The following Addresses were presented to His Majesty on the occasion of Their Majesties' visit to Cambridge, on Tuesday, the 1st instant:-

To Their Most Excellent Majesties the King and Queen.

The Loyal and Dutiful Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Cambridge.

May it please Your Majesties.

We, Your faithful lieges, humbly desire to offer a most hearty welcome on Your Majesties' visit to this ancient Borough, the first paid during the present Reign.

It adds to our pleasure to-day that Your Majesties are accompanied by Her Royal High-

ness the Princess Victoria.

The inhabitants of Cambridge have been honoured by many Royal Visits in the past, and we are proud to point to favours which the town has received from the hands of the Sovereign in a roll of Charters dating back for seven centuries.

The last two occasions when the Corporation of the Borough was graciously permitted to approach the Sovereign in Person occurred, Sire, during the historic visits to our town of Your Majesty's august Mother, our beloved Queen Victoria, and Your illustrious Father, His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, who was for so many years Chancellor of the University.

We do not forget that our King was for a time a Student at our Ancieut University, and that more recently Your Majesties' lamented Son, the late Duke of Clarence and Avondale, still affectionately remembered among us as Prince Edward, resided in our midst within the walls of Your Majesty's own College.

We gratefully recognize in this visit of Your Majesties to Cambridge to-day one more proof that there is no abatement in the deep interest which The King has so long felt in the prosperity

and the progress of that renowned University with the fortunes of which the material interests of the town are inseparably connected.

We respectfully thank Your Majesties for this opportunity of testifying to our unabated loyalty to the Crown and our faithful allegiance to Your Royal House.

"On behalf of Queen Alexandra and Myself I thank you for your Loyal and Dutiful Address, and for your kindly reference to the Princess Victoria.

"It is a great pleasure to Us to visit your ancient town, which will ever be of special interest to Me as a Member of your University. I am much touched by your allusion to the very happy visits paid to Cambridge by Queen Victoria, My beloved Mother. These visits were on the occasions of the conferring of a Degree on My dear Father, and subsequently of his installa-tion as Chancellor—a position which gave him much gratification and enabled him to confer lasting benefits on the University.

We, the County Council of Cambridgeshire, upon the occasion of this the first visit which Your Majesty has paid to our county town since the assumption by Your Majesty of Your Royal Dignity of King of these Realms venture to tender our humble and cordial welcome to Your

This task we prosecute with a greater zeal because we remember the active interest which Your Majesty has always shown in the pursuits of agriculture, and in the prosperity of all the various classes engaged in that oldest and greatest of our national industries.

That Your Majesty has deigned to receive this Address of Welcome from us will be not only a source of warm satisfaction to our county and all its inhabitants but also an incentive to fresh energy in the discharge of the great educational duties and responsibilities recently imposed upon ourselves by Parliament.

"The cordial welcome given to Us by you on behalf of the County of Cambridge is very gratifying both to Myself and to Queen Alexandra. I shall never forget My residence in your County while I was a Student in the University which adds so greatly to its distinction.

. "I am very glad to know of the educational work in connection with the great industry of Agriculture, which you have undertaken. In common with most branches of industry, Agriculture has, in modern times, come to depend for its success and extension upon the unremitting application to it of the results of scientific investigation. No greater service can be rendered to this ancient Industry than to furnish it with the means of research and instruction which are essential in order that labour may be directed in profitable channels.

"In the buildings which are to be opened to-day improved provision will be made for instruction in some of the branches of knowledge upon which the scientific cultivation of the land is based, and you will, I hope, derive therefrom useful aid in the carrying out of your undertaking.

"I pray that every success may attend you in the execution of the great work of general education which is now entrusted to you."

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

May it please Your Majesties.

We, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, humbly offer to Your Majesties our dutiful welcome to the precincts of this Ancient University.

We avail ourselves, Sir, of Your Majesty's gracious permission to address You that we may renew that assurance of our earnest and heartfelt loyalty towards Your Person and Your Throne

which we were permitted to tender on the occasion of Your Majesty's Accession.

Fifty-six years have passed since Your Royal Mother, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Whose memory we hold in abiding honour, was pleased, together with Her Illustrious Consort, then our Chancellor, to visit this University. Since that time, as we rejoice to remember, Your Majesty has resided among us as a Member of our Body, and has thought well to connect us with Yourself by many gracious personal ties, permitting us to share with respectful sympathy in the joys and sorrows of Your Royal House.

