THE following Despatch has been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief in South Africa:—

From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-quarters, South Africa,
Pretoria, 8th July, 1901.

SIR,
1. In continuation of my despatch, dated 8th of May, 1901, I have the honour to submit an account of the operations carried out by the troops under my command since that date.

It is first necessary to allude to the changes that have recently been taking place in the composition of the Army in South Africa, and to the fact that the period covered by the following narrative of events has for a large portion of the mounted troops been necessarily one of training and preparation.

During the months of April, May, and June the whole of the original force of Imperial Yeomanry and several of the earlier contingents of Australians and New Zealanders were gradually withdrawn from this country, and though they were replaced by a new Imperial Yeomanry, 16,000 strong, other oversea contingents, and the freshly-recruited South African Constabulary, it was not to be expected that these untrained men, however willing, would be able to fill the gap left by the departure of so many seasoned and experienced soldiers.

It was impossible at first to put into the field a large number of new Yeomanry recruits, many of whom were unable either to ride or shoot, and the necessity for their retention at drill and musketry upon the lines of communication unavoidably curtailed for a time the work of the mobile columns. Some few of the men have proved quite unsuitable for the work expected of them, but satisfactory progress has been, and is being made, and they are gradually gaining experience in the field.

The relief of the original Volunteer Service Companies has also been completed, and the despatch of nine lately embodied Militia battalions from England has enabled arrangements to be made for the return from South Africa of a similar number of units.

The South African Constabulary is gradually becoming an effective force. They have also required considerable training. Operating from the vicinity of the railways and occupying fortified posts, enclosing large areas, thus denying the passage of the enemy through certain districts, they have become lately of considerable

value, and have shown commendable spirit and steadiness.

Major-General Bruce Hamilton's operations in Southern Orange River Colony.

2. Early in May, Major-General Bruce Hamilton received information pointing to a concentration of the enemy in the hills south-west of Philippolis. He, therefore, directed Lieut.-Colonel W. Williams to move with three columns from the railway to the western border. Leaving Springfontein on the 10th of May, this force passed through the Philippolis district without much opposition, and reached Ramah on the 19th, having captured 33 prisoners (including Commandant Bothma), 1,000 horses, and much stock.

While operating in the neighbourhood of Ramah, Colonel Williams detached four squadrons of the South African Light Horse, under Major Gogarty, who was instructed to visit Luckhoff by night and endeavour to surprise a party of Boers, who were said to frequent that locality. This enterprise, which was completely successful, resulted in the capture of 31 armed burghers, with their horses.

Colonel Williams then returned to the railway at Prior Siding, leaving Lieut.-Colonel Byng's column to hold Philippolis.

During the progress of these operations, columns under Colonels Hickman, Monro, Maxwell, and White were usefully employed east of the railway in completing the clearing of the Smithfield, Zastron, and Rouxville districts.

In consequence of the increased activity displayed by the enemy in the north of Cape Colony, Colonel Monro, with a strong column, was, on the 19th of May, detached from the Orange River Colony to join the troops operating about Steynsburg, and early in June Lieut.-Colonel White's force was called on to operate from Aliwal North, in the direction of Jamestown and Lady Grey, in connection with Colonel Haig's pursuit of Krutzing's command. Lieut.-Colonel Murray, with a small force, also crossed into Cape Colony.

As already reported by telegram, Lieut.-Colonel C. Maxwell, R.E., who for many months had commanded a column with distinction, succumbed to injuries accidentally received on the 20th May.

In the beginning of June, General Bruce Hamilton arranged for a combined movement to be carried out by a number of columns, which, advancing from the line Kaffir River, Jagersfontein Road, Luckhoff, Koffyfontein,

were to converge towards Petrusburg. General Bruce Hamilton's own forces were divided into seven small columns. Colonel Henry's force, recently organised at Orange River Bridge, and the Kimberley column were instructed to co-operate through Wolvekop (near Luckhoff) and Koffyfontein respectively, and a force was detached from Bloemfontein to operate westward from Kaffir River Station.

To block retreat to the north, the country between Bloemfontein and Petrusburg was watched by posts recently established by the South African Constabulary, and the drifts on the Modder River from Abraham's Kraal to Paardeberg were secured by Major-General Knox's troops.

These operations, which were carried out between the 5th and 8th of June, resulted in the capture of 268 prisoners, many wagons and teams were also collected.

Since the middle of June, columns under Colonel Rochfort, Lieut.-Colonels White and du Moulin have scoured the country east of the railway between the Caledon River on the south, and the line Edenburg, Reddersburg, Dewetsdorp on the north. Here they have had numerous minor engagements with the wandering bands under Commandants Brand, Kolbe, and Joubert. West of the railway, Lieut.-Colonels Williams and Byng have continued their clearing operations in the districts of Fauresmith, Jacobsdal and Philippolis.

Major-General Charles Knox's operations in Central Orange River Colony.

3. Major-General Charles Knox, returning from the Senekal District, arrived on the railway on the 10th of May, and was ordered to march at once in the direction of Bothaville. This movement was designed to deal with a commando known to be laagered on the Valsch River, as well as to check any parties of the enemy who might seek to enter Orange River Colony, in order to evade our troops then operating in the neighbourhood of Klerksdorp. General Knox's columns left the line Virginia Siding, Holfontein, on the 13th May; a force under Major Pine-Coffin, detached from Kroonstad, moved westward at the same time, along the left bank of the Valsch River. Colonel Pilcher's column led the advance on Bothaville, and found the Boers in position at Alletasdraai, on the Valsch River. After a successful engagement the enemy were driven south-west towards Zandspruit, in which direction they were followed by Colonel Thorneycroft. By General Knox's direction, Colonel Pilcher then pushed on through Bothaville to the line of the Vaal about Commando Drift. A few days later General Knox concentrated his entire force near Bothaville, and thence marched back to the railway.

During the early part of June, General Knox's columns were employed, as already mentioned, in the country west of the railway and north of the Modder River, acting in connection with General Bruce Hamilton's enveloping movement from the south. While operating to the south of Boshof, Colonel Pilcher had several successful encounters with a commando under Jacobs and Erasmus, from whom he took 11 prisoners, 53 wagons and carts and 600 horses.

At the conclusion of General Bruce Hamilton's combined movement, Colonel Henry's column was brought up from Jacobsdal to Christiana, and placed under General Knox's orders for employment in that neighbourhood.

On the 2nd of July he arrived at Bloemhof accompanied by the Kimberley column which had

been sent to co-operate with him, and on the 4th moved to Hoopstad, returning to Bloemhof on the 7th. These operations resulted in the capture of 52 prisoners, 50 horses, 64 vehicles, and some 7,000 cattle. 2 Boers were killed and 15 surrendered to the column.

Colonel Pilcher's column moved at first towards Boshof, and later on Bultfontein, which latter place he occupied at dawn on the 18th of June. From this point Colonel Pilcher advanced in the direction of Hoopstad, while Colonel Thorneycroft, who had moved simultaneously on Bultfontein from the south, escorted the prisoners and captured stock into Brandfort. General Knox next employed Colonel Thorneycroft's troops in searching the bed of the Vet River, west of Smaldeel, where a good number of cattle and wagons were found hidden away. By the 26th of June the columns of Colonels Pilcher and Thorneycroft were concentrated at Brandfort for a short rest preparatory to undertaking further operations to the east of the railway.

On the 1st of July these columns again left the railway in an easterly direction, to take part in a combined operation which is still in progress.

Major-General Elliot's operations in Northern Orange River Colony.

4. Major-General Elliot's troops moving east were, on the 7th of May, disposed on the line Villiersdorp-Frankfort-Tafel Kop. From Cornelia, where he arrived on the 9th, General Elliot despatched a force to Vrede; the columns then converged on De Lange's Drift for supplies. 40 prisoners, 5,000 horses and a very large number of wagons and cattle were sent to Standerton.

