A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD, R. & I.

Whereas by "The Exportation of Arms Act, 1900," Section 1, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty by Proclamation to prohibit the exportation of all or any of the following articles, namely: Arms, ammunition, military and naval stores, and any article which His Majesty shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of arms, ammunition, or military or naval stores to any country or place therein named, whenever His Majesty shall judge such prohibitions to be expedient in order to prevent such arms, ammunition, military or naval stores being used against His Majesty's subjects or forces, or against any forces engaged or which may be engaged in military or naval operations in co-operation with His Majesty's forces.

Whereas a Proclamation was issued dated August seventh, one thousand nine hundred, prohibiting the exportation to China of arms and ammunition from and after the date aforesaid.

And whereas We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, judge it no longer expedient to prohibit the exportation to China of arms and ammunition.

Now, We, by and with the advice aforesaid, hereby repeal the said Proclamation prohibiting the exportation to China of arms and ammunition from and after the date hereof.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this tenth day of *August*, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three, and in the third year of Our reign.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of the Plurali-
ties Act, 1838, as amended by the Plurali-
ties Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted,
"That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop
"of the Province, with respect to his own diocese,
"and whenever it shall be represented to him by
"the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of
"any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or
"that one or more benefice or benefices, and one
"or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories,
"vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or
"dioceses, being either in the same parish or
"contiguous to each other, and of which the
"aggregate population shall not exceed one
"thousand five hundred persons, may, with
"advantage to the interests of religion, be united
"into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the
"Province shall inquire into the circumstances of
"the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear
"to him that such union may be usefully made,
"and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that
"the patron or patrons of the said benefices,
"sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-
"ages respectively, is or are consenting thereto,
"such consent being signified in writing under
"the hands of such patron or patrons, the said
"Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying
"such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as
"hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his
"own diocese, a statement in writing of the
"facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of

"the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only, and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Certificate in writing bearing date the thirteenth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of East Barkwith and the rectory of West Barkwith both in the county of Lincoln having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and is not of inconvenient extent and that the Very Reverend Edward Charles Wickham, Clerk, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln and the Chapter of the same church the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the rectory of East Barkwith the same being now vacant and John Leigh Smeathman Hatton of 25 Tredegar-square in the county of London Esquire the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the rectory of West Barkwith in case the same were now vacant consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consents in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in

case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say the first and every alternate right to present to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the said John Leigh Smeathman Hatton or the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of West Barkwith and the second and every alternate right to present to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter of Lincoln or the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of East Barkwith."

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of East Barkwith, situate in the county and diocese of Lincoln, and the rectory of West Barkwith, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons shall present to the said benefices after the same shall be united shall be as follows that is to say:—the first and every alternate right of presentation shall belong to, and be exercised by, the said John Leigh Smeathman Hatton, or the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of West Barkwith, and the second and every alternate right of presentation shall belong to, and be exercised by, the said Dean and Chapter of Lincoln, or the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of East Barkwith.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen,

have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Chidham in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chidham is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Joseph Beckett Sherrin of the vicarage, Chidham aforesaid, Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas the said Joseph Beckett Sherrin is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chidham now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Chichester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland now Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Chidham which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control; and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Chidham.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Joseph Beckett Sherrin (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chidham now vested in him the said Joseph Beckett Sherrin for the estate aforesaid shall be transferred from him to the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice

of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Catherine Sandal Magna situate in the parish of Sandal Magna in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Catherine Sandal Magna situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Rodney, Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Sandal Magna, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Catherine, Sandal Magna, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Catherine Sandal Magna.'

"And with the like consent of the said George Rodney, Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Catherine Sandal Magna, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect

of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Catherine, Sandal Magna, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Sandal Magna, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Wakefield which is bounded upon the west and upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Mary Wakefield, upon the north-east by the parish of Warmfield, upon part of the south-east partly by the last named parish and partly by the parish of Crofton, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the south-east, and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Crofton from the said parish of Sandal Magna, at the point where the Pond Ing Drain joins the stream called Oakenshaw Beck, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Pond Ing Drain for a distance of sixteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries Church View-road across the said drain, and extending thence westward along the middle of Church View-road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Sandal Common-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Sandal Common-road for a distance of two chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Belle Vue-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Belle Vue-road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Sugar-lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Sugar-lane for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to a point opposite the place where the boundary which divides the said parish of Sandal Magna from the said new parish of Saint Mary, Wakefield, begins to follow the western side of Sugar-lane, and extending thence westward and in a straight line to the said boundary on the western side of Sugar-lane."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Wakefield.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Colehill within the parish of Wimborne Minster in the county of Dorset and in the diocese of Salisbury.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Wimborne Minster of the parish of Hampreston in the said county and diocese and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist Newborough and Leigh in the said county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and new parish.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Wimborne Minster of the said parish of Hampreston and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Newborough and Leigh should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Colehill as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Salisbury as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation) with the consent of the Governors of the possessions revenues and goods of the Free Grammar School of Queen Elizabeth in Wimborne Minster as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Wimborne Minster (in testimony whereof they have affixed their common seal to this representation) with the consent of the Right Honourable Ivor Bertie, Baron Wimborne as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Hampreston (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation) and with the consents of Captain Carr Stuart Glyn of Woodleaze Wimborne one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace Francis Augustus Bevan of Number 54 Lombard-street in the city of London Banker the Reverend Edward William Collinson of Widmouth near Ilfracombe in the county of Devon Clerk in Holy Orders the Reverend Francis Briggs Sowter of Clevedon Lodge Wimborne Clerk in Holy Orders and the Reverend John Colville Morton Mansel-Pleydell

