CORONATION OF THEIR MAJESTIES.
COURT OF CLAIMS.

THE Right Honourable the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty for the purpose will meet at the Coun il Office, Whitehall, on Wednesday, the 4th day of December next, at eleven o'clock of the forenoon, to hear and determine Claims of Services to be performed at the time of the ensuing Coronation (except those dispensed with by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th day of June last), and of fees to be received for the same.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such claims as may be submitted to them in respect of rights or servi es connected with the parts of the C-remonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

THE following Despatches have been recently received from General Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa. From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War, London, S.W.

SIR, October 8th, 1901.

1. In continuation of my despatch, dated 8th September, 1901, I have the honour to report that during the past month there has been a general recrudescence of activity on the part of the enemy, which has made itself felt more particularly in the extreme south-east portions of the Transvaal. The immediate cause of this was, undoubtedly, the necessity felt by the Boer leaders to tide over the 15th September, the date fixed by the Proclamation of 7th August as the limit of time within which by voluntarily surrendering, the leaders might avoid certain penalties threatened by that Proclamation. In this they have succeeded. There has been no general surrender, but the device to which the Commandant - General resorted for turning the thoughts of his burghers in another direction has probably cost him and his cause more heavily than a simple pursuance of the usual evasive tactics would have entailed.

Operations on the Natal Frontier.
2. I alluded in my last despatch to the indications of a concentration in the Ermelo district, and to rumours of designs on Natal, and

to the preliminary steps taken to meet this con-

tingency.

On the 4th September, Lieut.-General the Hon. N. G. Lyttelton assumed command in Natal, in succession to Lieut.-General Sir H. Hildyard, who proceeded home on leave of absence. General Hildyard arrived from England at the commencement of the war in command of the 2nd Brigade, and has since then continued, without interruption, to exercise command in various positions of great responsibility. Much as I regret the loss of his valuable services, I am glad that he should now be able to enjoy a well-earned rest.

General Lyttelton having assumed command, at once found it necessary to turn his attention to the enemy in the Vryheid District. The commandos which had assembled in the Ermelo District early in the month, gradually worked south by Piet Retief and Paul Pieters Burg, whilst others joined them en route, but it was not until the 18th September that Major Gough's reconnaissance made the situation quite clear.

For some days previous to this, mist and rain had concealed the enemy's movements from our patrols sent out from Utrecht and Vryheid, and the natives, fearing the penalty the Boers now so ruthlessly exact from them for any assistance given us, had kept to their kraals. On the 15th September Major Gough's Mounted Infantry moved out from Dundee, with Lieut.-Colonel Stewart in command of the Johannesburg Mounted Rifles, to De Jager's Drift. Colonel Pulteney's troops were at Volksrust, and Lieut.-Colonel Garratt with his column, having passed through Wakkerstroom, was moving on Utrecht.

On the 17th September, Lieut.-Colonel Stewart and Major Gough.

and Major Gough decided to push on towards the Bloed River to gain touch with the enemy, reported to be in the vicinity of Scheeper's Nek. Major Gough marched about an hour in advance of Lieut.-Colonel Stewart, and as he neared the river sent tack word asking Lieut.-Colonel Stewart to remain for the present near Rooi Kop, in readiness to support him should he hear his guns in action. Half-an-hour later Lieut.-Colonel Stewart observed Major Gough's force galloping in the direction of Bloed River Poort, and he immediately pressed forward in support with his mounted men. While thus advancing, Lieut. Colonel Stewart was met by a messenger, who informed him that Major Gough had met with a serious reverse in front, and feeling it imperative to afford protection to his own guns at Rooi Kop, as well as to Major Gough's

baggage, which was following behind, he decided, after verifying the report, to fall back at once to De Jager's Drift, thus covering Dundee.

Major Gough had galloped into a well-arranged ambush. Believing that he was in presence of only 300 Boers he had pressed forward boldly to seize a ridge which appeared to command their position. The enemy, however, numbered fully 1,000, and whilst checking Major Gough in front, they rapidly overwhelmed his right flank and assailed his guns from the rear. There was a short sharp fight at close quarters, in which our men displayed much gallantry, and then completely outnumbered and surrounded, the whole of Major Gough's small force was captured.\* It is due to Major Gough to state that he has commanded in the field for the past two years under every condition, and with unvarying success, and I should be sorry to mark a solitary error of judgment in any way that might militate against the future utility of this gallant Officer.

Lieut.-Colonel Stewart in falling back when he did showed great judgment and a sound appreciation of the situation in a position of considerable difficulty.

Commandant-General Louis Botha, General C. Botha, and Commandants Opperman, Britz, and Henderson were all reported to have been present in the engagement, and it was quite evident that Dundee was momentarily menaced by a commando of considerable strength.

The troops placed at General Lyttelion's disposal were now rapidly concentrated on the threatened point. On the 18th of September Colonel Allenby's column reached Dundee, and by the 25th of the month General Lyttelton, who already held the line of the Buffalo in strength, had assembled two mobile forces at Dundee under command of Major - Generals Clements and Bruce Hamilton respectively.

A third force under Major-General Walter Kitchener moved out to Utrecht. It consisted of the column under Lieut.-Colonel Garratt, which had followed the enemy into that district from Wakkerstroom, and the troops under Major-General W. Kitchener and Colonel Campbell who had arrived at Volksrust on the 23rd September at the conclusion of their operations in the

vicinity of Ermelo.

In the meantime the Boers who had halted for some days at Bloed River Poort after their success against Major Gough, were reported to be moving into the salient angle of the Vryheid District which projects southwards into Zululand between Ngutu and Ndwande. Hostile patrols were seen to the east of Vant's and Rorke's Drifts, and it became apparent that our occupation of the line of the Buffalo had compelled the enemy to seek access to Natal by a wider detour to the south. This led him towards our fortified posts of Itala and Fort Prospect on the Zululand border, a few miles to the north-west of Melmoth, and to meet it General Lyttelton pushed out the force under Major-General Bruce Hamilton from Vant's and Rorke's Drifts in a south-easterly direction. The garrison of Itala consisted of 2 guns of the 69th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, and 300 men of the 5th Division Mounted Infantry, all under the command of Captain (local Major, and now Major and Brevet Lieut.-Colonel) A. J. Chapman, Royal Dublin Fusiliers. The attack on this post, which was conducted by Commandant-General Louis Botha and other leaders, at the head of some 1,500 men, was a most determined one.

mencing at 3 a.m. on the 26th September, it was pressed almost without intermission for 19 hours, when the enemy, repulsed on all sides, withdrew under cover of dusk in an easterly and northeasterly direction. That on Fort Prospect was made by a detached Boer force about 500 strong. This post was held by 35 men of the 5th Division Mounted Infantry and 51 men of the Durham Artillery Militia, all under the command of Captain C. A. Rowley, 2nd Bn. Dorsetshire Regiment, and the attack on it was easily repulsed. The successful defence of these two places reflects the greatest credit on Major Chapman and Captain Rowley, and all ranks of the small garrisons under their respective commands.

On the 27th September the Boer commandos being fully occupied in burying their dead and collecting and tending their wounded, showed no signs of aggression, and early on the 28th, the columns under Major-General Bruce Hamilton, which had been directed on Itala, as soon as the southward movement of the enemy was confirmed, arrived at that place. They were at once interposed between the enemy, who had fallen back on their approach towards Babanango and Retief's Rust, and the Tugela, and com-munication with Melmoth was opened up. General Lyttelton's plans for clearing the country of the Boers, and if possible, intercepting them, had in the meantime been developed. On hearing that they had committed themselves to a southward movement towards Zululand, he arranged that while Major-General Bruce Hamilton headed them off in the direction of Itala and Melmoth, General Clements should take them in flank through Nqutu, and Major-General Walter Kitchener should move from Utrecht by the Schurveberg and Vryheid upon their rear and endeavour to block the possible avenues of escape. to the north.

