WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Prebend of Selsey in the Cathedral Church of Chichester and now vested in us.

“Whereas on the vacancy of the said prebend which occurred on or about the sixth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine by the decease of the Reverend Thomas Valentine the then prebendary all the hereditaments then belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen

absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the hereditaments aforesaid which consist only of a pension of ten pounds per annum payable by the rector of Selsey are not subject to any outstanding lease or grant and are in our possession but are inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said hereditaments or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said hereditaments should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest therein in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty the hereditaments formerly belonging to the said prebend and so vested in us as aforesaid and all our estate right title and interest therein unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of lands tithes rent charges tenements or other hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester. *A. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the

sixth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for augmenting the income of the Archdeaconry of Sudbury, in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas part of the income of the said Archdeaconry of Sudbury has hitherto been derived from procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees, or some or one of these sources, and it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that it is undesirable that fees derived from any of these sources should continue to be received by such Archdeacon as aforesaid and such Archdeacon has discontinued to collect such fees.

"And whereas by reason of such discontinuance the income of such Archdeacon as aforesaid has been diminished and reduced below the yearly sum of two hundred pounds.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the augmentation hereinafter recommended and proposed is required in order to raise the average annual income of the said Archdeacon to two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Alwyne Bishop of Ely (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the Venerable George Hodges now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Sudbury (in testimony whereof he the said Archdeacon has signed and sealed this scheme) humbly recommend and propose that subject as is hereinafter mentioned we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners be authorized to pay by half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Sudbury and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of forty pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and sixty pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that the first year in respect of which the said yearly sum of forty pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Sudbury shall be payable shall be the year ending the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, and that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations synodals visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of forty pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Sudbury shall resign or otherwise avoid his Archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and

the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or either of them or any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ely.

"Whereas part of the income of each of the said Archdeaconries of Craven and Richmond has hitherto been derived from procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees or some or one of these sources and it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that it is undesirable that fees derived from any of these sources should continue to be received by such Archdeacons as aforesaid and such Archdeacons have discontinued to collect such fees.

"And whereas by reason of such discontinuance the income of each of such Archdeacons as aforesaid has been diminished and reduced below the yearly sum of two hundred pounds.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the augmentation hereinafter recommended and proposed is required in order to raise the annual income of the said Archdeacons to two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consents of the Venerable Francis Charles Kilner now Archdeacon of the

said Archdeaconry of Craven and the Venerable William Danks now Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Richmond (in testimony whereof they the said Archdeacons have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) humbly recommend and propose that subject as is hereinafter mentioned we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners be authorized to pay by half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen (firstly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Craven and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of eighteen pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and eighty-two pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry and (secondly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Richmond and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry the yearly sum of twelve pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and eighty-eight pounds now payable by us to the Archdeacon for the time being of the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that the first year in respect of which the said yearly sums of eighteen pounds and twelve pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Craven and the said Archdeacon of Richmond respectively shall be payable shall be the year ending the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and three and that every payment in respect of the said yearly sums or one or more of them shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations synodals or visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive one of the said yearly sums of eighteen pounds and twelve pounds hereinbefore recommended to be paid to the said Archdeacon of Craven and the said Archdeacon of Richmond respectively shall resign or otherwise avoid his Archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or either of them or any other Act of Parliament."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twentieth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, in the words following that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine; and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called ‘the said benefice’) of Rhayader in the county of Radnor and in the diocese of Saint David's.

“Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Rhayader is vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the parish of Nantmel in the said county of Radnor and in the said diocese of Saint David's.

“And whereas the Reverend Gethin Williams Griffith Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Rhayader now vested in him as aforesaid as such vicar or incumbent should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Saint David's.

“And whereas the Right Reverend John now Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Rhayader which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish or chapelry of Rhayader.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Gethin Williams Griffith vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Nantmel acting as such vicar or incumbent (in testimony whereof he has

signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Rhayader, now vested in him the said Gethin Williams Griffith as such vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Nantmel as aforesaid shall be transferred from him the said Gethin Williams Griffith and from his successors vicars or incumbents of the said vicarage of Nantmel to the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of “The Pluralities Act 1838” after reciting that “Whereas in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapeltries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted “That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or

“district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect.”

And whereas the Right Reverend Augustus, Lord Bishop of Lichfield, hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

“I Augustus by Divine Permission Bishop of Lichfield do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of ‘The Pluralities Act 1838’ hereby represent unto your Grace as follows:—

“1. There is in the county of Stafford and my diocese of Lichfield the benefice (being a vicarage) of Caverswall the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of five thousand seven hundred and sixty. The net annual value of the said vicarage arising from tithe rent charge, glebe, and fees is two hundred and fifty pounds or thereabouts.

“2. There is also in the said county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield the benefice (being a rectory) of Bucknall and Bagnall the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of four thousand five hundred and fifty-three or thereabouts. The net annual value of the said rectory arising from tithe rent charge, glebe fees and an annual payment by the Governors of Queen Anne’s Bounty is three hundred and sixty pounds or thereabouts.

“3. There is also in the said county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield the benefice (being a new vicarage sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Baptist Lane End the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of eight thousand three hundred and eighty-five or thereabouts. The net annual value of the said new vicarage arising from fees and annual payments from the Stoke Rectory Fund the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Governors of Queen Anne’s Bounty is three hundred and sixty pounds or thereabouts.

“4. Certain portions of the said parish of Bucknall and Bagnall and more particularly described in the first part of the first schedule to the scheme hereunder written lie to the north-west of the said parish of Caverswall and contiguous thereto and certain detached portions

of the same parish and more particularly described in the second part of the same schedule lie wholly within the said parish of Caverswall. The said portions of the said parish of Bucknall and Bagnall described in the first and second parts of the said first schedule contain together an area of three hundred and eighty-six acres or thereabouts and a population of two hundred and eighteen. A certain portion of the said parish of Saint John Lane End containing an area of nine and a half acres and a population of seven hundred and eighty and more particularly described in the second schedule to the said scheme lies to the west of the said parish of Caverswall and contiguous thereto.

