

A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD, R. & I.

Whereas Our Parliament stands prorogued to Friday, the eleventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred and three; We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Tuesday, the second day of February, one thousand nine hundred and four; and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure that the said Parliament shall, on the raid Tuesday, the second day of February, one thousand nine hundred and four, assemble and be holden for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Tuesday, the second day of February, one thousand nine hundred and four.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this eighth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred; and three, and in the third year of Our. reign.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and

third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in

the words following, that is to say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Tilbury Docks, in the parish of Saint Mary, Chadwell, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Tilbury Docks as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary Chadwell which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Tilbury Docks as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Tilbury Docks.' And with the like consent of the said Edgar Bishop of the said

diocese of Saint Albans (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Tilbury Docks as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Edward Smith, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary Chadwell shall continue to be such rector or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Tilbury Docks as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Edward Smith; and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the per-formance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Tilbury Docks, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint Mary, Chadwell, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans which is bounded upon the east by the parish of West Tilbury in the said county and diocese, upon the south by the middle of the River Thames, upon the west and upon part of the north by the parish of Little Thurrock in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining part of the north and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Little Thurrock from the said parish of Saint Mary Chadwell, at the junction of the road called 'The Chase' with the road leading from Little Thurrock past Hutt's House, Hobbill Farm and Southfield Barn to Little Biggin and extending thence first eastward then southward and then generally south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of seventy-four chains or thereabouts to the point near Little Biggin where such road meets the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary, Chadwell, from the said parish of West Tilbury.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of November in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Peter Parkstone, in the county of Dorset and in the diocese of Salisbury.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone is a new parish wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Ivor Bertie, Baron Wimborne, has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act then of the said new parish and towards the maintenance of the minister or Incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or Incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should grant out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act a capital sum

of seven hundred pounds sterling in respect of of which there shall be paid by us to the minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and the nomination of the minister or Incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said grant of seven hundred pounds sterling will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us the said Commissioners under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Salisbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Parkstone, which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Luke, Parkstone.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and the nomination of the minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised by the said Ivor Bertie, Baron Wimborne, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District of Saint Luke, Parkstone, being:-

All that part of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Peter, Parkstone, in the county of Dorset and in the diocese of Salisbury which is bounded upon the east and upon the north-east by the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Branksome Park, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Branksome Park, from the said new parish of Saint Peter, Parkstone, at the centre of

the bridge which carries the Poole and Bournemouth junction branch line of the London and South-Western Railway across the North Lodge-road leading from the Old North Lodge of Branksome Park in Canford Cliffs-road towards Parkstone, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Sandecotes-road over such branch line of railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Sandecotes-road for a distance of fortyone chains or thereabouts to its junction with Vale-road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Vale-road for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Saint Osmund's-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the bridle road leading from Saint Osmund's-road to Canford Cliffs-road for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts to the junction of the said bridle road with Canford Cliffs-road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter Parkstone, from the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Branksome Park."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the Incumbent of the cure out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and Incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the Loudon Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the

the new parish of Saint Paul, Harringay, both in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of

"Whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the eighth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one and being under our common seal and under the hand and seal of the late Right Houourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell then Bishop of London, a certain portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Tottenham in the said county of Middlesex and diocese of London was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Saint Ann situate in Hanger-lane in the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Tottenham and the said particular district was named 'The Particular District of Saint Ann Hanger-lane.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Saint Ann Hanger-lane has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-eighth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two and published in the London Gazette on the first day of the following month certain contiguous portions of the parish of Hornsey of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Stroud Green, both in the said county and diocese, and of the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate near the Harringay Railway Station in the said parish of Hornsey and the said consolidated chapelry was named The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul Harringay.

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul Harringay has under the provisions of the above-mentioned Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the abovementioned Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Harringay shall be altered in the manner

which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Harringay shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be

said new parish of Saint Paul Harringay.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul Harringay in the same county and diocese being all that part of the said new parish of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane, which is bounded upon the north by the consolidated chapelry of Christ Church, West Green, Tottenham in the said county and diocese, upon the west partly by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Peter, Hornsey, in the same county and diocese and partly by the said new parish of Saint Paul Harringay upon the south by the new parish of Saint Olave, Stoke Newington in the same county and diocese and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Olave Stoke Newington from the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane at a point in the middle of the line of the Tottenham and Hampstead Junction Railway opposite to the southern end of the wall forming the western boundary of the premises of the North Eastern Fever Hospital and extending thence northward to and along the said wall for a distance of fifteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the northern end of the said wall upon the southern side of Saint Ann's-road and extending thence first northward to and then westward along the middle of Saint Ann's-road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane, from the said consolidated chapelry of Christ Church, West Green, Tottenham."

representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively

signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Walthamstow and of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint John Walthamstow, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Walthamstow and of the said new parish of Saint John Walthamstow should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke, Walthamstow, situate as aforesaid.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke,

Walthamstow comprising:-"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Walthamstow and of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint John Walthamstow both in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Walthamstow in the said county and diocese from the said parish of Walthamstow at the junction of Palmerston-road with Mansfield-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Mansfield-road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Erskine-road and extending thence northwestward along the middle of Erskine-road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hatherley-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle Hatherley-road for a distance of nineteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hoe-street North and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of Hoe-street North (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said parish of Walthamstow from the said new parish of Saint John Walthamstow) for a distance of twentytwo and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Forest-road and Chingford-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Chingford-road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bedford-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Bedford-road for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to the point where such road turns southward and extending thence south-westward in a straight line (thereby crossing Lloyd's Park) for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the junction of the road called Winns-terrace with the road called Winnsavenue and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Winns-avenue for a distance of thirteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bemstead-road and continuing thence south-westward in the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Higham Hill-road and extending thence southeastward along the middle of Higham Hill-road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Forest-road and extending theuce south-westward along the middle of Forest-road for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Palmerston-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Palmerston-road (thereby following in part the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Walthamstow from the said parish of Walthamstow) for a distance of twenty-three and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Mansfield-road upon the last-mentioned boundary at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct

that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation. bearing date the fifth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Little Holbeck, the new parish of New Wortley, the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, and the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall, all in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-fourth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven and published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of May following a certain part of the chapelry of Holbeck, in the parish of Leeds, in the said county and diocese, was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and such district was named 'The District of Little Holbeck.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the third day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one and published in the London Gazette on the eighteenth day of the same month a certain part of the said parish of Leeds was constituted a separate district

for spiritual purposes, and such district was named 'The District of New Wortley.'

"And whereas the said districts of Little Holbeck and New Wortley have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the thirtieth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and published in the London Gazette on the day following a district chapelry was assigned to the

consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, situate in the said parish of Leeds, and such district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evan-

gelist, Wortley de Leeds.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the tenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two and published in the London Gazette on the four-teenth day of the same month a district chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Armley Hall, within the said new parish of New Wortley, and such district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall.'

Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall.'
"And whereas the said district chapelry of
Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds,
and the said district chapelry of the Holy
Trinity, Armley Hall, have under the provisions
of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years
of Her late Majesty chapter one hundred and
four become new parishes of the character
contemplated by that Act, by the abovementioned Act of the sixth and seventh years
of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and
by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second
and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty
chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Little Holbeck, the said new parish of New Wortley, the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, and the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd, Bishop of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed and scaled this or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Little Holbeck, the said new parish of New Wortley, the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, and the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall, shall be altered so that (firstly) all that portion of the said new parish of Little Holbeck which is described in the first schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured purple shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of New Wortley and (secondly) all those portions of the chapelry of Armley in the said county and diocese of the said new parish of New Wortley and of the chapelry of Beeston in the said county and diocese which are described in the second schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured green pink and orange shall be dissevered from such chapelries and new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, and (thirdly) all that portion of the said chapelry of Armley which is described in the third schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured yellow shall be dissevered from such chapelry and shall be annexed to and shall in future form

part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity,

Armley Hall.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or any of them or any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference. "THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Little Holbeck in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon and to be annexed to the new parish of New Wortley in the same

county and diocese being:-

"I. All that portion of the said new parish of Little Holbeck which is bounded upon the northwest and upon the north by the said new parish of New Wortley upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Philip, Leeds, in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining side, that is to say upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of Monk Bridge which carries Whitehall-road over the River Aire, where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Philip, Leeds, the new parish of Saint Paul, Leeds, in the said county and diocese and the said new parish of Little Holbeck all meet and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Whitehall-road for a distance of eighteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the point near the junction of Whitehall-road with Springwell-road where the middle of Whitehall-road is crossed by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Little Holbeck from the said new parish of New

"II. And also all that portion of the said new parish of Little Holbeck which is bounded upon the north-west by the said new parish of New Wortley upon the south by the chapelry of Holbeck in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Holbeck from the said new parish of Little Holbeck at the junction of Holbeck-lane and Bridge-road with Water-lane, and extending thence north-east-ward along the middle of Water-lane for a distance of two chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with Springwellroad and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Springwell-road for a distance of seventeen chains and threequarters or thereabouts to the point near the junction of Springwell-road with Whitehall-road where the middle of Spring well-road is crossed by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Little Holbeck from the said new parish of New Wortley.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, in the said county and diocese, being:—

"I. All that portion of the chapelry of Armley in the said county and diocese which is bounded upon part of the north-east by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Mary of Bethany, Tong-road, New Wortley, in the said county and diocese upon the sat and upon the south-east by the new parish of New Wortley aforesaid upon the south-west partly by the lastmentioned new parish and partly by the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, and upon the remaining part of the

north-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds, from the said chapelry of Armley crosses the middle of the Leeds, Bradford and Halifax line of the Great Northern Railway and extending theuce south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirty-three chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Armley from the said con-solidated chapelry of Saint Mary of Bethany, Tong-road, New Wortley.

