**CORONATION OF THEIR MAJESTIES.
COURT OF CLAIMS.**

THE Right Honourable the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty to hear and determine all Claims of Services to be performed at the time of the ensuing Coronation (except those dispensed with by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th day of June, 1901), and of fees to be received for the same, will meet at the Council Office, Whitehall, on Wednesday, the 14th day of May next, at eleven o'clock of the forenoon, to settle their Report to His Majesty.

The said Commissioners hereby require all persons who may still be desirous of exhibiting Petitions and Claims concerning such Services to make their Petitions or Claims on or before Wednesday, the 7th day of May next.

The said Commissioners at their Meeting held at the Council Office, Whitehall, on the 17th day of July, 1901, resolved as follows:—

1. All claims must be made by Petition. Petitions may be sent under cover to the Clerks of the Court of Claims, Privy Council Office, Whitehall.
2. Petitioners are not required to appear in person before the Court, unless summoned.
3. Petitioners may appear by Solicitors, Agents, or Counsel.
4. If a Claim was admitted in 1838, the Court will forthwith admit such Claim, provided the Commissioners are satisfied that the present Petitioner represents the person whose Claim was admitted in 1838, and that there is no Counter-Claim.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such Claims as may be submitted to them in respect of Rights or Services connected with the parts of the Ceremonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

SIR,

1. IN consequence of the wholesale depopulation of the country, carried on by the large slave-raiding hands of Kontagora, I directed Colonel G. V. Kemball, Royal Artillery, Acting Commandant West African Frontier Force, to proceed against the Emir, and he left Jebba on January 19th. His force (including a party which joined him from Illo en route) consisted of 11 officers (including medical), three British non-commissioned officers, 433 rank and file, with two guns and three Maxims. Lieutenant Keyes seized the village of Udara, four miles north of Kontagora, in the night, and depositing his baggage there Colonel Kemball advanced in square formation. "Some thousands of horse and foot," says Colonel Kemball, "awaited the attack. Parties of horse and men with trade guns and rifles moved against our front, but the greater number of the enemy worked round our flanks, and charged towards the rear of the square. Not a shot was fired from the square except by selected marksmen until the arrows began to fall thickly inside, and some of the enemy were within 80 yards. I then gave the order for volleys, and in two minutes the enemy were in full flight, but some of their horsemen and archers behaved in the most intrepid manner. Our only casualty was one man killed." He despatched Captain Lewis and Lieutenant Keyes with two light columns, each about 100 strong,

in pursuit of the Emir and his following, and these compelled him to abandon his slaves and baggage.

Colonel Kemball reports that the men, some of whom had only recently returned from Ashanti, and had been continuously on service for nearly a year, marched well and showed great keenness. He especially mentions the following Officers and Non-commissioned Officers for their assistance on all occasions:—

Captain T. A. Cubitt, Royal Artillery, Staff Officer.

Lieutenant (Local Captain) G. H. F. Abadie, 1st West African Regiment, Intelligence Officer.

Captain G. C. Merrick, Royal Artillery, Commanding Royal Artillery.

Captain E. H. Lewis, 21st Lancers, Lieutenants C. V. Keyes, Indian Staff Corps, and C. F. O. Graham, Royal Marines, 1st West African Regiment.

Dr. Langley, Principal Medical Officer.

Colour-Sergeant E. C. Garton.

I concur in his recommendations. He estimates the enemy at about 5,000, and their losses at about 50 or more. Successful efforts were made during the night to save the town from incendiarism. Over 200 kegs of powder were destroyed.

Leaving Captain Lewis with 100 men as garrison, and having sent back Lieutenant Keyes and his party to Illo, Colonel Kemball joined me with some 200 men at Wuya, 7½ miles from Bida, where he was reinforced by Captain Cochrane with 100 men (escort), and we marched on Bida. I was myself a witness of the admirable manner in which the march was conducted. Without a hitch, at a pace of close on three miles an hour, the whole force, including the heavy guns, arrived in compact formation, which reflects especial credit on the training Captain Merrick, Royal Artillery, has bestowed on his gun-carriers. Owing to the arrangements I have already reported to you, no shot was fired, and the new Emir was installed without any chaos or bloodshed.

The Emir had been warned that he would be well treated if he remained, but would be pursued if he fled. He elected the latter course, and Captain J. C. H. Rigby, Royal Marines, captured three important chiefs, two of whom were wounded. These were released after they had recovered. Colonel Kemball brings to notice the names of Captain Rigby, Lieutenant H. A. Porter, 19th Hussars, and Colour-Sergeant F. West. Though there has not in these operations been any very hard fighting, or any long list of casualties on our side, I consider that this result is largely owing to the admirable dispositions made by Colonel Kemball, and I desire to bring his services to your notice. I am especially gratified that the fine towns of Bida and Kontagora are both intact, and that those who have suffered are the real culprits and not the lesser people, who are forced to fight for their masters. The mortal effect of the rapid and continued pursuit in both cases will be very great, probably much greater than the killing of any number of slaves and petty people in battle. It is, as I desired, the slave raiders who have themselves been hunted, and had to ride for their lives. All those whose names have been brought forward by Colonel Kemball have done good work on many occasions besides this, and I am at a loss to select between them. Most of them are original members of the Force, and I have frequently had occasion to bring to your favourable notice both Captain Cubitt, Royal Artillery, and Captain Abadie and Dr. Langley.

2. Tawari Expedition.—It was absolutely necessary to inflict punishment on the village concerned in the sad death of the Honourable D. Carnegie, and with rapidity to prevent a far-reaching effect from this untoward event. Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel A. W. G. L. Cole, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, left Lokoja on December 6th, with three other officers (including Medical), seven British non-commissioned officers, 127 rank and file, two Maxims, and two seven-pounders, and arrived near Koton-Kerifi the same evening. Starting at 8 p.m., he marched all the night over a very bad and overgrown path, and reached Tawari at 8 a.m., the distance being over 20 miles. The place was strongly fortified and most difficult of access, and the defenders seemed at first inclined to hold it stubbornly. Colonel Cole, however, stormed the gate, which he had blown in by shell fire, and little resistance was encountered. One private was killed and another was slightly wounded. The troops were under arms for 16½ hours, and were very keen. I consider that Lieutenant-Colonel Lowry Cole deserves great credit for the way in which he carried out these operations. He specially brings to notice the services rendered by (Local) Captain and Adjutant T. A. Rose, Royal Scots Fusiliers, and Battery Sergeant-Major Heffernan, Royal Artillery. I have already recommended Lieutenant-Colonel Lowry Cole to your consideration in connection with the Munshi campaign and again at Limu, where he was severely wounded. Apart from his war services, he has commanded the 2nd Battalion since February, 1899, and its smartness and discipline are the result of his training. I have already had occasion to bring forward the name of Sergeant Heffernan for good service in the affair at Limu (where he was wounded). He is an original member of the Force, and I strongly recommend him for consideration.

3. After the threatened attack on our small garrison at Wushishi, in July, 1900, I left Major O'Neill there to patrol the country and repel the raids which had become more and more aggressive, and to protect our canoes, which had been attacked by the levies of Bida and Kontagora. Many skirmishes occurred, in which our men behaved very bravely, though in several cases no Officer or British Non-commissioned Officer was present. The native Non-commissioned Officer showed much resource and intelligence.

On the 14th December, Sergeant H. Edwards defeated with heavy loss a force estimated at 100 horse and 700 foot. On the 15th and 16th Major W. H. O'Neill, Royal Artillery, and Lieutenant H. A. Porter, 19th Hussars, attacked and defeated the Bida raiders, who are said to have lost 50 killed at least. On the night of the 17th he marched on the hostile forces again and surprised them at dawn. He estimated the enemy at 500 horse and 1,000 foot, and states that they suffered at least 200 casualties. His own force consisted of himself, Lieutenant Porter, Sergeant Edwards, 8 mounted and 50 dismounted men. Again on December 18, he advanced towards Bida with Lieutenant Porter, and 18 mounted and 25 dismounted men, driving parties of the enemy before him. These he pursued up to the walls of Bida and actually entered the town with his handful of men and endeavoured to seize the Emir with his own hand. In a desperate hand-to-hand encounter he was badly wounded, but the opportune arrival of some of his men enabled him to put the Fulanis to flight and to effect a retirement, during which his party was much harassed. The other casualties, besides Major O'Neill himself, being one man severely and two slightly wounded. Major

O'Neill had received distinct and positive orders not to approach too close to Bida, still less to enter it, and I consider that a grave disaster was only averted partly by good fortune and partly by the resource and ability shown by Lieutenant Porter. I promoted Lieutenant Porter, subject to your approval, to be a Company Commander, and I bring forward his name and that of Sergeant Edwards, who are both very strongly praised by Major O'Neill. There is no doubt that this most adventurous exploit created an immense impression on the people of Bida. The subsequent operations regarding Kontagora and Bida are related in the first part of this despatch.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

YOLA EXPEDITION.

SIR,

WITH reference to this expedition, I have the honour to inform you that Colonel T. L. N. Morland, Commandant of the West African Frontier Force, conducted the Expedition in person, and copy of his report I enclose herewith.

2. The defeat and deposition of the Emir, and the effective occupation of British Adamawa, puts an end to the immense slave traffic from the South, which for many years has been the chief source of supply for the Sokoto Empire.

3. I have the honour to bring to your notice the services of the following Officers who served with the force, and are specially mentioned in Colonel Morland's report, and to recommend for your approval that the Secretary of State for War be moved to allow their names to be recorded.

4. Brevet Major A. McClintock, Seaforth Highlanders. "Major McClintock acted as Staff Officer, and carried out his duties most ably: at a critical moment in the town he displayed great personal gallantry and efficient leadership." He was wounded on this occasion by shell splinter. Major McClintock has been conspicuous on more than one previous occasion, notably in the Munshi Campaigns on the Benue in 1900 and 1901, and has quite recently rendered most valuable service to the Protectorate during his diplomatic mission to Fataralla. At all times he has displayed marked ability as a leader of men.

5. Captain T. A. Rose, Royal Scots Fusiliers, a hardworking and zealous Officer. His name has already been brought before you for special service rendered in the Tawari Expedition, conducted by Colonel Lowry-Cole in December, 1900. In this instance he followed Major McClintock, who led a charge and captured the two rifled guns before they could be fired again.

6. Captain C. R. G. Mayne, Highland Light Infantry. Colonel Morland reports as follows: "I now ordered Captain Mayne with his Company to rush the gate: this he did in gallant style, and in a few moments the whole Palace compound was cleared of the enemy."

7. Captain E. M. Baker, Manchester Regiment. Mentioned for driving the defenders from the Mosque and capturing it. This place was strongly held by the enemy.

8. Lieutenant R. Henvey, Royal Artillery. Report states:—"The walls of the palace were still obstinately defended, and I ordered up the two 75 MM. guns, which were well served under Lieutenant Henvey: the close range fire of these

guns was too much for the defenders, and they began to leave the walls."

9. Lieutenant P. A. Macgregor, D.S.O., Coldstream Guards, Intelligence Officer, specially mentioned for his able work. This officer has been most highly spoken of by Major McClintock, whom he accompanied on the Fataralla mission.

10. Dr. Blair, Senior Medical Officer, performed yeoman service attending to the many casualties (he sucked the poison from Colonel Morland's wound), 41 in all, and also saw to and tended the enemy's wounded.

11. The others mentioned are Sergeant-Major H. Daniels, 2nd West African Frontier Force.

Sergeant Woodall, Royal Army Medical Corps. No. 1478, Lance-Sergeant Balarabe, "F" Company 2nd Battalion West African Frontier Force. This man has been in many engagements during the past 10 years in Nigeria.

