SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREAS.

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Swine Fever* under the above-mentioned Acts:—

Berkshire and Hampshire.—An Area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Wantage, Ilsley, Lambourn, Newbury (including the detached part thereof), Reading and Wokingham, the parishes of East Shefford and West Shefford, and the borough of Wokingham, in the administrative county of Berks; the petty sessional divisions of Kingsclere, Basingstoke, and Qdham, and the borough of Basingstoke, in the administrative county of Southampton; and also comprising the boroughs of Newbury and Reading (12 February, 1902).

Buckinghamshire.—An Area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Stoke and Burnham, and the parishes of Hughenden, West Wycombe,

Chipping Wycombe Rural, Little Marlow, Wooburn, and Hedsor, in the administrative county of Buckingham; and also comprising the borough of Chipping Wycombe (6 September, 1900).

Cambridgeshire.—An area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Bottisham and Cambridge, in the administrative county of Cambridge; and also comprising the borough of Cambridge (12 February, 1902).

Essex.—(1.) An Area comprising the petty sessional division of Rochford, and the parishes of Downham, Ramsden Bellhouse, Ramsden Crays, Great Burstead, Little Burstead, Laindon, Lee Chapel, Basildon, Vange, Novendon, Wickford, North Benfleet, Pitsea, and Bowers Gifford; in the administrative county of Essex; and also comprising the borough of Southend-on-Sea (2 November, 1901).
