NOTICE is hereby given, that His Majesty The King will hold a Levée at St. James's Palace on Monday, the 21st of April, and on Monday, the 12th of May next, at *twelve o'clock noon*, and that for these and all future Levées Cards of Admission will be required, as the numbers at each of these Ceremonies must be limited.

The following are the rules to be observed :—

ATTENDANCES AND PRESENTATIONS.

1. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

2. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Army, Militia, Yeomanry, or Volunteers, of whatever rank, except those on the Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Adjutant-General at the War Office, stating clearly whether they desire to attend or to be presented; if the latter, stating by whom and on what occasion. Deputy Lieutenants of Counties will also communicate and obtain their cards from the War Office.

3. Officers of the Household Cavalry and Foot Guards on the active list will make application to the Lord Chamberlain at St. James's Palace for cards of admission and presentation. All retired Officers of the Household Cavalry and Brigade of Guards will apply to the War Office.

4. All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and of the Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

5. All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall.

6. Similarly, all Gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office, the Home Office, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament or any Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation at Levées from the Department under which they serve.

7. Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, are requested to make their applications through the Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

8. Peers, Bishops, Lords Lieutenant of Counties, Members of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all Gentlemen other than the above mentioned, will be good enough to communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James's Palace, when they will each be furnished with a card of admission for use at the Levée.

The names both for attendance and presentation must be received at the various Offices above indicated not later than eight days prior to the date of each Levée.

THE following Despatch has been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa:—
From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-Quarters, South Africa.

SIR, Pretoria, 16th March, 1902.

I have the honour to forward herewith Lieutenant-General Lord Methuen's report on the engagement which took place on the 7th instant, between Tweebosch (247) and Leeuwkuil (23) in the Lichtenburg District.

From Lieutenant-General Lord Methuen to the Chief of Staff.

SIR, Klerksdorp, 13th March, 1902.

I have the honour to inform you that, with the object of preventing the force under General Delarey from moving northwards to the Marico District through the gap between Lichtenburg and Mafeking, I sent orders to Colonel Kekewich, C.B., at Wolmaranstad, to send a column towards Rooirantjesfontein where he would meet a column under Major Paris, Royal Marine Artillery, from Vryburg.

I, at the same time, directed Colonel Rochfort to cross the Vaal from Orange River Colony, and to move northwards by the Bamboo Spruit, or the Harts River, and thus drive General Delarey towards the columns which were heading for Rooirantjesfontein.

2. Colonel Kekewich informed me, on 2nd March, that he was sending a column, consisting of 1,600 mounted men, lightly equipped; while Colonel Rochfort wired that the command would contain about 1,000 mounted men.

3. The column under Major Paris, which I accompanied, consisted of the following units:—
5th Battalion Imperial Yeomanry, 184 men under Captain Jennings.

Cape Police (including Special Police), 233 men under Major Berangé.

Cullinan's Horse, 64 men under Captain Cullinan.

British South African Police, 24 men attached to Cullinan's Horse.

4th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, 1 section under Lieutenant Venning, D.S.O.

1 pom-pom, "GG" Section, under Captain Geoghegan, Royal Field Artillery.

These units did not belong to Major Paris' column, but were an addition, placed under his command.

Major Paris' column before the fresh units were placed under his command at Vryburg:—

86th Company Imperial Yeomanry, 110 men.

Diamond Fields Horse, 92 men.

Dennison's Scouts, 58 men under Captain Browne.

Ashburner's Light Horse, 126 men under Captain Ashburner.

38th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, 1 section under Lieutenant Nesham.

1 pom-pom, "D," Field Artillery.

1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers, 200 men under Captain Montagu.

1st Battalion Loyal North Lancashire Regiment, 100 men under Lieutenant Paul.

The Infantry were attached to the columns at Vryburg.

4. My written instructions to Major Paris were that I should give him daily the direction of the march, and the time of starting for the following day; in case of any fighting, that he should look

after the Mounted Brigade, and that I would stand by the guns and Infantry, and give him general instructions.