of Sturminster Newton in the said county of Dorset Clerk in Holy Orders as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Newborough and Leigh (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Wimborne Minster of the said parish of Hampreston and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Newborough and Leigh which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Colehill aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael Colehill.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael Colehill comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Wimborne Minster, the parish of Hampreston, and the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist, Newborough and Leigh, all in the county of Dorset and in the diocese of Salisbury, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint James, Holt in the said county and diocese from the said parish of Wimborne Minster at the junction of the road leading from the house called Clapgate past the house called Dogdean Farm to Colehill with the road leading past Horns Inn and the house called Beaucroft to Leigh and extending thence first south-westward then southward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of one mile and twelve chains or thereabouts (thereby meeting and for seven chains or thereabouts following the boundary which divides the said parish of Wimborne Minster from the said new parish of Saint John Newborough and Leigh) to the centre of the bridge which carries the last-mentioned road across the Southampton and Dorchester Line, of the London and South Western Railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and sixty-four chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Newborough and Leigh from the said parish of Hampreston) to the centre of the bridge which carries the said line of railway across the road leading from Stapehill to Uddens Park and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of one mile and eight chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge (called the White Bridge) which carries such road across the stream called or known as Uddens Water upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Hampreston from the detached portion of the parish of Chalbury in the said county and diocese and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which

divides the said new parish of Saint James, Holt from the said parish of Hampreston and extending thence generally westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James, Holt from the said parish of Wimborne Minster and extending thence first south-westward for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts and then north-westward for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts along the last-mentioned boundary to the firstly hereinbefore mentioned point where the road leading from Clapgate past Dogdean Farm to Colehill meets the road leading past Horns Inn and Beaucroft to Leigh at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make provision for the passing of vessels and of goods in transit between the sea and places beyond the British Niger Territory (as hereinafter defined).

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue, and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Niger Transit Order in Council, 1903.

2. In this Order and in any regulations made under this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression "the British Niger Territory" includes the Protectorate of Northern Nigeria and of Southern Nigeria as the same are respectively described and delimited by the Northern Nigeria Order in Council, 1900, and the Southern Nigeria Order in Council, 1900.

The expression "River Niger" shall include the River Niger and all its affluents, branches, and outlets within the British Niger Territory.

The expression "Customs authority" includes any official of the Protectorates of Northern or Southern Nigeria deputed or directed by the respective High Commissioners of such Protectorates, or either of them, to perform any of the duties or do any of the acts imposed upon the Customs authority.

"Vessel" includes any kind of ship, boat, lighter, canoe or raft, other than a public ship.

"Secretary of State" means any of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

3. Vessels and goods may pass in transit between the sea and places beyond the British

Niger Territory subject to the regulations contained in the Schedule, which shall come into operation at the commencement of this Order. Any such regulations may be altered, amended or revoked by a Secretary of State.

4. A Secretary of State may at any time make any other or additional regulations for carrying this Order into effect, and may from time to time alter, amend or revoke all or any of such regulations as occasion may require. All such rules and such alterations, amendments, and revocations thereof shall have the same force and effect for all purposes as if the same had been made by Order in Council, and shall come into operation in such manner and on such date as shall be provided by such regulations.

5. Every person who acts in contravention of this Order or of any regulations made thereunder shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

6. Any Court of competent jurisdiction of either of the Protectorates of Northern or Southern Nigeria which is empowered under the law of Northern or Southern Nigeria (as the case may be) to impose for any offence the punishment of imprisonment for six months may order any person who is within the local limits of its jurisdiction and is charged with an offence committed in any part of the British Niger Territory against this Order or of any Regulation made in pursuance of the provisions thereof, to be brought before that Court and enquire of, hear and determine such charge as if such offence had been committed within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

7. Subject to the provisions of this Order and of any Regulations made under this Order, goods and vessels in transit shall in all respects be subject to the law in force in that portion of the British Niger Territory in which the said vessel or goods may happen from time to time to be, including any Sanitary Regulations respecting human, animal, or plant life.

8. The respective High Commissioners of the Protectorates of Northern Nigeria and Southern Nigeria shall cause this Order and the Regulations in the Schedule to be published in the respective Gazettes of the said Protectorates on the same day, and this Order and the Regulations contained in the Schedule to this Order shall come into operation on that date.

9. His Majesty may from time to time revoke alter or amend this Order.

SCHEDULE. REGULATIONS.

1. Any vessel passing in transit between the sea and places beyond the British Niger Territory shall enter and clear in transit at the first of the Customs stations hereinafter named to which she comes after entering the British Niger Territory. The clearance papers shall state the nationality of the vessel together with her name, port of registry, tonnage, port of origin and of destination, the place at which it is intended that the vessel shall leave the British Niger Territory, and whether the vessel is in ballast or cargo, and the name of the master. The papers proving the nationality and status of the vessel shall on the demand of the Customs authority be produced for inspection.

