

NORTHERN NIGERIA.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.
Stern-wheeler "Empire," Mureji,

Sir, August 16, 1902.

I have the honour to forward herewith the military reports of the Commandant upon the expedition to Bornu, and the operations which resulted in the capture of the ex-Emir of Kontagora, together with short reports on two other

expeditions.

2. I had intended to proceed myself to Bornu to enquire into the position created by the recent incursions and the death of Fad-el-Allah, but I found it impossible to do so, and I therefore instructed Colonel Morland, Commandant, to proceed there with a force of about 500 rank and file and 20 British officers and non-commissioned officers. His orders were to proceed via Bautshi, the Emir of which place had refused to listen to warnings and to desist from slave raids and attacks on caravans, &c. Mr. Wallace, C.M.G., accompanied the force to this point. After leaving a garrison of about one company at Bautshi, Colonel Morland was directed to proceed to Gujba, the scene of the French victory over Fad-el-Allah, and to make full enquiry. He would leave another company there, and I left it to his discretion what further action he might find it necessary to take for the pacification of the country, and the prevention of further raids. I desired that he should return, if possible, along the Anglo-German frontier, and furnish me with as much geographical and political information as possible regarding the frontier as far as Yola, since I had news that a powerful German expedition was proceeding in that direction. The expedition was to be back by May 15th. 3. Colonel Morland carried out his instructions in an admirable manner, which left nothing to be desired. His attached report speaks for itself as to the military ability shown in the conduct of the fighting which took place, and I have already brought his services to your notice in the strongest terms at my command for the tact, ability, and thoroughness with which he accomplished the political part of his task.

4. I arrived in the Protectorate on November 18th, but it was not till about the end of January that I heard definitely from you whether the Sokoto boundary delimitation would take place at once or not. About that date I gave orders for the Bornu expedition to start. Some preparations had already been made, and the organization was completed with great rapidity, about 900 carriers being required (in order to carry supplies and ammunition for the garrisons which would be left at Bautshi and Gujba, in addition to the requirements of the force). In spite of the fact that steamers could not ascend the river at that time, it was ready to start from 1bi (300 miles up the Benue from Lokoja) at the end of January.

5. After subjugating a turbulent hill tribe (the Yergums) the force reached Bautshi on the 16th February (160 miles), and the garrison was located without opposition. Proceeding thence, Colonel Morland was attacked by a force of some 700 dervishes dressed in the "jibbeh," followers of the Mallam Jibrella, who called himself a Mahdi, and had leng been the firebrand of this part of the Protectorate, and hitherto invariably victorious. The enemy were defeated with great loss, and a most energetic pursuit by a number of flying columns was organized, with the result that the Mallam was captured by Lieutenant Dyer, who, as Colonel Morland relates, rode 70 miles in 17 hours (with ten men only), and was back at Gujba in 42 hours, a very remarkable performance indeed in a roadless country.

6. Colonel Morland reached Gujha on the 11th March, 170 miles in a direct line from Bautshi, apart from the detour made on account of the

Mallam Jibrella, and located a garrison there, and on the 23rd arrived by forced marches at Maidugiri (120 miles). Thence with a column of six Europeans and 200 rank and file he visited Kuka, and returned on the 6th April, covering 201 miles in eight days. A third garrison was located at Maidugiri, and leaving that place on April 8th, the remainder of the force reached Yola on April 18th, having succeeded, with great tact, in avoiding fighting with the tribes en route. From Yola, Colonel Morland returned to Lokoja, leaving Captain Cubitt, Royal Artillery, to deal with some turbulent tribes along the Benue, whom the Resident had long desired to coerce, on account of the frequent murders of traders which they had committed.

These difficult operations were carried out with the skill I should have expected, and both the Bassama and the Wurkum and Djen tribes were defeated in several actions till they sued for peace. On May 16th the troops reached Ibi.

7. The enormous distance traversed, the entire success with which fighting was avoided, except on the occasions in which it had previously been known to be inevitable and desirable, and the wonderful rapidity with which in three and a half months the whole was accomplished, enable me to bring the services of Colonel Morland to your notice with exceptional confidence that their merit will be recognized. I concur also in the selection of officers made by Colonel Morland for special mention, viz., Captain Cubitt, Royal Artillery, one of the original members of the Force, and one of the very best officers who has ever been in it; Captain Wallbach, Brigade Transport Officer, who has continuously done most excellent work, and who has merited recognition apart from this campaign; Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes, Dr. Grant, Captain Beamish, and Sergeant Oldershaw, together with Lieutenant Dyer, an officer who has always been distinguished for his intrepidity and dash.

8. Simultaneously with these operations I was compelled, early in February, to direct Major Dickinson to endeavour to effect the capture of the ex-Emir of Kontagora, who, since his deposition, had been for just a year raiding the country to the north of the Kontagora and Zaria provinces, the more so that the latter Emir had appealed to me for help. It was important that the attempt should be made with rapidity, so as not to risk the intervention of Kano, while the bulk of my fighting force was away in Bornu, and in Southern Nigeria on the Aro expedition. Leaving Wushishi on February 12th, Major Dickinson covered the 150 miles to the entrenched camp at Kaya in eight days, sending on Captain Porter with about 37 Mounted Infantry to intercept the retreat of the enemy. Captain Porter was accompanied by Captain Abadie, Political Officer, and finding the camp evacuated they pushed on, overtaking and rounding up the fugitives and driving them back on Major Dickinson's force. The result was the capture of the ex-Emir and almost the whole of his leading men, with several thousand followers. Morland brings to notice the names of Major Dickinson and Captain Porter in this connection, and I recommend them as well as Captain Abadie strongly to your consideration.

9. It will be within your recollection that early in 1900 the attacks by the Munchis upon the telegraph construction party had led to my sending an expedition under Lieutenant-Colonel Lowry Cole to punish those tribes. This was efficiently done, with the exception of two chieftains, Abuja and Abaka, who thereupon asserted that the white man was afraid of them, and became a focus of trouble, seizing traders, &c. Immediately after I left the Protectorate on leave in April, 1901, Mr. Wallace gave instructions that these two chiefs should be coerced. The expedition of about 160 rank and file was conducted with skill and success by Major McClintock, and I concur with Colonel Morland in bringing his services to your notice.

10. A separate clan of these irrepressible people, who live further east, and had not been previously dealt with, assumed a hostile attitude in May, 1901, and Mr. Wallace directed that a similar force should proceed against them under Captain Eckersley. The operations lasted about ten days, and were successful, the chiefs tendering their submission. Captain Eckersley then proceeded against the Yergums, and for a month during the rains under very exceptional hardships defeated them in several skirmishes. name is recommended to your notice, and he was also mentioned by Major McClintock in his previous campaign. Lieutenant Stewart, Royal Artillery, also took part in both expeditions, and Captain Eckersley.

From Colonel T. L. N. Morland, D.S.O., Commandant, Northern Nigeria Regiment, West African Frontier Force, to His Excellency the High Commissioner, Northern Nigeria. (No. F/1297/1902.)

Field Operations.

Lokoja, June 5, 1902. I have the honour to report that the following force, under my command, was concentrated at Ibi on 29th January, for the expedition to Bautshi and Bornu.

Staff Officer—Captain Cubitt, Royal Artillery. Brigade Transport Officer-Captain Wallbach. Survey-Captain Molesworth.

Royal Artillery—1 officer, 1 British non-commissioned officer, 2 75 M.M. guns, and 30 rank and file.

1st Battalion-2 officers, 2 British non-commissioned officers, 1 Maxim, and 125 rank and

2nd Battalion-Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes, 6 officers, 2 British non-commissioned officers, 3 Maxims, and 360 rank and file.

3 Medical Officers and 800 carriers.

2. I decided to march on Bautshi by a direct road via Dull through the pagan country hitherto untraversed by a European.

3. On 1st February I sent on Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes with one company to punish some Yergum villages to the west of the road

who had been murdering traders. He reached the villages on 6th February, and finding the people had fled set them on fire. While his men were somewhat scattered the enemy returned and attacked him, but were repulsed with loss, one man being killed on our side. On the 7th Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes pursued these people into the hills, where they had taken refuge, and inflicted severe punishment on them, without suffering any further casualties, though the enemy kept up a heavy arrow fire from the rocks. These people sent in their submission later to Mr. Hewby, Resident, Upper Benue.

4. I left Ibi on 3rd February with the main body, and reached Bautshi on the morning of the 16th February. There was no opposition to our advance. The old Emir having been deposed by Mr. Wallace, who accompanied the expedition thus far as Political Officer. I left one company 2nd Battalion under Captain Plumer as garrison, having selected the site for a fort outside the Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes returned from here to Lokoja, where his services were

urgently required.

5. On the 19th I left Bautshi with the remainder Gombe was reached on 23rd of the force. February. Leaving Gombe on 25th of February, and following the course of the Gongola River, I reached Nafada on 27th. From here I struck south, with a view to interviewing Mallam Gibrella, and marching 21 miles on 28th, I camped near the small walled village of Gwurradigga.

. 6. Starting at daylight next morning, about 7.30 A.M., a scout reported large numbers of the enemy concealed in a donga about 500 yards to

our left front.

The country was open and undulating, with scattered trees. Halting the head of the long column, which in single rank covered nearly two miles of the bush path, I ordered square to be formed as rapidly as possible, and advanced with the advanced guard of 100 men and a Maxim, and one 75 M.M. gun towards the enemy to cover this formation. They at once attacked in a most determined manner, numbering some 600 foot and 100 mounted men. This attack was met by a steady fire from the infantry in line kneeling, the gun firing case. In spite of desperate attempts to get to close quarters and envelop our flanks none got closer than 50 yards, and they finally broke and fled, losing 60 killed and a large number of wounded, among the latter being the Mallam's nephew, Sarikin Bajoga. casualties were only two men wounded, as they fired very little, but tried to get to close quarters with sword and spear.

7. Following the enemy towards Tungo I shelled that town, which is about seven miles from Gwurradigga, they fled in all directions. I then pushed on to Dukkul, seven miles further on, but found it evacuated; this was the residence of Mallam Jibrella himself, who had commanded in person. I camped here for the

night.

8. On the second day I followed in pursuit, and during the next few days his followers deserted him, and I sent out flying columns to endeavour to effect his capture. Horses, banners, and followers were captured in large numbers, and Lieutenant Dyer with nine mounted men rushed his camp on 8th March, but he managed to escape into the bush.

9. On 11th March I reached Gujba with the main body of the force and waited the arrival of the flying columns. On 15th March, hearing that the Mallam with only three followers, was near Birmi, I detached Lieutenant Dyer with ten mounted men to capture him; his party rode 70 | Bautshi.

miles in 17 hours with a change of horses half way, effected his capture, and were back at Gujba 42 hours after the start, a very fine performance in a roadless country.

10. Leaving Gujba, where a company remained as garrison, on 17th March, Maiduguri was reached on early morning of 23rd, the column averaging 20 miles a day. The arrangements with Shiefu Garbai, being of a political nature, are described elsewhere.

11. With a small column of six Europeans and 200 soldiers and carriers, I left Maiduguri on 30th March for Kuka, and returned on afternoon of 6th April, having marched 201 miles in eight days, or an average of 25 miles a day.

The people everywhere were glad of our arrival. The whole of Bornu is now practically peaceful and well disposed towards us. I do not anticipate

further trouble.

