WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for Regulating the Police Courts in the Metropolis," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to alter the number of the Police Courts, and to order such changes to be made of the places in which they should be holden within the Metropolitan Police District as should be found expedient, and every such Court should henceforth be holden in the place in or to which it should be so ordered to be established or removed; and whereas also, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of Her said Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for better defining the powers of Justices within the Metropolitan Police District," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to constitute within the Metropolitan Police District as many Police

Court Divisions as to Her Majesty should seem fit, and to define the extent thereof, and from time to time to alter the number and extent of such Police Court Divisions, and to assign a Division to each of the Police Courts already established, and to establish a Police Court for each of the other Divisions.

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts, so many Police Court Divisions as to Her said Majesty from time to time has seemed fit, have been constituted within the Metropolitan Police District, and the extent thereof defined respectively, and such Divisions have been severally assigned to each of the Police Courts continued or established under the said Acts.

And whereas alterations have been made in certain of the boundaries of parishes and areas comprised within some of the said Divisions, and it is expedient that the extent of the said Divisions so assigned as aforesaid and their respective boundaries should be defined in one Order in Council:—

Bow Street Police Court.

His Majesty is pleased therefore, with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say) from the boundary of the city of London, at the Temple Stairs, on the River Thames, in a line running along the said boundary as far as Holborn; thence across Holborn to Gray's-inn-road; thence along the centre of Gray's-inn-road to Guilford-street; thence along the centre of Guilford-street to Russell-square; thence along the east side of Russell-square to Woburn-place; thence along the centre of Woburn-place to the Euston-road; thence westward along the centre thereof to Tottenham Court-road; thence southward along the centre thereof, and of High-street, Great and Little Saint Andrew-streets, and Saint Martin's-lane, to Trafalgar-square, thence westward, including the said square, to Pall Mall, and along the centre thereof, and of Cleveland-row, to the boundary of the Green Park; thence along the boundary thereof, and of Saint James's Park (including Buckingham Palace and grounds), to Storey's Gate; thence along the centre of Great George-street and Bridge-street to the River Thames, on the north side of Westminster Bridge; and thence along the said river to the Temple Stairs aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December one thousand nine hundred and three constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Bow-street Police Court.

Clerkenwell Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point in Holborn where the boundary of the city of London coincides with the boundary of the division assigned to the Bow-street Police Court by this Order, along the last-mentioned boundary to Seymour-street; thence along the centres of Seymour-street, High-street Camden Town, Camden-road, Brecknock-road, and Dartmouth Park Hill to Chester-road; thence in a westerly direction along the centres of Chester-road and Swain's-lane to Highgate-road; thence northward along the centres of Highgate-road, West Hill and South-grove (West), to the boundary of the county of London at High-street, Highgate; thence eastward along the

said county boundary to Highgate Hill; thence southward along the centres of Highgate Hill, Holloway-road, Saint Paul's-road, Canonbury-road, New North-road, and Shepperton-road to the Regent's Canal at Rosemary Branch Bridge; thence along the centre of the said canal to Danbury-street Bridge; thence along the centres of Sudeley-street, and Nelson-terrace to the City-road, and across the City-road to Sidney-street; thence along the centre of Sidney-street to Goswell-road; thence southward along the centre of Goswell-road to the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street; and thence westward along the said boundary to the boundary of the Bow-street Division in Holborn aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Clerkenwell Police Court.

Worship Street Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street aforesaid, and thence eastward along the said boundary to Whitechapel High-street; thence in a line running eastward along the centres of Whitechapel High-street, Whitechapel-road and Mile End-road to Globe-road; thence along the centre of Globe-road to the southern side of the Great Eastern Railway; thence eastward along the same to the point where it crosses the boundary of the county of London; thence northward along the said boundary to the River Lea; thence down the said river to the mouth of the Hackney Cut; thence along the centre of the Hackney Cut to the Hertford Union Canal; thence along the centre of the said canal to Cadogan-terrace, Victoria Park; thence along the centre of Cadogan-terrace to Victoria Park-road; thence westward along the centres of Victoria Park-road, and Mare-street to the Regent's Canal at Cambridge Heath Bridge; thence westward along the centre of the said canal to Rosemary Branch Bridge; and thence along the boundary of the division assigned to the Clerkenwell Police Court by this Order to the boundary of the city of London at Fann-street aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Worship-street Police Court.

Thames Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the River Thames at Tower Stairs, in a line running along the boundary of the city of London to Whitechapel High-street; thence eastward along the boundary of the Division assigned by this Order to the Worship-street Police Court, to the boundary of the county of London; thence southward along the boundary last aforesaid to the River Thames; and thence along the said river to Tower Stairs aforesaid shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Thames Police Court.

North London Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby

ordered accordingly; that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say) from Rosemary Branch Bridge north-westward, along the eastern boundary of the Division assigned to the Clerkenwell Police Court by this Order, to the boundary of the county of London at Highgate Hill; thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary to Dickinson-road; thence along the said road, Elm-grove, Womersley-road, Dashwood-road and Ridge-road to the Great Northern Railway; thence in a straight line to the western end of Seymour-road; thence along the said road, Green Lanes, Saint Ann's-road and Stamford-hill to the western end of Bayley's-lane; thence eastward along the boundary of the county of London, and by the said boundary to the point below the southern extremity of the East London Waterworks reservoir, where it meets the boundary of the division assigned to the Worship-street Police Court by this Order, and thence northward and westward along the last-mentioned boundary to Rosemary Branch Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the North London Police Court.

Marlborough Street Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the Victoria Gate, Hyde Park, in a line running eastward along the boundary of the park to Oxford-street; thence along the said street (including both sides thereof) to Regent-street; thence northward along the centre thereof, and of Langham-place, Portland-place, and the eastern portion of Park-crescent to Euston-road; thence along the centre thereof to Tottenham Court-road; thence along the boundary of the Division assigned by this Order to Bow-street Police Court, as far as Hyde Park Corner; thence along the centre of Knightsbridge and Kensington Gore, and along the southern, western, and northern boundaries of Kensington-gardens and Kensington Palace to Victoria Gate aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Marlborough-street Police Court.

Marylebone Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the Victoria Gate, Hyde Park, in a line running eastward and northward along the boundaries of the divisions assigned by this Order to the Marlborough-street, Bow-street, and Clerkenwell Police Courts respectively, as far as Chester-road, in Dartmouth Park Hill; thence along Chester-road to Swain's-lane; thence along Swain's-lane to Highgate-road; thence along Highgate-road to the boundary of the county of London at High-street, Highgate; thence westward along the said boundary to the boundary of the parish and borough of Hampstead; thence southward along the said boundary to the Hampstead Junction Railway; and thence westward along the south side of the said railway to Hampstead Heath Station; thence along the east side of Southend-road to Pond-street, and along the south side of Pond-street, to Saint

Stephen's Church, Hampstead Green; thence along Lyndhurst-road, Fitzjohn's-avenue, Arkwright-road, Finchley-road, West End-lane, and Mill-lane, to the boundary of the county of London at Shootup-hill, Edgware-road; thence along Edgware-road to the Brondesbury Station of the Hampstead Junction Railway; thence along the southern side of that railway, to Salusbury-road; thence along Salusbury-road to the boundary of the county of London at Kilburn-lane; thence along the said boundary and Ladbroke-grove to the Uxbridge-road; thence eastward along the Uxbridge-road to the boundary of the division assigned by this Order to the Marlborough-street Police Court, and eastward along that boundary to Victoria Gate, Hyde Park aforesaid, shall from and after the thirty-first day of December one thousand nine hundred and three constitute a Police Court Division and be assigned to the Court called the Marylebone Police Court.

West London Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Hammersmith and Fulham, within the county of London, the parishes of Acton and Chiswick, within the county of Middlesex, and so much of the parish of Kensington as is included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point where the West London Extension Railway crosses the Fulham-road, northward along the boundaries of the parishes of Fulham and Hammersmith to the north-west corner of Kensal Green Cemetery, thence eastward along the Harrow-road to the boundary of the division assigned by this Order to the Marylebone Police Court, thence southward and eastward along the boundaries of the divisions assigned by this Order to the Marylebone and Marlborough-street Police Courts respectively to Queen's-gate, thence along Queen's-gate, Onslow-gardens, and Selwood-terrace to the Fulham-road, thence westward along the Fulham-road to the aforesaid point where the West London Railway crosses the said road shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the West London Police Court.

Westminster Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the River Thames on the south side of Westminster Bridge, in a line running westward along the boundary of the Division assigned to Bow-street Police Court by this Order, as far as Hyde Park Corner; thence along the centres of Knightsbridge-road, Kensington-road, and Kensington Gore, to Queen's Gate; thence southward along the boundary of the division assigned by this Order to the West London Police Court to Fulham-road; thence along the boundary of the parish of Chelsea to the River Thames; and thence along the River Thames to the point at which the parishes of Lambeth and Battersea meet on the right bank of the river; thence along the line dividing the parish of Lambeth from the parishes of Battersea and Clapham to the Clapham-road; thence eastward along Clapham-road, Kennington Park-road, Kennington-road, and Westminster Bridge-road to the south side of Westminster Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first

day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Westminster Police Court.

South Western Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Putney, Wandsworth, Battersea, Clapham, Tooting Graveney (sometimes called Tooting), the hamlet of Roehampton, the parish of Streatham (except so much thereof as lies immediately to the north of a line drawn along the centres of Streatham-place, Christchurch-road, and Thurlow Park-road, from the parish boundary of Clapham to the parish boundary of Camberwell) and also so much of the parish of Lambeth as lies to the south of the said line, all being within the Metropolitan Police District, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December one thousand nine hundred and three constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the South Western Police Court.

Lambeth Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the point where the Clapham-road crosses the eastern boundary of the parish of Clapham, along the line dividing Clapham and Lambeth parishes, and Clapham and Streatham parishes, to Streatham-place; thence eastward along the centres of Streatham-place, Christchurch-road, and Thurlow Park-road, to the western boundary of the parish of Camberwell; thence southward along the line dividing Lambeth and Camberwell parishes, to the point where such parishes cease to join each other; thence northward along the eastern boundary of the parish of Camberwell, to the Old Kent-road; thence along the centres of the Old Kent-road, New Kent-road, Saint George's-road, Westminster Bridge-road, Kennington-road, Kennington Park-road, and Clapham-road, to the boundary of the parish of Clapham aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Lambeth Police Court.

Southwark Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the space included within the following boundary, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District (that is to say), from the River Thames at Westminster Bridge, along the centre of Westminster Bridge-road, and the north-eastern boundary of the division assigned by this Order to the Lambeth Police Court, to the line which divides the parishes of Camberwell and Saint Paul, Deptford; thence northward along the said line to the boundary of the parish of Rotherhithe; thence along the said boundary to the River Thames; thence along the said river to Westminster Bridge aforesaid, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Southwark Police Court.

Greenwich Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Greenwich, Saint Nicholas Deptford, Saint Paul Deptford, Lewisham and Lee, the same being within

the Metropolitan Police District, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Greenwich Police Court.

Woolwich Police Court.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the parishes of Plumstead, Woolwich, Charlton, and Eltham, and the Liberty of Kidbrooke, the same being within the Metropolitan Police District, shall, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, constitute a Police Court Division, and be assigned to the Court called the Woolwich Police Court.

All Orders hereinbefore referred to as made under the said Acts, so far as they relate to the constitution and extent of the several Police Court Divisions affected by this Order, are hereby revoked as from the said thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three, on which day this Order shall come into force.

WHEREAS by the five hundred and eighty-second section of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-laws made under Part X of that Act, do all or any of the things specified in section five hundred and eighty-two:

And whereas by the five hundred and eighty-third section of the said Act it is provided that Bye-laws so made shall not take effect until they are submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Gloucester Pilotage Board, as the Pilotage Authority for that Port, have made and submitted for the consent of His Majesty certain Bye-laws, which proposed Bye-laws are set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, on the ninth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and three, to approve the said Bye-laws as *Provisional Rules* within the meaning of the Rules Publication Act, 1893.

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to approve and doth by this Order confirm the Bye-laws set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE REGULATION OF PILOTS AND PILOTAGE AT THE PORT OF GLOUCESTER.

1. Subject to the provisions contained in the twenty-fourth section of the Bristol Channel Pilotage Act 1861, no person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a Pilot unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a Bristol Channel Pilot of the Port of Gloucester, and being at least one year in the

oversea trade in square rigged sailing vessels, or shall have been engaged as Master in the coasting trade in the waters of the District for not less than five years; and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-three years or more than forty-five years of age.