2. If the conditions laid down in the preceding Regulation have been complied with, the Customs authority shall deliver to the Master a transit certificate on which shall be indicated the name of the station at which it is to be given up, provided always that if there are goods upon such

vessel the Customs authority shall first cause seals to be placed on them or on the hatches or holds of the vessel or otherwise so as not to delay her.

3. The transit certificate shall be shown to the Customs authority on demand, provided that this formality shall not involve any obligation in regard to landing station or depôt or breaking bulk or in regard to entry into any particular port.

4. The certificate shall free the vessel from all further formalities, so long as no goods are landed or shipped in the British Niger territory, and so long as no breach of the law of any portion of the British Niger territory is committed.

5. A vessel declared as in transit as hereinafore shall not land or ship goods in the British Niger territory except under the conditions prescribed in Regulation 15.

6. Vessels in transit shall fly special flags, namely, the flags representing the letters Y.A.C. in the International Code of Signals, and shall at night display special lights, namely, two red lights, one above the other, three feet apart, and not less than three feet above the ordinary mast head light.

7. A vessel in transit may touch at ports of entry and other provisioning stations in the British Niger Territory to take in fuel, provisions and other necessaries; the taking on board of such necessaries shall not be held to be a shipping of goods, and the said necessaries shall not be held to be goods within the meaning of these Regulations.

8. The transit certificate shall be given up to the officer authorized to receive such certificates at the Customs station mentioned thereon.

9. Goods passing in transit between the sea and places beyond the British Niger Territory shall be declared as in transit at the first of the Customs stations hereinafter named to which they are brought after entering the British Niger Territory; a manifest or schedule shall there be delivered in duplicate to the Customs authority stating the nationality, the value at place of entry, and the nature, origin, and destination of the goods, the place at which it is intended that they shall leave the British Niger Territory, and their weight or quantity if in bulk, or if not in bulk, the weight, number and distinctive numbers and marks of the parcels, together with the name and address of the person within the British Niger Territory who is in charge of the goods and is a responsible agent for them.

10. One of the manifests or schedules shall be retained by the Customs authority and the other, visé by that authority, shall be returned to the agent in charge of the goods.

The manifest or schedule shall constitute the transit certificate for the goods, and shall be shown to any official of the British Niger Territory on demand, provided that this formality shall not involve any obligation in regard to landing station or depôt, or breaking bulk, or in regard to entry into any particular port.

11. The Customs authority shall indicate on the manifest or schedule the name of the station at which it is to be given up, and the manifest or schedule shall be delivered accordingly to the officer authorized to receive the same at that station.

12. If any change is made in the weight, amount, shape, size, number or marks of the goods entered on any certificate, a fresh transit certificate or certificates shall be obtained from an officer of the British Niger territory authorized to issue such certificates in the same manner as on the entry of the goods into the

British Niger territory. The old certificate shall be given up to the officer from whom the fresh certificate is received.

13. Goods in transit shall be sealed or otherwise secured by the Customs authority at the Customs station of entry, and except in accordance with the provisions of the last preceding Regulation the seals or other fastenings shall not be removed except by that authority at the exit station, and must there be presented intact. A guard may also, at the discretion of the Customs authority, be sent with the goods, and such guard shall, on board ship, be properly accommodated.

14. The breaking of the seals or other fastenings, either by accident or by any other cause beyond the control of the agent in charge of the goods, shall not be held to be an infraction of these Regulations, but the agent in charge of the goods shall notify the fact to the nearest authority of the British Niger Territory, and, if possible, to the Customs authority, and note shall be made of the occurrence, and new seals or fastenings shall be affixed. The burden of proof that the breaking of seals or other fastenings was beyond the control of the agent shall rest with him.

15. Goods in transit shall not be landed, shipped, transhipped, repacked, restowed, or placed in bond, except at places appointed for the purpose by notice by the Customs authority, and that authority may require those operations to be carried on under its supervision.

16. The provisions as to goods in transit apply to goods in transit partly by land and partly by a vessel cleared to or from either of the pieces of land leased to the French Government under Article VIII of the Anglo-French Convention of June fourteenth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, or any place or bonded warehouse appointed by the Customs authority. In this case the seals or other fastenings must be presented intact both at the inland place of shipping or landing, and at the place where the transit certificate is given up. Regulations twelve and fifteen, among others, shall in particular apply.

17. The Customs authority may name a limit of time within which a vessel in transit shall, unless delayed by causes beyond control, leave the British Niger Territory, and a limit of time within which goods in transit shall, unless delayed by causes beyond control, leave the British Niger Territory or be there bonded or imported.

18. Goods declared as in transit shall be so packed or stowed as to facilitate verification and the placing of seals or other fastenings on the parcels or on the hatches or holds of the vessel. In case the placing of seals or other fastenings be not possible the goods must be so packed or stowed as to prevent fraud.

19. Goods in transit by land as provided for in Regulation sixteen shall be carried by the route indicated by the Customs authority.

20. Vessels in transit and goods in transit shall pay no Customs duties but they shall pay all other dues which are levied, or which may hereinafter be levied in the British Niger Territory for services rendered.

