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From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-Quarters, South Africa,

Sir, Johannesburg, 8th January, 1902. IN continuation of my Despatch of the 8th December, 1901, I have the honour to forward, herewith, an account of the operations carried out by the Troops under my command since that

date.

1. As the result of the limitations imposed upon their mobility by the extension of the blockhouse system, the enemy's forces in the field are now practically confined to four definite areas. In the Eastern Transvaal the personal influence of General Louis Botha continues to hold together a considerable, but diminishing, force, between the borders of Swaziland and the Brugspruit-Waterval blockhouse line; in the west, Generals De la Rey and Kemp cling to the difficult country between the Mafeking railway line and the Magaliesberg; in the north-eastern districts of Orange River Colony De Wet and ex-President Steyn still control a comparatively large and determined following, who have quite recently given proofs of their boldness and initiative in attack; and in Cape Colony the country to the north-west of the Cape Town-De Aar line is infested by several bands of rebels kept together by adventurers from the late Republics. Elsewhere, smaller commandoes are to be found, but their numbers are insignificant, and their want of enterprise reveals, in all prohability, an abating interest in the useless struggle in which they have so long been

Good progress has been made during the month in most directions, especially in the Eastern Transvaal, where the operations of Major-General Bruce Hamilton have been rewarded with continued success, and where the improvement in the situation has been marked by a gratifying increase in the number of voluntary surrenders.

The capture of Commandant Kritzinger whilst THE following Despatch has been received on his way to resume control of the raiding from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Opperman at the action of Onverwacht in the Eastern Transvaal, and the loss of Commandant Haasbroek, who was killed in action near Vaal Bank, in the Orange River Colony, have removed from the enemy's ranks three of their most trusted leaders.

2. At the date of my last despatch, Major-General Bruce Hamilton was continuing his operations against General Louis Botha in the Eastern Transvaal; the columns under Colonel Coliu Mackenzie and Lieutenant-Colonel Hon. C. G. Fortescue being in the vicinity of Carolina; Colonel Allenby at Boschmansfontein (204); and General Hamilton's other troops in and around Ermelo.

Upon his return to the latter place, on the 5th December, from his expedition to Oshoek (33), General Hamilton learnt that another considerable body of the enemy had moved in a north-westerly direction towards the Constabulary posts. He accordingly directed Lieutenant-Colonels Wing and E. Williams to move by Nooitgedacht (60) upon Kalabasfontein (170); Colonel Allenby was ordered to march west to Middelkraal (298); and General Hamilton himself, with Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson's column, proceeded from Ermelo in the direction of

On reaching Spicenkop (39), on the 9th December, General Hamilton's intelligence re-December, General Hamilton's intelligence reports showed that the Boers referred to, who had collected near Vaal Kop, some 20 miles north of Bethal, were moving in a southerly direction towards Trigaardtsfontein (151), with the evident object of escaping round his left flank. He therefore summoned the columns of Colonels Wing and Williams to join him at Colonels Wing and Williams to join him at Spicenkop, and at dark the whole force made a night march upon Trigaardtsfontein. Here the enemy were completely surprised; their laager was rushed by our troops at dawn, and after a pursuit of six miles it was found that 7 Boers had been killed, and that 130 prisoners, with 4,000 cattle and a large convoy, had fallen into our hands.

After this successful action the force marched : into Bethal, having covered 60 miles in the previous forty-eight hours.

In connection with the attack upon Trigaardts-fontein, Colonel Allenby, who moved west on the 10th from Middelkraal to Onverwacht (478), was instrumental in intercepting some of the fugitives who, with part of the Boer convoy, were captured as they sought to elude the pursuit of General Hamilton's other troops.

After halting a day at Bethal, General Hamilton was about to return to Ermelo, when he heard that a number of the Boars who had escaped from Trigaardtsfontein were re-assembling under General P. Viljoen at Witkrans (55), twenty-five miles north-east of Bethal. He at once halted his column, and then, when darkness had set in, commenced another long night march, with the troops under Colonels Sir H. Rawlinson, Wing, and Williams. The intelligence of the enemy's whereabouts proved correct, and after a sharp gallop of several miles in the early dawn of the 13th, 70 Boers (including Field Cornets Badenhorst and Swanepool) were captured and 16 killed. During this engagement one of the two 15-pr. guns taken from Colonel Benson's force at Brakenlaagte was recovered, and it was ascertained that the other gun had been disabled by the enemy.