12. A company remained at Maiduguri as garrison; with the remainder of the column I left that place on 8th April for Yola, marching via Kobshi, Huyum, Kilba, Song, &c. Yola was reached on 18th April.

Some difficulty was experienced in making the pagan Marghi people in the neighbourhood of Kilba understand that our intentions were peace-

ful, but fighting was avoided.

13. At Yola, I handed over command of the force remaining to Captain Cubitt, and left for Lokoja by canoe, to enable me to reach that place by the date you had fixed. I instructed Captain Cubitt to carry out certain operations in the Bassama country and Wurkum Hills, which had been sanctioned by Your Excellency.

14. Captain Cubitt left Yola on 28th with two guns, two Maxims, and 130 men. Marching down the north bank of the Benue, the people of Banjerum, who had recently murdered five Hausa traders, attacked him on the 29th; he repulsed them with loss, killing 25. Lieutenant Dyer and Interpreter Ankrah were slightly wounded and one carrier dangerously wounded (since dead).
On the 2nd May Kwa was reached; these

people had recently killed seven traders and one woman; they fled on the approach of the expedition, and their town was burnt; 32 skulls were found in one house; these people are generally reported to be cannibals. Lau was reached on 4th May.

15. On the 6th Captain Cubitt started with the infantry of the force for the Wurkum Hills.

On the 7th at Petogwu, after a skirmish in the morning, his camp was attacked at 5 P.M., the enemy were driven off with loss, and pursued for some miles. Further fighting took place on the 8th, after which the chiefs of the Wurkums came in and begged for peace. The whole district is now peaceful, and the roads open. Ibi was reached on 16th May, and the troops embarked in canoes for Lokoja.

16. I wish specially to mention the services of the following officers who took part in this expedition, which lasted over four months.

Captain Cubitt, Royal Artillery, as Staff Officer to the force, did splendid work throughout. I cannot speak too highly of his services. He commanded the expedition in the Bassama and Wurkum countries in a most efficient manner.

Captain Wallbach as Transport Officer was indefatigable; he is the model of what a Trans-

port Officer should be in this country.
Lieutenant-Colonel Beddoes, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, carried out the operations in the Yergum country in the early stages of the expedition in an efficient manner. His services were required at Lokoja, and he was unable to accompany the expedition beyond

Dr. Grant, as Senior Medical Officer.

Captain Beamish, mentioned for good service by Captain Cubitt, during operations in Wurkum Hills.

Lieutenant Dyer exhibited great pluck, dash, and endurance in his pursuit of the Mallam.

Sergeant Oldershaw, as assistant to the Transport Officer, did exceptionally good work.

From the Staff Officer, Benue Expeditionary Force, to the Officer Commanding, Benue Expedi-

tionary Force.

At Banjerum, on 30th April, one of the enemy came up to the square, presumably to sue for peace. He suddenly ran amok, and picking three poisoned spears off the ground he threw one at me, whereupon Corporal Mamma very pluckily threw himself on him and seized him by the throat, receiving the second spear in his ammunition pouch, the cartridges saving his life. The man fought like a fury, but Corporal Mamma held on and disarmed him.

From the Commandant, Northern Nigeria Regiment, West African Frontier Force, to His Excellency the High Commissioner, Northern Nigeria.

Field Operations.

Lokoja, June 18, 1902. I have the honour to report that, in accordance with instructions, Major Dickinson left Jebba on 6th February, 1902, with two officers, one 7-pounder gun, and detachment, and reached Wushishi on 11th February; here his force was increased to four officers, one non-commissioned officer, one medical officer, and 135 rank and file, of whom 37 were mounted infantry.

2. He left Wushishi on 12th with the force

and Captain Abadie, Resident, Zaria, to endeavour to capture the Emir of Kontagora, who was reported to have an entrenched camp at Kaya,

150 miles to the north.

3. Birnin Gwari was reached on 18th February, about 4 P.M. At 8 P.M. the same evening Major Dickinson started on a night march. Kasegi was reached at 5.20 A.M. next day, and after a short rest he started again at 7 A.M., marching till 5.45 P.M., when, owing to the exhaustion of his carriers, he was unable to proceed further that night.

4. Starting at 2.45 A.M. next morning he continued his march on Kaya, sending Captain Porter with the mounted infantry to get in rear

of place to prevent the Emir's escape.
Captain Porter, finding on arrival that the enemy had fled, at once followed in hot pursuit, and, accompanied by Captain Abadie, succeeded in capturing the Emir and cutting off the retreat of the major portion of his followers. Major Dickinson with the infantry following in support.

The result of these operations was the capture, in addition to the Emir himself, of his two sons, his brother, and others of his relations, with several thousand followers, almost without firing

These operations reflect great credit on Major Dickinson, whose services I wish to bring

specially to your notice.

Captain Porter with the mounted infantry showed great dash and judgment, acting on his own initiative when he found the enemy had

Major Dickinson reports that the services of Captain Abadie as Political Officer were invaluable.

From the Commandant, Northern Nigeria Regiment, West African Frontier Force, to His Excellency the High Commissioner, Northern Nigeria.

Field Operations.

Lokoja, June 27, 1902.

Your Excellency,

In May, 1901, the Munshis between Ibi and Mount Herbert having assumed a hostile attitude and closed the trade routes, Captain Eckersley received instructions to march through the country and bring the people to their senses.

He left Ibi on 20th May with a force consisting of four officers, three European noncommissioned officers, one doctor, 160 rank

and file, two Maxim guns, and one 7-pounder. On 23rd May the Jember villages were attacked and destroyed; but slight opposition

was met with.

On 24th May the Baiyafa Munshis at Oga opposed Captain Eckersley's advance, but were driven off with loss of 10 killed and many wounded. There were no casualties in Captain Eckersley's force.

Arufu was reached on 25th May, the people being friendly. From here a flying column left on 27th to punish Shishieku people who had murdered traders; the enemy were surprised and

severely punished.

Mount Herbert was reached on 28th, and the force returned to Ibi on 1st June.

The result of this expedition was the opening of the trade route and the pacification of the country, as all the recalcitrant chiefs finally tendered their submission.

On 8th June the force left Ibi to punish the Yergums and other pagan tribes in the Murchison Hills to north of Benue who had been murdering traders.

The village of Shemankar was surprised on 9th, and the King captured. On 11th, 12th, and 13th the Shemdam country was traversed, and the people punished, but little opposition being met with.

On the 14th and 15th June the Yergum country was traversed, and the large town of Lenthan destroyed; opposition was met with,

and the enemy lost ten killed.

Further fighting took place at Jong on the 18th and at Duguri on the 21st and 22nd, and after thoroughly traversing the country, the expedition reached Ibi on 6th July. This expedition took place in the rainy season, several unfordable rivers had to be crossed; all who took part in it had a very hard time, and there was much sickness among the Europeans of the force. The country being for the most part open, there

were no casualties, but I consider great credit is due to Captain Eckersley for the successful result of this expedition, and I wish to bring his name specially to your notice; he brings to notice the names of Lieutenant Stewart, Royal Artillery, Lieutenant Ross, and Sergeant Roach, 2nd West African Frontier Force. Field Operations.

Lokoja, June 27, 1902.

Your Excellency,

Major McClintock, in command at Akwanaja, received instructions from the Acting High Commissioner to coerce the Kings of Abaka and Abuga, Munshi towns, who had committed atrocities.

Accordingly he left Akwanaja on 17th April 1901, with three officers, two non-commissioned officers, 160 rank and file, one Maxim, and one 7-pounder gun.
Giddan Rai was reached on 18th April.

On 19th, leaving his camp in charge of Sergeant Roach and 25 men, he marched with remainder of the force against Abaka. enemy evacuated the village, but later attacked from the thick bush in a determined manner; the attack was repulsed with loss, and the enemy were followed up, and several neighbouring villages were destroyed. The enemy had ten killed and many wounded. There casualties in Major McClintock's force. There were no

On the 21st the headmen sent in their sub-

mission.

Abuja offered no resistance, and on 23rd Major

McClintock returned to Akwanaja.

He brings to notice the names of Captain Eckersley, 2nd West African Frontier Force, and Lieutenant Stewart, Royal Artillery, in charge of the gun.

I consider Major McClintock deserves great credit for the successful result of this expedition.

NORTHERN TERRITORIES OF THE GOLD COAST.

Despatches relating to Field Operations, 1899-1902.

Governor Sir F. M. Hodgson to Mr. Chamberlain. (Received October 17, 1899.)

Government House,

Accra, September 25, 1899. Referring to my despatch of the 8th August, and to my telegram of the 16th August,* acquainting you with the success of Captain Donald Stewart's expedition against the Fra Fras in the White Volta District of the Northern Territories, I have now the honour to transmit to you that Officer's detailed report of the expedi-

Captain Stewart left Gambaga with his force, which consisted of six European Officers, two Native Officers, and 202 rank and file, on the 26th He moved always in square covered by a few Moshi and Mamprusi horsemen acting as scouts.

Marching through Yariga to Tanga Captain Stewart found, at the latter place, that the fort

which had been occupied by Captain Fenton had been destroyed, and that the attack upon the corporal and five Hausas, who were killed, on the 14th March, as reported by Captain Fenton in his letter of the 20th March, a copy of which accompanied my despatch of the 28th July,† had been ordered by the Chief of Zari. (The bones of these unfortunate men were found at Tanga and buried.) An attack on Zari was therefore decided upon. Desultory fighting occurred right up to Zari, but without any casualty to the force. Sherigu was next attacked, and here one of the Mamprusi horsemen was killed.

The Fra Fras had retreated to the Sapiri hills, to which they had on previous occasions been allowed to retire unmolested. Captain Stewart very properly determined to attack them there and force them out. The attack took place on the 19th July, and was completely successful, the Hausas behaving throughout with great steadiness. Not less than 100 of the enemy were killed, and the Chief of Tong, who is stated to have been the principal author of the troubles,

secured and taken to Gambaga.

The action was an important one, and has probably read a severe lesson to the Fra Fras which will not fail also to influence other tribes in its relations towards our occupation of the country. I should be extremely glad if the excellent conduct of all ranks could be recognized

in some marked way.

All the Officers engaged with the force have merited Captains Stewart's commendation, and I will ask you to note the high terms in which he speaks of them. One of them, Captain Pamplin Green, was severely wounded by a poisoned arrow which, but for the very gallant act performed by Dr. Garland, would in all probability have proved fatal. Dr. Garland, after having removed the arrow-head, at the risk of his own life sucked the wound and sufficiently extracted the poison to save Captain Green's life.

The Moshi horsemen employed by Captain Stewart appear to have rendered excellent service during the expedition, and he strongly recommends that a small body of them should be raised for employment upon expeditions such as

that against the Fra Fras.

It would be unfair to close this despatch without bringing to your notice the name of Captain Donald Stewart, C.M.G., who commanded the expedition, and who, although in extremely bad health for a great part of the time, carried it out with so much success. I trust that you will consider that the services rendered on this occasion by this most deserving officer have merited your special commendation.

His Excellency the Governor.

In accordance with telegraphic instructions received from His Excellency the Acting Governor, I handed over the command of the Wam Pulliano expedition to Captain Leland and proceeded to Gambaga to arrange for the Fra Fra expedition, leaving Kumassi on the 23rd of May, arriving at Gambaga 18th June.