The mounted troops were the best horsed force that I have yet had under me, added to which the Cape Police, under Major Berangé, held an exceptionally high reputation, as did also the local corps. I remarked to Major Paris on leaving Vryburg, that I could not believe in the numbers given to me. He again made enquiries, and satisfied himself that the numbers were correct.

5. I informed Colonel Kekewich, by wire, that I should reach Rooirantjesfontein on 7th March.

6. 2nd March.—The column under Major Paris left Vryburg at 5 A.M.; the Supply Column, consisting of 39 ox wagons, and the baggage of 46 mule wagons; owing to heavy rains which had fallen during the night the last wagon did not reach O'Reiley's Pan, a distance of 13 miles, till 5 P.M. I therefore at once sent a message to Colonel Kekewich to inform him that I should be one or perhaps two days late at Rooirantjesfontein. I had previously informed him that the position of the enemy had rendered it necessary for Major Paris' column to bear more to the north-west towards Polfontein (254).

7. 3rd March.—Owing to the animals being exhausted by the previous day's trek, the column was only able to reach Grootpan (Bestersfarm), a distance of six miles. During the march the Police, forming the advance guard under Major Berangé, killed three local rebel Boers, by name Steyn, Bester, and "Janson."

8. 4th March.—At Grootpan I heard that large droves of cattle and Van Zyl's (rebel) commando had moved eastwards towards Doornbult (197). That morning Major Paris' column marched to Graspan, two miles beyond Mooiplatz (244 B), a distance of 13 miles, where there was plenty of water. As there had been no rain in these parts it was very doubtful whether, if I trekked by Klipdrift (188), as I had told Colonel Kekewich I intended to do, I should find water at Vaalkop (183), or Rietvlei (279).

9. 5th March.—I therefore moved to Boschpan (68) in the morning, which I found all but dry, and in the afternoon to Barberspan, a distance of 21 miles, where there was plenty of water. Here I was informed that there had been rain at Leeuwkuil (95), and that there certainly was water at Leeuwkuil (23).

10. 6th March.—The column moved off at 5 A.M., the ox convoy having moved at 4 A.M. The whole force reached Leeuwspruit (232) about 7.30 A.M. Here I sent on a detachment of Cape Police to Leeuwkuil (95) to make certain of the existence of water.

There had been some sniping at the rear guard by about 100 of Van Zyl's commando, and seeing some confusion, I went back myself, sending at the same time for the section of the 38th Battery.

I found the men forming the rear screen, which consisted of the 86th Company Imperial Yeomanry, very much out of hand, and lacking both fire discipline and knowledge of how to act. There seemed to be a want of instructed officers and non-commissioned officers. Van Zyl's commando being accurately shelled by the section Royal Artillery, eventually retired and moved round our right flank to Tweebosch (247), while the column halted at Leeuwspruit (232).

On receiving information, that there was no water at Leeuwkuil (95), I decided to move to Tweebosch (247), where Van Zyl's commando had taken up a good position in the bed of the Klein Hart's river.

Major Berangé with the Police, the section 4th Battery, and the Pompom "GG" Section, were ordered to move straight on Tweebosch (247), while Dennison's Scouts, supported by Cullinan's Horse, were to move round the enemy's left flank.

The commando retired rapidly, the police under Major Berangé working with the greatest quickness.

Much praise is due to Major Berangé for the way in which he handled his men.

Our casualties were one killed and two wounded.

As the day was hot and it was then 11.30 A.M. I decided to remain at Tweebosch (247).

11. 7th March.—At 3 A.M. the ox convoy moved off towards Leeuwkuil (23) with an escort of—

1 squadron Cape Police.

86th Company Imperial Yeomanry.

200 men 1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers.

100 men 1st Battalion Loyal North Lancashire Regiment.

1 section 4th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

1 pompom, "GG" Section.