21. Goods in transit may, under the control of the Customs authority, and in conformity with the Customs Regulation of the British Niger Territory, be re-entered for importation at any port of entry.

22. All acts of supervision on the part of the Customs authorities in regard to goods or vessels

in transit shall be free of charge to the master of the vessel, or to the agent in charge of the goods.

23. The following places in the British Niger Territory shall, for the purposes of these Regulations, be Customs stations:—

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act 1890 or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Niger Navigation Order in Council 1903.

2. In this Order and in any regulations made under this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression "the British Niger Territory" includes the Protectorates of Northern Nigeria and Southern Nigeria as the same are respectively described and delimited by the Northern Nigeria Order in Council 1900 and the Southern Nigeria Order in Council 1900.

The expression "River Niger" shall include the River Niger and all its affluents, branches and outlets within the British Niger Territory.

"Vessel" includes any kind of ship, boat, lighter, canoe or raft, other than a public ship.

"Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

The expression "Court of Competent Jurisdiction" means any Court empowered under the law of Northern or Southern Nigeria (as the case may be) to impose for any offence the punishment of imprisonment for six months.

3. Subject to the provisions of this Order and of any regulations made under this Order, vessels navigating the River Niger shall in all respects be subject to the law in force in that portion of the British Niger Territory in which they may happen from time to time to be.

4. It shall be lawful for a Secretary of State from time to time to make rules for the safety and control of navigation and for the imposition and collection of taxes, duties and tolls for services rendered to navigation, and also, as occasion may require, to alter, amend or revoke all or any of such rules. All such rules and such alterations amendments and revocations thereof shall have the same force and effect for all purposes as if the same had been made by this Order and shall come into operation in such manner and on such date as shall be provided by such rules.

5. Every person who acts in contravention of this Order or of any rules made thereunder shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months,

6. A Court of Competent Jurisdiction may order any person who is within the local limits of its jurisdiction and is charged with an offence committed in any part of the British Niger Territory against this Order or of any rule made in pursuance of the provisions thereof, to be brought before it and enquire of, hear and determine such charge as if such offence had been committed within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

7. The High Commissioners of the Protectorates of Northern and Southern Nigeria shall cause this Order to be published in the respective Gazettes of the said Protectorates on the same day and this Order shall come into operation on that date.

8. His Majesty may from time to time revoke alter or amend this Order.

WHEREAS it is provided by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, that the Legislature of any British possession may by an Act or Ordinance, confirmed by His Majesty in Council, repeal, wholly or in part, any provisions of that Act (other than those of the third part thereof which relate to emigrant ships) relating to ships registered in that possession; but that any such Act or Ordinance shall not take effect until the approval of His Majesty has been proclaimed in the possession, or until such time thereafter as may be fixed by the Act or Ordinance for the purpose.

And whereas the Legislature of the Colony of Hong Kong by certain Ordinances entitled respectively the Merchant Shipping Consolidation Ordinance, 1899, the Merchant Shipping Amendment Ordinance, 1901, and the Merchant Shipping Amendment Ordinance, 1903, and in particular by section 35 of the aforesaid Merchant Shipping Ordinance, 1901, has in part repealed the provisions of the said Act, other than those of the third part thereof which relate to emigrant ships.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinances should be confirmed by His Majesty in Council.

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to confirm the said Ordinances.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas, in pursuance of the said Act, certain Regulations and other Rules were made by Order in Council of Her late Majesty, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Queenstown:

And whereas it appears expedient that such Regulations and Rules should be amended:

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in him vested, is pleased, on the recommendation of the Admiralty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from the date hereof.

2. On this Order taking effect, all previous Orders relative to the matters comprised in this Order, shall cease to operate, and in lieu thereof the Rules and Regulations set forth in this Order shall become operative.

3. The terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act.

4. On the Chart accompanying this Order are marked all the limits referred to herein.

5. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without the permission of the Senior Naval Officer or King's Harbour Master, be moored, anchored, or placed within the space (to be called the Man-of-War Outer Anchorage) bounded as follows, namely:—

On the north by an imaginary straight line drawn from the Scots Church through the Pile Lighthouse on the Spit Bank.

On the south by an imaginary straight line formed by the south-west extreme of Haulbowline Island and the north extreme of Spike Island touching each other.

On the east and west by the contour line of three fathoms depth at low water spring tides.

Nor, with the exception of vessels placed alongside the quays, within the space (to be called the Man-of-War Inner Anchorage) bounded as follows, namely:—

On the east by a straight line drawn from the eastern extremity of the Admiralty Pier to the eastern extremity of Spike Island.

On the West by a line drawn N. 6° W. (true) from the inner end of the Black Prince's Pier.

On the north by the contour line of three fathoms depth at low water spring tides to the east extreme of the Naval Pier, thence by the low water line to the western landing steps on Middleton Quay, thence by the contour line of three fathoms depth at low water spring tides to a point where Black Point bears N. 62° E. (true) and thence in a direct line towards the north extreme of Ballybricken Point.

On the south by the low water line of Haulbowline Spit Bank, by the high water line of Haulbowline Island and west of that island by a straight line from the north-west extreme to the inner end of the Black Prince's Pier, which anchorages respectively are delineated and further described on the chart annexed to this Order: and these anchorages together shall be deemed to constitute, for the purposes of the said Act and of this Order, the Dockyard Port of Queenstown (in this Order called the Port).