From the 18th June to the 25th of June was occupied in getting ready the expedition which left for the Fra Fra country on the 26th June.

The strength of the expedition was increased by a few Moshi and Mamprusi horsemen, to

whom I will allude further on.

On arrival at Yariga on the 28th June, the Chief of Yariga complained about some villagers. who had only a few days before come to his market and killed a Moshi trader, looting his property; so I proceeded to try and arrest the men, but was unable to do so, as they bolted into the bush, leaving only a few women in the villages; I was able, however, to capture some cattle.

A few arrows were fired at our scouts without any result, otherwise there was no attempt at resistance here.

The next day we marched to Tanga; there was no resistance. The numbers of armed Fra Fras were seen occupying the hills on either side of us.

From information received from the Chief of Tanga and other natives that came into camp, it appears that Bambiri, Chief of Zari, was the man who ordered the six Hausas to be killed, which was carried out in the Chief's own house, where later on we found their bones and portions of their accoutrements; the bones were properly buried close to the place they were found.

Also that Bongsono, Chief of Sherigu, was the leader of the men who attacked Mr. Fenton and his party, about the same time the Hausas were killed. So I determined to try and capture these men first, and punish the tribe if any resistance

was shown.

The Chief of Tanga warned me I should be fired on soon after leaving his village, and this proved correct, as on the 1st of July, when hardly a mile from Tanga, small bodies of Fra Fras opposed our advance, which was difficult, on account of the high corn which was growing everywhere, while giving them ample cover, impeded our square greatly.

We were guarded against surprise through the Moshi horsemen, who scouted excellently, and kept me constantly informed of all the

enemy's movements.

This kind of desultory fighting continued right up to the village of Zari; the enemy lost about 40 killed, while we had no casualties

On the 2nd of July messengers arrived from the Chiefs of Merigu, Nabarungu, Pahkha, and Bongo, saying they submitted and had done nothing against the English, and as I had no proof that they were in any way engaged in the attacks on Mr. Fenton or the Hausas, though I have little doubt they were, I accepted their submission, and informed them that the English Government wanted to be their friends as well as being their masters, and that we only punished those who did wrong. Attacks on our Hausas, caravans, &c., must cease, otherwise they would find their villages destroyed, &c. This they promised to do, so I told them to let all chiefs know what I had said, and offered a reward if they would bring in the Chief of Zari and Sherigu. This, however, they said they could not do, as these chiefs had run into the bush lying between Fra Fra and Grunshi country; no one knew where they were.

On the 4th July we marched to Sherigu, meeting with only a slight resistance, as the Fra Fras found that trying to ambush the square was useless, with the Moshi horsemen out in front scouting. The Sherigus lost about 12 or 15 killed; our loss one Mamprusi horseman killed, one horse wounded.

The following villages were sent to: Kambusco, Tindongo, Unkum, Sapari, Yoruga.

No answer having been received from any of these villages and all the Fra Fras having taken I Tong.

to the Sapiri Hills, I determined to proceed there and carry them if possible. So on the 18th July I left for Sapiri and encamped opposite the hills.

The afternoon was spent in looking for a practicable place to advance over. Nearly everywhere the hills are too precipitous for the troops, though possible for naked savages without any encumbrances beyond their bows and arrows.

The place I ultimately chose was very steep, between two hills, but I thought, notwithstanding being in a defile, it was the only practicable route.

On the 19th July, after sending away all our cattle and sheep with a native officer and twentyfive men as escort, to Wale Wale, I proceeded to attack the hills, where from native information five to seven thousand men were. I think, however, these were completely surprised, as they never believed that we would try to go over the hills, especially as neither the French nor ourselves had attempted it in other expeditions, and so they considered themselves quite safe.

To this reason I attribute our small loss. don't think there were more than 2,000 men actually engaged against us. Arrows were fired at us from both sides very shortly after we began to climb the hills, but the range was too great, and no casualties occurred till we had reached what seemed the top; I then found we had two or three narrow defiles to pass through, which I was quite unaware of until we were in them. Here the rocks rise perpendicularly on either side, full of caves, holes, and scrub trees. Behind these the enemy found perfect cover and kept up an incessant shower of arrows, but did not do much harm, as the steady firing of the Hausas gave them no chance of taking aim, as to do that they had to expose themselves, and I am confident that the very steady firing prevented us having a very large number of casualties, as the ground we were going over would be impossible to storm if the defiles had been properly held. It was in one of these defiles that Captain Pamplin Green was severely wounded with a poisoned arrow in chest, fired at him from a cave not more than twenty yards from hin:, while most gallantly leading the front face of the square.

On carrying these defiles the ground descended into a kind of crater. Here were villages and some fields of corn.

The enemy had collected on the hills on the other side of the crater. These men were most successfully shelled with a 7-pounder gun, under Captain Irvine, of the Hausas, and were quickly driven off, losing a good many.

After a halt to rest the men, I turned half left from the line of our advance and kept down the centre of a rough valley piled up with loose stones, and scrub bush growing everywhere. There was no path anywhere to be found, so the men had to get over the boulders the best way they could. Here, again, we met with a good deal of resistance, as everywhere the enemy were lying concealed, and fired hundreds of arrows into us, luckily with little result. They could not face the fire of the Hausas, who throughout a most trying time behaved magnificently, and never at any moment showed any signs of demoralization, all bugle calls being obeyed at once; in fact, I can't speak too highly of their behaviour, and I sincerely hope that His Excellency the Governor will bring it to the notice of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

On reaching the plain again we found that we had then marched from one end to the other of the Sapiri Hills, coming out at the village of

I have great pleasure in reporting the excellent behaviour and gallantry displayed by the Hausas, often in trying positions. There was no hesitation in obeying the commands, and they showed the greatest coolness and steadiness when under fire; in fact, I don't think any troops could have behaved better.

I sincerely hope that His Excellency the Governor may be able to propose something to show the Government's appreciation of their

gallantry.

I beg to propose that all men and officers who were present and took part in the late Fra Fra expedition, who are not entitled to the West African medal just granted, should be included in that roll, and a clasp be given, if possible, for Sapiri. I am sure such an action would create the very best impression on the men, especially as we want to keep our best men if possible, and I am afraid many of them are taking their discharge and very few good men recruiting.

It is also with great pleasure I have to bring to the notice of His Excellency the Governor the excellent work and soldierlike way in which all the Officers did their work on this expedition. No individual Officer had any particular chance of distinguishing himself, but I am sure from the way they worked that if the opportunity had arisen it would have been eagerly seized.

I have to thank the Officers mentioned below for their assistance and loyal co-operation which enabled the expedition to have a successful ending. It is due to them that it was so.

I must also bring to the notice of His Excellency the Governor an act of the greatest gallantry.

On Captain Pamplin Green being struck in the chest by a poisoned arrow (one with a red tip, which are the most virulent) Assistant Colonial Surgeon Garland, without the slightest hesitation, at once proceeded to suck the wound, of course at the greatest risk to himself, and continued to do so for seven or eight minutes, until he had extracted all the poison that he could.

This action of his I have little hesitation in

saying was probably the saving of Captain Green's life, who, even as it was, had a very narrow escape from death, the result being in

doubt for two hours.

I regret that I have been unable to furnish this report before, owing to sickness.

With reference to your telegram of the 18th October last I have the honour to forward herewith copies of the following documents which have just come to hand :-

Report of the Fra Fra Expedition. Report on the Dagomba Expedition.

I have the honour to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, a report on the results of an expedition into the Fra Fra

Attached is a diary of the progress of the

expedition.

The object of this expedition was to punish the people of Zackoo, a large and populous district situated about twenty-five (25) miles to the North-West of the Gambaga.

These people, about three weeks ago, had attacked and robbed a Moshi caravan, killing seven (7) men and taking the whole of their loads, the result being that all the traders were afraid to use this caravan route. I was also informed that some of the people of Yariga were also engaged

in raiding caravans, so I determined to punish them on the way.

Exemplary punishment was inflicted on both these districts; about fifty (50) men were killed, the whole of their compounds burnt, and a considerable number of cattle, including sheep and donkeys, captured. I was unable to ascertain the number of wounded, as the Fra Fras are extremely tenacious of life, and unless very badly wounded generally managed to get away with the rest of their comrades.

The people of Zackoo and Yariga are of a warlike, turbulent nature; each of their fighting men invariably uses the large quivers containing from 75 to 100 arrows, which they fire with great rapidity, holding half a dozen arrows at

once between their finger and thumb.

I noticed that all the arrows were freshly smeared with poison, showing that they had every intention of resisting our advance.

The Moshi horsemen were of considerable use in scouting, pursuing the enemy and capturing cattle. Those armed only with spears showed no inclination to close with the enemy, of whose deadly poisoned arrows they are in much dread. The most suitable troops for operations in this country would be mounted infantry, who would be able to cope with the extraordinary mobility of the Fra Fras, who over the broken and uneven surface of the corn land frequently made good their escape from these horsemen.

The Hausas behaved and marched exception-I would wish to bring to His Excelally well. lency's notice the name of Assistant Colonial Surgeon P. J. Garland, who was of the greatest

assistance to me.

One 7-pounder gun and 1 Maxim accompanied the force. 100 rounds per carbine were carried by the men, 18 shells for the 7-pounder gun and two boxes containing each 480 rounds Maxim

ammunition in belts, were also taken. I found fifty Moshi horsemen waiting for me on the banks of the White Volta; they were under the command of the King of Moshi's eldest son; I informed them they were to be most careful not to do any harm to the inhabitants of any friendly villages through which we might pass.

We arrived at Zangoiri at II A.M. The water at Zangoiri is bad, and is procurable from water

holes.

March 14.—Left Zangoiri at 6.45 A.M. and marched along the permanent road made by Colonel Northcott for about five miles, then turned off to the left along a path to Sigo, which was reached at 10.15 A.M. The King of Sigo was very friendly and brought plenty of water; he informed me that the Fra Fras were going to attack us about an hour from Sigo. Left Sigo at 10.45 A.M.

About 12.15 the Moshi cavalry scouts reported that the Fra Fras were on the right flanks; on coming up with the main body of the Moshi horsemen I found about one hundred Fra Fras a few hundred yards off, yelling their war cries and blowing their whistles. I formed the cavalry into line, and having ordered Major Sheppard to follow in support with fifty Hausas, at once charged, which charge was rather checked by our coming across a deep "nullah" with steep sides, which took some time to get down; this gave the Fra Fras, who had fled on the near approach of the cavalry, a longish start, but we eventually came up with them, and after a running fight in which the Fra Fras discharged a considerable number of poisoned arrows, we killed twenty of them.

*The leader of the Moshi horsemen was dangerously wounded by a poisoned arrow. Seeing that the Fra Fras had fled for miles, and that our ponies were completely done up, I resumed the march ou Yariga, which we reached about 3.30 p.m. I was there met by the King of Yariga, who told me that with the exception of the inhabitants of his own compound and the one adjoining, the whole of his people had gone off to fight us, despite all he could do to prevent them. He also informed me that his people intended to attack the camp at night. About 5 p.m. some Fra Fras appeared on the adjoining hills yelling their war cries, but on a shrapnel shell being dropped into their midst, killing four,

they at once retired.

