A PROCLAMATION

Requiring all Seamen and Mariners to Render themselves to Their Majestics Service.

WILLIAM R.

Hereas divers Seamen and Mariners have latily left their usual and ordinary Places of Abode, and have removed themselves into some private and obscure Place, endativouring thereby to Avoid or Espetimow present Service: We threspore, by the Advice of Ow Prity Council, have thought his to Publish this Our Rual Proclimation; And do hereby strilly Charge and Command all Seamen and Mariners remaining in any Centry of England or Wales, and not Listed in Our Service, that they forthwith Render themselves unto the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy in London in to the Commissioners of the Navy at Chatham, or a tie Commissioners of the Navy at Portsmouth, or to the Surviceper and Master-Master for the Navy at Harwich for the thing, or to Henry Greenhill Agent for the Navy at Plimouth, or to Robert Henley at Brittol, or to iterspective Collectors of the Customs for the several Ports and Places following, viz. Ipswich, Wells, Lynn, Bosten, Sathwoogh, Sundarland, Wiritby, Suthampton, Cowes, Pole, Weymouth, Lyme, Topsham, Dartmouth, Falmouth, Loe, Fowy, Truro, Pembroke, Newcattle, Hull, Leverpole, and Great Yarmouth, in order to their being Receival into Pay, and sen on Board such of our Ships as shall be such as a past to the outside of the order of the perfect of the principal with all Seventy. And We do hereby Require all Mayors, Bashitis, Sherissi, Justices of the Place, Constain, which all Seventy. Hereas We have received Information,
That divers Seamen and Mariners, who
have been Hired and Impressed in Our
Service, and do belong to Our Ships of
War, do absent them lives from Our
said Ships, and betake therefolives on Board several interchant Ships, and Estate with an interest of the Mar, do absent thems lives from Our said Ships, and betake therefolves on Board several iderchant Ships and Visels, with an intent to depart out of this Our Kingdom without Our Royal litence in that beiness file obtained; We have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish this Our Royal Proclamation; And We do bereby Require and Command all and singular Scamen, Mariners, and Scafaring Menbelonging to any of Our Ships of War, and Assenting themselves from the same, as aforested, that they and every of them, do sorthwith upon the Publishing of this Our Proclamation. Repair on Board such of Our reserving their being punished as Deserters; Hereby Diclaring, That as We are very desirous of giving all due Encouragement to such Scamen and Mariners Employed in Our Service, as shall be found doing their Duty in their several Stations and Employments, So We are resolved to Proceed with the utmost Severity of Law against all such as shall neglect to give Obedience to this Our Proclamation. And We do hereby Command all Captains, Commanders, and other Officers of Our Ships, whom it may concern, to make diligent Search on Board all Merchant Ships, for any such Seamen who do or shall Absent themselves from Our Service, and upon finding them, to take them from on Board such Merchant Ships, and Secure them, in Order to their being brought to Condign Punishment. being brought to Condign Punishment.

Jawarew in Poland, Jen. 15. On Sunday last To Deura was sing here, in the Church of the Dominicans, for the late Success of our Forces, in defeating the Turkish Con-

voy designed to Caminiee; at which the King and the whole Court affilted. Since this, there has happened another Action in Moldavia: The Holpody of that Province, being very unealic to fee the Poles possession of Niemiet, Campolongo, and other places in his Country, and the heavy Contributions which they imposed upon it, gave Orders for the chawing all the Force he could together in order to disodge them; and resolved that the first Attempt should be made upon our Treops, who to the Number of about 150. were posted at a place called Ansi; The execution of this Design was committed to Colonel Sandol, one of his most experienced Officers; who taking with him Four hundred chosen Men, surprized the Poles, and cut most of their in pieces; but the Governor of Campolongo, having notice of what had passed, marched out immediately with 200 Horse and Dragoons, to cut off their retreat, and coming up with the Enemy near a place called Placea, attacked them with that vigor, that after a sharp dispute of about an hour, he routed the Moldavians, killed above 200 of them upon the place, and took the Brother of Coll. Sandol, with divers others Prisoners; with these, and a rich Booty, he returned to Campolongo; and dispatched an Officer hither with an account of this Rencounter, and of the Preparations that are making by the Moldavians, for iome farther Enterprize against the Polish Garisons in that Country. The Steur Binkis has likewise sent advice to the Court of his being gone with a Derachement of Horse in pursuit of them. Another Party of Tarrais has larely made a great Ravage on the Frontiers of Russia. The King will go from heace about the end of this Month to Warlaw, where a great Council of War will be held in February.