No. 1623, Corporal Babar Orloo, No. 1197, Private Adamu Beriberi, "F" Company 2nd West African Frontier Force.

No. 989, Private Adamu Kura, "E" Company, appointed Lance-Corporal at Yola.

No. 286, Lance-Corporal Awesu, "B" Company 2nd West African Frontier Force.

No. 491, Private Akamore, "D" Company 2nd West African Frontier Force.

12. Colonel Morland, who carried out the operations in person, and who early during the fighting was wounded with a poisoned arrow (and no more nerve-shattering wound can be inflicted, for if the poison is fresh it means death in a few minutes), stuck to his command. He deserves very great credit for the successful issue of this important expedition, and I desire to specially bring his services to your notice. He was specially mentioned for gallantry in Sir Frederick D. Lugard's despatch, West African Frontier Force, of 7th August, 1900, published in London Gazette, April 16th, 1901.

From Colonel T. L. N. Morland, Commandant, West African Frontier Force, Northern Nigeria.

To His Excellency the Acting High Commissioner, Northern Nigeria, Jelba.

23rd September, 1901.

SIR,

IN accordance with Your Excellency's instructions a force under my command left Lokoja on 26th August, in the Stern Wheelers "Liberty" and "Nkissi," for Yola, picking up detachments at Odeni and Ibi en route. The force, when completed, consisted of 13 Officers, 7 European Non-commissioned Officers, 2 doctors, 365 rank and file, with two 75 MM. guns, and four Maxim's.

2. The Niger Company's Station near Yola was reached on the morning of 2nd September.

As it was doubtful if the "Liberty" could safely get through the narrow channel connecting the lake at Yola with the river, the troops on board were distributed between the "Nkissi" and "Kaduna," the latter being kindly placed at my disposal by the Agent of the Niger Company; 25 men under Lieutenant Croly, were left on board the "Liberty," on which a three-pounder Nordenfelt gun had been mounted; he was instructed to seize all canoes, patrol the river, and prevent any of the enemy crossing the river to Guira, the Emir's summer residence.

3. A landing was effected in open ground, some 700 yards north of Yola, at 10 A.M., without opposition. After forming up the troops I sent a trustworthy messenger with a letter to the Emir, containing the terms mentioned in your instructions.

In half an hour the messenger returned and stated that the Emir refused to receive the letter, and ordered me to leave at once. I now moved the force to a position about a quarter of a mile to my right where the ground was favourable and formed three sides of a square, my rear being covered by the lake. I again sent the letter by the same messenger, stating that I insisted on his receiving it and if he again refused I should take steps to force him to do so: the messenger was absent some time, and meanwhile, numbers of horse and foot were collecting to my front and right. I began to fear that my messenger had been killed, when he returned stating that the Emir still refused to receive the letter, and that if I did not at once re-embark he would drive me into the water.

4. As horse and foot still continued to stream out of the town, and it was evidently to our advantage to let them attack us in open ground rather than to engage them in the narrow streets where our superior arms would not have full play, I decided to await their attack.

5. About 1 P.M., after much shouting and exhortation from their Mallams, they advanced to the attack on our front and right: I reserved our fire till the leaders were within 200 yards, when I ordered the maxims to open, Companies to fire section volleys, and the guns case. In ten minutes the attack melted away, some few fanatical footmen getting close to the square before they were killed. The survivors fled into the town, which is not walled.

6. The Emir's palace and those of the other Chiefs are surrounded by walls 20 feet high and three feet thick at base: forming regular forts in themselves. From the top of a tree the roof of the King's palace could be seen some 900 yards distant in the town—a shell was burst over this and two shells fired in reply which fell wide.

7. I now formed up for an advance on the palace: the streets were narrow and winding, and we could only advance on a narrow front. Little resistance was met with till the neighbourhood of the palace was reached: but this and a mosque near it were strongly held by the enemy. I was wounded by an arrow from the mosque; and a heavy rifle and arrow fire caused many casualties in five minutes.

The two rifled guns of the enemy hidden round a bend in the road were fired at 30 yards' range, blowing off one man's leg and severely wounding several others. Major McClintock, who displayed the greatest gallantry throughout, led a charge followed by Captain Rose, and captured the guns before they could be fired again, Captain Baker driving the defenders from the mosque. The walls of the palace were still obstinately defended, and I ordered up the two 75 MM. guns which were well served under Lieutenant Henvey: the close-range fire of these guns was too much for the defenders and they began to leave the walls.

I now ordered Captain Mayne with his Company to rush the gate: this he did in gallant style and in a few moments the whole palace compound was cleared of the enemy.

In addition to the two nine-pounder rifled French guns already alluded to, 105 loaded and fused shell, 60 French rifles in good condition, and a large number of other firearms,

1,000 rounds small arm ammunition, a quantity of bullets and over a ton of gunpowder were captured.

Our casualties were myself and Major McClintock slightly wounded; two men killed, six dangerously, eight severely, and 23 slightly wounded—two of the latter gun carriers. The enemy's loss I estimate at 50 killed and 150 wounded. The Bornu men and Arabs, deserters from Fataralla, gave most trouble inside the town. The enemy were now flying in all directions.

8. Effective pursuit was impossible owing to the lateness of the hour and lack of horses.

I gave strict orders that no house was to be touched except the Emir's palace, which was fired, and at dusk we returned to the neighbourhood of the steamers.

9. Early on the morning of the 3rd, the audience chamber of the Emir's palace was blown up; no other houses in the town were interfered with. Dr. Cargill, Assistant Resident, was trying to get into communication with Bobo Amadu, the Emir's brother.

You arrived in the afternoon of the 3rd.

10. The Emir was now reported to have reached Gurin, on the Faro River (New Guria on the English map, which shows it well in English territory).

In accordance with your instructions on the afternoon of the 4th I embarked on s.s. "Nkissi" with 6 Officers, 2 Non-commissioned Officers, 150 rank and file, one 75 MM. gun and two Maxims, and, following your launch, started at midnight for Gurin.

The neighbourhood of Gurin was reached next day at 3 P.M., but as it appeared from your observations that the direction of the river was more correctly shown in the French map, and that Gurin was just on the boundary, you wisely decided not to land, and as it was also evident that the Emir was not there, and the people were flying, there was no necessity to do so. The night was spent at anchor, some five miles below the mouth of the Faro River.

11. As reports were received that the Emir now intended to cross at Ribawo, which is of course well within the English boundary, after your return to Yola on 6th September, I proceeded there, and going in close, found a number of the enemy holding some rocky ground. I tried to parley with them, but their attitude was very hostile: as I should have landed here under considerable disadvantages and under close arrow-range from the enemy, themselves under cover, I proceeded up stream a quarter of a mile and landed on open ground, under cover of Maxim fire from the steamer, thus cutting off the men holding the rocks from the town. I now advanced, compelling the holders of the rocks to come out or be cut off.

They were finally driven away and pursued for a mile or more; horsemen on distant ridges were shelled: as all available canoes had been removed there was no possibility of a crossing here so I re-embarked, leaving the town intact. We had no casualties; the enemy's loss was not great, as there was a good deal of cover. At mid-day Yola was reached.

12. As negotiations were now proceeding with Bobo Adadu, and the people shewed signs of wishing to return to the town, no further columns were sent out after the Emir for fear of frightening those who wished to return. Reports showed that he was accompanied only by 30 horsemen, deserted by the majority of his people and was close to the German frontier.

13. On 17th September a site on high ground 2 miles north-west of Yola was selected as a camp for the garrison, F company under Captain Baker with two other Officers, one Doctor, two Non-commissioned Officers, 180 Rank and File, one Maxim, and one three-pounder Nordenfolt gun were landed: a fort is in course of construction.

14. On the 8th, after the ceremony of installing the new Emir was over, all troops were re-embarked: stores landed at the new site, and on the morning of the 9th the Expedition started on its return to Ibi and Lokoja.

15. All ranks worked well throughout the operations.

I wish to specially bring to notice the services of the following Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and men:—

Major McClintock acted as Staff Officer, and carried out his duties most ably: at a critical moment in the town he displayed great personal gallantry and efficient leadership.

Captains Rose, Mayne, and Baker, 2nd West African Frontier Force.

Lieutenant Macgregor (Intelligence Officer), 1st West African Frontier Force.

Lieutenant Henvey, Royal Artillery, in command of the guns.

Dr. Blair, Senior Medical Officer.

Despatch Relating to Field Operations.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to submit the following report on the operations undertaken in the Ishan and Uli countries to the north-east of Benin City, and to bring to notice the services of the officers mentioned.

2. The force engaged, consisting of 225 officers and men, was absent from headquarters from 1st March to 23rd May, and in actual contact with the enemy from 9th March to 8th May, during which latter period there was some very severe fighting. The casualties amounted to 25, or 11 per cent. in the force, and 17 in carrier column. All wounds were severe and three soldiers died of wounds. The operations were entirely successful, unfriendly tribes making absolute submission.

3. I strongly recommend the services of Captain (local Major) W. C. G. Heneker, Connaught Rangers, for consideration. He had command of the force and conducted the operations to a successful and satisfactory issue. I wish also to mention Mr. Wideuham Fosbery, the Political Officer who accompanied the expedition, and assisted in providing carriers and transport, and showed great tact and judgment in dealing with the unfriendly tribes when the military operations were completed. I consider his services equally deserving of consideration with those of Major Heneker.

4. I endorse strongly the following recommendations of Major Heneker which occur in his detailed report of the operations and submit that the services of the officers brought to notice are deserving of special mention, and that those of all engaged are worthy of consideration with a view to the granting of a medal in recognition.

"I beg to bring the names of the following Officers to your notice:—

"Captain A. M. N. Mackenzie, Royal Artillery, Adjutant of Expedition, gave me every assistance and worked hard,

"Captain A. D. Lewes, Royal Scots Fusiliers, was Quartermaster, and is an exceedingly hard-working energetic Officer. He performed the duties of Sanitary Officer, and had a great deal of work in the different camps, especially in Idigu, where we remained at one time for nearly a month.

"Dr. J. C. Whitley, as the only Medical Officer attached to the Expedition, had a tremendous lot of work, and his care of and attention to the sick and wounded night and day without a relief was unceasing.

"Captain G. E. Hewett, West India Regiment, sketched the country through which we moved, and I am indebted to him for the attached map. I beg particularly to thank Mr. Fosbery, the Political Officer, for the help he gave me, and desire to bring his services to your notice. Besides his work as Political Officer, he organised the carriers, and by the system he inaugurated was always able to replace sick men on the march up from Benin City. At all the towns on the road everything was ready and provided for the troops when we marched in, and I consider the success of the Expedition was largely due to his work and to the personal influence he has (apart from that exercised by him in his official position) over the Benin City Chiefs."

5. I further recommend that any recognition of services be extended to the Benin Chiefs who accompanied the force and rendered signal service.

I HAVE the honour to submit Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne's final report on the operations recently undertaken under his command against the Mullah, Muhammad-bin-Abdullah, in Somaliland.

The rise of the fanatical movement headed by this Mullah and the reasons why it became necessary to put it down by armed force are detailed in despatches dating from April, 1899, which have since been published in Parliamentary papers—"Africa No. 5 (1901)". Reports have also been submitted from time to time on the progress made in the raising and equipment of the native levy, and of the operations conducted by Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne in the field.

The original plan of campaign was that the Abyssinian force, which was to co-operate with ours, should drive the Mullah from his position in the western Ogaden, towards Bohotele, where our force would deal with him. The Abyssinian expedition, however, moved into the Ogaden

before our preparations could be completed; it effected its purpose, but did not ever come into touch with our force.