The whole was under command of Captain Montagu, 1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers.

The main column moved off at 4 A.M., as follows:—

Advance guard:—

1 squadron Cape Police.

Ashburner's Light Horse.

1 pompom, Diamond Fields Artillery.

Main body—

Cullinan's Horse.

British South Africa Police.

Detachment 5th Regiment, Imperial Yeomanry.

1 section 38th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

Rear guard—

Diamond Fields Horse.

Dennison's Scouts.

Thinking there was a likelihood of an attack in rear, I had called Major Paris' attention to the necessity of putting thoroughly reliable troops in the rear guard.

The country through which we passed was flat and without brush.

At daybreak (about 5 A.M.) a heavy fire was opened on the rear guard. The fire was so intense that the rear screen was at once reinforced by the section of the 38th Battery, and one pompom, Diamond Fields Artillery. A portion of Ashburner's Light Horse, and the detachment of the 5th Imperial Yeomanry, were extended on either flank, round which the enemy seemed intent on galloping.

At this time (5.30 A.M.) the ox convoy was about a mile in front of the baggage, which was moving in four lines well closed up. I therefore ordered the ox convoy to halt, and the baggage to join it. Major Berangé was directed to move, with the police that were with him, towards a fresh body of the enemy, who now appeared on our right rear. The time was about 6 A.M.

I joined the ox convoy about this time, and found Captain Tilney, D.A.A.G., assisting Captain Montagu, 1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers, Commanding the Infantry, to extend the men to meet the attack on our right flank.

The section 4th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, and the pompom "GG" Section, had already taken up a position to meet this attack.

I could see no mounted men available, and could only assume that they had all gone to reinforce the rear screen, so I ordered the baggage to continue to advance, it being im-

possible to move the ox convoy as the native drivers were lying under the wagons and refused to move.

I would here like to draw attention to the orderly manner and complete control exercised by Lieutenant Hartley, Transport Officer to Major Paris' column, over the mule wagons during the fight.

The Boers, attacking the rear guard, had come on with great determination right amongst the rear screen, but the support to the screen having been reinforced by Ashburner's Light Horse, Cullinan's Horse, and some of the 5th Imperial Yeomanry, held them in check till about 6.30 A.M. A heavy attack then developed on our rear and right flank, which caused, as far as I could see, all mounted troops then in rear (some of them which had originally been there had moved off towards the flanks to meet threatened attacks) to break, and they galloped in complete confusion past our left flank. The section 38th Battery was thus left unprotected, but continued in action until every man, with the exception of Lieutenant Nesham, was hit. I am informed that this Officer was called upon to surrender, and on refusing to do so was killed.

The attack on our right flank was pressed home to within 600 yards of the gun of the 4th Battery.

I then gave orders for a kraal about one mile along the road to Leeuwkuil to be occupied, and sent orders to rally the mounted men on the rising ground beyond the kraal. The kraal was occupied by Major Paris and Major Berangé with some 40 men. The mounted troops in the meantime continued their retirement. I remained with the guns, 4th Battery, and Infantry until my horse was killed, and my thigh fractured by a bullet.

They held out in a most splendid manner until about 9.30 A.M., when all the men round the guns had been shot down, and Lieutenant Venning, commanding the section, had been killed. In the meantime, the two guns and a pompom with Commandant Cellier's commando had rendered the kraal untenable, when the men at the kraal and those remaining with the baggage surrendered.

The Boer Commandants present were—Delarey, Vermaas, Cellier, Kemp, Van Zyl, D. Botha, and Lemmer. It is difficult to estimate the number of Boers on the field, but I should say about 1,500. General Delarey treated myself and the prisoners with the greatest kindness, and left General Cellier to look after our wounded on the ground; they buried 11 of their own men at Kareelaagte, and, from what I can learn, their losses were heavy.

12. I beg to draw attention to the good work done by Major Paris in endeavouring to keep the mounted troops in hand, and to the promptitude with which Captain Tilney, 17th Lancers, D.A.A.G., assisted in placing the Infantry round the convoy.

