might be privately fomented to the disjurbance of the pre-Sent Government.

His Majetty still infists upon the surrender of those places in the Metherlands, which are laid to be dependances apon any of the Governments or Dominions of his late Conquefis ; in order whereunto, the Sieur des Landes, Governour of Actb, has by his Majesties Order, lent his Commands to the Burgomaffers of Conde to publish the peace between both Crowns, and in His Majesties name to make their Bonfires and usual Solemnities, practiled on The like occasions; withal, acquainting them, that for the future they are to give obedience to his Orders as being dependant upon Aeth: upon the receipt of this Message, the Burgonia ters immediately confulted with the Spanish Governour, how they were to behave themselves on this point, who has exprelly forbilthem to give obedience to any other Orders but what they shall receive from him or his su, e-

The Sieur d' Erlat, ellest Captain of His Majerties Regiment of Swiss-Guards, is go to post for Swizzerland, and tis faid, has i relers to be present at the General Aisembly of cantons held at Lade, to mannage the interest of this Crown, and to prevent the deligns of such as would by their infinuations prevail upon them to tak: Franche Comte and Milin into their protections, and perswade them to recall the Swiffes which are now in His Majesties service.

A Courier extraordinary lately arrived from Monfieur de Besufort, informs us, that he had pursued three Spanish men of war into the Port of Vigo in Gallicia, into which he had followed the n in despisht of all their Attillery f.om the Fortress, and had there enclosed them.

The Situr de la Roche, Commander of a squadron of His Majesties ships, is lately dead of the Chollick, but his

Command not yet dispo'ed of.

A Courier lately arrived from Raifillon, informing His Ma off, that the Spaniards were not yet retired out of Roufillon, was within an hour after his arrival, fent back again with Orders to Monsieur de Passage, but of what concernment Fis not yet faid.

His Majesty has been lately pleased to conserve the Honour of Mareshal of France upon the Marquelles de Bellefonds, de Crequy, and d' Humiers ; and 'tis believed, the former of these will be chosen by His Majesty to be Govern-

our to the Dauphin.

Many endeavours are used to compose the differences rifen in the Church, by reason of the four diffencing Bishops; preparations were making for the full examination and canfure of them upon their refulal to subscribe the Form proposed to them, but upon farther consideration, and the addreffes of feveral others of the Bishops, the Counsel slave at present suspended and forbid their Assembly upon that ocration, intending to experiment fome milder Methods for the composure of this dispute.

Hague, July 13. The Here Van Beuninghen notwith-Randing the liberty given him for his return, is still at Pavis, endeavouring to continue a right understanding between the Two Crowns of France and Spain, in relation to the Demands His Most Christian Maiesty hath made of several places, which are said to be dependencies upon his late Conquests, and an Incussion lately made by the Duke d' Offuna upon Rouffillon.

The States of this Province have lately affembled, and tis believed somewhat wil be speedily resolved, as to the disbanding of our Forces, and disarming of a considerable

part of the Fleet.

The Prince of Denmarke having passed some dayes here incognito, refused all publick Addresses, as he did also the Lodgings prepared for him in Prince Maurice his Houle: he is now gone for samfterdam, and intends afterwards for

From the Texel are certainly informed of the arrival of 8 thips richly laden from the East Indies, 3 of these belonging to the Chamber of Amsterdam, 2 to Zealand; one to Dort, one to Rotterdam, and the last to Hoorn;

and that they daily expect the arrival of two more, which mere straggled from their company, with two athers iron Ceylon.

Paris, July 14. His Majelly has order'd an inquiry to be made into the Officers of His Houle, obliging them to declare their pretention, to their Titles of Noblette, if they challenge it from their Birth, to make sufficient proof thereof, under penalty of being proceeded against a cording to a late Ocdonance made to that purpole; or if from their Charges or Offices, His Majetty is willing to enable them by his Letters or Conditions, they bringing good Certificates of any confiderable service performed by them in the Army within the space of ten years.

Letters from Madrid tell us, that Don Juan, having all fati-faction given him by the Council of spain, was em-

barked for the Netherlands.

From Rochel we are informed, that Monsieur de Beanfort was fallen ill of a distemper aboard his ship near Vigo, from whence he had fer flik with a resolution of purluing his voyage for Lisbonnes but 'tis said, His Majesty has by fesh Orde's orde ed his speedy return, and to oilarm the Fleet.

Waymouth, July 6. There are now riding at Portland-road, a Feet of 25 fail of Lutch Metchant ships with their Convoy, outward bound for leveral parts of Frances and 18 fail of English and French ships waiting for a fair

Portsmouth, July . On Friday passed by S. Hellens-point, a Fleet of about 40 fail of Merchant ships under the Convoy of two Du ch men of War, which lait are in Se. Hellens Road with 8 fail of Merchant ships bound to the Westwards.

The squadron under the Command of Sir Thomas Allen, are re-fitting with all diligence, and may in few days be

ready to put to sea.

Whitehall, July 8. On Mond y last, their Majesties accompanied by their Royal Highnesses, and His Highness Prince Rupers, and attended by several of the Nobility and persons of principal Quality about the Court did the Counte's of Devenshire the Honour to dine at her House # Ro-Hampton who treated them to their great fatisfaction. His Majesty with His Royal Highness, and Pince Rupert, departed thence after dinner for Hampton Cours, and the next day diverted themselves in the Chace of a Stagg, which ended, they returned in the Evening to this place.