General Hamilton's troops moved into Ermelo on the evening of the 13th, after an extremely

hard day's work.

On the same date as the enemy's laager at Witkrans was thus broken up, Colonel Mackenzie and Lieutenant-Colonel Fortescue, operating a few miles to the northward of that place, were also engaged with the enemy, of whom 3 were killed, and several prisoners, together with much stock, captured.

On the 19th December, General Hamilton again left Ermelo for Steenkoolspruit (88), twenty-two miles east of Ermelo; Colonel Mackenzie marching simultaneously from Carolina upon Lake Banagher (181), twenty-two

miles north-east of Ermelo.

To co-operate with this movement, General Plumer and Colonel Pulteney were also ordered to move up to the vicinity of Spitzkop (115). where they would be in a position to watch for any attempt on the part of the enemy to break away in a southerly or south-westerly direction. At dawn on the 23rd both these columns came up with a force of 500 Boers at Glenfillan (288), and after a short engagement captured 6 pri-

Advancing from Carolina, on the night of the .19th, Colonel Mackenzie made a long forced march to Lake Banaglier, where he attacked, at daybreak, Barend Smit's commando in laager upon Schalk Meyer's farm, and inflicted upon the enemy a loss of 6 killed; 16 pr soners, 200 horses, and a quantity of ammunition were also taken. Colonel Mackenzie then moved west to

Bothwell (140).

At the latter place he received information that a Boer convoy was leaving Klipstapel in a westerly direction. He according started at 9 A.M., on December 21st, with all available mounted troops, and after a pursuit of 30 miles overtook and captured what turned out to be a convoy of Smit's commando, with 17 prisoners, 44 vehicles, and 2,000 cattle. Colonel Mackenzie subsequently returned to Carolina.

In the meantime, the troops under Major-General Bruce Hamilton had also met with some success. At dawn on the 23rd an attack was made upon Grobelaar's laager, at Maryvale (76), fifteen miles north of Amsterdam, but the dense morning mist favoured the escape of the Boers, by the enemy.

whose losses were limited for this reason to 4 killed and 11 captured. 700 cattle and a number of wagons were also captured.

From Maryvale, General Bruce Hamilton

returned to Ermelo.

Another easterly movement was commenced on December 29th, from Ermelo and Carolina respectively, when General Hamilton again pushed out his troops to Maryvale, and effected the capture there, on January 1st, of 22 prisoners, 14 wagons, and 500 cattle.

Colonel Mackenzie marched at the same time to Holnek (41), and thence towards the border of Swaziland, to guard against any possible

escape of the Boers to the north.

On the night of the 2nd of January, Major-General Bruce Hamilton, with columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Simpson and Scott, made a long march, by circuitous bridle paths, and followed up the tracks of the Pretoria commando, which was known to have left Amsterdam on the previous evening. These tracks led into some deep kloofs in the sides of the hills north-east of Amsterdam, where 49 prisoners (including General Erasmus and Mr. Custer, late J.P. of Amsterdam) were hemmed in and taken. Colonel Wing, who was also out on the same night, increased this total by a further capture of 20 prisoners and 5 wagons.

During the progress of the eastern movement here referred to, the columns under Brigadier-Generals Spens and Plumer and Lieutenant-Colonel Colville were disposed upon a general line, Beginderlyn-Rotterdam-Derby, to endeavour to intercept any bands which might try to escape from General Hamilton's troops towards the Elandsberg and the hilly country to the north of Wakkerstroom. Whilst watching this district, on the 3rd of January, a party of General Plumer's New Zealanders became hotly engaged with the enemy in the vicinity of Twyfelaar (3), when, despite the loss of the officer in command, who was wounded, and 20 of their numbers, they effected the capture of 300 cattle and a wagon load of ammunition.

