A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD R. and I.

WHEREAS under section eleven of "The Coinage Act, 1870," We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, from time to time by Proclamation to determine the design for any coin:

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to determine new designs for the silver coins specified in this Proclamation, being silver coins mentioned in the First Schedule to "The Coinage Act, 1870":

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said enactment and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

The designs for the said silver coins shall be as follows:—

- (1.) *Crown*.—Every crown shall have for the obverse impression, Our effigy with the inscription "Edwardus VII Dei Gra: Britt: Omn: Rex Fid: Def: Ind: Imp:" and for the reverse the image of Saint George armed, sitting on horseback, attacking the dragon with a sword, and a broken spear upon the ground, and the date of the year, and on the edge of the piece in raised letters, "Decus et tutamen Anno Regni," the year of the reign being in Roman numeral letters.
- (2.) *Half-Crown*.—Every half-crown shall have for the obverse impression the aforesaid effigy, with the inscription "Edwardus VII Dei Gra: Britt: Omn: Rex" and for the reverse the Ensigns Armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield surmounted by the Royal Crown and surrounded by the Garter bearing the motto, "Honi Soit Qui Mal y Pense," with the inscription "Fid: Def: Ind: Imp:" together with the words "Half Crown," and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.
- (3.) *Florin*.—Every florin shall have the same obverse impression as the half-crown, with the inscription "Edwardus VII D.G. Britt: Omn: Rex F.D. Ind: Imp:" and for the reverse the figure of Britannia standing upon the prow of a vessel, her right hand grasping a trident, and her left resting on a shield, with the words "One Florin Two Shillings" and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.

(4.) *Shilling*.—Every shilling shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the half-crown, and for the reverse, Our Royal Crest with the date of the year placed across the Crest, with the inscription "Fid: Def: Ind: Imp:" together with the words "One Shilling," with a graining upon the edge.

(5.) *Sixpence*.—Every sixpence shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the crown, and for the reverse the words "Six Pence" placed in the centre of the piece, having an olive branch on one side and an oak branch on the other, surmounted by the Royal Crown, and the date of the year between and below the branches, with a graining upon the edge.

(6.) *Silver Fourpence, Threepence, Twopence, and Penny*.—Every silver fourpence, threepence, twopence, and penny shall have for the obverse impression Our aforesaid effigy, with the inscription "Edwardus VII D.G. Britt: Omn: Rex F.D. Ind: Imp:" and for the reverse the respective figures "4," "3," "2," "1" (according to the denomination or value of the piece) in the centre, with the date of the year placed across the figure, and encircled with an oak wreath surmounted by the Royal Crown, with a plain edge.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, this thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two, and in the first year of Our Reign.

For Statute V, Clauses 1b and 1c, to substitute the following:—

"The income of the Tuition Fund shall be applied in accordance with the regulations hereinafter contained, in payment of remuneration to the educational staff of the College, and of other expenses connected with the education of the Undergraduate members of the College."

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of Jesus College in the University of Cambridge such amending Statutes being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the sixteenth day of December one thousand nine hundred and one and having been passed at such Meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of all the persons present and voting now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of Jesus College in the University of Cambridge in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth section of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877" do hereby alter

and amend the existing Statutes of our said College in the following manner:—

By adding to Statute VII intituled "Of the vacating of Fellowships" the following paragraph to form paragraph 8 of the said Statute:—

8. The Fellowship which in June 1901 was suspended by Order of the Visitor under Statute VI paragraph 1 shall remain vacant until June 1915. During that period of suspension there shall be paid in each year to the Scholarship Fund an amount equal to one Fellowship dividend for the preceding year which payment shall be deemed to be a sum due under the Statutes of the College from the gross yearly receipts of the College and as such entitled to priority under Statute XX now in force.

By substituting in paragraph 6 of Statute IX intituled "Of the Scholars to be maintained by the College" for the words—

No one shall be allowed to compete for a Scholarship before commencing residence in the University if his age exceeds nineteen years at the time of examination,

The following words viz.:—

No one shall be allowed to compete for a Scholarship before commencing residence in the University if his age exceeds nineteen years on the first day of October next preceding the time of examination.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Aidan Carlisle situate within the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle commonly called Saint Paul Carlisle in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle in the said county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the Schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle and the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Aidan Carlisle situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Wareing, Bishop of Carlisle as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle and with the consents of the Reverend Edmund Carr Clerk in Holy Orders Vicar of Holbrooke in the county of Derby and Honorary Canon of Carlisle Miles MacInnes of Rickerby near Carlisle Esquire Francis Augustus Bevan of number 59 Princesgate in the city of Westminster Esquire the Reverend Thompson Phillips Clerk in Holy Orders and Canon Residentiary of Carlisle and the Reverend William Mutrie Shepherd Clerk in Holy Orders and Vicar of Saint Lawrence Appleby in the county of Westmoreland as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle and the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Aidan Carlisle situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Aidan Carlisle.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Aidan Carlisle comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle commonly called Saint Paul Carlisle and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle both in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle which taken together are bounded upon the greater part of the north-west partly by the parish of Stanwix and partly by the parish of Croshy-upon-Eden upon the east by the new parish of Scotby, upon the south by the new parish of Saint John Upperby all in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-west and upon the west and upon the remaining part of the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Upperby from the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle at the centre of the bridge which carries the Newcastle and Carlisle Branch Line of the North Eastern Railway across the River Petteril and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named river for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle

of the south-eastern end of Raven-street and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Greystone-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Norman-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts to the wall at its north-western end which forms the south-eastern boundary of the grounds of the Carlisle Union Workhouse and continuing thence north-westward in the same direction and in a straight line (thereby crossing the grounds of the said workhouse) for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Back South Petteril-street upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle from the new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle aforesaid and extending thence westward along the said boundary (thereby following in part the middle of the said back street and afterwards crossing the grounds of the Carlisle Union Workhouse) for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts to the point where the same boundary crosses the middle of Broad-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Myddleton-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle from the new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle aforesaid) to the junction of the last-named street with Aglionby-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lismore-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Warwick-road and Lismore-place and extending thence still north-westward along the middle of the said place (thereby crossing Northumberland-road) for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Catholic-lane and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the southern bank of the River Eden and continuing thence north-eastward in the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the last-named river upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary (Without) Carlisle from the parish of Stanwix aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint James Wardleworth; partly out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of All Saints Hamer; and partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of Newbold, all within the original limits of the parish of Rochdale, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the above-mentioned new parishes are cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parishes which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain glebe lands, messuages tenements and hereditaments sometime belonging to the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the lastly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And whereas the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted will be permanently endowed under the provisions contained in the twelfth section of the said lastly-mentioned Act with an annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to be hereafter increased to two hundred pounds per annum when a permanent church shall have been consecrated and formally approved by us as the parish church for such district and such endowment will be secured by one or more instruments under our Common Seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas a sum of one thousand pounds has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England towards providing a permanent church within and for the said district and has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding that

(such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and when it shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the contributors of the said sum of one thousand pounds have nominated the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Manchester as the person to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish should be assigned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, all those portions of the said new parish of Saint James Wardleworth of the said new parish of All Saints Hamer, and of the said new parish of Newbold which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of the Good Shepherd Rochdale.' And with the like consent we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district of The Good Shepherd Rochdale and when it shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish shall be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of the Good Shepherd Rochdale comprising:—

All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint James Wardleworth of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of All Saints Hamer, and of the new parish (sometime district) of Newbold, all in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Newbold from the new parish of All Saints Hamer aforesaid at or near the middle of the eastern end of the bridge over the River Roch which connects Belfield-road with Hamer-lane and extending thence first westward and then south-westward across the said bridge and along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Joshua-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stafford-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hamer-lane aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance

of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Yorkshire-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints Hamer from the new parish of Saint James Wardleworth aforesaid) for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Littlewood-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bradshaw-street and with Mackinnon-street and extending thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with Ramsay-street and Trafalgar-street, and extending thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to its south-eastern end at the River Roch and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of a half chain or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the River Roch aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Wardleworth from the new parish of Newbold aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following the middle of the last-named river) for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to the point where the said river is joined by the stream known as the Moss Brook and extending thence first eastward and thence southward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to the north-western boundary of the premises of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway and extending thence due southward and in a straight line for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby passing over the said railway premises) to the middle of the main line of the same railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Facit Branch Line of the same railway and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Newbold from the new parish of All Saints Hamer aforesaid and extending thence northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the River Roch aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the said river for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the point near its junction with the stream known as Stanney Brook where it again meets the last-mentioned boundary and extending thence north-eastward along the said last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in part the middle of the said river) for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts to the point at or near the middle of the eastern end of the bridge over the said river which connects the said Belfield-road with Hamer-lane aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the three new parishes out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and also the Incumbents of two of the said new

parishes have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the Incumbent of the new parish of Saint James Wardleworth has offered certain objections to the said scheme.

And whereas, notwithstanding such objections, the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Brightside of the said new parish of Pitsmoor and of the said parish of Ecclesfield which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas we are satisfied that each of the said cures is a cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

"And whereas in pursuance of the power and authority given by an Order of the High Court of Chancery dated the first day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four confirming a scheme for the future application of the income of the trust property of the twelve capital burgesses and commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield in the said county of York and of an order of the Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales dated the fourth day of March in the year one thousand

eight hundred and seventy-four in partial variation of the scheme established by the said first-mentioned order the said burgesses and commonalty have proposed to appropriate the sum of two hundred pounds per annum out of that part of the income of their trust property which is applicable to ecclesiastical purposes, in and towards the endowment of the district herein proposed to be constituted.