"II. And also all that portion of the said new parish of New Wortley, which is bounded upon the north-west partly by the above described portion of the chapelry of Armley and partly by the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Wortley de Leeds upon the southwest by the last-named new parish and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, New Wortley, from the said new parish of New Wortley crosses the middle of the West Yorkshire Line of the Great Northern Railway and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of thirty-eight chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of New Wortley from the said chapelry of Armley

"III. And also all that portion of the chapelry of Beeston in the said county and diocese which. is bounded upon the north-east by the said new. parish of Saint John the Evangelist Wortley de Leeds upon the north partly by the last-named new parish and partly by the new parish of Saint Michael Farnley in the said county and diocese upon the north-west and upon the west by the last-named new parish and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Michael Farnley from the said chapelry of Beeston crosses the middle of the Farnley Branch Line of the London and North-Western. Railway, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Beeston from the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Wortley de Leeds.

"THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Armley Hall, in the

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may
be separated from the parishes or mother
churches to which they belong, with great " advantage, and places altogether extra-paro-" chial may in some instances with advantage be "annexed to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the " Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop " of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such "Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as "the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church " and either be constituted a separate benefice "by itself or be united to any other parish to " which it may be more conveniently annexed, or " to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, " so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or " that any extra-parochial place may with advan-" tage be annexed to any parish to which it is "contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish " for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Arch-"bishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in " writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be trans-" mitted to the said Archbishop for his considera-"tion) describing the mode in which it appears " to him that the alteration may best be effected, "and how the changes consequent on such "alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-" diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and " other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, " may be made with justice to all parties in-"terested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifi-"cation thereof as the said Archbishop may

"approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full "consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an "Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Augustus Lord Bishop of Lichfield, hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the thirtieth of July one thousand nine hundred and three to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Augustus by Divine Permission Bishop of Lichfield do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' hereby

represent to your Grace as follows:

"1. There is in the county of Stafford and within my diocese of Lichfield the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Mary Stafford the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of six thousand two hundred and four. The net annual value of the said rectory arising from Ecclesiastical Commissioners' fees, and Queen Elizabeth's Grant, is two hundred and twenty pounds or thereabouts.

twenty pounds or thereabouts.

"2. There is also in the said county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield the benefice (being a new vicarage, formerly a district chapelry) of Saint Paul Forebridge the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of three thousand nine hundred and fifty. The net aunual value of the said new vicarage arising from Ecclesiastical Commissioners' fees and pew rents is two hundred and twenty-four pounds or thereabouts.

"3. A certain district of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford containing in the whole an area of about ten acres but no population and more particularly described in the first part of the schedule to the scheme hereunder written lies to the north of the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge and contiguous to it but is separated from the remainder of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford by the River Sow.

"4. A certain district of the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge containing in the whole an area of sixty-six acres or thereabouts and a population of four hundred and five and more particularly described in the second part of the schedule to the scheme hereunder written lies to the south of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford and contiguous to it but is separated from the remainder of the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge by the said River Sow.

"5. It appears to me that under the provisions of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' the following alterations in the contents of the above-mentioned parishes may advantageously be made:—

"(a.) The separation of the district referred to in paragraph three of this representation from the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford and the annexation thereof to the said new parish of Saint Paul, Forebridge.

"(b.) The separation of the district referred to in paragraph four of this representation from the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge and the annexation thereof to the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford.

"6. The said rectory of Saint Mary Stafford is in the patronage of myself in right of my See of Lichfield.

"The said new vicarage of Saint Paul Forebridge is in the patronage of the Reverend Melville Scott, Vicar of Castlechurch in the said county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield in right of such districts shall hereafter belong to the Inhis Vicarage of Castlechurch.

"7. The Honourable and Reverend Cecil James Littleton is the present Incumbent of the said rectory of Saint Mary Stafford.

"The Reverend Joshua William Theophilus

Owen is the present Incumbent of the said new vicarage of Saint Paul Forebridge.

"8. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Bishop of Lichfield have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the district of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Saint Paul Forebridge and the district of the said parish of Saint Paul Forebridge so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford and the mode in which it appears to me the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace with the consents of the said patrons and Incumbents of the said benefices respectively to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"That a district consisting of all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford which is more particularly described in the first part of the schedule hereto and together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured round with red shall be separated from the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Saint Paul Forebridge.

