Rome, Jan. 19. You have already had an account of the advances that have been made towards an Accommodation of the Differences with France; and of the Pope's resolution to grant his Bulls to such of the French Bishops as had not assented at the Assembly of the Clergy in 1682. He signed the four Propositions. On the 6th instant, the Pope had a long Conference with the Cardinals Casanata, Panciatich, & Albani, to consult with them about the manner of proposing the said Bishops in a Consistory, and it was resolved that he should proceed therein with the following Precautions; That in the first place he should make a solemn Protestation in the matter of the Regale; Secondly, That he should enjoin the new Bishops not to suffer the Duchies contained in the four Propositions to be brought in their backs; And lastly, That he should de-

clare that he did not doubt but the same would be agreeable to the French King, and that he would cause all the Proceedings of the French Clergy in prejudice of the Rights and Authority of the See of Rome to be revoked and relinced. On the 9th a Consistory was held accordingly, where the Pope made a long Discourse concerning the Rights of the Church of Rome, and his Condescension in this Affair; and having declared himself about the matter of the Bulls in the form agreed on, he preconized the Archbishop of Sens, and the Bishops of Marseilles, Nismes, and Saiffons: And the Cardinal d'Estree thanked the Pope in the Name of the French King, with assurances of his respect and deference to the See of Rome. Since this, the French Cardinals have very earnestly pressed the Pope to grant his Bulls to 14 Bishops more, who have their Money ready for the time; but they have not yet obtained them, the Pope seeming desirous to have first some farther satisfaction given him in the business of the Regale. The Count de Rebenac, Envoy from France, arrived here on the 12th instant, and had on the 15th a short Audience of the Pope; We do not yet certainly know the Errand he comes hither upon.

Turin, Jan. 19. The Duke of Savoy went hence this Morning to visit the Garrison of Cour, and intends to be out about 8 or 10 days. We are now employed in making our Recruits, and the other necessary Preparations for the next Campaign.

Venice, Jan. 25. The Senate continue to treat with several Officers about the new Levies they have resolved on for reinforcing their Army in the Levant. From whence we hear that the Turks do make their utmost Efforts for carrying on the War this next Summer.

Vienna, Jan. 27. On Friday last arrived here an Express from General d'Aversperg, who brought an account of the surprizing the Palanke of Giula by the Troops under his Command, with several Standards taken from the Enemy in that occasion. The Particulars we have of this Action are as follow:

All things being prepared at Debreczen, in order to some Enterprize, the three Regiments of Cuirassiers of Doria, S. Croix, and Truchses, began their March the 9th instant, with 100 Musketeers on Horseback, one Mortar, one Piece of Cannon, 30 Bombs, 100 Granadoes, several Wood-facks and a great many Scaling-Ladders to mount to an Assault. They advanced the same day as far as Ufale, where they found Col. Molner with 6 Companies of Heydukes; and on the 10th, were likewise joyned by a Regiment of Hussars newly raised. They marched together towards Dikish, and being further reinforced by the Radzien Militia, both Horse and Foot, advanced with such Order and Diligence, that they arrived the 12th in the Night within a German Mile of Giula, before the Enemy had any news of their approach. General Aversperg, who himself Commanded this Detachment, held a Council of War with the Principal Officers, and it was resolved to attack the Palanke the next Morning by break of day, with three separate Parties, viz. Col. Molner with his Heydukes on the right hand towards the Gate of Affop, the Radziens on the left, and the Musketeers and Hussars, who dismounted, at the Gate in the middle; It was forbid on Pain of Death for any to straggle from their Body for the sake of Plunder, and commanded that they should all make their Attacks together, and advance from one Palanke to another (there being 3 in all, each separated from the other by a Ditch and Draw-Bridge) and if possible enter the Castle; The German and Radzien Horse, being at the same time drawn up not far from the Palanke, to be ready to assist the others as there should be occasion. The 13th about 6 in the Morning, our Troops began the Attack, and in half an hours time entered the Palanke at three several places, with little opposition from the Turks, who were in no apprehensions of an Enemy, and in their first fury, put all they met with to the Sword. But the Radziens and Hungarians falling too soon to Plunder, gave the Turks time to rally, and to make a Barricado of Wagons before the Castle, where

