COUNTY BOROUGH OF SALFORD. Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.

Bye-laws as to Seamen's Lodging-houses. THEREAS, by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted as follows:-

Section 214.

(1.) A local authority hereinafter mentioned whose district includes a scaport may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make Bye laws relating to seamen's lodging-houses in their district, and those Bye-laws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein.

(2.) The Bye-laws shall, amongst other things,

provide

For the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging-houses;

For the publication of the fact of a house being licensed;

For the due execution of the Bye-laws;

For preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution.

For the prevention of persons not duly liceused holding themselves out as keeping or purporting

to keep licensed houses; and

For the exclusion from licensed houses of per-

sons of improper character;

And shall impose sufficient fines not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of any Bye-law.

WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Council of the County Borough of Salford (being the Local Authority), held on the 4th day of December, 1901, the following Bye-laws were made, and the same were on the 26th day of February, 1902, approved by the Board of Trade.

Now we, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the county borough of Salford, do hereby under or by virtue of section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of every other power them hereunto enabling, make and publish the following Bye-laws, that is to say:

Interpretation of terms.

1. In the construction of the following Byelaws, unless the context otherwise requires, the licence shall be noted in such register.

following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—
"The Council" means the Council of the county

borough of Salford. "The Borough" means the said county

borough.

"Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who, within four weeks immediately preceding the date of any transaction or occur-rence within the scope of these Bye-laws, has been employed in any capacity whatsoever on board a ship, whether British or foreign, but shall not include a person engaged upon a fishing boat or trawl boat.

"Licence" means a licence granted or which may be granted by the Council in pursuance of these Bye-laws to a person authorizing him to keep the house specified therein as a seamen's

lodging-house.

"Licensed keeper" means a person to whom a licence has been granted in pursuance of these

Bye-laws.

"Keeper" means and includes both a licensed keeper, and a person who keeps a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged, to whom a licence has not been granted

in pursuance of these Bye-laws.
"Licensed house" means a seamen's lodging-house, in respect of which a licence has been

granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.
"House" means and includes both a licensed house and a seamen's lodging-house, or a house in which seamen are lodged, in respect of which a licence has not been granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.

Application for Licence.

2. A person who shall apply to the Council for a licence shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.

Register of Licences.

3. The Council shall cause a register to be kept of all licences granted under these Byelaws, and the suspension or revocation of any

" Penalty for False Statement.

4. A person who, not being entered in the Council's register as a licensed keeper, shall himself or by meams of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and to a further penalty of £10 for every day during which he shall continue to do so, after conviction for so doing.

Inspection and Approval before Licensing.

5. A licence shall not be granted in respect of a house, or part of a house, until it has been inspected and approved as fit for the purpose of a licensed house by the Medical Officer of Health of the borough, and any person who applies for a licence shall produce to the Council evidence to its satisfaction of his fitness to be licensed.

Licences not to be Transferred or Lent.

6. A licensed keeper shall not transfer or lend a licence to any other person.

Licence may be Conditional.

7. A licence shall be subject to such conditions specified therein, or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the Laws, Bye-laws, or regulations for the time being in force in the borough, as the Council sees fit, and a licensed keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house, shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe, such conditions.

Licence to be Annual.

8. A licence shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these Bye-laws provided) for one year from 1st January. The Council may, at its discretion, refuse to renew any licence.

Public-houses or Beer-houses not to be Licensed.

9. A house, or part of a house, which is in connection with any public-house or beer-house, shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodging-house.

Certain Persons not to be Licensed.

10. A licence shall not be granted to a person who holds a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor, or who is engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall a licence be granted in respect of any house, or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold, nor in respect of any house or part of a house occupied or used for the purpose of the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall any licensed keeper sell, or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor be engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer.

Notice to be Affixed to Licensed House.

11. A licensed keeper shall affix, and keep undefaced and legible a notice, with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house" in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the full name and address of the licensed keeper.

Access to Seamen's Lodging-house and to Register of Lodgers.

12. A keeper, and any person employed in a house shall, at all times by day or night, when required by an officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them, or any of them, free access to all parts of such house, and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.

Number of Lodgers.

