towards Savoy are all returning into their Winter Quarters, except the Regiments that remain in the Valley of Aost. The French have lately made some Excursions from Pignerol into this Country, but have not done much mischief.

**Venice, Jan. 11.** On Thursday last arrived here a Ship in 36 days from Cyprus, but brings no other News, than that the Turks were making Preparations for the Prosecution of the War this next Summer. The Abbot Scavari the Elector of Bavaria's Agent parted from hence on Saturday last for Florence.

**Vienna, Jan. 17.** The last Letters from Adrianople, which came by the way of Valachia, say that the Grand Signior had, by advice of the Vicer, and Perswasion of the French Ambassador, held a Divan, and that the said Ambassador being called to it, he dissuaded them from making a Peace, and promised in the Name of his Master to assist

them with Provisions, Officers, Ingeniers, and what else they wanted; whereupon it was resolved to continue the War, and the Grand Signior ordered that the Horse Tail and Mahomet's Standard should be exposed to the view of the People, which is never done but in the greatest Danger and Necessity. Our Preparations advance with all the Success imaginable; and we are assured that the Emperor's Forces in Hungary will be more numerous and earlier in the Field this Year than they have yet been since the War. The States of the Hereditary Countries have promised to have their Recruits in a readines by the end of February; and the Marquis de Fleury is with great diligence fitting out his Squadron, which is to consist of 140 Vessels. Prince Eugene of Savoy, came hither on the 10th instant, having parted at Inspruck from the Elector of Bavaria, who went on to Municken to dispatch some Affairs with his Council, and is expected here in few days. 'Tis confirmed by every Post, that the Turks at Great Waradin are reduced to an extreme want of Provisions, and that it will be impossible for them to hold out much longer: Some Advices say, That Teckelej had got a small Body of Men together again, and pretended to attempt their Relief. We have advice that a Party of Croats have lately made an Excursion towards Krupa, where they burnt part of the Town; the Turks fled into the Castle, and fired very furiously from thence, but without doing any harm to our Men, who carried off with them a very good Booty. The Emperor has declared Count Ernest Rudiger de Staremberg Knight of the Golden Fleece, and Councillor of State, President of the Council of War, in the place of Prince Herman of Baden, who died lately at Ratisbonne, where he was the Emperors Chief Commisioner. The Basha of Belgrade has sent a Pass for the English Ambassador who is coming this way in his Journey to Turkey.

**Ratisbonne, Jan. 21.** We have an account from Municken, That the Elector of Bavaria is gone from thence for Vienna. My Lord Ambassador Harbord arrived here the 17th from Nuremberg.

**Lintz, Jan. 20.** Yesterday in the Afternoon his Electoral Highness of Bavaria passed through Eberhsurg, not far from hence, going with an Attendance of about 20 Persons towards Vienna.

**Frankfort, Jan. 24.** We had lately an account that the French had drawn a Body of their Troops together between Birsac and Hammingen, which gave some Allarm to the Forest Towns; but we hear since that they are designed towards Flanders. All things are quiet in these Parts.

**Cologne, Jan. 25.** The Elector of Cologne has given Audience to the Deputies of this City, and of the Chapter, as likewise to a Gentleman who came to Compliment him on the part of the Elector Palatin. And yesterday these two Electors had an Interview together at Dormagen, about 4 Hours from this place; whence the Elector of Cologne returned hither in the Evening, and the Elector Palatin to Dusseldorp. The French have burnt the House of the Elector of Trier at Berncastell on the Moselle. The Letters from Bern of the 19th advise, that Monsieur Anetot the French Ambassador had written to all the Swiss Cantons in general, to amass them with the same Intimations about the Affairs of Savoy, which he had before made to those of Bern and Zurich.

**Copenhagen, Jan. 19.** The Prince Royal of Denmark parted from hence yesterday, with a Retinue of about 20 Persons, of whom Monsieur Anetot, who was lately Envoy Extraordinary from this Crown in England, is Chief; He Travels Incognito, and goes first to Italy. Count Comingssee, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor arrived here on Tuesday last, and has had Audience of the King; His

Business hither, among other things, is said to be to treat about some Troops to serve the Emperor in Hungary.