Another severe encounter between the Boers and General Plumer's troops took place on the following day, when about 50 of our mounted troops, under Major Vallentin, who were following up the commando which had been engaged with the New Zealanders, were suddenly attacked by several hundreds of the enemy. The Boers advanced at a gallop with about 100 men in first line, and about 50 thrown back on each flank. The whole movement was covered by heavy fire from several hundred dismounted riflemen in the background. Severe hand-to-hand fighting ensued, in which, I regret to say, Major Vallentin and 18 of his men were killed, and 5 officers and 28 men wounded before the arrival of reinforcements under Colonel Pulteney compelled the enemy to retire. The Boers, who were led on this occasion by General C. Botha on the one flank, and General J. D. Opperman on the other, fell back northwards to Schimmelhoek (89) and Foxhill (241), leaving 9 dead and 3 wounded in our hands, amongst the former of whom was General Opperman, who held chief command over a group of commandoes as well as the personal leadership of the Swaziland commando.

Prior to this co-operation with General Hamilton, Brigadier-General Spens' column had been working in the vicinity of Morgenzon (62) between Standerton and Ermelo, in which neighbourhood, on the 19th of December, a portion of his mounted infantry had been severely handled

On the night of the 18th, General Spens had | detached the 14th Mounted Infantry, under Major Bridgford, to search a number of farms which lie near the junction of the Vaal River with the Kaffir Spruit. Major Bridgford marched all night, and at daybreak encountered a party of Boers whom he chased ineffectively for a long distance. Then, whilst his men were scattered on a wide front, as a result of the pursuit, he was suddenly attacked by the enemy in very superior force. The casualties were heavy, and some of our men were taken prisoners. The some of our men were taken prisoners. remainder of the party, under Lieutenant Stirling, Dublin Fusiliers, whose behaviour appears to have been most creditable, fought their way back to the nearest point on the Standerton-Ermelo blockhouse line. On the arrival of General Spens with reinforcements the prisoners were recovered, and the enemy, who were under Commandant Britz, were found to have retired out of reach.

No time was lost, however, in organizing a pursuit of the commando, and by the 28th of December the columns under Generals Plumer and Spens and Colonel Pulteney were assembled in the neighbourhood of Amersfoort with a view to combined action. Touch with the enemy was soon gained to the west of Amersfoort, and on the 28th General Spens captured 7 prisoners near Schuilplaats (185). Commandant Britz was then chased to the south towards Platrand Station, where 24 more of his men fell into General Spens' hands; 100 of them escaped, with several casualties from the fire of our blockhouses, to the south of the railway line, and the remainder, broken up into small parties, turned north along the Vaal River. Our pursuing columns then marched back in a north-easterly direction to co-operate with General B. Hamilton towards

Beginderlyn and Rotterdam.

Whilst these operations were in progress in the extreme east, an isolated party of the enemy, some 200 strong, succeeded at the beginning of December in penetrating through the line of South African Constabulary posts, into the protected area to the east of Springs. Since then they have been constantly pursued by the mounted troops of Colonel Allenby's column and Brigadier-General G. Hamilton's Cavalry Brigade. Over 60 of the enemy are now in our hands, and others have surrendered to the Constabulary. Of the prisoners taken, 34 were captured by the Carabiniers under Major Butler on the 18th of December, near Schoongezicht, to the south-west of Brugspruit. A further success was achieved by Colonel Allenby's troops on the 5th of January near Bultfontein (217), to the north of Bethal. Upon this occasion, the 13th Hussars under Major Williams, who had returned to the east of the Constabulary posts, effected the surprise at daybreak of Commandant Breytenbach's laager, and took 11 prisoners (including the Commandant), 200 horses, 600 cattle, 50 mules, and 6 carts. The capture of Commandant Breytenbach was entirely due to Captain Tremayne, 13th Hussars, who, better mounted than his men, pressed on alone after the Boer commander, and obliged him to surrender.

To the north of the Delagoa Railway line,

operations against the enemy have been conducted by columns under Colonel Park and Lieutenant-Colonel Urmston, who, during the latter part of the month co-operated in the vicinity of Dullstroom in a search for the members of the so-called Boer Government, who were reported to be in hiding in that neighbourhood. The two columns converged upon Dullstroom from Lydenburg and Belfast respectively, Colonel Park being attacked on the night of the columns under Lord Methuen and Colonel Keke-

19th of December when encamped at Elandspruit on his way to effect a junction with Colonel Urmston. This attack, which was delivered by a strong force under Commandants Muller, Trichardt and Krieger, was repulsed after several hours' fighting, in which 1 officer and 7 men were killed, and 5 officers and 24 non-commissioned officers and men wounded. Eight of the enemy dead and 3 dangerously wounded were left upon the ground, amongst the former being Commandant Krieger and Field Cornet Malan. Colonel Park then continued his march, arriving on the 21st of December at Dullstroom, where he established communication with Colonel Urmston's troops, who were halted at Zwartkoppies (190).