March 15.—Left Yariga at 7 a.m. and burnt all the compounds belonging to Yariga for over four miles, except those belonging to the King and his immediate following. At 8.30 a.m. we heard Fra Fra war pipes, and found that a few men had occupied some rocks close to the road; we drove them out, killing eight. A Moshi horseman being slightly wounded and my orderly's horse being also hit by a poisoned arrow. At 9.45 a.m. we resumed the march and reached an excellent stream of water about 10.30 a.m., where we halted till 11 a.m., and finally reached the King of Bong's compound at 3.15 r.m. He was very friendly, bringing in water and food for the troops.

March 17.—We left Bong at 6.30 A.M., arriving at the King's house at Namogu at 8.15 A.M., and, as he had been implicated in raiding caravans, promptly arrested him in the middle of his chiefs; he acknowledged having raided caravans, but said that he had done so under the orders of the King of Zackoo. At 10 A.M. we reached the King's house of Zackoo, without any opposition, and arrested him and some of his immediate

following. The King admitted that he had raided caravans, but declared that greater part of the raiding was done by people on the main caravan road about four miles from his house. He also informed me that though these people were nominally under him they paid no attention to his orders, and that they had every intention to fight against us. At 3 P.M. I went out again myself with the Moshi horsemen and a few Hausas to see if I could discover where the cattle had been taken to. We went in the direction of the people that the King had informed me were decidedly hostile, and found a good many Fra Fras gathered together, shouting their war cries, but they kept at a safe distance; as these people were the real raiders and had killed the seven Moshi traders, I destroyed every compound for nearly three miles, returning into camp about 5.45 P.M.

March 18.—Left Zackoo at 6.45 A.M. this morning with the Moshi horsemen, sixty Hausas, and a 7-pounder gun detachment, leaving Major Sheppard in command of the camp. We proceeded to the other part of the district occupied by the Fra Fras, who had joined in the raiding of the caravans and the murders of the Moshis. About 9 A.M. came on tracks of the cattle, and as the Fra Fras were in great force formed square and advanced in this formation shooting several Fra Fras, and driving them off, so that when the cattle were sighted about a mile ahead the cavalry were able to advance and "round them up." We

captured 26 cattle and some donkeys.

On the road home I burnt all the compounds belonging to the people who were fighting against us. We got back to camp at 12.30 r.m.

In the afternoon I had all the prisoners who had been captured on our arrival brought before me, and told them as they had not fought against us and did not appear to be the chief offenders in the raiding caravans they would be released. As the King was a wretched, very infirm old man, with scarcely any power or influence, I only fined him fifty head of cattle, including donkeys, but told him that in future if he did not at once report to me any acts of raiding on the part of his people he would be held responsible for their actions.

March 19.—Left Zackoo on homeward journey at 6.30 A.M.; we reached Namogu about 8 A.M., bringing the King with us, who had been made to accompany the column for the last three days; there I informed him that as he had been implicated in the recent raiding, he would be fined fifteen head of cattle. I left Namogu at 9 A.M., leaving Major Sheppard to collect the fine.

We reached Bong at 10.45 A.M., where we camped for the night. Major Sheppard arrived 6 r.M., bringing in with him five head of cattle, one calf, and three donkeys, informing me that from what he had seen and heard he did not think it possible to collect any more as the King's

power appeared to be very slight.

March 20.—Left Bong at 6.20 A.M. and reached an excellent stream on the far side of Nangori at 11 A.M. The King of Nangori came in to pay his respects in the afternoon, bringing in a couple of bullocks and a sheep as a present, he also asked for a flag. As he was very old and almost blind I told him to send his chief minister into Gambaga, where he would be given a flag and a return present. The King of Yariga also came in to see me, and reported that his people had no wish to fight any more.

I released to-day the King of Namogu, warning him that if any further raiding took place in his district he would be most severely dealt with, and that unless he at once reported to me any

acts of raiding on the part of his people he would

be held responsible for their actions.

March 21.—Left camp at 5.50 д.м. and reached Yariga at 7.30 A.M.; the whole country was deserted except the King's compound and those in its immediate vicinity, who had remained friendly the whole time. We reached Zangoiri at 2 P.M., after halting for three-quarters of an hour for water at Sigo. I saw the King of Moshi in the afternoon, presenting him with a horse and two donkeys in recognition of services of his horsemen.

March 22.—Left Zangoiri at 6.30 а.м. and

arrived Gambaga at 10 A.M.

Sir, Gambaga, February 24, 1900. With reference to my letter, No. G/36/N.T., dated 5th instant, I have the honour to report the return of the force that left here on the 8th instant on an expedition to the Dagomba country.

Attached will be found a diary of the progress

of the expedition.

It will be seen that the force reached Patenga with, practically speaking, no opposition, due, I

consider, to two reasons:

1st. The Kings of Karaga, Patenga, and Saveluga had gone to Yendi for the purpose of deciding upon a successor to the "stool" of Yendi, which has now been vacant for some

2nd. The retirement of the Dagombas under the King of Karaga from the town of Subere, where, as I have aiready reported, they had taken up a strong position, was identical with the arrival of the Moshi horsemen at Gambaga, who, having been enrolled by me for the expedition, had come in here to go through a course of musketry and elementary instruction in scouting duties. The Dagombas were therefore convinced that they would no longer be able to ambuscade our troops as they had done on previous occasions, and also that in the event of their being defeated they would certainly be

On my arrival at Karaga, being confident that the opposition, if any, likely to be offered at Patenga would only be slight, and wishing to impress the Dagombas with the ubiquity of our power, I determined to send Major Sheppard with a strong body of troops to the King of Diari, who, on the occasion of my sending a messenger to the King of Saveluga two months ago had privately told him that he had every desire to be friendly with us and under our protection. From these Major Sheppard was directed to establish friendly relations with the Kings of Kombungo and Natong, who, I had been informed, when directed by the King of Karaga to join him against us had sent back word to say that they were not " mad."

Eighteen (18) Moshi horsemen, retainers of the King of Moshi, were employed by me, and, as I have already stated, were brought into Gambaga ten days before the expedition started to go through musketry and an elementary course of scouting. I cannot speak too highly of these horsemen; they were simply invaluable and their scouting excellent. Pushed well out to the front and flanks they formed a most

column from being surprised. They are excellent riders and display great dash and gallantry. I armed them with a carbine, which they fired from their horses. They behaved extremely well and obeyed orders most readily; but it should be remembered that they are not "soldiers," and cannot be treated as such.

Owing to there being no fighting neither officers nor men had any particular opportunity of distinguishing themselves; but I particularly desire to bring to His Excellency's notice the keenness displayed by all ranks; the behaviour of the Hausas was excellent, and their marching powers exceptionally good, despite the lack of water on the road and the intense heat. Assistant Inspector Fenton acted as my Staff Officer, as Captain Marshall was unable to accompany the expedition owing to sickness, and performed his duties most efficiently. I am also much indebted to him for the zeal and tact he displayed in assisting me to train the Moshi horsemen in Gambaga, and in handling them during the expedition.

The medical arrangements made by Doctor Garland, the Senior Medical Officer in the Northern Territories, were most ample.

We arrived at Temboko at 12 noon, where we camped for the night. This village is the furthest point up to which the new permanent road has been made, and is within a quarter of a mile of the Dagomba boundary; a plentiful supply of good water is to be obtained from a stream within one hundred yards of the village. The Chief and his people were particularly friendly.

February 9.—Left Temboko 7 A.M., arrived

Suberi 11.50 A.M.

Suberi is a large village with about forty compounds, was found deserted. From Suberi I sent out the Moshi horsemen reconncitring: they were fired upon, but killed five men and captured several prisoners (mostly women), all of whom I released, so that they might have the opportunity of telling the rest of the inhabitants of the village that so long as they did not fight efficient screen, and effectually prevented the lagainst us we had no intention of harming them. Water was plentiful, but muddy, from a stream 25 minutes off.

February 10.—Left Suberi 6.45 A.M.; 11.15 A.M. we arrived at Gonayeri, a very fine village with plenty of good water from the wells. This

village also was deserted.

February 11.—Left Gonayeri 7.15 a.m. and reached Karaga about 10.30 a.m., found the place practically deserted, captured several prisoners, who informed me the King of Karaga had been at Suberi with his fighting men to oppose our advance till about the end of January. He then retired to Karaga, telling his followers that he was going to Yendi to assert his claim to the throne, but the fighting men were to remain and oppose us. Result was a general stampede.

February 12.—Before leaving Karaga this morning I detached Major Sheppard in command of a party composed of Inspector Irvine and Assistant Colonial Surgeon Hamilton-Williams and 74 rank and file, with a Maxim gun detachment, to proceed to Diari, and also to visit the Kings of Kombungs Nantaga and Saveluge.

Kings of Kombungo, Nantong, and Saveluga.
February 13.—We marched back along the road on which we had come yesterday till 8 A.M., when we branched off towards Patenga. We did not reach water till 12.15 P.M., when we came across a large stream, where we halted three-quarters of an hour, as the column was rather done up from want of water, the heat being intense. We reached Patenga 2.15 P.M., a large straggling town, and found it evacuated; we camped half a mile from the town near the best water hole.

February 14.—Halted at Patenga and spent the whole morning trying to get information from the various prisoners, all of whom I released here. I learnt that the King of Patenga had left for Yendi four days ago, and that the King of Pigoo had no following now. The whole of Babartu's Zebremas had left him and were engaged in trading in the Salaga and Kintampo districts. He himself was living at a small village near Yendi.

February 15.—Left Patenga 6.25 A.M. and reached the fair side of Karaga at 12 noon, near the best water hole, halting for water at the stream that we passed on the 13th instant.

February 16.—Left Karaga 6.10 A.M. and arrived at Gonayeri 9 A.M.

February 17.—Left Gonayeri 6.30 A.M. and reached Suberi at 9.30 A.M. The place was still deserted.

February 18.—Left Suberi 5.55 A.M. and arrived at Temboko 9.30 A.M., where we breakfasted. At 11.30 A.M. I left Temboko accompanied by Assistant Inspector Fenton and the Moshi horsemen. We got into Gambaga 2 P.M.

February 19.—The rest of the column, under Assistant Inspector Walker, left Temboko at 6 A.M. and reached Gambaga.

Governor Major Nathan to Mr. Chamberlain. (Received June 23, 1902.) Despatch relating to Field Operations.

Government House, Accra,
Sir, May 31, 1902.

I have the honour to transmit the report of
Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Morris, D.S.O., on the
recent expedition into the Tiansi country of the
Northern Territories.

From this report it appears that in the eighteen days between the 11th and 27th March, during which the main column of the expeditionary force

was absent from Gambaga, some 250 miles of country were traversed, and that four days' fighting took place, in which the hostile tribes lost about a hundred killed, while the total losses of the expeditionary forces were five irregular horse killed and one carrier died. Various palavers were held with the friendly chiefs, the submission of the hostile ones was subsequently made and accepted, and much useful information with regard to the topography of the country and its chiefs and tribes was collected.

The details of the expedition are perfectly clear from Lieutenant-Uolonel Morris' concise report, and the diary which accompanies it, and are illustrated by the excellent map prepared by

Captain O'Kinealy, Royal Artillery.

Lieutenant-Colonel Morris acted judiciously in confining his operations to what was necessary to secure the main purpose of the expedition, viz.: the punishment of those tribes who have made a practice of raiding and ill-treating their more loyal and peaceful neighbours.