“5. It appears to me that under the provisions of ‘The Pluralities Act 1838’ the following alterations in the contents of the above-mentioned parishes may advantageously be made, viz.:—The separation of a district consisting of the portions referred to in the fourth preceding paragraph from the said parishes of Bucknall and Bagnall and Saint John the Baptist, Lane End respectively and the annexation thereof to the said parish of Caverswall.

“6. The said vicarage of Caverswall is in the patronage of William Robert Parker Jervis of Meaford Hall, Stone, in the said county of Stafford, Esquire one of His Majesty’s Justices of the Peace, the said rectory of Bucknall and Bagnall is in the patronage of Alfred Owen of Wood Hey Wrexham in the county of Denbigh, Esquire, and the said vicarage of Saint John the Baptist, Lane End is in the patronage of myself in right of my said Bishopric of Lichfield.

“7. The Reverend John Gordon Addenbrooke is the present Incumbent of the said vicarage of Caverswall.

“The Reverend George Thomas Birch is the present Incumbent of the said rectory of Bucknall and Bagnall, and

“The Reverend George Oliver is the present Incumbent of the said vicarage of Saint John the Baptist, Lane End:

“8. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Bishop of Lichfield have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the districts of the said parishes of Bucknall and Bagnall and Saint John the Baptist, Lane End, respectively so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Caverswall and the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charge, and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said patrons and Incumbents of the benefices of Caverswall, Bucknall and Bagnall, and Saint John the Baptist, Lane End aforesaid respectively to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents by your report to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the patrons and Incumbents of the said benefices respectively are as follows:—

“THE SCHEME.

“That a district consisting of those portions and detached portions of the said parish of

Bucknall and Bagnall which are more particularly described in the first and second parts of the first schedule hereto and together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured round with yellow shall be separated from the said parish of Bucknall and Bagnall and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Caverswall and that a district consisting of that portion of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, Lane End which is more particularly described in the second schedule hereto and together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the said map or plan and thereon coloured round with red shall be separated from the said parish of Saint John the Baptist Lane End and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Caverswall.

"That the Incumbent of the said parish of Caverswall shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within such districts.

"That the inhabitants of such districts shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Caverswall but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the parish churches of Saint Mary Bucknall and Saint John the Baptist Lane End respectively.

"That marriages baptisms churchings and burials shall be solemnized and performed in the parish church of Caverswall for the inhabitants of such districts, except burials of inhabitants of such part of the said districts as are locally situate within the borough of Longton, and all fees, dues, ecclesiastical offerings, and emoluments (except tithe rent-charge) arising from such districts, shall henceforth belong to the Incumbent of the parish of Caverswall.

"That no alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefices or any of them.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or any of them.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"First Part.

"1. All that portion of the township of Bucknall in the parish of Bucknall and Bagnall in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield which is bounded upon the east upon the south-east and upon the south by the parish of Caverswall in the same county and diocese and upon the north-east by the parish of Cheddleton in the same county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north and west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said township of Bucknall and the said parish of Cheddleton meets the middle of the footpath which leads from the lane from Withystakes to Armshead to Bucknall and extending thence in a westerly direction first along the middle of the said footpath to the north-east corner of the field number three hundred and eighty-two on the twenty-five-inch ordnance map for the said parish then along the northern fence of the said field to the point where the said fence meets Washerwall-lane and extending thence in a straight line and in the same direction to the point where the north-eastern corner of the field number three hundred and seventy-nine on the said map meets the last-mentioned lane extending thence along the northern and north-western fences of the said field number three hundred and seventy-nine and the field number three hundred and ninety-three in the said plan to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the brook which bounds the field number three hundred and ninety-four on the west and extending thence first in a southerly and then in a south-westerly direction along the middle of the said brook to the point where the same meets the western fence of the

grounds of Ash Hall numbered four hundred and seventy-four upon the said map and extending thence generally in a southerly direction along the said fence to the south-westernmost point thereof and extending thence in a straight line across the Hanley and Ashbourne turnpike road to the point where the same meets the western fence of the field numbered five hundred and twelve on the said map and extending thence in a south-easterly direction along the said fence and the western fence of the field number five hundred and nineteen on the said plan to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the brook forming the northern boundary of the closes numbered eight hundred and eighty-nine eight hundred and ninety-five eight hundred and ninety-six and nine hundred and extending thence in a westerly direction along the middle of the said brook to the point where it meets the western fence of the said close numbered nine hundred and extending thence in a southerly direction along the said fence and the western fence of the close number eight hundred and ninety-nine on the said plan to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the boundary of the said parishes of Bucknall and Bagnall and Caverswall.

"2. All that portion of the said township of Bucknall bounded upon the north-east and south by the said parish of Caverswall and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the last-mentioned parishes meets the western fence of the close number nine hundred and twenty-two on the said map and extending thence in a southerly direction along the last-mentioned fence to the south-westernmost corner thereof and thence along the western fence of the close number nine hundred and twenty-four on the said map to the point where the same meets the last-mentioned boundary

"3. All that triangular portion of the said township of Bucknall which is bounded on the south-east by the said parish of Caverswall on the north-west and south-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the said last-mentioned boundary meets the Widowfield-lane and extending thence in a south-westerly direction along the south-east side of the said lane to its junction with the Bentilee-road and extending thence south-eastward along the north side of the said last-mentioned road to the point where it meets the said last-mentioned parish boundary.

"4. All that irregularly shaped portion of the said township of Bucknall which is bounded on all sides except part of the north-west side thereof by the said parish of Caverswall and on such part of the north-west side thereof by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the last-mentioned parishes at the point where the same meets the Bentilee-road at the westernmost corner of the close numbered nine hundred and eighty-five on the said map and extending thence in a south-westerly direction along the middle of the said road to the point where the same meets the said last-mentioned parish boundary at the easternmost corner of the close numbered five hundred and forty-six on the said plan.