On the 29th September, General Kitchener reached Vryheid, and on the 30th General Clements was reported to be at Vant's Drift on the Buffalo River. On the 2nd October, General Kitchener arrived at Geluk (234) whence he pushed on a portion of his advanced troops to Tooyernaar's Rust (518); Major-General Bruce Hamilton was then in touch with the enemy in the neighbourhood of Retief's Rust, and General Clements moving on from Vani's Drift in the direction of Ngutu. On the same day Major-General Kitchener was engaged with 300 of the enemy near Pondwana Mountain. On the 4th October General Bruce Hamilton advanced north by Entonjaneni, on Inhlazatye, in communication on his left with General Clements, whose columns were directed from Ngutu upon Kromellenbog (289). The enemy's main body on this date was reported to be close to Ntabankulu with General Kitchener still to the north of it in the vicinity of Uitzicht (176). As our columns pushed on the Boers continued their retreat north to Boschoek (156), Kromellenbog (303), and Leeuwnek (15), where they were held for a time by Major-General W. Kitchener, but on the night of the 5th October the Boers were successful in breaking through to the north. Abandoning their baggage and wagons they moved rapidly round General Kitchener's left flank from Boschoek (156), to Smaldeel (575), retreating thence with all speed over the Pivaan River, past Paul Pietersburg, in the direction of Piet Retief and the Slangapies Berg. General Kitchener followed at once in close pursuit by Waterval (310), to Nooitgedacht (246), and Bellevue (600), where he engaged a rearguard, which in a strong position covered the flight of Our columns continue their the main body.

movement to the north in support of General Kitchener, but the unfinished state of a line of blockhouses from Wakkerstroom to Piet Retief, which was commenced on the 1st October by the 2nd Bn. Scots Guards and 2nd Bn. West Yorkshire Regiment, under Brigadier-General Bullock, renders it unlikely now that any large bodies of the enemy can be cut off before they escape into the Ermelo District.

It is disappointing that we were unable to gain the full advantage which this futile effort of the Boer leaders might have afforded us of striking them when concentrated, but the country in which these operations took place, at all times difficult, was rendered almost impassable by the heavy rains which continued, with one short interval of four or five days, throughout their progress and which finally forced the enemy to abandon his wagous in order to effect his escape.

Operations in the Eastern Transvaal.

3. Upon the departure of Lieut.-General Sir Bindon Blood for India, Brigadier-General Reeves assumed temporary command in the Eastern Transvaal, where the columns under Colonels Park and Benson have continued their operations

north and south of the railway. Colonel Benson, who had reached Witbank Station on 6th September, marched thence along the railway line to Middelburg. He again left Middelburg on the 10th, in a south-easterly direction, having located a party of Boers at Pullen's Hope (213), and, after a long march, on an extremely dark night, was successful in surprising and capturing 33 prisoners, with 73 horses, 515 cattle, 4 wagons, 4 carts, and a quantity of ammunition. Colonel Benson then joined his convoy and baggage, from Middelburg, at Eikeboom (218), and the following day marched to Blesbokspruit (219), from which point he passed through the valley of the Klein Olifant to Weltevreden (151). Here; on the 14th, he was informed that a band of the enemy had spent the previous night at Tweefontein (496). He accordingly started on a night march, taking with him two squadrons of the 2nd Scottish Horse, and the 19th Bn. Mounted Infantry, and, early on the 15th, took 10 Boers and 250 head of cattle, the remainder of the enemy making good their escape.
On the 16th September Colonel Benson moved

on to Carolina, and the following day again left that place, having heard of a gathering of Boers at Busby (206), on the Umpilusi River, some distance to the south-east. After a 40-mile march he reached his objective, and, just as the early morning mist was lifting, charged down upon two laagers at Middeldrift (191) and Busby (206), in which he secured 54 prisoners, 48 vehicles, 1,700 head of cattle, and 242 horses. Amongst the prisoners, most of whom belong to the Carolina Commando, were P. M. Botha, late Landdrost of Pretoria, and Commandant Nieuwboudt.

Colonel Benson then returned, by Lake Chrissie, to Carolina, and, on the 28th September, moved on westward into the Bethal District, capturing 12 prisoners on the following day in the vicinity of Monson's Store, to the west of the Klein Olifant: On the 1st October, when at Kranspoort (264) he received intelligence which pointed to the presence of 100 Boers at Weltevreden (179), on the Olifant's River. He started the same evening to try to overtake this band, but found, on arrival at his destination, that they had already trekked away on the previous afternoon. Their tracks were, how-

(285), and captured 7 prisoners, 30 horses, 12 mules, and some cattle. The remainder of the Boers fled north, hotly pursued by our troops, who covered over 50 miles in 19 hours in the course of the chase.

The westward movement was then continued, Kaallaagte (326) being reached on the 4th September, since which date Colonel Benson has

operated near Bethal.

There is no doubt that the Boers in this part of the country have been so constantly alarmed and harassed by the frequent night raids made by our troops that they have for the time become thoroughly demoralised. They seldom spend two nights in one place, shift camp daily, and saddle up regularly at 3 a.m. in readiness for flight. This is highly creditable to our men, but it naturally adds to the difficulty experienced in making any substantial captures.

Colonel Park, who had arrived near Bankfontein (234), north-east of Middelburg on the 8th September, marched into the latter town on

the 11th to refit his column.

On the 16th he again left Middelburg for Machadodorp, intending to operate in the vicinity of Schoeman's Kloof before returning to Lydenburg. A number of Boers had congregated in the Badfontein Valley, but, as Colonel Park approached, they dispersed and cleared away in the direction of Ohrigstad and Pilgrim's Rest. Colonel Park accordingly moved on to Lydenburg, and thence followed up the retiring enemy towards Kruger's Post, where at dawn, on 2nd October, he was successful in capturing 13 prisoners, 8 rifles, 3 wagons, some cattle and dynamite.

On the following day, Colouel Park took with him six companies of Mounted Infantry and two companies of the Manchester Regiment, and made a thorough search of all the farms between Kruger's Post and Ohrigstad. Four armed burghers were taken in this district, and large quantities of supplies, forage, and ammunition were collected and destroyed. Colonel Colonel Park then moved back towards Kruger's Post-His return march, however, was not unmolested, for at Rustplaats (15) he was attacked by a very considerable force which had apparently come from the east, under General Viljoen. Fighting went on for some hours, and the Boers then withdrew, Colonel Park continuing his way back to camp.

On the 7th October, Colonel Park surprised and attacked a party of Boers upon a farm at Rosenkrans (1444). The men escaped, but Rosenkrans (1444). The men escaped 40,000 rounds of Mauser ammunition, wagons, and a quantity of mealies were left in our hands. Colonel Park then moved south to

the Spekboom River.

The railway traffic to the east has been little interrupted during the last few weeks, but on 16th September an attack was made upon Belfast by a Boer commando, 100 strong, under Commandant Grobelaar, with the evident intention of obtaining supplies. The attack was easily repulsed, one man only of the garrison being wounded, but many Boer bullets fell in the refugee camp, where one woman was killed, and two children. wounded.

A general advance has been made in the Eastern Transvaal of the Constabulary posts which ran from Eerste Fabriken, through Springs and Heidelberg, to the Vaal River. This line has now been gradually pushed forward during the month by Colonel Pilkington, South African Constabulary, to the line Wilge River Station-Greylingstad, and the junction of Kalk Spruit ever, carefully followed by Colonel Benson's with the Vaal, an alteration of position which men, who came up with the enemy at Driefontein has enabled us to enclose and clear a much larger area of country. The work of the Constabulary, as they moved the blockhouses to the new line, has been covered and secured by the simultaneous advance of the troops under Lieut. - Colonels Hacket Thompson, Bewicke Copley, and Sir H. Rawlinson who operated respectively from Bronkhorst Spruit, Springs, and Heidelberg.