6. Moorings for His Majesty's ships, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with naval or military operations, shall be placed by the King's Harbour Master as from time to time the requirements of His Majesty's Service may demand.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without license in writing from the Senior Naval Officer, or King's Harbour Master, be moored, or fastened, to any of His Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels, in the Port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

8. The fairway through the Man-of-War Outer Anchorage shall, when no men-of-war are anchored in it, be considered to include the water for a space of two hundred feet on each side of the line of the leading lights under Fort Camden as shown in the Chart, and shall be kept clear.

9. A fairway will be kept through the Inner Man-of-War Anchorage, in such a direction with regard to His Majesty's moorings and ships as circumstances may from time to time require.

10. If at any time any merchant or other private vessel hooks any of His Majesty's moorings, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the King's Harbour Master, or to the Chief Officer of the nearest of His Majesty's Dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing the moorings without damage.

11. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe, and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

WHEREAS by section six hundred and seventy of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that when any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon has either before or after the passing of that Act been erected or placed on or near the coasts of any British possession by or with the consent of the legislature of that possession, His Majesty may by Order in Council fix such dues (in that Act referred to as Colonial Light dues) to be paid in respect of that lighthouse, buoy or beacon by the owner or master of every ship which passes the same and derives benefit therefrom as His Majesty may deem reasonable, and may by like Order increase, diminish, or repeal such dues, and those dues shall from the time mentioned in the Order be leviable throughout His Majesty's dominions and further that colonial light dues shall not be levied in any British possession unless the legislature of that possession has by address to the Crown or by Act or Ordinance duly passed, signified its opinion that the dues ought to be levied:

And whereas the Great Basses Lighthouse, the Little Basses Lighthouse, and the Minicoy Lighthouse are lighthouses which have been duly erected under and pursuant to the said section:

And whereas by Orders in Council dated respectively the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, His Majesty duly fixed the dues leviable in

respect of the said lighthouses for the classes of ships therein respectively mentioned:

And whereas under section ten of the Public Works Loans Act, 1881, and the Acts therein referred to certain loans became due to the Public Works Loan Commissioners in respect of the said lighthouses and it was by the said section enacted that so long as that were the case the dues payable in respect of the said lighthouses should be altered only with the consent of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that all loans made by the Public Works Loan Commissioners for the purposes mentioned in the said Acts have been repaid and that it is expedient that the amount of the said dues should be reduced in manner hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in him by the said section six hundred and seventy of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, is pleased to direct that from and after the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and three, or from the time of the receipt of notice of this Order, if that be later, by the officers authorized to collect light dues, the dues thenceforth to be levied shall be as follows, that is to say, in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, three-sixteenths of one penny per ton, and in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse one-sixteenth of one penny per ton, of the burden of every ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said lights respectively, and such dues shall be levied in lieu of the dues leviable under the said recited Orders in Council or any of them.

WHEREAS by section 5, sub-section 2, of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is enacted that the Scale and Rules set out in the Second Schedule to that Act shall have effect for the purpose of the levying of light dues in pursuance of that Act, but His Majesty may, by Order in Council, alter either generally or with respect to particular classes of cases, the Scale or Rules and the Exemptions therefrom:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the said Scale should be altered in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the above-recited provisions, doth, for the purpose of the levying of light dues in pursuance of the said Act, alter by this Order in Council, the Scale set out in the said Second Schedule to the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

1. Each of the dues authorized to be levied by the said Scale shall be reduced by twelve and a half per centum of the amounts therein specified, and the said dues as so reduced shall be levied accordingly.

2. This Order in Council shall come into operation as and from the first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and three.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Act, 1883, amongst other things provides by section thirty-nine that the exhibition of an invention at an industrial or international exhibition certified as such by the Board of Trade or the publication of any description of the invention during the period of the holding of the exhibition or the use of the invention for the purpose of the exhibition in the place where the exhibition is held or the use of the invention during the period of the holding of the exhibition by any person elsewhere without the privity or consent of the inventor shall not prejudice the right of the inventor or his legal personal representative to apply for and obtain provisional protection and a patent in respect of the invention or the validity of any patent granted on the application provided that both the following conditions are complied with, namely:—

(a.) The exhibitor must before exhibiting the invention give the Comptroller the prescribed notice of his intention to do so; and

(b.) The application for a patent must be made before or within six months from the date of the opening of the exhibition.

And whereas the said Act further provides by section fifty-seven that the exhibition at an industrial or international exhibition certified as such by the Board of Trade or the exhibition elsewhere during the period of the holding of the exhibition without the privity or consent of the proprietor of a design or of any article to which a design is applied or the publication during the holding of any such exhibition of a description of a design shall not prevent the design from being registered or invalidate the registration thereof provided that both the following conditions are complied with, namely:—

(a.) The exhibitor must before exhibiting the design or article or publishing a description of the design give the Comptroller the prescribed notice of his intention to do so; and

(b.) The application for registration must be made before or within six months from the date of the opening of the exhibition.

