Rome, Feb 16.

THe Cardinal de Faurbin had on Tuesday last a long Audience of the Pope, whom he pressed to dispatch his Bulls for the rest of the French Bishops that still want them; and at the same time prayed him to hasten away his Extraordinary Nuncio's to the several Courts to promote the Work of a Peace; and the better to engage the Pope therein, 'tis said, the French have intreated to him that the Squadron, now sitting at Toulon, shall not be sent on the Coasts of Italy. The Dukes of Samsio, Bonelli, and Cassoli, who were summoned to appear at Naples, to answer for their not assisting at the late Cavalcade of the Spanish Ambassador, when he presented to the Pope the usual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples, have since made their Submissions, and accommodated the Business. The Ambassador of Venice has received Assurances from the Pope, that he will send the Squadron of his Gallies to join the Venetian Fleet in the Levant this Summer.

Leiborne, Feb. 11. On the 8th instant arrived here a Vessel from Argiers, by which we have the Confirmation of the War being declared by that Government against the King of Fez, and of their having given Orders to their Men of War, to take, or destroy, all the Ships belonging to Sally, which they shall happen to meet at Sea. We hear that the French are fitting out at Toulon a Squadron of Men of War, to be Commanded by the Count d'Etre; who is expected there from Paris about the beginning of the next month.

Lemberg in Poland, Feb. 10. The King is come hither this day with the whole Court from Jawarow, and intends to pass the Carneval in this City, and after that to return to Warsaw, where a great Council of War will be held some time the next Month. The Tartars continue encamped in a considerable Body under the Cannon of Caminiee, the great quantity of Snow that has lately fallen hindring the Incursions they designed to make into the Frontier Provinces of this Kingdom. 'Tis confirmed by the last Advices from Moldavia, That the Hospodar had cut off several of his Chief Officers, upon a discovery of their being engaged in a Design to cast off their Subjection to the Turks and Tartars, and to put that Country under the Protection of the Crown of Poland. The Particulars we hear are; That the Hospodar, whose Name is Cantemir, having intercepted a Letter, which gave him a Suspicion, that the General of his Forces held

Intelligence with the Poles, he sent for him, and having taxed him with it, was going to strike him with a Stick he had in his Hand, but the General wrested it from him; as also his Sabre, which the Hospodar drew upon him; but in the mean time his Guards came in, and cut the General in pieces: After this the Hospodar caused his Chancellor, with his Son, and Brother, and 7 of the Chief Boyars, or great Men, to be put to Death; and divers others to be Imprisoned; and at the same time sent to the Turks and Tartars for Assistance.

Vienna, Feb. 28. The Letters from the Blockade of Great Waradin of the 17th instant tell us, That the Turks of that Garrison had two or three days before made a great Sally, to which they were encouraged by some advice they had received that our Hussars, who were posted near the place, might easily be surprized, but they soon found their mistake; for the Hussars were not only on their Guard, through the Care and Vigilance of the General, Count d'Auersperg, but received the Enemy very vigorously, so that they were beaten back with great loss, and disappointed of their chief Aim, which was to have got some Wood for Fuel, which they stand in great need of within the place: Some Prisoners were taken in this occasion; and the day after two Deferters came over to us, who all agreed in their Relations of the great Miseries which the Garrison do suffer; and that the Aga had been forced to promise them, that he would Capitulate if they were not relieved in a Fortnight. From Croatia we have an account, That the Bassa of Bosnia appeared on the 10th of this Month with 4000 Turks and Tartars, and two pieces of Cannon, before Dubitzza, on the Unna, and Stormed the place, but was repulsed; After which he planted his Cannon to batter the Wall of the Town, and then made a second Assault, but was again beaten off; The Tartars at the same time passed the Unna, but some of our Troops that were drawn together on the other side, obliged them presently to retire; several of the Tartars being killed, and divers others drowned in their repassing the River; all which so discouraged the Bassa, that he drew off his Men from before Dubitzza, and retired towards his own Quarters. The last Advices from Turkey say, That the Grand Visier does wholly apply himself to the Preparations for carrying on the War, and that he intends to have three Armies in Hungary this Summer. On the other side we prepare likewise for the Campagne, with all the diligence and vigor imaginable: The Emperor has resolved to augment his Forces in Hungary to 30000 Men; and to that end is treating for Troops with the King of Denmark.