As the majority of the Boers in this district had accompanied General Botha towards the Natal frontier, few of them were seen by the northern and central columns, but Sir Henry Rawlinson, to whom was assigned the task of clearing the front of the Constabulary between the Standerton line and the Vaal River, came in contact with several parties of the enemy which he chased westwards towards Barnard's Kop; and southwards over the Vaal into Orange River Colony.

On the 3rd October, Sir H. Rawlinson marched into Greylingstad, whence he organised a night patrol to Barnard's Kop, which resulted in the capture of three armed burghers. On the evening of the 4th, he again left Greylingstad for Watervalshoek (204), where the laagers of Field-Cornets Hans Botha and Pretorius were reported to be. The former of these was successfuly surprised at daybreak on the 5th near Kaffir Spruit (199), 7 prisoners, 20 horses, 12 wagons, 12 Cape carts, and 650 cattle being captured. The other laager had already moved east before the advance of the Constabulary posts, and though Sir Henry Rawlinson followed it for some distance, he was unable to add to his captures.

#### Operations on the Pietersburg Line.

4. No events of importance have occurred in the Northern Transvaal during the past few weeks. Since the train-wrecking incident of the 31st of August, the Pietersburg line has been undisturbed, and General Beyer's wandering bands have kept to the hills to the west of the railway, avoiding as usual contact with our troops.

Two columns have remained in this district in observation of the enemy, one under Colonel Colenbrander acting from Warmbaths, and the other under Lieut.-Colonel Wood, who has taken Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell's place, from Nylstroom.

Night raids and long-distance marches have from time to time been undertaken when oppose tunity presented, and a certain number of prisoners (including Captain M. Coetzee, the leader of Beyer's Scouts) have been brought in

by our troops.

Operations in the South-Western Transvaal.

5. At the date of my last despatch, the situation in the South-Western Transvaal was briefly as follows:—General Fetherstonhaugh and Colonel Kekewich completing their search for the dismounted stragglers of Kemp's force, to the south-west of Olifant's Nek. Colonel Allenby from Rustenburg, and Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton on their march to Pretoria and Klerksdorp respectively, and Lord Methuen's troops approaching Zeerust from the Marico Valley.

On the 11th of September, Brigadier-General Hamilton reported from Cyferkuil (47) as he approached Klerksdorp, that he had captured near Geduld (158) a Boer convoy, with 25 prisoners, 140 horses, 7 wagons, and 520 cattle.

General Fetherstonhaugh continued to search the kloofs round Leeuwiontein (339) for some days, and then on the 12th of September moved by Tafel Kop on Ventersdorp, to replenish his supplies. At Tafel Kop, he learnt that Kemp,

who had escaped from our cordon in a northeasterly direction, was already working his way back to the south again, as our troops withdrew.

Colonel Kekewich, after assisting General Fetherstonhaugh in his operations to the southwest of Oliphant's Nek, returned to Naauwpoort (214) with the prisoners taken. He again left Nauwpoort on the 13th of September, and passing through Olifant's Nek, turned cast to operate on the northern slopes of the Magaliesberg. On the 15th he reached Oorzaak (568), from which place he operated in conjunction with Colonel Mackenzie (1st Bn. Suffolk Regiment), who was then employed in constructing blockhouses to the south of the range between Naauwpoort (214) and Olifant's Nek. A careful search of the slopes and summits of the hills resulted in the capture of Field-Cornet Klopper, and 36 other prisoners of war. Colonel Kekewich then moved to Roodekoppies (171), whence he returned to Magato's Nek to co-operate once more with General Fetherstonhaugh against Kemp's commando, now reported to be re-assembling in that neighbourhood. On the 24th Colonel Kekewich was at Rietfontein (299). Here he organised a night expedition by Bulhoek (833) and Lamoenfontein (357) to Croco-dile Drift (266) on the Eland's river, at which place he surrounded and took a Boer laager, under Acting-Commandant van Rooijan, with 35 prisoners, 15 horses, 5 wagons, and several hundred cattle. Colonel Kekewich then moved to Waterval (596), whence on the 26th he marched to Lindley's Poort (102). Kemp's men on this date were reported to be on the Toelani River.

Being unable, however, to gain touch with the enemy, Colonel Kekewich on the 29th turned east to Moedwill (639), where at dawn on the following morning his camp was heavily attacked by a force of at least 1,000 Boers under Generals Delarey and Kemp, who had evidently followed up our column from the valley of the Toelani. The attack which lasted from 4.45 a.m. till 6.15 a.m. being delivered upon three sides of our camp with great vigour and a lavish expenditure of ammunition, was quickly repulsed after severe fighting, in which all ranks displayed great gallantry, the conduct of the 1st Bn. Derbyshire Regiment being especially distinguished. The enemy foiled in their attempt to rush the position were compelled to fall back, and they apparently retired in a northerly and north-westerly direction.

Our losses in this action were severe, 1 officer and 31 men being killed, and 26 officers, including Colonel Kekewich, and 127 men wounded. To give some idea of the severity of the fire to which the troops were subjected it may be mentioned that 3 piquets were practically annihilated, and that out of a party of 12 men of the Derbyshire Regiment which was guarding a drift, 8 men were killed and 4 wounded.

Upon Colonel Kekewich being incapacitated by wounds the command of the column was temporarily assumed by Lieut. - Colonel Wylly, Derbyshire Regiment. I am glad, however, to report that Colonel Kekewich has this day been

able to resume his work.

In the meantime General Fetherstonhaugh had again left Ventersdorp, marching north on the 21st September to resume operations in conjunction with Colonel Kekewich. Moving by Tafel Kop he was engaged on the 24th at Doornkom (896) with a number of Boers whom he drove in the direction of the Toelani Valley. On the following day he captured a position on Winkelhoek (280), driving the enemy towards Doornkloof (591); then failing to find any

further objective, he turned back in a south-

easterly direction to Waterval (68).

On the 29th September he moved to Kwaggafontein (924), and here on the 30th heard of the attack on Colonel Kekewich's camp at Moedwill. On receipt of this intelligence he at once sent Colonel Williams's column to Hartebeestfontein (514) to support Colonel Kekewich, following himself as soon as possible with the remainder of his force. By the 2nd October General Fetherstonhaugh had concentrated the whole of his troops at Moedwill, but he was unable to obtain any definite news of the enemy, who seemed to have scattered, after their unsuccessful attack, amongst the farms on both sides of the Rustenburg-Zeerust road. Between the 2nd and 6th he executed reconnaissances to the west in the hopes of being able to gain touch with Generals Delarey and Kemp, but failing to learn their whereabouts moved south on the latter date to Kosterfontein (292) on his way towards Tafel Kop. On the departure of General Fetherstonhaugh for the south, Lieut.-Colonel Wylly moved east through Magato's Nek to refit his column and draw supplies from Rusten-

Lord Methuen reached Zeerust on the 9th September after a series of sharp encounters with the enemy in the neighbourhood of the Marico Valley. The Boers had shown great boldness in these attacks, and persistently followed his rearguard up to Zeerust.

Two days later Lord Methuen returned to Mafeking, and he utilised the remainder of the n:onth in refitting his troops and in passing convoys into Lichtenburg and Zeerust, preparatory to a fresh movement to the east. This contemto a fresh movement to the east. This contem-plated advance had the double object of completing the collection of the ripening crops in the Marico District, and establishing a line of blockhouses between Zeerust and the lead

On the 2nd October his column marched from Mafeking to commence work, and on the 4th Lord Methuen had reached a line Wonderfontein (41)—Kleinfontin (76)—Waterkloof (148), from which points he is now moving south upon Bokkraal (300), carefully clearing the country of all scattered land of the country o Wilgeboom Spruit (276) on the 4th October,

resulted in five burghers being killed.

Operations on the Vaal.