We recognise, Sir, in the presence among us of Your Majesty and of Her Majesty the Queen a mark of Your favour towards this University and a proof of Your solicitude for the progress of Education, on which, under the blessing of Divine Providence, the stability and prosperity of Your Majesty's Empire, both at home and beyond the seas, so largely depends, and in the promotion and guidance of which the national Universities are entrusted with so high and so signal a responsibility.

We venture to remind You, Sir, that, in bestowing upon us this sign of Your gracious recognition of our endeavours to fulfil our part as one of Your Majesty's ancient Universities, You are following in the footsteps of Kings and Princes of this Realm. The University Library and this Senate House, in which we have the honour to address Your Majesty, are enduring monuments of the concern for our well-being which Your Royal Ancestors were pleased to manifest. And in particular we recall with gratitude and pride the zealous patience and the far-seeing wisdom with which Your august Father, while he was our Chancellor, ever took thought for the maintenance and advancement among us of learning and more especially of the study of Natural Sciences. To him we owe a debt which no lapse of time will diminish or obscure.

We ask Your Majesties to-day to visit those New Buildings, which, through the munificence of many Benefactors, we have lately been enabled to erect.

The Law School and the Law Library symbolize the development among us of those older studies, not only of Law, but also of Divinity, of Letters, of History, and of Philosophy, of which through many generations we have been guardians.

The Faculty of Medicine from our earliest days has had an honoured place in this our University. The beneficent Science of Medicine, with the sister Sciences of Surgery and of Pathology, will henceforth have a home not wholly unworthy, as we trust, of that splendid progress which in these later days has conferred on mankind inestimable blessings and is the pledge of a yet greater advance in the time to come.

The Museum of Geology, the memorial of the late Professor Sedgwick, whose honoured name it bears, and the Botanical Laboratory are fitting emblems of the growth of the physical Sciences which is a chief glory of our times, and which stimulates, and, we trust, will stimulate, the best energies of many of our ablest students.

The inauguration of these new Schools of Learning and Science marks an epoch in our academic history. We are profoundly conscious how auspicious and how memorable the commencement of this new era is rendered by Your Majesties' Presence in our midst and by Your gracious participation in our aspirations and in our hopes.

We assure You, Sir, that our earnest and humble prayer to Almighty God is that, as He has shielded Your Majesty from danger in the past, so He will vouchsafe to You, with Your Royal Consort, our beloved Queen, long to reign in undisturbed peace and happiness over a loyal, united and prosperous Empire.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

"I receive with much gratification your renewed expressions of loyalty to My Throne and Person, and your sympathetic references to My beloved Mother Queen Victoria and to My revered Father, who was so deeply interested in everything connected with the University of Cambridge, of which he was the Chancellor.

"I am proud to be a member of the University, and I shall always look back with great pleasure upon the time which I spent as an undergraduate at Trinity. It was a great gratification to Me to send My dear Son, the Duke of Clarence, to be matriculated at the same ancient and splendid Foundation. And Queen Alexandra well remembers with what pride and interest I showed Her shortly after Our marriage the University where I had studied.

"There are around Us many memorials of the interest taken in the University by My Ancestors; and like them I earnestly desire its well-being, and the extension and development of all brauches of study and research which are essential to the maintenance of the greatness and welfare of the Empire. I have no doubt that Cambridge will continue to occupy a foremost place in this great work; but the older Universities must receive new endowments if education within My Realm is to be kept at its proper standard of efficiency. I am glad to know that many munificent donations have been received to that end; and the Museums that are now being opened for the study of subjects of especial importance at the present time, will serve as an example of that generosity. The members of the Cambridge University Association, the subscribers to the Sedgwick Memorial, and all other friends of the University, will rejoice already to see the fruit of their efforts in the Sedgwick Museum, the Law School, the Botanical Laboratory, and other new buildings.

"But this great University should aim at

"But this great University should aim at nothing less than a complete apparatus of learning and research; and I trust to see the Endowment Fund reach the level of that aspiration.

"I heartily thank you for your welcome to Queen Alexandra and Myself, and for your good wishes; and I earnestly join with you in the prayer that the Empire may throughout My Reign continue in peace and prosperity."