2. Every candidate for Apprenticeship, before he can be considered eligible for the Pilot service, shall produce satisfactory testimonials as to character, and a surgeon's certificate that he is of sound health; he shall prove to the satisfaction of the Board that he is not less than fourteen or more than eighteen years of age, and that he has passed the standard of exemption for full time employment under the Elementary Education Acts. Having complied with these requirements, he may after a month's probation, on approval, be apprenticed to the Board for five years, and the Indenture of Apprenticeship, which shall be in a form approved by the Board, shall be signed by the Apprentice and his Guardian, and then be registered and kept at the Pilotage Office.

3. The Board shall cause to be endorsed on the back of every indenture a statement of time lost by the Apprentice, and of pecuniary losses which have been incurred by reason of the negligence or want of attention of the Apprentice, and such statement shall be signed by the Clerk of the Board and Apprentice on the respective dates, when such losses shall be charged against the Apprentice.

4. At the expiration of the five years' apprenticeship, the Apprentice shall appear before the Board with the Indenture, and the Board shall, after hearing the Pilot and the Apprentice and such other evidence as may be produced, decide as to the amount of time and money (if any) to be made good by the Apprentice before the Indenture shall be given to him, and such decision shall be finally binding on all parties. Whenever an Apprentice shall for the first time appear before the Examining Committee for examination for a licence to act as Pilot, his Indenture of Apprenticeship and all papers which the Committee shall think necessary shall be submitted for their inspection.

5. The Board shall have full power to enquire into the conduct of Pilots towards the Apprentices and vice versa, and to investigate all complaints made by Pilots against Apprentices, and also into the general conduct of Apprentices and Pilots and the Board shall have full power to make orders in respect of such complaints and conduct and to inflict fines and penalties in reference thereto. Also to withhold or cancel any Licence or Indenture.

6. When, in the opinion of the Board, it becomes necessary to license a Pilot, the first Apprentice on the rota who is eligible for examination shall receive due notice to attend the Committee for examination. If such Apprentice shall fail without reasonable cause to attend or shall fail in such examination he shall lose his first turn, and so on in rotation until all the Apprentices so eligible have been dealt with; but should any Apprentice fail in his examination he shall be allowed to take his turn when the next vacancy occurs, until he has had three chances, and after that the matter shall be left with the Board.

The Clerk shall keep a list of all Apprentices showing their respective service in the boats, together with a full record of their service, with a note when each Apprentice is out of his time, where he shall be subsequently engaged, and whether eligible for examination as Pilot.

7. No person shall be licensed to act as a Pilot in the District unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz.:

He must be able:—

- (1) To read and write.
- (2) To produce a Board of Trade Certificate as to colour-blindness.
- (3) To give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- (4) To state the rise, velocity, and set of the tides.
- (5) To state the depth and character of the soundings.
- (6) To describe the best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.
- (7) To describe the sand banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers.
- (8) To describe the landmarks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distances.
- (9) To describe the appearance of the different headlands.
- (10) To explain the management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor—unmoor—to get under weigh and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

8. As well as the general power conferred upon the Commissioners to grant or suspend licences the Pilotage Board shall also have power to grant the following licences to Pilots, according to experience and conduct, as follows:—

From the date of appointment and for 3 years ...	A licence to pilot vessels not exceeding 500 tons register.
To be called Junior Pilots	
After 3 years and up to 6 years ...	A licence to pilot vessels not exceeding 1,000 tons register.
To be called Senior Pilots	
After 6 years ...	A full licence.
To be called First-class Pilots ...	

The Board shall have power to withhold or suspend any such licence if they should be of opinion that any Pilot is not fully entitled to receive the same.

9. The Pilotage service shall be maintained by such number of Pilots and boats as the Board shall from time to time license, direct, and order; and the Pilots shall serve in such boats and in such manner, and the boats and Pilots shall, if deemed advisable by the Board for the more efficient working of the pilotage service, be divided into divisions or sections, or both, and placed at and ordered to cruise to and from stations and places within the limits of the Board, "the said limits being that portion of the Bristol Channel which lies eastward of Lundy Island, including the River Severn to the city of Gloucester, and the River Wye to Chepstow Bridge."

The stations shall for the present be as follows:—

No. 1.—The Sharpness Station, comprising the River Severn between to and from and including Sharpness and Portishead and the River Wye to Chepstow Bridge;

No. 2.—The Portishead Station, comprising the Bristol Channel between to and from and including Portishead and the Holmes;

No. 3.—The Holmes Station, comprising the Bristol Channel between to and from and including the Holmes to the Nash;

No. 4.—The Nash Station, comprising the Bristol Channel between to and from and including the Nash and Lundy;

with full power to alter or vary the same or the

turn of the Pilots or boats. No boat or vessel shall be used for the purposes of the Pilotage service unless it has been previously approved and licensed for that purpose by the Board. Care shall be taken that each Pilot shall have his regular and equal turn with the other Pilots for service, and shall take his turn in attending or being at the different stations within the limits aforesaid. No Pilot shall cruise outside the limits of the jurisdiction of the Board without the sanction of the Board in writing. For the convenience of the regulation of the service an Agent shall be appointed by the Board at Sharpness.

If a Pilot is prevented from joining the boat on the station selected for him, he shall join her as soon as possible, unless he has obtained leave of absence in writing from the Agent; and no Pilot on service whether on land or in a boat shall leave such service without permission from such Agent in writing, and if any Pilot shall refuse to work in the sections, or shall fail or neglect to take his place or turn for duty therein without reasonable excuse, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two pounds for the first offence and for the second or any subsequent offence to a like penalty or the suspension or revocation of his licence at the discretion of the Board. On his return to Sharpness at any time he shall report himself to the Agent. No Pilot shall be entitled to pursue his avocation as a Pilot without the sanction of the Board first obtained.

There shall be one indentured Apprentice on each boat.

10. Every Pilot shall, unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstance, carry on his duties as directed by the Agent acting under the authority of the Board, and shall also obey and execute all lawful orders given by the Board itself or through the Clerk of the Board, or the Agent at Sharpness, and shall also obey all lawful orders given by the Harbour Master at Sharpness relative to the docking, mooring or unmooring, towing, transporting, placing, or removing of vessels under his charge.

11. The Board may require each Pilot to provide himself with a good and efficient boat, which shall be approved and registered by the Board; and such boat shall be kept in good repair and fully equipped to the satisfaction of the Board and subject to periodical examinations by the Board. The Board may permit more than one Pilot to sail in the same boat upon such terms as the Board may order or approve. But such permission may at any time be withdrawn at the discretion of the Board. No Pilot shall be permitted to pursue his avocation of a Pilot without the sanction of the Board first obtained, unless he complies with the provisions of this Bye-law, and any Pilot acting in contravention hereof shall be subject to his licence being suspended or revoked, and to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, at the discretion of the Board.

There shall be one indentured apprentice on each boat.

12. Whenever a vessel inward bound shall take on board a Pilot whose class is below the registered tonnage of the vessel, the usual signal for a senior Pilot shall be kept flying, and as the vessel shall approach a Gloucester Pilot boat such signal shall be dipped twice and so on until answered, and if practicable the Pilot she has on board shall be exchanged for one of a class equal to the registered tonnage of such vessel from any boat she

may meet with whilst proceeding on her voyage to her destination, and the Pilot so taken shall return as speedily as possible to the boat in which he has lately been cruising.

13. No Junior Pilot shall take charge of a vessel going to sea above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless a senior Pilot cannot be obtained, notwithstanding that such junior Pilot may have brought the ship into Port; and no Pilot shall take charge of any ship above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless a senior Pilot cannot be obtained; but if no senior Pilot can be obtained and a junior Pilot has taken charge of any vessel he may be superseded by a senior Pilot between Kingroad and Lundy unless the Master of any such vessel shall desire to retain his services. But no junior Pilot is on any account to take charge of vessels above five hundred tons between Kingroad and Sharpness and *vice versa* if the services of a senior Pilot can be obtained.

14. Any Pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound to the Port to which he is licensed shall not leave that vessel or be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the Dock, Basin, or Harbour of such Port unless she is neaped, and the master does not require the Pilot's services, and it shall be his duty, if the vessel is bound to Sharpness, to communicate as soon possible with the Dock Master at Sharpness, and to give her draft and tonnage, and if any special orders are given him by such Harbour Master, to carry them out to the best of his power. But if in charge of a vessel bound to a Port to which he is not licensed he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is securely anchored in the nearest roadstead to the Port to which she is bound, and if outward bound to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged.

15. Each Pilot shall be furnished with and keep in his possession a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations, and he shall produce the same to the Master of any vessel or other person employing him when required to do so.

16. The Agent may appoint Pilots to attend the tide at Sharpness two hours before high water, (except in the case of night tides, when they shall have satisfied themselves that their services will not be required).

17. The last Pilot on turn in any section shall inform the first Pilot on turn in any other section when his services are likely to be required, and so on through the sections in rotation.

18. The Agent shall appoint such a number of Pilots as he may think best to the boats, and also regulate the working of the Pilots and boats of the sections and stations of the boats by the Pilots, and a discretionary power to vary the turn of the Pilots is given him, but the circumstances of the alteration shall be reported to the Board, who shall at all times have power to alter, vary or amend the same.

19. Should any Owner, or Master, or Agent apply for a Pilot to be sent over-land for the purpose of bringing a vessel to Sharpness, or any vessels in Bristol, Newport, Cardiff or any other Bristol Channel Port sending for a Pilot, he shall be served in such manner as the Agent may deem best. Any such person so applying shall give to such Agent the vessel's draft of water registered tonnage with such other information as may be required.

20. If any Pilot from the westward should be docking a vessel at Sharpness or Lydney, and it be considered necessary, such Pilot shall remain at Sharpness at the request of the Agent to take down any steamer or vessel towing to join his cutter to avoid expense of train fares, providing this will not seriously interfere with the arrangements made by the Pilot with his cutter (subject to Bye-law thirty-four). Pilots home from the westward shall, if necessary, supply Portishead, the Holmes boat drawing from Portishead when necessary.

21. Except as provided in Bye-laws twenty and thirty-four and the preceding Regulation, when a Pilot from the Holmes or Kingroad Stations docks a ship he shall, if possible, go back the same tide to his station.

22. Pilots having vessels neaped in Kingroad and coming home are to get a passage up to Sharpness if possible, provided that if there is no sign of a passage up, when the last railway train for Sharpness is due to leave, they shall be at liberty to return by train.

23. Pilots going down to Kingroad with vessels shall in all cases, if possible, get a passage up to Sharpness, provided that if there is no sign of a passage up when the last railway train for Sharpness is due to leave they shall be at liberty to return by train.

24. The Pilot in charge of the Holmes boat shall be responsible for keeping her to the westward of Portishead.

25. Any Pilot docking a vessel, and not returning to his Station, must report himself to the Agent as soon as possible.

26. The first first-class Pilot on duty at Sharpness, and disengaged, shall attend on the pier when vessels are docking to see that arrangements are made when necessary for Pilots docking to return to their respective Stations, and to secure the return of such Pilots whenever possible; such first-class Pilot to act in consultation with the Agent.

27. If any Pilot shall work out of his section or Station, or being one of the section off duty, shall seek to obtain employment out of his turn, he shall not be entitled to any advantage gained thereby, but any pilotage monies, both inwards or outwards, thus improperly earned shall be forfeited, and the Board shall award such pilotage monies to the Pilots who, in their judgment, would in the ordinary course have been entitled thereto, or in case no other Pilot has any claim to such pilotage monies, the Board may, if they think fit, direct that the whole or some part of such pilotage monies shall be added to the monies received for pilotage during that time.

28. Every Master, Owner or Agent of a vessel navigating within the limits of this pilotage district, who shall knowingly employ or continue to employ an unqualified Pilot after a qualified Pilot has offered to take charge of a vessel or has made a signal for that purpose, shall for every case incur a penalty of double the amount of the pilotage demandable for the piloting of the vessel to her port of destination or the limits of the pilotage district.

29. If any vessel whilst in charge of a Pilot does or receives damage, the Pilot shall immediately report the same to the Board's Agent at Sharpness, who shall at once report the same to

the Clerk of the Board, who shall submit the same to the Board at their next meeting or any special meeting that may be called. The circumstances of the accident shall be investigated by the Board, if deemed necessary, and the Board may fine the pilot or suspend or revoke his licence, or deal with the same in such a way as they may deem best.