6. Great progress has been made during the past month in clearing the enemy from both banks of the Vaal River. The line of block-houses from Kopjes Station to Potchefstroom, which was commenced in the first week of September by the 2nd Bn. Scots Guards and 1st Bn. Oxfordshire Light Infautry, has been completed; Heilbron has been similarly connected with Frankfort, and, east and west of Vereeniging, the drifts over the Vaal have been permanently occupied by detachments of the Railway Pioneer Regiment under Lieut.-Colonel Capper.

To prevent any interruption of this work, and to cover its completion, the columns under Lieut.-Colonels Byng and Dawkins were brought up from the south of Orange River Colony on the 10th September to Vredefort Road Station. From this point they moved out into the area round Reitzburg - Venterskroon - Parys, where a considerable number of Boers were taken as they sought to escape from the tract of country gradually being enclosed by the blockhouse line. Many of these prisoners who had fled south from the Losberg and Gatsrand were found lurking in the bed of the Vaal River, near Rensburg

Having thoroughly searched and cleared the ground between Parys and Reitzburg, Colonel Byng marched west to Coal Mine Drift, where he heard of the assembly at Bothaville of some 500 Boers, most of whom had left the area then being included within our blockhouse system. He proceeded at once in that direction with the idea of attacking, but found as he advanced that the enemy only broke up into small parties and dispersed in the country lying between the Rhenoster and Valsch rivers. He accordingly moved back with Lieut.-Colonel Dawkins along the Valsch River to Kroonstad, where they arrived on the 3rd October, having captured 81 prisoners of war since leaving Vredefort.

To work in co-operation with our troops to the south, Major-General Mildmay Willson organised a small force under Lieut.-Colonel Hicks, 2nd Bn. Royal Dublin Fusiliers, which consisted of 250 Mounted Infantry, two field guns, and five companies of Infantry. column, which assembled at Banks Station, moved thence on the 17th September for the country lying between the Gatsrand and the Vaal, where it was employed in establishing and provisioning Constabulary posts, and in hunting small parties of Boer snipers. 26 prisoners were taken, and on the 29th September the force returned to Potchefstroom. From there the column moved to Venterskroon, and on the 8th October Lieut.-Colonel Hicks reported by runner from Buffelshoek that the South African Constabulary troops, acting in co-operation with his column, had captured Field-Cornets George Hall and Van der Venter, 16 burghers, and a 7-pr. gun, which had been taken some weeks ago from their post at Houtkop.

Colonel Rimington's Operations in Northern

Orange River Colony.
7. On the 10th September, Colonel Rimington's Column, which had marched north from Kroonstad, was at Leeuwfontein, 6 miles south of Heilbron. From here, on the 14th, he made a night march on Anderkant (292), where he surprised and captured 6 Boers, 6 wagons, 9 Cape carts, and a number of horses and mules. On the 20th he was at Jakhal's Kop, south of the Heilbron-Frankfort Road, and on the 22nd marched thence to the junction of the Vaal and Wilge rivers, where he overtook Strydom's Commando, and secured 13 prisoners, 18 wagons, 17 Cape carts, 2 Scotch carts, 1,180 cattle, and 40 horses. Colonel Rimington then returned to Heilbron, and on the 28th marched to Oploop, between the Klip and Wilge rivers, watching for an opportunity of co-operation with Sir Henry Rawlinson's Column, which was then assisting the Constabulary to the north of the Vaal. On the 2nd October his chance came, and he captured 24 prisoners and 2,000 cattle, 30 horses; 14 loaded wagons, 22 Cape carts, and 20 mules, all belonging to Buys' Commando, which had been driven south of the river by Sir Henry Rawlinson's advance from Heidelberg.

On the 3rd October, Colonel Rimington was at De Rust on Venter's Spruit, and on the 7th he entered Standerton to draw supplies preparatory to moving south of De Lange's Drift to co-operate with Brigadier-General Broadwood and Colonel

De Lisle from Harrismith.

As it had been intended to reinforce Colonel Rimington by the column under Lieut.-Colonel Wilson (Kitchener's Fighting Scouts), which had been refitted at Kroonstad after its return from the Senekal district, the latter Officer was ordered to leave Kroonstad for Heilbron on 1st October. He crossed the Rhenoster River at dawn on the 4th, and almost immediately afterwards a portion of his command was attacked at

Paardekraal by a considerable force of the enemy which was driven off with loss. Having repulsed this attack, Colonel Wilson resumed his march on Heilbron, where, instead of joining Colonel Rimington's command, he was temporarily assigned the duty of covering the line of blockhouses from Heilbron to Frankfort.

Major-General Elliot's Operations in Eastern
Orange River Colony.

8. After two or three days' halt at Winburg, Major-General Elliot's Division again started on 10th September to warch east towards the Wittebergen. It seemed desirable to revisit this district once more, with the object of endeavouring to come up with some of the parties of Boers which had evaded capture during the previous movement. Lieut.-Colonel Barker and Major Pine Coffin remained to operate from Winburg to the west of General Elliot's line of advance, whilst Major-General B. Campbell continued to maintain his position on the eastern slopes of the Wittebergen. Brigadier-General Dartnell, with the Imperial Light Horse from Bethlehem, was also ordered to assist in the operations by blocking the passes at Retief's and Slabbert's Neks.

The movement from Winburg was commenced in four columns, General Broadwood's Brigade being on the right, Colonel Bethune's on the left, and the troops of Colonel Lowe and Lieut.-Colonel De Lisle in the centre. Lieut.-Colonel De Lisle came in sight of a convoy, under Commandant Koen, which was then trekking towards the Koranuaberg, and after a long gallop overtook and captured 15 prisoners, 47 wagons, 22 carts, 250 horses, and 2,500 cattle. On the 12th Colonel Bethune drove 70 Boers from a position near Wonkerkop, and on the following evening he made a night march to Rietvlei, where he was

again slightly engaged.

From the 14th to the 18th September the Division was employed in searching the western slopes of the Wittebergen, moving gradually northwards upon a line parallel to that followed by Major-General Campbell inside the Brand-water Basin from Steynsberg towards Retief's and Slabbert's Neks. This combined movement yielded good results. 17 Boers were taken by Major-General Campbell, and large quantities of supplies and vehicles were found hidden away in the mountain kloofs. A continual sniping was maintained from the summits of the hills by small parties of Boers under the leadership of Commandant Prinsloo. Having accomplished all that was possible in this district, General Elliot pushed north from Tafel Berg on the 19th by Bethlehem to Harrismith, a destination which seemed advisable in consequence of the development of events in Natal, and arrived there on the 26th.

The result of the operations which then closed was reported to be as follows:—7 Boers killed, 5 wounded, 46 prisoners, 8 voluntary surrenders, 2,560 horses, 9,100 cattle, 127 wagons, 101 carts, 8,700 rounds of amountain

2,700 rounds of ammunition.

The 2nd Imperial Light Horse with General Dartnell had already been brought into Harrismith, and proceeded thence by rail and road to Eshowe, in Zululand, and on the 29th of September Colonel Bethune, with 600 men of General Elliot's Division, followed General Dartnell to the same destination.

The other brigades of General Elliot's Division remained temporarily in the eastern portion of the Orange River Colony in readiness to act against any parties of the enemy who might seek to penetrate into Natal in co-operation with General Botha's enterprise. On the 28th and 29th Colonel De Lisle and Brigadier-General

Broadwood moved north from Harrismith towards Muller's Pass and Vrede to disperse certain hostile bands which were reported to be hovering about the frontier. Colonel De Lisle was at Muller's Pass on the 2nd of October, and the same night General Broadwood bivonacked at Boschoek, a few miles to the west. Few Boers were seen, and it was evident that the parties which may have been meditating an inroad into Natal had thought better of their project, and retired west towards Witkoppies and Vrede. Our columns accordingly made a reconnaissance on the 5th in that direction trying to gain touch with the enemy, and watching opportunity of communicating with fer an Colonel Rimington, who was then known to be moving east from Cornelia along the Vaal valley.

