**CORONATION OF THEIR MAJESTIES.
COURT OF CLAIMS.**

THE Right Honourable the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty to hear and determine all Claims of Services to be performed at the time of the ensuing Coronation (except those dispensed with by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th day of June, 1901), and of fees to be received for the same, will meet at the Council Office, Whitehall, on Wednesday, the 14th day of May next, at eleven o'clock of the forenoon, to settle their Report to His Majesty.

The said Commissioners hereby require all persons who may still be desirous of exhibiting Petitions and Claims concerning such Services to make their Petitions or Claims on or before Wednesday, the 7th day of May next.

The said Commissioners at their Meeting held at the Council Office, Whitehall, on the 17th day of July, 1901, resolved as follows:—

1. All claims must be made by Petition. Petitions may be sent under cover to the Clerks of the Court of Claims, Privy Council Office, Whitehall.
2. Petitioners are not required to appear in person before the Court, unless summoned.
3. Petitioners may appear by Solicitors, Agents, or Counsel.
4. If a Claim was admitted in 1838, the Court will forthwith admit such Claim, provided the Commissioners are satisfied that the present Petitioner represents the person whose Claim was admitted in 1838, and that there is no Counter-Claim.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such Claims as may be submitted to them in respect of Rights or Services connected with the parts of the Ceremonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

THE following Despatch has been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa:—

From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-Quarters, South Africa,
SIR, Pretoria, 8th March, 1902.

IN continuation of my despatch of the 8th February, 1902, I have the honour to forward herewith an account of the operations which have taken place since that date:—

1. The constant pressure which has been brought to bear upon the Boers in the Eastern Transvaal during the past three months by General Bruce Hamilton's columns resulted, about the middle of February, in such a complete dispersion of the enemy that it became almost impossible to locate formed bodies of Boers in any part of the district.

So untenable indeed did this portion of the country become for the enemy's commandoes, that General Louis Botha found it necessary, apparently, to quit the district altogether.

On the 13th February he moved south with a considerable following, and, passing through Swaziland, north of the Wakkerstroom—Piet Retief line of blockhouses, made straight for the neighbourhood of Vryheid. His actual motive for making this move must necessarily, at present, be a matter of guess-work. It may have been prompted by a desire to cause fresh unrest in Natal and Zululand, but was more probably the outcome of an urgent need for temporarily disengaging his harassed men from the close and unceasing pursuit to which they have for so long been subjected.

No time was lost, when General Botha's departure from the Eastern Transvaal had been fully verified, in following him up; and General Bruce Hamilton, with the columns under Brigadier-General Spens, Colonels Mackenzie and Allenby, and Lieutenant-Colonel Stewart, marched by Wakkerstroom towards Vryheid in pursuit of the Boer force.

This movement was commenced on 25th February, and on 6th March General Bruce Hamilton reported that he had again recovered touch with the enemy in the neighbourhood of Vryheid.

The troops under Brigadier-General Plumer, Colonel Pulteney and Lieutenant-Colonel Wing remained to operate in the angle formed by the upper waters of the Vaal River and the Standerton—Volksrust Railway, and to continue the pursuit of those Boers who had failed to effect a junction with General Botha when he quitted the district. Some of these men were known to be within the angle just alluded to, and General Plumer and Colonel Wing at once commenced a combined sweep of the country from a line Blaauwkoop—Paardekop right up to the apex of the triangle at Standerton Railway Station.

This movement terminated on the night of 28th February. Only some 40 Boers had been seen, of whom General Plumer's Queenslanders captured 12, and Lieutenant-Colonel Wing's men 8. In the district east of Springs, where Brigadier-General G. Hamilton has continued his operations, the enemy has received some accession of strength.

About 15th February, at least 150 Boers were pressed north out of the Zuikerboschrand by the action of our columns operating east of Heidelberg. They effected a crossing of the Standerton Railway, near Botha's Kraal Station, and moving north, attached themselves to the commando which has for some time been concealed in this district.

On the 18th, General Gilbert Hamilton was sharply engaged at Klippan (107), 20 miles south-east of Springs, with a body of Boers which was estimated to number about 500. Upon this occasion, I regret to say, a portion of a squadron of the Scots Greys, detached to one flank, was cut off, surrounded, and partially captured. Our casualties were, Major Feilden and Captain Ussher mortally wounded, Lieutenant Rhodes and two men killed and six wounded. The Boer losses were reported to be eight men killed or wounded, Commandant Van Niekerk being shot in the knee.

After this engagement Brigadier-General Hamilton marched to Nigel Mines, near Heidelberg, where he was joined by the 28th Mounted Infantry, and he then returned to Springs, which he is now using as a base of operations in his continued search for this gathering of the enemy.

To the north of the Delagoa line, Major-General Fetherstonhaugh, who has had at his disposal the columns under Colonel Park and Lieutenant-Colonels Urmston and E. Williams, has undertaken some combined operations which have met with a considerable measure of success. On the 7th February the situation in this district was as follows:—Colonel Park, who had moved south from Lydenburg, and Lieutenant-Colonel Urmston at Belfast; Lieutenant-Colonel E. Williams at Middelburg; and the bulk of the Boer forces, under Muller, Trichardt, and Hindon, in and about the Bothasberg.