30. A survey of the low water channel of the River Severn between Kingroad and Sharpness shall be made at low water once a month at least, by one or more Pilots as directed by the Board, who shall report to the Board any changes which may have taken place in the navigable channel.

31. No Pilot shall have or hold directly or indirectly any share or interest in any steam tug Company, or in any steam vessel used regularly or occasionally for towing vessels.

32. The Board shall be paid for the services of any Pilot taking charge of a vessel not bound to the Port to which he is licensed, and the Pilot shall be governed by the laws established at the Port to which the vessel is bound.

33. The fee on granting a licence to a Pilot shall be two pounds two shillings for a Gloucester Pilot, and one pound one shilling for a Lydney Pilot; and the licences of Pilots shall be renewed at the discretion of the Board annually in January. The renewal fee for a Gloucester licence being one pound one shilling, and for a Lydney licence ten shillings and six pence.

34. Pilots bringing up colliers and other vessels which are expected to leave the next tide or next tide but one shall remain to take them down.

35. Should a Pilot be sick and unable to follow his calling he shall at once report the same in writing to the Agent, and if the illness shall continue beyond seven days he shall obtain a medical certificate, and the matter shall be reported to the Board, who shall deal with the same in such a manner as they may deem best.

36. The first first class Pilot in any boat on turn for boarding vessels shall be responsible for the proper working and navigating of the same, and shall maintain order and discipline and keep the log and forward same to Agent. In the absence of a first-class Pilot the next class of Pilot shall be responsible for this duty.

37. Each boat and each Pilot shall return to Sharpness and shall have a week at home in rotation, as may be directed by the Board from time to time.

38. Each boat in the pilotage service shall be painted black and tarred on the outside, and shall have its number and the words "Gloucester Pilots" painted in white on the stern in letters at least one inch broad and three inches long, and shall also have the letters G.S. marked in black paint of not less than three feet in length on her mainsail, and shall by day carry at her masthead a flag of not less than four feet by three feet of two colours, the upper horizontal half white and the lower part red; and at night each pilot boat shall carry a white light only at the masthead, and shall exhibit three flare ups in succession at short intervals which shall never exceed 15 minutes and such other lights as are prescribed by the Board of Trade regulations for the prevention of collisions at sea applicable to pilot boats.

39. Every pilot shall, immediately on boarding any vessel and taking charge thereof, cause to be

hoisted a similar flag to the one prescribed in some conspicuous place, and keep the same flying during the time he so remains in charge. In case of default in any of the above requirements the Pilot to be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every breach thereof.

40. Whenever any qualified Pilot is carried off in a boat or ship not in the pilotage service he shall exhibit a flag of the above description in order to show that such boat or ship has a qualified Pilot on board, and if he fails to do so without any reasonable excuse he shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

41. Any Pilot missing his boat when down Channel may get back the best way he can, but he shall not speak any vessel to be employed as a Pilot, and he shall not board any vessel for the purpose of piloting her unless such vessel has hoisted the signal flag by day, or exhibited and recognized light signals by night, for a Pilot within the limits of his licence.

42. Every Master, Owner, or Agent of a vessel who may engage, employ, or signal for a Pilot to pilot such vessel to or from the Port of Gloucester, shall pay to the Board the dues payable for pilotage according to the registered tonnage of the vessel and to the schedule hereto, and the same shall be collected by the Board's Agent at Sharpness.

43. Every Pilot shall before leaving any vessel piloted by him, obtain from the Master or person in charge of such vessel a certificate of pilotage services rendered in the form provided by the Board for that purpose, and signed by that Master or person, and shall without any delay deliver to the Agent at Sharpness all such certificates of pilotage.

44. In lieu of the dues charged in the schedule to the said bye-laws, and referred to in Bye-law Number 42, the following reduced rates shall be paid by Masters of Vessels from Kingroad to Sharpness or Lydney for all vessels coming light to Sharpness or Lydney *bonâ fide* for coal, and for all such vessels laden with coal from Sharpness or Lydney to Kingroad, subject to a reduction of one-fifth in the case of vessels towed or propelled by steam.

45. All vessels piloted to Chepstow or to Lydney shall pay the same pilotage dues as to Sharpness and *vice versa*.

46. Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney or from Lydney to Sharpness and then to Kingroad shall pay the same rates as between Sharpness and Kingroad.

47. Vessels piloted to or from any place in the River Severn above Sharpness shall pay one-fourth more than the dues between Sharpness and Kingroad.

48. Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney or *vice versa* and then to Kingroad shall pay the same dues as between Sharpness and Kingroad, and the proportion of such pilotage dues shall be one-third as between Sharpness and Lydney, and two-thirds as between Lydney and Kingroad.

49. All vessels bound to Lydney or Sharpness or to any place in the River Severn above Sharpness, requiring and having the service of a Pilot, shall also employ on board as assistants to the Pilots from Kingroad the following number of men at the undermentioned charge, except in the case of vessels going to Northwick to lighten, when the charge shall be seven shillings and six pence per man as between Kingroad and Northwick, and seven shillings and six pence per man as between Northwick and Sharpness.

50. For the purpose of the Schedule the pilotage dues are assessed for steam vessels and sailing vessels towed by steam power between Kingroad and Sharpness and *vice versa*; but if any of the vessels are not towed or propelled by steam, then the pilotage rate between Kingroad and Sharpness, and *vice versa*, shall be one-fourth more than charged in the Schedule.

51. The same pilotage dues shall be paid for Pilots taken on board by Masters of vessels inward bound to the westward of Ilfracombe as from Lundy, if between the Nash Point and Ilfracombe, the same rates as from the Nash Point, if between the Nash Point and the Holmes, the same rates as from the Nash Point, and if between the Holmes and Kingroad the same rates as from the Holmes.

52. The same pilotage dues shall be paid in respect of any Pilot discharged from any vessel on the outward voyage between any of the stages mentioned in the above scale of dues as if he had been taken to the next stage beyond the place where he was discharged.

53. The sum of ten shillings a day for every day or part of a day a Pilot shall be employed shall be paid for any Pilot who may be required to remain on board any vessel for the convenience of the Master, Owner, or Agent of the vessel after he shall have discharged the duties for which he was engaged; and the following sums shall be paid for the employment of any Pilot

who shall be required to move any vessel in a Dock, Roadstead, Harbour, or River, or be employed to pilot any vessel for adjusting compasses or any other purpose, for every tide or part of a tide so employed: and the same shall be added to the pilotage rates, and be recoverable as such under the powers contained in section five hundred and ninety-one of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894:—

54. The sum of ten shillings a day or part of a day for each day's or part of a day's detention shall be paid in addition to the pilotage rates for the services of any Pilot who shall be detained in any roadstead by want of water, stress of weather, accident, or at the request of the Master, Owner, or Agents of the vessel either homeward bound or outward bound. Also in case any vessel shall be compelled to bear up from stress of weather or accident one-third of the pilotage dues in addition shall be paid to the Board for the services of the Pilot who shall be in charge, according to the distance such vessel may have reached before she shall have put back.

55. Every Master, Owner, or Agent of a vessel employing a Pilot shall in addition to the foregoing charges pay a Clerk's or Collector's fee as follows:—

56. The pilotage dues shall be collected by the Agent at Sharpness, and if any number of Pilots not being less than three-fourths of the total number of licensed Pilots agree to a scheme of working having for its object the ownership of boats, or the pooling of earnings for division among themselves, the Board may (if they approve of the scheme) authorize the Agent to carry out the same as far as the same may be practicable, and otherwise enforce the provisions of such scheme as between the Pilots who have assented thereto.

57. If any Pilot shall object to work under any scheme or system of working which (with the sanction of the Board) may for the time being be in force amongst Pilots, having for its object the ownership of boats or the pooling of their earnings for division amongst themselves, such Pilot shall be at liberty to so object, but he shall nevertheless take his place and turn for duty with the other Pilots in the Divisions, Sections, and

Stations set out in these Bye-laws, and shall in all other respects conform to and abide by the Bye-laws of the Board.

58. If any Pilot shall receive any pilotage dues without duly accounting for the same he shall be liable to be dealt with summarily, and his licence forfeited in the discretion of the Board. The Pilots shall also make a return to the Board of all cases where vessels bound to or from Gloucester have been piloted over any and what portion of the District by a Pilot not licensed for the Port, and a list shall also be forwarded of all vessels piloted by them to or from other Ports. Pilots making a false return shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for the first offence, and the suspension or loss of his licence for any subsequent offence, or such other punishment as the Pilotage Board may think necessary.

59. The carrying out of the Bye-laws or other regulations or orders of the Board shall be under the superintendence of the Agent of the Board at Sharpness, or the Clerk who shall act under the direction of the Board.

60. Every Pilot found guilty of neglecting his duty, failing to take his turn in piloting vessels without due or sufficient cause, acting in a disorderly manner, or of drunkenness, insolent or unwarrantable conduct, or who goes overland to take charge of any vessel, or seeks employment without instructions from the Agent, or refuses to obey the orders of the Harbour Master, Agent of the Board, or offends against any of the foregoing Bye-laws, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, be reduced in rank, or suspended from his office of a Pilot, or have his licence cancelled, and the Commissioners are hereby empowered to cancel his licence accordingly.

61. All disputes between Pilots shall be settled by the Board, whose decision shall be final.

62. All fines to be imposed may (after all expenses connected with any enquiry by the Board have been paid thereout), by order of the Board, be deducted by the Agent from the individual share of the earnings of the offending Pilot, and shall be applied to the Pilotage Fund or to such other purpose as the Board in their absolute discretion shall determine.

63. Although a scheme of pensions has been generally adopted, yet the Board shall have full power to alter, amend or vary the same, and deal generally with all applications made by Pilots for pensions.

64. The preceding Bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of the Order of His Majesty in Council confirming the same, from which date all Bye-laws previously made by the Gloucester Pilotage Board for the government of Pilots in the Gloucester Pilotage District shall be repealed and cease to be in force.

For vessels coming light to Sharpness or Lydney *bonâ fide* for Coal reduced rates are chargeable between Kingroad and Sharpness and Lydney. See Bye-law 44.

WHEREAS by the five hundred and eighty-second section of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-laws made under Part X of that Act, do all or any of the things specified in section five hundred and eighty-two:

And whereas by the five hundred and eighty-third section of this Act it is provided that Bye-laws so made shall not take effect until they are submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Commissioners for improving the Port and Harbour of Burntisland as the Pilotage Authority for that Port have made and submitted for the consent of His Majesty the proposed Bye-laws set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and doth by this Order confirm the Bye-laws set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE. Regulations.

I. All Pilots to be licensed for the Harbour of Burntisland, and all others concerned shall in every respect observe and be subject and liable to these and such other Bye-laws and Regulations as the said Commissioners may from time to time appoint, and also the provisions of that portion of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," which relates to Pilotage in so far as incumbent on them.

II. No Ship Master or other person shall be bound to employ a Pilot either inwards or outwards.

III. No person shall pilot, or take charge of any vessel as Pilot, or keep a boat for that purpose, without a Licence; and every person found so doing shall be prosecuted, and will be liable to be fined in Five Pounds sterling; but Masters and Mates of vessels will, on being found qualified, obtain Licences to pilot their own vessels, which will be in force for one year, and renewable annually by endorsement thereon.

IV. Every person applying to be licensed as a Harbour Pilot must be able to read and write, and must set forth in his application his usual place of abode, his age, height, complexion, and any other circumstances or peculiarity descriptive of his person, and produce a satisfactory certificate of moral character, and must be examined and be found skilful and qualified to act as Pilot for the Harbour.

V. The Harbour Pilots to have a sufficient number of boats satisfactory to the Commissioners or Harbour Master, with Burntisland Pilots marked in large white letters on bow.

VI. Harbour Pilots must always be in readiness with a boat approved of, and licensed, and manned, and must take charge of any vessel when required, and attend exclusively on the vessel they have charge of, and on no account whatever go to any other while so engaged, unless in cases of great necessity; bad weather,

or extreme danger, and then only with the consent of the captain on whose vessel they are attending.