And whereas His Majesty by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the provisions of the Patents Act, 1886, is empowered by Order in Council from time to time to declare that the provisions of the said Act of 1883 above recited shall apply to any exhibition mentioned in the Order in like manner as if it were an industrial or international exhibition certified by the Board of Trade and to provide that the exhibitor shall be relieved from the conditions specified in the said hereinbefore recited sections of the said Act of 1883.

Now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said Act of 1886 doth declare and it is hereby declared that the provisions of the foregoing sections of the said Act of 1883 shall apply to the International Exhibition to be held at Saint Louis in the year one thousand nine hundred and four; and further, that the exhibitor of an invention, a design, or any article to which a design is applied shall be relieved from the conditions specified in the said hereinbefore recited sections of the said Act of 1883 of giving notice as therein required of his intention to exhibit such invention, design, or article to which a design is applied.

IT having been represented to His Majesty in Council by the Governor and Company of the Bank of England in a Memorial sealed with the seal of the said Governor and Company, and dated the twenty-fifth day of June one thousand nine hundred and three—

(1) That between the twelfth June one thousand nine hundred and two, the date of the preparation of the last Memorial to His Majesty in Council, upon which His Majesty's Order in Council of the eleventh day of August one thousand nine hundred and two was made, and the presentation of the new Memorial of the twenty-fifth day of June one thousand nine hundred and three, certain bankers in the latter Memorial named, who, on the sixth day of May one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, were issuing their own bank notes to the extent of sums amounting in the aggregate to the sum of four hundred and thirty-nine thousand five hundred and seven pounds, have ceased to issue their own bank notes;

(2) That the total of the authorized issues of bankers who, subsequently to the said sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, have ceased to issue their own bank notes, including the above sum of four hundred and thirty-nine thousand five hundred and seven pounds, amounts to six million seven hundred and eight thousand four hundred and ninety-two pounds whereof the proportionate part of two-thirds amounts to four million four hundred and seventy-two thousand three hundred and twenty-eight pounds;

(3) That the aggregate increase of issues by the Bank of England of their own bank notes authorized by Orders of Her late Majesty in Council, under the provisions of the hereinafter mentioned Act, during the same period, have amounted only to four million one hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds; and

(4) That the difference between such aggregate increase of issues by the Bank of England and the proportionate part of two-thirds of the aforesaid lapsed issues by other banks is two hundred and ninety-seven thousand three hundred and twenty-eight pounds.

And the said Governor and Company having thereupon humbly made application to be authorized under the provisions of the Act passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of Her late Majesty, chapter thirty-two, intituled, "An Act to regulate the issue of Bank Notes, and for giving to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England certain privileges for a limited period," to increase the amount of securities in the Issue Department of the Bank of England, and to extend the issues of their own bank notes to an amount not exceeding the above-mentioned difference between the increase of issues by the Bank of England that has been already authorized and two-thirds of the aggregate issues by the banks that have lapsed subsequently to the sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four.

Now, therefore, it is this day ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Governor and Company shall be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to increase the amount of securities in the Issue Department of the Bank of England to the extent of two hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds beyond the total sum or value

of fourteen million pounds in the said Act mentioned, and of the further sums of four hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds, one hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds, three hundred and fifty thousand pounds, seven hundred and fifty thousand pounds, four hundred and fifty thousand pounds, two hundred and fifty thousand pounds, three hundred and fifty thousand pounds nine hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds and four hundred thousand pounds authorized by the Orders in Council dated the seventh day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the third day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, the fifteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, the eighth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the twenty-ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, the third day of March one thousand nine hundred, and the eleventh day of August one thousand nine hundred and two and thereupon to issue additional Bank of England notes from the said Issue Department, in manner in the said Act mentioned, to the amount of two hundred and seventy-five thousand pounds.

WHEREAS, by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the *London Gazette*, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered; provided also that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Prudhoe, and of the parish of Cruckton, in the civil parish of Pontesbury, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representations, made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-grounds should be opened in the civil parishes of Prudhoe and Pontesbury, without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parishes as hereinafter directed:

And whereas, His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the twenty-fifth day of June last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and three, and such Order has been published in the *London Gazette*, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-grounds shall be opened in the said civil parishes without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:—

PRUDHOE.—After the thirtieth of September, one thousand nine hundred and three, in the burial-ground known as Prudhoe Church cemetery, which was opened in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, except as follows:—

(a.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said burial-ground, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave:

(b.) In the said burial-ground, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

CRUCKTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Thomas, Cruckton, in the civil parish of Pontesbury, and in the churchyard.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of New College, Oxford, on the 17th day of June, 1902 (and sealed on the 7th day of July, 1903), amending Statute III, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

Statute to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, 40 and 41 Vict., cap. 48, and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to New College in the University of Oxford, in the matter of election to Fellowships, such amending Statute being duly made at a

General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the seventeenth day of June one thousand nine hundred and three and passed by the unanimous votes of those present and voting.

For Statute III, Clause 3, to substitute the following:—

Emoluments of Professorships.

III. 3. Each of the Savilian Professors shall receive the emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship, and shall also receive the annual sum of four hundred pounds in addition to the income derived from the Savilian Endowment, or from the University Chest. Provided that, if in any year the income arising from the Savilian Endowment shall exceed six hundred pounds, the total sum of eight hundred pounds to be paid in that year to the two Savilian Professors shall be reduced by the amount of the excess.