From the 21st to the 25th of December, the

two columns continued to work from Dullstroom, being engaged daily in their quest, which involved them in continual desultory skirmishes

with small bodies of the enemy.
On the 22nd of December, Lieutenant-Colonel Urmston almost succeeded in his object, as he occupied a Boer laager some miles to the north of Dullstroom, from which the Boer Government had fled in a Cape cart only a few hours pre-

The persistent prevalence of dense mists seriously impeded the work and finally caused the abandonment of further operations, and on the 26th of December the two columns returned

to the railway line at Belfast.

3. In the Northern Transvaal, to the west of the Pietersburg Railway, the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Colenbrander and Dawkins continued to act together until December 21st.

On the 11th of December they were at Zand-riverspoort (315), and on the 13th effected, in that neighbourhood, a joint capture of Commandant Badenhorst and 22 of his burghers, who, in trying to avoid Colonel Colembrander's troops, fell into the hands of Colonel Dawkins' Mounted Infantry.

On the 21st, Colonel Dawkins' column returned to the railway at Nylstroom, where it was entrained on the 26th for Harrismith to reinforce

General Rundle's command.

Colonel Colenbrander marched south after parting with Colonel Dawkins. He moved in the first instance to the Rooiberg, and thence to the neighbourhood of Jericho (190), near the Crocodile River, where 60 prisoners, with a quantity of stock, were secured. On the 22nd, he reached Haman's Kraal Station, and four days later again left the railway to operate in the vicinity of Rustenburg, where he arrived on the 1st of January. Since that date he surprised a Boer laager, located at Waterval (319), to the west of the Magaliesberg, a skilful march through Magato's Nek on the night of January 4th having enabled him to capture 29 prisoners, after an engagement at dawn in which 5 of the enemy were killed. This Officer also put in a timely appearance in the neighbourhood of Waterval on the 9th of January, where he encountered a party of Natives, under Chief Linchwe, about 2,000 strong. This party was moving down to endeavour to re-capture stock stolen from him the previous month by General Kemp. As, however, any further advance of Linchwe's would have brought him into the neighbourhood of a number of Boer women and children, with possibly deplorable results, Colonel Colenbrander directed the chief to return to the Pilaudsberg, which order he obeyed forthwith, much to the relief of the families of the enemy scattered throughout the district.

4. Between the 10th and 21st of December, the

wich operated together from Klerksdorp in the direction of Wolmaranstad.

At daybreak on the 13th of December, Lord Methuen arrived at Kareepan (137), and sighting a Boer convoy in the distance, at once started in pursuit with all available mounted troops. chase of 7 miles enabled our men to come up with the wagons which were all captured, and turned out to be the property of Field Cornet Van Rensburg's commando. On the 16th, 8 more burghers were secured, and the same night a march was undertaken to the southern slopes of the Makwassie range, near Wolmaranstad. Here General Potgieter's laager was successfully surrounded and completely surprised, the total captures made, including what had been taken with Van Rensburg's convoy, amounting to 36 prisoners, 108 wagons, 63 carts, 3,000 cattle, 250 horses, and a considerable supply of ammunition. In these operations Colonel Kekewich's columns afforded material support to Lord Methuen by marching to Korannafontein (146), where it blocked the roads to the north, and by engaging the commandoes under Commandants Vermaas and Celliers, who might otherwise have afforded assistance to the captured laager.

Both columns returned to Klerksdorp on December 21st, and on the 27th again moved out for fresh operations to the south-west of the town. From the neighbourhood of Wolmaranstad, to which he now proceeded, Lord Methuen pushed straight on towards Schweize Reneke, in pursuit of a commando which, unfortunately, had a long start of him, and was travelling westward in hot haste. He arrived at Vryburg on January 5th, having failed to overtake the object of his chase, but his effort nevertheless produced a satisfactory result, as the convoy, seeking safety by a sudden double to the south, ran straight into the column of Major Paris, who with his Kimberley troops, effected the capture of 40 wagons, and over 1,000 head of cattle.