As the lower drifts of the Wilge River had been secured by Lieut.-Colonel Western's troops, the presence of General Elliot's force about Frankfort and Cornelia had the effect of driving many of the Boers across the Vaal with their wagons and stock, to seek refuge in the hilly country south of Greylingstad. There they were met by the columns under Colonels E. Knox and Rimington, which in anticipation of such a movement had been suitably disposed to deal with it. Acting promptly, these officers attacked and dispersed most of the enemy who crossed the river, and effected the capture of 34 prisoners, 4,000 cattle, including 1,000 trek oxen, 284 wagons and carts, and 5,400 rounds of ammunition.

Having replenished his supplies from Standerton, General Elliot commenced the second phase of his operations. With his left column following the course of the Klip River, and his right extended to the south beyond Vrede, the eastward march towards the Natal border was continued.

In connection with this fresh advance, a strong column from Standerton, commanded by Colonel Colville, marched up the right bank of the Klip River, and keeping abreast of General Elliot's left, thoroughly searched Verzammelberg.

General Hildyard also detached troops from Volksrust and Newcastle to close Alleman's Nek, and watch Botha's and Muller's Passes. On the 19th of May, General Elliot arrived at Botha's Pass, having met with very slight opposition, except on his right flank which was engaged by some 300 Boers near Strydplaats, 20 miles south-east of Vrede. Over 2,000 captured horses and other stock taken since leaving the Vaal, were sent down to Natal.

Learning that several hundred Boers were holding the Witkoppies, a position of great natural strength, and difficult of access, 25 miles

south of Botha's Pass, General Elliot led his force thither and on the 21st succeeded in penetrating this rugged tract of country.

The resistance offered by the enemy was half-hearted and only intended to delay our troops, the bulk of the Boers with their convoy, having already moved westward down into the very broken country along the banks of the Wilge River.

The brigades of Colonels Bethune and Lowe (who had temporarily relieved General Broadwood) were then despatched from the Witkoppies to operate to the north and west respectively, with instructions to meet at Vrede about the 30th of May. General Elliot himself accompanied Lieut.-Colonel De Lisle's column to Harrismith, the troops collecting some 1,700 horses during this march. He then returned to Vrede.

It had been arranged that General Elliot should return to Kroonstad through Reitz and Lindley. Having received fresh supplies from Standerton, the force moved from the neighbourhood of Vrede on the 3rd of June; Lieut.-Colonel De Lisle's column, which had been sent on to Prankop, leading the advance on Reitz.

On the evening of the 5th of June, Major Sladen, with 200 Mounted Infantry of Lieut.-Colonel De Lisle's force, was instructed to make a night march to Graspan, near Reitz, to intercept a Boer convoy which was reported to be in that vicinity. The laager was found early on the 6th, and after slight resistance was captured, 45 prisoners being taken. Major Sladen at once sent back a party of 40 men to communicate with Colonel De Lisle, and chose a defensible position in which to await the arrival of the column.

Shortly before noon a determined attempt to recapture the convoy was made by a body of some 500 Boers under Commandant Fourie. Generals De Wet and De la Rey who were then on their way to a meeting in the Transvaal, were also present. During the close fighting which ensued, the Boers succeeded in moving off some of the captured wagons, which were parked outside the position, but failed to make any impression on the defence, and on the arrival of the first reinforcement from Colonel De Lisle's column, at about 3 p.m. the enemy retired in haste. A vigorous pursuit resulted in the recapture of all but two wagons, a large herd of oxen was also secured, 14 dead and 6 wounded Boers were left on the field, and many were removed in Cape carts. Our losses were severe, 3 officers and 17 men being killed, and 1 officer and 24 men wounded. In addition to the 45 prisoners, the captures included 10,000 rounds of ammunition, 114 wagons and carts, 4,000 cattle, and a large amount of food stuffs.

Continuing the movement westward through Lindley, near which place some additional captures were made, General Elliot's troops reached Kroonstad on the 14th and 15th of June.

General Elliot's force left Kroonstad again on the 22nd of June, to sweep eastward, passing between Lindley and Senekal to the line of the Wilge River. By the 2nd of July these troops had reached Springfield Drift, about 20 miles north of Harrismith, and were there met by a supply convoy sent out by General Rundle. On his march from Kroonstad, General Elliot's columns had killed 9 Boers and had collected 3,000 horses, 3,000 cattle, and 200 wagons. From this point General Elliot turned north, following the course of the Wilge River towards Frankfort, where he will wheel to the

left and return through Heilbron to the railway. In combination with this movement, which is still in progress, Lieut.-General Sir L. Rundle left Harrismith on the 4th, marching north on General Elliot's right, through the country east of the Wilge River, and Brigadier-General Bullock, from Standerton, is on his way to Frankfort, moving through Villiersdorp.

Lieut.-Colonel Western's operations on the Vaal River.

5. When no longer required on the lower drifts of the Wilge River in connection with General Elliot's eastward movement, Lieut.-Colonel Western marched in to Heilbron. On arriving there he received intelligence that one of Steenkamp's laagers was at Buffels Vlei, about 17 miles to the northward. He at once determined to attack this party, and, making a night march, surprised the Boer camp at dawn on the 9th of May. 32 prisoners with their rifles, horses, and wagons were taken.

After operating from Vereeniging for a short time up the right bank of the Vaal, Lieut.-Colonel Western's column was sent to traverse the Losberg, which was found clear of the enemy.

On the 1st of June the column left Vereeniging for Parys, and, after visiting Venterskroon and Vrededorp, swept back eastward along the Rhenoster River to the railway, 9 prisoners, 16,000 rounds of ammunition, and many wagons were captured during this movement.

Having refitted at Rhenoster, Lieut.-Colonel Western was next directed to proceed past the junction of the Vaal and Rhenoster Rivers to Coal Mine Drift, with a view to clearing the country in that neighbourhood. On the approach of the column, small bodies of the enemy retired south-west from Scandinavia Drift without fighting. On the 23rd of June, however, a Boer convoy was met some 12 miles south of the junction of the Vaal and Rhenoster Rivers, trekking east. This party was successfully engaged and driven south, 6 prisoners, 16 wagons and carts, and all their stock being taken. Colonel Western subsequently crossed the Vaal at Coal Mine Drift, and marched into Klerksdorp to replenish his supplies.

On the 28th of June Colonel Western acted in combination with Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton and Colonel Allenby in attacking the enemy in the hills at Hartbeestfontein (624), to the west of Klerksdorp, his force capturing 9 prisoners (including Assistant-Commandant Van der Venter), 10 rifles, and 12 horses. Two days later, Lieut.-Colonel Western left Klerksdorp and moved down both banks of the Vaal towards Hoopstad, to co-operate with Colonel Henry's column, which was advancing from Christiana. After pushing parties of the enemy under Potgieter and Vanderberg, who showed no desire to make a stand, west of the Makawasi and Zand Spruits, Lieut.-Colonel Western returned to Klerksdorp. The result of his expedition were 2 Boers killed, 6 prisoners, 13 rifles, 71 horses, and 15 wagons and carts.

Events in the East of the Orange River Colony.

6. Throughout the month of May, Lieut.-General Sir Leslie Rundle's troops were employed in clearing the numerous Boer supply depôts hidden in the remote valleys between Fouriesburg and Ficksburg. Having completed this task, General Rundle arranged for a combined movement towards Harrismith.

Colonel Harley left Fouriesburg early on the 31st of May and seized the Slaapkrantz position without much opposition. On the same day, General Campbell moved from near Bethlehem

and by a forced march reached Naauwpoort Nek, where he intercepted a Boer convoy which was endeavouring to avoid the troops advancing from Fouriesburg.

General Campbell then moved by the northern slopes of the Roodebergen towards Witzies Hoek. Colonel Harley traversed the difficult country south of the same range, and, issuing by the Golden Gate, joined hands with General Campbell on the 8th of June at Elands River Drift.

During these movements a small column from Harrismith watched the country to the east of Elands River Drift.

The results of General Rundle's operations since the 2nd of June were as follows:—7 Boers killed and 19 wounded, 101 Krupp shells, 4,800 rounds of ammunition, 21 rifles, 83 wagons and carts, 1,450 horses, and a large quantity of food stuffs and forage were captured or destroyed.