"Second Part.

"All those five detached portions of the said township of Bucknall lying wholly within the said parish of Caverswall and described on the said ordnance map as 'Stoke Parish Detached number one, number two, number three, number four, and number five' the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"All that portion of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist Lane End which is bounded on

the south-east by the said parish of Caverswall on the north-east by the newly formed consolidated chapelry of Saint Mary and Saint Chad Longton and on the remaining sides that is to say on the north-west and south-west by an imaginary line commencing at the junction of Forrester-street and Anchor-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the North Staffordshire Railway over the said last-mentioned road and extending thence in a south-easterly direction along the middle of the said railway for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the boundary which divides the said parish of Caverswall from the said parish of Saint John the Baptist Lane End.

"CONSENTS.

"We the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Lord Bishop of Lichfield being the patron or person entitled to collate to the benefice of Saint John the Baptist, Lane End, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend George Oliver, Clerk, the Incumbent of the same benefice, Alfred Owen, of Wood Hey, Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh, Esquire, being the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Bucknall and Bagnall, in the same county and diocese, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend George Thomas Birch, Clerk, the Incumbent of the same benefice, and William Robert Parker Jervis, of Meaford Hall, Stone, in the said county of Stafford, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, being the patron or person entitled to present an Incumbent to the benefice of Caverswall, in the same county and diocese, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend John Gordon Addenbrooke, Clerk, Incumbent of the same benefice, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the scheme above proposed and to every matter or thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands this twenty-seventh day of May, one thousand nine hundred and two.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop being the patron or person entitled to collate to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist Lane End in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend George Oliver the present Incumbent of the same benefice Alfred Owen of Wood Hey Wrexham in the county of Denbigh Esquire being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Bucknall and Bagnall in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend George Thomas Birch the present Incumbent of the same benefice and William Robert Parker Jervis of Meaford Hall Stone in the county of Stafford Esquire one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace being the patron or person entitled to present an Incumbent to the said benefice of Caverswall in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend John Gordon Addenbrooke the present Incumbent of the same benefice has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect. Provided also that in relation to the construction, maintenance, and use of the said vault or grave, the requirements of the law applicable to the case, except so far as those requirements may be varied by this Order, shall be duly observed and satisfied.

relating to burials in the Church and churchyard of Wellow, viz. :—

WELLOW, SOMERSET:—

Provided that—

(1) In the walled grave in which the body of the wife of Robert Long has been buried, the burial may be allowed of the body of the said Robert Long on his decease;

(2) In the walled grave in which the body of John King has been buried, the burial may be allowed of the body of the widow of the said John King on her decease;

(3) In the walled grave in which the bodies of Mical Gibbs and his wife have been buried, the burials may be allowed of the bodies of their son and daughter, that is to say, of John Gibbs and Martha Gibbs on their decease; and

(4) In the walled grave in which the body of George William Horton has been buried, the burials may be allowed of the bodies of Le Gendre George Horton, Clerk in Holy Orders, and of his wife, and also of Fanny Laura Horton, aunt of the said Le Gendre George Horton, on their decease, subject to the conditions that in preparation for each such burial in any of the said graves :—

(a) A stone slab shall be placed immediately above the coffin lastly therein before interred in the grave;

(b) A layer of Portland cement concrete, six inches in thickness, shall be placed so as to cover the entire surface of such stone slab; and

(c) Throughout the entire surface of such concrete and upon the whole of interior surface of each wall of the grave to a height of two feet above such concrete, a lining of Portland cement, one inch in thickness, shall be provided.

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1855," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered: provided also, that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that the powers and duties of the Secretary of State should be transferred to the Local Government Board:

And whereas the Local Government Board after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of Saint George, Kendal, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, have made a representation stating that they are of opinion that so much of the Order of Her late Majesty

in Council of the twenty-ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, as relates to the Castle-street Cemetery, Kendal, should be varied, by substituting for the directions relating to the said cemetery the following directions, viz. :—

KENDAL.—That burials in the Castle-street Cemetery, Kendal, shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely, except as follows :—

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said cemetery burial may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brick-work properly cemented.

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said cemetery burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.

(c.) In the said cemetery in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-seventh day of January next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-seventh day of January.

Statute.

In the Statutes made by the Commissioners for Queen's College, Stat. II 12, after the words "Every Fellow," the words "not being an official Fellow" shall be inserted.

Stat. II 19, as amended by Statutes approved by Her Majesty in Council (1) on the twenty-seventh of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and (2) on the third day of

March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, shall be struck out, and the following clause inserted in its place :—

"19. Every Official Fellow may marry or be married."

Stat. II 13, the words "(but subject to the provisions of Clause 19)" shall be struck out.

Stat. XXIII 6, the words "for the purposes of the provisions of Statute II 19, and otherwise" shall be struck out.

Stat. XXIII 7, the words from "so long as" to "provided always that" and the words "under the provisions of that clause" shall be struck out.

Alterations of Statutes made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, specially summoned for the purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting on the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and two.

In the Statutes made for Corpus Christi College, Oxford, by the University of Oxford Commissioners and approved by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council on the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two

Clause 19 (j) namely For the purposes of this clause years of service as Assistant Tutor shall

count as half the same number of years as full Tutor—shall be repealed.

In Clause 22 (a) after paragraph ii the following additional paragraph shall be inserted namely:—

iii. Any person who shall have served the College as Tutor or Assistant Tutor for a period of not less than ten years provided always that the Fellowship shall be reckoned as part of any pension to which he may have become entitled.

In Clause 77 (3) β the words "or extraordinary" shall be inserted between the words "ordinary" and "Fellowships."

Clause 77 (3) γ shall be repealed and the following words substituted "Payment of the sum of £500 per annum to the Pension Fund or of so much of that sum as the revenues of the College admit."

