WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty the King has power and jurisdiction within the limits of the East Africa Protectorate:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers on this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. For the purposes of this Order the expression "Crown lands" means all public lands within the East Africa Protectorate which for the time being are subject to the control of His Majesty by virtue of any Treaty, Convention, or Agreement, or of His Majesty's Protectorate, and all lands which have been or may hereafter be acquired by His Majesty under "The Lands Acquisition Act, 1894," or otherwise howsoever.

2. All rights of His Majesty in or in relation to any Crown lands shall vest in and may be exercised by His Majesty's Commissioner and Consul-General for the time being in trust for

His Majesty, or, if the Secretary of State at any time with respect to all or any such lands by order under his hand so directs, in such other trustee or trustees for His Majesty as the Secretary of State may appoint.

3. The Secretary of State may, when he thinks fit, by a like order, remove any trustee so appointed as aforesaid, and may appoint any new or additional trustee or trustees.

4. The Commissioner, or other such trustee or trustees, may make grants or leases of any Crown lands on such terms and conditions as he may think fit, subject to any directions of the Secretary of State.

5. All mines and minerals being in, under, or upon any lands in the occupation of any native tribe or any members thereof, or of any person not possessed of the right to work and take such mines and minerals, shall vest in the Commissioner or such trustee or trustees, in like manner as the mines and minerals being in, under, or upon any Crown lands.

6. This Order may be cited as "The East Africa (Lands) Order in Council, 1901."

WHEREAS by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was provided that Part 2 of "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," should apply to the group of British possessions therein mentioned.

And whereas by a further Order of Her late

Majesty in Council, dated the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, it was provided that "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," should apply as if the territories within the limits of Part 1 of the said Order were a British possession and that Part 2 of the said Act should apply to the British possessions named in the aforesaid Order of the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, and to the parts of South Africa mentioned in the said Order of the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

And whereas by an Order of Her late Majesty in Council, dated the third day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, it was provided that the Governor of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope might declare by Proclamation that on the date named in such Proclamation the territory of British Bechuanaland should be annexed to and form part of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and by Proclamation by the said Governor dated the eleventh day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five the territory of British Bechuanaland was on the sixteenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, annexed to and became part of the said Colony.

And whereas by Letters Patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom dated the first day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven the Governor for the time being of the Colony of Natal was authorized by Proclamation to declare that from and after a date in such Proclamation to be mentioned, the British possession of Zululand should be annexed to and form part of the Colony of Natal, and such Proclamation was duly made on the twenty-ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven and the said possession of Zululand was from and after the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, annexed to and became part of the said Colony.

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the twenty-fourth day of May, one thousand nine hundred, certain territories in South Africa theretofore known as the Orange Free State were annexed to and now form part of His Majesty's Dominions and are known as the Orange River Colony.

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the first day of September, one thousand nine hundred, certain territories in South Africa theretofore known as the South African Republic were annexed to and now form part of His Majesty's Dominions and are known as the Transvaal.

And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction in the territories of South Africa known as the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Southern Rhodesia, Barotsiland, North-Western Rhodesia, North-Eastern Rhodesia and the British Central Africa Protectorate.

And whereas by reason of the contiguity of the aforesaid Colonies and Possessions in South Africa and the said territories, and the frequent inter-communication between them, it seems expedient to His Majesty and conducive to the better administration of justice therein that Part 2 of "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," should apply to the said Colonies, Possessions, and Territories, and that, subject to the provisions of this Order, "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," should apply as if the said territories respectively were British possessions.

Now therefore His Majesty by virtue of the

powers in this behalf by "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. Subject to the provisions of this Order "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," shall apply as if the territories named in the First Schedule of this Order were a British possession.

2. In "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," as hereby applied to the territories named in Schedule 1 of this Order and in this Order with reference to the said territories, unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "Governor" means the officer for the time being exercising the functions,

(a.) As regards the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Southern Rhodesia, and Barotsiland, North-Western Rhodesia, of High Commissioner for South Africa.

(b.) As regards the British Central Africa Protectorate and North-Eastern Rhodesia, of Commissioner and Consul-General.