The operations appear to have been well planned and to have been carried out by the troops with great keenness and steadiness. The 43 irregulars who accompanied the force justified the confidence that Lieutenant-Colonel Morris has always placed

in his Moshi horse.

In view of the fact that Lieutenant-Colonel Morris has now, first as Commissioner and Commandant, and then as Chief Commissioner, been in charge of the extensive Northern Territories of the Gold Coast for over a year, I suggest that the successful termination of the operations reported in this despatch might be taken advantage of to bring his name to notice.

Captain J. O'Kinealy has justified the good report made on him by the Inspector-General, West African Frontier Force, on the occasion of that officer's inspection of the troops in the

Northern Territories in December last.

I recommend that the West African Frontier Medal, with clasp, 1902, be given to all the troops who took part in the expedition.

Sir, Gambaga, April 26, 1902. I have the honour to forward a report on the late expedition into the Tiansi country.

As Your Excellency is aware, the objects of the expedition were first to punish the turbulent town of Nafrongo, which for some considerable time past has been levying blackmail on the neighbouring towns, and then to visit the country lying close to the 11th parallel of north latitude, between 0° 30′ and 1° 0′ west longitude.

On my arrival at Paha I learn that the kingdom of Sinlieh, lying about six miles to the south of Tiana, was most hostile, and a scourge to the whole neighbourhood: I therefore determined to visit this country. The defeat of the people of Nafrongo and Sinlieh, the severe punishment inflicted on them, and the progress of the expedition have been fully detailed in the diary of

The three kingdoms of Nafrongo, Tiana, and Sinlieh are by far the most important of any that I have seen in these territories: they each extend over about twenty square miles of country, with compounds every two or three hundred yards, and are densely populated. The chief occupation of the inhabitants is farming, many acres of ground being put under cultivation.

I was much struck with the excellent way in which the compounds in Sinlieh are built; they

are circular in shape, and are made of very thick swish, smoothed and polished. They have high walls, which form the outer parts of each hut in the compound, connecting them together. The roofs are flat with a small parapet three feet high all round, so that the owner of the compound with his followers can successfully defend himself against his neighbours, armed only with the same primitive weapons as himself. I found these walls were not, however, proof against

The full fighting dress worn by the people of Sinlieh is both imposing and picturesque. consists of a headdress made of thickly plaited straw, in shape much resembling the steel cap worn by the old Crusaders; this is covered with hide, and into it are fixed the horns of a Hartebeeste or some other large antelope. bodies are protected by an enormous arrowproof shield of ox-hide, which covers them from head to foot. Their weapons are bows and poisoned arrows, also a kind of "battle axe," with a short wooden handle, and an iron pick-shaped head, about 18 inches long, running to a point, with barbs on either side along half its length. axes are poisoned, being used to inflict the "coup de grâce" to their enemies.

Since I began writing this report the Kings of Nafrongo and Sinlieh, with a representative from each of their chiefs, have arrived in Gambaga to make submission, and to ask that they may be given the English flag. faithfully promise that they will in future abstain from molesting their neighbours, and will obey all orders given them. I have accepted their presents, giving them liberal ones in return, and informed them that no further punishment will be inflicted on them, provided they faithfully carry out my orders. I have also given them the English flag. It is with the greatest satisfaction that I am able to report the submission of these Kings, as I am confident that there will now be no more blackmailing of caravans or molesting of their less warlike neighbours.

The prestige bitherto enjoyed by these people is broken, and in a very few months I have every hope of enlisting excellent recruits from the people of Sinlieh, who are Kanjargas, one of the most warlike tribes in this Hinterland.

At the beginning of the year I specially selected 15 men, good riders and shots, from this battalion, and had them trained as mounted infantrymen. These men did excellent work, and were most useful. The difficulty in obtaining ponies of even a fair stamp prevented more men being raised, as the service is most popular. Except during the dry season ponies do very badly at Gambaga, so that I do not propose to replace any casualties in horse flesh till next dry season.

Forty-three (43) Moshi horsemen, armed with Martini-Henry carbines, accompanied the Field Force, and rendered most excellent service. They had been brought in from Zangoiri a month previous to the starting of the expedition, and had been put through a lengthy course of musketry and taught a few simple movements in cavalry

Their scouting was admirable, and so was their behaviour. These men have now served under me on four expeditions, and I have no hesitation in saying that for scouting, driving in small detached bodies of the enemy, following up a beaten foe, or capturing cattle, they are simply invaluable and form a very important addition to the forces serving in the Northern Territories, though I consider it an absolute essential to their efficiency that they should be commanded by an officer whom they know.

Our casualties throughout the whole expedition amounted to:-

Killed—5 Moshis.

Wounded-1 Hausa, 6 Moshis (horsemen), and 4 horses

Died from sickness-1 Carrier.

I learnt from the people of Sinlish that they lost 60 men killed during the fighting on the 21st March, and a considerable number wounded, several of whom have since died.

The people of Nafrongo had about 40 men killed during the two days' fighting in their district, the number of wounded being unknown.

I particularly desire to bring to your notice the excellent behaviour of the troops; nothing could exceed their keenness or steadiness, and their marching was exceptionally good, not a man fell out in spite of the heat, which at times was intense.

Not including the senior non-commissioned officers the majority of the men who accom-panied me were only raised a few months ago from the Hinterland tribes, and I think Your Excellency will agree with me that the results have been most satisfactory.

Captain H. Walker-Leigh acted as my Staff Officer. I am desirous of bringing this Officer's name to Your Excellency's notice as rendering extremely good service. He has given me most valuable assistance throughout the whole of his tour, especially in training the mounted infantry and Moshi horsemen.

Captain J. O'Kinealy, Royal Artillery, also did very good work, commanding a detached column with considerable tact. He is an excellent officer, most energetic and full of resource; he has increased the efficiency of his battery to a very marked extent.

The medical arrangements made by Assistant Colonial Surgeon Tobit, Principal Medical Officer, were good and sufficient.

Considering the importance of this expedition, and the results attained by the complete defeat of the people of Nafrongo and Sinlieh, who, up to the present, have hitherto been unconquered, I desire to recommend that all the troops who took part in the expedition may be given the West African Medal, with clasp "Tiansi" or " 1902."

I sincerely trust that Your Excellency will be able to support the recommendation, as the possession of a medal will be the greatest source of pride to my young battalion, and gratification to feel that their good work has been recognized.

Diary of Expedition to the Tiansi Country. March 11.—The Field Force left Gambaga at A.M., composed as follows:-

Lieutenant-Colonel A. Morris, D.S.O., West African Frontier Force, in command.

Staff Officer Captain H. Walker-Leigh, West African Frontier Force.

Captain J. O'Kinealy. Captain and Adjutant J. Marlow. Lieutenant J. McC. Griffin.

Lieutenant K. J. Roy. Lieutenant W. Van Eeden.

West African Frontier Force. Medical Officers: Assistant Colonial Surgeon P. M. Tobit,

Principal Medical Officer. Assistant Colonial Surgeon J. C. Bhuttacharji Doctor H. T. Bury (Special Service). Doctor D. Cogan (Special Service).

One 7-pounder gun, one Maxim, and one rocket trough, accompanied the force.

Maibindiga was reached at 12.15 P.M. (13

March 12.—The column left Maibindiga at 5.50 A.M., halted for an hour at Diandana, where I had ordered the villagers to have ready a plentiful supply of water, and reached Walewale at 1 P.M. (18 miles).

March 13.—We left Walewale at 5.50 A M. I went on ahead with the mounted troops, reaching

Zangom at 6.50 a.m. (4 miles).

Zangom is a small village of about 100 inhabitants under Walewale. Left Zangom 7.15 A.M., arrived Nabari 8.15 A.M. (8 miles), a large village of about 200 inhabitants under Walewale. Left Nabari at 9.25 A.M. and reached Sarba 10.55 A.M. (14 miles). Left Sarba at 11 A.M. and reached Dua at 12 noon (18 miles). The infantry did not arrive till 1.30 P.M.; the heat was intense and there was no water on the road except at Nabari, where the inhabitants provided

an abundant supply.

March.—Left Dua at 6 A.M. this morning, reaching the White Volta River at 6.50 A.M. (3 miles), it was quite fordable being only 2 feet 6 inches deep. Left the Volta at 7.5 A.M., reaching the outskirts of Na at 7.45 A.M. (6 miles). Interviewed the King and went on at 9 A.M., reaching the outskirts of Korogu at 11 A.M. (16½ miles). Reached the halting place, a mile and a half further on, at 11.30 AM. Total journey 18 miles. The infantry did not get in till close on 2 P.M. The King of Korogu, who had already been into Gambaga twice to see me, met me with his principal chiefs at the entrance of his district; he had provided a very good camping ground, with plenty of water, guinea-corn, &c. At a palaver held this afternoon, the King of Korogu informed me that one of his chiefs in charge of the district nearest the Nafrongo country refused to recognize the authority of the white man, and also declined to come and see me.

The King's messenger was therefore again sent to order this chief to come and pay his respects. As he still refused I sent a small party of Moshi

horsemen to bring him to me.

On approaching his compound the Moshis were at once fired at by the chief and his following, who were all armed; in the fighting that took place inside the compound the chief and two of his men were killed, but on my coming up with the mounted infantry, under Captain Walker-Leigh, the remainder fled, several more being killed in the pursuit. Two levies on our side were killed.

Having been told in Gambaga that it was the invariable custom of the people living in this part of the country to attack at night, I pushed the piquets out about 150 yards from the faces of the square, thus putting the square out of range of the enemy's arrows, each piquet being in the centre of the face, and furnishing three

sentries.

The sentries communicated with one another, and a complete cordon was thus formed round the square. The piquets were fired at nearly all night by "snipers," evidently followers of the intense heat.

chief who was killed in the afternoon. was hit and the square was undisturbed.

The sentries, and occasionally the piquets, returned the fire, one of the enemy was found dead in the morning close to one of the piquets.

March 15.-We left Korogu at 6.15 A.M.

As the people of Nafrongo were reported to be going to attack us in force, I marched off the infantry in square, with the carriers in the centre.

The mounted troops were disposed as

follows :-

One troop Moshi horse (15 men) extended covering nearly a mile of front, and pushed a mile ahead: the two other troops were in support, one on each flank, the Hausa Mounted Infantry in the centre in reserve.

For about six miles the country, till we reached the outlying compounds of Nafrongo, was rather close "orchard bush," with longish grass.

The first shot was fired after we had gone about a mile into the Nafrongo country, but the enemy were only in small numbers, and were driven back by the mounted troops.

After two hours' running fight the centre of Nafrongo was reached (9 miles), all the com-

pounds being now abandoned.

Ten to twelve of the enemy were killed and a few cattle captured. Our casualties were two Moshi horsemen wounded.

March 16.—Left Nafrongo at 6 A.M. At 7 A.M. a large herd of cattle was seen, belonging to the people of Nafrongo, and captured. The King of Paha's house was reached at 8 A.M. (5 miles from Nafrongo). An excellent camp was formed,

water being good and abundant.

A native of Nafrongo was found this evening in Paha. I therefore sent him to the King of Nafrongo telling him to come in to Paha and make submission the next day, otherwise his

compounds would be destroyed.

March 17.—Halted at Paha.