Clause 77 (4) (b) α shall be repealed and the following words substituted "The additional charge for Scholarships and Exhibitions under these Statutes."

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Saint John's College, Cambridge, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of the College of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge which amending Statutes were duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the twenty-eighth day of November 1902 and having been passed at such meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We the Master and Fellows of the College of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge (being the Governing Body thereof) in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 do hereby alter and amend the existing Statutes of our said College in the manner following:

By repealing Statute X intituled "The Deans" (made on the 21st day of March 1881 and approved by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council on the 3rd day of May 1882) and by substituting therefor the following Statute to form an amended Statute X:

Statute X. The Deans.

There shall be elected annually a Dean or Deans. The duty of the Dean or Deans shall be to superintend the conduct and behaviour of the members of the College *in statu pupillari*, and to give effect to such rules and regulations as may from time to time be made by the Council for the celebration of Divine Service in the College Chapel, and to see that all persons conduct themselves decently therein.

A Dean shall not be absent from College during any period when he is required by these Statutes, or by order of the Council to be in residence, without appointing a deputy, to be approved by the Master, or in his absence by the President.

If there is no Dean in Holy Orders, such part of the Dean's duties as refers to the celebration of Divine Service in the College Chapel shall be assigned to some person or persons in Holy Orders appointed under Statute XXXVIII.

By repealing Statute XIII intituled "The Election of Officers" (made and approved as aforesaid) and by substituting therefor the following Statute to form an amended Statute XIII:

Statute XIII. Election of Officers.

The Council shall elect annually the President and the Dean or Deans at their first meeting after the annual election to the Council, unless they shall otherwise direct; and the two Treasurers or Bursars and the Steward on the day after the completion of the annual audit, unless such day shall be a Sunday, and then on the day following.

By repealing Statute XX intituled "Tenure of Fellowships" (made and approved as aforesaid) and by substituting therefor the following Statute to form an amended Statute XX:

Statute XX. Tenure of Fellowships.

All Fellowships shall, except as hereinafter directed, be tenable until ten days before the expiration of six years from the time of election and no longer, provided always that no Fellowship, except as hereinafter directed, shall be tenable by any person who is of more than ten years' standing from his first degree. No person who has vacated his Fellowship by lapse of time shall be capable of re-election except under the conditions prescribed by Statute XXIII or Statute XXIV.

Nevertheless no one elected to a Fellowship under the provisions of Statute XXIII of these Statutes nor any Fellow so long as he holds the office of Professor Reader Public Orator Librarian or Registrary in the University or of Vice-Master President Dean Tutor Lecturer Senior Bursar Junior Bursar or Steward in the College shall vacate his Fellowship by reason of lapse of time: and a Vice-Master President Dean Tutor Lecturer Senior Bursar Junior Bursar or Steward who has held his office for twenty years shall be entitled to hold his Fellowship for life.

The Council may permit any Fellow to retain his Fellowship (though he be not holding any of the aforesaid offices) after the expiration of the said limited tenure, if they shall be satisfied that such extension of tenure is desirable in the interests of education, religion, learning or research. Such permission shall only be given at a meeting of the Council (exclusive of such Fellow if he be a member thereof) by a resolution in which the votes of at least nine members of the Council shall have concurred, and it shall not extend to more than five years from the time at which such Fellow would in default of such special permission have vacated his Fellowship. Such permission may be renewed from time to time by the same authority for periods of not more than five years.

The Council may require of such Fellow, as a condition of such extension of tenure, that he shall reside in the University during such portion of each academical year as they shall determine, and that he shall deliver such lectures or perform such other duties as they shall prescribe, with or without further remuneration; or they may excuse him from any such duties or residence.

The Council may so extend the tenure of any Fellowship at any time within the three years preceding the date at which the Fellowship would otherwise terminate.

No Fellow who by these Statutes is entitled to retain his Fellowship in virtue of any College

or University office shall forfeit that privilege by vacating any such office, provided that he shall actually accept and hold some other of such offices, or be re-elected to his previous office within a time not later than the end of the next succeeding Term.

No Professor or Reader shall be deemed to be a Professor or Reader of the University, within the meaning of this Statute, unless by the rules which govern his office he be liable to residence and duties within the University.

The Council may appoint Assistant Lecturers, who shall not be entitled to hold their Fellowships beyond the expiration of the limited tenure aforesaid.

In order to maintain due discipline within the College, the President, Deans, and Tutors, or such other College Officers as the Council may from time to time determine, shall be required to reside within the College during such portion, being not less than two-thirds, of each Term as the Council shall determine, and shall hold office only so long as they shall so reside, except where such residence shall in the opinion of the Council have been prevented by sickness or other inevitable cause.

The Council shall make such provision as may from time to time seem to them expedient for the residence in College of College Officers or Fellows acting as their deputies during vacations.

The Council shall have the power of requiring any College Officer to reside in College during full Term, and during such part of the Long Vacation as they may think necessary for the due maintenance of discipline.

Every College Officer or Fellow who is fulfilling the duty of residence in College under this Statute shall sleep in College at least five nights in each week. Provided always, that a house communicating with the College and approved by the Council shall for the purposes of this section be deemed to be within the College.

A Fellow of the College shall vacate his Fellowship if he shall become Master or Fellow of any other College.

Every Fellow who shall be instituted or admitted to any benefice in the patronage of the College of the clear annual value of not less than four hundred pounds (after deducting rates, taxes, and all other legal charges) shall vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of one year after his presentation to such benefice, or in the event of its being reduced below the sum of four hundred pounds per annum by the pension paid to a previous incumbent at the expiration of one year after the falling in of the pension, unless the Fellow shall in the interval have resigned the benefice.