On the 13th of June, General Sir L. Rundle left Harrismith with both his columns for Bethlehem, intending to clear the Langeberg, the only district south of the Harrismith—Bethlehem road which had not been dealt with during his recent operations. During the march to Bethlehem, which was reached on the 18th, a certain amount of opposition was met with from scattered parties of the enemy who hung persistently on the flanks of the advancing columns. 15 Boers were killed or wounded, 2,770 horses, 56 vehicles, 4,000 rounds of ammunition, 7 rifles, and much stock were captured, and enormous quantities of supplies destroyed. On the conclusion of these operations General Rundle marched back to Harrismith.

On the 4th of July, General Rundle again quitted Harrismith to co-operate with General Elliot's march from Springfield Drift towards Frankfort, as already described.

Operations in the south-west Transvaal.

7. As the various columns of Lord Methuen and General Mildmay Willson closed in on the Boer position at Hartebeestfontein (624), the commandos hastily withdrew to the westward and scattered in all directions. Major-General Babington, however, moving northward, succeeded in bringing a force of the enemy to action on the 8th of May, at Leeuwfontein (42), and also drove a party towards Brigadier-General Dixon at Putfontein (70), where further captures were effected. Lord Methuen and Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson followed those of the enemy who had retired to the west, and eventually led their troops to Mafeking and Maribogo respectively. The columns under General Babington and Lieut.-Colonel E. Williams returned to Klerksdorp by a southerly route. A somewhat determined attack was made on a detachment of Lieut.-Colonel Williams' force near Korannafontein (146), on the 10th of May, but otherwise there was no serious opposition. Brigadier-General Dixon returned to his original position at Naauwpoort (214), south of the Magaliesberg, where he arrived on the 25th of May.

During these operations 70 prisoners were taken, 26 burghers surrendered, 102 wagons and carts and a large amount of stock were captured, 7 Boers were killed and several wounded.

De la Rey himself was reported to have gone to Wolmaranstad. Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson from the west and Colonel Williams from Klerksdorp were therefore instructed to march on that place, while Lord Methuen from Mafeking moved south-east, with the object of intercepting any force which might try to escape north from Wolmaranstad. General Fetherstonhaugh, who had relieved General Babington, in command of

the mobile columns in the south-west, accompanied Colonel Williams.

Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson entered Wolmaranstad unopposed on the 22nd of May, near which place he gained touch with General Fetherstonhaugh, and thence moved on Klerksdorp, capturing a small Boer laager at Cyferkuil (124). Lord Methuen, who reached Korannafontein (146) early on the 23rd, turned north in the pursuit of a commando which was found to have gone north in the direction of Lichtenburg. 56 prisoners, 40 horses, over 100 wagons and carts, as well as a large amount of stock, fell into the hands of the various columns.

On the 23rd of May, a convoy proceeding from Potchefstroom to Ventersdorp was attacked at Kaalfontein (696) by some 300 Boers. After a sharp skirmish, in which the escort to the convoy lost 4 men killed and 2 Officers and 31 men wounded, the enemy was driven off and the convoy arrived safely in Ventersdorp.

From the vicinity of Wolmaranstad, General Fetherstonhaugh led Colonel Williams' column south-east to the Vaal and cleared the country up the right bank of the river towards Klerksdorp. On the 24th of May this force had a successful action with Van Rensburg's commando, in the course of which 24 prisoners, 6,200 rounds of ammunition and 30 ox wagons were taken; 35 burghers surrendered to General Fetherstonhaugh during his march back to Klerksdorp.

General Dixon, after his return to Naauwpoort (214), moved westward to search for buried guns and ammunition, of which he had information. On the 29th of May he left his camp at Vlakkfontein (584) under a sufficient guard and moved to Waterval (68). On this farm he found the spot where the guns had been buried, but they had been removed.

Throughout the march bodies of Boers had been seen to the west, and these became active as soon as the force began to return towards Vlakkfontein. The rear guard, consisting of some 350 men with 2 guns, was sharply attacked, and at first successfully checked the enemy, although much harassed by a veldt fire lit by the Boers. The rear guard retired for about a mile along the ridge leading to the camp and formed up again to cover the main body, which had diverged slightly to the north. A large body of the enemy had meanwhile assembled in the valley to the south of the ridge on which the rear guard was posted. These advanced rapidly against the left of the position, and, appearing suddenly through the smoke of the grass fire, shot down the gunners and gun teams at short range and inflicted heavy loss on the Infantry and Yeomanry. The rear guard was forced to retire, and as, owing to the loss of the horses, the guns could not be removed they fell temporarily into the enemy's hands. General Dixon, however, had at once gone to the assistance of his rear guard, and on his arrival with reinforcements the Boers were driven out of the position they had seized and the guns recaptured. Our casualties were heavy; 6 Officers and 43 men were killed, and 7 Officers and 123 men were wounded. 41 of the enemy's dead were left on the field. The Boers were under the command of General Kemp and numbered about 1,500.

As General Dixon's information tended to show that reinforcements for the enemy were arriving, he decided to concentrate his whole force at Naauwpoort (214), and withdrew to that place on the evening of the 30th of May.

On receipt of news of this engagement, General Fetherstonhaugh, with the columns

under Colonels Sir H. Rawlinson, Williams, and Hickie, was at once ordered to advance north from Klerksdorp, so as to deal promptly with General Kemp's following. Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton's column was brought by rail from Greylingstad to Krugersdorp; Lord Methuen, then operating near Zeerust, was directed to move down south-west through Doornkop.

On General Fetherstonhaugh's force approaching Koperfontein (566) on the 6th June, General Kemp's commandos, which had remained near the scene of the recent fight, moved westward. Finding that the enemy showed no signs of making a stand, General Fetherstonhaugh directed General Gilbert Hamilton, who had reached Zandfontein (256), to return to Krugersdorp, near which place there was other useful work awaiting him.

Information having been received that General Kemp intended to move north-east to join General Beyers, in the Waterberg District, General Dixon was sent through Olifants Nek to Boschhoek (268) to block the passes north of Rustenburg. General Fetherstonhaugh meanwhile continued the direct pursuit through the difficult country west of the Magaliesberg. On the 9th of June he overtook the enemy at Roodeval (752) and captured 17 prisoners, 33 wagons and a quantity of ammunition. After this action the Boers retired northward; General Fetherstonhaugh therefore continued his advance across the Rustenburg-Zeerust Road up to the line of the Elands River, but finding no trace of the commandos in this direction he turned back and soon after regained touch with them at Vlakhoek (218). General Fetherstonhaugh now brought General Dixon's column south to Selous Kraal (645) to watch the country to his left flank, and with the remainder of his force advanced on Vlakhoek. The enemy, fearing to be surrounded, scattered in all directions, most of the Boers making for the south. General Fetherstonhaugh, with the columns under Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson and Lieut.-Colonel Hickie, now proceeded to Klerksdorp; Lieut.-Colonel Williams being directed on Krugersdorp to reft.

In order to deal with any Boers who might seek to break east during General Fetherstonhaugh's operations, Colonel Allenby's column marched from Pretoria on the 10th of June, and swept through the Hekpoort Valley; the passes through the Witwatersberg being held by General Gilbert Hamilton's troops. Breed's Nek, in the Magaliesberg, which was found to be held in some strength, was cleared without difficulty by Colonel Allenby, supported by General Hamilton. Both columns then moved westward in conjunction, at first to Tafel Kop, and thence south through Ventersdorp to Klerksdorp.

