WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and

thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for providing an endowment for the archdeaconry of Lindisfarne, in the diocese of Newcastle, for disannexing the benefice (being a vicarage) of Eglington, in the county of Northumberland and in the said diocese of Newcastle, from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne, and for effecting a transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Eglington.

“ Whereas the said benefice of Eglington is now annexed to the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne and the income of the archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne is derived

partly from the endowments and emoluments of the said benefice of Eglington and partly from procurations synodals visitation fees and induction fees or some or one of these sources, and it appears to us to be undesirable that the said benefice of Eglington should continue to be annexed to the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne and that fees derived from any of the above-mentioned sources should continue to be received by the archdeacon of the said archdeaconry.

"And whereas the payment of the yearly sum hereinafter recommended and proposed to be paid to the said archdeacon will after the disannexing of the said benefice of Eglington from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne and after the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees be required in order to provide for the said archdeacon an annual income of two hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne is now vacant.

"And whereas the whole right of patronage of the said benefice of Eglington before the annexation of such benefice to the archdeaconry of Lindisfarne was vested in the Bishop of Durham for the time being, in whose diocese the said benefice of Eglington was then situate.

"And whereas the said benefice of Eglington is now situate in the diocese of Newcastle, and it appears to us to be expedient that upon the disannexing of the said benefice of Eglington from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne the whole right of patronage of the said benefice of Eglington should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of Newcastle for the time being.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, now Bishop of Durham, is desirous that the whole right of patronage of the said benefice of Eglington, so soon as the same shall revert to him by the disannexing of such benefice from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne, should be transferred as above mentioned and as hereinafter recommended and proposed, and in token of such his desire he the said Handley Carr Glyn Bishop of Durham has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Arthur Thomas, now Bishop of Newcastle, is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed have that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the hereinbefore recited Acts or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Arthur Thomas Bishop of Newcastle has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage so to be transferred arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Eglington.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Handley Carr Glyn Bishop of Durham and with the consent of the said Arthur Thomas Bishop of Newcastle (in testimony whereof each of the said Bishops has signed this scheme and sealed it with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed it with his archiepiscopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners

be authorized to pay by half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen to the archdeacon for the time being of the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne the yearly sum of two hundred pounds the payment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing; provided always, that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations synodals visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such archdeacon or his representative (as the case may be) and the archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that from and immediately after the endowment of the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne with the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds as aforesaid the said benefice of Eglington shall be disannexed from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne, and shall be a separate benefice with cure of souls.

"And we further recommend and propose that as from the day on which the said benefice of Eglington shall be disannexed from the said archdeaconry of Lindisfarne and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Eglington so reverting to the Bishop of Durham as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said Handley Carr Glyn Bishop of Durham and from his successors in the same See and shall thereupon become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be fully and freely exercised by the said Arthur Thomas Bishop of Newcastle and by his successors in the same See for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the fifth year of Her said late Majesty, session two chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her said late Majesty session two chapter twenty-six have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with reference to the purchase of a house of residence for the Dean of the Cathedral Church of Manchester and for the improvement of the same house.

"Whereas there is not at present any house of residence annexed to the deanery of the said Cathedral Church and the Very Reverend Edward Craig Maclure the present Dean is desirous and it appears to us also to be expedient that the house at present occupied by the Dean in Bury New-road, Higher Broughton, Manchester, and being as near to the Cathedral Church of Manchester as in the circumstances it is practicable to obtain a suitable residence for the Dean should together with certain additional garden ground be purchased as a house of residence for the said Dean and his successors and that certain improvements or alterations should be made in the said house of which particulars have been submitted to and approved by us.

"And whereas the sum required for the purchase of the said house and additional garden ground is five thousand pounds and the cost of the improvements or alterations so approved by us as aforesaid together with the expenses attendant upon such purchase and improvement or alteration will exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds.