3. The jurisdiction under Part 1 of "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," to hear a case and commit a fugitive to prison to await his return may be exercised in the territories named in Schedule 1 of this Order by any person having in the said territories authority to issue a warrant for the apprehension of persons accused of crime and to commit such persons for trial.

4. Part 2 of "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881," shall apply to the Colonies, possessions and territories mentioned in Schedules 1 and 2 of this Order.

5. The Governor of each of the Colonies, possessions and territories named in the Schedules to this Order shall cause this Order to be proclaimed therein and this Order shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by such Proclamation.

6. The Orders of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council of the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight; and the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, shall, as and from the date of the coming into operation of this Order, be revoked, without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, or to any proceedings commenced before the said date.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any

“diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.”

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We the undersigned Frederick, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council,—

“That the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Greetham and the vicarage of Ashby Puerorum both in the county of Lincoln having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

“That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and is not of inconvenient extent and that the Very Reverend Edward Charles Wickham, Clerk, Doctor in Divinity, Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln and the Chapter of the same church, the patrons or person entitled to present or nominate to the rectory of Greetham and to the vicarage of Ashby Puerorum in case the same were now respectively vacant consent to the proposed union.

“That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in

Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

“The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

“And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.”

Now, therefore His Majesty in Council by and with the advice of His said Council is pleased to order as it is hereby ordered that the rectory of Greetham and the vicarage of Ashby Puerorum both being in the county and diocese of Lincoln shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the Archdeaconry of Bristol in the diocese of Bristol.

“Whereas by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six and published in the London Gazette on the seventh day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven there were effected certain re-arrangements of the areas of the Rural Deaneries in the said Archdeaconry of Bristol and in the other Archdeaconries at that time in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

“And whereas by another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven and published in

the London Gazette on the ninth day of the same month, the said diocese of Bristol was constituted.

"And whereas by another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the third day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight and published in the London Gazette on the eighth day of the same month the said Archdeaconry of Bristol was made to comprise and to be co-extensive with the limits of the said diocese of Bristol and to consist of the following Rural Deaneries namely the Rural Deanery of Bristol the Rural Deanery of Stapleton the Rural Deanery of Bitton the Rural Deanery of Clippenham and also the Rural Deanery of Malmesbury and the Rural Deanery of Cricklade as the two lastly-mentioned Rural Deaneries are limited by the above-mentioned Order of Her said late Majesty in Council dated the seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend George Forrest Bishop of the said diocese of Bristol that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said Archdeaconry of Bristol are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve firstly the abolition of the present Rural Deanery of Bristol and secondly the formation of four new Rural Deaneries to be called respectively 'The Rural Deanery of Bristol City' 'The Rural Deanery of Bedminster' 'The Rural Deanery of Clifton' and 'The Rural Deanery of East Bristol' and thirdly the transfer of three cures from the said Rural Deanery of Stapleton to the said proposed new Rural Deanery of Clifton and the transfer of two cures from the said Rural Deanery of Stapleton to the said proposed new Rural Deanery of East Bristol.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said George Forrest Bishop of the said diocese of Bristol (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said present Rural Deanery of Bristol shall be abolished and that in lieu thereof the following four Rural Deaneries shall be constituted namely:—(1) The Rural Deanery of Bristol City (2) the Rural Deanery of Bedminster (3) the Rural Deanery of Clifton and (4) the Rural Deanery of East Bristol and that the cures of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston the cure of Horfield and the cure of Westbury-on-Trym with Redland shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Stapleton to the said proposed new Rural Deanery of Clifton and that the cure of Fishponds and the cure of Two Mile Hill shall be transferred from the said Rural Deanery of Stapleton to the said proposed new Rural Deanery of East Bristol and that the said Rural Deanery of Bristol City the said Rural Deanery of Bedminster the said Rural Deanery of Clifton the said Rural Deanery of East Bristol and the said Rural Deanery of Stapleton and the other Rural Deaneries of the said Archdeaconry of Bristol shall respectively comprise and consist of the parishes cures or churches the names of which are set down in numbered order under the name of such Rural Deaneries respectively in the Schedule to this scheme annexed and each of the said

parishes or cures or churches shall belong to and be and form part of the Rural Deanery under the name of which it is set down as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery under which it is so set down as aforesaid and subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Bristol and shall not belong to or be a part of any other Rural Deanery or Archdeaconry nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean or Archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The territory to be dis severed from the new parish of Saint Paul West Hartlepool in the county and diocese of Durham and to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church, West Hartlepool, in the same county and diocese being:—