General Fetherstonhaugh having replenished his supplies at Klerksdorp was instructed to move against Kemp, who, with a portion of his followers, had taken up a position near Koperfontein (566). Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson and Lieut.-Colonel Hickie's columns marched north through Ventersdorp, while Lieut.-Colonel Williams, who had already moved west from Krugersdorp to Klerkskraal, advanced on the right of the other columns. By the 30th of June, General Fetherstonhaugh's force (with the exception of General Dixon's troops at Magato Nek) were on the line Vlakfontein (584)-Syferwater (6)-Doornput (550) to the south-west of Koperfontein. Lieut.-Colonel Williams from Vlakfontein (584) moved to the east of Koper-

fontein and drove the enemy westward, inflicting some loss as they crossed the front of his troops. As they fled towards Stoenbokfontein (570) the Boers also came under fire from Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson's guns, but a deep kloof which intervened prevented his mounted troops from closing in upon the enemy.

Lord Methuen had returned to Mafeking after the dispersal of Kemp's force; his troops were then employed in escorting convoys to Zeerust. A number of Boers, with stock and wagons having collected near the Enzel Berg, north-east of Zeerust, Lord Methuen moved against them on the 3rd of July, and on that and two following days captured 43 prisoners, 57 rifles and 46 wagons. 3 Boers surrendered and 3 were killed. Our casualties were 2 men wounded.

At the end of June, General G. Hamilton and Colonel Allenby, reinforced by Lieut.-Colonel Western, undertook some useful operations in the vicinity of Klerksdorp, which resulted in the breaking up of a commando which had assembled in the Hartebeestfontein hills.

In consequence of the somewhat determined opposition offered to columns under Major-General Barton and Major C. Williams which had been detached from Pretoria and Krugersdorp respectively to cover the establishment of a line of posts along the line of the Crocodile River to be occupied by the South African Constabulary, Colonel Allenby was ordered to march with all speed towards Krugersdorp, and thence to move down the left bank of the Crocodile to co-operate with General Barton. Colonel Allenby's column reached Vlakplaats (20) north of Krugersdorp on the 7th of July.

Operations between the Delagoa and Natal lines.

8. Towards the end of April many of the enemy, who had been obliged by General Sir Bindon Blood's operations to abandon their haunts north of the Pretoria-Delagoa line; began to swell the commandos already collected in the vicinity of Ermelo and Bethel. In order to prevent any attempt to concentrate in this quarter, a column under Brigadier-General Bullock was in the first instance, pushed north from Volksrust, with instructions to operate in the vicinity of Ermelo. General Bullock advanced through Amersfoort, and after several successful engagements drove the Boers from Ermelo on the 9th of May. A few days later Colonel Rimington's column arrived from Standerton, and the combined force cleared the neighbourhood of Ermelo, the bulk of the enemy retiring towards Bethel.

General Bullock then disposed his own troops on the line Ermelo-Lake Chrissie, in order to close the roads leading north-east, connecting on his right with General Blood's columns under General W. Kitchener and Lieut.-Colonel W. Pulteney, which were by this time approaching Ermelo from the north. Colonel Rimington meanwhile marched westward to join hands with Brigadier-General Plumer, who was advancing on Bethel from the west.

General Plumer had left the eastern line at Silverton near Pretoria on the 14th of May, being charged with the control of a combined movement against Boer laagers reported near the source of the Wilge River. Other columns under Colonel Allenby from Whitbank and Colonel E. Knox from Greylingstad were simultaneously directed on the same objective. General Plumer and Colonel Allenby effected a junction at Kromdraai (100) on the 16th of May, being joined by Colonel Knox on the following day. The Boers, who had hitherto frequented this neighbourhood, broke up their

laagers on the approach of our troops, dispersing chiefly towards the south and east.

Colonel Allenby who was ordered to move on Springs, engaged one of the commandos near Leeuwkop (218), and drove them south-east. General Plumer with Colonel Knox moved east on Bethel, where they gained touch with Colonel Rimington on the 20th of May. During the march considerable opposition was met with by General Plumer's column, which moved on the right flank south of the main Bethel road. 37 prisoners and a large amount of stock were taken on the way to Bethel.

After hearing Colonel Rimington's report of the enemy's movements east of Bethel, General Plumer decided to extend the three columns now at his disposal on the line Bethel-Middelplaats (52), and from thence to sweep down to the Vaal, clearing the country between the Leeuw-spruit and Kaffir Spruit. During the progress of this movement a return convoy proceeding from Bethel to Standerton was heavily attacked by some 400 Boers on the 25th of May, while on the march between Whitbank (274) and Mooi-fontein (207). The escort under Colonel Gallwey fought with great gallantry and completely foiled the enemy's repeated attempts to press into close quarters. Our casualties were 1 officer and 5 men killed, and 1 officer and 24 men wounded. The Boers lost about 6 killed and 30 wounded.

General Plumer's and Colonel Knox's columns halted in the vicinity of Standerton, and Colonel Rimington at Platrand. Since leaving Bethel 37 prisoners had been captured by, or had surrendered to the columns, and 650 horses were driven in.

General Bullock, who had in the meantime been operating to the east of Ermelo, was joined on the 25th of May by a column from Standerton under Lieut.-Colonel Grey. These two officers, acting in conjunction, carried out a series of raids by night on the various farmhouses along the banks of the Vaal in the district south-east of Ermelo, capturing many armed Burghers. Subsequently both columns marched into Standerton at the beginning of June.

Colonel Grey again set out for the Ermelo district on the 5th of June with the object of endeavouring to capture a Boer gun reported to be with a commando on the Kaffir Spruit. At dawn on the 11th he surprised the enemy's laager in Rietvlei (66), after a sharp fight, in which the Boers lost 1 killed, 2 wounded and 9 prisoners. After energetically searching the country between Ermelo and Bethel, but without finding the gun of which he was in search, Colonel Grey marched back to Standerton.

General Bullock completed the refitting of his column by the 10th of June, when he moved by the Ermelo road to the junction of the Vaal and Mabusa Spruit. From Beginderlyn his troops scoured the country in all directions, but found few of the enemy, and those that were seen showed no inclination to fight. A few days later, General Bullock moved further east and accomplished some useful clearing operations to the east of Elandsberg, and thence down the valley of the Assegai River. At the end of June, General Bullock was called in to the railway, and reached Standerton on the 4th of July.

Brigadier-General Plumer's operations in the south-eastern Transvaal.

9. Soon after General Plumer's arrival in the neighbourhood of Standerton in the end of May,

considerable Boer forces were reported to be wandering about in the country between Amersfoort and Piet Retief. He was therefore directed to make a sweep towards the eastward, as soon as he had refitted his troops. In accordance with these instructions, he disposed his columns on the 1st of June in readiness for this fresh advance on the line Platrand (196)-Springbokfontein (86)-Uitkyk. The route prescribed for Colonel Rimington, whose column was on the right flank, led through Amersfoort to a point on the left bank of the Assegai River some 20 miles west of Piet Retief. General Plumer, marching in the centre, was to pass the Mabusa Spruit near its junction with the Vaal. Colonel Knox, on the left, was directed to keep on the right bank of the Vaal until reaching Witpunt (16), 13 miles south of Ermelo, cross the river there and move towards Piet Retief.

By the 8th of June, all three columns had reached the line Driefontein (331)-Breda (133)-Waterval Drift (6), to the north-west of their objective. At dawn on the following morning the centre and left columns descended on Piet Retief from the north, while Colonel Rimington, making a detour by night, blocked the roads leading south from the town. General Plumer found the place deserted, but near Swartwater Drift (41) on the Vryheid Road, Colonel Rimington succeeded in cutting off a Boer convoy. 30 prisoners, 12 wagons, and 100 horses were taken, the Landdrost of Piet Retief, William Emmett, being found among the prisoners.

From Piet Retief, General Plumer and Colonel Knox turned towards Wakkerstroom to meet a supply convoy which was now due. After picking up the convoy, General Plumer's columns traversed the almost inaccessible Slangapiesberg, Colonel Rimington being stationed on the south-east of the mountains to block retreat in that direction.

Having cleared this most difficult tract of country as far as practicable, General Plumer pushed on with his whole force to Paul Pietersburg, where he arrived at daybreak on the 20th of June. This place, like Piet Retief, was found to be abandoned; all the columns consequently converged on Utrecht. Since leaving Piet Retief 26 burghers had surrendered, 21 prisoners and 232 horses had been taken, and over 100 wagons and carts destroyed.

