#### PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some " instances with advantage be annexed to parishes "or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical "purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it "shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, "or when the Bishop of any diocese shall re-"present to the said Archbishop that any such "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the "diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, "may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself, or be "united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, "or be constituted a separate parish for eccle-" siastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing "(the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted "to the said Archbishop for his consideration) "describing the mode in which it appears to him "that the alteration may best be effected, and "how the changes consequent on such alteration "in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe " lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesias-"tical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect

"to patronage and rights to pews, may be made "with justice to all parties interested; and if "the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall "consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or "modification thereof, and shall certify the same "and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to "His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for "His Majesty in Council to make an Order for "carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, "as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Saint Davids, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the sixth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and three, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Saint Davids do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Radnor and my diocese of Saint Davids 'the vicarage of Nantmel (hereinafter referred to as the benefice of Nantmel) which is a distinct and separate ecclesiastical parish defined by well-known metes and bounds and having a population that by the census of nine-teen hundred and one amounted to nine hundred and forty-four.

"That there is also in the same county of Radnor and my diocese of Saint Davids the vicarage of Rhayader (hereinafter referred to as the benefice of Rhayader) which is also a distinct and separate ecclesiastical parish defined by well-known metes and bounds adjoining the said benefice of Nantmel and has a population that by the census of one thousand nine hundred and one

amounted to one thousand two hundred and lifteen.

"That the benefice of Nantmel is now held by the Reverend Arthur George Adamson and has a vicarage house or residence and that the benefice of Rhayader is now held by the Reverend Leonard Henry Evans and has also a vicarage house or residence.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Nantmel as well as of the benefice of Rhayader is vested in me by virtue of my Bishopric.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Nantmel is two hundred and fifteen pounds and of the said benefice of Rhayader two hundred

and thirty-six pounds.

"That it appears to me that a portion of the benefice of Nantmel comprising a certain mission church or chapel of ease known as the Guifron Mission Church may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be with advantage separated from the benefice of Nantmel and annexed to the said benefice of Rhayader.

"That the portion of the benefice of Nantmel proposed so to be separated from that benefice and united to the benefice of Rhayader adjoins the said benefice of Rhayader and has a present population of about two hundred and fifty and an area of seven thousand acres or thereabouts and is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan annexed to the scheme appended to the representation being thereon edged with

pink.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the parish of Nantmel have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the said church or chapel of ease known as the Guifron Mission Church nor does it appear that any of the inhabitants of the portion of the parish of Nantmel so proposed to be separated from that parish have any such right to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the parish church of Nantmel.

"That it is proposed that the said church or chapel of ease known as the Guifron Mission Church should cease to be a chapel of ease to the parish of Nantmel and should become a chapel of

ease to the parish of Rhayader.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all persons interested.

"And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of myself as patron in right of my See of the said benefices of Nantmel and Rhayader and of the Reverend Arthur George Adamson Incumbent of the benefice of Nantmel and of the Reverend Leonard Henry Evans Incumbent of the benefice of Rhayader that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents

to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate from the benefice of Nantmel in the county of Radnor all that

portion of the benefice of Nantmel which is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan attached hereto being thereon edged with pink and contains seven thousand acres or thereabouts and adjoins on its western side the benefice of Rhayader in the said county of Radnor and to unite the same to the said adjoining benefice of Rhayader so that it may become hereafter for ecclesiastical purposes a part of such benefice of Rhayader of which the parish church for the time being of the said benefice of Rhayader shall be the parish church.

"That the said benefice of Rhayader so enlarged shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice was

subject to before being so enlarged.

"That the church or chapel of ease known as the Guifron Mission Church which has been duly licensed for Divine service and is now a chapel of ease to the benefice of Nantmel and is situate in that portion of the benefice of Nantmel so to be separated therefrom shall cease to be a chapel of ease to the benefice of Nantmel and shall be a chapel of ease to the benefice of Rhayader.

"That the said benefices of Nantmel and Rhayader shall respectively retain all the emoluments to which they were respectively entitled.

"That marriages in respect of the inhabitants of the said portion of the benefice of Nantmel so to be separated from that benefice and united to the said benefice of Rhayader shall hereafter be performed in the parish church of Rhayader or in any church or chapel of ease belonging to the said benefice of Rhayader which now is or hereafter shall be licensed for the solemnization of marriages and that the fees for all such marriages usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Rhayader.

"That baptisms churchings and burials in respect of the inhabitants of the said portion of the benefice of Nantmel so to be separated from that benefice and united to the said benefice of Rhayader shall hereafter be performed in the parish church of Rhayader or in any other church or chapel of ease belonging to the said benefice of Rhayader and duly licensed for Divine service and that the fees for all such offices in relation thereto usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Phayader.

bent of the said benefice of Rhayader.