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Needham Market as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Barking which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Needham Market as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Needham Market.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Needham Market as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that so long as the Reverend James Wilson Clerk in Holy Orders the present Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Barking shall continue to be such Rector or Incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Needham Market as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said James Wilson and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Needham Market being:—

"All that part of the parish of Barking in the county of Suffolk and in the diocese of Norwich which is bounded upon the north-west upon the north and upon the north-east by the parish of Creeping Saint Mary in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Creeping Saint Mary from the parish of Barking aforesaid at a point near Barking Mill in the middle of the bridge which carries the road leading from Coddendam to Needham Market over the River Gipping, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction (at or near to the bridge which carries the Ipswich and Norwich Line of the Great Eastern Railway over the said last-mentioned road) with the road leading to Grinstead Hill and extending thence

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Crocken Hill in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury and partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Paul Swanley (within the original limits of the parish of Sutton-at-Hone) in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Crocken Hill and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Swanley which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas we are satisfied that each of the said new parishes is a cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district

any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of assisting to provide an endowment for the said proposed separate district Constance Eastwood of the Cottage Swanley in the said county of Kent Spinster has contributed a sum of seven hundred and forty pounds Five pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Guaranteed Stock of the Great Western Railway Company and has transferred the same into our name in the books of the same Company to be held on trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the Minister for the time being of the said proposed separate district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act then of the Incumbent of the said new parish the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said Minister or Incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed according to the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act.

"And whereas the said Constance Eastwood has also contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a capital sum of one thousand two hundred and eighty-five pounds in further aid of the endowment of the said proposed district or new parish (as the case may be) and of the maintenance of the Minister or Incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed and undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February the first day of May the first day of August and the first day of November in each and every year to such Minister or Incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act the sum of thirty-eight pounds eleven shillings in each and every year during which the said capital sum shall continue in our hands.

"And whereas by a deed dated the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, operating under the New Parishes Acts and being under our common seal the Reverend Charles John Monson Shaw the Vicar or Incumbent of the said vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul Swanley with the consent of William Seymour Eastwood Esquire Barrister-at-Law of Esher Lodge Esher in the county of Surrey the patron of the said vicarage and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury did grant and confirm to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish a clear annual rent charge of twenty-five pounds charged upon and payable out of a certain portion of the endowments of the said vicarage of the new parish of Saint Paul Swanley aforesaid.

"And whereas the said sum of seven hundred and forty pounds Five pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Guaranteed Stock of the Great Western Railway Company aforesaid has been so provided and the said capital sum of one thousand two hundred and eighty-five pounds has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding that we should make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein named Act to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish (as the case may be) when duly licensed as aforesaid the annual sum of fifty pounds sterling and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the

said district or new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Sutton-at-Hone have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of some or one of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act to the Minister or Incumbent of the said proposed district so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act then of the said new parish and to his successors a grant of fifty pounds per annum and such grant will be made by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the said Constance Eastwood the donor of the said sum of seven hundred and forty pounds Five pounds per centum per annum Consolidated Guaranteed Stock of the Great Western Railway Company and of the capital sum of one thousand two hundred and eighty-five pounds has nominated to us the Warden Council and Scholars of Keble College in the University of Oxford as the persons or body in whom she desires that the whole right of patronage or nomination of the Minister or Incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish shall be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Crocken Hill and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Swanley which are mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary Swanley.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Warden Council and Scholars of Keble College in the University of Oxford aforesaid and their successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament,