Soon after General Plumer reached Utrecht he detached Colonel Rimington to act against the enemy in the valley of the Pongola River to the north of the town. Colonel Rimington started on the night of the 26th of June, marching himself with the main body of his column to Tiverton (20), while Lieut.-Colonel Wing made a detour to the east over the Elandsberg Pass to Schuilhoek (40). A small force from Utrecht watched Elands Nek, and Mounted Infantry from Wakkerstroom were posted at Castrol's Nek. Colonel Wing attacked at dawn, and drove the enemy up the valley, where they unexpectedly found themselves taken in rear by Colonel Rimington's guns; they then at once broke and fled in all directions. 6 Boers were killed and 3 captured, 9 wagons and carts, 6,500 rounds of ammunition, and a number of horses and cattle were also taken.

After operating for a few days in the vicinity of Wakkerstroom, Colonel Rimington returned to Platrand independently.

General Plumer and Colonel Knox left Utrecht on the 28th of June for the north, moving through Amsterdam on Carolina. They reached Bothwell (140) near Lake Chrissie on the 7th of July.

Major-General Beatson's operations.

10. After General Plumer's arrival at Bethel, Major-General Beatson, who had been watching the line Middelburg-Bronkhorstspruit, collected his force at Brugspruit. He was then instructed to move south towards the junction of the Olifants River and Steenkool Spruit, where some of the Boers, driven from Bethel were reported to have assembled.

General Beatson marched from Brugspruit on the 25th of May, and was joined two days later by Colonel Allenby's column from Springs. During the advance from Springs, Major Garratt, with a small detachment of Colonel Allenby's force, had captured 8 prisoners, a Colt gun, 8 wagons, 40 mules, besides some rifles and ammunition. Soon after crossing to the right bank of the Olifants River, General Beatson drove Piet Trichard's commando from a strong position on Vaalkrans (24), taking all their wagons and stock after a long gallop. As no further considerable body of the enemy could be located in the vicinity of Brugspruit, Lieut.-Colonel Hippisley (temporarily commanding Colonel Allenby's column) marched in to Wilge River Station and thence with his mounted troops to Pretoria.

On the 6th of June General Beatson again moved out to the junction of the Olifants River and Steenkool Spruit, to operate round that locality on his way to Bethel. While encamped at Van Dyck's Drift (200) on the 10th, he detached a force of four companies Victorian Mounted Rifles with two pom-poms, under Major Morris, to act against a small force of the enemy reported at Boschmansfontein (204).

The detachment reached its destination and found the laager evacuated. On the 12th General Beatson sent instructions to Major Morris to combine with him at dawn on the 13th in an attack on another body of the enemy reported to be at Elandsfontein (256). The detachment bivouacked on the evening of the 12th at Wilmansrust (22). At about 7.30 p.m. a body of the enemy, which in the darkness had evaded the outposts, crept up close to the bivouac, opened a heavy fire, stampeded the horses, and after a few minutes rushed the camp. The pom-poms were captured and removed, 2 officers and 16 men were killed, and 4 officers and 38 men wounded; a number of the men were made prisoners, but shortly afterwards released.

General Beatson received information of this reverse at 1.30 a.m. on the 13th; leaving his baggage under the guard of his infantry, he set out at once with all available mounted men and arrived at Wilmansrust shortly after daybreak. The Boers, however, had moved off again immediately after the action, and were out of reach; General Beatson therefore concentrated his force at Koornfontein (102).

The column then moved east, and came in touch with General Blood's troops at Hartebeest-spruit (20) north of Ermelo on the 19th. General Beatson's force proceeded to Middelburg a few days later to refit. The results of his operations from the 6th to 19th of June were as follows:—Boers killed and wounded 16, prisoners 23, rifles 160, ammunition 10,850 rounds, 58 wagons and carts, besides some stock.

Lieut.-General Sir Bindon Blood's operations in the eastern Transvaal.

11. On the completion of General Sir Bindon Blood's operations north of the Delagoa Railway it was decided to send a strong force from Middelburg towards Ermelo to co-operate with General Bullock, while other columns searched the difficult country bounded on the north by

the railway and on the south by the line Carolina-Holnek (41)-Steynsdorp.

These movements began on the 13th of May, on which date Major-General W. Kitchener and Lieut.-Colonel Pulteney left Middelburg for Ermelo. By the 17th their columns were close to Ermelo and in touch with General Bullock, whose troops held a line from Lake Chrissie southwards. As the bulk of the enemy were found to have completely abandoned the country round Ermelo, General Kitchener and Colonel Pulteney were directed to turn eastward, and to operate towards Steynsdorp. Concurrently with the advance on Ermelo, General Blood occupied Carolina with his cavalry on the 17th of May. Colonel Benson marched south from Belfast, and having crossed the Komati Valley at Nootgedacht (166) at once set to work clearing the country to the eastward. Lieut.-Colonel Douglas, moving from Machadodorp through Uitkomst (138), operated between Komati River and the railway.

In the meantime Brigadier-General Spens occupied a position on the railway, at Nelspruit, to prevent the enemy retiring northward, and to stop any Boers who might seek to move south from Spitzkop, flying from Colonel Park's column, which, starting from Lydenburg, crossed the Mauchberg, and thence moved on Nelspruit.

During these operations General Blood's columns killed 4 and captured 18 of the enemy. 9 burghers surrendered.

On the 10th of June a combined movement was begun, under the immediate direction of Brigadier-General Spens, with the object of thoroughly searching the mountainous region lying within the triangle Machadodorp-Lydenburg-Nelspruit. General Spens, with his own column and that under Colonel Park, operated north-west from Nelspruit, while Colonels Benson and Douglas moved north-east from Machadodorp. The area above described was thoroughly cleared by the end of June, the following results having been obtained:—17 Boers killed, 48 prisoners captured, 107 rifles, 38,700 rounds of ammunition, 266 vehicles, and a considerable quantity of stock and supplies of all sorts seized.

In consequence of the attack on General Beatson's detachment on the 12th of June, General Sir Bindon Blood was ordered to move west from Carolina with such troops as were within reach. He formed Major-General Babington's Cavalry Brigade and the 1st King's Royal Rifles into two columns under General Babington and Colonel Campbell, sending orders to Major-General W. Kitchener and Colonel Pulteney, who had by this time worked down to Amsterdam, to follow as quickly as possible. On the 13th of June signalling communication was established between General Sir Bindon Blood's Head-quarters, at Klipstapel (145), a few miles north of Ermelo, and the columns under General W. Kitchener and General Beatson, the latter of whom joined General Blood the following day.

The columns under General Babington, Colonel Campbell, and General W. Kitchener were directed to move west to the line Middelkraal (298)-Uitgedacht (292), north of Bethel. Colonel Pulteney was also to follow in the same direction as soon as he arrived from Carolina, where he had gone to draw supplies.

General Blood accompanied General Beatson's column to Middelburg, arriving on the 25th of June. This column was left at Middelburg to be reorganized. General Blood moved out south with a convoy of supplies to join the columns under Generals Babington and Kitchener and

Colonel Campbell, who were all at Middelkraal (289) on the 30th. The movement towards Springs was resumed the following day, Colonel Campbell on the right, marching on Kleinkoppie (305), General Babington on Roopepoort (84), and General Kitchener on Grootpan (317). On the 3rd of July General Kitchener opened up communication with Colonel Colville's column, near Watervals Hoek (204). Colonel Colville had moved north from the Standerton-Heidelberg line, and Lieut.-Colonel Garratt, who had relieved Lieut.-Colonel Grey, had also led his column from Greylingstad northwards to the neighbourhood of Boschmanskop (189).

Colonel Pulteney reached the vicinity of Middelburg on the 3rd of July, having been obliged to come in to the railway to replenish his supplies. As General Viljoen and other leaders had collected a considerable number of burghers in the country immediately to the north of Middelburg, and it was reported that they intended to move eastwards, arrangements were made to check any such attempt; Colonel Benson was sent from Machadodorp to occupy Dullstroom; Colonel Park, from Lydenburg, was ordered west so as to threaten the enemy from the north; while General Spens' own column was brought from Nelspruit to Wonderfontein to be in readiness to act as circumstances required.