"And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners have signified by a writing bearing date the seventh day of November in the year one thousand nine hundred and one under our common seal our approval of and consent to the proposed endowment of the said proposed district.

"And whereas the said endowment of two hundred pounds per annum has been so appropriated as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of parsonage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned to the twelve capital burgesses and commonalty of Sheffield aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Brightside of the said new parish of Pitsmoor and of the said parish of Ecclesfield which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Cuthbert Sheffield.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and shall be exercised by the said twelve capital burgesses and commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield and their successors.

And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Cuthbert, Sheffield comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district) of Brightside in the county of York and in the diocese of York which is bounded upon the north by the parish of Ecclesfield upon the north-west and upon the south-west by the new parish (sometime district) of Pitsmoor both in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east

and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Pitsmoor from the new parish of Brightside aforesaid at the junction of Osgarthorpe-road with Grimesthorpe-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fifty-three and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Upwell-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Owler-lane and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Selby-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Firth Park-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to the point near its junction with Dickson-lane now called Bolsover Hill-road where it is crossed by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Brightside from the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Pitsmoor which is bounded upon the north-east by the said parish of Ecclesfield upon the east and upon part of the south-east by the hereinbefore described portion of the said new parish of Brightside and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the other part of the south-east and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Brightside from the new parish of Pitsmoor aforesaid at the junction of Osgarthorpe-road with Barnsley-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Norwood-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Piper-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Longley-lane and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty-three and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Carr-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the boundary on the eastern side of Longley House which boundary divides the said new parish of Pitsmoor from the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Ecclesfield which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint Thomas Wincobank in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south-east and upon part of the south-west by the said new parish of Brightside (including the hereinbefore described portion thereof) upon the remaining part of the south-west by the hereinbefore described portion of the said new parish of Pitsmoor and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the west upon the north-west and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Pitsmoor from the parish of Ecclesfield aforesaid at the hereinbefore described point in the middle of Carr-lane on the eastern side of Longley House as aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the last-named lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the boundary of the city of Sheffield as extended by the authority of

the Sheffield Corporation Act 1900 and extending thence first north-eastward then northward then again north-eastward and then eastward along the last-mentioned city boundary for a distance of one mile and twenty-nine chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing Elm-lane, Sheffield-lane and Sicey-lane) to a point in the middle of Common-road at a distance of about three chains south of its junction with Oaks-lane upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Ecclesfield from the new parish of Saint Thomas Wincobank aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

cure (being a vicarage) of Raglan, the churches and cure (being a vicarage) of Saint Arvans with Penterry, all in the county of Monmouth and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said benefices is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Most Noble Henry Adelbert Wellington Duke of Beaufort, and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the said Henry Adelbert Wellington Duke of Beaufort is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said benefices now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Llandaff.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Henry Adelbert Wellington Duke of Beaufort (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said benefices, namely, the said benefice of Gwernesney, the said benefice of Llandenny, the said benefice of Llanishen with Trelleck Grange, the said benefice of Llansoy, the said benefice of Magor with Redwick, the said benefice of Raglan, and the said benefice of Saint Arvans with Penterry, now vested in him the said Henry Adelbert Wellington Duke of Beaufort and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid, shall be transferred from him and them to the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

"And with the like consent of the said Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical

Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Chad Smethwick situate as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Supple-

mental Scheme bearing date the seventh day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Supplemental Scheme under the twenty-fifth section of that Act with reference to a sum of money remaining in the hands of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne (hereinafter called the said Governors) being the unexpended portion of the fund mentioned in the thirteenth fifteenth and sixteenth clauses of the Order of Her late Majesty in Council first hereinafter mentioned and by the said Order established for the purpose of providing a parsonage house or house of residence for the Rector or Incumbent of the united benefice and rectory of Saint Catherine Cree with Saint James Duke's-place in the city and diocese of London (hereinafter called the said united benefice).

"Whereas by an Order of Her late Majesty in Council made the fifth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three and published in the London Gazette on the sixth day of the same month it was ordered and directed (*inter alia*) that out of the net proceeds realized by the sales (thereby authorized) of the materials site and (if sold) certain furniture of the church of Saint James Duke's-place threenths should be paid to the said Governors in aid of a fund for providing a residence for the said united benefice and that every Incumbent of the said united benefice who should hold the same benefice discharged from any liability to the payment of an annual sum to a former Incumbent of either of the benefices by the said Order united should pay yearly to the said Governors the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds sterling to be increased to two hundred pounds in every year in respect of which a yearly payment should be due and in which such Incumbent should not have been resident for nine calendar months within the limits of the said united benefice until by means of such payments and otherwise as thereafter mentioned a fund should have been provided for the purchase or erection of a house of residence for the said united benefice within the limits of the said united benefice.