"That a district consisting of all that part of the said parish of Saint Paul Forebridge which is more particularly described in the second part of the schedule hereto and together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the said map or plan and thereon coloured round with green shall be separated from the said parish of Saint Paul Forebridge and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Saint

Mary, Stafford.

"That the Incumbents of the said parishes to which such districts shall respectively be annexed shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within

such districts respectively.

"That the inhabitants of such districts shall respectively be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of the parish to which such districts shall respectively be annexed but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the church of the parish from which the same shall

have been separated.

"That marriages baptisms and churchings for the inhabitants of such districts shall be solemnized and performed in the church of the parish to which the district where such inhabitants reside shall be annexed and all fees dues ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments (except tithe rent charge but including all fees dues and other emoluments (if any) payable in respect of burials of any such inhabitants in the burial ground for the municipal borough of Stafford) arising from

cumbent of the parish to which the district where the same arise shall be annexed.

"That no alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefices or either of

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

"The SCHEDULE.

"FIRST PART.

"The district to be separated from the parish of Saint Mary Stafford in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge in

the same county and diocese being:—
"All that part of the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford bounded upon all sides except the north by the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge from the parish of Saint Mary Stafford aforesaid at the point marked 'A' where the same intersects the middle of the River Sow and extending thence westward along the middle of the bed of the said river to the point where the middle of the said river again meets the said boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge from the parish of Saint Mary Stafford aforesaid.

"SECOND PART.

"The district to be separated from the said new parish of Saint Paul, Forebridge, and to be annexed to the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford

being:—
"All that part of the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge bounded on all sides except the south by the said parish of Saint Mary Stafford and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge from the parish of Saint Mary Stafford aforesaid at the point mentioned in the first part hereof and marked 'A' where the said boundary intersects the middle of the River Sow and extending thence eastward along the middle of the bed of the said river to the point where the same meets the parliamentary and municipal boundary of the borough of Stafford and extending thence first in an easterly and then in a northerly direction to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Forebridge from the parish of Saint Mary Stafford aforesaid.

"CONSENTS.

"We, the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Bishop of Lichfield being the patron or person entitled to collate to the above-mentioned benefice of Saint Mary Stafford in case the same were now vacant the Honourable and Reverand Cecil James Littleton, Clerk, the Incumbent of the same benefice, the Reverend Melville Scott, Clerk, being the patron or person entitled to collate to the above-named benefice of Saint Paul Forebridge in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend Joshua William Theophilus Owen Clerk the Incumbent of the same benefice do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the scheme above proposed and every matter and thing therein contained.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Arch-

bishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report dated the fifteenth of October one thousand nine hundred and three, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council,

"That marriages baptisms and churchings shall be solemnized and performed in the parish church of Saint Chad for the inhabitants of such district and all fees dues ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments (except tithe rent charge) arising from such district shall hereafter belong to the Incumbent of the said parish of Saint Chad, Stafford.

"That no alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefices or either of

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

"SCHEDULE.

"I, the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Saint Davids do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth

section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Brecon and my diocese of Saint Davids the vicarage of Llanafanfawr with the chapelries of Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan now annexed and constituting together one benefice.

"That Llanafanfawr and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan are distinct and separate civil parishes defined by well-known metes and bounds the populations whereof at the census of the year one thousand nine hundred and one were four hundred and fifty-seven and one hundred and

eighty respectively.

"That Llanafanfechan is also a separate and distinct civil parish defined by well-known metes and bounds and having a population which at the census of the year one thousand nine hundred and one was one hundred and twenty-nine.

"That there are three churches pertaining to the said benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechau and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan which churches are respectively situate within the civil parishes of Llanafanfawr, Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and Llanafanfechan and that the church of Llanafanfechan is distant from the church of Llanafanfawr three and a half miles in a direct line and four miles by the nearest road and is distant from the church of Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan four miles in a direct line and five and a half miles by the nearest road.

"That baptisms churchings marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the said church of Llanafanfechan as well as in the churches of Llanafanfawr and

Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan aforesaid.

"That there is a house of residence belonging

to the said present united benefice.

"That the income of the said present benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan is respectively as follows

namely:

"The income of Llanafanfawr certain apportioned tithe rentcharge commuted at one hundred and sixty-nine pounds seven shillings and one penny besides rents from glebe land amounting to eighteen pounds per annum and the yearly sum of fifty pounds received from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

"The income of Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan certain apportioned tithe rentcharge commuted at sixty-seven pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence and the income of Llanafanfechan certain apportioned tithe rentcharge conmuted at thirtyeight pounds six shillings and eightpence.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the said chapelry of Llanafan-fechan have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in any of the churches of the said present united

"That there is also in the same county of Brecon and my diocese of Saint Davids the vicarage of Llanganten which is a distinct and separate civil parish defined by well-known metes and bounds the population of which at the census of the year one thousand nine hundred and one was two hundred and five.