"That the Incumbent of the said benefice of Rhayader shall also have cure of souls within the limits of the said portion so as to be united to such benefice as part of his benefice.

"That the right of patronage or presentation to the said benefice of Rhayader shall remain as

heretofore.

"That the inhabitants of the said portion of the benefice of Nantmel so to be separated therefrom and united to the benefice of Rhayader shall be exonerated from all liability (if any exists) to repair the parish church of Nantmel or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected belonging to the said benefice of Nantmel and such inhabitants of such separated portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Rhayader but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Nantmel.

" CONSENTS.

"I John Lord Bishop of Saint Davids as the patron in right of my See entitled to present or nominate to the benefice of Nantmel in the county of Radnor and to the benefice of Rhayader in the said county of Radnor.

"And I the Reverend Arthur George Adamson the Incumbent of the said benefice of Nantmel and I the Reverend Leonard Henry Evans the Incumbent of the said benefice of Rhayader do hereby signify to your Grace our consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the said portion of the benefice of Nantmel from that benefice and uniting the same to the adjoining benefice of Rhayader for ecclesiastical purposes.'

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop

for his consideration;

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report dated the twenty-eighth of October one thousand nine hundred and three, which said report is in the words and figures following:

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby

report to Your Majesty in Council:
"That the Right Reverend John Bishop of Saint Davids has represented to us (amongst

other things):

"That there are in the county of Radnor and his diocese of Saint Davids the benefice (being a vicarage) of Nantmel and the benefice (being

a vicarage) of Rhayader.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that a portion of the said benefice of Nautmel comprising a certain mission church or chapel of ease known as the Guifron Mission Church and more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan annexed to the scheme appended to the representation of the said Lord Bishop and thereon edged with pink may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Nantmel and annexed to the said parish of Rhayader for ecclesiastical purposes only under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all persons interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop of Saint Davids as the patron in right of his See entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice of Nantmel and the said benefice of Rhayader in case the same were now vacant, the Reverend Arthur George Adamson the present Incumbent of the benefice of Nantmel and the Reverend Leonard Henry Evans, the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Rhayader has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to

are hereunto annexed.

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"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868 duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the seventeenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868' section three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of

Lichfield.

"Whereas under and by virtue of an Order in Council of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and duly published in the London Gazette of the seventh of the following month there is now payable by us to the Dean and Chapter of Lichfield an annual sum of five thousand and five hundred pounds until the said Dean and Chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates sufficient to secure to them a clear annual income therefrom after deducting rates, taxes, the cost of agency, and other outgoings amounting to five thousand and five hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have

not yet been so put into possession of such real estates but there is situate in the Vicarage Close, Lichfield, a house and premises shown upon the tracing annexed hereto of which a portion coloured green thereon forms part of the property vested in the said Dean and Chapter and the remainder coloured red thereon is vested in us in

fee simple.

"And whereas it is desirable that the whole of the house and premises aforesaid should be in one undivided ownership, and the said Dean and Chapter have applied to us and we have agreed to transfer to them our interest in such part of the said premises as is coloured red on the said tracing in consideration of the reduction by the sum of twenty-seven pounds per annum of the annual sum of five thousand and five hundred pounds aforesaid.

"And whereas the terms of such transfer are

in our opinion fair and reasonable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield and with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Bishop of Lichfield as Visitor of the said Dean and Chapter testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals that upon and from the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any further conveyance or act in the law the property coloured red upon the said tracing annexed hereto with its appurtenances shall subject always to the liabilities and charges, if any, to which the said property may now be specifically liable be transferred to the said Dean and Chapter in the manner contemplated by the said Act and that they shall be entitled to the rents profits and proceeds thereof as from the twenty-ninth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, and that in consideration for such transfer as aforesaid the payment of the annual sum of five thousand and five hundred pounds aforesaid shall be reduced by the annual sum of twenty-seven pounds as from the said twenty-ninth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and three.

And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of his said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868 duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words and figures following, that is to

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868' section three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of

Lincoln.

"Whereas under and by virtue of an Order in Council of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria bearing date the fifth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy and duly published in the London Gazette of the eighth day of the same menth there is now payable by us to the Dean and Chapter of Lincoln an annual sum of nine thousand and two hundred pounds until the said Dean and Chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates sufficient to secure to them in addition to the income from certain other estates a clear annual income therefrom after deducting rates taxes the cost of agency and other outgoings amounting to the annual sum aforesaid.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have not yet been so put into possession of such real estates but there is vested in us subject to a lease granted for lives certain property shown by the green colour upon the tracing annexed hereto whereon are erected the school premises in which the choir boys of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln

are educated and boarded.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have recently acquired by purchase the estate and interest demised by the said lease in the said property shown by the green colour on the said tracing and the school is under their sole direction and control and they have applied to us to convey to them our reversionary interest in the said property shown by the colour green on the said tracing which we have agreed to do in considera-tion of the reduction by the sum of thirtyfour pounds and ten shillings per annum of the

annual sum of nine thousand and two hundred pounds aforesaid.

