Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to inquire into the Military preparations for the War in South Africa, and into the supply of men, ammunition, equipment, and transport by sea and land in connection with the Campaign, and into the Military operations up to the occupation of Pretoria:

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability,

have authorized and appointed, and do by these presents authorize and appoint, you, the said Victor Alexander, Earl of Elgin and Kincardine; Reginald Baliol, Viscount Esher; Sir George Dashwood Taubman-Goldie; Sir Henry Wylie Norman; Sir John Ommanney Hopkins; Sir John Edge; and Sir John Jackson to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry.

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine, all such books, documents, registers, and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do by these presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And We do by these presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for augmenting the incomes of the Archdeaconry of Lynn, the Archdeaconry of Norfolk the Archdeaconry of Norwich and the Archdeaconry of Suffolk all in the diocese of Norwich.

"Whereas part of the income of each of the said Archdeaconries of Lynn, Norfolk, Norwich and Suffolk has hitherto been derived from procurations synodals visitation fees and induction fees or some or one of these sources, and it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that it is undesirable that fees derived from any of these sources should continue to be received by such Archdeacons as aforesaid and such Archdeacons have discontinued to collect such fees.

"And whereas by reason of such discontinuance the income of each of such Archdeacons as aforesaid has been diminished and reduced below the yearly sum of two hundred pounds.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the augmentation hereinafter recommended and proposed is required in order to raise the annual income of each of the said Archdeacons to two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Norwich (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consents of the Right Reverend Arthur Thomas Lloyd Suffragan Bishop of Thetford now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Lynn the Venerable Sidney Pelham now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Norfolk the Venerable Thomas Thomason Perowne now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Norwich and the Venerable Charles D'Aguiar Lawrence now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Suffolk (in testimony whereof they the said Archdeacons have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) humbly recommend and propose that subject as is hereinafter mentioned we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners be authorized to pay by half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen (firstly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Lynn and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of fifty-seven pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and forty-three pounds now payable

by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry (secondly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Norfolk and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of forty-six pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and fifty-four pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry (thirdly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Norwich and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of fifty-seven pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and forty-three pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry and (fourthly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Suffolk and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of sixty-eight pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and thirty-two pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that the first year in respect of which the said yearly sums of fifty-seven pounds forty-six pounds fifty-seven pounds and sixty-eight pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Lynn, the said Archdeacon of Norfolk the said Archdeacon of Norwich and the said Archdeacon of Suffolk respectively shall be payable shall be the year ending the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and three and that every payment in respect of the said yearly sums or one or more of them shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations synodals visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive one of the said yearly sums of fifty-seven pounds forty-six pounds fifty-seven pounds and sixty-eight pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Lynn the said Archdeacon of Norfolk the said Archdeacon of Suffolk respectively shall resign or otherwise avoid his Archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or either of them or any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Norwich.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip Nelson situate within the new parish (sometime district) of Great Marsden in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Great Marsden, of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Little Marsden in the said county and diocese, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Mary Nelson, in Little Marsden in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Great Marsden, of the said new parish of Little Marsden, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Nelson, in Little Marsden, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same shall be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip, Nelson, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of Manchester as diocesan, as alternate patron in right of his See of the vicarage of the said new parish of Great Marsden, and as one of the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary Nelson, in Little Marsden (in testimony whereof he has affixed his signature and his episcopal seal to this representation) with the consent of the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury as the other alternate patron on behalf of Your Majesty of the said vicarage of the said new parish of Great Marsden (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation) with the consent of the trustees of the estates devised by William Hulme Esquire, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Little Marsden (in testimony whereof they have affixed their common seal to this representation) and with the consents of William Farrer Ecroyd of Credenhill Park in the county of Hereford Esquire, one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace and a Deputy Lieutenant of the said county, Edward Ecroyd of Low House, Armathwaite, in the county of

Cumberland Esquire, one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace, William Harry Hartley of Hoarstones near Burnley in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, and Harry MacKnowles Walton of Walverden House Nelson Esquire as the remaining patrons of the said vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary Nelson in Little Marsden (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Great Marsden, of the said new parish of Little Marsden, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Nelson in Little Marsden, which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Philip Nelson situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Philip Nelson.'