"And whereas there is now standing in our name a sum of six hundred and forty-two pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence India three pounds per centum stock which is held by us on behalf of the said Dean of Manchester and his successors and there will shortly be paid to us on behalf of the said Dean and his successors a sum of two thousand six hundred and fifty pounds or thereabouts which sum and the said sum of India stock are both available for effecting the proposed purchase and the said Dean is desirous and we also approve that a further sum of two thousand five hundred pounds (being not more than two years' net income of the deanery) should be raised upon the security of a mortgage of the revenues of the deanery upon the terms and conditions hereinafter appearing for the purpose of completing the said purchase and defraying the cost of and incidental to the improvements or alterations so approved by us as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Craig Maclure the present Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Manchester we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said house in Bury New-road, Higher Broughton, Manchester, now in the occupation of the said Dean together

with the additional garden ground hereinbefore mentioned be purchased as and for the deanery and as from the date of such purchase shall be constituted the deanery or house of residence for the said Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Manchester and his successors Deans of the said Cathedral Church and that the said sums of six hundred and forty-two pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence India three pounds per centum stock and of two thousand six hundred and fifty pounds cash or thereabouts be applied by us to such purchase and that for the completion of such purchase and the execution of the works of improvement or alteration so approved by us as aforesaid the said Dean be authorized to borrow from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds and that, as a security for the same the said Dean do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments profits or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said deanery to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty-five years or until the said sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds with interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following that is to say during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of thirty-five years computed from the day of the date of the mortgage no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable but the said Dean or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one thirtieth part of the said principal sum, until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and that such mortgage deed shall be in such form as the said Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty may approve and shall bind as well the said Edward Craig Maclure now Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Manchester as every succeeding Dean of the said Cathedral Church until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said purchase and improvements or alterations at the house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Dean of Manchester for the time being shall at his personal charge and expense insure and keep insured the deanery or house of residence aforesaid from loss or damage by fire in one of the public offices of assurance in London or

Westminster to be approved by us in a sum of not less than five thousand pounds, and that such Dean shall within fourteen days after any premium for such assurance shall have become due and payable deliver to us the receipt for the same and that in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house any and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us in trust to be applied and the same together with any interest and accumulations thereof shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said house or of any part thereof which may so have suffered loss or damage in such manner as shall be determined by us with the concurrence of the Dean of Manchester for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Manchester.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for

altering the boundaries of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale partly in the county of Berks and partly in the county of Surrey, and wholly in the diocese of Oxford, and of the new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham in the said county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the twenty-fourth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one and being under the hands and seals of the late Honourable and Right Reverend Richard sometime Bishop of Oxford, of the late Right Reverend Charles Richard sometime Bishop of Winchester of the late Right Honourable John Singleton Baron Lyndhurst sometime Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and others, certain contiguous portions of the parish of Old Windsor in the said county of Berks and diocese of Oxford, of the parish of Sunninghill in the last-named county and diocese of the parish of Windlesham, of the parish of Egham, and of the parish of Chobham, all in the said county of Surrey and in the said diocese of Winchester, were assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity situate at Sunningdale in the said parish of Old Windsor.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-ninth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and published in the London Gazette on the sixth day of the following month certain contiguous portions of the said parish of Chobham and of the said parish of Windlesham were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Saviour situate at Valley End within the limits of the said parish of Chobham and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Saviour Chobham.'

"And whereas the said particular district of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale and the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Saviour Chobham have under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four, become new parishes of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale and of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Herbert Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale and of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham shall be altered so that (firstly) all that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale which is

described in the first schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and from the said diocese of Oxford and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of Windlesham and of the said diocese of Winchester and shall be included in the archdeaconry and rural deanery within which the said parish of Windlesham is comprised and (secondly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and from the said diocese of Winchester and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale and of the said diocese of Oxford and shall be included in the archdeaconry and rural deanery within which the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale is comprised.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference :—

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale partly in the county of Berks and partly in the county of Surrey and wholly in the diocese of Oxford and to be restored to the parish of Windlesham in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester being :—