On the 19th, General Fetherstonhaugh commenced his operations by a movement of his three columns from Pan, on the railway line, towards Schietpad (63) in the Bothasberg. A long night march was undertaken to get unperceived within reach of the enemy, and at daylight on the 20th February, our troops under Colonel Park, who was accompanied by 300 of the National Scouts, were completely successful in surprising and rushing two laagers at Nooitgedacht (12) and Grootrietvlei (116). 164 prisoners were taken, of whom 8 were wounded, together with 72 horses, 630 cattle, 7 mules, 10 vehicles, and a quantity of saddlery, ammunition, clothing, and blankets. Amongst the prisoners were Field-Cornets Du Toit, G. Joubert, H. De Jager, and Lieutenant A. J. Viljoen. Hindon and Trichardt unfortunately escaped from the laagers before the latter were captured. Colonel Park then returned with our columns to Pan Station, where he arrived on the 22nd February.

About this date it was ascertained that the members of the Boer Government, with an escort of 100 men, had left Roos Senekal, moving west with an ultimate intention of proceeding by a circuitous route, north of Pietersburg, to pay a visit to Generals Delarey and Kemp.

On the 20th February, the National Scouts, operating from Godwaan, killed 2 Boers and captured 8 prisoners at Somerset (1340).

On the night of the 21st February, Colonel E. Williams again undertook a night march to Welyverdiend (125) on the southern slopes of the Bothasberg, where he secured 8 prisoners. He then pushed on to Buffelskloof (198), and there captured a laager with 20 additional prisoners, 2 vehicles, and a quantity of provisions.

On the 27th February, a portion of Colonel Park's force was moved by train from Belfast to Bronkhorstspuit station, and on the same day Lieutenant-Colonel Williams' column from the Bothasberg, reached Doornkop (42), 12 miles N.N.W. of Middelburg.

These movements were made preparatory to a descent upon Langkloof (95), (near the junction of the Olifant and Wilge Rivers), which was

timed to coincide with the expected arrival there of the members of the Boer Government as they journeyed to the west.

It was anticipated that by dawn on the 28th, Colonels Park and Williams could be in position to the north-west and north-east respectively of Langkloof, and that they would then close in rapidly upon their objective. Colonel Park; however, was unavoidably prevented from reaching his assigned position, and was unable therefore to co-operate with Colonel Williams, who, after an exceedingly difficult and trying march of 29 miles over a rocky and intersected country, successfully surrounded Langkloof at the appointed hour, only to find that the members of the Boer Government had quitted the neighbourhood for the Pietersburg district on the previous afternoon. Colonel Park, however, met with some little success. Finding that it was out of the question for him to reach his objective in time to co-operate with Colonel Williams, he turned towards the kloofs on the western side of Rhenoster Kop, and there instituted a search which resulted in the capture of 17 prisoners (including a Lieutenant of the Staats Artillerie), 9 horses, 29 oxen, a supply of ammunition, and 14 vehicles.

Our troops then returned to Bronkhorstspuit station, where they were joined by the remainder of Colonel Park's column from Belfast.

2. Since his abortive attack on Pietersburg, described in my last despatch, General Bayers has remained inactive in the Northern Transvaal, and the month, as far as this district is concerned, has passed without incident. The continued prevalence of horse sickness has prevented our troops from pressing the enemy to any great extent.

3. In the South-Western Transvaal on 8th February, Colonel Kekewich and Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie were at Rietvlei (229), 14 miles south-east of Lichtenburg; Lieutenant-Colonel Colenbrander was approaching Tafel Kop (north of Ventersdorp), and Lieutenant-Colonel Von Donop, who had succeeded temporarily to the command of Lord Methuen's mobile troops, was en route from Klerksdorp to Wolmaranstad.

On the 21st February, Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell, who had returned from leave of absence, took over command of Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie's troops, and on the same day Colonel Kekewich moved south with both columns, through Vaalbank (116), to Hartebeestfontein (624). He reached his destination on the morning of the 25th without encountering any force of the enemy.

On the 10th of February, Colonel Von Donop arrived at Wolmaranstad, which he had been ordered to occupy both as a base for future operations, and to deny its further use as a centre for the enemy. He remained operating in this neighbourhood until the 23rd February, on which date he despatched an empty convoy of over 100 wagons to refill at Klerksdorp, and bring out supplies to him at Wolmaranstad.

The escort of this convoy was composed of the 5th Imperial Yeomanry, three companies of the 1st Northumberland Fusiliers, two guns and a pompom, and a few details; the whole under Lieutenant-Colonel W. G. Anderson, of the Imperial Yeomanry.

All went well with the convoy until the early morning of the 25th February, when, as it was moving off, just before daylight, from its bivouac ground near Elandslaagte (488), 10 miles south-west of Klerksdorp, a determined attack was made upon the advanced guard from some dense bush on rising ground to the left of the road to be followed. Only flashes of the enemy's rifles

could be seen in the darkness, but the guns and pom-pom opened fire on the bush, and the wagons of the convoy, which had stampeded back towards the old camping ground at the first outbreak of firing, were again closed up as rapidly as possible from the rear. Then came a second attack, followed by a third one, also from the left of the road and this time upon the rearguard, but these attempts, as well as the earlier one, were successfully repulsed by the escort.