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Methley, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, out of the parish of Featherstone, in the said county of York, and in the diocese of York, and out of the parish of Swillington, in the said county of York, and in the said diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said parishes of Methley, Featherstone, and Swillington are parishes wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parishes of Methley, Featherstone, and Swillington which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

"And whereas by a certain indenture bearing date on or about the first day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856, or some or one of them between the late Honourable and Reverend Philip Yorke Savile, then rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Methley of the first part, the late Most Houourable Frederick Temple, then Lord Dufferin and Clandeboye, and afterwards Marquess of Dufferin and Ava, at that time Chancellor of Your Majesty's Duchy of Lancaster, acting on behalf of Her said late Majesty as the patron in right of Her said Duchy of Lancaster of the rectory of the said parish of Methley of the second part, the late Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon of the third part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners of the fourth part (which indenture was enrolled in the High Court of Chancery), the said Philip Yorke Savile did with the consent of Her said late Majesty as such patron as aforesaid testified by the said Frederick Temple Lord Dufferin being a party to and executing the said indenture grant and confirm unto and to the use of the minister or Incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall have been appointed and his successors ministers or Incumbents thereof for the time being one clear yearly rent charge or sum of one hundred and twenty-five pounds to be payable half-yearly on the fifteenth day of April and the fifteenth day of October in every year, a proportionate part of the first of such half-yearly payments to be made on such of those days as shall first happen next after a minister or Incumbent shall have been duly appointed to the said intended district free and clear of all deductaxes rates charges assessments and impositions whatsoever (except on account of the tax on income or property, if any) to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon all that the rectory of the parish of Methley aforesaid and the glebe lands and hereditaments to the said rectory belonging or in anywise appertaining which said glebe lands and hereditaments are in a summary form particularized in the schedule annexed to the same indenture.

"And whereas the said yearly rent charge or sum of one hundred and twenty-five pounds has been so granted and confirmed as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said intended district and of the nomination of the Incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter

"And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners now hold in trust for and for the benefit of the rector or Incumbent of the said rectory of Methley a sum exceeding twenty thousand pounds of India Three Pounds per centum Stock.

"And whereas we intend so soon as the said proposed district shall be duly constituted to submit to Your Majesty in Council a scheme for effecting the further endowment of the said proposed district by setting apart out of the endowments of the said rectory of Methley an amount of Stock sufficient to produce a further yearly sum of two hundred and seventy-five pounds.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd, now Bishop of Ripon, and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) we l

the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said three several parishes of Methley, Featherstone, and Swillington, which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Mickletown, and that such district shall be included in and shall form part of the Rural Deanery of Whitkirk, the Archdeaconry of Ripon, and the Diocese of Ripon.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish and of the nomination of an Incumbent thereto, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in Your Majesty Your Heirs, and Successors in right of Your said Duchy of Lancaster and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Right Honourable Sir William Hood Walrond, Baronet, now Chancellor of the said Duchy of Lancaster and by his successors Chancellors of the same Duchy on behalf of Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors in right of Your said Duchy.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parlia-

#### "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Mickletown being :-

" All that territory which may in general terms be said to be bounded on the south-east by the River Calder on the north-east by the River Aire on the north by the Oulton Beck and on the west by the line of the Midland Railway all which territory may be more particularly described and defined as consisting of all that portion of the parish of Methley in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which is bounded upon the north and north-east by the parish of Rothwell the parish of Swillington and the new parish of Alierton Bywater all in the county of York and diocese of Ripon aforesaid upon the south-east by the new parish of Whitwood Mere by the new parish of Saint Philip Whitwood and by the new parish of Saint Mary Altofts all in the said county of York and in the diocese of York and upon the remaining side that is to say on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Methley aforesaid at the point where the line of the Midland Railway aforesaid crosses the centre of the old course of the River Calder aforesaid and extending thence generally north-

ward for a distance of rather more than two

miles along the middle of the said line of railway

to the boundary at Oulton Beck aforesaid which divides the said parish of Methley from the

and diocese of York aforesaid which are respectively called or known as The Island and Pilkington Ness and which are situate immediately on the north bank of the River Calder aforesaid: which said portions of the parish of Featherstone are contiguous to the above described portion of the parish of Methley and have become isolated from the main portion of the said parish of Featherstone by the formation of the said new