Colonel Benson, on the 3rd of July, had an engagement near Vlakkfontein (465), 12 miles north-west of Machadodorp, and drove back the enemy, who lost 6 killed and one prisoner. Our casualties were 3 killed and 8 wounded. On the 7th Colonel Benson was attacked near Dullstroom by General Ben Viljoen with the Johannesburg and Middelburg commandos. The enemy was driven off and pursued through a difficult country as far as Windhoek (443). General Spens is now moving out from Wonderfontein to co-operate with Colonel Benson, who will press on against Viljoen.

Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell's Operations in the Northern Transvaal.

12. In the beginning of May information was received from the north to the effect that there were many scattered parties of Boers in the Zoutpansberg district, moving generally in a northward direction. It was therefore decided to despatch a force from Pietersburg to Louis Trichard, a small township in the Bushveld, about 100 miles north of Pietersburg, and from that point to head off the northward trek. Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell was in charge of the expedition; his troops consisted of 600 men of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, the 12th Battalion Mounted Infantry, 2 guns, and four companies of the 2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment.

The column left Pietersburg on the 7th of May. Lieut.-Colonel Colenbrander (Kitchener's Fighting Scouts), commanding the advanced force, occupied Louis Trichard two days later.

Colonel Grenfell, after disarming the Boers found in the town and clearing the country round, pushed on eastward in pursuit of those of the enemy who had retreated towards the Portuguese frontier. By the 17th of May he had reached the Yzerberg.

A few days later, while operating in the broken country east of the Yzerberg, a detachment under Lieut.-Colonel Colenbrander, by a well-planned night-march, surprised a laager on the Klip Spruit. Field-Cornet Venter, with 72 burghers, 68 rifles, 18 wagons, and a large amount of ammunition, besides a large number of cattle, were captured.

At the request of Commandant Van Rensburg and Field-Cornet Du Preeze, Lieut.-Colonel

Grenfell met them on the 25th of May, and after a satisfactory interview, accepted the surrender of themselves and their followers, some 150 men.

After this arrangement had been come to, Colonel Colenbrander, who was no longer required, was sent off to search the country round Buffels, where some roving bands were reported. Here he was engaged with small parties of the enemy, of whom he killed 7 and captured a Maxim gun. A detachment of Lieut.-Colonel Colenbrander's force, under Major Knott, overtook a commando under Barend Viljoen and captured 79 prisoners and 13,000 rounds of ammunition. As soon as Commandant Van Rensburg had collected his followers and their families, Colonel Grenfell marched back with them to Pietersburg.

The total results of Colonel Grenfell's expedition to the Zoutpansberg, the success of which did much to secure the pacification of the north of the Transvaal, included 9 Boers killed, upwards of 150 prisoners of war, several hundreds of voluntary surrenders, 550 rifles, 200,000 rounds of ammunition, a Maxim gun, and 175 wagons, besides much stock.

Operations on the Pietersburg Line.

13. Shortly after the departure of Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell's force for Louis Trichard, General Beyers, who had collected several hundred burghers in the Waterberg district, seemed about to make a raid on the Pietersburg line. A column under Lieut.-Colonel Wilson, consisting of a wing of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, 2 guns, and 2 companies of the 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders, was accordingly concentrated at Naboom Spruit. In addition to this force Major McMicking with 400 Mounted Infantry and 2 guns detached from Pretoria were ordered to co-operate from Nylstroom.

The operations began on the 19th of May, when Lieut.-Colonel Wilson overtook a Boer commando near Boekenhout's Kloof (1809), 20 miles north-west of Nylstroom. The results of the engagement which ensued were very satisfactory, Field-Cornet Oosthuisen, with 79 burghers, 100 rifles, 33,500 rounds of ammunition, 66 wagons, much dynamite, and a large number of cattle, being taken.

The remnant of the enemy's force retired westward and was again attacked on the 21st of May by Lieut.-Colonel Wilson at Zandriverspoort (315). On this occasion part of Major McMicking's force made a demonstration in front of the Boer position, while the remainder accompanied Lieut.-Colonel Wilson, who made a detour by Geelhout's Kop and attacked the enemy in rear. The Boers, finding their position turned, fled, leaving 18 prisoners, 48 rifles, 9,600 rounds of ammunition, and 44 wagons in our hands.

On the 1st of June a small force detached by Colonel Wilson from Warm Baths had a sharp engagement near the Rooiberg with some 500 Boers under Uys and Pretorius, but succeeded in forcing the enemy towards Colonel Wilson, who attacked and defeated them at Clark's Store on the following day. The enemy, who made a stubborn resistance, lost 40 prisoners, 70 rifles, 48 wagons, 8,000 cattle, besides dynamite and ammunition.

During the first three weeks of June, Colonel Wilson and Major McMicking, operating from Warm Baths and Nylstroom respectively, covered the Pietersburg line from any attack from the west until a force could be collected at Piet Potgieter's Rust to join in a combined attack on General Beyer's commando in the Zand River Valley from the north-east.

By the 21st of June the arrangements for an

advance on General Beyer's position at Zandriverspoort (315) were complete. Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell marched from Piet Potgieter's Rust south-west through Groot Hoek (507) to strike at the enemy's rear, while Major McMicking made a direct movement from Nylstroom. The march of Colonel Grenfell's force was much delayed by the extremely broken and almost roadless country which had to be traversed. These unavoidable delays enabled General Beyers to withdraw to the westward.

Colonel Grenfell then occupied Zandriverspoort (315) as an advanced base, from which his mounted troops scoured the surrounding country. Besides other minor successes, he succeeded in surprising and capturing a Boer laager at Hopewell (56) at daylight on the 1st of July, after a march of 40 miles. One Boer was killed, 93 prisoners, 100 horses, 2,000 cattle, and 2,000 rounds of ammunition were taken. After this expedition Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell returned to Zandriverspoort (315).

Operations in the Standerton-Heidelberg district.

14. Some successful operations were undertaken early in May by troops in Major-General Clewett's command, against the enemy's laagers on the right bank of the Vaal near Blaauwkoopie, some 25 miles north-east of Standerton. The roads leading south from the river having been blocked by troops detached from Standerton and Platrand, Lieut.-Colonel Colville led his column by night along the Standerton-Ermelo road and attacked from the north at dawn on the 5th of May. The enemy scattered in all directions, leaving 8 prisoners, 1 Maxim-Nordenfeldt machine gun, 15 rifles, 12 wagons, and 15 horses in the hands of our troops.

In the middle of May, Colonel Colville, whose column had been strengthened by four squadrons of regular cavalry, marched from De Lange's Drift up the right bank of the Klip River, through the Verzammelberg, thus co-operating with General Elliot's simultaneous movement through Vrede to the Natal border. On arriving near the junction of the Klip and Ganzvlei, Colonel Colville crossed into the Orange River Colony, and moving by Gemsbok Hoek Berg, where he encountered some opposition, returned to De Lange's Drift. Large captures of stock were made in the course of this march.

At the beginning of June, Colonel Colville's column moved down the right bank of the Vaal towards Villiersdorp, which he cleared, as well as many farms along the north bank of the river. On the 22nd of June he moved north from Val Station to act on the left flank of Lieut.-Colonel Grey's column, which had left Standerton on the previous day to operate against the enemy west of Bethel. Both columns converged on Watervalshoek (204), from which place Colonel Grey drove some 400 of the enemy on the 25th. Colonel Colville remained in the vicinity of Watervalshoek, awaiting to connect with General Blood's columns, which were expected from the north-east; Lieut.-Colonel Grey marched into the railway at Greylingstad to fill up with supplies.