**Hamburg, Jan. 25.** Yesterday the Prince of Denmark, who goes under the Name of the Count of Oldenburg, passed this River about 4 English Miles from hence; but came not to this Town as was expected; He intends to go by Hamour and Berlin, towards Italy. They write from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburg went on the 18th for Torzaw, where he was to have an Interview with the Elector of Saxony. The Letters from the Court of Hamour tell us, that Prince Maximilian would soon return thither, having complied with the Duke his Father's Desires about the Union of the two Dukedoms.

**Paris, Jan. 25.** On Saturday last there was a review of the French and Swiss Guards in the Plain of Ouilke. The Equipages of the Household are preparing; and it is said, they will part the next Month towards Flanders. Orders are given for repairing the fortifications of Montmelian; and Monsieur de Catinat, who by our last advice continued still at Chambery, has been several times to visit that Work. They have begun here to appoint the Troops that are to compose the Army on the Rhine this next Campagne, which is to be again Commanded by the Marechal de Lorge, and to consist only of 35 Battalions and 68 Squadrons. They write from Provence, that they had Orders to fit out at Toulon and Marseilles 20 Men of War and 30 Gallies, and that 6 of the biggest Ships were designed to pass the Streights, and to joyn the French Fleet in the Ocean. We have an account by an Express who parted from Rome the 10th instant, that the Pope had granted his Bulls to the Archbishop of Sens, and to the Bishops of Marseilles, Soissons and Nismes, and that the rest of the Bishops, that have not signed the four Propositions, would likewise have theirs, so soon as the Money, they are to give for them, was ready.

**Brussels, Jan. 27.** The French continue their Preparations in all the Frontier places of Flanders; and have lately sent divers Pieces of heavy Cannon and Mortars from Mons to Mabeuge. The Advicts from the new Conquests say, that the Gens d'Arms of the Household would begin their march from Paris about the end of this Month; and that the French King and the Dauphin would set out towards Flanders about the 25th of the next. Don Fuen Mayor, Son to the Marquis de Castel Moncayo, who was sent by our Governor the Marquis de Castauna, to Complement the Elector of Bavaria upon his being declared Governor General of the Spanish Netherlands is returned hither from Munich; whence his Electoral Highness parted on the 16th for Vienna; He purposed, as we are assured, to stay there but 4 days, and to be in these Countries towards the end of the next Month. The Marquis de Grigny, one of our Lieutenant-Generals, is going to serve as General of the Horse in Catalonia; and the Count de Valsassines, who was Lieutenant-General of the Foreign Horse already Embarked for Spain. They write from Rome, That the Pope has determined the Differences with France in this manner. Such of the French Bishops as have not signed the four Propositions are to be continued, and the Nomination of the others to be declared null and void; and as to the Matter of the Regale, he will content himself with making an Act of Protestation.

**Brussels, Jan. 29.** Monsieur Dyckvelt is on his return hither from Luige, where he was very well received by the Prince and Government, and effected the Business he went upon, which was chiefly, to hinder the carrying any Horses out of that Country for the use of the French, who are in much want of them. The Baron de Baumgarten Envoy extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, has given notice to the Ministers of the Congress that he has Orders to go for England, and thence to Spain, to reside there in the same quality. The Letters from Madrid of the 9th of January tell us, That the Indulto of the Galeons was agreed at 4 Millions 5 Hundred Thousand Pieces of Eight; of which two Millions, that are to be paid down, will be remitted to Florent, Milan and Catalonia; the rest is to be employed in discharging the 120000 Pieces of Eight that have been advanced to the King, and in fitting out the Fleet this Year, which is to be commanded by Don Pedro Corbete, an experienced Sea Commander, together with the Vice-Admiral Papackin.

**Plymouth, Jan. 18.** On Friday last put to Sea the James of London, and the Zant Frigate bound for the Streights, with 2 or 3 small Vessels in their Company. His Morning came in here the Cleavelly Galley, Captain

Commander, who has lately taken a French Prize bound with Hemp from St. Malo to Brest.

**Plymouth, Jan. 19.** The Ships bound for Bilbao, are still in this Port. Their Majesties Ships the Mont and the Sapphire, are going out to Cruise.
