PORT OF PORT TALBOT.

Limits of Port.

We, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of "The Customs Consolidation Act, 1876," appoint Port Talbot to be a port in that part of the United Kingdom called Wales, and do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at a point on the coast of the county of Glamorgan, distant one thousand and fifty yards or thereabouts in a direct southerly direction from the tower of the Jersey Marine Hotel, and situate eight hundred yards or thereabouts to the west of the River Neath at its junction with the sea, such point being the eastern limit of the Port of Swansea, and shall continue along the coast of the said county in a south-easterly direction to Nash Point, the north-western limit of the Port of Cardiff, and shall