Operations in the Harrismith and Bethlehem Districts.

9. Allusion has already been made to the part taken by Major-General B. Campbell's column in the operations about the Wittebergen. The remainder of Sir Leslie Rundle's Division has been occupied in blocking the passes leading into Natal between Van Reenen's and Witzie's Hoek, in relieving the garrisons upon the Albertina-Van Reenen's line which have hitherto been furnished from the Natal command, and in passing supplies by convoy into Bethlehem.

After the departure of Brigadier-General Dartnell for Zululand, the 1st Imperial Light Horse, under Lieut.-Colonel Briggs, remained to act independently from Bethlehem. This force which was especially organised with a view to mobility has already justified its existence, and some excellent long distance raids have been undertaken. The most successful of these took place on the night of the 28th of September, when after a circuitous march of 38 miles from Bethlehem, Lieut.-Colonel Briggs surrounded the town of Reitz at dawn on the 29th. Here he captured 21 prisoners (including Landdrost Piet de Villiers), 9 Cape carts, 2 wagons, 24 horses, 9 rifles, 250 cattle and some ammunition. His return march, however, was much opposed, and several unsuccessful attempts were made at night by parties of Boers, said to be under De Wet, to surround and rush his force.

Operations in Southern Orange River Colony. 10. After Commandant Smuts had crossed to the south of the Orange River at Kiba Drift, as mentioned in my last despatch, the remainder of the Boers in the south-eastern portion of the Orange River Colony, under Commandant Kruitzinger and other leaders, broke up into a number of small commandos which have moved rapidly about, evading the pursuit of our columns in the area marked by Wepener-Dewetsdorp-Bethulie and Zastron.

On the 8th September, the positions of the different columns under Major-General C. Knox, in this district, were, approximately, as follows:—Colonel Thorneycroft at Quaggafontein and Meyerhoek, guarding the line of the Orange River to the south of Zastron; Lord Basing at Jurysbaken, patrolling thence to Commissie Bridge on the Caledon; Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson on the march south from the Elandsberg to Aliwal; and General Plumer at Smithfield. Major Damant had already returned to Springfontein.

From Smithfield, on the 9th September, General Plumer moved up the valley of the Caledon to Arcadia and Bastard's Drifts against the Boers who had been driven north from the Elandsberg on 7th September, by Sir Henry Rawlinson. From these drifts he detached Sir John Jervis upon Wepener in pursuit of two large parties of

the enemy; whilst with Colonel Colvin's Column | he struck across to Runnymede on the Basuto border. On the 15th, the force reassembled at Wepener, where General Plumer learnt from prisoners that the commandos which had retired north before Sir John Jervis; were local men, and that Kruitzinger had once more doubled back to the Elandsberg. He accordingly sent Colonel Colvin in the latter direction to cooperate with Colonel Thorneycroft, whilst he himself, with Sir John Jervis's Column, moved back towards Smithfield by the right bank of the

On the 19th September, some of Sir John Jervis's mounted men, under Captain Knight of the Buffs, had a sharp skirmish at Wessel's Rust, 8 miles north-west of Bastard's Drift, an affuir in which we captured eight prisoners, including Adjutants Brand and Joubert.

On the same day Colonel Thorneycroft, relieved by General Hart of the task of watching the line of the Orange River, had moved up to Rocklands with Colonel Minchin's Column, thereby setting free Lord Basing to fill the gap between Smithfield and the railway, and Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson had advanced from Aliwal to Beestekraal and Willemsfontein to enable General Hart to devote his entire attention to the line of the river east of Klaarwater Drift.

Colonel Thorneycroft, ascertaining that Kruitzinger had moved on the 17th from the Elandsberg to Tilly, 10 miles north-east of Vecht Kop, despatched Major Copeman's Column in that direction on the night of the 18th, and himself prepared to follow through Dorcum with Colonel

Minchin's troops.

On the 22nd September a party of New Zealanders, under Major Tucker, belonging to Lieut.-Colonel Colvin's Column, was engaged on the Elandsberg with 150 Boers under Field-Cornets Hugo and Bothma, both of whom, with

several other prisoners, were captured.

The effect of these operations was to press some of the enemy's bands toward the Thabanchu line, where their presence had not been taken into account by the Commandant of the section. On the 19th September, a small force, consisting of some 160 mounted men and two guns of "U" Battery, Royal Horse Artillery, which had been detached without any authority or sufficiently important object by the Officer Commanding at the Bloemfontein Waterworks, was surrounded and captured at Vlakfontein, 18 miles south-west of Sannah's Post, by a Boer commando under Commandants Coetzee and Ackermann.

On receipt of this news General Plumer was ordered to move north rapidly on Wepener, where he arrived on 26th September, and Colonel Rochfort, who had succeeded to the temporary command of Major-General Bruce Hamilton's force when the latter was transferred to Natal, was directed to push his columns across the railway line from the west with the object of hemming in the enemy against the Thabanchu

line.

Daily skirmishes occurred with one or other of the columns, and at daybreak on the 29th, Colonel Lowry Cole surprised a Boer laager under Commandant Dreyer and Field-Cornet Van Vuuren, capturing both these leaders and other

prisoners.

In conjunction with these operations General Plumer despatched 200 New Zealanders under Major Andrews from Wepener to hold Mokari Drift on the Caledon. This party reached the drift on the 27, just in time to anticipate some 300 to 400 Boers who were about to cross the river to the south-east. In some sharp fighting which followed, the enemy, who were driven l

westward, left six dead and seven wounded on the field. The same evening General Plumer joined Major Andrews at Mokari, and the whole force then moved south by Commissie Bridge to Rouxville, without being further engaged. After two days' halt General Plumer received orders to march to the railway at Springfontein.

As previously mentioned Colonel Thorneycroft

moved east from the Rouxville District on the 18th and 19th September, and passing through Corunna on the 20th, successfully attacked a Boer force at Vaunedikking's Vallei the same

At the end of September Major Damant's column was withdrawn and brought by rail to Heilbron, to assist Colonel Wilson in covering the Heilbron-Frankfort line of blockhouses.

Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson's troops were also withdrawn to Burgherdorp, and moved thence by rail to the Transvaal for operations near Heidelberg which have already been described.

To each of the columns now left on the east of the main line of railway an area was assigned with a centre from which to work. The columns thus placed are able to deal with any small bands coming within their reach, and three or four can easily combine against any more formidable gathering of the enemy. In this manner the whole district is being rapidly brought under

In the south-western portion of the Orange River Colony the situation has improved in a very marked degree. Only a few small scattered parties remain in this district and the work of systematic clearance has been so thoroughly carried out by the troops under Major-General Bruce Hamilton that as already shown it was found possible to withdraw, first the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Byng and Dawkins to the Vredefort District, and then Major Damant's to Heilbron, whilst the remainder, now directed by Colonel Rochfort, were transferred to the more disturbed area on the east of the railway. Colonel Henry's column continues to operate in . this district.

#### Cape Colony.

11 After passing the Orange River on the night of the 3rd September, Commandant Smuts moved into the Jamestown-Dordrecht district where he was engaged on the 12th of the month by Colonel Monro.: On the same night Smuts eluded our pursuing columns, and, passing over the Sterkstroom-Indwe line of railway at Halseston Station, moved rapidly by Putter's Kraal in the direction of Tarkastad. He was followed south by Colonel Gorringe, Lieut-Colonel Doran, and the 17th Lancers, whilst Colonel Scobell's column moved to Cradock to try to intercept him from the west.