From Wolmaranstad Colonel Kekewich turned north-east about the 29th of December, in pursuit of a detachment of Potgieter's men, and since that date has been operating in the country to the west of the Kierksdorp-Ventersdorp blockhouse line, always in constant touch with the enemy, and from time to time effecting small but useful captures.

Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie's column, the third one allotted to this district, has been employed lately in covering the extension of the new blockhouse line from Ventersdorp to Tafel Kop, which has made considerable progress during the past month. The occupation of Tafel Kop, long a favourite resort of the Boers, marks another step in the effective occupation of this

particular part of the country.

5. The operations in the Orange River Colony have been marked during the past month by a great display of enterprise and determination on the part of the followers of De Wet, who, as a result, it is said, of deliberations at a Krygsraad held on the 11th December, has considerably modified his former system of tactics. Finding that the wide dispers on of his forces into small parties scattered throughout the country has only led to a steady decrease in their numbers, owing to the constant captures effected by our mobile columns, and perceiving also that evasive or merely defensive tactics could only end in his being inextricably hemmed in by the advance of the blockhouses, he decided to concentrate his men into several larger bodies, which, while still seeking to avoid contact with any considerable force of British troops, would watch for opportunities of falling suddenly upon isolated detachments, or working parties engaged at the head

of our lines of circumvallation. This new policy on the part of the Boer leader has already produced some determined fighting, which, despite the surprise and defeat of one of our smaller mobile columns, may be welcomed, I think, as likely to ensure an earlier collapse of the enemy's power of prolonging the struggle.

In the second week of December arrangements were made for a combined movement of the division under Major-General Elliot with the columns under Colonels Rimington, Byng, Damant, and Wilson. The columns under Damant, and Wilson. The columns under Brigadier-General Broadwood, Colonel De Lisle, and Colonel Byng moved east from the vicinity of Kroonstad, by Lindley, towards Reitz; the remaining three columns under command of Colonel Rimington passing south from Frankfort to the line of Liebenberg's Vlei, which was crossed in the first instance in an easterly cirection. These dispositions gave an impression to the enemy that the six columns were about to carry out a general movement to the east, and this caused an attempt on the part of the Boers to break back again through the columns in small parties to the west. A complete countermarch of our troops was therefore undertaken on a given day, when the whole of the six columns, turning suddenly about, endea-voured to drive the enemy westwards into the angle marked by the main line of railway and the Wolvenhoek-Frankfort line of blockhouses. This movement began on the 8th December, the eastward march being maintained until 4 A.M. on the 11th, when the front was suddenly reversed, and the sweep back to the west at once commenced.

The parties of Boers who had broken back were not, however, in anything like the numbers expected, and the captures effected by the time the columns reached the railway were consequently not large. They amounted, however, in all to 43 prisoners of war, 780 horses, 3,000 cattle (including over 500 trek oxen), and 187 vehicles.

General Elliot's division was again rendezvoused at Kaalfontein, then the head of the Kroonstad-Lindley blockhouse line, by the 13th, and by the 14th Colonel Rimington had reassembled his force at Leeuwfontein, a few miles to the south of Heilbron.

Information was next received that a large concentration of Boers was taking place in the neighbourhood of Kaffir Kop, some 20 miles north-west of Bethlehem. Co-operation was therefore arranged between General Elliot's division from the vicinity of Kroonstad, General Dartnell's column from Elands River Bridge, and Colonel Barker's troops from Winburg.

General Dartnell was directed to take up a position about 6 miles south-east of Kaffir Kop by dawn on the 17th December, Colonel Barker moving simultaneously to a point about the same distance to the south-west of the same locality. General Elliot, in the meantime, was to march south in three columns, under Brigadier-General Broadwood and Colonels De Lisle and Byng, so as to eventually close in upon Kaffir Kop from the west, north-west, and north-east. This movement, though well timed, was unsuccessful, as the Boers dispersed rapidly and escaped as our troops approached, the only noticeable incident in these operations being the death of Commandant Haasbroek, a prominent Boer leader, who was killed in action with Colonel Barker's troops at Vaalbank on the 16th of the month.

tunities of falling suddenly upon isolated detachments, or working parties engaged at the head direction of Lindley, a few small captures being

effected during his return march, and on the 20th his troops again returned to Kaalfontein.