Finding, however, that the pressure upon the rearguard was momentarily increasing, Lieutenant-Colonel Anderson now ordered the convoy to move on again in the direction of Klerksdorp, instructing his Transport Officer to try and trot the wagons clear of the enemy's fire. He himself supported the hardly pressed rearguard, as it sought to cover the retirement, with his guns and such troops as could be collected from the front. The efforts made, however, to extricate the force were in vain, for not only were the rearguard and guns enveloped and overpowered by greatly superior numbers of the enemy, who pressed on in a most determined way under Generals Delarey and Kemp, but the convoy itself was assailed and captured as it sought to cross Jagd Spruit. The passage of a spruit upon a narrow front necessarily takes time, and a stampede of the native drivers and animals under the heavy fire poured into them from all sides, finally disposed of any remaining chance of saving the wagons.

Our casualties in this engagement, in which the escort appears to have behaved with considerable gallantry and firmness under difficult circumstances, amounted to 5 Officers and 53 men killed, and 6 officers and 123 men wounded. The remainder of the escort, with the exception of 3 Officers and 106 men who reached Klerksdorp, were captured, I regret to say, by the enemy, being subsequently released a few days later after being taken to the vicinity of the Mafeking railway line.

On receipt of the news of this mishap to the convoy, Lieutenant-Colonel Sir R. Colleton, commanding at Bothaville, was ordered to afford support to Lieutenant-Colonel Von Donop at Wolmaranstad, and Colonel Kekewich and Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell were directed to take up the pursuit of the Boers, and endeavour to recover the lost guns and wagons. The latter, however, had been burnt and their teams shot as soon as captured—so that recovery in their case was out of the question—and, as the enemy dispersed again as rapidly as they assembled, pursuit in any given direction was of little avail.

Unfortunately, the capture of this empty convoy has not been the only check to the progress of our operations which we have experienced in this district during the past month.

On the 7th March, after a sudden and evidently prearranged reconcentration, Generals Delarey and Kemp made an overwhelming attack upon a column under Lord Methuen, which had started from Vryburg on the 2nd, with the object of intercepting the probable withdrawal, to the Marico Valley, of the guns captured with Colonel Von Donop's convoy.

A detailed statement of the incidents of this engagement and the causes of reverse is not yet in my hands, and it would therefore be premature for me to express any definite opinion upon the telegraphic reports which have already reached me. I deeply regret, however, to learn that Lieutenant-General Lord Methuen is severely wounded, and in the hands of the enemy.

Subsequent to the loss of Colonel Von Donop's convoy, and prior to this sudden attack upon Lord Methuen, Colonel Kekewich, with his own

troops and the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Grenfell and Von Donop, the latter of which joined him at Wolmaranstad, undertook a vigorous pursuit of General Delarey's forces. Failing, however, to come up with the enemy, who retired rapidly from the neighbourhood of Wolmaranstad towards the north-west, he returned to Klerksdorp, where he received orders to detach Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell with 1,600 mounted men, to follow up the probable line of retreat of the Boers and co-operate with Lord Methuen's column from Vryburg. On the 7th March Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell reached Rooirantjesfontein, 20 miles south of Lichtenburg, a point in Lord Methuen's anticipated line of advance. On the same day, Lord Methuen met with his reverse about 20 miles to the south-west.

4. In my last despatch I described the extensive operations which concluded on the 8th February upon the Wolvehoek—Kroonstad railway line.

A few days of necessary rest were then given to the troops, but the interval was employed in maturing preparations for another far-reaching sweep of the districts frequented by De Wet's followers. The contemplated scheme of operations was divided into two phases, in the first of which two simultaneous movements were to be made to the east, one between the Heidelberg—Standerton railway and the Wolvehoek—Frankfort—Tafel Kop blockhouse line, the other from a line Kroonstad—Ventersburg—Doornberg up to the blockhouses between Lindley and Bethlehem.

For the second phase, it was arranged that whilst the northern columns, then on a line between Standerton and Tafel Kop, made a right wheel on to the Botha's Pass—Tafel Kop blockhouses, with Tafel Kop as a pivot, the southern columns should move east to the Wilge and, in conjunction with the troops at Harrismith, hold the line of that river between Strydpoort and Major's Drift.

Finally, with the line of the Wilge so held to the west, and the passes over the Drakensberg closed to the enemy on the east by troops from the Natal command, the northern line of columns was to move south from the Tafel Kop—Botha's Pass position right down to the blockhouses between Van Reenen's Pass and Eland's River Bridge, near Harrismith.

The same tactics were to be pursued as had proved so successful in the sweep just completed. By day, our troops would constitute a moveable screen with supports and reserves ready to proceed to any threatened point, by night, the line of columns would form a continuous chain of entrenched outposts in unbroken contact from flank to flank.