"And whereas by another Order of Her late Majesty in Council made the twelfth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three and published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of the same month it was ordered and directed that the restriction imposed by the hereinafter recited Order of Her late Majesty in Council as to the situation of the proposed house of residence for the said united benefice should be removed and that it should not be necessary that such house of residence should be actually situate within the limits of the said united benefice.

"And whereas in pursuance of the first hereinafter recited Order of Her late Majesty in Council, the payments thereby directed to be made, have been, from time to time, made to the said Governors and the fund thereby directed to be established by the said Governors has been so established by them for providing a house of residence for the said united benefice."

"And whereas a house of residence for the said united benefice has been provided in accordance with the provisions of the said recited

Orders of Her late Majesty in Council, and after payment by the said Governors out of the said fund of the cost of providing such house of residence there remained in the hands of the said Governors a certain sum (being the unexpended portion of the said fund and its accumulations).

"And whereas by an Order of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice made on the eleventh day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred, in an action wherein the executors of the late Incumbent of the said united benefice were plaintiffs, and the said Governors, the Attorney-General, and the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London (hereinafter called the said Corporation) were defendants, it was declared that the moneys in the hands of the defendants, the said Governors being the unexpended portion hereinafter mentioned of the said fund and its accumulations, did not belong to or form part of the estate of the said late Incumbent of the said united benefice, and it was further declared that it was within the power of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to recommend a further scheme or further schemes with reference to the application of the fund after payment thereof of the costs thereby directed to be paid.

"And whereas after the payment of such costs there now remains in the hands of the said Governors the sum of two thousand and fifteen pounds thirteen shillings and seven pence being the unexpended portion of the said fund for providing a house of residence for the said united benefice together with accumulations of interest up to the fifth day of April in the year one thousand nine hundred and one.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Bishop of the diocese of the patrons of the said united benefice and of the vestries of the said two parishes to be affected by this scheme, that is to say, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the Master and Fellows of the College of Saint Mary Magdalene, in the University of Cambridge, as alternate patrons of the said united benefice, and of the said Corporation as the other alternate patrons of the said united benefice (in testimony whereof the said Master and Fellows and the said Corporation have respectively hereunto affixed their common or corporate seals), and with the consent of the vestry of each of the two said parishes of Saint Catherine Cree and Saint James Duke's-place (in testimony of which consent this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the Chairman of a Meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said sum of two thousand and fifteen pounds thirteen shillings and seven pence now in the hands of the said Governors and any accumulations of interest in respect thereof subsequent to the said fifth day of April one thousand nine hundred and one shall be applied in the following manner, that is to say, that the said sum with all such further accumulations of interest as above mentioned shall be paid by the said Governors to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to be held and applied by us for the purpose of the endowment or augmentation of the income or otherwise for the benefit of the Incumbent of the said united benefice and his successors.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other

measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Supplemental Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Supplemental Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity Hereford situate within the parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed in the county of Hereford and in the diocese of Hereford.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed, of the parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford, of the parish of All Saints in Hereford, and of the parish of Saint John the Baptist in Hereford, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunto written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed of the said parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford, of the said parish of All Saints in Hereford and of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Hereford should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity Hereford situate as aforesaid.

the patrons both of the vicarage of the said parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed and of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Hereford, with the consent of the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Earl of Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain as the patron on behalf of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford and with the consent of the Dean and Canons of Your Majesty's Free Chapel of Saint George within Your Castle of Windsor as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of All Saints in Hereford (in testimony whereof they the said John Bishop of Hereford and the said Hardinge Stanley Earl of Halsbury have respectively signed and sealed this representation and they the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Hereford and the said Dean and Canons of Windsor have respectively caused their common or corporate seals to be affixed to this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed of the said parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford, of the said parish of All Saints in Hereford, and of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Hereford which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity Hereford situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Hereford.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Hereford comprising:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of Holmer with the chapelry of Huntington annexed of the parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford, of the parish of All Saints in Hereford, and of the parish of Saint John the Baptist in Hereford (such portion of the last-named parish being a detached portion of the same parish) all in the county of Hereford and in the diocese of Hereford which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Nicholas in Hereford from the parish of All Saints in Hereford aforesaid crosses the middle of Ryland-street at a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts north-east of the junction of the said street with Chandos-street, and extending thence first south-eastward and then eastward along the said boundary for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to a point at or near the south-western end of Barton Railway Station in the middle of the Hereford Hay and Brecon Branch Line of the Midland Railway, and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of one mile and fifty-four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing under the bridge which connects White Cross-street with Eign-street crossing the boundary which