"All that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale which is bounded upon the south and upon the south-west by the said parish of Windlesham and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-west upon the north-east and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point upon the southern side of the plantation called Old Windsor Bog where the present boundary of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale diverges from the boundary which divides the said county of Berks from the county of Surrey aforesaid and takes a south-easterly direction towards the milestone indicating a distance of twenty-four miles from Hyde Park Corner on the high road from London to Basingstoke and extending thence that is to say from the said point upon the county boundary generally eastward or north-eastward along the said county boundary for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of Dale-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Dale-road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with the high road from London to Basingstoke and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said high road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing the milestone indicating a distance of twenty-three miles from Hyde Park Corner) to the point where the said high road is joined by the road leading past the Sunningdale Golf Links and extending thence

south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to the point where such road crosses the boundary which divides the civil parish of Windlesham from the civil parish of Chobham and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where the said civil parish boundary is intersected by the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale from the parish of Windlesham aforesaid.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham in the said county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester and to be annexed to the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale being :—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham which is bounded upon the west by the said parish of Windlesham upon the north-west by the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Sunningdale upon the north upon the north-east and upon the east by the new parish of Christ Church Egham otherwise called Christ Church Virginia Water in the said county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church Egham otherwise called Christ Church Virginia Water from the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham crosses the middle of the Staines and Wokingham Branch Line of the London and South Western Railway and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the middle of the culvert which carries such line of railway over the stream called the Little Arm and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the culvert which carries the road leading from Sunningdale to Valley End across the said stream and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of a quarter of a mile and extending thence due west and in a straight line for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Saviour Chobham from the said parish of Windlesham."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council : now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester and by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, situate in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and published in the *London Gazette* upon the twenty-eighth day of the same month, a part of the parish of Saint Peter, Wolverhampton, in the said county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate at Whitmore Reans, within the limits of the said parish, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or

plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of Saint Peter, Wolverhampton.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, and to be restored to the parish of Saint Peter, Wolverhampton, in the said county and diocese being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, which is bounded upon the south by the said parish of Saint Peter, Wolverhampton, upon the south-east partly by the new parish of Saint Mary, Wolverhampton, and partly by the new parish of Christ Church, Wolverhampton, both in the said county and diocese, upon the north by the last-named new parish, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Wolverhampton, from the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, at the junction of Red Cross-street, Molineux-street and Waterloo-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Waterloo-road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wolverhampton, from the said parish of Saint Peter, Wolverhampton."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patron and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patron and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty the King has power and jurisdiction within the Somaliland Protectorate:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers on this behalf by "The

Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Somaliland Order in Council, 1904," and shall be construed as one with the Somaliland Order in Council, 1899.

2. In this Order—

"Crown Lands" means all public lands in the Protectorate which are subject to the control of His Majesty by virtue of any Treaty, Convention, or Agreement, or of His Majesty's Protectorate, and all lands which shall have been acquired by His Majesty for the public service or otherwise howsoever:

"The principal Order" means the Somaliland Order in Council, 1899.

3.—(1.) His Majesty may by Commission under his Sign Manual and Signet appoint a fit person to administer the Government of the Protectorate under the designation of Commissioner or such other designation as His Majesty thinks fit, and the person so appointed is hereinafter referred to as the Commissioner.

(2.) In the event of the death, incapacity, removal, or absence from the Protectorate of the Commissioner for the time being, all and every the powers and authorities by this Order granted to him shall, until His Majesty's further pleasure is signified through the Secretary of State, be vested in the Deputy Commissioner or other principal officer of the Protectorate Government for the time being in the Protectorate.

(3.) The Commissioner shall administer the Government of the Protectorate in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, and shall do and execute in due manner all things that shall belong to his said command and to the trust thereby reposed in him, according to the several powers and authorities granted or appointed to him by virtue of this Order and of his Commission, and according to such instructions as may from time to time be given to him under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, or by Order of His Majesty in Council, or by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and according to such laws as are or shall hereafter be in force in the Protectorate.