"That Llanganten has a parish church wherein baptisms, churchings, marriages, and burials have heretofore been and are now performed and that such benefice has no house of residence.

"That the parish of Llanganten is contiguous to Llanafanfechan and that the church of Llanganten is distant from the church of Llanafanfechan by the nearest road about two and a half miles.

"That the income of Llanganten consists of certain rents of glebe lands amounting yearly to forty-six pounds, an annual payment of fiftyeight pounds nine shillings and sixpence from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and the yearly sum of forty pounds received from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan as well as of the benefice of Llanganten is vested in me by virtue of my Bishopric and that the Reverend William Jones is Incumbent of the said benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and the Reverend Herbert Davies is Incumbent

of the said benefice of Llanganten.

"That it appears to me that the whole of the chapelry of the parish of Llanafanfechan as now existing which now forms part of the benefice or vicarage of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfibangel Bryn-Pabuan may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated for ecclesiastical purposes from the said vicarage and parishes of Llanafanfawr with Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and be annexed to the vicarage and parish of Llanganten in order to form one united benefice for ecclesiastical purposes.

"And that the endowment of the said united benefice so formed should consist of the present income of Llanganten only and that the said benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan shall after the separation of Llanafanfechan therefrom retain all the income now pertaining to it including the commuted tithe rentcharge of Llanafanfechan amounting to thirty-eight pounds six shillings and eightpence.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rentcharges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to the patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all persons interested. And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of me John Lord Bishop as aforesaid the patron by virtue of my said Bishopric of both the said benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and the said benefice of Llanganten and of the Reverend William Jones the present Incumbent of such benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and the Reverend Herbert Davies the present Incumbent of such benefice of Llanganten that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"That the said civil parish of Llanafanfechan be separated for ecclesiastical purposes from the civil parishes of Llanafanfawr and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan to which the former now belongs for ecclesiastical purposes and that the said civil parish of Llanafanfechan be annexed to the said vicarage and parish of Llanganten to which it is contiguous in order to form one united benefice

for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That such united benefice of Llanganten with Llanafanfechan shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of

Llanganten is now subject to.

"That the present income of the benefice of Llanganten shall belong to the Incumbent of the said united benefice of Llanganten with Llanafanfechan and that the present income of the benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan including the commuted tithe rentcharge of Llanafanfechan shall continue to belong to the Incumbent of the benefice of Llanafanfawr with Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan.

"That all fees for churchings marriages and burials in respect of the inhabitants of the parish of Llanafanfechan and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect thereof and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent of the said intended united benefice

of Llanganteu with Llanafanfechan.

"That the Incumbent of the said intended united benefice of Llanganten with Llanafanfechan shall have exclusive cure of souls within

the limits of such united benefice.

"That the right of nominating a minister to the church of such united benefice of Llanganten with Llanafanfechan shall be for ever vested and be in the Lord Bishop of the diocese of Saint

Davids for the time being.

"That the inhabitants of Llanafanfechan shall be exonerated from all liability if any such now exists to repair the churches of Llanafanfawr and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan or either of them or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in either of the said parishes of Llanafanfawr and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan.

"CONSENTS.

"I John Lord Bishop of Saint Davids as the patron or person entitled to nominate to the vicarage of Llanafanfawr with Llanafanfechan and Llanfihangel Bryn-Pabuan and to the vicarage of Llanganten both in the county of Brecon if the same were now vacant.

"And I the Reverend William Jones the Vicar of the said vicarage of Llanafanfawr with Lianafanfechan and Lianfihangel Bryn-Pabuan.

"That the Right Reverend Edward Carr Lord Bishop of Peterborough as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the perpetual curacy or vicarage of Sutton and the perpetual curacy or vicarage of Upton both in the county of Northampton having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

1. This Order may be cited as "The Zanzibar

Order in Council, 1903.

2. This Order shall be construed as one with "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1897," hereinafter called the "Principal Order."

3.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, a Second Assistant Judge may be appointed for the Court for Zanzibar.

(2.) The Second Assistant Judge shall be appointed in like manner and upon the same con ditions as, and shall possess the like qualifications as are required for, the Assistant Judge.

(3.) The Second Assistant Judge shall have the

same powers as the Assistant Judge.

