ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 30TH DECEMBER 1903.)

SCARBOROUGH (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1903.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Provisions of Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896 applied to the Borough of Scarborough.

1.-(1.) The provisions of the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896 shall apply to the borough of Scarborough, but no swine, fat or store, shall be moved out of the said borough, except as expressly authorized by this Order.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine where they are moved through that borough by railway from a place outside that borough to another place outside that borough without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within that borough.

(3.) Swine may be moved with a Licence of an Inspector of the Board or of a person authorised by the Board to grant the same, which Licence will only be granted where the Board, after inquiry, are satisfied that exceptional circumstances render the movement necessary or expedient.

Offences.

2. If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as afcresaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act. 1894.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the sixth day of January, nineteen hundred and