4. All references to the Consul-General in the Principal Order or in the Somaliland Order in Council, 1903, or in any King's Regulations, Proclamations, Notices, Rules of Court or other documents issued or made under the Principal Order shall be deemed to be references to the Commissioner and construed accordingly.

5. The Commissioner shall have an official seal, bearing the style of his office, and such device as a Secretary of State from time to time approves, and such seal shall be deemed the public seal of the Protectorate, and may be kept and used by the Commissioner for the sealing of all things whatsoever that shall pass the public seal. And, until a public seal shall be provided, the seal of the Commissioner may be used as the public seal.

6.—(1.) The Commissioner may with the approval of the Secretary of State by Proclamation define any boundaries of the territories for the time being within the limits of this Order, and divide those territories into provinces or districts in such manner and with such subdivisions as may be convenient for purposes of administration, describing the boundaries thereof and assigning names thereto.

(2.) If a question arises whether any place is or is not within the Protectorate, or within any province or district, and such question does not

appear to be determined by any such Proclamation, or other evidence, it shall be referred to the Commissioner, and a certificate under his hand and seal shall be conclusive on the question, and judicial notice shall be taken thereof.

7.—(1.) All rights of His Majesty in or in relation to any Crown lands shall vest in and may be exercised by the Commissioner for the time being in trust for His Majesty, or, if the Secretary of State at any time with respect to all or any such lands by order under his hand so directs, in such other trustee or trustees for His Majesty as the Secretary of State may appoint.

(2.) The Secretary of State may, when he thinks fit, by a like order remove any trustee so appointed, and may appoint any new or additional trustee or trustees.

(3.) The Commissioner, or such other trustee or trustees, may make grants or leases of any Crown lands, or may permit them to be temporarily occupied, on such terms and conditions as he or they may think fit, subject to the provisions of any King's Regulations.

(4.) All mines and minerals being in, under, or upon any lands in the occupation of any native tribe, or any members thereof, or of any person not possessed of the right to work such mines and minerals, shall vest in the Commissioner, or such trustee or trustees, in like manner as the mines and minerals being in, under, or upon any Crown lands.

8.—(1.) A Secretary of State, or the Commissioner, subject to the directions of a Secretary of State, may, on behalf of His Majesty, appoint, or authorize the appointment of, such public officers for the administration of the Protectorate, under such designations as he may think fit, and may prescribe their duties.

(2.) The Commissioner may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, suspend from the exercise of his office in the Protectorate any such public officer, which suspension shall continue and have effect only until His Majesty's pleasure therein shall be made known and signified to the Commissioner.

(3.) Subject to the provisions of any King's Regulations, the Commissioner may appoint, or may authorize Heads of Departments to appoint, such clerks and other subordinate officers as may be required; and unless other provision is made all subordinate officers shall be removable by the respective officers by whom they were appointed.

9. The powers of the Secretary of State with respect to the application to the Protectorate of enactments and Acts of the Governor-General of India in Council or of the Governor of Bombay in Council under Article 7 of the Principal Order, and of laws and ordinances for the time being in force in any British possession under Article 9 of that Order shall on the commencement of this Order be transferred to the Commissioner, but those powers shall be exercised by him only by means of Regulations made under and subject in all respects to the provisions of Article 32 of the Principal Order.

10. The Commissioner may by such Regulations repeal or amend with respect to the Protectorate any enactments, Acts, laws, or ordinances which are made applicable or have been brought into operation in the Protectorate by or under any of the provisions of Articles 7 and 9 of the Principal Order.

11. All King's Regulations made or to be made under Articles 32 or 33 of the Principal Order, or under Article 3 of the Somaliland Order in Council, 1903, shall, unless a contrary intention appears, extend to natives, and may in

relation to natives comprise such special provisions, modifications, and penalties as the Commissioner may think fit.

12. In all cases, civil and criminal, to which natives are parties, every Court (a) shall be guided by native law, so far as it is applicable and is not repugnant to justice and morality, or inconsistent with any Order in Council or King's Regulations, or any regulation or rule made under any Order in Council or King's Regulations; and (b) shall decide all such cases according to substantial justice, without excessive regard to technicalities of procedure and without undue delay.