I would also call attention to the gallant manner in which Lieutenants Nesham and Venning, Royal Field Artillery, stuck to their guns.

Captain Montagu, Commanding detachment, 1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers, and Lieutenant Paul, Commanding detachment, 1st Battalion Loyal North Lancashire Regiment, held on until further resistance was impossible. Civil Surgeon Prentice with the rear guard, and Captain Thurston, Royal Army Medical Corps, with the guns, continued bandaging the wounded throughout the engagement.

Colonel Townsend, C.B., my Principal Medical Officer, remained in the fighting line until he had

received three wounds: he has, from the commencement of the campaign, always acted most gallantly.

Captain Fernyhough did good work with the rear guard during the action. He has been of very great value to me ever since he has served under me.

A large number of the Boers were dressed in khaki, many of them wearing the chevrons of non-commissioned officers. This, in several instances, led to misapprehension by our troops, and to losses by death, wounds, and capture among us. Owing to having been wounded and taken prisoner, I am unable to give any list of casualties. This report is, for the same reason, based solely on what came under my own observation, and what I have been able to gather from the few officers with whom I have had the opportunity of speaking on the subject.

It may be that I have omitted to bring to notice some who distinguished themselves during the action, and that Major Paris can supply this deficiency.

And for the better enabling you Our said Commissioners to make the said inquiry, We do by these presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to call before you, or any three or more of you, such persons as you may judge necessary, by whom you may be the better informed of the matters herein submitted for your consideration, and every matter connected therewith; and also to call for, have access to, and examine, all such books, documents, papers, or records as you shall judge likely to afford you the fullest information on the subject of this Our Commission; and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do further by these presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem expedient for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you, or any three or more of you, do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us under your hands and seals upon the matters referred to you as aforesaid, and that you may have power to proceed to Us, from time to time, your several proceedings in respect of the matters aforesaid, if it may seem expedient to you so to do.

And We further will and command, and by these presents ordain, that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And for your assistance in the execution of these presents, We do hereby nominate and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Robert Barclay Pearson, Esquire, Advocate, to be Secretary to this Our Commission.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated March 24, from His Majesty's Representative at Odessa, enclosing the following new Quarantine Rules for the Russian Black Sea Coast, dated January 5, 1902, now come into force:—

INSTRUCTIONS of January 5th, 1902, issued by the Committee for the Prevention of Plague to the Medical and Quarantine Stations of the Black Sea.

(1.) Ships coming from abroad are divided into two categories: (a) ships coming from a port free from plague, cholera, and yellow fever; (b) ships coming from a port where a case of one of the above-mentioned diseases exists, or whose passengers, crew, and cargo came from such a port.

(2.) Ships under category (a), after the usual inspection, will be granted free pratique in any port where a medical and quarantine station exist, or where doctors have been especially appointed to examine into the sanitary state of the ships.

Remark 1. Ships that had cleared from ports not infected with cholera and plague, if they have a ship's doctor on board, can enter any port where there is a custom-house but no quarantine doctors, and will be granted pratique upon delivery of a certificate of health from the ship's doctor.

Remark 2. Where no custom-house exists the coast guard will take the necessary precautions when foreign ships enter. (See supplement to instructions.)

(3.) All answers made to the doctors by the captain are written down on a printed form, and they are then verified by perusal of ship's papers and by questioning the doctor, if one exists.

(4.) These questions are put on board ship, but the doctors before boarding the ship ask whether any dangerous illnesses exist on board.

(5.) After the questions the ship and crew are examined. In the case of passengers, medical examination is only made when the place whence passenger came is under suspicion, or where the passenger is himself in bad health.

(6.) Ships on which cholera, plague, and yellow fever exist, come under regulations of paragraph 15.