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mary, Swanley being :—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometimes consolidated chapelry) of Crocken Hill in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury which was dissevered from the new parish (sometimes district chapelry) of Saint Paul Swanley in the same county and diocese and annexed to the said new parish of Crocken Hill by an Order of Her late Majesty in Council bearing date the seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and published in the London Gazette on the tenth day of the same month.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul Swanley which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Farningham in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south-west by the hereinbefore described portion of the said new parish of Crocken Hill upon the west by the parish of Saint Mary Cray in the said county and diocese upon part of the north by the parish of Wilmington in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say upon the remaining part of the north upon the north-east and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the road leading from Ladenhatch to Swanley where the boundary which divides the said parish of Wilmington from the new parish of Saint Paul Swanley aforesaid diverges from such road in a northerly direction and extending thence generally eastward along the middle of the same road for a distance of seventy-one chains or thereabouts to its intersection by the road leading from Hextable to Swanley Junction and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading to the plantation called 'The Grove,' and extending thence south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the level crossing over the main line of the South-Eastern and Chatham Railway between the posts indicating distances from London of eighteen and a quarter and eighteen and a half miles respectively and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries over such line of railway the road leading from Swanley to Broomfield Hall and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of thirty-two chains or thereabouts to the boundary near to the junction of the same road with the roadway leading to Parkwood Convalescent Home which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Swanley from the parish of Farningham aforesaid."

"Whereas under and by virtue of an indenture bearing date the fourteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and made or expressed to be made between the Reverend Thomas Woodman, Clerk in Holy Orders, Rector of the rectory and parish church of Kirkby in Ashfield aforesaid, of the first part, the Most Noble William John Arthur Charles James, Duke of Portland, patron of the said rectory, of the second part, and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the third part, the mines beds and seams of coal and other minerals and mineral substances (save and except as therein mentioned) in and under the lands containing one thousand two hundred and thirteen acres three roods and twenty-six perches or thereabouts situate in the parish of Kirkby in Ashfield more particularly described in the Schedule to the deed and constituting the glebe lands of the said rectory became with their appurtenances vested in us in fee simple.

indenture and all benefit and advantage conferred in favour of and all reservations to the Rector for the time being of the said rectory or his assigns or in favour of any glebe or property of the said rectory either by the said conveyances or arising by or in consequence of the sales effected by the said conveyances including the benefit and advantage of all accommodation works made or to be made hereunto with their appurtenances and are now vested in us in fee simple.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act all or any of the said land hereditaments and premises so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwell. *A. WHEREAS by "The Burial Act, 1852," it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the Metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the Metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the Metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation should be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month before such representation was so considered; provided always, that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the incumbent and the vestry clerk of such parish:

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1855," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas in pursuance of "The London Government Act, 1899," the powers of the vestries in the Metropolis have been transferred to the Councils of the Metropolitan Boroughs:

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1900," it was enacted that the powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the Burial Acts should be transferred to the Local Government Board:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the incumbent of the parish herein-after mentioned, and the Town Council of the Metropolitan Borough of Lambeth, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, have made a representation stating that they are of opinion that so much of the Order of Her late Majesty in Council of the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, as relates to the churchyard of the district church of Saint Mark, Kennington, in the parish of Lambeth, should be varied, in respect of the said churchyard, as hereinafter set forth.

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the twenty-sixth day of

June last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and one, and such Order has been published in London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said first recited Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that so much of the Order in Council of the twenty-fourth October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, as relates to the churchyard of the district church of Saint Mark, Kennington, in the parish of Lambeth be varied by the substitution of the words "and forthwith and entirely in the churchyard" for the words "and, with the reservation of rights in private vaults and family graves, to cease at once in the portion of the churchyard which has been already used for burials, and wholly and entirely, with the same reservation, at the end of twelve months" contained in the said Order of the twenty-fourth October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three:

That as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of a coffin in the said vault the entrance to the said vault from the mortuary chapel shall be properly covered, and the covering shall be hermetically sealed by concrete or cement in such a manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the said vault into the mortuary chapel.