On the 17th September, Smuts's Commando arrived at Modderfontein, 18 miles north-west of Tarkastad, where the Boers made a most determined attack upon a squadron of the 17th Lancers, under Major Sandeman, posted to close all egress to the south. The enemy being dressed in khaki were taken for our own troops, and got to close quarters with the advantage of ground before the mistake was discovered. Thus taken at a great disadvantage our men offered a most gallant resistance, and worthily maintained the traditions of their regiment. The losses of the squadron were very severe, 3 Officers and 20 men being killed, and 2 Officers and 30 men wounded. The Boers, who had evidently made the attack in order to elude the close pursuit to which they were subjected, also suffered heavily, before the approach of another squadron of the

engagement.

After this encounter Smuts rapidly continued his movement to the south for several days. The pursuit, however, was never relaxed, and the troops under Lieut.-Colonels Gorringe, Doran, and Scobbel responded cheerfully to the great exertions demanded of them. The enemy's route lay through Paling Kloof, Bankview (18 miles N.N.E. of Bedford) to Mount Prospect, and thence across the Mancazana at Koonap's Drift, along the Fish River to a point near Sheldon Station, where they crossed the Port Elizabeth line to the west on the night of the 27th September. Lieut.-Colonel Gorringe next engaged him at Oud Murazie in the Zuurberg Mountains, and here succeeded in dividing his force, driving one-half south towards Glen Connor, and the other west towards Darlington. The Boers subsequently re-united at Diep Drift, 10 miles south of Darlington, but again attacked on the 3rd October by Colonel Gorringe, were driven north, with a loss of three men killed and five wounded. Our columns in close contact still maintain the pursuit in this direction.

In the north-eastern portion of Cape Colony the operations against Myburg and Fouché, the latter of whom has recrossed the Orange River, have been continued by the columns under Colonel Mouro, Colonel Pilcher, and Lieut-Colonel Western; Major-General Hart, with Lieut.-Colonel Ilon. A. D. Murray's troops and the Connaught Rangers remaining in observation cf the river line between Bethulie and Herschel.

On the 10th September an attack upon Ladygrey was easily driven off. On the 15th, Colonel Pilcher's columns were south and west of Jamestown, Lieut.-Colonel Western between Jamestown and Ladygrey, and Colonel Monro to the north of Dordrecht. Smuts with his column had already gone south, but about 400 Boers, most of whom had returned from the Transkei, remained scattered in small parties throughout the district.

Early on the 20th September a determined effort was made by Commandant Kruitzinger near Quaggafontein, north of Herschel, to force a passage over the Orange River at a point covered by 80 men of Lovat's Scouts under Lieut. - Colonel Hon. A. D. Murray. attempted crossing failed, but the loss sustained by our small force was very heavy, Lieut.-Colonel Murray, his Adjutant and 16 men being killed, and 1 Officer and 35 men wounded. much deplore the death of Lieut. - Colonel Murray, an Officer of great promise, who has led Lovat's Scouts with gallantry and distinction throughout the campaign.

At the end of September, Colonels Monro and Pilcher were watching the passes over the Drakensberg, across which most of the enemy had again withdrawn into the Transkei, and Lieut.-Colonel Western was near Ladygrey. From these positions Colonel Pilcher and Lieut. Colonel Western were recalled to the southeastern portion of the Orange River Colony; Colonel Monro, supported by local troops, being in charge of this area.

In the southern sphere of operations, it will be remembered that early in September Commandant Scheepers had made several unsuccessful attempts to cross to the west of the Cape Town-De Aar line near Matjesfontein. On the evening of the 9th September, General Beatson, who was directing the operations in this district, hearing that a party of the enemy had outspanned at Driefontein about 12 miles east of Laings-burg, despatched Colonel Crabbe's column on a siderable losses must occur meanwhile.

17th Lancers compelled them to break off the | night march from his camp at Waggon Drift: At daybreak of the 10th, Colonel Crabbe completely surprised the Boers under Commandant Van der Merwe. During the short resistance offered by the enemy, Commandant Van der Merwe and one of his followers were killed, and several burghers were wounded. 37 prisoners (including Field-Cornet Du Plessis), together with a good deal of ammunition and equipment, were captured. After this blow to his detachment, Scheepers turned east, and, passing to the south of Ladismith and Oudtshorn, reached Klip Drift with the remainder of his commando on the 20th. From this point he took a northerly direction, closely pursued by the columns under Colonels Crabbe, Atherton, and Major Kavanagh.

After constant changes of direction, Scheepers narrowly escaped capture on the 5th October, at Adam's Kraal, 20 miles S.S.W. of Ladismith, where he was successfully attacked by Major

Kavanagh.

On the 8th September, Commandant Theron was moving rapidly west from the direction of Willowmore, with the apparent intention of joining Scheepers. On approaching Heidelberg and Swellendain, however, he suddenly turned northwest and, making for the railway, crossed to the north of the line between Triangle and Touw's River Stations. After passing the railway, Theron was opposed by a force under Lieut.-Colonel Capper, who pursued him into the northern portion of the Ceres District. The troops under Lieut.-Colonels Alexander and Wyndham joined in the pursuit, and Theron was driven well away to the north-west, after which our columns moved back to the railway line to co-operate once more in the chase after

In the Philipstown and Hanover districts, small columns under Lieut,-Colonel Sprot and Major Lund have had frequent encounters with parties of Lategan's men, who reappeared once more to the south of the Orange River. Field-Cornet Louw, an influential rebel, and seven of his followers were captured by Major Lund on the 23rd September.

I must also make allusion to a very gallant stand made on the 17th September by nine men of the 3rd Bn. Grenadier Guards, under Lieutenaut M. Gurdon-Rebow, who found themselves attacked by some 30 to 40 of the enemy near Cyferkuil, 10 miles north of Riet Siding. A summons to surrender was refused, and it was not until Lieutenant Gurdon-Rebow and one man had been killed and two others dangerously wounded, as the result of 3 hours' fighting, that the remaining men were overpowered and cap-The serjeant of the patrol was drowned in a gallant attempt to cross the Carolus River in search of help.

12. Throughout the period covered by this despatch, the movements of our columns have been somewhat impeded by the prevalence of rinderpest amongst the cattle. This first made its appearance on the Thabanchu line 3 months ago. For some time it was kept more or less under control, but in spite of every exertion the disease has now spread, and is likely to make it-self felt in every district in turn. It is consequently necessary to inoculate all cattle, a process which throws them out of work for a fortnight or more, and considerably reduces the efficiency of the ox transport for at least a month. The bulk of our oxen have been, or are now being, subjected to this treatment, but some time must elapse before its effects on the whole transport will have completely passed off, and very conIt is a matter of great consideration to note that, in spite of all the difficulties that have presented themselves, there has been no falling-off in the results which the mobile columns are able to show in return for their hard work during the month of September; 170 Boers have been killed in action, 114 have been wounded and are prisoners in our hands. We have taken 1,385 unwounded prisoners, and 393 burghers have surrendered. Our columns have captured in addition 798 rifles, 119,000 rounds small-arm ammunition, 770 wagons, 11,000 horses (most of which are practically useless), and 41,500 cattle.

which are practically useless), and 41,500 cattle.

It cannot be expected, even under the most favourable conditions, that in the presence of

ever-diminishing numbers opposing us in the field, these figures can be maintained, but I feel confident that so long as any resistance is continued no exertion will be spared either by Officers or men of this force to carry out the task they still have before them.

Recommendations for Good Service.

13. I beg to forward herewith the lists of Officers, non-commissioned officers and men whom I wish to bring to notice for good services during the past two months.

In connection with my despatch, dated 8th 18th October, 1901. October, 1901, I beg to forward herewith reports describing the defence of Itala and Fort Prospect on the 26th, and the repulse of the attack upon Colonel Kekewich's camp at Moedwill, on the 30th September, 1901.

Report on the Action at Itala Mount, Zululand, on the 26th September, 1901.

Forces.

1. Our force-

guns, Royal Field Artillery, 69th

3 companies, 5th Division, Mounted Infantry Battalion (300 rifles).