If a doubt arise as to the clear annual value above mentioned, the same shall be determined by the Council after sufficient inquiry into the circumstances of the same on the application of the Fellow who is about to be so instituted or admitted and shall be stated in a College Order. Any Fellow of the College may, at his discretion, call for such a determination of the annual value of a benefice when it is vacant. The annual value determined as aforesaid shall be deemed to be final and conclusive for the purposes of these Statutes until the next succeeding vacancy of the benefice.

Every benefice to which the patron is bound to present a Fellow of the College shall as regards the vacation of Fellowships be deemed to be in the patronage of the College.

By repealing Statute XXXVII intituled "Discipline of the College" (made and approved as aforesaid) and by substituting therefor the

following Statute to form an amended Statute XXXVII:

Statute XXXVII. Discipline of the College.

All persons *in statu pupillari* shall show due reverence and obedience to the Master, the Fellows, and the Officers of the College: they shall conduct themselves in a quiet and orderly manner, shall observe the Statutes, and shall conform to all such orders and regulations as may be made by the Council from time to time for the good government of the College. If any such person (not being a Fellow of the College) shall not observe the Statutes or the orders and regulations above referred to, or shall be guilty of any offence contrary to discipline and good order, or tending to bring scandal upon the College, he shall be punished by the Master, or in his absence by the President, or by a Dean acting on their behalf respectively, in such manner (short of removal from the College) as the offence may appear to deserve. The penalty of temporary or final removal from the College, or, in the case of a Scholar, of deprivation of his Scholarship or temporary forfeiture of the emoluments and advantages thereof may be inflicted by the Council.

By repealing Statute XLIII intituled "Distribution of Revenues" (made on the 28th day of October 1898 and approved by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council on the 14th day of July, 1899) and by substituting therefor the following Statute to form an amended Statute XLIII:

Statute XLIII. Distribution of Revenues.

The income of the College, after payment of the ordinary expenses, including all commons allowed by these Statutes, and of such stipends and salaries to the Lecturers and other Officers and the Servants of the College as shall have been fixed by the Council, shall be paid, applied, and distributed as follows, that is to say:

To the Master a fixed annual stipend of seven hundred and ninety pounds (£790) as provided by the Statute for that purpose.

To each Fellow of the College holding a Professorship in the University the stipend whereof is reduced by two hundred pounds (£200) when the Professor holds a Fellowship (hereinafter and in Statute LIV designated a Professorial Fellow) the sum of two hundred pounds (£200).

To each of the Scholars such annual payment, not being less than forty pounds (£40), as the Council shall subject to the provisions of Statute XXX determine, the whole sum so distributed in Scholarships being not less than two thousand seven hundred pounds (£2,700) in each year.

To each of the Minor Scholars such annual payment, not being less than fifty pounds (£50) nor more than eighty pounds (£80), as the Council shall determine.

To each of the nine Sizars such annual payment (if any) as the Council shall from time to time determine.

And, subject to these payments and to the payment in each year of the Contribution to the University under Statute XLII and to such other payments as in the judgment of the Council may be required for the purposes of the College and the management or improvement of its estates and property, there shall be paid:

To every Fellow of the College other than a Professorial Fellow as hereinbefore defined such sum as the Council shall fix for the dividend of the year, not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds (£250).

To the Master a sum equal to three and three-fifths times the amount of such dividend.

To each Member of the Council a sum equal to one-fifth of such dividend, in addition to his dividend.

To the Pension Fund a sum equal to two such dividends.

And to each Professorial Fellow as hereinbefore defined the sum, if any, by which the dividend of the year shall exceed two hundred pounds (£200).

Provided, that if any person shall have been Master, Member of the Council, Fellow, Foundation Scholar, Minor Scholar, Sizar, or Officer of the College, for a part only of the year, he shall be entitled only to one-fourth part of his annual stipend, dividend, or allowance for each quarter of the year, or part of a quarter greater than a half, during which he may have been Master, Member of the Council, Fellow, Foundation Scholar, Minor Scholar, Sizar, or Officer.

All Fellows of the College shall be entitled, in addition to such dividend as is above provided, to rooms and commons, if in residence, or to such

pecuniary allowances in lieu thereof as the Council shall from time to time determine.

By adding the following Statute to form Statute LV:

Statute LV. Pension Fund.

From the date of the confirmation of this present Statute by His Majesty in Council no further payment shall be made to the Pension Fund as directed by Statute XXVI in respect of the property and income administered by the College under the Wills of Pierce Brackenbury Doctor of Medicine and Francis Robins Master of Arts but in lieu thereof there shall be paid to the Pension Fund in each year out of the general revenues of the College a sum equal to twice the dividend for the year as ascertained under Statute XLIII.

By adding also the following Statute to form Statute LVI:

Statute LVI. Open Exhibition Fund.

it is provided that on the occasion of a vacancy of any of the Exhibitions on any of these several Foundations if no duly qualified candidate shall present himself from the several Schools having a preference or none such of sufficient merit to deserve election the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition provided that in these cases it shall be tenable for one year only.

From the date of the confirmation of this present Statute by His Majesty in Council no further elections shall be made to these several Exhibitions so treated as open to general competition as aforesaid. But the annual value of each such Exhibition shall be paid to a Fund to be called the Open Exhibition Fund for the term for which each such Exhibition is by virtue

of the several Statutes hereinbefore cited treated as open.

In lieu of the Exhibitions to be offered for open competition under the several Statutes hereinbefore cited the Council is hereby empowered to offer for open competition Exhibitions tenable for such terms of years and of such annual values as the Council shall in each case determine. Such Exhibitions to be paid out of the income of the Open Exhibition Fund.

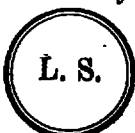

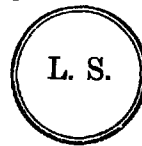

following regulations be observed as regards vessels and passengers, viz.:—

Infected Places.

1. The following countries are, for purposes of quarantine, to be treated as infected:—

- (a.) Arabia (excepting Perim and Aden);
- (b.) China;
- (c.) Egypt (excepting Port Said and Suez);
- (d.) India;
- (e.) Odessa.

