The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received the following telegram from His Majesty's Ambassador at St. Petersburg, dated March 18th:—

"Official Messenger" publishes to-day instructions to Commanders of warships, in which additions are made to section 10,* Article 6, so as to include under food-stuffs and forage all kinds of grain, fish, fish products, beans, bean oil, and oil cakes. To list of remaining articles intended for war are added machinery and parts thereof intended for the manufacture of cannons, small-arms, and projectiles.