(b.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be

separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(c.) In the said portion of the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of any person heretofore buried in the said portion of the churchyard.

ISHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Peter Isham, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

LONGFRAMLINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in Longframpton Church, in the county of Northumberland; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) The Order shall not apply to the portion of the churchyard included between a line drawn due north from the church tower to the northern boundary of the churchyard and a line following the footpath leading from the chancel to the north-east gate.

(b.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

BOCONNOC.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Boconnoc, in the county of Cornwall; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

(c.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

(d.) In the churchyard in a grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of Mr. J. B. Fortescue and of the bodies of any members of his family.

WIGMORE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint James, Wigmore, in the county of Hereford; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In the walled grave, wherein are interred the remains of the late Mr. Walter Jones, the burial may be allowed of one member of the family of the said Mr. Walter Jones, subject to the condition that the coffin buried in the said grave be separately entombed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventeenth day of September next:

Board of Trade (Fisheries and Harbour Department), London, August 9, 1901.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following translation of the Quarantine Regulations in force in the Faroe Islands:—
 Notice concerning the Quarantine Regulations of the Faroe Islands.

ART. 1. Any vessel touching the Faroe Islands and being desirous of communicating with the shore, must be provided with a certificate or bill of health. If coming from any foreign port the said bill of health must contain a statement whether any contagious disease was prevailing at the said port, or among the crew at time of departure, and this statement must be certified by the Danish Consul, or—when no Danish Consul is residing there—by the magistrates of the place in question.

Should the vessel not be provided with a proper certificate or bill of health, or should any case of sickness or death have occurred on board during her voyage, the authorities concerned shall be entitled to make the necessary inquiry, especially into the state of health of the crew, the master being bound to obey such directions as the authorities may think proper, with a view of preventing the introduction of any contagious disease.

ART. 2. All vessels coming from abroad or from the Inland and touching the Faroe Islands are—before they enter other ports of the Islands—bound to call at one of the hereafter named ports:—Thorshavn and Vestmanhavn in the Isle of Stromo, Trangisvaag in the Isle of Sudero, Vaag (Klaksvig) in Bordo, Midvaag in Vaago, Kongshavn in Ostero, and Sand in Sando.

The master is allowed to choose among the above-named ports, but if he chooses a port where no physician is domiciled, no communication with the shore will be permitted in cases where a medical examination is ordained (§§ 1, 3, and 4), before such examination has taken place on direction of the vessel and at its expenses either by a physician being in attendance or after having sailed to a port where a physician is domiciled. Physicians are now residing only in Thorshavn and Vestmanhavn, in Stromo, Trangisvaag in Sudero, and Vaag (Klaksvig) in Bordo.

ART. 3. All vessels coming from ports where it has been notified that Asiatic cholera, small-pox, exanthematic typhus, or other diseases, to which the regulations ordained by the law of January 8th, 1872, may apply, are considered epidemic, are bound to hoist the quarantine flag—or, that failing, a white flag—on the main top before they enter the port, and keep it flying until further notice.

This rule shall also apply to vessels coming from other ports if any person on board suffer or has been suffering during the voyage from any of the above-named diseases, or from measles or

from scarlet-fever, or if, during her voyage, any corpses of such persons have been or still are on board.

ART. 4. From such vessels as mentioned in Art. 2 no persons on board, whether passenger or crew, must be landed before the vessel, by the direction of the sanitary police, has been examined by the physician of the district.

If it should be proved, on medical inquiry, that any suspicious disease has occurred on board the ship during her voyage, whether resulting in death or not, or that her sanitary condition should give rise to fear of the introduction of contagion, the vessel shall immediately be ordered to Thorshavn, where the sanitary police on the arrival of the vessel, and before anybody on board be allowed to go on shore, will have to take the necessary steps in order to have the sick evacuated and the dead bodies removed from the vessel, and to have the same disinfected. The ship shall be kept isolated until these operations have been carried out.

