Entry into Brazilian ports prohibited of articles capable of carrying infection, as specified in clause 30 of Federal Sanitary Regulations, shipped from infected and suspected ports. Usual quarantine imposed on vessels arriving from said ports, which sailed after 26th ultimo."