1 Maxim.

Boer Forces.—Strength, 1,800 to 2,000, under the command of Commandant-General Louis Botha, Generals C. Botha, Opperman, and Emmett, Commandants Scholtz, H. J. Potgeiter, Danhausser and others.

Intelligence.

2. Information came in on the afternoon of the 25th that two large commandos had reinforced Danhausser, and that their intention was to attack my camp that night. About 8 pm. further reports came in that a large force had left Babanango by the west road, and was marching on the Itala. Another large force was moving to cross at White's Drift, east of Babanango,

Disposition of our Forces.

3. Ours.—The garrison at once proceeded to take up their positions. I sent 80 Mounted Infantry, under Lieutenant Lefroy, 1st Bn. Royal Dublin Fusiliers, and Lieutenant Kane, 1st Bn. South Lancashire Regiment, to occupy the highest point of the Itala, about 1 mile from the camp.

Disposition of Boer Forces.

Boers.—About 800 men, under General C. Botha and Commandant Scholtz, attacked the Itala from the west; General Opperman, with about 500, attacked the camp from the southeast; Commandant Potgeiter, with 600, attacked camp from the north. A strong detached force of 200 men was sent along road to M'Kandhla to hold the ridge where the Melmouth and M'Kandhla roads cross; at the same time a force of about 500, under Commandant Grobelaar, proceeded to Prospect Post 15 miles east of Itala, and attacked it at 6 a.m. on the 26th inst.

Small parties of Boers searched all the sur-

rounding country for stock.

The Action.
4. At 12 midnight, 25th and 26th, rapid fire was heard from the advance post on the top of the Itala, and continued for about 15 minutes, when it suddenly ceased for half hour. It then recommenced and continued for half hour, when all firing from the top ceased. A verbal report was received about 2 a.m. from this post that they had been surrounded by about 500, who rushed it, and that all were either killed or taken prisoners. This was true to a great degree, but many men refused to surrender, escaped down the south side of the mountain and fought it out the whole day, doing considerable execution from the number of dead Boers found on that side.

The action was now general all round the camp, the fire terrific, and continued without cessation till 4 a.m., the Boers during this phase charged close up to the trenches, many dead were picked up 2 and 3 yards from them; at 4 a.m. the fire suddenly ceased. At dawn, 6 a.m., thinking the Boers had cleared, the native scouts were ordered out to clear up the situation, and Lieutenant Fielding, Royal Army Medical Corps, proceeded up the hill to look for wounded, suddenly the fire broke out with increased energy and continued from that time till 7.80 p.m. (19 hours). Lieutenant Fielding could not return and was detained by the Boers. The whole area of the camp was swept by bullets from every direction, and our casualties became heavy, during the action the men were practically without food or water, and it became evident that it was a question of ammunition which would decide the day, officers and men had been ordered to regulate their fire by the Boers and not to waste. When the action ceased there only remained about 100 rounds per man, all reserve was expended. The night was very bright, there being nearly a full moon, and the guns came into action during the first phase, making excellent practice on the kopies 1,100 yards north and ridge 3,400 yards north, materially helped to keep down the fire. At dawn when the attack recommenced they continued to fire for half-hour, when they became the target for every rifle, so I ordered them to cease and the men to take cover. The fire from the guns and Maxim killed and wounded a great number; Kaffirs report Boers commandeered them to carry away dead and wounded, and this they were doing all that night and next day. The officer in command of the guns, Lieutenant Herbert, Royal Field Artillery, and four men were severely wounded

Reasons for my Decision to Evacuate Itala.

5. When the firing ceased at 7.30 p.m., I waited au hour, and then sent native scouts to reconnoitre, they reported that all Boers had cleared; from personal observation at dusk large bodies of the enemy were observed retiring across the border, all going north and north-east. I decided that owing to my heavy casualties in men and horses, the exhausted condition of the force, and want of ammunition, to retire to M'Kandhla. No information of assistance was received until 4.30 p.m. the 27th instant at M'Kandhla. The 10-mule wagons were loaded with as much as they could carry, and the force moved off at 12 midnight, arriving at M'Kandhla 4 a.m. unmolested. There were left at Itala Lieutenant Hyslop and 20 men unarmed, also Chief Veterinary-Surgeon Probyn to look after wounded, collect and bury dead. Sufficient tents to form a field hospital were also left. Lieutenant Fielding, Royal Army Medical Corps, was released, and came into camp shortly after the column had marched off.

#### General Remarks.

6. The Boers shot harmless natives, stripped and robbed the dead and wounded. They used explosive bullets, and some of the dangerous wounds are due to them.

No helio communication could be attempted.

and native scouts could not get through.

The native scouts employed by me under Guide Collins, Intelligence Guide, brought in early, ample, and accurate information. During my stay in Zululand they have been constantly in the Boer laagers, and it is to their being able to so quickly transmit information that we were quite prepared when the attack began. I should be gratified if favourable notice could be taken | firing for 13 hours. I estimate the strength of of their services.

The Commandant-General, L. Botha, directed the action from the top of Babanango by helic and mounted orderlies. Two messages, picked up on the Itala, are attached.

7. Ours. — Killed: officers, 1; men, 21; mules, 4. Wounded: officers, 5; men, 54; horses, 222. Missing: officers, nil; men, nil.

Boers.—Reliable eye-witnesses say 128 dead; wounded, 270 about.

Amongst their killed are Commandants Scholtz, H. J. Potgeiter, and the latter was killed by revolver shot from Lieutenant Lefroy, 1st Bn. Royal Dublin Fusiliers.

Report on the Defence of Fort Prospect, Zululand, 26th September, 1901.

I have the honour to forward the following report of the action at Fort Prospect, 26th Sep-

tember, 1901:-

About 2 a.m. on the morning of the 26th, it was reported to me that firing could be heard at Itala; at 2.30 a.m. a rocket went up. I at once reinforced the trenches and made ready for an attack. About 4.15 a.m. a Kaffir came in and warned me that the Boers were coming to attack the post in hundreds. By this time I had provisions, water, and extra ammunition placed in all the trenches. At 4.30 a.m., under cover of a mist in the donga, the Boers made a very severe attack on the north and west of my position, the brunt of the attack fell on two sangars held by the Durham Company of Artillery; the Boers broke through the wire and got to within 20 yards of these sangars, but they both gallantly held their own and I, with the aid of the Maxim, was able to repulse this attack. By 6.30 a.m. the Boers drew off from this flank. They then commenced a very severe attack on the rear of my post, but by 10 a.m. it was repulsed. About this time a party of Zululand Native Police, gallantly led by Serjeant Gumbi, broke through and reinforced me; he brought with him 13 men and had marched 4

miles from his own post to reinforce me.

The Boers now had completely surrounded the camp, but contented themselves by keeping up a heavy fire chiefly directed on the Maxim Fort. This fire was kept up all day, gradually lessening towards evening, when the Boers drew

off about 6 p.m.

My casualties were one killed and eight wounded, which, considering the severity of the fire, is very little. I consider it was owing to the excellent cover afforded by the forts and trenches, as we were subjected to very heavy

the Boers at from 500 to 600 men, and they belonged to the Ermelo or Carolina commandos.

The casualties of the Boers are unknown, but two dead were buried at Potgieter's Farm. prisoners who were taken at Itala say that the Boers own to having had 60 killed and wounded on the attack on Fort Prospect. I picked up 30 dead horses next morning, also 2 rifles and 20 saddles.

I cannot close the report without mentioning the gallantry displayed by all ranks, especially by the Durham Company of Militia Artillery. wish to bring to your notice the following names of those who did very well:-

Durham Artillery. Lieutenant R. G. M. Johnson commanded one of the sangars where the brunt of the attack fell, and helped me to organise defence.

1. No. 1332 Bombardier J. Marsden manded the other stone sangar after Bombardier Gilligan was wounded and refused to surrender.

2. Serjeant F. Doyle commanded rear trench

and repulsed Boer second attack.