- (4.) In case of the illness or temporary absence of the Second Assistant Judge, or of his temporary appointment as Judge or Assistant Judge, the Consul-General may appoint either a person qualified to be appointed Second Assistant Judge, or a person appointed to hold a subordinate Court under the Principal Order, or a commissioned Consular officer to act as Second Assistant Judge.
- 4. The Assistant Judge and the Second Assistant Judge shall respectively undertake such part of the duties prescribed in the Principal Order for the Assistant Judge and such other duties of a judicial, magisterial, or legal nature as the Judge, with the approval of the Secretary of State, shall direct.
- 5. In the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence from Zanzibar of the Consul-General for the time being, all and every the powers and authorities by the Principal Order granted to him shall, until His Majesty's further pleasure is signified through the Secretary of State, be vested in the senior Consular officer in His Majesty's service for the time being in Zanzibar.
- 6. The production of a grant of probate or of letters of administration shall, notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in any Indian Act or Law in force in Zanzibar or in the Principal Order, be necessary to establish the right to recover or receive any part of the estate or effects of any deceased person situate in Zan-
- 7. The powers of the Secretary of State with respect to the application to Zanzibar of enactments and Acts of the Governor-General of India in Council or of the Governor of Bombay in Council under Article 11 of the Principal Order, and of laws and ordinances for the time being in force in African possessions of His Majesty, under Article 13 of that Order shall, on the commencement of this Order, be transferred to the Consul-General, but those powers shall be exercised by him only by means of Regulations made under and subject in all respects to the provisions of Article 47 of the Principal Order.
- 8. The Consul-General may by Regulations made under, and subject in all respects to the provisions of Article 47 of the Principal Order, repeal or amend with respect to Zanzibar any enactments, Acts, laws, or ordinances which are made applicable or have been brought into operation in Zanzibar by or under any of the provisions of Articles 11 and 13 of the Principal Order.
- 9. In Article 9 of the Principal Order the word "Judge" shall be substituted for the word "Consul-General."

The following provisions of the Principal

Order are hereby repealed:—
Article 3 (iii). The words from "including" to "Consul-General."
Article 9. The word "Consul-General."

Article 11 (e) (iii). The words "relating to civil or criminal procedure or to procedure in bankruptcy.'

Article 31 (2) and Article 32. The words "in

Zanzibar."

wardens of such parish:
And whereas the Local Government Board. after giving to the Incumbents and the churchwardens of the parishes of Saint Peter and

Saint Paul, Colesbill, Saint Luke, Spratton, Saint Mary, Tetbury, and Saint Peter, Brandon, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representations, made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-grounds should be opened in the civil parishes of Coleshill, Spratton, Tetbury, and Brandon without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parishes as hereinafter directed:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burialgrounds shall be opened in the said civil parishes without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued as follows, viz. :-

COLESHILL.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, Coleshill, in the county of Warwick; and also in the churchyard and the burial ground adjoining the churchyard which was opened in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, except as follows:-

In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard or the said burial ground, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

SPRATTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Luke, Spratton, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

TETBURY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Tetbury, in the county of Gloucester; and in the churchyard, except as follows:

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard, the burial may be allowed at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.

(c.) In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofere taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom, or of any member of a family for which, such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Brandon.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Peter, Brandon, in I the county of Suffolk; and in the churchyard, except as follows:-

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of All Souls College, Oxford, on the 21st day of November, 1903 (and sealed on the 5th day of December, 1903), amending Statute XIIa, Clause 2, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":-

Whereas the University of Oxford Commissioners, under and by virtue of all and every the powers in that behalf enabling them contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, did by an Instrument under their seal dated the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, make certain Statutes thereunto annexed for the College of All Souls of the Faithful Departed, commonly called All Souls College, in the University of Oxford.

And whereas such Statutes were approved by Her late Majesty in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

And whereas No. 12a, Clause 2, one of such Statutes is in the words and figures following,

that is to say :-

"2. From and after the 2nd day of November 1887, elections may be held to not more than three Fellowships with emoluments in every year (exclusively of any elections under Statute III, cl. 10) until provision is made out of the revenues of the College for all the purposes provided for in Statutes IV, V, and VI. Two of the Fellowships which may be so filled up in each year shall be Fellowships awarded after examination in subjects connected with the studies of Law and History. So long as the foregoing limitation continues in force not more than one election may be made in each year under Statute III, cl. 10.

And whereas at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of our said College, specially summoned for that purpose and held on the twenty-first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and three, it was by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present at such Meeting and voting Resolved that in Statute 12a, Clause 2 of the College Statutes the paragraph-

"So long as the foregoing limitation continues in force not more than one election may be made in each year under Statute III, cl. 10" should be repealed. And that in lieu thereof the following paragraph should be substituted, viz.:-

"So long as the foregoing limitation continues in force, the number of Fellows elected under Statute III, cl. 10, entitled to receive emolument shall not at any time exceed such number as would then have been entitled to Fellowships under that Clause had one such Fellow been elected in each year after this Statute came into operation, and shall not in any case exceed seven. The Fellows entitled to receive emolument shall be determined according to priority of election under the said Clause: provided that a Fellow elected under the said Clause, who immediately on the expiration of the term of his Fellowship is reelected under the same Clause, shall continue to be one of the Fellows entitled to receive emolument."