parish of Whitwood Mere. "And further of all that portion of the said parish of Swillington wherein the houses called or known as Lemon Royd are situate and which said portion of such parish is situate between the Aire and Calder Navigation Canal and the River Aire aforesaid and is bounded on the south, south-west and west by the above described portion of the said parish of Methley on the north-west by the parish of Rothwell aforesaid and on the remaining sides that is to say on the north-east and on the north by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Swillington aforesaid at the point where the said River Aire is joined by Oulton Beck aforesaid and extending thence first south-eastward and then eastward for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same river to the boundary which divides the said parish of Swillington from the parish of Methley aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the three cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and also the Incumbents of two of the said cures have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the Incumbent of the parish of Methley has offered a certain objection to the said scheme.

And whereas, notwithstanding such objection, the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the said dioceses of York and Ripon.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for
England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth
and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen

Victoria chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of that part or residue of the original parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which under the fourth section of the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850, constitutes for all ecclesiastical purposes the parish of Manchester and partly out of the parish (sometime district under the said Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850) of Saint Alban Cheetwood within the limits of the said original parish of Manchester.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said ecclesiastical parish of Manchester and the said parish of Saint Alban Cheetwood are parishes wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said ecclesiastical parish of Manchester and of the said parish of Saint Alban Cheetwood which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas we are satisfied that an

"And whereas we are satisfied that an adequate and permanent maintenance for the support of the minister of the said proposed district and when the said district shall have become a new parish then for the support of the Incumbent thereof will be secured as from the date of the licensing or appointment of such minister or Incumbent by the payment of a sum of not less than one hundred and fifty pounds which will be annually provided out of the moneys received by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under the provisions of the said Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said ecclesiastical parish of Manchester and of the said parish of Saint Alban Cheetwood which are more particularly described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Saviour Cheetham.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Saviour Cheetham comprising:-

"I. All the following portion of that part or residue of the original parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of

Manchester which under the fourth section of the Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850 constitutes for all ecclesiastical purposes the parish of Manchester, namely:—All that portion of such ecclesiastical parish of Manchester which is bounded upon the east by the parish of Saint Thomas Redbank, upon the north-east, upon the north-west and upon the west by the parish (sometime district under the Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850) of Saint Alban Cheetwood upon the south-west by the parish of Trinity Salford all in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Trinity Salford from the said ecclesiastical parish of Manchester at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway across the River Irwell and extending thence north-castward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby passing through Victoria Railway Station) for a distance of seventeen chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Corporation-street across such line of railway upon the boundary which divides the said ecclesiastical parish of Manchester from the said parish of Saint Thomas Redbank.

"II. And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance and other lawful means His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in and over the Protectorate of Southern Nigeria, and within all the ports thereof in accordance with the said Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that it is expedient to declare the port of Old Calabar in the said Protectorate a Port of Registry, and to declare the description of persons who shall be Registrars of British ships thereat, and to make regulations with respect to the registry of British ships thereat.

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him in this behalf by the here-inbefore recited Acts or some or one of them and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare and order as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as "The Southern Nigeria Maritime Order in Council, 1904."
- 2. The Port of Old Calabar in the Protectorate of Southern Nigeria shall be a Port of Registry for British Ships.
- 3. The Registrar of British Ships at the said port shall be such officer in the public service of the Protectorate as the High Commissioner may from time to time appoint by writing signed by him and in default of such appointment shall be the Collector of Customs at the said port.
- 4. The High Commissioner of Southern Nigeria may from time to time in case of the absence or intended absence from Old Calabar or in case of the illness of the Registrar appoint by writing under his hand a fit person to be the deputy of the Registrar for the time therein mentioned and every such appointment shall be revocable at pleasure by the High Commissioner by writing under his hand.

The person so appointed shall during the continuance of his appointment have all the power and authority of the Registrar.