March 18.—As the King of Nafrongo had not come in to submit, and I heard that he was in a distant part of his district, I started this morning at daybreak with a flying column composed of all the mounted troops.

Eighty (80) infantry, with one 7-pounder gun and one Maxim, with double relays of carriers, followed in reserve under the command of Captain

O'Kinealy.

On getting near Nafrongo I advanced at a gallop, hoping to capture the King, but found all the compounds again abandoned; pushing through Nafrongo a few of the enemy were found holding a belt of bush on the outskirts of the district. I dismounted the mounted infantry and drove them out, killing seven; a running fight then ensued, lasting for two hours, when we reached the friendly district of Meerigu. There I learnt that some natives of Nafrongo had been seen early that morning driving a large herd of cattle in the direction of Zoko. It was supposed that the King of Nafrongo was with them. I sent orders to Captain O'Kinealy to destroy the King's compounds, and to remain near the water hole where we had camped previously. I then pushed on with the mounted troops, and after another four miles caught sight of the cattle, with a few men in attendance; a general pursuit took place, the whole of the cattle were captured, the enemy flying in all directions.

The boundaries of the friendly district of Zoko were now reached, so I therefore stopped the pursuit, being anxious not to alarm the inhabitants.

We returned to Paha at 4 P.M., having done a march of about forty-five miles in the most

Twenty-five of the enemy were killed in the day's fighting. Our casualties being only one horse wounded, and three Moshis killed while employed in knocking down compounds in Nafrongo.

March 19.—I held a large palaver in the afternoon and received the Kings of Paha, Chulchulga, Tiana, and Meerigu, who were accompanied by

their chiefs.

March 20.—Left Paha at 6 A.M. and marched with the mounted troops till 7.15 A.M., when we

reached a dried up stream (5 miles).

The road to Tiana lay through considerably thicker country than usual; a very large stream (dry) with steep banks was crossed about 8.30 A.M. (8 miles).

We reached the borders of Tiana at 10 A.M., and the camping ground, near some water holes,

at 11 A.M. (17 miles).

March 21.-I left camp this morning at daybreak with a flying column composed of all the mounted troops, one 7-pounder gun, one Maxim,

and 120 infantry.

At 7.45 A.M. the outskirts of Sinlieh were reached (6 miles), and the compounds were found abandoned. At 8.45 a.m., after we had got well At 8.45 A.M., after we had got well into the Sinlieh country, small bodies of armed men were seen in all directions, gradually massing together. A large body had taken up a position

on some small rocks.

I brought the 7-pounder gun and Maxim into action, forming the infantry into three lines; being driven out of the rocks the enemy took up a further position a few hundred yards in rear, which they held on to for a short time, but the fire of the Maxim and the steady vollies of the firing line drove them out, after which they broke up into twos and threes and fled in all directions. The Moshi horsemen were then ordered up in pursuit, which they carried out in the most thorough manner.

I went on to the King's house, which we

destroyed.

We returned to the camp at Tiana in the after-

The enemy had thirty men killed during the day's fighting. Our casualties being four Moshi horsemen wounded and three horses wounded.

It is impossible to estimate the number of the enemy wounded, as they are always taken off by

their friends.

March 22.—I again went out to Sinlieh from Tiana with the same force as yesterday, and a

large number of carriers.

No signs of the enemy were seen, the whole district, about twenty square miles, being abandoned. The column returned to Tiana in the doned. evening.

March 23.—Halted at Tiana. Chiefs from various towns round came in to see me, bringing presents of cattle, and asking for the English flag; the chief of these were the Kings of Kayoro,

Bawarti, and Kasidimar.

March 24.—Left Tiana at 5.55 A.M. to-day, arriving at some good water holes at 7.10 A.M. (5 miles); met the King of Chulchulga a mile further on, who came to escort us through his country to Dober. We reached Dober at 10.40 A.M. (16 miles); the place was practically speaking deserted except by half a dozen people, who came out with white fowls; they brought water, &c.

March 25.—Left camp at 5.45 A.M. and reached the outskirts of Therigu near a good water hole

· at 7.45 A.M. (8 miles).

At 9.45 A.M. reached the outskirts of Bolga Tanga (13 miles). At 10.30 A.M. we arrived at the King's house, where we pitched camp $(15\frac{1}{2})$

The people of Tanga were friendly and remained in their compounds.

The whole of the Sherigu people had fled and abandoned their country, remembering the severe punishment that was inflicted on them $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago for murdering some Hausas, since which time they have not been in to make

March 26.—As I was aware that the remainder of the country to be visited would in all probability be absolutely friendly, I divided the column at Bolga Tanga into two parts, sending Captain O'Kinealy with one column, composed of 120 infantry and a Maxim gun detachment, to visit the towns of Arabeh, Tily, Zebilla, Binduri, and Bawku, returning to Gambaga viâ Kuguri and Sinbaga.

The remainder of the Field Force, under myself, left Bolga Tanga at 6 A.M., reaching the borders of Nabrigo at 8 A.M. (8 miles). I sent a horseman on a few hundred yards in advance with a white flag to show that we had come in a friendly spirit; but the inhabitants, who had already left their compounds, promptly fired at him, and then retired, taking up a position on the slope of a neighbouring hill, from which they were driven out by the mounted infantry, and then retired altogether. I captured several of the inhabitants of Nabrigo, and released them, telling them to go and tell the rest of their people that I had no wish to fight against them, but had come as their friend.

We reached the borders of Yariga at 10 A.M. 12 miles). Crossed the Red Volta River between Yariga and Sigu at 12.30 г.м. (17 miles): halted there till 1.45 P.M., finally reaching the camping ground at Sigu at 4 P.M. (25 miles).

March 27.—Left Sigu at 5.15 A.M., and rode straight into Zangoiri (10 miles), reaching there 7.30 A.M., where I saw the Kings of Moshi and Zangoiri, thanking the former for the valuable assistance of his horsemen, and left again at 8.15 A.M., reaching the banks of the White Volta at 9.15 A.M. (14 miles). Halted there quarter hour; finally reaching Gambaga at 11.45 A.M. (21 miles)

The times of arrival at each place and the rate of marching shown in this diary are those of the mounted troops, whom I invariably accompanied.

2. Lieutenant Griffin appears to have carried out the duty which was entrusted to him with much energy and tact, and to have obtained a satisfactory result. I have much pleasure, therefore, in bringing this Officer to your favourable notice, as also the behaviour of the Non-commissioned Officers and men who formed the column under his command.

3. You will observe, in the 5th paragraph of Lieutenant Griffin's report, he states that at

4. In the last paragraph of his confidential despatch of the 31st May last,* transmitting to you Lieutenant-Colonel Morris' report on the expedition into the Tiansi country, Sir M. Nathan recommended that the West African Frontier medal with clasp 1902 be given to all the troops who took part in the expedition, and I would now suggest, for your favourable consideration, that the medal with clasp be granted to any troops who formed part of Lieutenant Griffin's column, and who did not take part in the former expedition under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Morris.

Sir, Gambaga, September 23, 1902. I have the honour to forward, for Your Excellency's information, Lieutenant Griffin's report, with sketch map, on his recent mission to Fra Fra, to inquire into: (1) An attack made by the people of Gah, Dobah and Navrapum on the Chief of Merrigu, when he was returning to his country from Gambaga with our flag; two of his followers being reported killed. (2) Also, to investigate a complaint made by a Moshi

trader against the Chief of Sherigu. 2. It will be seen, from Lieutenant Griffiu's orders (copies attached), that he was given a free hand in dealing with the chiefs of Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum and their people, if, on investigation, he found the complaints made by the Chief of Merrigu correct.

3. After careful enquiries at Korogu he ascertained that the complaint made by the chief of Merrigu was correct, and the reason assigned for it was that the people of the town were angry with Merrigu for going to Gambaga to seek protection, and they therefore decided to punish him on his return, especially as he had

been given a flag.
4. Lieutenant Griffin then decided to go to Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum, and see the Chiefs, if possible, as he was assured that they would not come to him. On arrival at Gah he was attacked by the combined forces of the three towns, and these attacks continued for several hours during the early part of the day, all of which he repelled very successfully, especially the final attack, which took place in front of a stream, the enemy retiring in all directions, after having suffered very severely; fifty-nine men being counted killed. Our casualties were, for-tunately, practically nil, only two native followers being reported wounded.

5. The chief of Navrapum seems to have tried to prevent his people from fighting, and Lieutenant Griffin recommends that he should be given a flag. I shall consider this recommenda-tion when the chief comes to Gambaga. The chief of Gah came in before the fight and protested his friendliness, which was not borne out by subsequent events; consequently, Lieutenant Griffin made him a prisoner, and intended to bring him to Gambaga. Unfortunately, how-

Korogu he was met by the son of the King of | ever, he escaped on the way. The chief of Navrongo amongst other people. This chief | Dobah is now in Gambaga, and I shall go into his case as soon as some witnesses I have sent for arrive.

Lieutenant Griffin has enquired into the complaint made against the chief of Sherigu, and as the chief was unable to recover the trader's property, he brought in his son and brother to Gambaga, the chief himself being too old to travel; and burnt the compound belonging to the man who was reported to have stolen the property.

I think the results of the mission may be sum-

marized as follows:

(1) The people of Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum, have been severely punished for their attack on a friendly chief, and the authority of the Government has been vindicated.

(2) We have shown them that we can fight in

the rainy season.

(3) The chief of Merrigu has been established in his country, and that those found guilty of looting from traders, &c., will be severely

punished.

I consider Lieutenant Griffin carried out his mission very successfully under very trying circumstances, and I am sure Your Excellency will be pleased to hear that the Non-commissioned Officers and men behaved so well.

September, 23, 1902.

I have the honour to report that, acting under orders received from the Officer Commanding at Gambaga, on 2nd September, I left Gambaga on special service with 75 rank and file.

My orders were to proceed to Korogu; and investigate a complaint made by the King of

Merigu, and take necessary action.

I reached Wale Wale on September 3rd, and while here I received further orders to proceed to Serigu in connection with another complaint. I subsequently ascertained that Serigu lay considerably east of Korogu, and quite out of line between that town and Wale Wale.

On September 4th we left Wale Wale, and, going north through Navari, camped at Du. We reached the Volta at 6.45 r.m. on September 5, but were not all across till 12.45 r.m., and I

camped for the night at Naga.

On the morning of September 6th I arrived at Korogu, and was met by the following on entering the town:—The King of Korogu, Chief Bago, King of Merigu, Chief of Kikilo, the King of Paha's brother and a son of the King of Navrongo and their chief men.

From inquiries I learnt that Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum were most defiant, and had been drumming and blowing war horns quite close to Korogu. They were aware of our approach before we reached the Volta, and boldly asserted that the English were not fit to fight in the wet

I decided to start for Gah next day. Owing to the state of the streams and country generally, I arranged to leave behind in camp all loads except medicine box and matchets, with one sergeant and 20 men to guard the camp.

At 5.30 A.M. on September 7th, as I was marching off, the King of Gah came in and said his people were bad, and were going to fight the English, but he and two of his compounds were

good."
We reached Gah at about 7.30 A.M., and King of the "good" compointed out the direction of the "good" compounds, on our left rear. Immediately afterwards arrows were fired by our "friends" concealed in the dense corn, growing close to and completely hiding the compounds. One of the natives who had accompanied us from Korogu was brought to me with a poisoned arrow in his shoulder. 1 cut it out and treated the wound at once.