Now we the said College, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby submit the aforesaid alterations so made by us in the Statutes governing our said College to the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, and humbly pray that the same may be approved and confirmed.

Woodlark,

III.—(a) The period during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall be extended throughout the county of Dorset, so far as regards the Birds added to the schedule of the Act by Clause II of this Order, and all the Birds mentioned in the said schedule, except the Mallard Wild Duck), Golden Plover, Pochard, Sheldrake, Shoveller, Snipe, Teal, and Widgeon, so as to be between the 31st day of January and the 1st day of September in any year.

(b) So far as regards the Mallard (Wild Duck), Golden Plover, Pochard, Sheldrake, Shoveller, Snipe, Teal, and Widgeon, the close time shall be altered so as to be between the last day of February and the 1st day of September in any year.

All Eggs protected in Certain Areas.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of any species of Wild Bird is prohibited within the undermentioned areas for a period of five years from the date of this Order:—

(a) The districts or areas known as the Chesil Bank, together with East and West Fleet. The coast or cliffs from the Chesil Bank around the Island of Portland to Portland Roads. The coast of Portland Roads from Portland Castle to Bincleave Rocks, thence around the Weymouth Backwater and Lodmoor to Preston Beach and the coast and cliffs to Redcliff Point.

From thence the coast and cliffs to St. Albans Head, Durlston Head, Swanage, and Studland Bays, to Little Sea.

And in every case a distance of 2 furlongs inland from the nearest point of high water mark or edge of marsh land.

(b) The district or area within a line drawn from the coast at the south end of Little Sea to a point within 1 furlong of Nath Point, thence to Wych, along the road to Corfe Castle through Wareham to Stroud Bridge, on the Bere and Wareham main road, thence to a point on the Poole and Dorchester main road about 3 furlongs westward from Morden Mill, thence along the said Poole and Dorchester main road to Morden Mill, Park Corner, Slepe, North Holton Farm, Lytchett Minster through Upton to Fleets Corner, Longfleet and Poole, thence along the main road from Poole to the county boundary at Bournemouth, and along such boundary to the coast; which said districts and areas are outlined in red on five Ordnance Sheets, numbered 328, 329, 341, 342, and 343, respectively, deposited with the Clerk of the County Council, each sheet being sealed with the seal of the Secretary of State, and dated the 26th November, 1903.

BRANDON AND DISTRICT (SWINE-FEVER)
PROHIBITION OF MOVEMENT ORDER
OF 1903.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

Movement of swine into out of or within Scheduled District.

1. No swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such

District without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within such District.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

3.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows a pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act,

1894.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the Brandon and District (Swine-Fever) Prohibition of Movement Order of 1903.

Bye-laws and Regulations with respect to Tramways.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Council of the above Borough, as the Promoters under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, made the following Bye-laws at a Meeting held on 2nd December, 1903, at the Town Hall, Burnley, namely:—

COUNTY BOROUGH OF BURNLEY.

Burnley Corporation Tramways.

"Bye-laws and Regulations made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Burnley, as Cromoters under the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Burnley Corporation Act, 1900, with respect to any tramways or portions of tramways for the time being belonging to or worked by them.

Repeal of former Bye-laws and Regulations.

1. From and after the date of these Bye-laws coming into force, all Bye-laws and Regulations heretofore made by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, or by the Burnley and District Tramways Company Limited, with respect to tramways within the said borough, shall be repealed; but any proceedings pending at the time of such repeal may be continued and prosecuted as if such repeal had not taken effect.

Interpretation.

2. Throughout these Bye-laws, the word "Corporation" means the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Burnley; the word "tramways" means the tramway system for the time being worked by the Corporation, whether situate within the County Borough of Burnley or in any other district; the word "car" means any carriage or car run upon the tramways for the conveyance of passeugers; the word "conductor" means any officer or servant of the Corporation having charge of or 'helping in the charge of a car; and the word "driver" means any officer or servant of the Corporation driving or helping to drive a car.

Entering and leaving Cars.

3. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a car by the step of the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise, unless so directed by the conductor.

All persons desiring to alight from any carshall do so before any person boards such carfor the purpose of travelling thereon, and all persons desiring to board the car shall permit such person to alight as aforesaid.

Smoking.

4. No person shall smoke or carry a lighted pipe, or cigar, or cigarette, inside any car, except in a compartment specially set apart for the purpose.