- 5. The Registrar shall have and use a seal bearing such style and device as the High Commissioner shall from time to time direct.
- 6. Every signature or seal affixed to any instrument purporting to be the signature or seal as the case may be of the Registrar shall for all purposes under this Order without any proof thereof be presumed to be genuine and shall be taken as genuine until the contrary is proved.
- 7. The Registrar of Shipping at Old Calabar shall have the same powers as any Registrar of Shipping appointed under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of the said Act and of this Order the said Registrar shall have the same powers as by the said Act are conferred for the purposes of registration and measurement on any officer of Customs or any officer of the Board of Trade.
- 8. The High Commissioner shall with regard to the performance of any act or thing relating to the registry of a ship registered at Old Calabar, or of any interest therein, be considered as in all respects occupying the place of the Board of Trade and the Commissioners of Customs.
- 9. Where it appears to the High Commissioner that by reason of special circumstances it would be desirable that permission should be granted to any British ship to pass without being previously registered from the port of Old Calabar to any port within His Majesty's dominions the High Commissioner may grant a pass accordingly and such pass shall for the time being and within the limits therein mentioned have the same effect as a Certificate of Registry.
- 10. Fees not exceeding the amounts named in the schedule to this Order shall be taken in respect of the matters mentioned in the said schedule.

11. All fees authorized to be taken under this Order shall be applied to general revenue.

State, and so long as such law or ordinance continues in force there and no longer; or direct that such law or ordinance or any part thereof shall have effect in such British Possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act:

And whereas by certain Orders of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council Her Majesty was pleased to direct that certain Acts respectively enacted by the Legislatures of the Colonies of South Australia, Western Australia, Queensland, Tasmania and Victoria should have effect in the said Colonies respectively without modification or alteration as if they were part of the Extradition Act, 1870:

And whereas on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and one, the Commonwealth of Australia was established under the provisions of an Act of Parliament passed in the sixty-third and sixty-fourth years of Her late Majesty's reign, shortly entitled "The Commonwealth of Australia Constitution Act," and each of the said Colonies is now a State forming part of the Commonwealth established as aforesaid:

And whereas the Parliament of the Commonwealth is empowered under the provisions of the said Act to make laws for the peace, order and good government of the Commonwealth with respect to (inter alia) the influx of criminals and external affairs:

And whereas the Commonwealth is a "British Possession" within the meaning of section twenty-six of the Extradition Act, 1870:

And whereas by an Act enacted by the Parliament of the Commonwealth, the short title of which is the Extradition Act, 1903, and the provisions of which are fully set forth in the first schedule appended to this Order, provision has been made for carrying into effect within the Commonwealth the surrender of fugitive criminals who are therein or suspected of being therein:

And whereas it is provided by the said Act that the said Act shall commence on the day on which the Governor-General makes known by Proclamation that His Majesty has by Order in Council directed that the said Act, or any part thereof, shall have effect in the Commonwealth as if it were part of the Extradition Act, 1870:

Now therefore His Majesty, in pursuance of the Extradition Act, 1870, and in exercise of the powers in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, direct as follows:—

- The Commonwealth Extradition Act, 1903, shall have effect in the Commonwealth of Australia without modification or alteration as if it were part of the Extradition Act, 1870.
- The Orders of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council enumerated in the second schedule appended hereto are revoked as and from the commencement of the said Act.

#### SCHEDULE I.

The Commonwealth of Australia Extradition Act, 1908.

Whereas by the Imperial Act known as the Extradition Act 1870, it is enacted that that Act when applied by Order in Council shall, unless it is otherwise provided by such Order, extend to every British possession, but with the following among other modifications, namely:—No warrant

of a Secretary of State shall be required, and all powers vested in or acts authorized or required to be done under that Act by the Police Magistrate and the Secretary of State, or either of them, in relation to the surrender of a fugitive criminal, may be done by the Governor of the British possession alone.

And whereas by that Imperial Act it is also enacted that if, by any law made by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within that possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in that possession, the King may by Order in Council direct that such law, or any part thereof, shall have effect in that possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of that Imperial Act.

And whereas by other Imperial Acts known as the Extradition Act 1873 and the Extradition Act 1895, it is enacted that those Acts shall be construed as one with the Extradition Act 1870, and that the three Acts may be cited together as

the Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895:

Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate, and the House of Commonwealth of Representatives of the Australia, as follows:-

1. This Act may be cited as the Extradition

Act, 1903.
2. This Act shall commence on the day on which the Governor-General makes known by Proclamation that the King has by Order in Council directed that this Act, or any part thereof, shall have effect in the Commonwealth as if it were part of the Extradition Act 1870.

3. In this Act, unless the contrary intention appears, terms defined in the Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895 have the same meaning as in those

Acts.