I faced about and fired volleys at the enemy, who could now be seen advancing through the corn, yelling and drumming as they came. soon checked the advance; as we drove them back I made the natives from Korogu and our carriers with matchets beat and cut down the corn before we advanced, so as to clear our field of fire. This course I adopted the stand near some day. The enemy finally made a stand near some big trees, but our fire proved too hot for them,

and they retired into the bush.

The friendly natives now set to work to burn and destroy these compounds. While this was being done a lot of men were seen advancing from the north and east, i.e., from the direction of Navrapum and Dobah. I advanced in square to a good position and opened fire from the front and right faces. The men from east in the direction of Dobah, fell back, and we could see them darting through the high grass to join the men attacking our front. I then aligned on the front face, and fired volleys till they turned and disappeared into the bush.

The enemy had lost a good many men by now, but it was impossible to get really good effect, owing to the great thickness and height of the grass and corn. One very big man, whose body we passed, I was told afterwards was the King

of Gah's brother.

I was now able to advance, and we burned several large compounds without being further molested. I then turned in the direction of Dobah, which we reached after about two hours' marching in square. The enemy kept on threatening us, but our fire kept them at a safe distance. Here we destroyed some of the principal com-

pounds.

I decided to march on Navrapum and settle matters if I could. The men I had sent on to scout returned very shortly with the information that a great number of men were advancing on us from the direction of Navrapum. We soon heard the drums and horns, and I halted my men in a good place, with comparatively clear ground in front, commanding a small stream about 300 yards away. I waited till the enemy crossed this, and then ordered "individual fixing," three rounds at a time, in order to keep control of the fire, which was difficult. I found the Hausas picked their men, and made much better practice than with volleys. The enemy suffered severely before they finally broke and fled, and we charged across the stream after them. It was now 1.30

After this we had no more trouble.

The country was quiet when I left, and I think there will be no more trouble.

On September 7th 59 men were counted dead on the field, and 1,100 were reported to have been out against us. I think we must have encountered about that number during the day.

The people of Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum are now all anxious to submit, and the King of Merigu has been reiustated in his own country. I have brought in prisoners, the King of Dobab, the King of Serigu's brother and son. I have brought in altogether 58 head of cattle (41 cows,

15 sheep, and 2 donkeys); under more favourable circumstances this total would have been largely increased, as the people of Gah, Dobah, and Navrapum had sent away all their women and cattle long before we reached the country, and, in fact, made every preparation for fighting.

The conduct of the men throughout was most exemplary, under very trying circumstances; and under this head I should specially like to mention B. S. M. Sambah Moshi, who, on every occasion, had his men well under control.

Bago the Grunshi and his horsemen from Korogu rendered me great assistance as scouts.

Most of the tracks after leaving Wale Wale were under water, and we had to cross many miles of swamp, with deep mud holes, but the men always marched well, and, though constantly wet through by rain and river, they were always cheerful and keen, and I never had any complaints.

Two friendly native followers were shot by poisoned arrows; they both came from Korogu. A horse ridden by one of Bago's scouts was also

shot in the breast.

ORDER of the Local Government Board: Regulations as to Cholera, Yellow Fever, and Plague:-

PORT OF IPSWICH.

IPSWICH AND HARWICH PORT SANITARY AUTHORITIES.

To the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority: To the Harwich Port Sanitary Authority; To the Officers of Customs of the Ports of

Ipswich and Harwich;—
To the Medical Officers of Health of the said Port Sanitary Authorities ;-

To all Masters of Ships;-

To all Pilots;

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Section 1 of the Public Health Act, 1896, it is enacted that Regulations of the Local Government Board made in pursuance of

Section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or in pursuance of that Section, as extended to London by the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, may provide for such Regulations being enforced and executed by the officers of Customs and the officers and men employed in the Coastguard as well as by other authorities and officers, and without prejudice to the generality of the powers conferred by those Sections may provide for-

(a) the signals to be hoisted by vessels having any case of epidemic, endemic, or infectious

disease on board; and

(b) the questions to be answered by masters, pilots, and other persons on board any vessel as to cases of such disease on hoard during the voyage or on the arrival of the vessel; and

(c) the detention of vessels and of persons on

board vessels; and
(d) the duties to be performed in cases of such disease by masters, pilots, and other persons on board vessels: Provided that the regulations shall be subject to the consent-

(a) so far as they apply to the officers of Customs, of the Commissioners of Her

Majesty's Customs; and

(b) so far as they apply to officers or men employed in the Coastguard, of the Admiralty; and

(c) so far as they apply to signals, of the

Board of Trade.

And whereas by a General Order dated the 9th day of November, 1896, as amended by a General Order dated the 24th day of December, 1902, We, the Local Government Board, in the exercise of the powers conferred on Us by the Public Health Act, 1875, the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, and the Public Health Act, 1896, made certain regulations (hereinafter referred to as "the Regulations") with a view to the treatment of persons affected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, and for the prevention of the spread of such diseases;

And whereas it is expedient that the Regulations should be revoked so far as regards ships bound to the Port of Ipswich and coming or being within the Harwich Port Sanitary District, and that other rules and regulations should be prescribed with regard to the said ships;

And whereas the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and the Board of Trade have respectively signified their consent to the Regulations hereinafter set forth so far as they apply to the officers of Customs and to signals:

Now therefore, in exercise of the powers before referred to, We hereby rescind, so far as regards ships bound to the Port of Ipswich and coming or being within the Harwich Port Sanitary District, the said Orders dated the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and the twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and two, except in so far as such Orders may apply to any proceedings now pending; and We do, by this Our Order, and in exercise of the powers conferred on Us by the Public Health Act, 1875, and the Public Health Act, 1896, and every other power enabling Us in that behalf, make the following Regulations with regard to the said ships, and declare that they shall be enforced and executed by the Authorities and Officers hereinafter mentioned.

ARTICLE I.—In this Order—

The term "Ship" includes vessel or boat; The term "Officer of Customs" includes any person acting under the authority of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs;

The term "Master," used in relation to a ship. includes the officer, pilot, or other person for the time being in charge or command of the ship; The term "Cholera" includes Choleraic

Diarrhœa;
The term "Local Authority" means any Council of a County Borough or any Urban or Rural District Council, and in the Administrative County of London any Sanitary Authority for the execution of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891; The term "Infected" means infected with

Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague: Provided that every ship shall be deemed infected in which there is or has been during the voyage, or during the stay of such ship in the port of departure or in a port in the course of such voyage, any case of Cholera, Yellow

Fever, or Plague.

ARTICLE II.—For the purposes of this Order the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority shall forthwith appoint a legally qualified Medical Practitioner (hereinafter referred to as "the Deputy Medical Officer of Health"), who shall reside within the Borough of Harwich, in the County of Essex, and shall act in the execution of this

ARTICLE III.—With regard to ships bound to the Port of Ipswich which are brought up for Customs purposes within the Harwich Port Sanitary District the following provisions shall

have effect:

(1.) The Officer of Customs who, on the arrival of any such ship from foreign, shall visit the ship, shall ascertain, so far as possible, whether such ship is infected, and if he have any reason to suspect that the ship is infected or has come from any infected place shall require the Master of the Ship, or the Surgeon, if the ship carries a Surgeon, to give (in writing under his hand and in the form hereunto appended or in a form to the like effect) a true answer to the following question:

(2.) The Officer of Customs who, on the arrival of any such ship from foreign, shall visit such ship, shall, if he find, or have reason to suspect, that the ship is infected, detain such ship, and order the Master forthwith to moor or anchor the same in such position as such Officer of Customs shall direct; and thereupon the Master shall forthwith moor or anchor the ship accordingly.

(3.) The Officer of Customs detaining, under the provisions of subdivision (2) of this been moored or anchored at the Ipswich Mooring

Article, any ship bound to the Port of Ipswich, and ascertained by him to be infected, or which he may have reason to suspect of being infected, shall forthwith give notice thereof, and of the cause of such detention, to the Deputy Medical Officer of Health and also to the Harwich Port Sanitary

(4.) Whilst such ship shall be so detained, no person (other than an Officer of Castoms or a person acting in the execution of this

Order) shall leave the same.

(5.) The detention of any such ship by the Officer of Customs shall cease so soon as the ship shall have been duly visited and examined by the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, or if the ship shall, upon such examination, be found to be infected, as soon as the same shall have been moored or anchored in pursuance of Article VIII at the mooring station fixed by the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority for the purposes of Our Order dated the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and hereinafter referred to as the Ipswich Mooring Station: Provided, that if the examination be not commenced within twelve hours after notice given to the Deputy Medical Officer of Health as aforesaid, the ship shall, on the expiration of such period, be released from detention.

(6.) The Deputy Medical Officer of Health, on notice of the detention of the ship being given to him as aforesaid by the Officer of Customs under the provisions of subdivision (3) of this Article, shall forthwith visit and examine the ship for the purpose of ascertaining whether such ship is infected; and shall, at the same time, inform the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority of the detention of

(7.) If on such examination, or on visiting and examining any ship under Article IV, the Deputy Medical Officer of Health shall be of opinion that the ship is infected, he shall give a certificate in duplicate as required by Article VI, and shall give to Us information as to the arrival of the ship, and such other particulars as We may require.

ARTICLE IV.—If the Deputy Medical Officer of Health have reason to suspect that any ship bound to the Port of Ipswich, whether examined by the Officer of Customs or not, is infected, he shall, or, if he have reason to suspect that the ship has come from an infected place, he may visit and examine such ship for the purpose of ascertaining whether such ship is infected; and may make the like visit and examination in the case of any such ship which has come from an infected place. The Master of any such ship shall permit the same to be so visited and examined.

The Master of any such ship shall also, on being required so to do by the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, cause the ship to be brought to, and, if necessary, moored or anchored in some convenient place while the same shall be visited and examined; but due regard shall be had to the safety of the ship and to the convenience of navigation.

ARTICLE V.—If the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, having visited and examined any ship bound to the Port of Ipswich under Article IV, find the ship to be infected, he shall give the certificate prescribed by Article VI, and inform the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority of the case by the speediest method available, and shall then remain on board such ship until the same has Station, and until the arrival on board of the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority or otherwise so long as may be necessary for the execution of this Order. The Deputy Medical Officer of Health shall also give to Us information as to the arrival of the ship, and such other particulars as We may require.

ARTICLE VI.—If the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, on making such examination as aforesaid (whether under subdivision (6) of Article III, or under Article IV, as the case may be) shall be of opinion that the ship is infected, he shall forthwith give a certificate in duplicate in the following Form, or to the like effect, and shall deliver one copy to the Master, and retain the other copy or transmit it to the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority. He shall also give to Us information as to the arrival of the ship, and such other particulars as We may require.

ARTICLE VII.—The Master of any ship certified in accordance with the provisions of Article V by the Deputy Medical Officer of Health to be infected shall carry out the directions of the Deputy Medical Officer of Health (not relating to matters of seamanship) as to the removal of the ship to and its mooring or anchoring at the Ipswich Mooring Station, and any other directions which the Deputy Medical Officer of Health may deem necessary to be given for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of Article V.