(7.) If a ship contains one or two passengers who originally came from a port where cases of plague, cholera, or yellow fever exist, but who, on leaving that port, were subjected to medical examination, pratique will be granted to the ship, upon disinfecting luggage, &c., of these passengers. If the passenger has not been previously examined, he will, on landing, be treated in accordance with rules of paragraph 19.

(8.) Reasons for considering the sanitary conditions of the ship as bad are:—

(1) Overcrowding, (2) collection of rags, unwashed wearing apparel and bedclothes, animal droppings and other rubbish, (3) unsatisfactory quality of drinking water.

On such ships, pratique will only be granted upon the removal of those deficiencies noticed by the doctors, though passengers who are in a healthy condition will not be detained.

(9.) Where a ship possesses a doctor, pratique will, after the usual questions, be granted, without inspection, upon the assurance of the doctor that no illness of a suspicious nature exists on board ship.

(10.) Where the results of the questions or inspection are satisfactory, a certificate will be granted signed by the quarantine doctor, with the official seal. Having received this certificate the vessel can claim pratique, not only where it lies, but in all other Russian ports.

(11.) Ships coming from a port where plague or cholera exists, before entering a Russian port must first proceed to a Naval Medical Station of the first class. The only exception to this is in the case of regular passenger steamers carrying a doctor and complete disinfecting apparatus: such ships can enter any port where sanitary stations exist, and they will be granted pratique (1) upon the receipt by the authorities of a certificate from the ship's doctor that no plague or cholera exists and that everything has been disinfected, and (2) upon a favourable medical inspection.

(12.) Ships coming from an infected port are classed, without regard to their bill of health, as—

(1.) Favourable—where no cases of cholera or plague have broken out from departure to arrival in port.

(2.) Suspicious—where cholera or plague existed at the commencement and during the voyage, but in which no fresh case has broken out within the last 7 and 12 days respectively.

(3.) Infected—where cases of cholera and plague exist or where cases of cholera and plague have broken out within the last 7 and 12 days respectively.

(13.) Vessels classed as favourable will be dealt with as following:—

(1.) Medical inspection of crew and passengers.

- (2.) Disinfection of dirty clothes, &c., &c., and the effects of passengers and crew.
- (3.) Removal of water from the hold after disinfection, and substitution of water of good quality.

(4.) If certain goods (the import of which is forbidden from ports where cholera and plague exist) are on board and have come from such places, other goods which have come from healthy ports can be subjected to disinfection should the doctors consider it necessary.

(5.) Crew and passengers are subjected to an inspection by ship's doctor as to the state of their health for five days after leaving a port infected with cholera and for ten days in the case of plague.

Members of the crew during this period are only allowed to land for service purposes.

When the inspection of the ship has been favourable and the measures stated in clauses 2, 3, and 4 of this section have been carried out, the ship will be allowed to leave the medical station and proceed to her destination. Mention will be made on the certificate (paragraph 10) of the measures taken.

Passengers wishing to land at the medical station may do so after disinfection, but in such cases the sanitary regulations of paragraph 19 will come into force.

(14.) For ships classed as "suspicious," besides the above-mentioned measures for favourable ships, the following are added:—

(1.) Disinfection of every part of the ship where cholera or plague patients have been, and of all parts of the ship which, in the opinion of the doctors, are capable of spreading infection.

(2.) Crew and passengers are subjected to an inspection as to the state of their health for five days after arrival of a vessel infected with cholera, and ten days after arrival of a vessel infected with plague.

(15.) For "infected" ships the following measures are obligatory:—

(1.) Removal of the sick to hospital.

(2.) Individual inspection of crew and passengers.

(3.) Disinfection of dirty clothes, &c., &c., removal of water from hold.

(4.) Clause 4 of paragraph 13.

(5.) Disinfection of all parts of ship with which those infected have come into contact.

(6.) Crew and passengers are subjected to quarantine, the term of which is fixed from the moment of their installation in the medical stations, or, in the case of their remaining on board, from the moment that the disinfecting operations have ceased.