Lieut.-Colonel Garratt, who now took over command from Colonel Grey, moved north, in the direction of Boschman's Kop (189), so as to bring his force on the west of Colonel Colville. By the 3rd of July, Colonel Garratt had reached Boschman's Kop (189), and was in communication with Colonel Colville at Watervalshoek (204), who, from his position, was in touch with General W. Kitchener at Grootpan (317).

Lieut.-Colonel Garratt arrived in Springs on the 8th of July.

Operations in Cape Colony.

15. The operations in Cape Colony have been of a very complicated nature, and may be generally described as a series of rapid movements of small Boer forces, acting more or less independently, and always followed or headed by small columns of our troops. The Boer numbers have not, at any time, exceeded 1,200 men, and they have had no fixed base of operations, but have lived entirely on the country. The principal leaders are Scheepers, Malan, Fouché, Kruitziager, Lotter, Myburg, Smits, Van Reenan, Latagan, Maritz, and Conroy.

In the beginning of May, Scheepers, who was posted near Daggaboers Nek, was attacked by Colonel Henniker and driven north. Breaking back, he succeeded in reaching the Koetzeesberg. Here, for a time, the commando concealed itself, but being again chased out of the kloofs, Scheepers moved by Pearston and Kendrew into the Camdeboo Mountains, west of Graaf Reinet. He arrived there on the 23rd of May, closely followed by the Victorian Bushmen of Colonel Henniker's column. In his flight Scheepers's force had been reduced from 200 to 100 men, but in Camdeboo he was joined by 70 men belonging to the commando of Swanepoel, who had been killed.

Malan did not accompany Scheepers to Daggaboers Nek, but remained west of Cradock. Lieut.-Colonel Scobell operated against this commando, and on the 20th of May, before dawn, surprised the laager, killing 4 men and capturing 40 horses, and many saddles and rifles. Malan afterwards moved west to the neighbourhood of Richmond, and has since remained in that district, constantly harassed by small columns under Major Mullins and Captain Lund. He attacked Richmond on the 25th of June, but was unable to overcome the defence, and withdrew on the approach of Captain Lund's column next day.

In the middle of May Kruitziager and Lotter, who had brought some 500 men from the Orange River Colony, joined Fouché in the Zuurburg, north of Steynsburg. Colonel Haig, who was directing the operations of the mobile columns, arranged a converging movement of the Cape Mounted Rifles and the columns under Colonels Monro, Gorringe, Crabbe, Scobell, and Murray, on these commandos. The enemy, however, broke through towards Maraisburg, but were headed off into the Bamboes Mountains, where they were able to evade our columns until the end of May. Kruitziager, with Lotter, Myburg, and Fouché, then made a dash across the Molteno railway near Cyphergat and moved eastward. Van Reenan broke north-west into the Steynsburg district.

Our columns followed the main body which, on the 2nd June, captured, after a faint defence by the Town Guard, the strongly-entrenched village of Jamestown; 150 horses, some thousands of rounds of ammunition, and much needed supplies of food and clothing fell into the enemy's hands.

Constant endeavours were made to surprise the enemy by night. On the 6th of June, Colonel Scobell's column caught a commando asleep at 3 a.m. Lieut.-Colonel Lukin, with a squadron of Cape Mounted Rifles, rushed the laager in the dark, killing 6 Boers and capturing 25 prisoners, and all the saddles of the commando.

The direction of operations in Cape Colony was now entrusted to Lieut.-General French, who took over command of all mobile columns in Cape Colony on the 9th of June.

By this time the commandoes had separated widely, and it became necessary to detach columns to follow and hunt down each. Colonels Monro and Crabbe overtook Kruitziuger and Lotter, on the 17th of June, 25 miles south-east of Maraisburg. The Boers left 4 killed, 12 wounded, and 25 dead horses on the field. Our captures included 8 prisoners, 50 horses, and some ammunition and saddles. On the 21st of June, a party of 60 Midland Mounted Rifles, a local corps, was surrounded and captured by Kruitziuger between Cradock and Graaf Reinet; 9 men were killed and 2 officers and 10 men were wounded.

About the 25th of June, Fouché, who had been moving eastward for some time, crossed the Drakensberg into the Maclear district, probably in the hope of getting recruits and fresh horses. At the end of June he was still near Maclear, and troops had been sent to block the passes through which he had gone. Myburg, with about 80 men, was north of Jamestown, and Erasmus, with 70, east of Rayner Station; these parties were being hunted by Colonel Monro. Van Reenan had been pursued by Colonel Crabbe to the Bamboes Mountains. Colonel Scobell was driving Kruitziuger towards Colonel Crabbe. Colonels Crewe, Doran, and Wyndham, were operating against Scheepers and Hugo in the Gamdeboo Mountains, and Captain Lund was chasing the small parties of Malan, Breedt, and Smits, near Richmond.

In the west of the Colony, two parties of Boers, in strength about 100 each, under Maritz and Conroy, have been for some time moving about. They have several times been successfully engaged by our small forces in the Calvinia district. Conroy, after suffering considerable loss, has been driven north across the Orange River.

General Situation.

16. The general effect of recent operations has been a gradual weakening of the enemy's power of offence.

During the months of May and June, the Boer losses have undoubtedly been very heavy, and in the constant small fights and skirmishes there must have been many casualties which have never been reported. Our frequent captures of prisoners continue to constitute a steady drain on the numbers still remaining in the field.

The loss of their ox-wagons has seriously affected the enemy's mobility and supply arrangements, and though the Boers are still able, in case of emergency, to concentrate a considerable number of men, they are now, in my opinion, unable to undertake any large scheme of operations. Divided up into small parties of three to four hundred men, they are scattered all over the country without plans and without hope, and on the approach of our troops they disperse to re-assemble in the same neighbourhood when our men pass on. In this way they continue an

obstinate resistance without retaining anything or defending the smallest portion of this vast country.

The apparently inexhaustible supply of meat and mealies furnishes them with food, but they are short of ammunition, which they now use sparingly, unless an opportunity occurs of surprising or ambushing some detached party of our troops numerically much inferior to themselves.

I consider that throughout the Transvaal, Orange River Colony, and Cape Colony, there are now not more than 13,500 Boers in the field, but with long lines of railway to hold, every yard of which has to be defended, both to secure our own Military and Civil supplies, and, what is more important, to prevent the enemy from obtaining necessaries by the capture of our trains, the employment of large numbers of troops continues to be a necessity. Mobile columns are also required to operate against the scattered bands of the enemy and complete the exhaustion of his resources.

As in all guerilla warfare this is a slow process and great patience is required to see the inevitable end of an insensate resistance, which some may consider patriotic, but which has, in my opinion, long since forfeited such a designation and become an unjustifiable prolongation of the war sufferings of women and children. Such continuance of hostilities, causing so much devastation of the country and distress to their own families, is due to the ignorant arrogance of leaders, who, though originally opposed to the war, are unwilling now to submit to what they foresaw would be its inevitable consequences.

The Boer party who declared war have quitted the field and are now urging those whom they deserted to continue a useless struggle by giving lying assurances to the ignorant burghers of outside assistance, and by raising absurdly deceitful hopes that Great Britain has not sufficient endurance to see the matter through.

Recommendations for Good Service.

17. Throughout the period covered by this despatch, the troops in the field and their commanders have continued to show those soldierly qualities which have marked their work throughout this campaign; they cheerfully respond to the constant and heavy calls made upon them, and to their efforts is due in a large degree the steady progress which has been made against the enemy. I enclose lists (A) of Officers and (B) of non-commissioned officers and men whose good services I desire to bring specially to notice. The latter includes a number who have been promoted by me, but I hope that such promotion may not prejudice the grant of any further recognition which you may think desirable.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 10th instant, from His Majesty's Representative at Belgrade, enclosing the following translation of further regulations with regard to quarantine published in the Official Gazette of the preceding day:—

La frontière été ouverte à Ristovats, (1.) pour les voyageurs et leurs bagages qui sont munis de preuves (passeport) qu'ils ne viennent pas directement de Constantinople ou de ses environs, et après qu'ils se sont soumis à une désinfection par le glycéphormole (ou gliciformole) à la frontière Serbe.