I would avail myself of this opportunity to acknowledge the valuable assistance rendered to the Protectorate in the suppression of the Mullah's movement by Lieutenant-Colonel Harrington, His Britannic Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Addis Abbaba, whose conduct of our relations with the Emperor Menelek alone rendered possible the undertaking of concerted action with Abyssinia against the Mullah.

Active operations commenced on the 22nd May last, when an advance was made from our advanced base at Burao. The Mullah was located in the central Dolbahanta with a force of some 5,000 men, mounted and foot, with about 500 rifles. He could also count on support from large numbers of tribal spearmen, whose attitude it was known would depend on the result of the first conflict with the enemy. Our force consisted of 1,500 men of the levy, 50 Punjabi Mahomedan Sepoys from India, and a number of spearmen employed on transport work. Operations ceased with the return of the expedition to Burao on the 29th and 30th July.

The operations conducted during this period under the able command of Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne were completely successful. The enemy were defeated on three occasions with heavy loss, and the Mullah and the remnants of his force were twice driven out of the Protectorate in hot pursuit, finally to seek a refuge in the Mijjertein country beyond our border, thoroughly disorganized and dispirited; and tribes who had actively supported the Mullah from the first were pursued and punished.

As a result of these operations undertaken over a large area in a difficult and for the most part waterless country, with no means of support in case of a reverse, the tribes both in the Dolbahanta and the Ogaden country south of our border sent in emissaries to renounce the Mullah and sue for pardon. This was granted to them subject to good behaviour, and on the understanding that they held aloof from any further dealings with the Mullah, who being still at large was capable of causing further trouble hereafter. Our authority was thus restored over a large portion of the Protectorate, where for the last two and a-half years the Mullah's movement had remained unchecked for want of means to cope with it, and at the same time friendly relations were renewed with the tribes who trade with our Protectorate and inhabit the country to the south of our border.

It will be within your Lordship's recollection that in the instructions issued to Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne I desired that one portion of any live-stock captured should be applied to compensate our tribes for the losses they had suffered at the Mullah's hands, one portion be given the Somalis of the levy as prize-money, and one portion be set-off against the cost of the expedition. The distribution was mainly made on these lines, but I have not yet received the final report of distribution. One hundred animals were made over for the benefit of the Berbera Poor-house, which for months had supported women and children rendered destitute by the Mullah's raids; none were given to the hospital.

I would wish to bring prominently to your Lordship's favourable consideration the eminent services rendered by Major (local Lieutenant-Colonel) E. J. E. Swayne, Indian Staff Corps, in raising and organizing the levy, and in planning and conducting his operations to a successful issue.

He has shown powers of organization and generalship to a marked degree, and it would be difficult to speak too highly of the able manner in which the work intrusted to him was planned and carried out. I fully indorse the favourable mention Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne has made of the services of the officers acting under his orders.

Brevet Major W. G. L. Beynon, D.S.O., Indian Staff Corps, ably commanded the mounted branch, and was assisted by Captains J. W. B. Merewether and C. M. D. Bruce, Royal Artillery, in command of the mounted infantry and cavalry respectively. The mounted branch did good service in covering the advance of the infantry, in surprising by forced marches and capturing the enemy's live-stock, and in completing the rout of the Mullah and his followers by sharp pursuit beyond the border.

Captain G. E. Phillips, Royal Engineers, is commended as a thoroughly reliable and capable officer. I had ample demonstration at Burao of the efficiency to which he had quickly brought his corps by his powers of organization. I trust that the ability he has shown during this expedition may be considered in connection with the services he has already rendered in other parts of Africa.

The defence of his position at Somala by Captain M. McNeill, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, was a brilliant affair. Three successive attacks in force were repulsed, and finally the enemy, who outnumbered him by more than twelve to one, were beaten off with heavy loss.

The name of Lieutenant J. C. Lamprey, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, is brought forward by Captain McNeill for good service performed in the defence of the camel zariba, which formed portion of the position held at Somala.

Brevet Major the Honourable A. H. C. Haringbury-Tracy, Royal Horse Guards, assisted by Captain R. P. Cobbold, Reserve of Officers, held a position with the Abyssinian force which called for the exercise of much tact and diplomacy, and in which he was able to render valuable assistance to the Abyssinian Commander, thus winning the warm appreciation of the Emperor Menelek. His reports testify to the difficulties he had to encounter, and I would recommend to your Lordship's favourable notice the services he has rendered whilst attached to the Abyssinian expedition.

It was with deep regret that I had to report the loss of two valuable and experienced officers, who devoted themselves to their work with the levy, and who would have risen to distinction had they lived—Lieutenant L. W. de Sausmarez, King's Royal Rifles, accidentally shot at Burao, and Captain D. A. Friederichs, Royal Engineers, killed in action at Furdiddin.

Mr. Gerolimato, British Vice-Consul at Harrar, rendered useful assistance in keeping me informed of the progress of affairs at Harrar, and of the movements, so far as they could be ascertained, of the Abyssinian force operating in the Ogaden. I would place on record the fact that, in deference to what he knew would be my wish, Mr. Gerolimato postponed an application he had intended to make for leave of absence in order to remain at his post till the conclusion of the expedition.

I gladly indorse Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne's mention of the aid given him by Lieutenant Cordeaux in his capacity of His Britannic Majesty's Vice-Consul at Berbera. The troubles caused by the Mullah's movement threw a large amount of extra work on Lieutenant Cordeaux which was readily and cheerfully performed;

and throughout he gave me the most loyal assistance in our dealings, at times anxious, with the tribes.

I trust that Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne's request that a medal and clasp be given to all ranks serving with the expedition may meet with your Lordship's favourable consideration. Many of our Somalis served with the Italians, and show with pride the medals they received for the actions in which they were engaged. On political grounds alone the issue of a medal for the operations lately concluded would be expedient.

I would also recommend that some native title be created to reward native officers and officials who perform meritorious service in our African Protectorates, similar to the titles conferred by the Indian Government on deserving Mahomedan officials.

Bessalidar Musa Farih is a native officer eminently deserving of such a title, and I should wish to see one conferred on him, both on account of the good services he has performed for years past and the influential position he holds amongst his countrymen in Somaliland.

Lieutenant-Colonel Swayne to Consul-General Sadler.

[Despatch relating to Field Operations.]

London, November 10, 1901.

SIR,

1. IN continuation of my despatches of June and July last, I have the honour to submit a final report on the raising of the Somali levy and the operations which resulted in the disorganization, and expulsion from the British Protectorate, of the Mullah Abdilla Hassan's armed following.

2. The raising of the levy dates back to the latter end of November, 1900, when, owing to the decision to withdraw the 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment, it became necessary to make some other arrangement to face the Mullah.

3. The position at this time was as follows:—

The Mullah, after his raids on the Abyssinians at Jig-Jiga, and his subsequent attacks upon our Habr Awal tribe, had moved westward to the pools of Harradiggit, situated in the Haud desert, 170 miles south of the Ishak border.

During August, September, and October our tribes, who had already suffered very severely from his raids, were kept in a state of perpetual alarm owing to the operations of bands of the Mullah's reconnoitring horsemen.

They had consequently retired to the arid coast region, where there was insufficient grazing to keep their flocks and herds alive for many days.

Formerly, although raids between the tribes were continual, a rough balance of power had existed, but the importation of arms by the Darud tribes, who supported the Mullah, absolutely altered this state of things, and placed the outlying sections of our Ishak tribes completely at the Mullah's mercy.

4. The tribes in Northern Somaliland may be classed into three main divisions: the Ishak, Darud, and Dir.

The Ishak are tribes within the Protectorate, with whom we have Treaties, to which, in 1886, "protective clauses" were added. These tribes, if we exclude a few fanatical individuals who were unsupported by their fellows, were at this time hostile to the Mullah and friendly to us.

The Darud, on the other hand, comprise the Ogaden clans south and outside of our Protectorate, and also the Dolbahanta, the bulk of whom were at this time actively supporting the Mullah, and hostile to us.

The Dir include the Esa and Gadabursi in the neighbourhood of Zeyla, remote from the scene of operations and unaffected by them.

It will be convenient, therefore, to bear in mind that, although the Administration at all times discriminated between the friendly and unfriendly sections of the Darud, and endeavoured to disabuse the people of the idea that the Darud, as a whole, were considered hostile to us, the Somali tribes generally, nevertheless, looked upon the Ishak as being on the side of Government and the Darud as being hostile.

5. Thousands of live-stock of the Ishak had been raided, and men, women, and children slaughtered. Numbers of children died from the want of milk, and the coast towns became full of destitute fugitives. The alarm spread even to Berbera and Bulhar.

6. The country is unsuitable to the employment of regular troops owing to its great distances and the scarcity of water and pasture. There is no cultivation whatever, and no food is obtainable, once the coast is left, except meat.

7. Moreover, the tribes had no confidence in the ability of regular troops to afford protection from devastating raids.

8. Regular troops had been employed in the operations against the Esa tribe in 1891. They suffered from the heat and want of water. The enemy, having greater mobility, was able to avoid the troops, and choose his opportunity for attack. At Hussein a small body of Esa rushed the camp, held by over 350 troops, and inflicted, in the dark, a considerable loss in killed and wounded.

9. It is by no means unusual for Somali horsemen whilst on a raid to cover 60 or 70 miles in a day, and even men on foot will cover over 50 miles.

10. The Mullah, being fully aware of the advantage conferred by superior mobility, disregarded our posts at Adadleh and Hargeisa, and successfully carried out his two most disastrous raids on our tribes, at a time when the 2nd Battalion King's Africa Rifles were holding posts in the interior.

11. It was therefore recognized that, in order to give adequate protection and reassure the tribes, it was necessary to have troops capable of moving as fast as the enemy.

Under these circumstances our requirements could only be met by a local levy, which could travel fast and could live entirely, if necessary, on the country. Sick men would not hamper rapid movement, as they could be sent back to their tribes on camels; moreover, an irregular levy had the advantage of being inexpensive.

12. I received orders from you on the 22nd November, 1900, to raise, as a preliminary measure, a sufficient number of men to replace the regulars.

13. In less than a week 250 men, comprising eight sections under the command of Coast Police Sepoys as Non-commissioned Officers were raised,

armed, and equipped, and taught the use of their rifles.

14. They were marched inland by me on the 28th November, and the regular detachments at Adadleh and Hargeisa, 55 miles and 100 miles distant from Berbera, were relieved on the morning of the 1st and 2nd December respectively, and supplies of rations and ammunition were taken over at both places.

15. A defensible masonry block-house for the storage of ammunition was built at Adadleh.

16. No rifles had yet arrived from England, so the new levies were armed with the spare Martini-Henry and Snider rifles of the Coast Police, and later on, when, on my return from Hargeisa on the 4th December, new sections were raised, such other serviceable rifles of various calibres as were available in the Protectorate were utilized.

On the departure of the regulars, 150 Martini-Enfield single-loading .303 rifles were left on loan to the Protectorate, and these also immediately passed into the hands of the new levies.

17. There was at this time, owing to the feeling of exasperation caused by the sufferings of the people, no difficulty in obtaining infantry recruits, even at the low rate of pay of 12 rupees a month, a rate 4 rupees less than that given to the Coast Police. On the first day some 1,200 men came forward.

In selecting men, only those vouched for by responsible Chiefs, and those belonging to trustworthy tribes were enlisted, no Dolbahanta being allowed to enter the ranks.

18. Every man, before marching out of Berbera, was paid an allowance to purchase his own Somali shoes, and also a piece of American cloth. Extra hides and spare steel were sent up with the sections, and the men, amongst whom were many shoemakers and workers in iron, made and repaired their own shoes, and made axes with which to cut thorn-bushes. On the march thorn zaribas were made every night.