The term of quarantine is fixed at five and ten days for cholera and plague respectively.

For ships infected with cholera that have on board a doctor and complete disinfecting apparatus, the quarantine of the crew and passengers can be replaced by a surveillance for the above-mentioned term of days, first, upon a certificate from the doctor that, from the moment of cholera breaking out, all necessary measures were taken, and, secondly, upon the doctor taking it upon himself to examine daily the members of the crew and the passengers during the transit from the medical station to the port of destination, and there to inform the authorities of any change in the health of those on board.

If these conditions are carried out the vessel is allowed to leave for its destination. Passengers will only be allowed to land at these

central medical stations after their clothes have been either washed or thoroughly disinfected.

In such cases the passenger will come under the regulations of paragraph 19.

(16.) Foreign going ships, not wishing to undergo sanitary measures, have the right to keep out at sea. Discharging of cargo can be carried out under the following conditions:—

(1.) Ships must be placed at a distance sufficient to guarantee their isolation from the inhabited parts of the shore and from other ships in port.

(2.) No communication is allowed with the shore by passengers; the crew may only land for special service, under strict surveillance of the doctors of the medical station.

(3.) Before discharging cargo, the water from the hold must be disinfected and then removed, and all drinking water replaced by water of good quality.

(4.) Ships also which do not wish to be subjected to the sanitary regulations, may land passengers under the following conditions:—

(a.) Medical examination and disinfection of baggage of passengers coming from a healthy port.

(b.) The measures stated in paragraph 15, for passengers coming from or having any connection with a port infected with cholera or plague.

(5.) At Batoum all ships, whatever their sanitary state may be, are allowed to load with kerosine, by means of pipes, but the sanitary authorities must see to it that there is no communication of any kind with the shore, and also take measures to prevent rats landing by the mooring ropes.

Medical Inspection.

(17.) Medical inspection takes place on board ship, and only on land when the application of some special method of examination is necessary in doubtful cases. During the inspection no more clothes should be removed than is absolutely necessary, and if the person subjected to examination must strip entirely, it should be done in a separate room.

Disinfection.

(18.) Disinfection is carried out under the superintendence of the doctor of the medical station.

Surveillance.

(19.) All persons coming from a place infected with cholera or plague are subject to surveillance as to the state of their health: they are, however, allowed to proceed to their destination, but they must sign a paper binding themselves till the expiration of the term of surveillance (paragraphs 13, 14, 15), to inform the police of their arrival at their destination or at any other place where they may stop.

A note will also be inserted on their passports that they have come from an infected port and that they are under surveillance.

Independently of the above, a telegram is sent to the head of the district or town police of the place the person is travelling to, giving name and family, term of surveillance, &c., &c. The responsibility of sending this telegram lies on the doctor of the medical station.

Quarantine.

(20.) Quarantine should, as far as possible, be carried out on land in suitable premises. It can be carried out on board:—

(1.) When, owing to the large number of persons under quarantine, there are no suitable premises;

- (2.) Or at the request of the Captain that the crew may stay on board;
- (3.) When passengers, by permission of the Captain, prefer to undergo quarantine on board ship.
- (21.) For those under quarantine the following rules should be observed:—
- (a.) All persons should bathe and their clothes should be disinfected.
- (b.) Those under quarantine should be divided into small groups, so that if cholera or plague should break out, the lengthened term of quarantine need only be extended to the infected group.
- (c.) Doctors should question daily, and, if necessary, examine patients.
- (d.) On cholera or plague breaking out, those infected should be instantly isolated, and those persons occupying the same premises should be removed elsewhere, after disinfection, and have their term of observation extended another five and ten days for cholera and plague respectively, dating from the time of their removal.
- (22.) The duty of providing provisions for persons under quarantine, and of supplying ships with all necessaries falls on the superintending doctor, with whom the police authorities are also, if necessary, to co-operate.
- (23.) All ships coming from a healthy port, and also all ships that have already been granted pratique at one of the Russian Sanitary Stations, will be allowed to moor before the doctor's examination, provided that no custom-house or port laws are thereby infringed.