- 13. A keeper shall not at any time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house, or permit to sleep in any room therein, any greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the Town Clerk of the borough. Such certificate shall state the total number of lodgers allowed to sleep in each room of such house, as well as the total number such house may receive, and shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper; and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.
- 14. A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room a ticket signed by the Town Clerk of the borough, stating the number of lodgers allowed to sleep in such room.
- 15. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall not at any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated, any such letters or figures.
- 16. Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received in a house or in any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 400 cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that purpose.
- 17. Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received in any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect, under the hand of the Town Clerk of the borough, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in such notice.

Sleeping Apartments.

18. A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for uso as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room which does not comply with the provisions of the Public Health Acts, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

Ventilation.

- 19. A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in or in connection with any room or passage in a house, and in or in connection with any water-closet belonging to a house to be maintained at all times in good order.
- 20. A keeper shall cause the windows of every room and of the passages and water-closets in a house to be fully kept open for such time on each day as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. in winter, and 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. in summer.

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this Bye-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or of other sufficient cause.

Cleansing.

21. A keeper shall, in the first week in the month of April, and, if required in writing by the

Medical Officer of Health of the borough, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a honse to be cleansed, and shall, at the same time, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase, and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and lime-washed or distempered. Provided that if any such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to tender the lime-washing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this Bye-law shall be deemed to be satisfied, so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed, and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.

22. A keeper shall, as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all the rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily, before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

23. A keeper shall cause all bed-clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed-clothes, bedding, and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome condition, and free from vermin.

Chamber Utensils and Washing Basins.

24. A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be provided a sufficient number of chamber utensils, and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles, and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

Removal of Refuse.

25. A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in a house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be thoroughly cleansed.

Infectious Disease.

26. In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being attacked by any infectious disorder, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation of the same to the Medical Officer

of Health of the borough.

- 27. A keeper, immediately after being informed or having ascertained that any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, is ill of any infectious disease, shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance on such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate.
- (a.) Where in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such inmate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such

keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all such precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the Medical Officer of Health of the borough, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

- (b.) Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house, or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorized to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the Medical Officer of Health of the borough, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the case may require.
- (c.) Such keeper shall, immediately after the death, removal, or recovery of an inmate who may have been ill of any infectious disease, give written notice thereof to the Medical Officer of Health of the borough.
- (d.) When a registered medical practitioner has certified that any inmate of a house is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and can be safely removed to hospital, such inmate shall not obstruct the sanitary authority in effecting his removal to any hospital or infirmary with the consent of the authorities thereof.
- (e.) When the Medical Officer of Health of the borough certifies that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection, or the destruction of such articles would tend to prevent or check any dangerous infectious disease, such keeper shall give the sanitary authorities such facilities as may be necessary to enable such authority to carry out such works of cleansing, disinfection, or destruction as such Medical Officer of Health may deem to be necessary.
- (f.) Unless and until by such cleansing and disinfection the necessary precautions for preventing the spread of disease shall have been duly taken, such keeper shall not cause or suffer any other lodger to be received into the room or rooms which, in the case hereinbefore specified, may have been exposed to infection.

Water-closets.

28. A keeper shall provide, in a suitable and convenient situation for the use of lodgers, properly constructed water-closets, in the proportion of one such water-closet for every twelve lodgers; and shall cause such water-closets and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

Maintenance of Premises.

- 29. A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all times in good order.
- 30. A keeper shall cause the yard, area, forecourt, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean, and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

No Female Lodgers.

31. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

Exclusion of Persons of Improper Character.

32. A licensed keeper and every person employed in a licensed house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any other person of improper character.

Register of Lodgers, &c.

33. A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

Scale of Charges.

34. A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these Bye-laws in a suitable and conspicuous position in the common sittingroom of a house, in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging, and necessaries, made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

Licence may be suspended or revoked.

35. Upon the Council being satisfied that any licensed keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping, or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these Bye-laws or any of them, the Council may suspend or revoke all licences granted to such keeper.

Officers not to be obstructed.

36. No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of these Bye-laws.


Penalty.

37. Every person offending against any of the foregoing Bye-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a penalty of £5 for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first