Colonel Barker returned to Winburg without opposition, but Brigadier-General Dartnell was hotly attacked during the final stage of his march back to Elands River Bridge. After leaving Bethlehem on the morning of the 18th December, the latter officer found himself opposed by a large force of Boers under De Wet, who, occupying a position along the Tygerkloof Spruit, disputed his further advance, whilst he vigorously assailed General Dartnell's flanks and rearguard. Sharp fighting was maintained throughout the day. Every successive attack was gallantly repulsed by the two regiments of Imperial Light Horse, until the approach from Bethlehem of the column under Major-General B. Campbell, who had established signalling communication with General Dartnell during the progress of the fight, finally compelled the enemy, about 3 P.M., to beat a hurried retreat in the direction of Reitz.

Though his failure against General Dartnell was thus complete, De Wet did not remain long inactive, having apparently decided to strike a sudden blow at the troops employed in covering the gradual construction of the Harrismith-Bethlehem blockhouse line. On the 24th of December, the head of this line had been pushed as far west as Tweefontein, some 9 miles west of Elands River Bridge, and a covering force lay that night a mile or two in advance of the working party. This covering force was composed of 4 squadrons of the 4th Battalion Imperial Yeomanry, 1 gun of the 79th Battery, and a pom-pom under the temporary command of Major G. A. Williams, 1st South Staffordshire Regiment.

Lieutenant-General Sir L. Rundle, with a small column, consisting of 270 of the Grenadier Guards and 66 mounted infantry of the 1st South Staffordshire Regiment, with 1 field gun, was also encamped at a point some $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the

east of the covering force.

The position held by Major Williams' troops was on the slope of a solitary kopje, the southern side of which is steep. The outpost line held this crest, and the Camp lay on the gentle slope to the north. About 2 A.M. on the morning of the 25th, an attack was delivered from the south, the Boers suddenly rushing the picquets upon the crest in overwhelming numbers. The loss of the ridge was at once followed by a rush through the Camp, when many officers and men were shot down before they had time to realize what had happened.

The casualties in this action amounted to 6 officers (including Major Williams) and 51 men

killed; 8 officers and 80 men wounded.

On hearing the firing at Major Williams' Camp, General Rundle at once sent Lieutenaut-Colonel Tudway, D.A.A.G., with his mounted infantry detachment to ascertain its cause, and summoned up the 2 regiments of Imperial Light Horse from Elands River Bridge, a distance of 14 miles. On the approach of the latter force, the Boers retired into the Langeberg, taking with them, however, the gun and pom-pom of Major Williams' force, which were both captured in their assault upon his Camp. A Court of Enquiry has been held* upon the circumstances connected with this unfortunate affair, which is not, in my opinion, satisfactorily covered by the explanations hitherto put forward. Considering the warning which this covering force had re-cently received, directing them to be on the alert, and the knowledge they possessed of De

Wet's concentration to attack General Dartnell in the neighbourhood of their post, the preparations made by them to meet any night attack by the enemy seem, as far as I can judge at present, to have been most defective.

On receipt of the news of this successful attack by the enemy, I arranged to reinforce General Rundle by the 1st Black Watch and 4th King's Royal Rifles, then landing from India and England respectively at Durban, and despatched Lieutenant-Colonel Dawkins' column from the Northern Transvaal to Harrismith. Since the arrival of these reinforcements no further attempts have been made to molest the troops engaged upon the construction of the blockhouse line, which is now being pushed on in the direction of Bethlehem.

Another very determined attack was also made upon Lieutenant-Colonel Damant's column, in the vicinity of Tafel Kop, between Frankfort and Vrede.

On the evening of the 19th of December, this column, together with Colonel Rimington's troops, who had also moved from Heilbron to Frankfort, marched from the latter town towards Tafel Kop to cover the extension of the blockhouse line in that direction. They moved throughout the night by two parallel roads, some three miles apart, and to the north of the proposed line of blockhouses, and, after circling round Tafel Kop, were at daybreak in the vicinity of Bacchante Farm. Here a resolute attack was suddenly made by some 800 Boers under General Wessels, upon Colonel Damant's advanced guard, who were deceived by the khaki disguise of the enemy, and their clever imitation of the formation usual with regular mounted troops. To complete the deception, the enemy even fired volleys, as they approached Colonel Damant's men, in the general direction of some Boers who were escaping across the front of the two forces. This clever ruse enabled them to get sufficiently close to Colonel Damant's troops to anticipate them by a few yards in the occupation of the crest of a kopje which commanded the whole field, including the guns and the main body of our troops.