13. The production of a grant of probate or of letters of administration shall, notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in any Indian Act or Law in force in the Protectorate or in the Principal Order, be necessary to establish the right to recover or receive any part of the estate or effects of any deceased person situate in the Protectorate.

14.—(1.) Article 3 (iii) of the Principal Order and the words "in the Protectorate" in Article 25 (a) of the Principal Order are hereby repealed.

(2.) In Article 26 of the Principal Order the words "in the Protectorate" shall follow the word "property," and shall not appear after the word "dies."

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Lansdowne, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

WHEREAS by the Sugar Convention Act, 1903, after reciting that by Article VII of the Convention, signed on the fifth day of March, nineteen hundred and two, in relation to sugar, provision was made for the establishment of a Permanent Commission (in the Act referred to as the Permanent Commission) charged with watching the execution of the provisions of the Convention, it is enacted that where it is reported by the Permanent Commission that any direct or indirect bounty is granted in any foreign country on the production or export of sugars, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, make a prohibitory Order, that is to say, an Order prohibiting sugar from that foreign country to be imported or brought into the United Kingdom, subject to any provision which might be made by Parliament in lieu of such prohibition to impose a special duty on such sugar in accordance with the Convention; and that while a prohibition Order is in force the laws relating to the Customs shall apply as if the sugar in respect of which the Order is made were specified, with exception as to transit, in the table of prohibitions and restrictions inwards contained in section forty-two of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876. And it was also enacted that His Majesty might, similarly, make such regulations as should appear to Him necessary in relation to any such Order.

And whereas it appears that the said Permanent Commission has reported that a bounty on the exportation of sugars is granted in the Dominican Republic.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered:—

That, from and after the first day of August next, and subject to any such provision by Parliament as hereinbefore stated, all sugar from the Dominican Republic (not including molasses and sugar-sweetened products) shall (except in transit) be prohibited to be imported or brought into the United Kingdom; and that in relation to this Order, Regulation IV in the Schedule to the Order in Council under the said Act dated the eleventh day of August, nineteen hundred and three, shall be construed and read as referring to the Dominican Republic as well as to the other countries named therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the power for this purpose given to His Majesty by the said Act, and of every other power hereunto enabling His Majesty, doth hereby authorize the execution of Military Manœuvres within the limits specified in the Schedule to this Order during the period of one calendar month, commencing from the seventh day of September, one thousand nine hundred and four.

And the Right Honourable the Principal Secretary of State for the War Department is to give the necessary directions.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make Regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas the Harbour of Dover is a "Dockyard Port" within the meaning of the said Act:

And whereas it appears expedient to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service that the limits of the Dockyard Port of Dover should be defined:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, on the recommendation of the Admiralty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Preliminary.

1. This Order shall take effect from the date hereof.

2. In this Order, and in the Schedule hereto, unless the context shall otherwise require, the terms "vessel," "master," and "Justice" shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, and the term "the Dockyard Port" shall mean the "Dockyard Port of Dover" as described in paragraph 3 hereof.

Dockyard Port of Dover.

3. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order, the limits of the Dockyard Port shall be as follows:—

All the waters, bays and creeks so far as the tide flows lying between the lines drawn as follows:—

On the east by a line drawn south true through a point on the shore at High Water Mark situated four hundred yards N. 57° E., true, from the root of the Eastern breakwater.

On the west by a line drawn south true through a point on the shore at High Water Mark situated four hundred yards S. 77° W., true from the root of the Admiralty Pier.

On the south by a line drawn east and west true through a point situated eight hundred and seventy yards south true from the flagstaff in Archcliffe Fort.

Delineation of Limits.