For the said examination a fee of 4 Kroner is due to the physician for vessels not exceeding 60 tons, of 6 Kroner for vessels from 60 until 100 tons and of 10 Kroner for vessels of above 100 tons. The fee to the physician and the payment for his conveyance to and from the vessel, with the medical expenses of the sick on shore, and of the disinfection of the vessel, shall be borne by the vessel, which is responsible for the payment, and which, previous to anybody on board being put on shore, shall give security for all current expenses. With regard to men-of-war, the doctor's fee shall be borne by the exchequer.

If the physician be absent, the vessel may be exempted, by the police, from the said medical examination, when the master to the local authorities delivers a declaration, in the form prescribed by the Minister of Justice, that no case of sickness or death has taken place on board during the voyage, any more than he at present has sick persons or dead bodies on board the vessel. In this declaration cases of accident are not included.

ART. 5. Directly the vessel enters one of the ports mentioned in Article 2, and previous to any communication having taken place with the inhabitants or to anything being discharged from the vessel or brought on board her, the master shall go ashore and report himself, in Thorshavn, to the "Landfoged" and in the other ports of clearance to the "Sysselmand" or, if there be no Sysselmand residing there, to the quarantine officer, to whom he shall produce the ship's papers and give such explanation as may be required regarding the state of health of the vessel (cfr. Art. 1).

If there be nothing to prevent it, the landing shall take place at the spot marked by a flag-pole, from which a yellow flag (quarantine flag) will be flying when the vessel is entering port.

ART. 6. When the examination mentioned in Art. 4 and 5 has taken place, and when the provisions, it may have occasioned, have been made, a bill of health will be issued by the proper authorities conferring on the said vessel the right to communicate, during the same voyage, with any other port in the Faroe Islands.

At any port the vessel might subsequently call, the Master, with due regard to what has been prescribed by Art. 5, shall immediately on arrival report himself to the Magistrate or quarantine officer of the port, to whom he shall produce the ship's papers and the above-mentioned bill of health, which shall each time be provided with a visa or notice, stating its having been presented for inspection.

ART. 7. Whenever foreign fishing vessels enter a port in the Faroe Islands—excepted the case mentioned in this Art., 2d alinea—they shall pay to the authorities concerned or quarantine officer for inspection of the ship's papers 5 Ore pr. ton register, of which an entry shall be made on the ship's articles or crew's roll.

Whenever a foreign fishing vessel takes refuge in a port in stress of weather, without any of the crew landing or communicating with the inhabitants, the Master shall not be compelled to go ashore to present the ship's papers, even if the vessel is lying at anchor until she can proceed again without risk.

ART. 8. Whenever a ship, previous to having called at any of the regular ports of clearance (cfr. Art. 2), is compelled by heavy weather or any other cause to take refuge in any other port in the Faroe Islands, the Master, with regard to his obligations towards the officers of quarantine, is to be guided by the rules contained in Art. 3, Art. 4, first part, and Art. 5, taking in consideration whether the ship may be regarded as suspicious or not. The Master shall in every respect comply with the orders given him by the local officer of quarantine or "Sysselmand," and he shall especially, as soon as possible, proceed to the port of clearance to which the vessel is bound, or to which he may be directed by the proper quarantine officer.

ART. 9. Any person infringing the aforesaid regulations or the instructions given in accordance therewith—and provided no greater punishment should be incurred in virtue of the common law—shall be liable to a penalty in accordance with the quarantine regulations in force at the Faroe Islands, cfr. the quarantine-ordinance of February 8th, 1805, Art. 39, law concerning abolishment of the Royal Commercial Monopoly in the Faroe Islands of March 21st, 1855, Art. 11, law regarding regulations to prevent the introduction of Asiatic Cholera into the Faroe Islands, &c., of January 8th, 1872, Art. 6, and law regarding the fishing of foreigners at the Faroe Islands of April 23rd, 1881, Art. 3.

ART. 10. The official notice of February 27th 1882 published by the Ministry of Justice concerning the quarantine regulations of the Faroe Islands, is hereby annulled.

ART. 11. A copy of this notice, with an English translation, if necessary, shall be delivered by the quarantine officers of the Faroe Islands to every ship's Master not previously provided with the same.