The operations to be undertaken in the sweep along the Vaal Valley were timed to commence on the 16th February, but whilst the columns were moving into position, Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson's troops were deflected into the Zuikerboschrand (to the west of Heidelberg) to deal with a gathering there of Boers who, on the 12th of the month, had made a somewhat unexpected attack upon the 28th Mounted Infantry whilst on the march from Vereeniging to Heidelberg.

Sir Henry Rawlinson accordingly moved on the 14th February to Klip River Station, and on the 15th cleared the hills of the enemy, who broke into two parties, one of which proceeded in a south-easterly direction towards Villiersdorp, whilst the other, a numerically smaller one, effected a crossing of the Heidelberg Railway, as already mentioned, at Botha's Kraal Station.

This subsidiary operation over, at dawn on the 16th February, the columns under Lieutenant-Colonel Keir, Colonel Rimington, Colonel the

Honourable J. Byng, and Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson (reading from right to left) were in a position to advance from a general line Gottenburg Road—Vaalbank—Heidelberg.

On the night of the 18th, these troops had reached a position marked by Standerton—Zamenkomst (on the Vaal)—Tafel Kop, from which line, after a halt of 24 hours to replenish supplies, a commencement was made of the right wheel which was to bring our columns, by the evening of the 22nd February, on to the Tafel Kop—Botha's Pass line of blockhouses.

As the wheel commenced, Colonel Nixon's Cavalry Brigade, issuing from Paardekop Station, made a thorough search of the Verzemelberg, on the left of, and in conjunction with, Sir Henry Rawlinson, and then came into the new alignment of columns ready for the further advance upon Harrismith.

In the meantime, the convergent movement of the southern columns towards the Wilge River was in full progress. On the night of the 13th February, our troops had been disposed upon a line, facing east, from Kroonspruit (south of Kroonstad) to Bronkhorstfontein (1125), a few miles to the west of Senekal, the columns standing in the following order from left to right:—Major-General Elliot's Division, the columns under Majors Holmes and Marshall, Colonel the Honourable R. T. Lawley's Cavalry Brigade, and Major Du Cane's column.

The advance commenced at dawn on the 14th, and by the evening of the 16th our columns had reached a position running from Lindley, by Kaffir Kop to Bethlehem, having made a complete sweep of the country lying between the Kroonstad—Lindley blockhouse line, which barred all avenues of escape to the north, and the Senekal—Bethlehem Road, which was strongly held for the occasion by the troops from the south, under Major-General C. Knox and Colonel Barker. A two days' halt, to replenish supplies, was necessary upon the Lindley—Bethlehem alignment, and General Elliot's Division then moved forward to the line of the Wilge River, the drifts over which, between Tafel Kop and Harrismith, were all carefully blocked by our troops by the evening of the 22nd February.

The last stage of the operations was thus reached. At dawn on the 23rd, a general advance to the south was commenced by all our columns, disposed at the termination of their right wheel along the Tafel Kop—Botha's Pass Road. This final movement to the Vanreenen's Pass—Eland's River Bridge blockhouses was timed to take 4 days. It was well carried out, productive of some severe fighting, and highly successful in its issue.

On the night of the 23rd, at the close of the first day's march, a most determined and partially successful attempt to break out to the north was made by De Wet, Steyn, and some 700 of their followers, who had been driven east by Major-General Elliot's advance to the Wilge River, into the net of our approaching columns. The attack was delivered under cover of darkness, at Langverwacht, 18 miles south of Vrede, the point where, at the moment, the right of Colonel Byng's column was in touch with Colonel Rimington's left. Here again, as on the occasion of his previous escape, De Wet adopted the plan of advancing under cover of a large mob of cattle, which were rapidly driven up by natives to the point where the rush through was to be attempted. This expedient met, it is true, with a part of the desired success, for there is little doubt that De Wet, Ex-President Steyn, and a number of their men thus managed to break out of the toils. As a whole, however, the Boer

force was very severely punished by the New Zealanders of Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt's column, who displayed great gallantry and resolution at the critical moment, in resisting, and in part repelling, the attack. The conduct of the New Zealanders upon this occasion reflects the highest credit upon all ranks of the contingent, and upon the Colony to which it belongs. Nothing could have been finer than the behaviour of the men. The whole of the Boer cattle and vehicles were captured, and 31 of the enemy, together with over 160 horses were killed at the point where the attempt to penetrate our line was made.

Our own casualties were also severe, 2 Officers and 18 men being killed, and 5 Officers and 33 men wounded, the large majority of whom belonged to the New Zealand Contingent.

Yet another attempt to break out was made on the night of the 26th, when Colonel Nixon successfully repulsed an attack by a large number of the enemy upon the line of the Cornelius River.

The sweep down to Harrismith was then completed, and at its close it was found that our captures comprised 778 prisoners of war, 25,000 cattle, 2,000 horses, 200 wagons, and 50,000 rounds of ammunition. About 50 Boers had also been killed in the several engagements which had taken place. The surrender to Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson, of Commandant Truter and 650 men, accounted for the majority of the prisoners taken.

After a necessary halt of three days in the vicinity of Harrismith, our column again moved off to take up positions for a fresh series of operations, which are now already developing, but which are not as yet sufficiently advanced to enable me at this date to do more than make this passing reference.