VII. No Harbour Pilot already licensed shall (unless he holds a Leith Trinity House Firth Pilot's Licence) proceed in search of vessels, or go on board thereof, with a view to Harbour Pilotage, at any place beyond a distance of one mile and a half from the Pier Heads of the Harbour; and no Firth Pilot shall be entitled to go on board of a vessel bound for Burntisland Harbour at any place within these limits, unless required to do so for the purpose of Pilotage in the Firth, at the full fees payable for that service.

VIII. Firth Pilots, not licensed for the Harbour, when approaching the Harbour Pilots' limits are directed by the Commissioners to require the vessels of which they are Pilots (if bound for Burntisland Harbour) to display and keep flying the usual signal for a Pilot; and if a Harbour Pilot is within hail, or is approaching and within half-a-mile, such Firth Pilots are by heaving to in proper time, or shortening sail, or by any practicable means consistent with safety to facilitate the Harbour Pilots getting on board. If no Harbour Pilot appear, Firth Pilots may continue in charge of vessels until they reach Burntisland Roads, but on no pretence are Firth Pilots, not licensed for the Harbour, to be at liberty to bring vessels into the Harbour (extreme cases of necessity alone excepted).

IX. When a vessel is bound to Burntisland Roads for orders, any Firth Pilot is entitled to pilot her into the Roads, and to stay by her as Pilot, if required by the Master, until the orders are obtained; but if the vessel is ordered to the Harbour the Firth Pilot, if not licensed for the Harbour, is immediately thereafter to cease to act as Pilot.

X. Inward vessels waiting for the tide shall be so placed as to be ready to come in immediately on the proper signal being made, and the duty of the Pilot and his Assistants shall not be fully discharged until the vessel is moored where the Harbour Master may direct at the tide or time she enters.

XI. The Rates of Pilotage payable are those specified in the annexed Table, and the inward Pilotage shall be paid by the Owners, Masters, Consignees, or Agents of the vessel piloted, to the Collector of the Harbour dues, and to no other person, for behoof of the Pilots. The Master of every vessel shall sign and deliver to the Pilot a certificate stating the number of feet of water which his vessel draws, and her tonnage, and whether she was towed by a steamer; and no Pilot shall ask or take payment for inward or outward Piloting otherwise than through the Collector of Harbour Dues.

XII. Masters and Mates licensed for their own vessels shall pay a fee of *ten shillings and sixpence* for their licence, and *five shillings* for every renewal thereof; other Pilots shall pay a fee of *ten shillings and sixpence* for their licence, and these fees shall be applied by the Commissioners to cover expenses incurred in connection therewith.

XIII. All fees for harbour pilotage shall be paid over by the Harbour Dues Collector to the licensed Pilots, subject to deduction of five per cent. to cover expenses of collection.

XIV. Pilots are required to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the signals of the Harbour, and the Bye-laws and Regulations, and also frequently to inspect the entrance of the Harbour, and the Harbour itself, at low water spring tides, especially after storms or land floods; and when, through ignorance, negligence,

or otherwise, they permit vessels to run aground, they will be prosecuted in terms of law, and held responsible for damage caused to any of the Harbour works, dredging plant, or other property.

XV. The Harbour Master has power to give directions to Pilots, and order them to take charge of any vessel when wanted, and also from time to time to inspect the boats and crews and see that the Pilots do their duty and observe the Regulations.

XVI. All Pilots licensed by the Commissioners must observe strict sobriety and civility in the discharge of their duties, and when a Pilot shall fail to observe, or shall commit any breach of the Regulations, or shall discharge his duties insufficiently, or shall use improper language to any of the Commissioners' Officers while in the discharge of their duties, the Commissioners shall punish such offender by exacting a fine, or by temporary suspension or permanent deprivation of Licence; and persons having cause of complaint against the Pilots are requested to communicate the same in writing to the Harbour Master.

XVII. And it is further enacted, that Ship Masters will apply at least four hours before high water at the Harbour Master's Office for Pilots previous to sailing.

XVIII. And a sufficient number of Pilots, as the Harbour Master may direct, shall be in attendance at the Harbour Office at such time as he may direct.

XIX. All numbers, whether of money, or of tonnage of vessels, &c., shall be stated by Masters of vessels and others in words and not in figures.

XX. In addition to the qualifications of Pilots licensed for the Harbour of Burntisland contained in Article four of the Bye-laws, dated fourth July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, the Commissioners hereby enact that no person shall be licensed to act as a Pilot before he has attained the age of twenty-two years, and has been for the space of five years or more actually engaged and actively employed as a seafaring man, and during that space of time has sailed for three years or longer in a square-rigged vessel. Every Candidate must be free from colour-blindness, and he must have experience in relation to the navigating, piloting, and conducting of vessels, including knowledge of the Regulations for preventing collisions at sea. He must be able to give a correct and seamanlike description of the Firth of Forth, and the Harbour of Burntisland, and Entrance Channels leading thereto, and the Dock and Piers thereat, and the course and distance from any one place to another within the limits of the Commissioners' Pilotage District. He must be able to navigate and pilot any vessel from and to the said Firth of Forth to and from the said Harbour of Burntisland, Entrance Channels leading thereto, the said Docks and Piers thereat, and into, from, and throughout any part of the said Pilotage District. He must be familiar with the rise and set of the tides, the depth and character of the soundings, the best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide, the sandbanks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers, and the landmarks, buoys, lights, and signals. He must understand how to bring a vessel to anchor, to keep a clear anchor, to moor and unmoor and to get under way in all situations, and also know the complete management of a vessel in bad weather in bad channels, and where necessary he must be able to set off a ship's situation or actual place on the chart.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to the Board of Trade, on or before the 23rd day of December next, by the Godalming Gas Light and Coke Company Limited (hereinafter called "the Company") for a Provisional Order under the Gas and Waterworks Facilities Act, 1870, for the purposes or some of the purposes following (that is to say):—

1. To extend the existing limits within which the Company are authorized to supply gas under the authority of the Godalming Gas Order, 1878,

(Extending and Defining Limits of Port of London and Jurisdiction and Powers of Thames Conservators; Imposing Rates on Goods Imported into Port of London; Provisions for Collection and Recovery of such Rates, Penalties, Apportionment of Rates between London and India, Surrey Commercial and Millwall Dock Companies and Conservators; Powers to Commissioners of Customs and Provisions as to Accounts and Inspection thereof and of Books of said Commissioners and Registers of Vessels and as to Recovery of Rates from said Commissioners; Provisions as to Fixing and Regulation of Rates; Power to said Dock Companies to Levy Rates, &c., in respect of Lighters, Barges, &c., and repeal of Exemptions relating to and to Ballast and Goods discharged or received from and by Lighters and Barges, and provisions as to Ascertainment and Recovery of such Rates and as to Services to be performed by Dock Companies in relation to Barges and Lighters; Alteration and Assimilation of Tonnage Rates and Rents, and fixing and Regulation of certain Rates on Goods leviable by and Provisions as to Charges for Services performed by said Dock Companies; Imposing Obligations on said Dock Companies with respect to Improvements of Docks, &c.; Powers to Board of Trade to require such Improvements and control Expenditure of said Dock Companies; Limitation of Dividends on and Provisions with respect to Issue and Disposal of Capital of said Dock Companies with respect to formation of Reserve Funds by and Application of Income of such Companies; Extension of Dredging and other Powers of Conservators; Power to Board of Trade to require Conservators to exercise Powers and execute Works and imposing other obligations on Conservators; Power to Board of Trade to increase Number of Conservators; Power to Board of Trade and Commissioners of Woods to Transfer Land and to Conservators to Purchase Land and to Borrow Money and apply Funds; Provisions with respect to Securities of and Keeping of Accounts and Application of Surplus Income of Conservators; Provision as to Payment of Costs of Bill by Dock Companies and Conservators or out of Rates and Application of Funds by those bodies; Agreements between Conservators and Dock Companies; Amendment and Repeal of Acts, &c., &c.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session for leave to bring in a Bill for effecting the purposes or some of the purposes following (that is to say):—

To define and prescribe the limits of the Port of London to which the Bill will relate so as to include all or any portion of the River Thames between Teddington Lock and a line drawn from the pilot mark at the entrance of Havengore Creek in the county of Essex to the land's end at Warden Point in the Isle of Sheppey in the county of Kent and all islands, rivers, streams, creeks, waters, watercourses, channels, harbours, docks and places within the before-mentioned limits and the whole or any part of any area which for the time being is under any Act to be deemed to form part of the Port of London, and to extend the limits

of the Port of London for the purposes of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and if thought fit to alter and amend the definition of "the Thames" in section 3 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and extend the limits of the jurisdiction of the Conservators of the River Thames (hereinafter called "the Conservators") for all or such purposes as the Bill may define over the River Thames so as to embrace all or any portion of the area of the Port of London as so defined (hereinafter referred to as "the Port of London").

To impose rates, dues and charges (hereinafter referred to as "goods rates") upon animals, goods, articles, merchandise and things (hereinafter referred to as and included in the expression "goods") imported into the Port of London from parts beyond the seas (including goods from such parts transhipped at any other port in the United Kingdom and thence imported into the Port of London) other than (1) goods on any vessel passing through any part of the Port of London on a voyage solely between places situate on the River Medway or the River Swale and not within the Port of London and any other places not within that port; (2) goods to be transhipped directly from one ship to another for immediate conveyance by the latter ship to some other port and which are the subject of a through bill of lading to such other port; (3) and such other descriptions of goods as may be specially exempted under the provisions of the Bill and to make provision for the collection and recovery of such rates, dues and charges by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs or by such other body or persons as the Bill may prescribe, and to confer upon the said Commissioners or other the body or persons so prescribed and their officers and servants (hereinafter referred to as and included in the expression "the collecting authority") all necessary powers in that behalf and to make provisions for securing the payment of such goods rates and the giving of information by masters and owners of vessels and owners and consignees of goods and others and to impose penalties on persons evading or aiding or abetting in the evasion of payment of goods rates or otherwise failing to comply with the provisions of the Bill.

To make provision for the payment of the cost of the collection of the goods rates to be imposed as aforesaid and for the payment (after deducting such costs) to the London and India Docks Company, the Surrey Commercial Dock Company and the Millwall Dock Company (hereinafter called "the Dock Companies") respectively of the goods rates levied in respect of goods landed, discharged or unshipped in or at their respective docks, canals, basins, locks, cuts and entrances, quays, piers or other works and to the Conservators of the goods rates levied in respect of goods not so landed, discharged or unshipped or otherwise to provide for the application of the sums received in respect of such goods rates and for the allocation and apportionment thereof to and between the respective Dock Companies and the Conservators, or if thought fit to confer powers upon the Dock Companies and the Conservators, or any of them, of themselves collecting and recovering such goods rates or any of them.

To make all necessary provision for ascertaining the amount of goods rates due to any of the Dock Companies and to the Conservators, and for the recovery of the same by them respectively

from the collecting authority, and for the keeping by the collecting authority and inspection by the Dock Companies and the Conservators of books and accounts of such rates, and for the rendering to the Dock Companies and the Conservators of copies of such accounts, and for the audit of such accounts, and for the settlement of any disputes with reference thereto, and the inspection by any such Companies or the Conservators of any books or accounts of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and registers of vessels.

To prescribe or provide for the fixing and regulation of the amount of the rates and dues to be imposed as aforesaid from time to time.

To empower the Dock Companies or any of them, notwithstanding any provisions contained in any Act or Acts relating to them or to their Undertakings respectively, and especially the provisions of the following Local and Personal Acts (that is to say): 9 George IV, cap. 95; 1 and 2 William IV, cap. 52; 27 Vict. cap. 31; 27 and 28 Vict., caps. 178 and 255, and 45 and 46 Vict., cap. 90, conferring any exemption, whether absolute, partial or conditional, from payment of rates, tolls or charges in respect of lighters, barges or other craft (hereinafter called "craft") entering into or being in any dock, canal, basin, lock, cut or entrance of any of the Dock Companies, or conferring any exemption from the payment of rates or charges in respect of ballast or goods discharged or received into or from or being upon such craft, to demand, take and recover in respect of any craft entering such dock, canal, basin, lock, cut or entrance, such rates, tolls and charges as the Company think fit, or as may be prescribed or provided for by the Bill, and to make all necessary provision for the ascertainment of the rates, tolls or charges payable in respect of any such craft, and for the recovery of such rates, tolls and charges, and if thought fit to confer exemptions from the payment of such rates, tolls and charges, and to make provision with respect to the services to be performed and facilities to be afforded by the Dock Companies to craft entering or leaving their respective docks, canals, basins, locks, cuts or entrances, and to impose upon such Companies, or any of them, such obligations with respect thereto as the Bill may define.