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County of Carmarthen) Order, 1901."

BIRDS.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

II. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the County of Carmarthen to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:—

Black-headed Bunting, Reed Bunting, Common Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Blue Tit, Marsh Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Tree Creeper, Water Ouzel or Dipper, Linnet (all species), Butcher Bird, Bullfinch, Robin, Thrush.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

III. During the period between the 31st day of July in any year and the 2nd day of March following, the killing or taking of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Carmarthen:—

Goldfinch, Black-headed Bunting, Reed Bunting, Linnet (all species), Nightingale, Common Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Blue Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Woodpecker, Tree Creeper, Kingfisher, Owl, Butcher Bird, Water Ouzel or Dipper, Gulls (except Black-backed Gull), Bullfinch, Robin, Thrush.

EGGS.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the County.

IV. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Carmarthen:—

Goldfinch, Black-headed Bunting, Reed Bunting, Linnet (all species), Nightingale, Golden-crested Wren, Blue Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Woodpecker, Tree Creeper, Kingfisher, Owl, Butcher Bird, Water Ouzel or Dipper, Gulls (except Black-backed Gull).

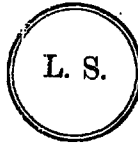

Brighton Corporation Tramways.

NOTICE is hereby given that at a Meeting of the Council of the County Borough of Brighton, holden at the Town Hall, in the said Borough, on Friday the 2nd day of August, 1901, the said Council, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Brighton Corporation Act, 1900, and the Tramways Act, 1870, and of all and every other powers them thereunto enabling, did make the following Bye-laws and Regulations:—

County Borough of Brighton.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations made this 2nd day of August, 1901, by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Brighton, under the powers conferred by the Brighton Corporation Act, 1900, and the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Corporation, and to all places with respect to which the Corporation have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

2. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term "the Corporation" shall mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Brighton, the term "the Borough" shall mean the County Borough of Brighton, the term "carriage" shall mean any

engine, car, or carriage using any tramway laid down within the said Borough, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the driver and conductor or other person having charge of an engine, car, or carriage.

3. The driver or conductor of a carriage shall stop the same at any of the stopping-places which may from time to time be appointed by the Corporation for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers when required by any passenger desiring to leave the carriage or by any person desirous of travelling by the carriage, for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made.

4. The driver of a carriage, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the carriage to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the carriage.

5. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramway, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

6. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or "conductor's" platform, and not otherwise.

7. No passenger shall smoke inside nor on the three front rows of seats on the outside of any carriage, or expectorate inside, outside, or from any carriage.

8. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform on any musical instrument.

9. A person in a state of intoxication or affected with any infectious or contagious disease shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and, if found in or upon any carriage, shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

10. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

11. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the seats, cushions, linings, or other fittings, of any carriage, or remove or deface any number plate, printed, painted, or other notice, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage, and no person, not being a servant of the Corporation duly authorized in that behalf, shall touch, handle, or interfere with any electric machine or appliance in, under, upon, or about any carriage (except electric bells provided for the use of passengers). Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

12. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

13. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Corporation, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

14. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor, or any duly authorized servant of the Corporation, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

15. A passenger, not being an artizan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Corporation, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artizans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

16. Personal luggage not exceeding 28 lbs. in weight (including the tools of artizans, mechanics, and daily labourers), may be carried by hand, or, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, shall be placed on the front or driver's platform. The conductor may decline to take into or upon the carriage any luggage of a form or description calculated to annoy or inconvenience any passenger.

17. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the Corporation, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or driver's platform of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof or platform of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

18. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

19. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is authorized to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage after being warned by the conductor not to do so.

20. When a carriage contains the full authorized number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

21. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the authorized number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

22. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

23. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and, in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

24. No person shall enter, get upon, or travel in or on any carriage with loaded fire-arms, or with any article, instrument, or implement which may be dangerous or offensive to any passenger.

25. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Corporation.

26. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

27. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

28. There shall be placed and kept in a conspicuous position, inside of each carriage in use, a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

29. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the fifteenth day of October, 1901.