The Professor of Logic shall receive the emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship, and shall also receive, in addition to the stipend paid to him out of the University Chest, the annual sum of three hundred pounds.

Subject to the provisions of Statute XXI, each of the other Professor-Fellows shall receive the emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship, and shall also receive the annual sum of seven hundred pounds.

For Statute III Clauses 18-25 to substitute the following:—

Ordinary Fellowships.

13. The Ordinary Fellowships shall (subject to the power of suspension or diminution vested by these Statutes in the Visitor) be not less than twelve in number, nor more than will make up the whole number of Fellowships to thirty-six, exclusive of Fellowships without emolument, but including any Fellowship held by the Bursar under the provisions of the preceding clause.

Emoluments of Ordinary Fellowships.

14. The emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship shall be two hundred pounds a year clear of income tax.

Tenure of Ordinary Fellowships.

15. Every person elected to an Ordinary Fellowship shall (subject to the provisions for vacating Fellowships otherwise than by lapse of time and for the deprivation of Fellows in these Statutes contained) be entitled to hold his Fellowship for seven years from the day of his election, and no longer. If any person holding an Ordinary Fellowship shall be elected to a Tutorial Fellowship, he shall, in the event of his ceasing to be a Tutor or Lecturer of the College before the date at which his Ordinary Fellowship would have become vacant by lapse of time, be entitled to hold an Ordinary Fellowship until such date.

Power to elect persons specially qualified.

16. The Warden and Fellows may, at any Stated General Meeting, by the votes of two-thirds of those present and voting on the question, elect to an Ordinary Fellowship, without giving public notice and without examination, any Professor or Public Reader in the University, or any person whose attainments in Literature, Science, or Art, shall in the judgment of the Warden and Fellows qualify him for election as a Fellow, and who shall undertake to perform any definite literary, scientific, or educational work in the College or the University, or elsewhere under the direction of the College or the University, which work shall be specified in the Resolution by which he is elected; and may assign to any person so elected and undertaking to perform such work as aforesaid, in addition to the emoluments of an Ordinary Fellowship, such

reasonable payment as they may determine, not exceeding one hundred pounds per annum. Provided that, if the emoluments (exclusive of fees) of any Professor so elected shall exceed seven hundred pounds per annum, he shall not receive as the emoluments of his Fellowship a greater sum than will amount, with the emoluments of his Professorship (exclusive of fees), to nine hundred pounds per annum: Provided also, that every Professor or Reader so elected shall, upon ceasing to hold his Professorship or Readership, vacate his Fellowship; and that every person elected upon undertaking to perform some definite literary, scientific, or educational work, shall, if in the judgment of the Warden and Fellows he cease to perform it, vacate his Fellowship.

Power of re-election.

17. The Warden and Fellows may, in the manner and under the conditions specified in the last preceding clause, re-elect, from time to time, to an Ordinary Fellowship, any person who shall have been elected under that clause, or any person qualified under that clause who already holds an Ordinary Fellowship: Provided that the whole number of persons holding Fellowships under the powers conferred by this and the last preceding clause, or either of them, shall not exceed ten at any one time.

Election on condition of teaching.

18. The Warden and Fellows may at any Stated General Meeting elect to an Ordinary Fellowship, with or without examination, and on account of proficiency in any branch of learning for the time being recognized in the Schools of the University, a person who shall undertake to reside and take part in the teaching work of the College during at least three years of the tenure of his Fellowship. Provided that there shall not be more than four such Fellows at any one time.

Candidates for Fellowships under this clause must have fulfilled all the conditions required by the University for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or of Bachelor of Letters, or of Bachelor of Science.

The Warden and Fellows may, if they shall think fit, allow a Fellow elected under this clause, to postpone the commencement of his teaching for not more than two years from the date of his election, on condition that he shall pursue a definite course of study in Oxford, or elsewhere, to be approved by the Warden and Fellows.

A Fellow elected under this clause who shall cease to reside and teach (except on the conditions mentioned in the last paragraph) before he shall have completed three years of such residence and teaching shall, *ipso facto*, vacate his Fellowship.

Election by Competition.

19. The remaining Ordinary Fellowships shall be filled up by competition, but so that not more than two Fellowships shall be so filled up in any one year. Half of them shall be open to all persons who shall have been educated for at least two years in the School of the College of Saint Mary of Winchester, otherwise called Winchester College, or have been for at least eleven Terms members of New College, and shall be called Winchester Fellowships. Half of them shall be open to all persons who shall have passed all the examinations required by the University for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and shall be called Open Fellowships. No person shall be eligible to a Fellowship under this clause who shall hold any benefice, property, pension, or office, which, if acquired after his election, would have disqualified him from continuing to be a Fellow.

Manner of Election by Competition.

20. The election to Ordinary Fellowships open to competition shall be made by the Warden and Fellows at a Stated General Meeting. Thirty days, at least, before every day of election, notice of such intended election, of the number of vacancies to be filled up, and of the conditions of election, shall be given by the Warden in such manner as he shall deem best adapted to ensure publicity.