In the early part of February, until required to take part in the operations just described, the troops under Major-General C. Knox and Colonel Barker continued their work of systematic clearance in the districts between the Bloemfontein—Ladybrand line of blockhouses and the Winburg—Senekal—Bethlehem Road.

On the 10th February, Colonel Lawley and Major Du Cane reported considerable captures of cattle, wagons, and supplies, in the Doornberg. Colonel Barker's troops at the same date were employed in searching the innumerable kloofs and caves on the western slopes of the Wittebergen.

This work was temporarily suspended when it became necessary to bring up all available troops to hold the line of road from Senekal to Bethlehem, during the progress of the sweep of columns from the railway to the Wilge River. With the termination, however, of this movement, Major-General C. Knox's troops were able to fall back once more to the south and resume their interrupted work.

Colonel Barker continued to co-operate in the main operations. Dropping into second line in rear of Major-General Elliot to watch for any stragglers and fugitives escaping to the west, he was able, in this position, to pick up 30 prisoners, 225 cattle, and 280 horses. He then moved into Lindley, and on the 25th February, again left that place, marching in the first instance to reinforce the Wilge line, and then in accordance with subsequent orders to Tygerkloof, between Bethlehem and Harrismith, preparatory to the further series of contemplated operations which are now in progress.

5. In the second week in February the columns under Colonel Rochfort were searching the Philipolis and Luckhoff districts for the commando under Nieuwhoudt, which had been reported to be hovering about north of the Orange River, and

watching for any favourable opportunity for entering Cape Colony.

No trace, however, of the enemy could be found in this direction, and hearing that Nieuw-houdt had appeared upon the Modder River, Colonel Rochfort, on the 15th February, directed the whole of his columns to move north.

On the 17th February, Colonel Western was at Kalabas Bridge on the Riet; Major Gilbert at Vlakfontein, near Jagersfontein; and Major Driscoll moving north from the village of Luckhoff.

On the 21st February, Colonel Western and Major Gilbert arrived at Koodoesrand-Drift (on the Modder), and Major Driscoll reached Jacobsdal.

Colonel Western reported that, as he came north, he had been engaged with the enemy between Emmaus and Brandvallei Drift, on the Modder, and that the commando, which was probably Nieuwoudt's, had again gone south.

In consequence, however, of information received from Lieutenant-Colonel Sitwell, to the effect that he was in the presence of a body of Boers near Boshof, Colonel Rochfort decided to continue his march to the north. Major Driscoll reached Boshof on 25th February, and the following day Colonel Rochfort arrived there with the other two columns. Major Driscoll had been engaged on the march at Simonsvallei, where he captured 6 prisoners, 100 horses, 80 mules, 150 cattle, 14 vehicles, and 2,000 rounds of small-arm ammunition.

Since 26th February, Colonel Rochfort has been undertaking operations between Boshof and Hoopstad, against a gathering of Boers, under Commandants Erasmus, Badenhorst, and Jacobs, which had been offering some resistance to Lieutenant-Colonel Sitwell's troops, and had recently attacked a convoy on its way to Boshof.

6. After the return of Piet Wessels, on 4th February, from the Midlands to the north-eastern district, the rebels of this part of the country remained in complete inactivity until the close of the month. Carefully avoiding our troops, and keeping to the hill tops in parties of 20 and 30, they have been experiencing, I understand, a gradually increasing difficulty in obtaining provisions and necessaries from their former friends and sympathisers.

Whether this diminishing popularity formed a contributory cause or not I cannot say, but on the 1st March, Fouché and Myburg made a sudden dash out of the district with some 200 followers, and, crossing the East London—Stormberg railway, made for the country to the south of Steynsburg, where their pursuit is now being undertaken by the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Price and Baillie.

A few stragglers alone remain in the Burghersdorp—Barkly East—Jamestown triangle.

On the 16th February some 700 Boers, forming the main body of the rebels in the western district, were assembled about Bastaard's Poort, 30 miles E.N.E. of Fraserburg. Their capture of the convoy in this neighbourhood on the 5th of the month had, of course, encouraged them, and General French decided that the concentration must be broken up without delay, and that they must be driven north of the Lambert's Bay—Victoria West blockhouse line.

Our columns, under Major-General Stephenson, were disposed with this object by the night of the 16th upon a general line from Nelspoort Station, by Beaufort West, to Rhenosterfontein (15 miles north-west of Beaufort West), Colonel B. Doran being on the right, Lieutenant-Colonel Capper and Major Nickalls in the centre, and Colonel Crabbe and Major Lund on the left.

The advance commenced at dawn on the 17th, its general direction being to the north-west towards Williston. Slight resistance, however, was offered by the enemy, who, breaking up into three main parties, dispersed almost immediately our troops came into contact. A few Boers were wounded and captured on the 18th, amongst their number being Judge Hugo and Field Cornet Van Heerden, the former of whom has since died of his wounds.

Of the three parties of the enemy which retired as our columns approached, one consisting of 200 men under Malan, after doubling round Colonel Doran's right flank, was successful in passing eastwards over the railway into the midland district; another withdrew past Williston to the north-west; and the third, under J. J. Smith, broke through the blockhouse line, with some loss, to the north, and thence turned east to Van de Merwe's Dam, 15 miles north-east of Victoria West.