19. In the beginning of December, when an expedition was sanctioned, you authorized me to increase the infantry of the levy up to 1,000, and, later on, to form a Mounted Corps of 500 men.

20. As I was at this time alone, I had had to personally conduct the detachments up-country, and as this involved journeys of 200 miles to Hargeisa and back, I now found it impossible to spare the four days occupied by the journey.

21. Much work had to be done at the coast in bringing over riding camels from Aden, in purchasing transport animals and supplies, and in sending caravans up-country.

Estimates had to be prepared, and arms, equipment, clothing, stores, water tanks, &c., ordered from England, Egypt, or India.

22. I found it necessary, therefore, to apply for the immediate services of two Subalterns in order to take charge of the up-country posts, and on the 2nd Battalion King's African Rifles sailing from the coast, the services of Lieutenants Byrne and Walshe were placed at my disposal. They were at once sent up to take charge of the levies at Hargeisa and Adadleh (50 miles apart), whilst I continued to enlist men at Berbera.

23. The raising of the Mounted Infantry gave much trouble. As soon as he could be spared from Hargeisa, Lieutenant Byrne was sent westward to Doboek, where the Chiefs had agreed to bring up horsemen for enlistment.

He succeeded in raising 100 men, bringing their own ponies and saddles, but owing to the threatening attitude of the Rer Ali Ogaden, and to the consequent disinclination of our tribes to

leave their flocks unguarded, further enlistment came to a standstill.

24. Owing to the hindrance caused to my plans, I had the honour to ask permission; as a preliminary measure, to deal with the Rer Ali. Men, transport, and supplies were concentrated at Hargeisa, and two sections of riflemen were sent 50 miles southwards to observe the border. You were unable, however, at this time on political grounds, to sanction an advance across our border.

25. The Gadabursi, whose Chiefs had promised to produce a contingent of horsemen, failed to do so, although Mr. Keyser, His Majesty's Consul at Zeyla, used every endeavour to induce them to come forward. The tribes in this part of the Protectorate had not suffered from the Mullah's raids, and being of separate origin to the Ishak tribes, were not affected by the latter's misfortunes.

26. In order to fill up my mounted branch I found it necessary to apply for sanction to purchase ponies and mount my infantry on them, and even then the Mounted Corps filled up so slowly that it was not complete when the time came for starting. I had to enlist extra infantry to make up the deficit, and also to arrange for getting in tribal horsemen with spears during the progress of operations.

27. A number of spearmen were also enlisted for a Transport Corps. These men were not continuously employed, but were called up for service or discharged as found necessary.

Their duties were mainly connected with the charge and protection of captured live-stock sent back from the front, and a certain number assisted the transport riflemen, and were utilized as spies and for reconnoitring work at a distance from the field columns.

The men for the greater part received no pay, but were given a bonus out of the live-stock captured from the enemy.

28. By the middle of January, when the first British Officers began to arrive on the coast, 600 men had already been raised, and the detachments at Hargeisa and Adadleh were considerably strengthened.

29. These arrangements not only kept matters quiet after the departure of the regulars, but, owing to the exaggerated reports of our strength which reached the Mullah, he became apprehensive of raids by our levies and tribes on his own live-stock, and so confined himself to looking to his own protection, and abandoned the idea of making any further organized attacks upon our border.

30. Altogether 21 Officers joined me, viz., 1 Major, 6 Captains, 1 Medical Officer, and 13 Subalterns.

When the levy was sanctioned no local military establishments existed with the exception of the Coast Police, of whom some forty men were available for the charge of sections.

Likely men of the levy were made acting Non-commissioned Officers, and taught by four Indian havildars lent me from Aden. The latter returned to India when the Somalis were sufficiently advanced to take charge of sections.

31. The infantry was divided into two corps of 500 men each, and the camelry and mounted infantry formed one corps.

The Mounted Corps was commanded by Major Beynon, D.S.O., Indian Staff Corps, and he was assisted by Captain Bruce, Royal Field Artillery, who had charge of the camel corps, and Captain Merewether, Indian Staff Corps, commanding the mounted infantry.

The two infantry corps were respectively commanded by Captain Phillips, Royal Engineers,

and Captain McNeill, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.

32. Captain Friederichs, Royal Engineers, was appointed Adjutant, Lieutenant Byrne, Transport Officer, and Lieutenant Dickinson, Quartermaster.

Ressaldar Musa Farah raised and commanded one of the mounted infantry companies, and besides, acted as Ressaldar Major to the force. Owing to his intimate knowledge of Somali customs and his influence with the tribes, I placed under his charge the arrangements for tribal scouting work.

33. Spies and strong patrols were sent 100 miles south to report on the Mullah's movements, and to capture prisoners and so obtain information. A number of the Mullah's spies were caught and caravans taking supplies to him were captured.

34. The Rer Guled of the Eidegalla were at this time trafficking with the Mullah, and being an Ishak tribe in the midst of our own people, it was necessary to coerce them into good behaviour.

Ressaldar Musa Farah by a rapid march with two sections succeeded in capturing and bringing in some of the chief men, and these I found it convenient to attach to the expedition as a guarantee for the tribe's good behaviour. This measure allayed the anxiety of the levies as to the safety of their flocks during their absence.

The Eidegalla behaved well, and I was able, at the end of operations, to express my satisfaction by making them a substantial present out of the captured camels.

35. In February, owing to the Hardiggit pool drying up, the Mullah was compelled to shift quarters, and consequently withdrew to the southern edge of the Haud desert, to a pool of water called Mersin.

36. The Abyssinians, after the Mullah's attack on their post at Jig-Jiga, recognized the gravity of the danger to their position amongst the Mahommedan tribes at Harrar, and decided to address the British Government with a view to a joint expedition.

37. In January a force of Abyssinians, which eventually reached 15,000 men, was sent down to the western edge of the Haud, from Jig-Jiga towards Gerlogubi, with orders to block that side of the country to the Mullah and prevent any chance of his combining with the Ogaden tribes, with whom Colonel Ternan's expedition was at this time dealing.

38. In February, owing to the operations of the Abyssinians, the Mullah found it necessary to leave Mersin. He had attempted to combine the Ogaden against them, but these tribes having been badly treated by him, would not now help, and on the punishment of one of their outlying sections by the Abyssinians, the Mullah found himself compelled to retire eastward to Bohotele to our Dolbahanta tribes, his own kinsmen, who have always proved to be the backbone of his following.

39. Shipments of ammunition began to arrive at Berbera on the 10th January, and were followed by the rifles on the 7th February.

40. The newly raised levies were put to the work of unloading, and earned commendation by their willingness to perform fatigue work, to which, until then, they had been totally unused, and which is generally disliked by Somalis.

41. All Officers worked well together and recruiting, training, equipment, and musketry instruction were quickly pushed forward.

42. A credit was afforded me on the Berbera Treasury, and all camels, ponies, supplies, and articles purchased locally were paid for on the spot in cash.

Later on an account was opened with the Aden branch of the National Bank of India, in order to enable me to pay by cheque for debts incurred on account of transit charges and local purchases.

Small advances of pay were made to the men in order to provide for the maintenance of their families during their absence in the interior.

43. Messrs. Cowasji Dinshaw Brothers transhipped all stores and brought them in their steamers to the coast. They performed this work well. Some delay was caused by stores being, through error, overcarried to Ceylon.

44. The men learnt to shoot quickly, and in a competition held at Burao in May actually shot better than the Punjabi detachment. Their volleys at 600 and 800 yards were well directed and fire discipline became good.

45. Buglers quickly learnt the few calls I found it necessary to teach them.

46. The fifty Punjabis, who had been sent for from India to act as havildars, drill instructors, and Maxim gun detachments, unfortunately arrived on the coast only on the eve of the expedition leaving Burao, when I had been compelled to do what I could with such scanty material as was available in the shape of police on the coast.

47. I therefore decided to keep them as a separate body and the Somalis were allowed to continue their work, the three Maxim guns, which had been fitted to riding camels, being managed entirely by them, under the direction of Lieutenants Thorpe and Lamprey.

48. Whilst enlistment was going on there was much sickness in the low coast region, and over 300 men had to be discharged and other men enlisted instead.

The want of grazing also caused much difficulty. The camels as quickly as they were purchased were sent up-country with supplies, and then had to be driven out to the grazing grounds some 40 miles distant from the interior levy posts.

49. The rains which should ordinarily have fallen in the first week in April were insufficient to bring out the grass, and a bad drought followed during April and May. All animals had therefore to be constantly on the move, roaming about in search of food, and it became necessary to detach numerous parties of the levy to guard them. Even with the greatest care over 100 died and the remainder became so debilitated as to compel a postponement of the advance.

50. On the Mullah's move eastward from Mersin to the Dolbahanta country, a corresponding change of base on our part became necessary.

51. In April men and stores were shifted, partly with our own transport and partly with hired animals from Adadleh to Burao. The latter place was quite bare and the animals had therefore to be brought back some 40 miles to graze at Eyl-Humma.

52. A defensible post was made at Burao and strengthened with barbed wire, and supply caravans were sent up from Berbera by the direct route over the Sheikh Pass. The reserve ammunition at the Adadleh block-house was, for safety, moved to Burao.

The tribes at this time of the year require all their transport animals in order to shift their encampments when changing round in search of grass; moreover, their animals equally with ours were dying for the want of food. Much time was consequently taken up at Adadleh in interviews with tribal Elders, who, however, eventually did what they were asked to do in the way of supplying transport.

53. Supplies were calculated on the assumption that the force would require twenty days' food carried for it forward from Burao, plus twelve days' live-stock.

Besides this a month's rations was to be held in reserve at Burao, and another month's food was to be sent up to Burao from Berbera during the progress of operations.

All the supplies sent up by me in December and January were consumed during the time occupied by the organization and training of the levies.

Lieutenant Murray was directed to take charge of the supplies at Burao.

54. The mounted infantry ponies were grazed at the foot of the Golis range, where the only suitable grass for horses at this time was to be found.

55. Whilst the movement to Burao was in progress steps were taken to stop the Mullah's sources of information. His spies in the Ishak country were either captured or driven away; caravans taking stores to the Mullah were apprehended within a radius of 60 miles, and a body of his scouts were surprised 30 miles south of Burao near Idoweina.

Caravans coming in from the interior to Berbera were, as a rule, not interfered with, as it was not desirable or necessary to stop trade; moreover, I derived much useful information from them.

Our own spies penetrated to the Rer Hagar Dolbahanta encampments at Ainabba and Balliwein, 75 miles south of Burao, and strong patrols acting on their information captured prisoners in the enemy's country, who supplied us with information. Some of these prisoners, after being misled as to our real line of advance were allowed to escape at night, in order to return to the Mullah and deceive him. In order to assist in this object the Dolbahanta tribes at Bohotele were ordered to have sheep ready for the consumption of the force at Bohotele.

56. A number of donkeys were purchased to assist in hospital transport and to be at the disposal, for riding purposes, of twenty selected Punjabis whom I had decided to take on from Burao to my advanced field base.

57. The rest of the Punjabis I left in the Burao post, as their slower rate of marching, and the amount of water and supplies which they would have required, would have considerably hampered our movements.

58. Captain Phillips, who commanded at Burao, took the opportunity afforded by the delay caused by the postponement of the rains to perfect his men in musketry practice, and you were pleased to inspect the men and commend the progress made.

59. About this time, whilst I was at Eyl-Humma, the expedition had the misfortune to lose Lieutenant de Sausmarez, King's Royal Rifles, who died from an accidental gun-shot wound. The circumstances of the case were fully reported to you by a Board of Inquiry, assembled by my orders at Burao.

Lieutenant de Sausmarez was one of the most promising Officers, very popular with both Officers and men, and had just come up from South Africa where he had been in action with his regiment on Waggon Hill.