The intellectual qualifications of the candidates shall be tested by an examination in such subjects connected with the studies of the University as the Warden and Fellows shall determine: provided that the system of examinations shall be such as shall render Ordinary Fellowships accessible, from time to time, to excellence in every branch of knowledge for the time being recognized in the Schools of the University; and that the examination for election to Open Fellowships shall, once at least in every seven turns, have special reference to excellence in each of the following subjects: viz. Theology; Natural Science, or Medicine; and Mathematics.

Election to lapse if no sufficient Candidate.

21. The Warden and Fellows shall elect that candidate (being otherwise duly qualified according to the Statutes in force for the time being) who, after such examination, shall appear to them to be of the greatest merit, and most fit to be a Fellow of the College as a place of religion, learning, and education. Provided that if there shall be no candidate whom the electors shall judge to be of sufficient merit for election, the Warden and Fellows shall declare the election to have lapsed for that year: and the subject of examination shall be deemed to have had its turn for the purposes of the last preceding clause of this Statute.

Power to elect eminent persons and ex-Fellows to Fellowships without emolument.

22. The Warden and Fellows may, from time to time, at any Stated General Meeting, by two-thirds of the votes of those present and voting on the question, elect to a Fellowship, without emolument, but with the other rights of an Ordinary Fellow:

(a) Any person who holds the office of Professor or Reader in the University, or who is of eminence in Literature, Science, or Art: Provided that the whole number of such persons holding such Fellowships shall not exceed four at any one time;

(b) Any person who is or has been a Fellow of the College, and whom it is judged expedient for the interests of the College to retain or to re-elect as a Fellow: Provided that the whole number of such persons holding such Fellowships shall not exceed four at any one time.

The duration and conditions of tenure of such Fellowships may be determined by the Warden and Fellows from time to time.

The Warden and Fellows may repay to persons elected under this clause such necessary expenses in respect of attendance at Meetings as they shall find from time to time determine. A Fellow shall not, in consequence of receiving such payments or of receiving the dinner allowance mentioned in clause 32, be deemed to be in receipt of emolument for the purposes of this Statute.

Admission of Fellows.

23. Every person elected to a Fellowship under clauses 16, 17, or 22 of this Statute, shall be admitted an Actual Fellow immediately upon his election; and the Electors may at the time of his election determine the rank which he shall hold in the College, without reference to the date

of his election, but such rank shall confer no other than honorary privileges.

Probation of Fellows.

24. Every person elected to an Ordinary Fellowship under clauses 18 or 19 of this Statute shall remain a Probationer Fellow for one year from the day of his election, and until he shall have been resident in the University for three Terms after his election; Easter and Trinity Terms being counted for this purpose as one Term.

Residence in each term shall for the purposes of this clause mean pernoctation during forty-two nights of Full Term: and the whole of the residence required shall be completed in the first year after election unless the Warden and Fellows shall give leave to the contrary. Such leave shall not extend the period within which the residence of a Probationer Fellow is to be completed beyond two years from the date of election; and at the expiration of one year, or such extended period as the Warden and Fellows have sanctioned, if his residence be not completed, his Fellowship shall *ipso facto* become vacant.

Provided always that the Warden and Fellows at a Stated General Meeting may, if they shall think fit, dispense with any part of such residence upon such conditions as may be laid down in the By-laws.

A Probationer Fellow shall not be entitled to take any part in the government of the College, or the administration of its property, but shall receive the same emoluments as if he were an Actual Fellow. As soon as possible after his residence is completed and his year of probation is expired, he shall, if found fit in the judgment of the Warden and Fellows, be admitted an Actual Fellow of the College. If he shall be found unfit, his Fellowship shall thereupon become vacant.

Causes of vacating Ordinary Fellowships.

25. Every person holding an Ordinary Fellowship under clause 19 of this Statute, who shall be instituted to a benefice, or become entitled either by descent or devolution or by virtue of any testamentary or other gift or settlement to property or to a pension, or be admitted to an office tenable for life or during good behaviour (not being an academical office in the University), or to any office in the permanent Service of the State, and shall retain such benefice, property, pension, or office for one year, shall, if the annual income derivable by him from such benefice, property, pension, or office, or from any two or more of these sources, clear of deductions (except for property or income tax), shall exceed £500, vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of one year from the time of his institution, accession, or admission to such benefice, property, pension, or office. In construing this clause the word "property" shall include any estate or interest in possession in any property real or personal; and the income which the estimated value of any property would produce, if invested in two and a half per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, at the price current at the time of the acquisition thereof, shall, in case of doubt, be considered to be the income derivable from such property, and in any case in which the sources of income may have been acquired by a Fellow at different times, the latest time at which any of such sources of income shall have been acquired by him shall be considered as the time of the acquisition of the whole.

For Statute III, Clause 31, to substitute the following:—

Precedence of the Fellows.

31. Subject to the provision of Statutes II, 6, and III, 23, and to any resolution which the Warden and Fellows may pass in any particular case for a different order of precedence, the Fellows shall rank and take precedence in the College according to the date of their election or appointment, and their emoluments shall begin to accrue from the same date. Any Fellow who shall be re-elected under clauses 10, 11, or 17 of this Statute, and any Fellow who holding a Fellowship of one class shall be elected to a Fellowship of another class, shall rank according to the date of his original election.