Musical Instruments.

5. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any car, sing, or shout, or sound or play upon any musical instrument.

Offensive language or conduct.

- 6. No person shall swear or use obscene indecent or offensive language or conduct himself offensively whilst in or upon any car, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car or tramway station or premises used in connection with the tramway system, or in any way wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger. No person shall distribute advertisements or tracts of any kind, or heg or collect money, alms, or subscriptions, or sell any article, or play any game, or gamble, or deposit remnants of food or fruit in or upon any car.
 - 7. No person shall spit in or on any car.

Objectionable Persons.

- 8. No person in a state of intoxication, or affected with any contagious or infectious disease, or unfit from any other cause, in the opinion of the conductor, to be a passenger on the car, shall enter or mount upon any car, and any such person found in or upon any car shall be immediately removed from the car by or under the direction of the conductor.
- "Contagious or infectious disease" means any of the following diseases:—Smallpox, cholera, diphtheria, membranous croup, erysipelas, the disease known as scarlatina or scarlet fever, and measles; also the fevers known by any of the following names—typhus, typhoid, enteric, relapsing, continued or puerperal.
- 9. No person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of a conductor of a car, soil or injure the seats, linings, cushions, or curtains of the car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, nor any person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might, for any other reason, be offensive to any passenger, shall be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any car, and may be prevented from entering or remaining in or upon any car.

No such person shall enter in or upon any car after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if any such person be found in or upon any car, he shall, on the request of the conductor, leave such car upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

Dogs.

10. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any car, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into a car after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any car shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the car immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by, or under the direction of, the conductor.

Damage to Car.

11. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the seats, cushions, curtains or linings of any car, or remove or deface any number-plate, printed, painted, or other notice or writing, or any advertisement, in or on any car, or mark, break, or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any car. No person other than the conductor or driver shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards, or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley-cord, or any part of a car or the equipment thereof, or signal a car to start. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to pay the amount of any damage done, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations.

Payment of Fares.

12. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Corporation, the fare legally demandable for the journey, and obtain a ticket therefor. Such ticket shall not be transferable, and shall be available only for the journey and on the car for and on which the same is issued. Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his or her journey.

Tickets.

13. Each passenger shall show his ticket when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Corporation, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

14. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the tramways belonging to or worked by the Corporation, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

Luggage.

15. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, or on the rear or conductor's platform, or in a compartment specially set apart for the conveyance of parcels, and not elsewhere on any car. The conductor may decline to take into or upon any car any luggage which, from its size or otherwise, is not suitable for conveyance in or upon such car.

Travelling on Steps, &c.

16. No person other than the driver or the conductor of a car, or a servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty, shall travel or ride upon the steps, outside rails, buffers, or guards of any car, or shall stand on the outside, or, except by express permission of the conductor first obtained, upon any platform or in the interior of any car.

17. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall board a car, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of a car.

Entering Full Cars.

18. When any car contains in the interior thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided in such interior, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain therein, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained. When any car contains on the outside thereof

When any car contains on the outside thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided on such outside, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain thereon. Disabled Cars.

19. If at any time a car becomes disabled, or from any cause is unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon the request of the conductor, leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares, they shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid, but on production of their tickets shall be allowed to travel by the next available car on the same day for the remainder of the distance in respect of which they have paid their fares.

No person shalf, except with the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or injured car.

Cars proceeding to Sheds.

20. No person other than the conductor or driver shall travel upon a car upon or along any siding or approach to a car depôt, or upon or along any tramway within a car depôt.

Entering or leaving Cars in motion.

21. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any car whilst in motion.

Firearms, &c.

22. No person shall travel in or on any car with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument, or implement, or any material or substance which may be dangerous or offensive to the passengers, provided that nothing contained in this Bye-law shall apply to persons in the Naval, Military, Reserve, or Auxiliary Forces carrying unloaded firearms.

Obstructing Officers.

23. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any car or tramway of the Corporation.

Enforcing Bye-laws.

24. Every conductor and driver of a car shall, to the best of his ability, enforce these Byelaws, and prevent the breach thereof, and if any such conductor or driver fails to enforce the same as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach thereof.

Penalty.

25. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

Power to remove Passengers committing offence.

26. Any person who shall commit, whilst on any car, any legal offence, or any breach of these Bye-laws, shall, in addition to being liable to a penalty, be liable to be immediately removed from the car, and if such person shall have paid his fare, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of his fare so paid.

Copy of Bye-laws to be placed in Cars.

27. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each car in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

These Bye-laws and Regulations shall come into force on the first day of March, 1904.

The foregoing Bye-laws were made at a Monthly Meeting of the Council of the County Borough of Burnley, held on the second day of December, 1903.
