THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz:—

SPECIAL REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Clerk in the Departments of His Majesty's General Register House, Edinburgh (supplementary to the General Regulations respecting Open Competitive Examinations for situations in the Civil Service included in Schedule A of the Order in Council of 4th June, 1870).

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 20 and 25, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

2. No Candidate will be eligible who has not either (a) passed the First Examination in General Knowledge under the Regulations for the admission of Law Agents practising in Scotland, or (b) obtained the equivalent Leaving Certificates of the Scotch Education Department; and who has not within the last five years served for at least two years in the office of a Conveyancer in Scotland or as Engrossing Clerk, or Registered Boy Copyist in the Register House Departments. Evidence on these points must be sent in at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

3. The Examinations will be in the following subjects, viz:—

1. Elements of Conveyancing as practised in Scotland.
2. Handwriting and Orthography.
3. Copying MS. (to test accuracy).
4. Indexing or Docketing.

5. Digesting Returns into Summaries.

6. English Composition.

No Candidate will be eligible who fails to pass in the subject numbered 1.

4. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Commissioners.

5. A fee of £2 will be required from every Candidate attending the Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that an Open Competitive Examination for not fewer than five situations as Clerk in the Departments of His Majesty's General Register House, Edinburgh, will be held in Edinburgh, commencing on the 22nd October, 1901, under the foregoing Regulations.
