PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by section sixteen of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, "and whenever it shall be represented to him by "the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of "any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or "that one or more benefice or benefices, and one " or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or "dioceses, being either in the same parish or "contiguous to each other, and of which the "aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with "advantage to the interests of religion, be united "into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the "Province shall inquire into the circumstances of "the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear "to him that such union may be usefully made, "and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that "the patron or patrons of the said benefices, "sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-"ages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, "such consent being signified in writing under "the hands of such patron or patrons, the said "Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying "such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as "hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his "own diocese, a statement in writing of the "facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of