"We, therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Philip Nelson comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district) of Great Marsden, of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Little Marsden, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Mary Nelson in Little Marsden all in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of the bridge at the north-eastern end of Nelson Railway Station which carries the Clifton Accrington and Colne line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway across Railway-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said street for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with Scotland-road and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-named road (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Little Marsden from the new parish of Saint Mary Nelson in Little Marsden aforesaid) for a distance of forty-nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge called Walverden Bridge which carries the said road across the stream known as Walverden Water upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Nelson in Little Marsden from the new parish of Great Marsden aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then westward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following the middle of the said stream) for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to the point near the junction of the said stream with the stream known as Pendle Water where the last-mentioned boundary meets the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Thomas Barrowford in the said county and diocese from the said new parish of Great Marsden and extending thence first northward, then eastward and then generally north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby partly following the course of the last-mentioned stream, and the course of the stream known as Colne Water) for a distance of one mile and

twenty-two chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned stream is joined by the stream flowing through Swinden Clough and extending thence south-eastward along the centre of the last-mentioned stream (thereby following the boundary of the municipal borough of Nelson) for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the said Clifton Accrington and Colne Line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway over the last-mentioned stream and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Great Marsden from the new parish of Little Marsden aforesaid) for a distance of one mile and four chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge at the north-eastern end of Nelson Station which carries the said line of railway over Railway-street at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four and of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John Isleworth and of the new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow both in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the second day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven and published in the London Gazette upon the sixth day of the same month a part of the parish of Isleworth (in the said county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid) was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of

Saint John the Baptist situate within the limits of such parish and such district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Isleworth.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint John Isleworth has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the thirtieth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven and published in the London Gazette on the first day of May following certain contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth and of the new parish of (Holy Trinity) Hounslow in the said county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen situate at Hounslow within the limits of the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth and such consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Stephen Hounslow.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Stephen Hounslow has under the provisions of the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character which is hereinbefore mentioned.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth and of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth and of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow shall be altered so that (firstly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be annexed to and in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow and (secondly) all that portion of the said parish of Isleworth which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green shall be annexed to the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned

Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint John Isleworth in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow in the same county and diocese, being all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Isleworth which is bounded upon the south by the new parish of Saint Philip and Saint James, Whitton in the said county and diocese upon the north-west by the said new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north, upon the east and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Stephen Hounslow from the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth at the centre of the bridge which carries Heath-road over the loop line of the London and South-Western Railway and extending thence first eastward, then north-eastward and then again eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction opposite Worton Hall with the road leading to Whitton and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road (thereby passing Worton Farm-house) for a distance of fifty-five chains or thereabouts to the point nearly opposite to Whitton Farm-house where the said road crosses the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Isleworth from the new parish of Saint Philip and Saint James, Whitton aforesaid.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth being all that portion of the parish of Isleworth in the said county and diocese which is bounded upon the south-east upon the south and upon the south-west by the parish of Twickenham in the said county and diocese upon the north-west and upon the north by the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Isleworth from the said parish of Isleworth at the junction of Mogden-lane with Twickenham-road and extending thence southward along the middle of last-named road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the point at the centre of Ivy Bridge where the boundaries of the said parish of Isleworth the new parish of All Souls Saint Margaret's-on-Thames in the said county and diocese and the said parish of Twickenham all meet."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to

direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend in certain particulars regulations prescribed by Orders made by Her late Majesty in Council on the fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, respecting appointments to, and employments in, the Civil Service of the State:—

Now therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Clause VI of the said Order in Council of the fourth June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, as amended by Clause II of the said Order in Council of the nineteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, is hereby cancelled and the following Clause is substituted therefor:—

After the candidate has passed his examination and his certificate of qualification has been issued by the Commissioners, he shall enter on a period of probation of at least one year. During this time his conduct and capacity in the transaction of business shall be subjected to such tests as may be determined by the chief of the department for which he is intended, and he shall not be finally appointed to the public service unless his probation shall furnish to the head of his department satisfactory proof of his fitness to be permanently employed in that department.

This Clause shall not be interpreted as reducing any period of probation of greater length than one year which may be prescribed for any particular situation by any other Order or regulation.

2. The following shall be added to Clause six of the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight:—

In ascertaining the order of merit, such allowance may be made as the Civil Service Commissioners and the Treasury may from time to time prescribe in respect of previous service as a boy copyist or boy clerk.

3. The following shall be added to Clause nine of the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight:—

PASSPORTS IN SERVIA AND ELSEWHERE.

His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received a Despatch from His Majesty's Minister at Belgrade, pointing out that British subjects travelling to Serbia should on no account omit to provide themselves beforehand with passports, which are the only documents accepted as proof of identity by the Servian Police Officials. Such passports, if intended to be used for the purpose of a journey through Serbia into Turkey or Roumania, should bear the visa of a Turkish or Roumanian Consular Officer, as the case may be.