60. Your orders were to capture or defeat the Mullah and to put an end to his influence in the Dolbahanta country.

It was borne in mind, that once the expedition started, no support could be given from the rear.

61. In Somaliland, life revolves round the camel. The people live on the milk for the greater part of the year, and without the camel

the best grazing grounds distant from water, would be unattainable, for sheep have to be kept near the wells. Without the camel the bulk of the people could not exist.

62. In forming plans of attack, therefore, it was important to bear in mind that if the flocks and herds of the enemy could be captured the men would inevitably be compelled either to make terms or to collect to attack the expedition.

63. The all-important point was to march faster than the enemy and be able to surprise him, instead of his surprising us. Slow movement meant the possibility of attack by overwhelming masses of the enemy who would have had time to collect, and safety lay in rapidity of action, and consequent disorganization of the enemy's plans.

64. The Mullah's force was reported to consist of some 5,000 men, the greater part of whom were horsemen, and he probably had some 600 rifles. The tribes on whom he might draw for support probably mustered another 20,000, but these were not able to gather together for more than a day or two owing to the want of grazing for their numerous ponies.

In addition, doubtful tribes, who would probably have joined the Mullah in case of our suffering a reverse, possibly had some 60,000 spearmen, and the Mijertein tribes within the Italian sphere of influence, most of whom, however, were too distant to help the Mullah, had been estimated by the Resident at Aden at from 60,000 to 70,000 men.

65. His Majesty's Consul-General had sent out Proclamations informing tribes that only those who continued to assist the Mullah would be considered hostile to us, and warning them that tribes as a whole would be held responsible for the acts of individuals.

I gave hostile tribes frequent opportunities of making their submission, and later on, after every action, captured chiefs were sent to them to explain that, provided they left the Mullah, we would cease to be hostile.

66. It was intended to march direct on the Mullah wherever the latest information should have located him, and at the same time, by striking out at the hostile tribes on the right and left of the line of march, to drive them back out of touch with him.

I hoped early to capture sufficient live-stock to be able to drop the bulk of my transport at a point within striking distance of the Mullah, and then advance as light as possible by forced marches to the attack.

67. In order to avoid delay, which might have occurred further on, the expedition was divided into two columns, each of which was complete in itself, 200 camels being attached for water alone.

68. The first column, consisting of the bulk of the levy, was under my personal command; it was made as light as possible, and a reserve of rations and live-stock was brought up by the second column, which consisted of some 20 Punjabis and 350 Somali Rifles, with a number of spearmen for transport work, all under Captain McNeill. Both columns were to march and camp together until a favourable opportunity of making a sudden attack on the enemy should present itself, upon which the first column would leave all transport animals, except those necessary for the carriage of water, barbed wire, and wounded men, with the second column, the men relying for their food upon the herds of camels, which could be quickly driven with them.

69. In the middle of May, although Burao was still parched, rain was reported to have fallen sufficiently in the Haud to make a move possible.

70. On the 20th May, therefore, the levies were concentrated with some 800 transport animals at Burao, and the Mounted Infantry and Camel Corps were brought up simultaneously from the Golis range, 45 miles distant.

A new site, commanding the wells, was chosen, and strongly entrenched.

71. On the 22nd, the force, leaving a garrison under three British officers with a month's reserve rations, marched 18 miles to Ber.

72. The order of march was generally an elastic square, transport in the centre, and Mounted Corps half a-day's march ahead, preceded by scouts and spies. Mounted men and detached parties were also sent well out on both flanks and to the rear.

73. At Ber, a check of three days occurred owing to a number of transport spearmen, who were expected to join from the Habr-Toljaala tribe, not turning up.

74. Before leaving Burao, spies and scouts had been sent out to keep two days' march ahead of the columns, and to send back from time to time, such information as they were able to obtain, and to capture prisoners with this object. On leaving Ber on the 25th May last, the information, of which, for some time, we had been in possession that the Mullah was at Yaheyl, having moved there through Bohotele and Lasadar was confirmed.

The Dolbahanta tribes were reported to be much scattered for the want of grazing; the Rer Haggarr and Arasama having gone southward towards Balliwein and Bohotele, and the Jama Siad and Barkad, westward towards the eastern end of the Bur-Dab range.

75. Night marches were made so as to avoid the clouds of dust which would have indicated the march of the column, and a line of advance was chosen to avoid as much as possible dense bush, and bring us between the various sections of the hostile tribes.

76. Eyl-Dab, 72 miles distant from Ber, was reached on the evening of the 28th, in three days' forced marching over the waterless desert; the mounted corps being generally half a-day ahead, and keeping up connection with the scouts further ahead.

77. On the way, the Mullah's stockaded village, and former head-quarters, at Kob-Fardod, was burnt; mosques being spared so as not to offend Mahomedan feeling.

78. The transport, after a little practice, even through thick bush at night, was able to march on a broad front of some six or seven strings of camels.

79. A sufficient supply of water was obtained in the rain-pools at Ber to last the Officers for 100 miles; the water obtainable at Eyl-Dab and Ainabba being only drinkable by Somalis.

80. At Eyl-Dab our scouts had captured a Mullah's caravan and had located the various Dolbahanta tribes.

81. I was anxious to punish the sections of the Mahmud Gerad Dolbahanta who had joined the Mullah, and raided our Habr Taljaala tribes, as the bulk of the tribe was wavering, and it was probable that a sudden blow would decide them to leave the Mullah alone and return north.

The tribe lay generally on the left flank of our line of march, and as there was some danger of its raiding as far as Berbera after we had passed, it was necessary to take steps to prevent this, and so to reassure our men as to the safety of the women and children they had left behind them.

82. Moreover, we wanted live-stock badly so as to be able to leave heavy bags of rice and dates behind. Hearing now from prisoners, that some encampments of the Jama Siad section of the Mahmud Gerad tribe were some 50 miles off, near Muyo, on the left of our line of advance to Yaheyl, I decided the opportunity was favourable, and sent off the mounted corps under Major Beynon to surprise them. The prisoners acted as guides.

83. Simultaneously the infantry of both columns continued its march on the Mullah's position south of Yaheyl, approaching it by an easterly detour which, besides avoiding the dense bush, enabled us to take advantage of the grass plains and to make night marches.

84. The columns reached a pool of rain-water at Samali on the 30th May.

85. News was here brought in that the Mounted Corps had succeeded in surprising the Jama Siad sections of the Mahmud Gerad, and I therefore decided, this being a convenient advanced position, to await here the arrival of the captured herds.

86. A strong zariba, overlooking the wells, was therefore constructed on a low hill which was admirably adapted for defence, and barbed wire was plentifully used to strengthen the work.

Before leaving Samali, being aware that the captured camels and our transport would prove a strong temptation for attack from the enemy, Captain McNeill was directed to double the zariba, and to fill water tanks to use as cover against the enemy's rifle fire. Captain McNeill carried out this work to my entire satisfaction, and the excellent disposition of the Maxim, on a cairn of stones commanding the zariba, afterwards contributed to a large extent to the repulse of the enemy.

87. Sections were sent out to support the incoming Mounted Corps, and these presently arrived with some 300 captured camels, having covered some 90 miles, and driven the hostile section of the Mahmud Gerad in flight northwards, thus separating them from the Mullah.

88. In consequence of this action the Mahmud Gerad, who aggregate some 20,000 men, now, with the exception of the most southern and easterly clan, the Nur Ahmed, sent in deputations to make terms, and bound themselves to oppose the Mullah.

89. It was foreseen that the Mullah would now be compelled to meet us, or lose all prestige with the tribes.

90. Captain McNeill was left with the second column and details of the first column, aggregating some 370 rifles and 70 spearmen, a few tribal horsemen being attached for the purpose for keeping him informed of the approach of the enemy, and for rounding in the camels if suddenly attacked.

91. The twenty Punjabis, who had so far accompanied the column, were left here in order to still further reduce transport and increase rapidity of movement. They were unable to live on meat alone, like the Somalis.

92. On the 2nd June, when the ponies of the mounted infantry had had a day's rest after their hard work, and when all was ready, the first column, leaving behind all surplus rations, and taking only water and hospital camels, and driving eating camels for rations, moved on to Weyla Hedd, to which place the Mullah had by this time transferred his head-quarters. The direct route through the difficult Higlale Pass, where an attack under unfavourable conditions for us might take place, was not used, the open plains eastward towards Tifaleh being traversed.

The events which followed are already described in my despatches of the 13th and 21st June.

93. The Mullah, compelled to act, owing to the clamours of his Jama Siad allies, whose camels had been seized by the mounted infantry, advanced with some 5,000 horse and foot from Ano Hadigle, 80 miles through the Hig'ole Pass, and, avoiding the stronger column, attacked Captain McNeill's post on the 2nd and 3rd June.

94. His attacks were bold and persistent but were beaten off by Captain McNeill with a loss to the enemy, which I do not think can have fallen far short of 600 casualties. Over 180 dead bodies were found in the immediate vicinity of the zariba, and the first column afterwards continually came across dead bodies and wounded men.

Captain McNeill has already submitted you, direct, a full report.

95. In attempting to return to Ano Hadigle the Mullah was compelled to pass through Odogoi, where the column under my command had by now cut him off from his base. His retreat was converted into a rout, and his people scattered in all directions and fled into the Haud.

96. The Mullah himself, having continual changes of horses, was able to escape with great difficulty, after a pursuit which was carried on through night and day and was not discontinued until his people had been driven over 150 miles away from Captain McNeill's zariba.

His scattered forces, utterly demoralized by continual losses due to our rifle fire, crossed the Italian border, and, dropping various articles everywhere in the bush, did not stop until they had crossed the Haud waterless desert, many dying of thirst on the way, and many prisoners falling into our hands.

97. Owing to our ponies having been ridden to a standstill and to the large percentage of deaths which had occurred amongst them, and to the fact that I could not cross the Haud until I had obtained more water tins from my advanced base at Samali, I found it necessary to postpone further pursuit.

98. The Mullah had taken refuge with Sultan Othman Mahmud's people at Mudug, and before making arrangements to cross the waterless desert to attack him it was incumbent on me, Sultan Othman Mahmud being an Italian protégé to refer to Government for instructions.

99. The delay, which must occur before an answer could be received, was utilized by me in connecting up with Captain McNeill, 96 miles westward at Lasadar, and in dealing with the hostile tribes, who furnished the Mullah with fighting men.

100. The Allegiri, Arasama, Rer Haggar, and other tribes were surprised in various localities and severely punished. They were driven southwards into the dense thornbush of the Haud desert beyond Kurmis, and were kept on the run by detached columns.

Over 14,000 camels, 1,000 cattle, and 30,000 sheep fell into our hands, and presently, owing to our holding the only watering places on the north of the Haud, the tribes came in and surrendered unconditionally.

101. These operations had involved forced marches by night and by day, of some 30 miles, through very dense bush, as much as 40 miles and over being frequently covered on days of actual conflict.

The head-quarters alone had covered, from Beretaleh, where the Mullah's pursuit was discontinued, to Kurmis, over 180 miles, and detached columns had, after that, steadily worked over an area of 1,600 square miles.

102. I tried whilst at Kurmis to communicate with the Abyssinian force operating on the western side of the Haud, but my scouts returned from Gerlogubi, and reported that the Abyssinians had gone south-westward to try to obtain food, and had then marched back to Harrar.

I received a letter from the Abyssinian Commander by a roundabout way, asking for instructions, but it was too late to assist him, and many men died for want of food.

103. In the meantime the Mullah, who had succeeded in getting together his more fanatical followers* at Mudug, being threatened from the south by Sultan Yusif Ali, of Obbia, and finding his retreat to the Allegiri country blocked by my levies, came north again across the Haud to the neighbourhood of Beretaleh in British territory.