To alter, assimilate and fix the maximum tonnage rates and rents or any of such rates or rents on vessels entering, leaving or using the docks, canals, basins, locks, cuts or entrances of the Dock Companies, or any of them or lying therein or departing therefrom or docked or undocked therein, and so far as may be necessary in that behalf to increase or reduce any of such rates or rents, and to provide so far as may be necessary for the fixing and regulation, subject to such control or authority (if any) as may be provided by the Bill, of any rates and charges not now subject to any fixed statutory maximum, and which such Companies may respectively demand and take on goods brought into, shipped, unshipped, transhipped, landed, received or delivered at from or on, or deposited within their docks, canals, basins, locks, cuts, entrances, quays piers or works, and especially those leviable by the London and India Docks Company at the East India Docks and the West India Docks (including the South West India Dock) and the works connected therewith respectively, and those leviable by the Millwall Dock Company, and to make provision if thought fit for the settlement by the Railway and Canal Commission

or such other authority as the Bill may prescribe of any dispute as to the charges to be made in respect of services performed by the Dock Companies or any of them.

To alter existing tolls, rates, dues and charges, and to confer, vary and extinguish exemptions from the payment thereof and of the goods rates and other rates, tolls and charges proposed to be authorized by the Bill.

To impose upon the Dock Companies or any of them (and especially upon the London and India Docks Company) such obligations with respect to the improvement of their respective docks and dock accommodation as the Bill may prescribe, and if thought fit to confer upon the Board of Trade or such other authority as the Bill may define, powers to require the execution of and to control expenditure on such improvements and to veto and control the expenditure of money by any of the Dock Companies on or for the purposes of their respective Undertakings, subject to such exceptions, conditions and stipulations as may be provided for under or prescribed by the Bill.

To limit the dividends to be paid upon the ordinary shares and stocks in the capital of the Dock Companies, or any of them, and the maximum dividends to be paid in respect of any further capital to be issued by such Companies, or any of them, and to provide if thought fit that any such further capital shall be offered to the public by auction or tender, or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the Bill may prescribe or provide for, and to make provision for the formation of reserve funds by such Companies or any of them for the equalization of dividends and for providing for dock extensions and equipment or for such other purposes as the Bill may prescribe, and to regulate the application of the income of the Dock Companies or any of them and to prescribe the purposes for which and the manner in which any surplus income (after payment of the dividends limited as aforesaid) shall be applied, and if thought fit to provide for the application thereof in forming such reserve funds, and in the improvement of the docks and works of the said Companies respectively and the reduction, and extinguishment of any moneys borrowed by or debenture stocks of such Companies and in such other manner as may be thought fit.

To extend and enlarge the powers of the Conservators with regard to the borrowing and re-borrowing of money, and to authorize and if need be require them to borrow further moneys and to create and issue debentures and grant mortgages and annuities upon the security of the lower navigation fund, and the sums receivable by them in respect of goods rates or either of them and any other funds, rates, property and revenue of the Conservators as may be prescribed by the Bill, and to make provision for the payment of interest on and repayment of moneys borrowed or the redemption and extinguishment of stock or annuities issued or granted to them, and for the keeping of separate accounts of any moneys received by the Conservators in respect of goods rates and to provide for the application of such moneys, and if thought fit for the appropriation of any surplus of such moneys in or towards the improvement and maintenance of the navigation of the River Thames and of the estuary thereof, whether within or beyond the Port of London, and the reduction of the duties of tonnage which by the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, the Conservators are authorized to levy in respect of vessels, or in such other manner as the Bill may prescribe.

To make provision for the payment of the costs of preparing, applying for and obtaining the said Bill and the carrying the same into execution by the Dock Companies and the Conservators or any of them or out of the goods rates to be levied under the Bill, and to authorize and require the Dock Companies and the Conservators to apply their funds and any money from time to time belonging to them or which they have or may obtain power to raise to or for such purposes or any of the purposes of the Bill, and if and so far as may be thought expedient to require the collecting authority to reimburse out of such goods rates any sums so paid.

To empower the Conservators and the Dock Companies or any one or more of them to enter into agreements for the improvement or otherwise in relation to the Undertakings respectively belonging to or under their control, and the execution of all or any of the powers of the Bill, and to sanction and confirm any agreements

which may have been or may be entered into in that behalf.

To repeal, vary and amend the provisions or some of the provisions of the following Local and Personal Acts (that is to say):—9 George IV, cap. 95; 1 and 2 William IV, cap. 52; 27 Vict., cap. 31; 27 and 28 Vict., caps. 178 and 255; 45 and 46 Vict., cap. 90; or any other Act or Acts relating to the Dock Companies or any of them, or the Undertakings respectively belonging to them, the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Conservators.

The Bill will vary and extinguish all rights and privileges which may interfere with or may be inconsistent with any of its objects, and will confer such other rights and privileges as may be expedient for the purpose of carrying those objects into effect.

Printed copies of the Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons on or before the 17th day of December next.

(b) To provide trucks, wagons and rolling stock required for the purposes of such traffic, and to forward the trucks, wagons and rolling stock of the Company over the railways belonging or leased to or worked, run over or used by them respectively, on such terms and conditions as to payment for or allowance in respect of the same or as to the apportionment of any rates charged by such Companies in respect of traffic conveyed therein as the Bill may define.

(c) To afford all such other facilities and accommodation as may ensure the due and expeditious forwarding at through rates, tolls and charges of traffic from and to the docks, quays, warehouses, wharves or other works of the Company by means of the railways and sidings of the Company, and the railways

of or leased to, worked, run over or used by such Railway Companies, or any of them.

To empower the Company, and if and so far as may be thought fit, any Company running over or using the railways and sidings for the time being belonging to the Company to demand, take and recover tolls, rates and charges in respect of such railways and sidings, and to alter existing tolls, rates and charges, and confer, vary and extinguish exemptions therefrom.

To alter and amend the provisions of the agreement made in the year 1864 between the London Dock Company, the St. Katharine Dock Company and the Victoria (London) Dock Company of the one part, and the London and North Western Railway Company, the Great Eastern Railway Company and the Great Northern Railway Company of the other part, so far as may be necessary, to provide that for the purposes of that agreement the exchange sidings hereinbefore referred to at or near the Tidal Basin Station at the Victoria Dock shall, as regards traffic worked by the Company by way of the north side of that dock, be deemed to be the point of junction with the railways belonging to the Company as successors of the said Dock Companies.

To provide for the extension and application of all or any of the aforesaid powers and provisions to any Railway Company which may in future be authorized to construct or maintain, work, lease, run over or use any railway leading or forming access from or to any dock, railway, siding or other works of the Company, and to the railways of or leased to, worked, run over or used by such Railway Company, and to any railways or sidings which may be laid down by the Company in connection therewith and to the Company in relation thereto.

To extend the period limited by the London and India Docks Company (New Works) Act, 1901, for the completion of the works authorized by that Act as amended by the London and India Docks Company (Various) Powers Act, 1902, and the periods respectively limited by those Acts for the compulsory purchase of (1) the lands required for the purposes of such works, and (2) the lands (a), (b), (c) and (d) which the Company are by section 4 of the last-named Act authorized to acquire, and to authorize the Company to pay out of their capital or any of their funds from time to time interest or dividends on any shares, stock, debenture stock, debentures or mortgages raised for or the proceeds of which are or may be applied in the purchase of such lands and the construction of such works, and also to apply to any of the purposes of the Bill their corporate funds and revenues, and any other moneys under their control.

To alter, amend, extend or repeal the provisions or some of the provisions of the London and India Docks (Amalgamation) Act, 1900; the London and St. Katharine Docks Act, 1864; the London and St. Katharine Docks Act, 1882; 9 George IV, cap. 95; 1 and 2 William IV, cap. 52; and any other Act or Acts relating to the Company or their Undertaking; the 25 and 26 Vict., cap. 223; the London and Blackwall Railway Act, 1860; the London and Blackwall Railway Lease Act, 1865; the London, Blackwall and Millwall Extension Railway Act, 1865; the London and Blackwall Railway Act, 1876; and any other Act or Acts relating to the Great Eastern Railway Company or the London and Blackwall Railway Company or their respective Undertakings;

the 7 and 8 Vict., cap. 18, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Midland Railway Company or their Undertaking; the 9 and 10 Vict., cap. 204, and any other Act or Acts relating to the London and North Western Railway Company or their Undertaking; the 9 and 10 Vict., cap. 396, and any other Act or Acts relating to the North London Railway Company or their Undertaking; the 5 and 6 William IV, cap. 107, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Great Western Railway Company or their Undertaking; the 9 and 10 Vict., cap. 71, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Great Northern Railway Company or their Undertaking; the 15 and 16 Vict., cap. 84, and 25 and 26 Vict., cap. 8, and any other Act or Acts relating to the London, Tilbury and Southend Railway Company or their Undertaking.

To incorporate with the Bill and extend and apply to the Company and to their railways and sidings all or any of the provisions of amongst other Acts the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, and the Railways Clauses Act, 1863.

To vary or extinguish all rights and privileges inconsistent with or which would in any way interfere with the purposes of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session of 1904 by the Leicestershire and Warwickshire Electric Power Company (hereinafter called "the Company") for leave to bring in a Bill for effecting all or some of the purposes following (that is to say):—

1. To extend the periods limited by section 67 of the Leicestershire and Warwickshire Electric Power Act, 1902 (hereinafter called "the Act of 1902"), for the Company making a substantial commencement of the works for carrying out the powers of the said Act, and also for providing the generating stations sufficient in the opinion of the Board of Trade for those purposes to such extended periods as the Bill may prescribe.

2. To repeal or alter so much of section 21 of the Act of 1902 as prohibits the Company from exercising their borrowing powers to the

extent of one-third of their capital until the whole of the shares for the time being are fully paid up, and in lieu thereof to enable the Company to exercise their powers of borrowing when one-half of the nominal amount of the issued shares is paid up instead of the whole amount of such shares is fully paid up as provided by that section.

3. To amend section 30 of the said Act of 1902 relating to the construction of stations for generating electricity on the lands described in the First Schedule to that Act, and, if thought fit, to extend the provisions of section 32 of the same Act so as to allow the Company to construct such stations on lands acquired by agreement under the last named section, and to purchase and appropriate any of such lands for that purpose and other purposes of the Bill as they think fit.

4. To extend the provisions of section 64 of the said Act of 1902, and to enable the Company to take a transfer of or acquire by agreement from any Local Authority or other Undertakers to whom a Provisional Order under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, has been or may be granted relating to any area within the Company's area of supply for the time being of the Undertaking authorized by such Provisional Order, and the powers, rights, authorities and privileges of the Undertakers under such Provisional Order, and to enable any such Undertakers to transfer their Undertaking, powers, rights, authorities and privileges to the Company on such terms and conditions as the Bill may prescribe.

5. To enable the Company, notwithstanding anything contained in the Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, to pay out of their capital or any of their funds from time to time during such time as may be prescribed by the Bill interest or dividends on any of their shares or stock during construction of works.

6. To authorize the Company to apply their funds and revenues to any of the objects of the Bill, to amend, alter or repeal the provisions or some of the provisions of the Act of 1902; to vary or extinguish all or any rights and privileges inconsistent with or which would or might interfere with the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

7. To confer upon and extend and apply to the Company and to their Undertaking and works all or such of the provisions of the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, and the Acts incorporated therewith, and of the schedule to the Electric Lighting (Clauses) Act, 1899, as may be thought expedient or necessary to effect the aforesaid objects, and the Bill will alter or repeal such of the provisions of those Acts and of the said Act of 1902 as may be inconsistent in giving effect to the aforesaid provisions, with such exceptions and variations as are contained in the Act of 1902 and in the intended Bill.