Lieutenant-Colonel Damant's men displayed

the utmost gallantry, holding on to their inferior position so as to save the two guns which accompanied the advanced guard, and every officer and man, except four, of the leading troops was shot down before reinforcements, which were pushed forward from the main body and Colonel Rimington's column directly firing commenced, could

arrive upon the scene.

The appearance of these reinforcements compelled the Boers to relinquish their attack, and they fled over the Wilge River, pursued for some

miles by Colonel Rimington's troops.

Since the date of this affair the troops of Colonels Rimington and Damant have continued to operate in the neighbourhood of Tafel Kop, where I am reinforcing them by two of the newly-formed battalions of Royal Artillery Mounted Rifles, and by the Canadian Scouts under Major Ross. The 2nd Battalion Essex Regiment, which has just landed from India, has also been placed at the disposal of Brigadier-General E. O. Hamilton, for duty on the blockhouse line to the east of

On the 22nd December, Major-General Elliot's division, now organized into two columns under Lieutenant-Colonel De Lisle and Major Fanshawe. moved out once more to Quaggafontein Hill, to the north of Lindley, where it was joined by the column under Lieutenant-Colonel Hon. J. Byng.

At Quaggafontein, General Elliot heard that De Wet, who moved north after his attack upon Major Williams' camp, was at Reitz, so, leaving

Lieutenant-Colonel Byng to cover the head of the blockhouse line, then approaching Lindley, he set out on the 27th with his division to endeavour to gain touch with the Boer forces. On the 28th, Liebenberg's Vlei was reached at Fanny's Home, where the enemy were found in position, apparently barring General Elliot's further advance upon Reitz. As a matter of fact. General Elliot was only in presence of a rearguard, which was masking a withdrawal of his force by De Wet from east to west of the Vlei, some ten miles further to the north, and in an opposite direction to General Elliot's line of advance.

Having effected a passage of the river and brushed aside the Boers in front of him, General Elliot pushed on into Reitz, which he found to be deserted, but where he ascertained the true direction of De Wet's retreat. The pursuit, undertaken at once, was, however, practically ineffective, although a few prisoners and a certain amount of stock was captured. But the approach of darkness soon enabled the Boers, under cover of a rearguard engagement, to withdraw out of reach, and to disperse once more aver the spacious yeldt.

To give an idea of the distances now covered by some of our columns, it may be stated that General Elliot's column made the following marches during the foregoing period, viz.:—

On December 29th.—Marched 70 miles in close pursuit of De Wet.
On December 31st.—20 miles.

On January 4th .—60 miles,

these marches being all in the same week.
6. At the date of my last Despatch, the columns under Major-General C. Knox and Colonel Rochefort were still in occupation of the south-eastern district of Orange River Colony, where they remained, continuing their clearing operations until the 19th December. It then became necessary to detach Colonel Rochfort's troops, under Lieu'enant-Colonels Western and Du Moulin and Major Driscoll, to the west of the railway in pursuit of straggling bands of the enemy, who had been forced by the pressure of pursuit to escape from the country occupied by our troops. Lieutenant-Colonel A. C. Hamilton's column had already been sent to the Philippolis district earlier in the month, with the same object.

With the remainder of the force hitherto employed in the area east of the railway, General C. Knox completed his work of clearance, making a systematic advance in conclusion from the Caledon River up to the Thabanchu-Ladybrand line. This he crossed, and he is now operating to the north of it, undertaking, in conjunction with Colonel Barker's troops from Winberg, a thorough clearance of the adjoining districts on similar lines to those which have proved so suc-

cessful to the south.

North of the line of the Modder River, Lieutenant-Colonel Sitwell (who has succeeded to the command of Colonel Henry's column) has operated in support of the South African Constabulary against the bands of Boers who still frequent the country between Boshof and Brandfort. Latterly, Colonel Sitwell has been employed in escorting convoys of supplies to the posts lying to the west of the Kimberley line.