(2.) Pour les voyageurs et leurs bagages venant de Constantinople, et ses environs, s'ils fournissent la preuve qu'il y a déjà 12 jours qu'ils ont quitté Constantinople et ses environs, au moment où ils arrivent à la frontière Serbe.

(3.) Si par la revision des passeports il serait constaté qu'il se trouve un seul voyageur dans le train qui n'ait pas quitté Constantinople et ses environs depuis 12 jours tout le convoi sera renvoyé de la frontière, comme étant suspecté d'infection.

(4.) Le trajet de la station frontière turque à la station frontière Serbe à Ristovats devra être fait à pieds pour éviter la communication des deux trains et de leur personnel strictement défendue.

(5.) Toutes les marchandises de manufacture qui ne proviennent pas de Constantinople et ses environs et qui ne sont pas mentionnées au chapitre A de la circulaire du 14 Novembre No. 11702, pourront passer la frontière, si elles sont chargées dans des wagons fermés et si le certificat (qui doit être signé par l'autorité sanitaire locale) et visé par le Consulat Serbe le plus rapproché, prouve que les marchandises proviennent d'endroits

qui ne sont pas infectés, qu'elles n'ont pas touché Constantinople et ses environs, qu'elles ne proviennent pas d'autres portes de la Turquie d'Europe, sauf Salonique, et qu'elles ne seront pas manipulées en cours de route pour la Serbie.

(6.) Avec tous les voyageurs on procédera en outre suivant les dispositions du §§ 2-10, point 2/B de la Circulaire du 14 Novembre 1899, No. 11702.

Translation of Sections 1-10 of Article 2 of Chapter B of the Circular of November 14, 1899.

(1.) Le passage des voyageurs en Serbie ne sera admis par voie de terre que, sur les lignes du chemin de fer de:—(a.) Belgrade Niche Pirov; (b.) Belgrade Niche Vranja; (c.) Belgrade Lopovo Kragujevats, et par voie fluviale, seulement aux stations de Strabats et Obrenovits sur la Save, et, Belgrade Semendria, Dubrovitsa, Grodiste, Colubovats et Negotine sur le Danube.

Les autres endroits de passage à la frontière sont interdites.

(2.) Le Médecin du chemin de fer ou celui du Gouvernement assistera à l'embarquement et débarquement des voyageurs dans les stations frontières du chemin de fer. Le personnel du train tiendra un compte exacte de la santé des voyageurs du train, et portera tout incident soupçonneux à la connaissance de l'autorité de police de l'endroit où le débarquement des voyageurs a eu lieu.

(3.) Le médecin local du Gouvernement ou celui de la commune assisteront toujours au débarquement des passagers des bateaux.

(4.) Les bagages des voyageurs, vieux effets, de déménagement et de lits usés, doivent être soumis à une désinfection à la station frontière.

(5.) Tous les voyageurs qui viennent d'endroits infectés sont tenus de se soumettre à une observation médicale pendant 12 jours dans la localité où ils sont descendus, comptant du jour de leur départ en voyage. Ils ont le droit de libre circulation dans l'endroit même.

(6.) Afin de pouvoir exécuter exactement la visite médicale partout, là où il y a de médecins, et de pouvoir contrôler le procédé des tribunaux communaux là où il n'y a pas de médecins locaux on ordonne aux Préfectures de recommander très sévèrement aux organes de la police le long des lignes de Chemin de fer et le long des rives de la Save et du Danube de tenir compte exacte du transit des voyageurs provenant d'endroits déclarés contaminés.

A cet effet dès que les voyageurs arrivent à la frontière les organes de la police devront se procurer d'eux les données très exactes de l'endroit et du jour auquel ils se sont mis en voyage pour la Serbie ainsi que de l'endroit auquel ils veulent séjourner en Serbie et de la durée de leur séjour.

Tous les jours, régulièrement, pendant toute la durée de l'épidémie dans les Etats déclarés contaminés, les organes de la Police chargés de cette surveillance sont tenus de porter à la connaissance de l'Autorité de Police de district ou de département de l'endroit dans lequel les voyageurs arrivés veulent séjourner et cela de la manière la plus courte possible, toutes les données qui leur sont fournies par les voyageurs mêmes et la dite Autorité en informera de son côté les tribunaux communaux.

(7.) Si le voyageur descend dans une localité où il y a un médecin ce dernier sera obligé de s'assurer tous les jours avant midi personnellement de l'état de santé du dit voyageur. La ou il n'y a pas de médecin local le tribunal communal local sera obligé d'informer tous les jours avant

midi, le Chef de son département, et ce dernier le médecin départemental ou d'arrondissement de l'état de santé d'un tel voyageur: cette observation médicale doit être exécutée pour la durée de 12 jours, du jour où le voyageur est parti pour la Serbie. Dès que des symptômes suspects de maladie se présentent chez un voyageur l'autorité de Police locale est tenue d'en informer sans retard la préfecture du département, qui de son côté devra envoyer sans retard son médecin sur les lieux, afin que ce dernier constate avec le médecin local s'il y en a un, la nature de la maladie, d'accord avec lequel ils prendront ensuite toutes les mesures nécessaires pour empêcher la propagation de la maladie.

(8.) Les wagons dans lesquels se trouvent des voyageurs malades ne peuvent pas passer la frontière; de même des voyageurs malades ne pourront pas se débarquer des bateaux à vapeur sur lesquels ils se trouvent.

(9.) Si dans un train il se présente quelque cas de maladie suspecte, le wagon dans lequel se trouve le malade sera décroché et laissé dans la station la plus rapprochée, d'une localité dans laquelle il y a un hôpital départemental et le malade sera envoyé au médecin local. Les autres voyageurs du même wagon pourront continuer leur voyage.

Les frais d'hôpital seront perçus de la même manière que pour les autres malades, sujets Serbes ou étrangers.

Translation of Circular No. 10076 of the Imperial and Royal Marine Board to all the Imperial and Royal Offices and Officers and Subordinate Port and Sanitary Offices and Officers.

By Decree of August 3, 1901 (B.L.I. No. 118) issued by the Imperial and Royal Ministries of the Interior, of Commerce and Finance in union with the Royal Hungarian Government, on account of cases of plague verified at Constantinople, the prohibition of importation and transit of certain specified goods and articles from Egypt, issued by Ministerial Decree of May 7, 1900 (B.L.I. No. 81), is extended to Constantinople, and this for the purpose of preventing the introduction of contagious diseases.

The present Order comes into force on the day that it is received respectively by the Custom House Offices and by the Marine Sanitary Offices.

This is made known with reference to Government Circular of May 9, 1900, No. 5740, for information and guidance, with the observation that the above-mentioned goods as well as in general those that would be considered suspect

from a sanitary point of view which would be introduced into Austria-Hungary during the time that the present Decree is in force, will be sent to the nearest lazaretto at the expense of the parties and there will be subjected by the Authorities to destruction or to disinfection, according to the case, without taking into consideration the damage of the goods, and this will be done at the expense of the parties without granting any compensation. EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875 (38 Vict. c. 17).

ORDER of Secretary of State modifying the General Rules as to packing for conveyance of explosives other than gunpowder.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Explosives Act, 1875 (in this Order referred to as the Act), an Order of the Secretary of State (known as Order of Secretary of State, No. 3) was made on the 27th day of November, 1875, adapting the General Rules relating to packing of gunpowder, contained in Part 1 of the Act, to the packing of explosives other than gunpowder; and whereas by section 83 of the Act it is provided that a

Secretary of State may by Order from time to time revoke, add to, or alter any previous Orders of the Secretary of State.

Now, therefore, in the exercise of the powers aforesaid, I, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby order as follows:—

There shall be appended to Part E, Rule 3, the following proviso:—

Provided that in the case of electric detonators, the quantity to be contained in any one such outer package may amount to not more than three thousand (3,000) electric detonators, or, if such outer package be provided with handles of such strength and construction as to allow it to be safely and conveniently carried by means of such handles, the number may be increased to five thousand (5,000).