2. And the following ports:—

- (a.) Ports in the Persian Gulf;
- (b.) Syria between Sur and Port Said (exclusive of the latter port).

Infected Vessels.

3. Infected vessels are vessels which have, or have had, on board, during the voyage or the preceding 20 days, cases of cholera, yellow fever, plague, or any disease with symptoms which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, resemble the symptoms of the said diseases.

Vessels which are not allowed to enter the Harbour, but are allowed to communicate with Quarantine Establishments.

4. Infected vessels.

5. Vessels with pilgrims from the East, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

6. Vessels from infected places, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels allowed to load in Quarantine.

7. Vessels arriving at Malta without a clean bill of health.

8. Infected vessels when carrying a recognized Medical Officer and not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3 on board.

9. Vessels from infected places not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3, when arriving within 10 days from departure.

10. Vessels with pilgrims from the East when carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels from Infected Places admitted to pratique.

11. Vessels without a clean bill of health, or from infected places, will be admitted to pratique after 10 days from date of departure.

Medical Inspection.

12. All vessels and passengers on arrival are subject to medical inspection.

Passengers.

13. Passengers, before landing, must declare on oath before a Marine Police Officer that they have not been in, or have not communicated with, an infected place within the last 10 days. Otherwise they shall remain in quarantine to complete 10 days from departure.

14. Passengers arriving on vessels without a clean bill of health shall complete 10 days' quarantine from departure.

15. Passengers arriving from infected places, after 10 days from date of departure are allowed to land in free pratique after strict medical inspection and thorough disinfection of their persons, effects, and luggage, if the inspecting Medical Officer is satisfied that they are in good health.

16. Passengers not otherwise provided for are subjected to the restrictions applicable to the vessels on which they arrive.

17. When 20 days have elapsed from the last case of plague, cholera, or other disease against which restrictions have been in force with regard to a country or place declared to be an infected place, a notice will be issued by the Collector of Customs to the effect that the place or port is no longer to be dealt with as infected.

N.B.—Vessels that carry a doctor and pass through the Suez Canal without taking on board either cargo or passengers, will not be considered infected by contact with Canal Pilots taken on board from a disinfecting station or by coaling and provisioning at Port Said or Suez, under restrictions approved by the Chief Government Medical Officer.

The word "passengers," as used in this Notice, includes the crew.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE (SWINE-FEVER)
ORDER OF 1902.

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, with modifications, to certain Scheduled Districts.

1. The provisions of the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 shall apply to the Districts specified in the First Schedule hereto, (in this Order referred to as Scheduled Districts,) as if they had been declared by Special Order of the Board to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area, but subject to the modifications hereinafter contained.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority may grant a Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition of swine in a Scheduled District, if they are satisfied that the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held in a market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition which is capable of being cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the next following Article, and thereupon the market fair sale or exhibition may be held accordingly.

(2.) A Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market fair sale or exhibition (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held, and may authorize the holding of periodical markets fairs sales or exhibitions on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding three months, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time or revoked at any time by the Local Authority.

(3.) A Licence shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to ensure publicity for the same, and a copy of the Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition where such market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article.

(5.) A fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority and named in the Licence for the purpose of receiving Licences authorizing movement of swine to the market fair sale or exhibition, and for granting Licences for movement of swine therefrom in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

(6.) No swine shall be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare into a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Article unless accompanied by a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Markets, &c.

3. Every market fair-ground sale-yard and place of exhibition in which a market fair sale or exhibition of swine is held under the last preceding Article, shall so soon as practicable after the holding of the market fair sale or exhibition, and in any case before it is again used for swine, be cleansed and disinfected as follows—

- (i.) all parts of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition that have been used for swine shall be thoroughly scraped and swept, and all dung, sawdust, litter, or other matter effectually removed therefrom; then
- (ii.) the same parts shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water; then
- (iii.) the same parts shall be disinfected in such manner as the Local Authority may direct; and
- (iv.) the scrapings and sweepings shall be well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Licences for Movement out of Licensed Markets, &c.

4.—(1.) Swine exposed at a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order may be moved from the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition along over or across a highway or thoroughfare in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District if accompanied by a Licence authorizing such movement—(in the Form set forth in the Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or to the like effect)—granted by the Local Authority of the District in which the market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue.

(3.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and where the place of destination specified in the Licence is in a Swine-Fever Infected Area, or a Scheduled District, the swine shall be moved to such place and not elsewhere.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

5.—(1.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to a market fair sale or exhibition in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall be delivered up at the entrance to the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition by the person in charge of the swine to the person appointed under this Order to receive the same.

(2.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to any other premises in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the said movement.

Attendance at Markets, &c.

6. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

7. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Markets, &c. of Swine by Licence of Board.

8. Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions and in addition thereto a market fair sale or exhibition of swine may be held with a Licence of the Board, which Licence will only be granted where the Board after inquiry are satisfied that exceptional circumstances render such market fair sale or exhibition necessary or expedient.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

10. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Forms.

11. For the purposes of any Movement Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order, the Scheduled Districts shall be deemed to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area.

Special Provision as to certain parts of the Scheduled Districts.

12. From and after the commencement of this Order, the area described in the Second Schedule hereto shall cease to be a separate Swine-Fever Infected Area and shall become subject to the provisions of this Order.

Offences.

13.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which

the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fail to deliver up or send a Licence, as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any place in or in respect of which the same is omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

14. In this Order—

ESSEX (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1902.

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order; and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, with modification, to certain Scheduled Districts.

1. The provisions of the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 shall apply to the Districts specified in the First Schedule hereto, (in this Order referred to as Scheduled Districts,) as if they had been declared by Special Order of the Board to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area, but subject to the modifications hereinafter contained.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority may grant a Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition of swine in a Scheduled District, if they are satisfied that the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held in a market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition which is capable of being cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the next following Article, and thereupon the market fair sale or exhibition may be held accordingly.

