NOTICES TO MARINERS.

(Nos. 7 to 16 of the year 1902.)

[The bearings are magnetic, and those concerning the visibility of lights are given from seaward.]

No. 7.—UNITED STATES—ATLANTIC COAST, MARYLAND.

Chesapeake Bay—Bank Extending; Spar Buoys Established.

THE United States Government has given notice, that on 19th November, 1901, the under-mentioned buoys were established in Chesapeake Bay to mark the extension of the bank northward of the measured mile:—

a. A red spar buoy, named Barren Island Shoal Buoy, was moored in a depth of 17 feet, low water, with Cedar Point Lighthouse bearing S. 56° W., distant 4 miles, and Cove Point Lighthouse N. 49° W.

This buoy marks the edge of the shoals off the upper end of Barren Island.

b. A red spar buoy, named Meekins Neck Shoal Buoy, was moored in a depth of 18 feet, low water, with Cove Point Lighthouse bearing N. 60° W., distant $3\frac{1}{4}$ miles, and Cedar Point Lighthouse S. 41° W.
