

7° Vis-à-vis du Sénégal et des pays soupçonnés de fièvre jaune.

Dans le cas de patente nette, avec état sanitaire bon pendant la traversée: désinfection des marchandises susceptibles provenant du Sénégal, libre pratique des passagers.

Dans le cas de patente brute ou de patente nette, avec état sanitaire suspect: neuf jours de quarantaine, désinfection du bateau et des marchandises.

8° Vis-à-vis du Cap et des pays où règne la peste bovine.

Interdiction du bétail, des moutons, des peaux, des fourrages, etc.

NOTA.—Les marchandises prohibées doivent être placées dans un local spécial du bord soumis à l'examen de l'autorité sanitaire et placé dans des conditions parfaites d'isolement et de fermeture.

Dans le cas contraire, elles doivent être transbordées sur un chaland ou un ponton mis à la disposition du service sanitaire par la direction du port, isolé et portant le pavillon quarantenaire.

Dans tous les ports secondaires, c'est-à-dire ceux autres que Majunga, Diego-Suarez et Tamatave, les bateaux infectés ou suspects ne peuvent être admis en libre pratique qu'après avoir été reçus dans un port à lazaret et y avoir subi toutes les mesures de quarantaine et de désinfection réglementaires.

Tout bateau suspect ou n'ayant pas de médecin sanitaire doit remplir le questionnaire prescrit par l'article 45 du décret du 31 mars 1897.