(Purchase of Lands and Easements by compulsion or agreement; Construction of Outfall Sewer; Further Powers as to Seashore and Promenades; Sea Water Supply; Bye-laws as to Seashore, Promenades and Bathing; Licensing Pleasure Boats; Provisions as to Recreation Grounds; Public Band; Streets and Buildings; Sanitary Provisions; Infectious Disease and Tuberculosis; Common Lodging-houses; Public Lavatories and Slaughter-houses; Hoardings, Sky-signs and Advertising Vehicles; Police Provisions and Street Traffic; Fire Brigade; Public Vehicles; Borrowing Powers; Gratuities and Pensions to Officers; Bye-laws; Penalties; and other provisions usually inserted in Bills of this character.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session by the Urban District Council of the urban district of Birkdale, in the County Palatine of Lancaster (in this Notice referred to as "the Council"), for an Act for all or some of the following purposes (that is to say):—

1. To empower the Council for the purpose of the proposed works and other the purposes of the Bill, to purchase or acquire by compulsion or agreement, or take on lease or hold any lands, houses or buildings, and to acquire by compulsion or agreement rights or easements in, under, over, or connected with any lands, houses or buildings in the district, and to empower the Council to appropriate to all or any of the purposes of the Bill any lands for the time being vested in them.

2. To authorize the Council to make and maintain in the district and the sea adjoining the same, the following works or some of them, with all necessary and proper tanks, storage and subsidiary sewers, outfalls, works and conveniences (that is to say):—

(1) An outfall sewer commencing on the sand hills at a point 1,250 yards, or thereabouts, in a westerly direction from the point where the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway crosses the boundary line of the townships of Ainsdale and Formby, and 10 yards in a northerly direction from such boundary line, thence running in a westerly direction for a distance of 100 yards parallel to the aforesaid boundary line, thence deviating in a north-westerly direction for a distance of 172 yards to the line of foreshore, but 143 yards from the aforesaid boundary line measured at right angles therefrom, and thence to low water mark, terminating at a point 72 yards from the aforesaid boundary line measured at right angles therefrom.

3. To authorize the Council in connection with the intended sewage outfall works to make and maintain all necessary approaches, retaining walls, embankments, subsidiary sewers, tanks, bridges, arches, tunnels, drains, culverts, excavations, and other works and conveniences.

4. To authorize the Council to deviate in the construction of the intended works, both vertically and laterally, to the extent shown on the deposited plans and sections or to be defined by the Bill.

5. To empower the Council to construct all such works on the foreshore or under the sea as may be necessary for laying and for preserving and maintaining the intended outfall sewer, and if found necessary to deepen the bed of the sea

and the foreshore for those purposes, and to dispose of any material obtained thereby.

6. To enable the Council to construct sand shields or fences, or to lay down grass or other material to prevent sand from being blown off the seashore, and to require landowners to take proper means to prevent sand being blown off their lands to the annoyance of the neighbourhood.

7. To authorize the Council to supply sea water throughout the district, and to erect pumping stations, and to lay mains and pipes for such purposes, and to sanction charges being made for such supply.

8. To make it unlawful for persons to throw rubbish or filth on the seashore, or to take sand or shingle therefrom.

9. To empower the Council to make bye-laws for the regulation of the esplanade and promenades, for prescribing the nature of the traffic for which they may be used, for regulating the selling and hawking of any article, commodity or thing thereon, and for the preservation of order and good conduct among the persons frequenting the same; and also bye-laws for the prevention of danger, obstruction, nuisance or annoyance to persons using the seashore, and with regard to bathing, to provide that section 171 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and section 69 of the Town Police Clauses Act, 1847, shall apply to bathing tents or huts, to require the provision of boats for the protection of bathers, and to authorize the Council to licence pleasure boats and boatmen.

10. To authorize the Council to enter into agreements with the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Southport for the purchase and transfer to the Council of the Birkdale portion of the gas Undertaking of the Corporation, and to make provision for carrying any such agreement into effect, to borrow the money necessary for such purpose, and to take a supply of gas in bulk from the Corporation pending the erection of gasworks by the Council.

11. To make provision with regard to the recreation grounds of the Council, and particularly to authorize the Council to erect, provide, equip, maintain, furnish and let waiting, refreshment, assembly, concert and other rooms, and saloons, pavilions and other accommodation for music and other public entertainments, and to charge for the admission to and use thereof; to provide seats and chairs, and charge for same; to set apart portions of recreation grounds for certain purposes; to provide apparatus for games; to provide that the pleasure grounds shall be deemed streets for certain purposes; to authorize the Council to contribute to bands of music, and to appoint officers for securing the observance of the part of the Bill relating to recreation grounds.

12. To confer on the Council new and enlarged powers with reference to buildings and streets, including, amongst others, the following (that is to say):—The approval of plans to be void after certain intervals, that plans may be retained by the Council, power to the Council to vary position or direction of new streets, to prohibit the erection of new buildings until line of street defined, laid out and kerbed; to declare where streets begin and end; to provide for crossings for horses or vehicles over footways, and that any continuation of an existing street shall be deemed a new street; to provide for the execution of urgent and temporary repairs to private streets; to

charge for supervision of works, and to enter into agreements with owners to carry out works; to define what are new buildings; to make provision with regard to the erection of buildings to a greater height than adjoining buildings; to provide that no dwelling is to be erected at back of house without communication with street, and that terrace houses must have back streets; to provide for intersecting streets; to make provision with regard to the height of buildings, and as to fencing vacant lands adjoining streets; to require the lopping of trees or shrubs overhanging streets and footpaths, the fencing off of forecourts from streets; to provide that the deposit of building materials or excavations shall not be made in streets without consent, and for preventing the formation of culs-de-sac; to require that elevations of buildings erected on front lands shall be subject to approval of the Council; to empower the Council to make bye-laws as to buildings, and to require the provision of means of escape from buildings in case of fire; to make provision concerning temporary and movable buildings, the control by the Council of stands, sheds and other buildings of a temporary character, the sale of materials of temporary buildings, and for requiring separate sewers; and to empower the Council to require enlarged sewers in certain cases, and to make restrictions as to the placing of wires above ground.

13. To confer on the Council further powers with regard to sanitary matters, including the following, viz.:—To empower the Council to require water-closets to new buildings and the conversion of existing closet accommodation into water-closets at the expense of the owner and to enable the Council to contribute towards such expense, to provide for appeal, and as to the apportionment of the expense where work done for common benefit, to make provision as to separate sewers, and for the testing of drains, to require old drains to be laid open for examination, to make provision with regard to reconstruction of drains, the improper construction or repair of water-closets or drains, to prevent wilful damage to drains, to authorize the Council to order houses to be drained by a combined operation, to prohibit the throwing of injurious matter into sewers or drains, to provide for the ventilation of sewers and inspection of drains, to extend the provisions of section 41 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to authorize the Council to make bye-laws as to closet accommodation, to enlarge the definition of nuisance and to enable the Council to appoint more than one inspector, to provide for the filling up of cesspools, and to require persons to provide sinks and drains to buildings, and to make connections of drains with sewers, to make provision for the covering of ditches, to authorize the Council to prevent obstructions in watercourses, and to charge for emptying privies or dustbins of trade refuse, and to require the cleansing of cisterns, to make provision as to houses without a proper water supply, to require householders to provide sanitary dustbins, to enable the Council to provide dust boxes, to provide for the removal or alteration of urinals, and to make provisions as to the air space necessary in lodging-houses.

14. To protect the public against the spread of disease by the sale within the district of the milk of cows suffering from tuberculosis, and for taking samples of milk within the district for the purpose of bacteriological examination, and for the entry of the medical officer of the district or

a specially authorized inspector into any byres or cowsheds or other places within or beyond the district where cows are kept, the milk from which is sent for sale within the district, to examine the cows therein for the purpose of ascertaining whether such cows suffered from disease or indurated udders, and for preventing the milk of cows so affected being sent for sale within the district, and for imposing a penalty with reference to the matters aforesaid.

15. To confer on the Council further powers with regard to the prevention of and dealing with infectious disease, and in particular to require dairymen to furnish list of sources of their supply of milk, and to notify any infectious disease existing among their servants; to prohibit infected persons from carrying on business, and to enable the Council to compensate dairymen and persons ceasing employment for loss; to make provision for protection against infection of books from lending library; to empower the Council to make bye-laws for regulating admission to and discharge from hospitals, to require the purification of filthy articles, to enable the Council to pay the expenses of persons in hospital and to provide nurses and charge for their services; to prohibit wakes being held over body of person dying of infectious disease, and a certificate before body removed by railway or other public conveyance; to prohibit the retention of the dead body of any person dying of infectious disease, and to impose a penalty for so doing, and to provide that the body of a dead person dying in hospital of an infectious disease is to be removed only for the purpose of burial, and to empower justices in certain cases to order dead bodies to be buried, to empower the medical officer of health to examine school children, and to require that child suffering from infectious disease is not to attend school, to require the principal of any school to furnish list of pupils in certain cases and power to medical officer of health to close Sunday schools and prevent infectious children attending school, to erect temporary shelters or houses for members of any family in which any infectious disease has appeared who have been compelled to leave their dwellings, and to regulate the manufacture and sale of ice-cream or any similar commodity.

16. To empower the Council to make regulations for the control, registration and regulation as to common lodging-houses and other homes, refuges and night shelters, and to impose penalties upon any lodging-house keeper who shall keep a lodging-house without first having registered the same; to empower the Council to refuse to register any common lodging-house, or any person as a common lodging-house keeper unless satisfied with his character and fitness, to require the provision of proper sanitary conveniences in common lodging-houses.

17. To enable the Council to provide and maintain sanitary conveniences and lavatories in or under any street, and to make reasonable charges for the use of the same, and to make bye-laws for the management and conduct of persons using the same, and to empower the Council to let the same.

18. To authorize the Council to erect public slaughter-houses and to prohibit the use of private slaughter-houses after giving due notice as provided by the Bill, and to empower the Council to make compensation to any owner and occupier of a registered slaughter-house within the district.

19. To place restrictions upon the erection of hoardings for advertising purposes, and the plac-

ing of advertisements upon hoardings, walls or similar structures, to empower the Council to prohibit the use of any vehicle or vehicles used exclusively or principally for the purpose of displaying advertisements without the consent of the Council in writing, and to prohibit the erection of any sky-sign or the use of any existing sky-sign except with the licence of the Council, and to specify the terms upon which any such licence may become void, and the imposing of penalties upon persons acting in contravention of this part of the Bill.

20. To enact that unfenced ground is to be deemed to be a public street for certain purposes, and that notice is to be given of processions, to prevent persons riding or driving to the common danger to regulate traffic during a fire; to enable the police to break open and enter buildings adjoining thereto in case of fire, to make provisions as to children trading in streets, and to licence persons following certain callings.

21. To empower the Council to make and enforce bye-laws for regulating the use of bicycles in streets, and to impose penalties on persons drawing timber, stone or other weighty articles without a proper carriage for the same or without a competent attendant, or for carrying carcasses uncovered or for blowing horns or for sticking bills or injuring fences, or for loitering and obstructing the free passage along any street.

22. To empower the officer in charge of the police to regulate the traffic at fires, to enter and break open premises in case of fire, to enable the captain of the fire brigade to control operations at fires, and to empower the Council to erect cottages for the use of firemen, and enter into agreements with Local Authorities for the common use of fire appliances.

23. To confer powers on the Council with regard to the inspection of hackney carriages, the granting of occasional licences for public vehicles, and to apply the provisions of the Town Police Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1889, and the bye-laws made thereunder with respect to hackney carriages, to railway stations and the approaches thereto, as if such railway stations were hackney carriage stands or a street, and to make applicable the provisions of those Acts with respect to the regulation of fares to hackney carriages taking up and setting down passengers within the district, but which go outside the district.

24. To empower the Council to borrow money for all or any of the purposes of the Bill, and for such other purposes as may be prescribed or authorized by the Bill, and to charge the money so borrowed and interest upon the security of the revenues and other Undertakings and property for the time being of the Council, or some of them; and on any other funds and rates established and leviable by the Council, to empower the Council to apply their funds to any of the purposes of the Bill, to make further provision with reference to the existing debt of the Council, and otherwise in relation to the finances, rates and revenues of the Council, and to authorize the Council to allow a discount for prompt payment of rates.

25. The Bill may provide for the collection of the local rates, including the poor rate, general district rate and all other rates; and to amend the powers of recovering the same; to prescribe the form of demand note; to enable the Council to appoint and remove officers; to assist the

overseers and assistant overseers in the discharge of their duties, and to determine their salaries.

26. To empower the Council to extend the provisions of any existing bye-laws; to make new bye-laws, rules and regulations with reference to all or any of the foregoing matters, and to enforce the same by penalties or otherwise, or to vary or rescind the same; and to confer upon them all powers, rights, authorities and privileges which are or may become necessary for carrying the powers granted by the Bill into execution; to vary or extinguish all existing rights or privileges which would or might in any way prevent or interfere with or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

27. To make further provision for the prosecution of offenders, the bringing of actions and proceedings, and the signing and service of orders, contracts and notices.