At the end of the month the position of our columns was as follows:—Colonel Capper and Major Nickalls at Walkraal (12 miles east of Williston); Colonel Crabbe and Major Lund at Gorras (30 miles east of Williston), and Colonel B. Doran, who had followed up J. J. Smith to prevent him crossing the railway into the midlands, some 12 miles north of Richmond Road.

The whole of the country between the railway line and the Clanwilliam—Williston—Carnarvon—Victoria West blockhouse line has thus been cleared.

The pursuit of Malan to the east was promptly undertaken by the column under Major Wormald, and two squadrons of the 9th Lancers. These troops had just succeeded in chasing the remnant of Kruitziuger's commando, under Louis Wessels, out of the midland district in a western direction, but they turned back after Malan as he passed the railway, and are now following him in the country to the south of Hanover.

Colonel Haig, during the past month, has been in charge of operations in the Clanwilliam and Van Rhynsdorp districts, where he has had at his disposal the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Kavanagh and Wyndham. Several skirmishes have taken place, and on the 13th February Lieutenant-Colonel Kavanagh was able to surprise and rush Bouwer's laager, near the junction of the Doorn and Olifants Rivers, when 11 prisoners were captured, together with 60 horses, 7 mules, and some rifles and ammunition.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twentieth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Kirkby-in-Ashfield in the county of Nottingham and in the diocese of Southwell between that benefice and two other benefices namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and the benefice (being a district) of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield which two last-named benefices are also situate in the said county of Nottingham and in the said diocese of Southwell.

"Whereas the Most Noble William John Arthur Charles James Duke of Portland Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter is the patron of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield and also of each of the said two benefices of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield.

"And whereas the endowments of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield comprise among other things a sum of upwards of thirty-seven thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock held by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for and for the benefit of the rector or Incumbent of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield and as part of the endowments of the same benefice.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said two benefices of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield are not at present endowed and that after the transfer to or for the benefit of the vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and to or for the benefit of the minister or Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield of such portions of the aforesaid sum of India three pounds per centum per annum stock as are hereinafter mentioned the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and within the district of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield is now full of a clerk, the rector or Incumbent of the same being the Reverend James Butterwick Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas the said James Butterwick is consenting that the apportionment hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect as from the day hereinafter mentioned in that behalf.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend George Bishop of the said diocese of Southwell acting as such Bishop and with the consent of the said William John Arthur Charles James Duke of Portland acting as the patron as aforesaid of each of the said three benefices, namely the benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and the benefice of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield and also with the consent of the said James Butterwick acting as rector or Incumbent of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, the Bishop sealing the same with his episcopal seal), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose firstly that as from the sixth day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and two and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same a sum of ten thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock (being part of the hereinbefore-mentioned sum of upwards of thirty-seven thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock) shall cease to form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield and shall be held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for and for the benefit of the vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and as part of the endowments of that benefice secondly that as from the date lastly mentioned and in the same manner a further sum of ten thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock (being a further part of the hereinbefore-mentioned sum of upwards of thirty-seven thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock) shall cease to form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield and shall be held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for and for the benefit of the minister or Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield and as part of the endowments of that benefice and thirdly that such portion of the herein firstly-mentioned sum of upwards of thirty-seven thousand pounds India three pounds per centum per annum stock as shall be sufficient to produce a capital sum of three thousand two hundred pounds shall cease to form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Kirkby-in-Ashfield and shall be sold by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners one moiety of the proceeds of such sale to be applied by us towards defraying the cost of building a parsonage house for the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist Kirkby Woodhouse and the other moiety of such proceeds to be applied by us towards the cost of building a parsonage house for the said benefice of Saint Thomas Kirkby-in-Ashfield.

this purpose held on the twentieth day of March one thousand nine hundred and two and passed by the unanimous vote of those present and voting and submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council.

Whereas the College may under its Statutes (St. III, XI b) elect under special conditions a Professor of the University to a Fellowship in the College. Every Professor within the University who shall be elected under St. III, § 11 b, shall hold his Fellowship so long as he shall continue to serve the University in the Office of Professor.

The Minister of the Interior, with reference to the International Sanitary Convention of Venice, of March 18th, 1897; with reference to the various Maritime Sanitary Ordinances, issued from time to time for the protection of the Kingdom against the introduction of bubonic plague, and containing general regulations, as well as to the other general instructions from time to time distributed in particular cases; since it is considered advisable to set in order, and bring together in one document the aforesaid prescriptions; on the advice of the Board of Health; with reference to the law of December 22nd, 1888, No. 5849 (series 3A).

DECREES:

ART. 1.

All vessels coming from ports, which are either infected with bubonic plague or form part of districts or regions in which are places infected with that disease, before being admitted to free pratique in the Kingdom, and immediately after the usual interrogatory has been concluded, shall be subjected to a medical visit of all the persons on board and to the disinfecting of all articles of personal and domestic use which are not perfectly clean. Moreover, the port doctor must satisfy himself, by an examination in detail of the vessel, that there has been no exceptional mortality of rats from infectious causes during the voyage.