(2.) A Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market fair sale or exhibition (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held, and may authorize the holding of periodical markets fairs sales or exhibitions on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding three months, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time or revoked at any time by the Local Authority.

(3.) A Licence shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to ensure publicity for the same, and a copy of the Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition where such market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article.

(5.) A fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority and named in the Licence for the purpose of receiving Licences authorizing movement of swine to the market fair sale or exhibition, and for granting Licences for movement of swine therefrom in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

(6.) No swine shall be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare into a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Article unless accompanied by a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Markets, &c.

3. Every market fair-ground sale-yard and place of exhibition in which a market fair sale or exhibition of swine is held under the last preceding Article, shall so soon as practicable after the holding of the market fair sale or exhibition, and in any case before it is again used for swine, be cleansed and disinfected as follows—

- (i.) all parts of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition that have been used for swine shall be thoroughly scraped and swept, and all dung, sawdust, litter, or other matter effectually removed therefrom; then
- (ii.) the same parts shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water; then
- (iii.) the same parts shall be disinfected in such manner as the Local Authority may direct; and
- (iv.) the scrapings and sweepings shall be well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Licences for Movement out of Licensed Markets, &c.

4.—(1.) Swine exposed at a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order may be moved from the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition along over or across a highway or thoroughfare in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District if accompanied by a Licence authorizing such movement—in the Form set forth in the Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or to the like effect—granted by the Local Authority of the District in which the market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue.

(3.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and where the place of destination specified in the Licence is in a Swine-Fever Infected Area, or a Scheduled District, the swine shall be moved to such place and not elsewhere.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

5.—(1.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to a market fair sale or exhibition in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall be delivered up at the entrance to the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition by the person in charge of the swine to the person appointed under this Order to receive the same.

(2.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to any other premises in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the said movement.

Attendance at Markets, &c.

6. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

7. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Markets, &c. of Swine by Licence of Board.

8. Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions and in addition thereto a market fair sale or exhibition of swine may be held with a Licence of the Board, which Licence will only be granted where the Board after inquiry are satisfied that exceptional circumstances render such market fair sale or exhibition necessary or expedient.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

10. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Forms.

11. For the purposes of any Movement Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order, the Scheduled Districts shall be deemed to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area.

Special Provision as to certain parts of the Scheduled Districts.

12. From and after the commencement of this Order, the area described in the Second Schedule hereto shall cease to be a separate Swine-Fever Infected Area and shall become subject to the provisions of this Order; Provided that; unless and until the Board otherwise order, no market fair sale or exhibition of swine shall be held in any place in the area so described.

Offences.

13.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved

in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fail to deliver up or send a Licence, as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any place in or in respect of which the same is omitted shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

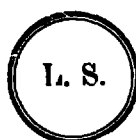

(Purchase by Compulsion or Agreement of Undertaking of the Wellington Coal and Gas Light Company; Maintenance, Improvement, and Extension of Existing Gasworks; Supply of Gas in Wellington and the neighbourhood thereof; Provisions for Regulating Supply of Gas; Meters and Fittings; Rates and Charges; Supply of Electrical Fittings; Borrowing Powers; Raising and Application of Monies; Application of Revenue of Gas Undertaking; Bye-laws; Penalties; Incorporation, Amendment, and Repeal of Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session by the Urban District Council of Wellington (Salop) (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") for an Act for all or some of the following purposes and objects (that is to say):—

1. To empower the Council to purchase by compulsion or agreement the gasworks and other the Undertaking, rights, powers, and properties of the Wellington Coal and Gas Light Company (hereinafter called "the Company"), to provide for the transfer to and vesting in the Council of such gas works, Undertaking, rights, powers, and properties, the application of the purchase money, the payment of the debts and the fulfilment of the contracts of the Company, the redemption, cancellation, or extinction of all mortgages, debentures, ordinary and preference stock and shares of the Company, and the winding up and dissolution of the Company, and to confirm and carry into effect any agreement between the Company and the Council entered into prior to the passing of the intended Act for the sale and purchase of the Undertaking or otherwise in relation to the matters aforesaid.

2. To provide for the settlement by arbitration (in default of agreement) of the amount of compensation for and terms and conditions of the

transfer to the Council of the Undertaking, rights, powers and properties of the Company.

3. To authorize the Council to carry on the Undertaking acquired by them, and to maintain and from time to time improve, enlarge, alter, renew, extend or discontinue the gasworks upon the lands upon which they now stand, and upon all such lands to erect, lay down, provide, maintain and from time to time enlarge, improve, alter, renew or discontinue additional gasworks, and to manufacture and store gas and materials employed in or about the manufacture of gas, and to convert and manufacture and store all or any products resulting or arising from the manufacture of gas, and to authorize the Council to supply gas for all domestic, trading, public and other purposes within such parts of the parishes and places of Wellington Urban, Wellington Rural, Wrockwardine and Hadley, in the county of Salop, as lies within a radius of two miles from the parish church of All Saints in Wellington aforesaid, save and except such parts of the parish of Hadley as lie to the east side of the brook course at Haybridge and north of the Great Western Railway, but including such parts of the said parish of Hadley as lie between the Great Western Railway and the Shropshire Union Railway and west of the said brook course.

4. The lands hereinbefore referred to, upon which the gasworks of the Company now stand, are as follows:—

Lands now belonging or reputed to belong to the existing Company, and in their occupation, containing by admeasurement four acres and one rood or thereabouts, upon part of which the existing gasworks of the existing Company are situate, and bounded on the east and north by land and works belonging or reputed to belong to the Great Western Railway Company and the London and North Western and Great Western Railway Companies (Joint), and on the east by lands and works belonging or reputed to belong to Messrs Groom, Sons, and Co. (Limited), Timber Merchants and General Woodware Manufacturers, and known as "The Shropshire Works": and the road from such works and the existing gasworks numbered 958 on the Ordnance Map of the parish of Wellington, scale 1/2500, first edition 1882, reprint 25/1901, to the Heygate-road, on the south by the road and footpath leading from the said road, numbered 958, to Slang-lane, and on a part of the west by a field numbered 948 on the said map, and belonging, or reputed to belong, to William Robert Mansell, and on the remainder of the west by a public footpath leading from the said road numbered 958 to a foot-bridge over the said joint railways.