28. To authorize the Council to grant gratuities and pensions to their officers or servants who may be injured in their service, or become incapacitated through age or other infirmity, and to any charity undertaking the relief of such officers, and to regulate and authorize the sums to be paid out of the funds of the Council to such purposes.

29. To provide that in executing works for an owner the Council are to be indemnified against damages so long as there is no neglect on their part.

30. To incorporate with alterations and amendments, and to apply, amend, alter or repeal all or some of the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament following, or some of them (that is to say):—The Lands Clauses Acts; the Harbours, Docks and Piers Clauses Act, 1847; the Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847; the Town Police Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1889; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Public Health Acts; the Infectious Diseases Notification Act, 1889; and the Infectious Diseases Prevention Act, 1890; and all Acts amending the said Acts respectively or any of them.

31. To vary, repeal or extinguish all existing rights, powers and privileges which would in any manner interfere with or prevent the carrying into effect of any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights, powers and privileges.

And notice is hereby given, that on or before the 30th day of November instant, plans and sections of the works intended to be authorized by the Bill, showing the lines and levels thereof, and showing also the lands intended to be taken compulsorily under the powers of the Bill, with a book of reference to such plans and a copy of this Notice as published in the London Gazette will be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the County Palatine of Lancaster at his office at Preston, and with the Clerk to the Urban District Council of Birkdale at his office.

For all or some of the purposes of the Bill to amend, vary, alter or repeal the provisions of the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, and the Ealing Electric Lighting Order, 1891, and to enable the Corporation (a) to attach brackets, wires and apparatus for street lighting to buildings; (b) to restrict the placing of electric lines or wires above ground along, over or across any street; (c) to supply electrical energy to any local authority authorized to supply electricity in any adjacent or neighbouring districts; (d) to supply electrical energy for traction purposes to any person, company, authority or corporation authorized to use electrical energy for traction purposes on any tramway, tramroad, light railway or railway for all or any purposes for which such person, company, authority or corporation are empowered to use the same within or without the borough, and to authorize the Corporation and any such person, company, authority or corporation to enter into and carry into effect agreements for all or any of such purposes; (e) through a contractor but not otherwise to purchase, supply, sell, let, use and otherwise deal in and fit, fix, alter, repair and remove electrical wires, fuses, casings, meters, switches, fittings, lamps, lampholders, motors and other apparatus, and to provide materials and do all work necessary, and take such remuneration, rents or charges and make such terms and conditions with respect to such supply, sale, letting, use, fitting, fixing, alteration, repairing or removal, or the provision of such materials or the doing of such work as the Corporation may think fit or the Bill may prescribe; (f) to exempt fittings, meters, motors, &c., let for hire by the Corporation from distress or execution; (g) to borrow money for such purposes and to provide that any expense incurred by the Corporation in relation to such matters shall be deemed to be an expense incurred under the Electric Lighting Act, 1882; (h) to make bye-laws with respect to any wires, apparatus and fittings in any building or premises within the borough supplied with electricity, and for the protection of the same and the supply of electricity.

To authorize the Corporation to make provision as to the supply of electricity where the consumer has a separate supply. To enable the Corporation to refuse to supply persons in arrear; to alter the rate prescribed by the Electric Lighting Act, 1882, for the making and filling up of

the accounts of the Electric Lighting Undertaking of the Corporation.

To enable the Board of Trade by Provisional Order to appoint Joint Committees or Joint Boards for the purpose of enabling the Corporation and any neighbouring Local Authorities to supply electrical energy within their respective districts, and in reference to the exercise of such powers conferred on them.

To make provision in cases where electrical energy is supplied by the Corporation for motive power and is used for the production of light, that the Corporation may charge in such case as for light.

To make further provision as to money borrowed by the Corporation for the purposes of or under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888; and the Ealing Electric Lighting Order, 1891, and to provide for the postponement of the repayment of moneys borrowed by the Corporation for electric lighting purposes until after the completion of the works for which the money was so borrowed.

To confer powers on the Corporation and to make further provision for the improvement and good government of the borough and for preserving the health of the inhabitants, and especially with respect to the following amongst other matters:—

The position, cleansing and construction of cisterns and the prevention of the contamination of water used for drinking purposes and domestic supply, of dampness in buildings caused by defective or insufficient gutters, spouts, drains, &c., and by the deposit of materials and of the choking or silting up of any stream or watercourse. The provision of public conveniences and lavatories in or under streets or elsewhere, the making and enforcement of bye-laws in reference thereto, the employment and payment of attendants and the making of charges for the use of such conveniences and lavatories, the letting of the same, empowering the Corporation to require owners of inns, public-houses, beerhouses or other places of public entertainment, to provide and maintain urinals attached thereto and to order the removal of offensive urinals, the power of entry by the officers of the Corporation into houses and premises for the purpose of inspection or for any other purposes of the Bill; the appointment by the Corporation of more than one inspector of nuisances; the provision of public drinking fountains, &c.; houses without proper water supply; fencing of vacant lands; the prevention of drainage of any property fronting or abutting on any street from flowing on to the footpath of such street, the provision of sufficient water-closet accommodation in buildings, and the nature, size, materials and position thereof; paving in insufficiently paved yards; the re-construction of existing drains; the connecting of drains with surface water sewers and sewers for the reception of sewage matter; amendment of the general law as to sewers and drains and enabling the Corporation to order houses to be drained by a combined system of drainage; the testing of drains; penalties for improper construction or repair of water-closets and drains; the ventilation of sewers and the laying, repair and maintenance of pipes and other apparatus and entry on private or other lands for such purposes; the covering of ditches by owners; the ventilation of staircases and the lower portions of buildings; the area and cubical space of habitable rooms and the mode of construction and ventilation of the same; to enable the Corporation to require the use of portable ashbins, and the removal of ash pits or similar erections, and to determine the size, number, construction and position of portable ashbins.

To make provision for prohibiting the keeping of swine in any locality, premises or place within the borough unfit for the purpose or likely to cause a nuisance or be injurious to public health, and to impose penalties for the breach of any provisions made in reference thereto.

To make better provision for the prevention of infectious diseases and confer powers on the Corporation with regard to the following amongst other matters:—The entry and inspection of schools and the examination of school children with a view to prevent the spread of infectious disease, and the exclusion of scholars and the closing of schools in case of infection; the regulation of dairies and dairywomen and the milk supply of the borough; the prohibition of the sale of milk in certain cases; the notification of tuberculosis and other diseases in cows; the isolation of diseased cows; the inspection of cows dairies cowsheds and milkshops within and outside the borough, and empowering the medical officer or other officer of the Corporation to enter premises and take samples of milk, and to prohibit the sale of milk from such dairies, cowsheds, and milkshops; the sale of milk by retail in the streets; the imposition of penalties for breaches, and to define the meaning of the words "dairy" and "dairyman"; the regulation of the manufacture and sale of ice cream; the prevention of infection through books in lending libraries; requiring and compelling persons engaged in washing or mangling clothes to furnish lists of owners; the payment of compensation by the Corporation to persons ceasing their employment to prevent the spread of infectious disease, and the payment of wages of infected persons by the Corporation; the amendment of section 124 and extension of section 132 of the Public Health Act, 1875; supply of antidotes and remedies against infectious diseases.

To enact provisions for enabling the Corporation to recover their reasonable expenses in respect of the maintenance and treatment in hospitals or elsewhere of persons other than paupers from the parents, guardians, masters or mistresses of such persons; further provisions as to bakehouses.

To confer powers on the Corporation and to make further and better provision in regard to streets and buildings within the district and particularly in reference to the following matters:—Power to the Corporation to vary or alter the position, direction, or level of new streets; plans of new buildings to be submitted to Corporation; line of frontage of buildings to new street to be defined on plans to be submitted to the Corporation for their approval, and the prevention of the erection of any building nearer the centre of any new street than such line, the definition of new buildings, the prohibition, licensing and regulation of sky signs, advertising boardings, projections overhanging public streets, and street advertisements, approval and retention by the Corporation of plans, drawings, sections, &c., deposited with them; power to the Corporation to prevent the formation of culs-de-sac or streets with dead or closed ends; intersecting streets; alteration of names of streets; to provide that the continuation of an existing street shall be deemed to be a new street, and to enable the Corporation to declare where streets begin and end; the prohibition of the erection of buildings in any street until such street is laid out, constructed, sewered, and kerbed, to the satisfaction of the Corporation; the erection and regulation of temporary and moveable buildings and structures, and the granting of licences for such erection and the removal of such buildings and

structures and sale of materials in certain cases; the lopping of trees and shrubs overhanging streets; the laying of crossings for horses, cattle, and vehicles over footways; names of new streets to be submitted to the Corporation for approval; the construction of rooms, staircases, and structures over and adjoining stables; empowering the Corporation to require greater width of streets in certain cases; prohibiting the erection of buildings or structures within such distance from the centre of any street or way as may be defined by the Bill without the sanction of the Corporation; the regulation of the fixing of timber in external walls of buildings; the structure, thickness, height, position, and materials of furnace chimney shafts; deposit of building materials and excavations; the uniting of buildings and openings in party or other walls of buildings; as to staircases, corridors, passages, doors, and barriers in churches, chapels, meeting-houses, public halls, public lecture rooms, public exhibition rooms, and public places of assembly, and additions or alterations to existing buildings of the same class; the construction, stability, and materials of the corridors, staircases, and floors of buildings constructed or used as flats or tenements, provisions as to light and air space for same; limiting the height of existing and new buildings, and regulating the quality of materials used in new buildings and the manner in which and the materials with which grates, stoves, and fireplaces shall be set in new buildings; fencing of waste lands; power in certain cases to order sewer in private streets to be made sufficient for drainage of contiguous property.

To enact further and more stringent provisions as to new buildings intended to be inhabited, as to notice to be served, as to drainage and ventilation, trapping of drains, inspection of premises, prohibition against allowing premises to be inhabited until after compliance with Act, and imposition of penalties. To cancel and annul Bye-law No. 104 of the bye-laws relating to new streets and buildings made by the Corporation on the 6th day of February, 1902, and confirmed by the Local Government Board on the 13th day of February, 1902.

To make further provisions as to private improvement expenses, and new street expenses, and the recovery thereof with interest thereon, and to enable the Corporation to recover the estimated cost of paving, &c., of private streets before the execution of the work. To make provisions as to notices under section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875. To enable the Corporation to charge and recover a sum to cover the expenses of supervision, interest, &c. To enable the occupier in default of the owner to execute works and deduct expense thereof from his rent. To impose penalties upon occupiers refusing to allow execution of works. To make private improvement expenses a charge upon lands in priority to all other incumbrances, and to make successive owners liable therefor. To enable mortgagees in possession to add to their debt for principal and interest any amounts paid by them for private improvement expenses. Recovery of private improvement expenses. Power to Corporation to take possession of lands, &c., in default of payment by owner, and to exercise the functions of an owner, including the letting of the lands, and the receipt of the rents and profits. Power to Corporation to contribute to expenses of private street works, and pay same out of rates. Power to apply district fund and borough fund towards works for private owners. Power to Corporation to borrow moneys for private street works, and

to allow time for payment of private improvement expenses. Apportionment of such expenses and power to include premises not fronting, adjoining, or abutting, &c.

To make further and better provision in regard to parks, recreation grounds and open spaces, and to empower the Corporation to erect, furnish, equip, maintain and remove conservatories, pavilions, refreshment rooms, shelters, and other buildings and conveniences in any public park, recreation ground, or open space belonging to, or under the control of, the Corporation. To authorize the letting of the same and charges for the use thereof and admission thereto. To authorize the setting apart of any park, recreation ground or open space, or any part thereof for games and other special purposes. To provide apparatus for games, and to make charges for the use thereof respectively. To authorize the Corporation to employ and pay, or to contribute to the expense of, providing musical entertainment; a band or bands of music. To empower the Corporation to place seats and chairs in parks, recreation grounds, streets and open spaces, and to charge for the use thereof, and to make bye-laws in regard to the matters aforesaid.

To extend and apply the provisions of the Vagrancy Act, 1824, and of sections 28 and 29 of the Towns Police Clauses Act, 1847, and of such other sections of that Act as the Bill may provide, to offences committed in parks and recreation grounds, unfenced ground, and places of public resort.