Lastly, the bilge-water, after disinfection, must be emptied out, and the water stored on board must be changed for good drinking water.

Moreover, the following regulations must be observed:

I. Vessels which carry their own doctor and are provided with a disinfecting stove, are admitted to free pratique when the doctor declares on oath:—

(a.) That neither articles of personal or domestic use nor baggage have been embarked without previous disinfection; or that these articles have been properly disinfected on board.

(b.) That neither on the departure of the vessel nor during the voyage was any ascertained or suspected case of bubonic plague discovered.

(c.) That no exceptional mortality among rats was observed during the voyage.

II. Vessels which carry their own doctor, but are not provided with a disinfecting stove, are admitted to free pratique when the doctor declares on oath:—

(a.) That neither articles of personal or domestic use nor baggage were taken on board without being first disinfected.

(b.) That neither on the departure of the vessel nor during the voyage were any ascertained or suspected cases of bubonic plague discovered.

(c.) That no exceptional mortality among rats was observed during the voyage.

III. Vessels which have neither doctor nor disinfecting stove, but which have a clean bill of health on the voyage, are admitted to free pratique after having carried out the measures laid down in the first paragraph of this article and any others which the Sanitary Authorities may see fit to impose in special cases in order to make sure of the perfect health of the vessel.

ART. 2.

Vessels on which, either at the moment of departure or during the voyage, ascertained or suspected cases of bubonic plague have been discovered, may be admitted to free pratique, after all the measures laid down in the first paragraph of Art. 1 have been carried out, and with the observance of the following further rules:—

I. For vessels which carry a doctor and a disinfecting stove, free pratique will be given when the doctor declares on oath that at least 12 days have passed since the death or complete recovery of the infected persons; that the disinfection of the effects and articles of the sick persons, and of those who have tended them and had contact with them has been carried out, as well as that of the places in which the sick persons were attended to; and that there has been no exceptional mortality among rats on board.

II. For vessels carrying a doctor, but not provided with a disinfecting stove, free pratique will also be granted when the doctor declares on oath that at least 12 days have passed since the death or complete recovery of the infected persons, that the disinfecting measures mentioned in the preceding paragraph have been carried out with chemicals, and that no exceptional mortality among rats has been observed on board.

III. Lastly, for vessels which have neither doctor nor disinfecting stove, but which have had on board either suspected or ascertained cases of plague, even at a date anterior to the 12 days already mentioned, admission to free pratique will be granted after the vessels have been sent to a sanitary station, where they will be detained for the time necessary for disinfection and for establishing their complete freedom from infection.

ART. 3.

Vessels which on their arrival show ascertained or suspected cases of bubonic plague, or which have had such within a period of twelve days, will be sent, without exception, to a sanitary station in order to undergo all those measures which the Ministry of the Interior may think fit to impose in each particular case.

ART. 4.

After the admission of the vessels to free pratique, all individuals landing from them, whether passengers or belonging to the crew, must be provided by the local Prefecture with a compulsory travelling pass, of which a form is annexed (Annexe A), and the Syndics of Com-

munes for which they are bound must be informed by telegraph, in order that they may be submitted to sanitary surveillance for the period of time necessary to complete 10 full days to be counted from the date of their departure from the last infected port in the case of the vessels indicated in Art. 1, and of the landing at a port or place of call in Italy in the case of the vessels indicated in Art. 2.

This surveillance may never consist in measures of isolation and sequestration, but only in a daily medical examination to make sure of the state of health of the person, and, in the case of his departing before the prescribed time is up, in the notification of the fact to the Syndic of the Commune to which he intends to go, with a view to the continuance of the examination until the conclusion of the 10 days.

ART. 5.

All vessels coming from infected ports, on their arrival in an Italian port, will be subjected to the following measures, on the responsibility and under the surveillance of the port authorities, who will see that they are strictly carried out:

(a.) From the moment of their anchorage or mooring up to the moment of their departure, the anchor chains and safety hawsers must always be provided with apparatus to prevent rats from leaving the ship (for example: thorny bushes, cone-shaped funnels, &c.).

(b.) Gangways may not be laid from the vessel to the quay, save only in the day-time, and for the time strictly necessary for the disembarkation of the passengers and cargo. At night the vessel must lie off the quay at a distance to be fixed by the Port Authorities, and which must not be less than 5 metres.

(c.) The rats on board must be destroyed by asphyxiating gases, or by other means laid down in special instructions, after the landing of the cargo.

The bodies of the rats must be collected and burnt.

(d.) The sweepings from the cleaning of the holds must be carefully collected and burnt.

ART. 6.

Vessels which, although having touched at infected ports, have kept themselves in strict isolation while there, are exempt from the measures laid down in the preceding articles.

Vessels will be considered as having maintained strict isolation:—

(a.) When they have not embarked passengers or goods of any sort, with the exceptions mentioned in paragraph c.

(b.) When the crew and passengers from other places already on board have not landed nor had any sort of communication with the infected port.

(c.) When only the victuals, coal, and drinking water necessary for the voyage and only postal correspondence (excluding parcels and samples) wrapped in tarred bags have been taken on board.

