The Right Honourable Charles Thomson Ritchie, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, having caused the Commissioner of Police to prepare a plan for the access and regress of Carriages on the day of the Coronation of Their Majesties, and the Executive Committee for the purposes of Their Majesties' Coronation having submitted the same to this Committee, their Lordships are pleased to approve thereof and to authorize the Right Honourable C. T. Ritchie to take all such measures as shall be necessary for carrying the said plan (of which a copy is hereunto annexed) into effect, and also for securing the passage of the carriages in the several routes therein set forth, and he is further authorized to make such alterations in the said plan as he may deem necessary and proper.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED ON THE DAY OF THE CORONATION.

1. In pursuance of an Order of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the following instructions have been framed for securing the commodious access and return of carriages conveying persons to and from Westminster Abbey, on the occasion of His Majesty's Coronation.

2. In conformity with these instructions, the necessary directions have been given to all His Majesty's Officers and Servants concerned, and to the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis for carrying them into execution.

3. The entrances of Westminster Abbey will be opened at 6.30 o'clock in the morning. The gates of Hyde Park will also be opened for carriages at the same hour.

4. The gates of St. James's Park, except Storey's Gate, will be closed against all carriages

other than those of His Majesty The King and of Members of the Royal Family until after His Majesty has returned to Buckingham Palace.

5. His Majesty The King will proceed in State from Buckingham Palace by way of The Mall, St. James's Park, the Horse Guards' Parade, Whitehall, Parliament-street, and Broad Sanctuary, to the west entrance of Westminster Abbey, returning after the ceremony by Parliament-square, St. Margaret's-street, Parliament-street, Whitehall, Charing Cross, Cockspur-street, Pall Mall, St. James's-street, Piccadilly, Hyde Park-corner, and Constitution Hill to Buckingham Palace.

6. The Royal Procession will leave Buckingham Palace at 10.30 A.M. precisely.

7. The whole line of route to and from Westminster Abbey will be kept exclusively for the free passage of His Majesty The King and the Royal Procession from 8.30 A.M. until such time as His Majesty shall have returned to Buckingham Palace after the Coronation.

8. The Royal Procession will form up at 9.45.

DETAIL OF REGULATIONS FOR CARRIAGES.

I. First Route.—To the West Entrance of Westminster Abbey.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the West Entrance will proceed by Knightsbridge, Wilton-place, Wilton-crescent, Belgrave-square, Upper Belgrave-street, Hobart-place, Grosvenor-gardens, and Victoria-street (off side), or by Buckingham Palace-road and Victoria-street, setting down at the entrance to the Pavilion at the west door. They will draw off by way of Tothill-street and Westminster Broadway, and wait in Great Chapel-street, James-street, Palace-street, and vicinity. These carriages will take up the reverse way, and return by the route by which they came.

II. Second Route.—Dean's-yard and Cloisters.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the entrances in Dean's-yard and the Cloisters will approach by the route laid down for the west door of the Abbey, turn into Dean's-yard, set down and draw off into Tufton-street, waiting in Orchard-street, Great Peter-street, Marsham-street, and vicinity. They will take up the reverse way, and return by the route by which they came.

III. Third Route.—To the North Entrance of Westminster Abbey.