where they posted themselves, and after this, the said Radziens being laden with their Boory, could not be obliged to advance farther towards the Enemy; upon which, the Count d' *Aversperg* caused some of the Germans who were putted for a Relieve, to enter into the place, and to set it on fire. On our side there were 50 killed and wounded, and of the Enemy about 500 who bore Arms, and in all with Women and Children above 500. The Beg of *Giula* escaped with much difficulty, but his Wife and Daughter were taken Prisoners with divers others, who all own that they had no knowledge of our design, farther than what they heard from a loose Report of some Enterprize that was intended against *Jena*. The Count d' *Aversperg* had before this Action sent our several Parties of Horse to destroy the Hay and Forage in the Neighbouring Villages, as well to prevent the Enemies carrying the same into the Castles of *Giula* and *Jena*, as to deprive them of the means of sending any Reliet to *Great Warasin*; The Necessities of which place increase every day; and 'tis said, that they has already happened a great difference between the new *Bassa* and the *Agá* of the Janissaries, and that the Garrison is resolved to Capitulate in case they do not receive very speedy Succors. The Elector of *Bavaria* has since his arrival here, assisted at several Conferences of War; and intends to part from hence in few days for *Flanders*.

Ratisbonne, Jan. 30. My Lord Ambassador *Harbord* parts from hence to Morrow on his Journey towards *Vienne*. 'Tis said here, that the Emperor is to be assisted this Summer with 2000 Men from the King of *Denmark*, 4000 from the Duke of *Hanover*; 2000 from the Duke of *Saxe Gotta*, and the like number from the Bishop of *Munster*.

Cologne, Feb. 5. The Elector of *Cologne* intends very suddenly to go and view the Towns of *Bou*, *Rhinberg*, and *Kesseraert*; but 'tis not yet known what place in this Archbishoprick he will make choice of for his constant Residence; Some think that he will accompany his Brother the Elector of *Bavaria* to *Holland* and *Flanders*, and after having made that Journey, return to *Bavaria*.

Paris, Feb. 4. The Marquis de *Beuffers* took Possession this day of his Command of Colonel of the French Guards; and to Morrow returns by Post towards *Flanders*. The Court goes about the 20th of this Month to *Villers-Cotteretz*, where they will be entertained by the Duke of *Orleans*. The Express that was lately sent to *Rome*, to desire the Popes Dispensation for the Duke of *Chartres* Marriage with *Mademoiselle de Blois* is come back, and the said Marriage will be celebrated in few days. Last Night died the Popes Nuncio at this Court. 'Tis declared that the Count de *Tourville* is to Command the French Fleet the next Summer.

Brussels, Feb. 6. Some days ago, a French Party of 250 Horse came to *Ash*, in the way to *Alost*, where they burnt several Houses, as they did likewise at *Merkeem*; But in their return to *Mons* on the 2d instant, they were met by a Detachment belonging to *Aesh*, who Charged and routed them, and returned to their Garrison with 150 Horses which they had taken, and 100 French Prisoners. The Enemy go on with their Preparations. The like is done on our side, and great Magazines are provided in our Frontier places. They write from *Paris* of the 4th instant, That the French King would set out towards *Flanders* about the 20th of this Month, and take his Journey by *Villers Cotteretz*, and that the Troops of the Household would begin their march some days before.

Hague, Feb. 8. The last Letters from *Flanders* say, that there had fallen so much Snow, as made the ways almost unpassable. They tell us likewise, that a Distemper was got among the Horses of the French Troops, of which a great number had died lately, and that it still encreased. The Count de *Winditzgratz* the Emperor's Plenipotentiary, who has been ill, is very well recovered again, and assisted yesterday at the Congress of the Confederate Ministers.

Pembroke, Jan. 29. On Tuesday last came into this Harbour their Majesty's Ship the *Smirna Merchant*, Capt. *Price* Commander, from *Corke*; he says, that the Danish Troops were all Ship'd, and sailed from thence about a fortnight ago, but by contrary Winds were put into *King'sale*.

Falmouth, Jan. 30. A Dutch Caper is come into this Port from *Eliza*, having lately taken a French Ship bound home from *Newfoundland*. Another Dutch Privateer has been in a Prize, being a Vessel bound from *Brift* to *St. Michael*.

Lisbon, Jan. 31. Yesterday arrived here the *D. fire* of *St. James*, which sailed from *Lisbon*. The Merchant Ships

that came lately with the *Pembroke* Frigate from the *Dowry*, are still in this Port, staying for some other Merchantmen, and two or three Men of War more, who are daily expected from *Spitzhead*.

Portsmouth, Feb. 2. This Morning the *Portland*, and *Phoenix*, with divers Merchant Ships under their Convey sailed from *Spitzhead* to the *Westward*.

Whitehall, Feb. 3. Yesterday at a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter, held at *Kennington* in the Presence of the Sovereign: His most Serene Highness *John George* the Fourth Elector of *Saxony*, and the Right Honourable *Charles* Earl of *Dorset* and *Middlesex*, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, were Elected Knights Companions of the said most Noble Order.