(d.) When gangways have not been laid to the quay in the infected ports, and when the anchor-chains and hawsers have been fitted with adequate apparatus for preventing rats from getting on board.

Saving better means of ascertaining the facts, if necessary, with regard to the conditions laid down in sections—(a.), (b.), (c.), and (d.), the doctor, if there be one on board, will make a statement. If there be no doctor on board, the facts must be substantiated from the notes made by the captain in the ship's log.

ART. 7.

In accordance with the measures already stated, Italian vessels which touch habitually at infected ports, or on board of which cases of plague have occurred during the last six months of the passage, are obliged periodically to destroy all rats on board in the manner indicated in the preceding article, the vessel being entirely cleared of cargo for the execution of this measure at least once every three months.

The ship owner and the officer in command of the vessel are responsible for the carrying out of this measure, which shall be notified in the Sanitary Log, and in the absence of a Sanitary Log in the Log.

ART. 8.

The Ministry is empowered, at the request of the shipping companies, to give permission to vessels coming from regions infected with plague and having disinfecting stoves on board to take on board a doctor recommended by the Government.

Such vessels shall be dispensed on arrival from medical inspection and from the disinfection prescribed by the regulations (the necessity of emptying the hold of the vessel, and the regulations of Articles 4 and 5 still holding good) in the following cases, which must be sworn to by the doctor:

(a.) That no cases of plague have been either suspected or declared either before the vessel sailed or during the passage.

(b.) That twenty-four hours previous to calling at an Italian port objects of personal and domestic use which are not perfectly clean were disinfected under the immediate supervision of the doctor.

(c.) That before entering the port the doctor had made an inspection with satisfactory results of all persons on board.

(d.) That no exceptional mortality of rats had occurred during the passage.

ART. 9.

Articles 4 and 5 holding good, vessels which have a foul bill of health, but which nevertheless, have had a passage during which no cases have occurred, can by the authorization of the Minister of the Interior be exempted from the sanitary measures laid down in the preceding articles:

(a.) That in the place of origin the cases of plague were imported cases and did not occasion the spread of other cases which could be traced to the above-mentioned cases.

(b.) That in the place of origin itself all the necessary precautions were taken to prevent the spread of the plague.

ART. 10.

Even after vessels arriving from infected regions have been admitted to free pratique the crew shall not be allowed to go on shore unless their service should render it necessary.

ART. 11.

Emigrant ships which are provided with disinfecting stoves and on board of which there is a doctor of the Royal Navy shall in accordance with the Regulation of Article 11 of the Law of January 31, 1901, No. 23, and Articles 115 and the following Articles of the Regulation of July 10, 1901, No. 375, be treated in accordance with Article 8 of the present Ordinance and comply with all the conditions and restrictions laid down in the aforesaid Article.

ART. 12.

In addition to the measures laid down in the preceding Articles other special measures can in certain circumstances be adopted for those vessels which, even if they have had no cases on board during the voyage,

(a.) Are not provided with disinfecting stoves and are without a doctor on board.

(b.) Which have on board large congregations of persons in an unsatisfactory condition of cleanliness.

(c.) Whose general hygienic state is unsatisfactory.

(d.) Who, previous to leaving the infected port of call, have not been subjected to the measures laid down in Chapter IV, No. 1, of the Convention of Venice of March 19, 1897.

(e.) Who have had during the passage an exceptional mortality among rats, or who are discovered on their arrival to have on board an exceptional number of dead rats owing to infectious causes.

(f.) Which present any other serious circumstances.

ART. 13.

The importation of the following goods in whatever state, and even if contained in postal packages, is prohibited should they come directly or indirectly from regions infected with bubonic plague:—

(a.) Personal and domestic effects, with the exception of what is taken as baggage.

(b.) Rags, used bags, used carpets and embroideries.

(c.) Fresh untanned hides and other animal products, and refuse such as fat and intestines.

ART. 14.

The sanitary measures mentioned in the preceding Articles shall be carried out exclusively in the ports of Geneva, Leghorn, Naples, Brindisi and Venice, on the mainland, and in the ports of Palermo, Messina and Catania, in Sicily.

The measures shall be carried out by day, and in accordance with the regulation at the first port of call.

In accordance with Articles 4, 5 and 10, should no exceptional case have occurred during the passage after the first call at a port, sanitary measures shall be limited to a medical examination of the persons on board, and to the disinfection of the effects which are to go on shore.

ART. 15.

No restrictive measures shall be adopted in regard to vessels arriving from an infected region, should those vessels have left the port at least five days before the declaration of the first case of plague.

ART. 16.

The preceding measures of maritime hygiene of May 8, 1897, No. 3; of July 15, 1897, No. 6; of June 12, 1899, No. 6; of June 16, 1899, No. 7; of January 24, 1900, No. 1; of March 1, 1900, No. 8; of April 7, 1900, No. 10; of July 9, 1900, No. 20; of August 10, 1901, No. 11, are suspended and superseded by the present measures.

The prefects, captains, and officers of the port are charged with the execution of the present measures, which will come into force immediately after their publication in the Official Gazette of Italy.