Very excellent work has been done in this north-western portion of the Orange River Colony by Major Pack Beresford, of the South African Constabulary. At the end of December this officer conducted a well-managed raid upon Bothaville, which led to the capture of 36 prisoners, 80 horses and 29 vehicles, and on the 4th of January he followed up this success by

taking Field Cornet Theron's laager, near the junction of the Vet and Zand rivers. Upon this occasion Major Pack Beresford secured 35 prisoners (including Field Cornet Le Roux), 70 horses, 30 rifles, and the whole of the enemy's transport.

7. During the past month the contemplated blockhouse line from Botha's Pass to Vrede has made very substantial progress under the direction of Brigadier-General Bullock, who has had at his disposal Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt's column as a covering force, and the first York and Lancaster Regiment as a working party and garrison for the blockhouses. This line, in a tew days, will be connected with the Frankfort-Tafel Kop-Vrede line, which is also being rapidly pushed on by Brigadier-General E. O. Hamilton.

On the north-eastern frontier of Natal, the small column under Lieutenant-Colonel Chapman has continued to operate on the Zululand border against parties of the local Boers in the extreme

south of the Vryheid District.

8. In the north-eastern portion of Cape Colony the situation has not materially changed, though constant pursuit by the columns under Colonels Monro and Scobell, supplemented by some useful work by Lovat's Scouts, has completely disorganized and broken up the tands under Fouché and Myburg, whose followers continue to lead a life of brigandage in the hills about Dordrecht, Jamestown, and Lady Grey. A considerable number of these rebels have been killed and wounded during the past month, and their power for mischief is being steadily reduced from day to day.

The capture of Commandant Kritzinger has been a notable incident of December. On the night of the 16th December he was returning from the north of the Orange River with an escort of 100 men to resume direction of the commandoes in Cape Colony. Near Hanover Road he came in contact with the blockhouses held by the Grenadier Guards on the Naauwpoor: De Aar line of railway. The bulk of the escort were successful in effecting a crossing to the south, but Commandant Kritzinger (himself dangerously wounded), 12 of his men (also wounded), and 100 horses were left behind to be captured by our patrols.

Lieutenant-Colonel B. Doran and Major Lord W. Cavendish Bentinck, with small columns, were at once sent in pursuit of the remainder of Kritzinger's followers, who made their way into Aberdeen District closely followed by our troops

In the western portion of Cape Colony, operations have been steadily maintained against the numerous bands of rebels in this wide area. With a view to curtailing the freedom of movement which the latter now enjoy, a line of blockhouses has been commenced which will ultimately run from Lambert's Bay, by Calvinia to Victoria West, a distance of over 200 miles. This is a formidable undertaking, necessarily involving much labour, but, owing to the nature of the country and its inhabitants, it seems to me to offer the only reliable method of dealing with a very difficult situation.

On the 9th of December, Lieutenant-Colonel W. Doran, whilst moving in the direction of Fontelb: schkolk, was successful in surprising the Sutherland rebels under Nesser near Brandwagt, 30 miles east-north-east of Calvinia, where

1 Boer was killed and 8 captured.

On the approach of Colonel Doran the enemy in the neighbourhood of Tontelboschkolk broke up into a number of small parties, and moved south into the Clauwilliam District, with the intention of re-assembling for an attack upon the next

convoy which might leave Clanwilliam for Calvinia.

This convoy, which happened to be escorted by the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Crabbe and Wyndham, was attacked, as arranged, at dawn on the 22nd of December when about 40 miles north-east of Clanwilliam. Its assailants, who were in considerable force, tried to close with the rearguard, but were easily repulsed. Another attempt to stop the march of the convoy was made on the following day, when the enemy took up a strong position along a high ridge astride the road, and commanding the line of advance. From this position, a previously prepared one, the enemy were driven back by the 16th Lancers, who rushed the entrenchments with a great deal of dash. The enemy, who were much in need of supplies, are reported to be disheartened at the result of these engagements. They broke up at once into small parties, and disappeared, leaving the convoy to make its return journey unopposed.

Since the date of my last Despatch, the command of the Cape Colony District has been assumed by Major-General Sir H. H. Settle, in succession to Major-General A. S. Wynne, who has proceeded to the United Kingdom.