104. As it was important to give him no time to re-establish his authority with the tribes, I decided to transport my force once more across the breadth of the Dolbahanta country and attack him.

105. I received your orders of recall when I had come up with his rearguard, near Cour-Gerad. I was now over 340 miles from the coast, with no support nearer than Burao, 150 miles distant. To retire before an active enemy, through a country teeming with possible enemies, would have been very dangerous, and I had no option but to first proceed and break up the Mullah's force.

106. We arrived at Cour-Gerad after an 18-mile march at sunset of the 16th instant, and scouts who had been sent ahead, having located the Mullah at Ferdiddin, some 14 miles eastward, I decided to continue my march the same night so as to attack him at dawn.

107. There was no moon, so, in order to enable us to get through the bush, only Maxim, hospital, and water camels were taken forward, some 16 animals all told. All the rest of the transport was left at Cour-Gerad in a strong zariba.

108. The column had been reduced owing to the necessity of detaching parties to escort captured animals and prisoners back to Burao, to about 700 rifles, 100 of whom had to be left to guard the transport at Cour-Gerad.

The mounted branch numbered only about 75 men, and there were in addition from 350 to 400 Dolbahanta tribal horsemen upon whom no reliance was to be placed.

109. We started at midnight preceded by scouts, and by dawn had descended into a shallow, bush-covered valley.

110. Some prisoners were here captured. They reported the Mullah's villages to be just beyond a spur on the right of the valley, about three miles distant. The Mounted Corps was sent forward at a trot to reconnoitre and report. The formation of attack was as follows:—

The Headquarter Escort (Camel Corps), in the centre, with Lieutenant Dickinson's company as a reserve; the 1st Corps under Captain Phillips on the right flank to crown the hills, and the 2nd Corps under Captain McNeill to keep on the left over the plain. All units were warned to keep well in touch of the centre, and not to be led into disorganized pursuit.

111. The small Mounted Corps, some seventy-five men all told, under Major Beynon, under whom were Captain Friederichs and Lieutenant Walshe, soon rounded the spur some two miles ahead, followed by 350 tribal Dolbahanta horsemen, and the Headquarter Camelry Escort was moved up as a link to connect with the column.

* These men were called Derawsh (Dervishes), and were under oath to fight for their religion.

Heavy firing commenced almost immediately behind the spur and along the hills above, and the Dolbahanta horsemen at once galloped back.

112. Recognizing that the mounted branch must be more heavily engaged than I had intended I directed the reserve company, under Lieutenant Dickinson, to get to the edge of the spur, whence a commanding fire could be brought to bear on the enemy in the plain, the rest of the troops to extend and follow quickly in the order I had previously intimated.

113. Lieutenant Dickinson's men doubled over the intervening two miles and seized the spur, suffering somewhat from the fire of the enemy on the commanding hills beyond. Assisted by the fire of the Headquarter Escort, however, that portion of the enemy which was in the bush in the plains, and was then attacking Major Beynon's Mounted Corps was checked, and the latter were able to fall back on the spur. A number of our men were killed and wounded, Lieutenant Dickinson being among the latter, and the Maxim camels and some ponies were shot down. Our Somalis, however, clung steadily to the spur, and even managed of their own accord, to disentangle the Maxims from the dead camels and bring them into action on commanding ground.

114. The advance of Captain Phillips' corps over the hills on the right brought a considerable volume of fire to bear on the enemy in this direction, and the Dervishes were compelled to take cover and fire from behind boulders and bushes. Lieutenant Stigaud's company, which was on the extreme right, presently outflanked the enemy, and compelled him to retire. The Dervishes lost so heavily directly they left cover that the retirement became a rout, and they gave way all along the line.

Immediately the enemy's attention was taken up by the 1st Corps, Lieutenant Dickinson's men went forward, under a native Officer, and, descending at a run down the further side of the spur, drove the enemy from the hills beyond.

115. In the meantime, the 2nd Corps, advancing steadily on the left, drove back that portion of the enemy which had been engaged with the Mounted Corps, and, moving fast through the bush-covered plain, outflanked the enemy on the left. The enemy mounted their ponies and galloped into the bush, continually losing men by our rifle fire.

The pursuing force reached the Mullah's village and burnt it, and drove the enemy for five miles or so through the dense bush. The enemy tried here and there to stand, but could not face our fire, and suffered considerable loss.

116. The Dolbahanta horsemen, on whom I had placed no reliance, took no further part in the fight, but galloped away to loot the Mullah's flocks and herds.

117. Captain Friederichs had been killed at the commencement of the action. He had been sent forward by Major Beynon with some of the Mounted Corps to act as an advance party, and, seeing the enemy on the hills some distance to his front, and concluding that the plain was clear of them, he had advanced into some very dense bush where an ambush had been laid. Immediately firing broke out, Major Beynon moved up, dismounted, in support; but nearly half his camels and ponies were almost immediately shot, and the enemy's riflemen, increasing in numbers at every moment, advanced, completely outflanking the Mounted Corps on both flanks.

118. Major Beynon then directed a retirement. Owing to the loss of their mounts, the men could not get away without suffering loss in killed and wounded, and the loss would have been much

heavier had not Lieutenant Dickinson's company and the 1st Corps just then checked the enemy, as previously described, by firing from the spur.

119. On the enemy's pursuit being continued, he fled south, across the Italian border, into the dense bush of the Haud, leaving dead and wounded everywhere, and scattering in all directions.

The pursuit having resulted in somewhat disorganizing, in the dense bush, the cohesion of our levies, Captain McNeill, who, owing to the easier ground over which he had advanced, had got ahead of the 1st Corps, decided to make a check, in order to reorganize. He was joined by a company of the 1st Corps, under Lieutenant Stigaud, which had, by Captain Phillips' order, assisted in the pursuit, wheeling round from the right flank.

120. We were at this time nearly 50 miles distant from our last watering-place, and there was no water nearer than Beretableh. The water-tanks with Lieutenant Taylor at Cour-Gerad were nearly empty, and the men had used up the water they carried themselves. Only six camel-loads of water remained for the wounded men. The ponies and camels of the Mounted Corps had had no water since the evening before, and then only a limited quantity, and many ponies and camels had been killed or wounded by the enemy's rifle fire. The Dolbahanta horsemen, moreover, had been useless, and had cleared off.

121. I, therefore, with great regret, being also in some anxiety as to my wounded men, found myself compelled to abandon the pursuit, and so, after giving the men a few camels for their meal, we collected and buried the dead, and, having arranged for the carriage of the wounded, we returned the same evening (14 miles), arriving at nightfall at the zariba at Cour-Gerad.

122. The men had, from midnight on the 16th to midnight on the 17th, marched 40 miles, subsisting only on the water they carried, and had fought an action in dense bush and over stony hills.

123. The Mullah's own kinsmen, the backbone of his following, had been very severely handled; over 60 dead bodies were counted on the ground and the pursuit came across many more; a large number of Sheiks and well-known men were amongst the dead. The Mullah's people never stayed their flight into the waterless desert for five days, and few reached the wells of Mudug and Bia-Aun alive, numbers dying of thirst by the way. The Mullah himself, his son, and his Chief Adviser, Haji Soudi,* were reduced to making use of the water found in the stomachs of dead camels. His chained prisoners escaped and his supporters scattered in all directions seeking their own safety.

The Mullah's cattle and the camels of Haji Soudi were captured.

124. There being no water at Cour-Gerad we continued the march, at dawn of the 10th, down a steep ravine to the plain below, marching on a made road, possibly of Phœnician or Indian origin. We reached Eyl-Maado, our first watering-place since Lasa Eyl-Birdale, some 80 miles back, at mid-day on the 18th. Here a halt of half a day was made in order to fill water-tanks, and enable Lieutenant Boulton, Indian Medical Staff, to look after his wounded, and in order to reconnoitre Beretableh, where a detached portion of the Mullah's force, which had

* Haji Soudi is an ex-inte pier of the Royal Navy. He had been at Suakin, and was conversant with Dervish ways and had imported many of their customs.

Sultan Nur is the disgraced Sultan of the Habr-Yunis-Ishak tribe, and is an outcast from his tribe.

not taken part in the fight, was reported to be. The horsemen sent out by me, however, reported that these men had fled.

125. Marching some 20 to 25 miles a day, we connected up with Lieutenant H. du B. O'Neill's advanced base at Tifafleh, and thence marched to Burao via Eyl-Dab, going through the site of Captain McNeill's zariba at Samala.

At Eyl-Dab the column was met on the morning of the 24th June by a party of the mounted branch, which had returned from Burao under Captains Merewether and Bruce.

126. There was no good drinking water for Europeans for some 150 miles or so, from Asura to Burao, but the Somalis managed to get water at Eyl-Dab, from which place they easily crossed the 95 miles to Burao on the water they themselves carried, supplemented by a few tanks. We carried water in tanks for the horses and captured live-stock, and by sending them on by night in small batches, managed to supplement the supply out of the almost dry wells at Olasar, 70 miles from Burao.

127. The wounded were brought back some 340 miles to the coast on camels, or on stretchers carried by prisoners. Only one man died on the way.

128. The expedition returned to Burao on the 29th and 30th July, 1901.

The levies had covered some 1,170 miles in three months, including delays at Burao, and had frequently marched 30 miles a day. On days of action, as at Odogoi, on two occasions in the Arrasama country, at Kurmis, and on several occasions in the Allegiri country, and at Fardiddin, 40 miles had been covered, or over. Besides this, detached sections and companies had traversed an aggregate distance of 1,700 miles, and this does not include the work of parties of scouts and spies, who frequently worked two days ahead of the force.

129. The infantry carried, besides rifle, bayonet, equipment, and 100 rounds of ammunition, two days' rations of dried meat and dates, and a sheep-skin containing about a gallon of water. Blankets and superfluous clothes were left behind at Burao. Every British Officer was mounted.

130. Although the men in some cases were excited in action, they soon settled down to work, and on no occasion did the loss caused by the enemy's rifle fire affect them so as to cause them to hesitate in their advance. At Fardiddin the Somalis, of their own initiative, extricated the Maxims from the dead camels and worked them, paying proper attention to sights and trial shots. They took up new positions whenever the advance of the infantry rendered this desirable. In the same action, the Mounted Corps, which had suffered severely in men and animals, was ordered to temporarily fall back on the infantry, but advanced again with them directly a forward move was made.

131. No attempt had been made to teach the men, in the limited time available, anything except to generally obey orders, to shoot, and to learn the formations and movements necessary for general cohesion. They could march well, and being all more or less used to intertribal fighting, they quickly adapted themselves to our tactics. They understood the care and loading of transport animals, could live on meat alone, and could easily go for two days, subsisting only on the water they themselves carried.

I found no difficulty in at once finding as many riders as were necessary to utilize such ponies as we were able to buy or capture.

Some difficulty occurred at the start owing to there being no Non-commissioned Officers or

training staff available, the men we eventually used for this purpose being merely coast policemen, some of whom had less than a year's service. The men learned fast, however, and directly Non-commissioned Officers began to come forward from amongst them, there was no further trouble.

132. It was not advisable, nor was it necessary, to dragoon the levies, whose mobility was, to a great extent, the outcome of their being an irregular corps. I had, whilst in the Uganda Rifles, some opportunity of contrasting Somalis with Soudanese, and I found the Somalis in the main perhaps easier to manage.

133. Provided the men are treated with the same consideration as is used in the native army in India, they will readily respond by doing their best. It was unfortunate that many of the Officers could only communicate with their men through interpreters who, in some cases, were prone to make the most of their position.