#### Extradition from the Commonwealth.

4. All powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a Secretary of State, under the Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895, in relation to the surrender of a fugitive criminal, are hereby vested in, and may in the Commonwealth be exercised and done by, the Governor-General, and may in any part of the Commonwealth be exercised and done by any deputy of the Governor-General thereto authorized.

5. All powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a Police Magistrate or any Justice of the Peace under the Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895, in relation to the surrender of a fugitive criminal, are hereby vested in, and may in the Commonwealth be exercised and done by, any Stipendiary or Police or Special Magistrate of the Commonwealth or of a State, or any Magistrate of a State thereto specially authorized

by the Governor-General.

Extradition from Foreign States.

6. Where the Extradition Act 1870 applies in the case of any foreign State, a requisition for the surrender of a person, accused or convicted of an extradition crime in the Commonwealth, who is or is suspected to be in that foreign State, may be made by the Attorney-General to a Consular Officer of that State in the Commonwealth, or to any Minister of that State through the Diplomatic Representative of His Majesty in that State, or in such other mode as is settled by arrangement.

7. Any person accused or convicted of an extradition crime who is surrendered by a foreign State may, under the warrant for his surrender issued in the foreign State, be brought into the Commonwealth and delivered to the proper authorities to be dealt with according to law.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of Trinity College, Oxford, on the 26th day of February, 1904, amending Statute VI of the Statutes of the College, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

At a Meeting of the Governing Body of Trinity College, Oxford, specially called for the purpose, with due notice of the business to be transacted thereat, held on Friday, February 26th, 1904, it was resolved by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting, to make certain amendments to the Statute of the College concerning the Pension Fund, and to affix the College Seal to them.

The Amendments to the Statute are printed below.

ALTERATION OF STATUTE (1904).

For VI (Pension Fund), clause 2, read:

answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a 2. The income of the Fund (including the sums sum not exceeding 20%, to enable him to defray paid to it yearly from the Corporate Revenue

and from the Tuition Fund) shall be applicable to the payment of pensions, subject to the provisions contained in the following clauses. The unapplied balance of the income of the fund in each year shall be added to the capital of the fund.

3. Any Official Fellow who has served the College as Tutor, Bursar, or Lecturer for twentyfive years shall be entitled as of right (but subject to the provisions of clauses 5 to 7) to a pension, if without default or misconduct on his part he be not re-elected a Fellow on the expiration of his Fellowship, or vacate, or voluntarily retire from, his Fellowship. Such pension shall be at the rate of £250 per annum if he has served for thirty years, and otherwise at such rate, not being less than £200, or more than £250, per annum, as the College may determine.

4. The College may grant a pension, not exceeding £200 per annum, to any person who after serving the College as Tutor, Bursar, or Lecturer for twenty years, has retired from such service, or who after so serving the College for not less than ten years has been disabled from such service by ill-health, under circumstances such as in the opinion of the College to render such grant necessary or proper. No pension shall be granted which the income of the fund shall not in the opinion of the College be sufficient to satisfy.

5. No person, while holding the office of President or a Fellowship in the College, shall

receive payment of any pension.

6. No person holding a pension shall be entitled to payment of his pension for any year otherwise than out of the income of the fund

accruing in that year.

7. In any year, in which the income of the fund is insufficient to pay in full all the pensions then in existence, every pension to which a right has been acquired under clause 3 shall be paid in priority to all pensions to which a right has subsequently been acquired under that clause, and also in priority to all pensions which have been granted (whether previously or subsequently) under clause 4, and every pension granted under clause 4 shall be paid in priority to all pensions subsequently granted under that clause.

# ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(Dated 7th March 1904.)

SAND HUTTON AND DISTRICT (YORK, SHIRE) (SWINE-FEVER) PROHIBITION OF MOVEMENT ORDER OF 1904.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Movement of Swine into out of or within Scheduled District.

1. No swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District to another place outside without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within such District.

L. S.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### Offences.

3.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows a pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. This Order may be cited as the SAND HUTTON AND DISTRICT (YORKSHIRE) (SWINE-FEVER) PRO-HIBITION OF MOVEMENT ORDER OF 1904.

Isle of Wight.—An Area comprising the administrative county of the Isle of Wight, including the boroughs of Newport and Ryde (15 September, 1903).
