

portion of the churchyard which existed prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, except as follows:—

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.

BOSHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Holy Trinity, Bosham, in the county of West Sussex, and in the churchyard after the thirtieth of September, one thousand nine hundred and two, except as follows:—

(a.) In a walled grave now existing in the said church and belonging to Mr. B. Cheesman, the burial may be allowed of one member of his family subject to the condition that as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of the coffin therein the said grave shall be completely filled up with concrete.

(b.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(c.) In the said churchyard in a grave space belonging to Mr. Spicer in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of the family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of April next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representations one month before the said twenty-eighth day of April.

THE following Statute, made on the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, by the Governing Body of Wadham College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTE to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877," 40 and 41 Vict., cap. 48, and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to Wadham College, in the University of Oxford, in the matter of the fund or funds chargeable with the payment of part of any pension

assigned by the Visitor to the Warden on his vacating the Wardenship owing to permanent incapacity to perform the duties of his office, such amending Statute being duly made at a General Meeting of the Warden and Fellows of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of two-thirds of those present and voting.

For Statute II, clause 11, to substitute the following clause:—

"Any pension assigned to a retired Warden, under the last preceding clause, shall be provided for and paid as follows; that is to say, three fifth parts thereof shall be charged upon and deducted from the stipend of his successor in the office of Warden; and two fifth parts shall be charged, as the Warden and Fellows shall determine, either upon the General Revenues of the College, or upon the Pension Fund hereinafter established, or partly upon the one and partly upon the other."