The levies were placed under the Burmah Military Police Regulations and Somaliland Order in Council of 1899. There was very little crime, and the punishments, which it was found necessary to inflict in a few serious cases of plundering, having been very severe, a stop was at once put to anything of the kind.

134. The fever from which both British men and Officers suffered, whilst in the low-lying coast country, disappeared when once the force had left Burao, and the percentage of sickness was then very small. One or two officers suffered from the want of vegetables, but the men were not affected.

135. The total number of casualties inflicted on the enemy at McNeill's zariba and in the subsequent pursuit in the Arrasama and the Allegiri country, and at Fardiddin, cannot have fallen far short of some 1,200 men killed and wounded. Some 800 prisoners, including many Chiefs and many Headmen, who were, for the most part, afterwards released, were also taken.

136. The camels were either given as compensation to the Ishak tribes who had been looted by the Mullah, or were handed over to the men, with their consent, in lieu of pay, thus reducing the cost of the expedition. A large number of transport spearmen were paid entirely in camels, and wounded men, and the relatives of the dead, were in the same manner compensated. Compensation was given for all tribal horses killed, and others were purchased from the tribes in exchange for camels. All casualties in the transport were made good, and friendly tribes were given a bonus for services rendered. The Field Force for some time lived entirely on its captures.

The sheep and milch goats, excepting a small percentage of the former, eaten by the force, were returned to the enemy's women and children. No person who applied for relief was turned away.

Thus, at the end of operations, our tribes had regained at least a good proportion of the losses previously sustained by them. All services had been paid for, and our transport and Mounted Corps had been put on a proper footing. In spite of nearly the whole of our horses having been killed, there were, owing to captures and exchanges in lieu of camels, more left at the end of operations than there were at the beginning.

137. In November the Mullah was still quiescent, and although he had received consignments of arms, he had not been able to collect more than some 500 men or so, his former followers having been much discouraged by their wanderings and hardships in the waterless Haud.

138. For a year now he has made no attacks upon our tribes, although in the previous year

when the regular troops were in the country, raids on the tribes, resulting in much bloodshed, had been frequent and had ended in alarming the whole country.

139. The most serious point is the continued importation of arms, and this must sooner or later cause trouble.

140. The Abyssinian co-operation consisted, as arranged, in blocking the western side of the country. They never actually came in touch with the Mullah, nor were they seen by our levies.

141. Major the Honourable A. Hanbury-Tracy, who visited me at Adadleh, and there received my instructions, had, with Captain Cobbold, his companion, a very difficult time with the Abyssinian force, continually requiring the exercise of tact and sound judgment.

142. Mekometers were badly wanted for the Maxims, but none were, unfortunately, available at Benly and Aden, and there was no time at the last to get them from England. The Maxims had a trick of jamming at critical moments, but were quickly set right again. The fault may have been in the belts.

Owing to the swaying pace of the camels and the rocking motion set up, the animals soon had sore sides.

143. Unfortunately, owing to the dust storms and haze which, during April, May, and June prevailed, signalling with 6-inch heliographs was out of the question. Possibly a larger size might have been useful, but none were quickly available.

144. Gun-cotton for enlarging rocky wells, blue lights, and signal rockets were kindly supplied by General More-Molyneux, commanding at Aden.

145. I had ordered from India three months' rations for the Punjabis. Further rations were arranged for by the Indian Commissariat at Aden.

146. The portion of the country over which the fighting took place was unmapped, except in the northern portion; by Major Welby's compass route, and as we did not march along this but crossed and recrossed it, we had to rely entirely upon native information.

147. Our guides were fairly accurate in the northern part of the country, but got hopelessly adrift in the country where we got in touch of the Mullah, and we had consequently to do the best under the circumstances, and rely on capturing prisoners and getting information from them. Marches were set by compass bearing, and at night we marched by the stars.

148. Lieutenant Boulton, Indian Medical Staff, was assisted by two Indian hospital assistants.

149. Up to April the native armourers who happened to be available on the coast, attended to the rifles, but in April a British Armourer Sergeant was sent to me. A number of iron-workers had been enlisted and proved most useful in executing minor repairs.

Commendations. British Officers.

It now remains to bring forward the names of such Officers and others, as, in my opinion, merit special commendation. As it was usual, after successful actions, for the expedition to be split up into detached columns, which pushed the pursuit of the enemy in every direction, the same Officers were called on again and again to take independent charge of units.

Captain and Brevet Major W. G. L. Beynon, D.S.O., Indian Staff Corps, raised and equipped a

detachment of fifty Punjabi Mahommedans in India and brought them to the Somali Coast. He was appointed Second in Command, and was given the control of the Mounted Corps consisting of camelry and mounted infantry.

He had previously served under my orders in Somaliland, and the knowledge there acquired by him of the country and people, made him especially useful to me. He was in command of the levies sent out to capture the Jaima Siad camels, and was with his corps during the pursuit of the Mullah, and afterwards on many detached pursuits. His loyal support, backed up by sound judgment, was of great help to me.

Captain G. E. Phillips, Royal Engineers, is a thoroughly reliable and capable Officer. Owing to his powers of organization his corps quickly reached a high state of efficiency, considering the short time available for training. He soon got influence over the men, who were ready at all times to respond to any call made upon their powers of endurance. A very good Officer.

Captain M. McNeill, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, commanded the 2nd Infantry Corps. He was in command of the zariḃa at Samali, the persistent attacks on which, directed by the Mullah in person, were successfully beaten off with such loss in killed and wounded to the enemy, as to thoroughly demoralize him. The position was one of great responsibility, and I do not think any Officer could have done better. His coolness and judgment, on this occasion, gave confidence to his men, and thoroughly justified my confidence in him.

I desire especially to bring him to your notice.

Captain A. G. G. Sharp, East African Regiment, joined the expedition in time to take part in the march to, and action at, Fardiddin. On the death of Captain Friederichs, Royal Engineers, Captain Sharp was appointed Adjutant. I consider him a thoroughly capable Officer, methodical, and understanding how to deal with natives. From the commencement he earned their liking and respect. He has already served the Foreign Office for four years in Nyasaland, East Africa, and Uganda, and has been mentioned in despatches.

Captain C. M. D. Bruce, Royal Field Artillery, commanded and raised the Camel Corps. His knowledge of mounted work proved most useful. He is active and tireless. He had trying work in escorting the undisciplined hired caravans from Berbera to Burao, but managed very well through hard work and patience.

Captain D. A. Friederichs, Royal Engineers was my Adjutant. He was untiring in his work, which was heavy. A very keen and clever Officer, who lost his life in pluckily trying to save a wounded Somali Non-commissioned Officer. Had he lived I would have brought his services specially to your notice.

Lieutenant F. A. Dickinson, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, was appointed Quartermaster. He managed his company well, and was severely wounded when leading his men over a hill swept by the enemy's fire. He continued pluckily to move up and down the firing line, looking after his men for some time after he had been wounded, and his action contributed in a great measure to extricate the Mounted Corps from a difficult situation.

Lieutenant H. Boulton, Indian Medical Service, had sole medical charge of an expedition, which at one time, if we include transport spearmen and others, consisted of 2,500 men. He was assisted by no other medical Officer, and his work at Fardiddin, under fire, was heavy. He brought back the wounded some 340 miles to the coast, only losing one man.

Lieutenant J. C. Lamprey, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, defended an outlying corner in the camel zariba at the time of the Mullah's attacks on Captain McNeill's zariba at Somali. He only had a dozen men with him, and the fighting was hand to hand. Lieutenant Lamprey's gallant behaviour materially helped to beat off attacks, which were continued until some time after nightfall.

Native Officers, &c.

Ressaldar Musa Farah has served Government for some 13 years. He is thoroughly trustworthy, and the most intelligent Somali I have met, and far above the average of Indian native officers. He has more influence in the country than any tribal Chief, and has frequently been employed on detached work, where his tact, judgment, and firmness have always insured satisfactory results. He is tireless in the saddle, and got the utmost out of the company of mounted infantry he commanded. He was conspicuously brought to my notice for gallantry in action at Fardicdiu by the Officer Commanding the Mounted Corps.

Besides the Officers who actually took part in the expedition, I would like to bring to your notice the names of two Officers employed on a detached expedition which co-operated with my levies.

Brevet Major the Honourable A. H. C. Hanbury-Tracy, Royal Horse Guards, was deputed to accompany the Abyssinian force, and reported himself to me for instructions at Adadleh on the 29th March last.

He had a very responsible position, and both he and his companion, Captain R. P. Cobbold, Reserve of Officers, were frequently in very difficult and dangerous situations, calling for the exercise of tact and sound judgment. I desire to bring the services of these Officers to your special notice.

I would respectfully submit that, if the work done by the expedition under my command meet with your approval, the question of granting a medal and clasp and batta be taken into consideration.

I would beg to offer you my best thanks for your valuable assistance and advice, and to bring to your notice the thorough manner in which Mr. Cordeaux, His Majesty's Vice-Consul at Bebera, has at all times helped me.

Despatch relating to Field operations.

MY LORD.—As your Lordship is aware, the raids of the Suk and Turkana people on the peaceful inhabitants dwelling under British protection on the shores of Lake Baringo, obliged us to establish a post in the Suk country under Mr. H. H. Baker, and finally in the early part of the present year to send a strong military expedition, commanded by Captain E. H. Gorges, Manchester Regiment, to punish the Suk and Turkana tribes for their raids, and to relieve Mr. H. Baker's post in the Ribo Hills, which had been cut off from communications with the Eldama Ravine. The expedition consisted of two companies of the Uganda Rifles, 500 Masai irregulars, and 100 Masai from Enjámusi, one of the raided districts which had suffered most severely from an unprovoked attack on the part of the Turkana. Captain W. E. Rumbold, Royal Artillery, was second in command; Dr. Drake Brockman accompanied the expedition as Medical Officer, and Mr. Macallister (Collector for the Mau District) went as Political Officer, and also from his knowledge of the Masai language was of great assistance in controlling the Masai irregulars.

The expedition started from the Eldama Ravine on the 9th of January, 1901, and after proceeding through the Enjámusi country round Lake Baringo reached the Ribo post on the 16th of January. A certain amount of fighting took place with hostile Suk people before the post was reached, but no casualties occurred to the expedition beyond a few wounds from poisoned arrows, which were subsequently healed. Arrived at

Ribo post, the expedition split up into two columns, under the respective commands of Captain Gorges and Captain Rumbold. These columns operated in the direction shown on the accompanying sketch map.* Very drastic punishment was inflicted on the Japtaleil, and on the hostile section of the Suk people; also on the Kivas, Ndai, and Magurok tribes, some of whom are included under the general designation of "Turkana." About 300 of the enemy lost their lives. Over 500 of their cattle, nearly 10,000 of their sheep and goats, and 77 donkeys were captured. The villages of the hostile tribes were destroyed, and the supplies of grain stored in them were used to ration the troops. The enemy fought with spears and poisoned arrows, and with some of the rifles and ammunition taken from the police who had been killed in the spring of 1900. With the exception of two deaths from pneumonia caused by exposure to the cold, there were no fatal casualties on the side of the expedition, all those persons wounded by spears or poisoned arrows recovering under medical treatment. The Medical Officer in his report on the expedition, specially praises Captain Gorges for his prompt attention and skill in treating those of his men who were wounded by poisoned arrows. His injections of strychnine probably saved their lives. The Medical Officer himself (Dr. Drake Brockman) also, I consider, deserves great praise for his own assiduous attentions to the Europeans and Africans who were sick or wounded during the expedition, the general health of which was satisfactory, in spite of the badness of the drinking water in many places, and the malarial character of the countries traversed.