To make bye-laws for the regulation of Ealing Commons consisting of tracts of land known as Haven Green, Drayton Green, Ealing Green, Ealing Common, and the strips of waste land referred to in the scheme set forth in the first schedule of the Metropolitan Commons Supplemental Act, 1877. To empower the Corporation to enclose and lay out a strip of waste land in the parish of Ealing purchased by the Local Board of the urban district of Ealing, the predecessors of the Corporation, from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, by Indenture dated the 23rd day of November, 1878, situated on the north side of and bounded on the south by the Uxbridge-road, and on the north by the North Common-road, and containing one acre two roods and twenty perches or thereabouts, and having no name, and plant trees, shrubs and flowers thereon.

To provide that the powers of the Guardians of the Poor of the Brentford Union to appoint officers for the collection of poor rates in respect of the parish of Ealing shall cease, and to confer upon the Corporation power to appoint, employ and control Assistant Overseers and Collectors of the poor rates for the said parish. To authorize the amalgamation of the collection of the poor rates and general district rates in the parish of Ealing, and to provide for a joint demand note, receipt, and other necessary documents, and to empower the Local Government Board to prescribe the forms of such documents respectively.

To make provision as to the rating of buildings occupied during any part of the period over which a rate is made, and to provide that rates which the Corporation are entitled to levy and raise, may be recovered and enforced by the Corporation in like manner as if they were poor rates, and to enable the Corporation to charge for surveys, superintendence and notices under the Public Health Act, 1875.

To authorize and provide for the establishment of a fund for the encouragement of thrift among the officers and servants of the Corporation, or any class or classes thereof, and for

fixing the amount of the contributions to be paid thereto by such officers and servants, and the payments to be made to them or their representatives, out of the said fund, on retirement or death, and to provide that such contributions, or certain of them, or some portion thereof shall be compulsory, and as to such contributions to authorize the Corporation to deduct the amounts thereof from the salaries or wages of the officers and servants liable to the payment thereof, and to empower the Corporation to contribute to and to assist in the formation of the said fund, and to receive deposits of moneys for the purposes thereof, and to invest such funds and deposits, and to pay compound interest thereon, and on the said contributions, and to charge all such moneys and interest on, and to pay the same out of their funds, rates and revenues, and to provide for the appointment of a committee or committees of the said officers and servants to act with or to assist the Corporation in establishing and administering and in keeping and auditing the accounts of the said fund, and to confer on the Corporation, their officers and servants, and the said Committees all powers necessary or expedient for or in relation to any of the purposes aforesaid, and to authorize the Corporation to settle a scheme or schemes for carrying the above purposes, or any of them, into effect, and to empower the Corporation to pay pensions and make superannuation allowances to their officers and servants in cases of incapacity arising from accident, disease, sickness or otherwise.

To empower the Corporation to acquire by compulsion or agreement from the churchwardens and overseers of the parish of Ealing or other persons in whom for the time being the same maybe vested, certain lands in the parish of Ealing, in the county of Middlesex, containing two acres or thereabouts, and now forming part of certain allotment lands, which lands so to be acquired are situate at the junction of Mattock-lane with Northfield-lane, and to require and compel the said churchwardens and overseers or other persons aforesaid to accept as the consideration therefor, or in exchange, other lands in the borough equally suitable for the purpose of allotments, and on the lands so exchanged and now forming part of the allotment lands to enable the Corporation to erect thereon schools for elementary education. To enable the Corporation to raise money for the purpose; to make all necessary provisions in reference to the transfer of the said lands, and to confirm any agreement made or to be made in reference thereto before the passing of the Bill. For any of the foregoing purposes to alter, amend, or repeal, wholly or in part, the Poor Relief Act, 1831, and the Allotments Act, 1832, and any other Act or Acts relating to or affecting the matters aforesaid.

To enable the Corporation to utilize a piece of garden land now enclosed by walls and used as a kitchen garden being part of certain lands in the said borough acquired by them for pleasure grounds, and known as Walpole Park, for the purpose of erecting thereon buildings of a municipal or educational character.

To make provision with respect to the use or letting of the Town Hall of the borough, or any part thereof, for public meetings, or for petty or special sessions, county courts, coroner's inquests, public inquiries, or parochial purposes.

To make provisions and to enact prohibitions or restrictions as to the admission into the borough of bears and other animals, and to impose and enforce the recovery of penalties.

To alter and enlarge the present borrowing powers of the Corporation, and to enable them,

for the purposes (including costs) of the Bill, to borrow, re-borrow, or raise further moneys by mortgage, bond, debenture, debenture stock, or otherwise on the security of the district fund, and general district rate or borough fund or borough rate, and other rates, tolls, revenues, estates, lands, undertakings, and properties leviable by, or belonging to, the Corporation, or any of them, and to provide for the application of borrowed moneys, and to empower the Corporation to make levy, and recover rates and assessments for the purposes of the Bill, and to authorize the Corporation to apply any of their funds, or any moneys they are authorized to borrow for any of the purposes of the Bill, and to provide that in calculating the amount which the Corporation may from time to time borrow under the Public Health Act, 1875, the amounts borrowed by the Corporation for all or any of the purposes of their Electric Lighting Undertaking and of the Bill shall not be included or taken into account.

To make provision as to the repayment of moneys borrowed, or to be borrowed by the Corporation, and as to the sinking fund for the repayment of moneys so borrowed or to be borrowed by such instalments, and within such periods as the Bill may prescribe, and to extend the period for the repayment of moneys borrowed, or to be borrowed by the Corporation for the purposes of their Electric Lighting Undertaking.

To make provision as to the payment of the expenses of the execution by the Corporation of the provisions of the Bill out of moneys to be borrowed by the Corporation under the powers of the Bill, or in such other manner and out of such funds or rates as shall be defined by the Bill.

To authorize the Corporation to levy and recover rates, rents, and charges for all or any of the objects and purposes of the Bill, and to alter or increase existing rates, rents, and charges and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from existing or future rates, rents, and charges, and to enable the Corporation to levy, assess, recover, or collect all or any rates, rents, and charges together or separately. To vary or extinguish all existing rights or privileges which would or might in any way prevent or interfere with or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

To provide for the making of rules, bye-laws, and regulations by the Corporation for or in respect of all or any of the objects and purposes of the Bill, and to extend the powers of the Corporation in regard to bye-laws under the Public Health Acts. To impose penalties for breaches or non-observance of the provisions of the Bill and of such rules, bye-laws, and regulations, and to provide for the recovery and application of such penalties and for the laying and making of informations and complaints and the authentication and service of notices and other documents.

To provide that lands acquired for some purposes of the Public Health or any other Acts may be used for any purpose other than that for which it was acquired.

To enable the Corporation on the one hand and any local authority, Company, Corporation or person on the other hand to enter into and carry into effect agreements with respect to any of the purposes of the Bill, and to confirm and to give effect to any agreements which have been or may be made touching any of the matters aforesaid.

To incorporate with or without variations such

of the provisions as may be thought fit of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869, the Local Government Acts, the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 to 1899, the Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847, the Towns Police Clauses Act, 1847, the Vagrancy Act, 1824, the Public Health Acts, the Local Loans Act, 1875, the Infectious Disease (Notification) Acts, 1889 and 1899, the Infectious Disease Prevention Act, 1890, the Poor Law Amendment Act, 1868, the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milksheds Order, 1885, the Arbitration Act, 1889, and such other Acts as may be necessary, and all other Acts (public or local) amending or extending those Acts or any of the provisions thereof affecting Urban Sanitary Authorities, with such modifications as may be contained in the Bill.

To vary, amend, extend, repeal, apply, alter, or consolidate such of the provisions as may be deemed expedient of the following Acts or Orders or some of them:—

Brentford and Ealing Order, 1873 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1873; Ealing Order, 1882 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1882), Ealing Order 1885, and Brentford and Ealing Order, 1885 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act (No. 6) 1885; Local Government Board's Order of 23rd March, 1895, under the provisions of section 33 of the Local Government Act of 1894, Ealing Electric Lighting Order, 1891 (confirmed by the Electric Lighting Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1891 (No. 2)), Ealing Order, 1899. (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1899), Local Government Board's Order of 23rd August, 1899, under the provisions of subsections (1), (3), and (7) of section 33 of the Local Government Act, 1894, and all other Acts or Orders relating to or affecting the Corporation or the borough, and all other public and private Acts or Orders applicable to, or the provisions whereof might be useful to, or affect or interfere with the objects and purposes of the Bill.

Plans of the land proposed to be taken for the purposes of the intended Act, together with a book of reference to the plans, and a copy of the notice of the intended application to Parliament as published in the London Gazette, will, on or before the 30th day of November, 1903, be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Middlesex at his office, at the Guildhall, Westminster, and with the Town Clerk of the borough of Ealing, at his office at the Town Hall, Ealing.

Printed copies of the Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, on or before the 17th day of December next.

(Provision for working Deep Gales; Alteration of Boundaries of existing Gales; defining Rights and Liabilities of Galees, Lessees, and others; Compensation to Galees and others;

Amalgamation of Gales, and giving up of way leaves on Amalgamation; Extension of Intervals between Periodical Revision of Royalties; Power to Gaveller to require Specific Works of Development in certain Cases, and to require Deposit of Money or other Security; Powers to Freemen to elect Committee or Trustees, and powers to such Committee or Trustees; Amendment of Acts; and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session for leave to introduce a Bill and to pass an Act for the objects and purposes following, or some of them, viz:—

To make better provision for winning, working, and draining coal and iron mines in the Forest of Dean and hundred of St. Briavels, in the county of Gloucester, and for such purposes to authorize the amalgamation of gales within the said forest and hundred, and to grant new gales upon such terms and conditions as shall be agreed upon between the Crown and any galees and lessees to provide for disregarding applications made for portions only of such amalgamated gales, and for receiving fresh applications for the entire amalgamated gales.

To authorize, and in certain cases to require and compel, the surrender and repeal of any existing gales, leases, and grants, and to grant other gales, leases, and grants, in lieu of those surrendered, and to provide for the settlement and payment of compensation to galees and lessees, and others whose interests shall be prejudicially affected by any such surrender or amalgamation, and to confer powers for the surrender and giving up of wayleaves on amalgamation of gales.

To enable certain lessees and galees to work deep coal seams below the free drainage level of their gales, and, so far as may be necessary for the objects and purposes aforesaid, to alter the boundaries of existing gales, and to make additions thereto, and to alter the rents, royalties, terms, and conditions upon which such gales, or any of them, are now worked and drained, and to charge other rents, royalties, and payments, and to define the rights and liabilities of galees and others, and to extend the intervals between the periodical revision of royalties.

To provide that the gaveller shall have power as well in the case of amalgamation by agreement of existing gales as in the case of new grants to stipulate for the carrying out of specified works of development within a specified time, and to require security to be given by the deposit of money or otherwise for the due and punctual carrying out of such stipulations.

To enable any number of freemen who may be interested in any gale or gales to elect a Committee, or Trustee, or Trustees, to represent them in all matters connected with such gale or gales, and to empower such Committee, Trustee, or Trustees, to act for such freemen, and to provide that such freemen shall be bound by their acts.

To alter or extinguish all or any existing rights and privileges which would interfere with the carrying into effect the objects and purposes of the intended Act, and to create new rights and privileges.

And so far as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid it is proposed to alter, amend, and, if need be, to repeal wholly or in part, the

following Acts of Parliament, viz.:—1 and 2 William 4, cap. 12; 3 and 4 William 4, cap. 38; 4 and 5 William 4, cap. 59; 5 and 6 Vic., cap. 65; 1 and 2 Vic., cap. 42; 7 and 8 Vic., cap. 18; 24 and 25 Vic., cap. 40; 59 Geo. 3 cap. 86; 6 and 7 William 4, cap. 3; 15 and 16 Vic., cap. 62; 1 and 2 Vic., cap. 43; 5 and 6 Vic., cap. 48; 48 Geo. 3, cap. 72; 17 and 18 Vic., cap. 49; 18 and 19 Vic., cap. 16; 29 and 30 Vic., caps. 62 and 70; 34 and 35 Vic., cap. 85, relating to the Forest of Dean and Hundred of St. Briavels, in the county of Gloucester.

(Increase of Number of Wards, Aldermen and Councillors of Borough of Tynemouth; Alteration and Re-arrangement of Boundaries of Existing Wards; Redistribution of Existing Councillors among New Wards; Amendment of Section 9 of Electric Lighting Act, 1882; Amendment of Acts.)