"And whereas the terms of such transfer are

in our opinion fair and reasonable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln and with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Bishop of Lincoln as Visitor of the said Dean and Chapter testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals that upon and from the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any further conveyance or act in the law the reversion in fee simple expectant upon the determination of the said lease of and in the premises thereby demised being the property shown by the green colour on the said tracing shall subject always to the liabilities and charges if any to which the said property may now be specifically liable be transferred to the said Dean and Chapter in the manner contemplated by the said Act as from the twenty-ninth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and three and so that the term created by the said lease shall be merged and absolutely extinguished in the freehold and inheritance of and in the said premises and that in consideration for such transfer as aforesaid the payment of the annual sum of nine thousand and two hundred pounds shall be reduced by the annual sum of thirty-four pounds and ten shillings as from the said twenty-ninth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and three.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the said Act or of any other Act of Parlia-

ment."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said A. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850, that is to say, the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-one, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Hersaid late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the seventeenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850, that is to say, the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter forty-one, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of

Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for setting out and constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes, and annexing such district to the consecrated church of All Saints Stretford situate within the limits of the parish (sometime a district under the said Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Matthew Stretford within the original limits of the parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district for spiritual purposes comprising a part of the said parish of Saint Matthew Stretford shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of All Saints Stretford which church was not consecrated under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her

said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Saint Matthew Stretford which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be severed and disannexed from the said parish of Saint Matthew Stretford and shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of All Saints Stretford and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes and shall be named 'The District of All Saints Stretford.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other

Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of All Saints Stretford being :-"All that part of the parish (sometime district under the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Matthew Stretford in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded upon the west partly by the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Davyhulme, and partly by the new parish of Saint Catherine, Barton-upon-Irwell, upon part of the north-east by the district of Saint Cuthbert, Old Trafford, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say upon the remaining part of the north-east upon the south-east, upon the south and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district of Saint Cuthbert Old Trafford from the said parish of Saint Matthew Stretford at the point in the Duke of Bridgewater's Canal which is called Waters Meeting and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the culvert which carries the said canal over Longford Brook and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said brook for a distance of seventeen chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where such brook is crossed by the middle of the line of the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirty-five

chains or thereabouts to the point (near the southern end of Stretford Railway Station) opposite to the middle of Radnor-street and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of Radnor-street (thereby crossing the Duke of Bridgewater's Canal) for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to the junction of such street with Chester-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Chester-road for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Herbertstreet and extending theuce north-westward along the middle of Herbert-street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cyprus-street and extending thence south-west-ward along the middle of Cyprus-street for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with School-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of School-road for a distance of twenty-two chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Barton-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Barton-road for a distance of sixty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where such road crosses the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Matthew, Stretford, from the said new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin, Davyhulme.'

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and Incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de

Coronatore Eligendo for the purpose of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the

number of those who have been theretofore cus-

tomarily elected in such County, to order that such County shall be divided into such and so

many districts for the purposes of the said Act

as to His Majesty, with the advice aforesaid,

shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

Adwick - upon - Dearne, Bolton - upon - Dearne, Denaby, Mexborough, Darfield, Wombwell and

Hoyland Nether;

and that thereupon such places should be added to and comprised in the Wakefield Coroner's District and the Doncaster Coroner's District as follows:—

1. A shoal, on which there is a depth of 5 fathoms, is situated at a distance of 2 miles N. 7° E. from Lillhällan heacon; it is marked by a red spar buoy with a ball between two downturned brooms at a topmark.

2. A red spar buoy with a ball under a downturned broom as a topmark will be established to mark the west side of the 17 feet patch situated at a distance of 5 cables N. 19° W. from Lillhällan beacon.

3. A black and white spar buoy with a ball as a topmark will be established to mark the east side of the patch situated at a distance of 13 miles N. 60° W. from Lillhällan beacon. This patch has a depth of 22 feet on it, and not 30 feet as shown on our charts.

4. A black spar buoy with two balls as a topmark will be established in a depth of 25 feet at a distance of 2 miles S. 70° W. from Lillhällan beacon, to mark the east side of the 14 feet shoal.

Buoys withdrawn.

5. The red spar buoy and the black and white spar buoy situated at distances of 1 mile N. 3° E. and 2½ miles S. 83° W. respectively from Lillhällan beacon will be withdrawn.