5. To empower the Council to supply gas for lighting, heating, motive, warming, and other purposes.

6. To empower the Council to manufacture, purchase, provide, sell, and let on hire or otherwise deal in and fix meters, pipes, slot-meters, fittings, engines and other apparatus incidental to the supply or consumption of gas, to exclude the same from liability to distress, and to make provision in regard to the construction, laying down, inspection and testing of pipes, meters, and fittings.

7. To authorize the Council and any Corporation or other District Council, Parish Council, Company, or person to enter into and carry into effect contracts for the supply of gas within or beyond the limits of supply, and to confer upon the Council and any Corporation, Council, Company or person the necessary powers enabling them to lay down the necessary mains and pipes, to break up streets and highways and to raise the necessary moneys.

8. To authorize the Council for any of the purposes of their Gas Undertaking to purchase or take on lease and hold lands, houses, and buildings, and to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of any lands, houses, or buildings for the time being belonging to them, and not required for the purposes of the Undertaking.

9. To confer upon the Council all other necessary powers and authorities for the manufacture, production, storage, and supply of gas of any description for all domestic, trading, public, and other purposes.

10. To make provision in regard to the price, pressure, quality, and testing of gas.

11. To authorize the Council to maintain and use, and from time to time alter, renew, and make such extensions of and additions to the mains, pipes, culverts, drains, and other works required by them as may, in the opinion of the Council, be necessary, and for that purpose and for the general purposes of the intended Act to cross, open, break up, divert, stop up, or otherwise interfere with railways, tramways, streets (whether dedicated to the public use or not), roads, highways, footways, lands, sewers, drains, pipes, electric, telegraphic, telephonic, hydraulic, or other apparatus, rivers, canals, bridges, navigations, streams, water-courses and passages, or other places.

12. To authorize the Council to enter upon lands and premises in certain cases, to remove or inspect any pipes and works belonging to the Council, and for other purposes.

13. To make provision in regard to matters incidental to the objects of the intended Act, including the following:—The exemption of the Council from liability to supply gas to persons in debt to them in respect of other property, and from liability to penalties in cases of unavoidable accidents, the payment of interest on deposits, the making of bye-laws, audit of accounts, the giving, service, and authentication of notices and other documents, the exemption of justices and others from disqualification by reason of contracts for supply of gas; and the imposition, recovery, and application of penalties; the size and material of the pipes and fittings to be laid by the consumer; the use of antifluators, the laying of pipes for ancillary purposes, the giving of notices by consumers of their intention to discontinue the supply of gas or to leave premises supplied with gas, and with regard to defective meters.

14. To authorize the Council to acquire, hold, and use patent rights and licences thereunder for any of the purposes of the intended Act.

15. To empower the Council to levy and recover rates, rents, and charges for the supply of gas, and for the sale, hire, and use of meters, stoves, and fittings, and other things supplied, and for work done by the Council.

16. To empower the Council to supply electric fittings, and to make and enforce bye-laws or regulations for securing the safety of the inhabitants and for the prevention of fire in respect of buildings supplied with electric energy, and to alter the date for making up the accounts relating to the electric lighting Undertaking of the Council, and to authorize the Council to allow discounts on payments for supplies of electric light or power, to exempt the Council from liability to supply in certain cases.

17. To empower the Council to borrow money for all or any of the purposes of the Bill and for the general purposes of their gas and electricity Undertakings and for such other purposes as may

be prescribed or authorized by the Bill, and to charge the money so borrowed and interest upon the security of the whole or part of the revenues of the Council from time to time arising from the gas and electricity and other Undertakings and property for the time being of the Council or some of them, and on any other funds and rates established and leviable by the Council, and to empower the Council to apply any of their funds to any of the purposes of the Bill, and to provide for the disposal or application of the revenue arising from the gas and electricity Undertakings, and to make further provision with reference to the existing debts of the Council and otherwise in relation to the finances, rates, and revenues of the Council.

18. To authorize the Council and any local authorities, bodies, companies and persons for all or any of the purposes of or incidental to the objects of the Bill, to enter into and fulfil agreements and contracts, and the Bill will or may confirm any such agreements and contracts which may have been, or which during the progress of the Bill may be entered into, and to enable any such local authorities, bodies, companies or persons for the purposes aforesaid, to extend their funds, rates, and revenues, and to borrow moneys on the security thereof.

19. To empower the Council to extend the provisions of any existing Bye-laws, to make new Bye-laws, rules, and regulations with reference to all or any of the foregoing matters, and to enforce the same by penalties or otherwise, or to vary or rescind the same, and to confer upon them all powers, rights, authorities, and privileges which are or may become necessary for carrying the powers granted by the Bill into execution, to vary or extinguish all existing rights or privileges which would or might in any way prevent or interfere with or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

20. To incorporate with alterations and amendments and to apply, amend, alter, or repeal all or some of the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament following or some of them (that is to say):—The Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; the Land Clauses Acts; the Gasworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1871; the Arbitration Act, 1839; the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888; and the Electric Lighting (Clauses) Act, 1899; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Public Health Acts, and all Acts amending the said Acts respectively or any of them.

21. To vary, repeal or extinguish all existing rights, powers, and privileges which would in any manner interfere with or prevent the carrying into effect of any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights, powers, and privileges.

22. To alter, amend, extend, enlarge, or repeal or re-enact, with or without amendments, all or some of the provisions of the Wellington (Salop) Improvement Act, 1851, and the Wellington (Salop) Electric Lighting Order, 1901, and all other Acts and Orders relating to the Council.
