The two Azogues Ships, that lately parted hence for the West-Indies, were 4 or 5 days ago forced back by bad weather, to St. Lucar, where they are repairing the Damage they received, and so soon as that is done, will put to Sea again. We have an account from Sr. Sebastiaens. that 4 French Capers belonging to Bayenne and St. John de Luze were cast away in a great Storm that happened about a Fortnight ago on that Coast. Several Couriers have of late passed between this place and Madrid, about the Matter of the Indulto of the Galeons, which we are affured is at last settled at 4 Millions and a half.

Madrid, Jan. 9. The King has given the President-ship of the Council of Arragen, to the Duke of Ossuna: And has declared Don Pedro Cirbette General of the Armada, and Admiral Papachino Lieutenant-General; the Count D'agailar who Commanded the Fleet the last Year, being fent for to Court; to discharge his Office of Councellor of State. Tis yet uncertain whether a Dyet will be held this Winter; many of the Senators are of opinion to defer it till towards the End of this Year, and the Nobility of Lithurnia, have not yet confented to the holding it at Warfaw, claiming their Privilege of having it meet this next time at Gradno, one of the Chief Towns of that Dutchy; which, by reason of the distance of that Place, would be very prejudicial tothe Publick Affairs. In the mean time, the King intends to take a Journey of Devotion to our Lady of Czenstecowa, and from thence to return to Warfaw. An Envoy is arrived here from Moscovy, who has not yet had Audience, by reason of his making several new Pretentions in the Ceremonial part of it, and which are not granted to the Ministers of this Crown at Mefcow; However 'tis faid, that his Errand hither is to assure the King of the Friendship and good Correspondence of the Czars, and to agree in what manner, and upon what Deligns the Forces on both fides shall all the next Summer against the Turks and Tartars.