The expedition returned to the Ravine Station at the beginning of March, Mr. Baker bringing with him a large number of Suk chiefs to treat for peace. To one of these men I returned a small proportion of the captured cattle on the understanding that he would henceforth be friendly to the Administration, and would reside not far from Lake Baringo, where he and his people might be kept under control. I directed that the captured cattle should be employed in the first place to recompense the Enjámusi people to some extent for the raid they had suffered at the hands of the Turkana. Other cattle, and large numbers of sheep and goats were used to pay the Masai and Enjámusi people for their services.

The political results of this expedition have been or are about to be dealt with in other despatches. I have been in telegraphic communication with Colonel Coles, the Commandant of the Armed Forces of the Uganda Protectorate, and that Officer is of opinion uncommon with myself that Captain Gorges deserves great praise for the manner in which he organized and commanded an expedition which had at short notice to march something like two hundred miles into and out of a very difficult country, but little known to us from any previous survey, in many places without water, and inhabited by tribes who have shown themselves persistently hostile to Europeans, owing to the influence of a large colony of Arab slave-traders established in their midst for some years past. Consequently, Colonel Coles desires me to draw your Lordship's attention to the recommendations which Captain Gorges has made in his Military Report as to the services rendered by Captain W. E. Rumbold (who carried out the work of a separate and subsidiary expedition with marked skill), Mr. Macallister (who commanded and directed the work of the Masai irregulars), Mr. H. Hyde

Baker, Dr. Drake Brockman, and Sergeant D. J. Reilly. I have already mentioned favourably the good work done as Medical Officer by Dr. Drake Brockman. Of Mr. Macallister, Captain Gorges says: "The admirable manner in which the Masai and Gwas 'Ngishu spearmen were handled by Mr. Macallister was most praiseworthy." Captain Gorges in his various reports on the progress of the expedition repeatedly refers in terms of warm commendation to the assistance rendered by the Masai. He says that they acted as a screen round the expedition, so carefully intervening to protect it from the enemy that their action in this respect was the chief cause why so few casualties occurred. Their discipline is spoken of in some passages as "perfect." They did no looting and behaved with great propriety when passing through friendly districts. For my own part, I think no feature of this expedition is more gratifying than the loyal, prompt, and willing assistance rendered by these Masai warriors, who have shown themselves for the past two years consistently loyal, and determined to support the British Administration. Their services in the Nandi campaign have already been mentioned. I hope we may be able to do everything in reason to encourage these fine people to increase and multiply, and settle down in the Eastern Province. The fact that they are quite on our side as regards protecting the game (which they do not care to hunt on their own account) makes them valuable auxiliaries. All they ask for at our hands is permission to graze their cattle and sheep undisturbed. Captain Gorges writes: "My special thanks are due to Mr. Hyde Baker for his work as Political Officer in the Suk country." Mr. Baker is so popular with a proportion of the Suk, and with all the Enjámusi people, that I do not think it was from want of a conciliatory disposition on his part that he suffered so much from the hostility of the Japtaleil and other tribes. He has gleaned during his stay in the country much geographical information of value to us in understanding the features of the Suk district.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to bring to the notice of the Commandant the following act of gallantry performed by Captain Petrie:—

On the 12th June, at 5 A.M., the bivouac of the mutineers was surrounded and rushed by the troops under my command. It lay in a wood on the bank of a broad swamp. The grass was everywhere very tall. A party of mutineers was observed by Captain Petrie to escape down the swamp and enter a dense patch of papyrus. Captain Petrie had only a few men with him at the moment owing to the manner in which his company had lost touch in the tall grass and bad light when the attack was made. The morning was foggy, the sun was not up, the smoke of the bivouac fires and heavy firing mingled with the fog and hung in a dense layer over the swamp, so that nothing could be distinguished clearly. Some individuals were seen to enter the papyrus bed at a certain spot, and Captain Petrie followed them. His party was at once fired at, the shots coming in rapid succession. It was important to kill or capture the mutineers, but Captain Petrie thought that, in the semi-darkness and difficulty of the swamp—a very matted tangle with mud and water reaching to the waist—there was more likelihood of the men shooting each other than the enemy, and that the latter would certainly escape unless the papyrus were closely watched outside. He

therefore came out again, withdrew the five men he had with him, and posted them outside the swamp. He then re-entered the papyrus bed armed with a rifle, and pluckily followed by his orderly, to attack any one whom it might contain. He was continually fired at, but working his way along and shooting when he saw a sign of anything to shoot at, he eventually severely wounded one mutineer, though without knowing it at the time. This man continued to maintain a rapid fire, and Captain Petrie then saw two individuals in front of him. Finally, he succeeded in shooting one (the man already wounded) through the head, exchanging shots at three yards' range and being himself wounded in the chin by the mutineer. The second individual then proved to be a woman, who lying in the mud and water was handing the man cartridges as he fired. Another mutineer was killed by the men outside. I heard the firing and came up on the other side of the swamp, where a number of mutineers were captured and killed, the latter including Farajalla Effendi. I could follow the fight by the smoke rising above the papyrus, but did not know who was inside at the time, though from the rapidity of the firing thought there must be several men pursuing mutineers. Captain Petrie in reporting the incident merely stated that he had shot a mutineer and been slightly wounded himself. But I heard the incident being discussed in camp, as it had evidently impressed every one as a very gallant action of Captain Petrie's. The Soudaese fully appreciated the desperate character of the men he attacked, and the advantage the defender had over the attacker in such a spot as the papyrus swamp. I therefore made inquiries, with the result that the above facts were disclosed.

South African Constabulary	Sergeant James Rogers	On the 15th June, 1901, during a skirmish near Thaba'Nchu, a party of the rearguard of Captain Sitwell's column, consisting of Lieutenant F. Dickinson, Sergeant James Rogers, and 6 men of the South African Constabulary, was suddenly attacked by about 60 Boers. Lieutenant Dickinson's horse having been shot, that Officer was compelled to follow his men on foot. Sergeant Rogers seeing this, rode back, firing as he did so, took Lieutenant Dickinson up behind him, and carried him for half-a-mile on his horse. The Sergeant then returned to within 400 yards of the enemy, and carried away, one after the other, two men who had lost their horses, after which he caught the horses of two other men, and helped the men to mount. All this was done under a very heavy rifle fire. The Boers were near enough to Sergeant Rogers to call upon him to surrender; his only answer was to continue firing.

URBAN DISTRICT OF WALLASEY.

Tramways.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Wallasey Urban District Council, on the seventeenth day of April, 1902, made the following Bye-laws and Regulations pursuant to the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1899:—

Wallasey Tramways.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS made by the Wallasey Urban District Council pursuant to the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1899.

Repeal of former Bye-laws and Regulations.

1. From and after the date of these Bye-laws and Regulations coming into force the Bye-laws, Rules, and Regulations with respect to the tramways within the district of Wallasey made and passed by the Wallasey Local Board at a Meeting of the said Board, held on the 7th day of June, 1883, shall be repealed; but any proceedings pending at the time of such repeal, may be continued and prosecuted as if such repeal had not taken effect.

Application of Bye-laws and Regulations.

2. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Council and to all vehicles authorized by the Council used upon the tramways, and to all places with respect to which the Council have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

Conductor.

3. The word "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Council in connection with their tramways.

Entering and leaving Carriages.

4. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindmost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

Smoking.

5. A passenger shall not smoke inside a carriage, except in a compartment provided for that purpose.

Playing Musical Instruments.

6. A passenger shall not while travelling in or upon any carriage sound or play upon any musical instrument.

Intoxicated Persons.

7. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and, if found in or upon any carriage may be immediately removed by or under the directions of the conductor.

Offensive Language, &c.

8. A person shall not swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

Spitting.

9. A person shall not spit within or upon any carriage.

Damaging Carriages.

10. A person shall not wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number, plate, printed or other notice, or advertisement, in or on any carriage, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to pay the amount of any damage done in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations.

Objectionable Persons.

11. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of the carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor might, for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter in or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from mounting any carriage, and shall not mount any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found upon any carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage, upon the fare (if previously paid) being returned.

Payment of Fares.

12. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, the fare legally demandable for the journey. Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his or her journey. A child under five years of age, who is sitting on the lap of a passenger, shall not be liable to pay a fare provided that this provision shall apply only to one such child accompanying any one passenger. Any additional child irrespective of age, accompanying such person, shall pay the full ordinary fare.

Tickets.

13. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket, or pay the fare legally demanded for the distance travelled over by such passenger. Tickets shall not be transferable, and shall only be available by the car on which they are issued.

Wrongful use of Workmen's Tickets.

14. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1899, or Incorporated Acts, shall not use, or attempt to use, any ticket intended only for artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

Luggage.

15. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers),

shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior, or on the roof of any carriage. The conductor may decline to take into or upon the carriage any luggage, which from its size or otherwise, is not, in the opinion of the conductor, suitable for conveyance in or upon the carriage.

Disabled Cars.

16. If at any time a car becomes disabled, or in any way injured, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon the request of the conductor, leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid. A person shall not, except with the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or injured car.

Time of Journey.

17. The Council shall not be bound to complete any journey in any specific time.

Travelling by Cars proceeding to Sheds.

18. A person shall not travel upon a car which is proceeding to a shed, and is not on its usual journey, unless permitted so to do by the conductor, and where such person is so permitted, he shall pay the usual fare payable for the journey.

Travelling on Steps, &c.

19. A passenger or other person not being a servant of the Council employed in the tramway service, shall not travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage.

Interfering with Bells, Brakes, &c.

20. An unauthorized person travelling in or upon any carriage, shall not wilfully touch, or interfere, or meddle in any way with any bell, or brake, or any other appliance, machinery, or mechanism fixed to, connected with, or in anywise belonging to such carriage.

Passengers only to enter Cars, &c.

21. A person not being a passenger or intending passenger shall not enter or mount any carriage, and a person shall not hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein, otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

Entering full Carriages.

22. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is authorized to carry, an additional person, not being a servant of the Council employed in the tramway service, shall not enter, mount, or remain in, or on any such carriage, when warned by the conductor not to do so.

Mounting or Dismounting from Carriages in Motion.

23. A person shall not enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst it is in motion.

Excess of Passengers.

24. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

Passengers having Infectious Disease.

25. A person afflicted with any infectious or contagious disease shall not mount, enter, or travel on any car, or attempt so to do, and a conductor shall not suffer or permit any such person so to do.

Dogs, &c.

26. A dog or any other animal shall not be allowed in or on any carriage. A person shall

not take a dog or other animal into any carriage, after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal found in or on any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, such dog or other animal may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

Fire-arms.

27. A person shall not travel in or on any carriage whilst in possession of any fire-arm or dangerous articles or things. Provided that nothing contained in this Bye-law shall apply to persons in the Naval, Military, Reserve, or Auxiliary Forces carrying unloaded fire-arms.

Obstructing officials in exercise of duty.

28. A passenger or other person shall not wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Council in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Council.

Power to remove Passenger committing offence.

29. Any person who shall commit, whilst on any car, any offence or any breach of these Bye-laws shall, in addition to being liable to a penalty, be liable to be immediately removed from the car, and if such person shall have paid his fare, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of his fare so paid.

Conductor to enforce Bye-laws.

30. Every conductor shall, to the best of his ability, enforce these Bye-laws and Regulations, and prevent the breach thereof, and if any such conductor fails to enforce the same as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach thereof.

Singular and Plural, Masculine and Feminine.

31. In these Bye-laws the "singular" shall include the "plural," and the "masculine" the "feminine."

Exhibition of Bye-laws.

32. There shall be placed, and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use, a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

Penalty.

33. Any person offending against or committing a breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence.

These Bye-laws and Regulations shall come into force on the 20th day of June, 1902.