ARTICLE VIII.—The following provisions shall apply to all ships certified as aforesaid by the Deputy Medical Officer of Health to be

infected:-

(1.) The Master of any ship so certified to be infected shall thereupon moor or anchor such ship at the Ipswich Mooring Station, and such ship shall remain there until the requirements of this Order have been duly fulfilled.

(2.) No person (other than an Officer of Customs or a person acting in the execution of this Order) shall leave any such ship until the examination hereinafter mentioned

shall have been made.

(3.) The Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority shail, as soon as possible after any such ship has been certified to be infected, and has been moored or anchored at the Ipswich Mooring Station, examine every person on board the same, and in the case of any person suffering from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, or from any illness which the Medical Officer of Health suspects may prove to be Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, shall certify accordingly.

(4.) Every person certified by the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority to be suffering from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague shall be removed, if his condition admit of it, to some hospital or other suitable place appointed for that purpose by the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority; and no person so

removed shall leave such hospital or place until the Medical Officer of Health shall have certified that such person is free from the said disease.

If any person so certified to be suffering from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague cannot be removed the ship shall remain subject, for the purposes of this Order, to the control of the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority; and such person shall not be removed from or leave the ship, except with the consent in writing

of such Medical Officer of Health.

(5.) Any person certified by the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority to be suffering from any illness which such Officer suspects may prove to be Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague may either be detained on board the ship for any period not exceeding two days, or be taken to some hospital, or other suitable place appointed for that purpose by the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority, and detained there, for a like period, in order that it may be ascertained whether the illness is or is not Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague.

If any such person, while so detained, shall be certified by such Medical Officer of Health to be suffering from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, the provisions of subdivision (4)

of this Article shall apply.

(6.) No person on board such a ship as is mentioned in subdivision (3) of this Article who has not been certified as required by that subdivision shall be permitted to land unless he satisfy the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich PortSanitary Authority as to his name, intended place of destination, and intended address at such place.

Such name, intended place of destination, and address shall forthwith be given by such Medical Officer of Health to the Clerk to the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority, and such Clerk shall thereupon transmit the same to the Local Authority of the District in which such intended place of destination

is situate.

Every such person who, within forty-eight hours after landing, shall arrive at any place of destination or address other than such place or address as aforesaid, shall forthwith upon such arrival notify in writing his place of destination and address to the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority, or to the Local Authority of the District in which such place is situate.

(7.) The Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority shall, in the case of every ship certified to be infected, give directions, and take such steps as may appear to him to be necessary, for preventing the spread of infection, and the Master of the said ship shall forthwith carry into execution such directions as shall

be so given to him.

(8.) In the event of any death from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague taking place on board such ship while detained under subdivision (1) of this Article, the Master shall, as directed by the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority or the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority, either cause the dead body to be taken out to sea, and committed to the deep, properly loaded to prevent its rising, or shall deliver it into the charge of the said Authority, who shall thereupon cause the same to be otherwise lawfully and properly disposed of.

(9.) 'The Master shall cause the clothing and ! bedding and other articles of personal use likely to retain infection which have been used by any person who may have suffered from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague on board such ship, or who, having left such ship, shall have suffered from Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague during the stay of such ship in any Port, to be disinfected or destroyed; and if the Master shall have neglected to do so before the ship arrives in port, he shall forthwith, upon the direction of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority or the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority, cause the same to be disinfected or destroyed, as the case may require; and if the said Master neglect to comply with such direction within a reasonable time, the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority shall cause the same to be carried into execution.

(10.) The Master shall cause the ship to be disinfected, and every article therein, other than those last described, which may probably be infected, to be disinfected or destroyed, according to the directions of the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich

Port Sanitary Authority.

ARTICLE IX.—Where a ship bound to the Port of Ipswich is not ascertained or certified to be infected, but has passengers on board who are in a filthy or otherwise unwholesome condition, or has come from a place infected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority if the ship be within the Ipswich Port Sanitary District, or the Deputy Medical Officer of Health if the ship be within the Harwich Port Sanitary District, may, if in his opinion it is desirable with a view to checking the introduction or spread of Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, give a certificate in the following form and the like office and the following form, or to the like effect, and shall deliver one to the Master, and retain the other or transmit it to the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority :-

ARTICLE XI.—If, as regards ships bound to the Port of Ipswich, the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority or the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, have reason to believe that any such ship coming or being within the Ipswich Port Sanitary District or the Harwich Port Sanitary District, as the case may be, is infected, or has come from an infected place, he may direct all bilge water and water ballast to be pumped out in some suitable place before such ship enters any dock or basin:

ARTICLE XIII.—The Master of every ship bound to the Port of Ipswich, and infected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, shall, when the ship is within three miles of the coast of any part of England or Wales, or is within the limits of a Port, cause to be hoisted-

(i.) At the masthead or where it can be best seen, during the whole of the time between sunrise and sunset, a day signal, consisting

of a large flag of yellow and black borne quarterly; or

(ii.) At the peak or other conspicuous place where it can be best seen, and at a height of not less than twenty feet above the hull of the ship, during the whole of the time between sunset and sunrise, a night signal, consisting of three lights, which shall be arranged, at a distance of not less than six feet apart, in the form of an equilateral triangle, and of which the light at the apex of the triangle shall be white, and the other lights at the ends of the base of the triangle shall be red in colour.

No person (other than an Officer of Customs or a person acting in the execution of this Order) shall leave the aforesaid ship until after such visit of the Officer of Customs as is mentioned in Article III, or until after the visit of the Deputy Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of Article IV.

ARTICLE XIV .-- (1.) The Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority may, if they think fit, either generally or in any particular case, authorize the Deputy Medical Officer of Health to act in place of their Medical Officer of Health, or authorize their Medical Officer of Health to act in place of the Deputy Medical Officer of Health in the execution of any purposes of this Order.

- (2.) The Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority may also from time to time, where the circumstances in their opinion so require, appoint and pay a legally qualified Medical Practitioner to act as a temporary substitute for or an Assistant to their Medical Officer of Health or the Deputy Medical Officer of Health.
- (3.) Where the circumstances so require, references in this Order to the Deputy Medical Officer of Health or to the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority shall include in the one case references to the Medical Officer of Health or to any temporary substitute for or Assistant to the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, and in the other case references to the Deputy Medical Officer of Health or to any temporary substitute for or Assistant to the Medical Officer of Health of the Ipswich Port Sanitary Authority; and this Order shall be construed and apply with any modifications necessary to give effect to the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE XV.—Nothing in this Order shall render liable to detention, disinfection, or destruction any article forming part of any mail (other than a parcel mail) conveyed under the authority of the Postmaster-General, or of the postal administration of any Foreign Government, or shall prejudicially affect the delivery in due course of any such mail (other than a parcel mail) to the Post Office in accordance with the provisions of the Post Office Acts.

BYE-LAWS made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Portsmouth, being the Promoters of the Tramways in the Borough of Portsmouth, with respect to such tramways, pursuant to the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870.

Interpretation.

1. Throughout these Bye-laws the word "Corporation" means the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Portsmouth, and shall include any lessees or persons, for the time being, working the tramway system hereinafter referred to; the expression "the Town Clerk" means the Town Clerk of the Borough of Ports-This notice affects the following Admiralty mouth; the word "tramways" means the tram-Charts:—Bass Strait, No. 1695b; Rivoli Bay to way system worked by the Corporation; situate

in the Borough of Portsmouth and the Parish of Cosham; the words "Tramway Committee" mean the Committee appointed by the Corporation for the time being to undertake the control and management of the tramways; the word "car" means any carriage or car run by the Corporation upon the tramways for the conveyance of passengers; the word "conductor" means any officer or servant of the Corporation having the charge of or helping in the charge of a car; and the word "driver" means any officer or servant of the Corporation driving or helping to drive a car.

Offensive Language or Conduct.

2. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language or conduct himself offensively whilst in or upon any car, or spit or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car or tramway station, or premises used in connection with the tramway system, or in any way wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger. No person shall play or perform upon any musical instrument, or distribute advertisements or tracts of any kind, or beg or collect alms, or subscriptions, or sell any article, or play any game, or gamble, or deposit remnants of food or fruit in or upon any car.

Objectionable Persons.

3. Any person who is in a state of intoxication, or who from that or any other cause is in the opinion of the conductor, or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, unfit to be a passenger on a car shall not be allowed to board or enter upon any car, and if any such person be found in or upon any car he shall be requested by the conductor, or such other officer or servant as aforesaid, to leave the car, and upon such request such person shall forthwith leave the car, and in default of such person so doing it shall be lawful for the conductor or any other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee to remove such person from the car.

Dogs.

4. No person shall take a dog or other animal into or upon any car. Any dog or other animal taken into or found on any car shall be removed by the person in charge thereof from the car immediately upon request by the conductor or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, or may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor or such other officer or servant as aforesaid.

Damaging Cars.
5. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the seats, cushions, curtains, or linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed, or other notice, in or on any car, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any car. Any person acting in contra-vention of this Regulation shall be liable, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Byelaws, for the amount of any damage so done.

Smoking.

6. No person shall smoke or carry lighted pipes, cigars, or cigarettes inside any car.

Payment of Fares.

7. Each passenger shall on demand pay to the conductor, or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, the fare legally payable for his journey and obtain a ticket therefor. Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his journey.

Tickets.

8. Each passenger shall immediately upon demand show his ticket to the conductor, or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, and shall also when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

Tickets shall not be transferable and shall only be available by the car on which they are issued, except under any special regulations that may

from time to time be made.

Interference with the Duties of the Conductor or Driver.

9. No person other than the conductor or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards, or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord, or any part of a car or its equipment, or signal a car to start.

Luggage.

10. No luggage or parcels of any description unaccompanied by a passenger shall be conveyed upon any car by any driver or conductor, except under any special regulations that may from time to time be made, and any luggage or parcel brought by a passenger shall be placed by the passenger in such position on the car as shall be directed by the conductor.

Entering Full Cars.

11. When any car contains in the interior thereof the full number of passengers, for which seating accommodation is provided in such interior, no additional person shall enter, or remain in the interior of such car, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained. When any car contains on the outside thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation is provided on such outside, no additional person shall enter, board, or remain thereon.

Disabled Cars.

12. If at any time a car becomes disabled, or in any way injured, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon the request of the conductor, or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid. No person shall, except with the leave of the conductor, or such other officer or servant as aforcsaid, enter a disabled or injured car.

Cars proceeding to Sheds.

13. No person shall travel upon a car which is proceeding to a shed and is not on its usual route unless permitted so to do by the conductor, and where such person is so permitted, he shall pay the usual fare payable on such route.

Travelling on Steps, &c.

14. No person not being the driver or conductor of a car, or other officer or servant of the Tramway Committee, acting in the performance of his duty, shall travel or ride on the steps. platforms, outside rails, buffers, or guards of any car, or shall stand in any case on the outside, or, except with the express permission of the conductor first obtained, in the interior of any car.

No person except a passenger or intending passenger, or an officer or servant of the Tramway Committee acting in the performance of his duty, shall enter or board a car, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of a car.

Firearms.

15. No person shall travel in or on any car with firearms, or dangerous articles or things provided that nothing contained in this Bye-law shall apply to persons in the Naval, Military Reserve, or Auxiliary Forces carrying unloaded firearms.

16. Every person shall enter or depart from a