(24.) The mode of notice for ships entering ports where there is a medical station of the second class is to be drawn up by agreement between the superintending doctor and the Custom-house Officials.

Supplement to Instructions to Medical and Quarantine Stations of the Black Sea.

Sanitary Rules of 30th July, 1894, to be observed when foreign vessels touch at any spot on the Black Sea, where neither Custom-house nor Quarantine exists.

When owing to stress of weather foreign vessels put in at a spot where neither Quarantine nor Custom-house exists, the Coastguard, except in extreme cases, will not permit those on board to land or enter into communication with persons on land, but will immediately inform the nearest Quarantine station, or, if that be impossible, the nearest police authorities, who, if the case should demand it, will cause a doctor to be sent. The above measures should also be observed in the case of a sick person being secretly landed.

When permission has been given to foreign vessels to enter a port where neither Custom-house nor Quarantine stations exist, in such cases the Coastguard will permit communication with the shore only upon the production of a certificate of a clean bill of health from one of the Russian Quarantine Stations.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 8TH APRIL 1902.)

KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER
OF 1902 (No. 2).

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

*Modification of former Order and Alteration
of Boundaries of Scheduled District.*

1.—(1.) The Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1902 is hereby modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

(2.) The Scheduled District for the purposes of the above-mentioned Order and this Order shall after the commencement of this Order be the District described in the First Schedule to this Order.

*Movement within Scheduled District with Licence
between different parts of a Farm or between
Farms in the same Occupation.*

2.—(1.) Where the Local Authority consider that it is necessary or expedient that any animals within their district should be permitted to be moved within the Scheduled District—

(i.) On a particular occasion, either from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm, or between different farms in the occupation of the same person; or

(ii.) As often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms in the occupation of the same person;

and it is impossible to so move the animals otherwise than along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare, the Local Authority may authorize such movement by a licence (in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect) granted by an Inspector of such Local Authority to the occupier of the farm, provided that the animals are not in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place and their movement is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

(2.) Where the movement authorized by the Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence" and shall be in force until it is revoked by the Local Authority by a Notice to the occupier of the farm. In other cases the Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue.

(3.) The Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorized to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorized to be moved.

(4.) The animals shall be moved between the several parts of the farm or between the different farms, as the case may be, by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and shall be accompanied by the Licence authorizing the movement.

(5.) The expression "farm" means any premises occupied by the same person as one farm whether all the premises are held of the same landlord or not, but does not include any common or other land occupied by such person together with other persons.

*Movement within Scheduled District with Licence
for Slaughter.*

3.—(1.) An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is marked as required by this Article and accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(2.) Every animal moved under this Article shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition namely:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above-mentioned.

(3.) A Licence under this Article shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or his agent authorized in writing for this purpose to the effect:

(i.) that the animal is not affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and

(ii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;

(4.) The Declaration shall be retained by the person granting the Licence and disposed of by him as may be directed by the Local Authority.

(5.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(6.) Every animal moved with a Licence under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and shall be slaughtered after its arrival at the slaughter-house without unnecessary delay.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

4. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Order of the Board relating to any disease other than Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals, but nothing in any such Regulation shall permit the movement of animals in contravention of this Order.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

5.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

6.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of the conditions of a Licence under this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If an animal is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If an animal is not marked as required by this Order, the person to whom the Licence to move the animal is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so marked, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any

animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows a head of cattle, or a sheep, or goat, or pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

7. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture:

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

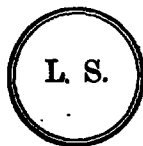
8. This Order shall come into operation on the eleventh day of April, one thousand nine hundred and two.

Short Title, &c.

9. This Order may be cited as the KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1902 (No. 2), and shall be read with the Order mentioned in Article 1 of this Order.