the House of *Lunenburg*, and the Bishop of *Munster*, and his Minister at *Berlin* solicites Recruits for the *Brandenburg Forces* now in his Imperial Majesty's Service. The Emperor has declared, General *Heifler*, the Prince of *Commercy*, and the Prince of *Montecuculi*, Generals of his Horse. Prince *Lewis of Biden* is just now arrived here from *Bohemia*.

Hydelberg, March 4. The Cruelties of the French have forced the few Inhabitants that remain'd at *Manheim*, wholly to forsake that once famous City, and to retire hither, and to other places on the *Neckar*. The French Troops in *Alsace* are in motion, but 'tis only to reinforce the Garrisons of *Monroyal* and *Philipsburg*, and to send Detachements to *Flanders*. The Officers of the Imperial and Saxon Forces that are quartered in these parts, are very busie in making their Recruits, which they are to have compleat by the end of the next Month.

Hamburg, March 4. The Marquis de *Fleury* is come hither to raise Scamen to serve in the Fleet of Gallies and Barks which the Emperor has resolv'd to employ on the *Danube* this Summer, and he has already got a good number of Men.

Francfort, March 5. We have an account by Letters of the 28th past from *Lintz*, That my Lord Ambassador *Harbord* was arrived there in his way to *Vienna*. General *Palfi* is come back from *Mentz* with the Hussars under his Command, and is now marching towards the *Bergstræet*. The Emperor has call'd upon this City to furnish their Quota of Men for the Service of the Empire.

Cologne, March 7. The Elector of *Cologne* continues still at *Bonne*, where the States of this Diocess, who are now assembled, have not yet taken any Resolution upon what was propos'd to them on the part of his Electoral Highness. The last Letters from *Municken* say, That the Elector of *Bavaria* would part from thence on the 8th of this Month, and purpos'd to be at *Bon* on the 12th or 13th, and after having had an interview there with his Brother, the Elector of *Cologne*, to proceed on his Journey to *Flanders*. The Elector *Palatin* has issued out strict and repeated Orders to all the Towns and Villages within his Territories, not to pay any Contributions to the French.

Hague, March 11. Prince *Waldecke* is expected here towards the end of this Week from *Cylenburg*; and in the mean time he has sent Orders to the Forces of this State to march nearer to the Frontiers of *Flanders*. They write from *Berlin*, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* has resolv'd to bring 23000 men into the Field Summer, to be employ'd against *France*; and that there was a Discourse, that his Electoral Highness would himself Command them.

Falmouth, March 3. The *Sun of Middleburg*, laden with Sugars from *Surinam*, is come into this Port, bound home. On Tuesday arrived here the *Spanish Alliance* from the *Greyn*.

Plimouth, March 6. On the 3d instant Their Majesties Ships the *Centurion*, *Chester*, *Misford*, and *Portsmouth*, sail'd from hence with about 40 Transport Ships bound with the Danish Soldiers for *Flanders*. The same day came in the *Mary Magdalen* from *St. Sebastians* bound for *Dublin*. And this day arrived in this Port the *Valentine*, the *Speedwell*, and the *Sarah*, all three laden with Wines from *O Porto*, and bound to *London*; As also the *Ostrich*, laden with Bees-Wax and Copper for *London*.

Portsmouth, March 9. Yesterday sail'd from *Spithead* Their Majesties Ship the *Plimouth*, with several Merchantmen under her Convoy to the Eastward. This day the Expedition sail'd out of this Harbour, where there now remains of the great Ships

designed for this next Summers Expedition, only the *Defiance*, who will be ready to sail the next Week. *Deal, March 7.* The Danes are come into the Downs from *Plimouth*, under the Convoy of four Men of War; and it's believed they will sail again this afternoon for *Flanders*.