3. No. 1317 Gunner J. White when wounded went on fighting, and when dressed returned under fire to his trench.

4. No. 2913 Bombardier G. Gilligan commanded stone sangar until wounded.

Report on the Defence of Colonel Kekewich's Camp at Moedwill, 30th September, 1901. From Major-General Mildmay Willson to the Adjutant-General, Army Headquarters, Pretoria. Krugersdorp,

6th November, 1901. Sir.

I beg to forward Colonel Kekewich's report on the attack on his camp on the morning of 30th September, 1901, which seems to have been most carefully arranged by the Boers, and carried out with the greatest rapidity and determination. regret to say that our losses have been very heavy both in Officers and men, but it will be seen from the report that all rauks behaved in a most gallant manner, and although the attack was, to a certain extent, a surprise, and the fire very heavy, there was no panic or flinching of any kind.

The picquets held their ground till they were almost annihilated, and thus enabled the re-

mainder to get under arms.

Colonel Kekewich, I am told, behaved splendidly, and, by his example, largely contributed to the successful repulse of the attack. He was wounded in three places, none of which, I am glad to say, are serious. I beg to bring his gallant behaviour to your favourable consideration, and also the names of the different Officers, non-commissioned officers, and men mentioned in the various reports.

Commanding West of Johannesburg. Report on the Attack on Colonel Kekewich's Column at Moedwill (639), on 30th Sep-

tember, 1901. 1. The column, approximate strength as per margin,\* left Waterval (396) at 5 a.m. on the

29th and arrived at Moedwill at noon the same

2. The camp was pitched on some rising ground on the right bank of the Selons River, and from 800 to 1,000 yards east of the drift where the river is crossed by the main road from Magatos Nek to Zeerust. camp faced west, its left resting on the road and its front being about parallel with the river. The mounted troops were on the right, the Artillery in the centre, and the Derbyshire Regiment on the left.

Outposts were thrown out as follows:-

The Derbyshire Regiment with 1½ companies held the drift in front of the left of the camp, and extended from there round the left and left rear, up to, and including the main road in rear of the left.

The mounted troops took up the line from this point with two squadrons extended round the right and front of the camp and joined up with

the Infantry outpost on the drift.

4. The supply column, with refugees and prisoners, and with an escort of 1 company Derbyshire Regiment, and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  squadrons Scottish Horse, of which ½ squadron only was mounted, left the force at 7 p.m. on the 29th on its way to Naauwpoort, via Magatos Nek to refill.

Thus the force left in camp consisted of:-4 companies Derbyshire Regiment—about 350 61 squadrons (Imperial Yeomanry and Scottish Horse)—about 450 rifles.

3 guns, 28th Battery.

G 2 Section Pompoms.

5. Special orders were issued for patrols to be sent out from each picquet an hour before dawn, and two special patrols of a troop each were ordered to move out north-west and south-west, starting at 4.30 a.m.

6. No signs of the enemy had been seen on the march from Waterval to Moedwill, and, except for a small party of Boers reported to have been seen near Buffelshoek (10), the country in the vicinity appeared practically

7. The first sign of attack was a few rifle shots heard at 4.40 a.m. from the north-west, down the river; these were subsequently found to have been fired at a patrol going out from the left or most southerly picquet furnished by the Devonshire Imperial Yeomanry.

The firing rapidly grew heavier as the enemy, in considerable force, pushed back the patrol, and came upon the Yeomanry picquet, every man of which was either killed or wounded.

Having thus established themselves to the east of the river, they opened a very heavy fire along the bank to the south; on the camp and to the north-east on another Imperial Yeomanry picquet, which soon had almost, if not all, its members killed and wounded, including the officer in command of it.

I may mention here that the right bank of the Selons River all along the front and north of the camp is high and steep, and appeared to offer a formidable obstacle to an attack.

8. It would appear that the enemy had collected in large numbers in the bed of the river and in the broken and bushy ground, of which there was much to the north-west of the camp, across the river.

9. Meanwhile the alarm had been given, and by 4.45 a.m. all were a-foot, advancing out of camp and reinforcing the picquets, except a small party of the Derbyshire Regiment remaining to guard ammunition, &c.

10. The enemy had now pushed up the river, outflanking the Derbyshire picquet holding the main drift, and, after a very gallant resistance in which all but one man was killed or wounded,

occupied their position.

11. The whole of the actual camp was now under a hail of bullets, principally from the west and north-west, to which it was impossible to reply with good effect owing to the tents and loose animals, and to the difficulty in the dim light of distinguishing friend from enemy. ranks, however, seemed to realise that they must get out at once into the open towards the enemy, to obtain a field of fire; this they did under various officers, and meanwhile our guns, Maxim and pompom, and such outposts as were not surrounded, kept the enemy off.

12. A strong body of the Derbyshire Regingent under Major Watts moved out east, on a report being made by Captain Watson, Adjutant, Scottish Horse (since died of wounds), that a large body of the enemy were working round from the north to the east or rear of the camp. It was now growing light, and as this reported movement of the enemy was discovered to be not well founded, Major Watts, who had been joined by Major Browne of the Border Regiment, with a number of men he had collected, such as servants, cooks, orderlies, &c., being satisfied as to the safety of the east, swung his men round to the north and advanced with fixed bayonets against the enemy in the bushes. As he did this a large number of men of the Imperial Yeomanry

and Scottish Horse, under Captains Rattray, Dick-Cunyngham and Mackenzie, joined in the general advance and, as they came on, the enemy whose fire had been slackening for some time and whose flank was being threatened by this movement, broke and fled. They picked up their horses which had been held for them in the river bed and retired at a gallop north and northwest, coming for a short period only under the fire of our guns.

13. I had early in the day ordered Colonel Duff to get two squadrons ready, so as to pursue the enemy on the attack being repulsed, but the casualties were so heavy, especially among the horses, that it was found impossible to do this.

14. By 6.15 a.m. the last shot was fired.

15. While the enemy's main attack from the north-west was developing, progressing, being checked, and finally repulsed, other minor attacks were made from the east, west, and south, but were not pushed home, the enemy who had made them retiring in various directions at about 6 a.m.

16. The enemy are reported to have been 1,200 strong, under Delarey, Kemp, Van Heerden, Van Tonder, Steenicamp, Oosthuizen, and Boshof. They expended an enormous quantity of ammunition, which they can ill spare, and, so far as I know, gained no advantage by this very large and rapid concentration.

They are so quick at removing their dead and wounded, that it is impossible at present to estimate their losses with any accuracy.

17. I much regret the heavy losses incurred

by our troops.

I cannot speak too highly of the gallant conduct of all ranks, and especially of the 1st Bn. Derbyshire Regiment, in repelling this carefully planned and most determined attack by a large force of the enemy, which was probably made with a view to capturing our guns, ammunition, and supplies, of which, doubtless, they were in great want.

18. The severity of the attack may be realised from the fact that, at its commencement, three picquets were practically annihilated, and the casualties in some of the others were very heavy; also that a large number of the wounded were

hit in several places.

19. Of course, there must be many unrecorded acts of gallantry and devotion to duty in a night attack such as this, but any special acts and good work that have been brought to my notice are embodied in the attached reports.

20. I am in hospital, having handed over the command of the column to Lieut.-Colonel Wylly, Derbyshire Regiment, but, as I was commanding it at the time the attack took place, I forward this report and my recommendations.

All horses intended to be shipped from any place other than any of the Australian States (which include Tasmania and New Zealand) shall, before being shipped, he subjected by the Veterinary Surgeon appointed to examine and grant certificates of health for stock intended to be shipped for this State to a Mallein Test, and all cattle from any such place shall be subjected to a Tuberculin Test; and if any of such horses or cattle shall, in the opinion of such Veterinary Surgeon, react to such test, he will refuse to grant a certificate of health, and such horses or cattle, as the case may be, shall not be admitted into this State.

This Regulation to take effect three months after the date of issue.