The term "the Admiralty Harbour" shall mean that portion of the Dockyard Port protected, or to be protected, by breakwaters, which lies to the eastward of the Prince of Wales Pier, and of a line drawn from the end of that pier to the western end of the detached breakwater. The term "the Commercial Harbour" shall mean that portion of the Dockyard Port which is enclosed by the inner parts of the Admiralty Pier, the spur from the Admiralty Pier, and the Prince of Wales Pier.

4. On the chart accompanying this Order are drawn all the limits of the Dockyard Port, the Admiralty Harbour and the Commercial Harbour respectively.

5. The regulations contained in the Schedule hereto are hereby made, and shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Dover.

Penalties.

6. The master of every merchant or private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe, and cause to be observed, the said Regulations as far as relates to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said Regulations, or fails to observe, and cause the same to be observed, he shall, for every such offence, be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds. (£10).

Local Authorities.

7. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Harbour Board for Dover under the Acts of Parliament relating to them.

SCHEDULE.

General.

1. The Admiralty Harbour shall, subject to the provisions of Clause 3 of this Schedule, be for the exclusive use of His Majesty's Ships, and no merchant nor other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Senior Naval Officer or the King's Harbour Master, anchor or lie in it, nor be moored or fastened to any of the Forts, or to any Government moorings, buoys, breakwaters, jetties, piles, or vessels in the Dockyard Port.

2. The berths alongside the Admiralty Pier Extension eastward of the position of the old head of that Pier are to be cleared whenever required for His Majesty's Service.

3. A fairway will be kept through the Admiralty Harbour for vessels passing between the eastern entrance of the Admiralty Harbour and the Commercial Harbour.

4. Moorings for His Majesty's ships, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with naval or military operations, may be placed by the King's Harbour Master in such positions as he may from time to time consider the requirements of His Majesty's Service demand.

5. No person shall lay moorings for private vessels in the Dockyard Port, without the permission, in writing, of the King's Harbour Master, and all such moorings shall be in such positions as the King's Harbour Master shall deem fit, and shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.

6. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any Government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the master, or other person having the charge or command of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Senior Naval Officer or to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard Port.

8. No merchant or other private vessel shall anchor on the lines of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts or other discernible marks erected on shore, and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette.

9. No ballast, stones, sand, earth, clay, refuse, ashes, rubbish, dust, filth of any description, nor refuse from any quarry, mine or pit, nor any other material whatsoever, shall be unladen, cast, nor allowed to fall into the waters of the Dockyard Port.

"Whereas by an Order in Council of Her late Majesty bearing date the twentieth of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty it was directed that the Officer who conducts the cash and store duties at the Royal Hospital School at Greenwich should receive a salary of two hundred pounds a year, with residence.

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable that this salary should now be revised.

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the salary of the Cashier and Store Officer being increased after three years of service from two hundred pounds to two hundred and fifty pounds a year, and to authorize payment to the present holder of the appointment at the rate of two hundred and fifty pounds a year from the ninth day of May one thousand nine hundred and four when he completed three years of service."

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council and in pursuance and exercise of the power vested in His Majesty by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882," to fix the number of wards into which the borough of Great Yarmouth shall be divided; and to order and direct that the said borough shall be divided into twelve wards, which Order was made on the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and three.

And whereas on the fifteenth day of July, in the year last aforesaid, the Right Honourable *Apetas Akers-Douglas*, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did duly appoint me, *Henry Best Hans Hamilton*, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of such wards, and apportioning the Councillors of the said borough among such wards.

Now, I, the said *Henry Best Hans Hamilton*, in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act; do hereby determine, as hereinafter mentioned, the boundaries of the twelve wards into which the said borough is divided, which wards are hereinafter named and numbered as follows, that is to say:—

1. North Ward.
2. Saint Nicholas Ward.
3. Market Ward.
4. Britannia Ward.
5. Regent Ward.
6. Saint George's Ward.
7. Saint Peter's Ward.
8. Nelson Ward.
9. South Ward.
10. Southtown Ward.

11. Saint Andrew's Ward.

12. Gorleston Ward.

No. 1. North Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 1, otherwise North Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Bure where the most northerly point of the borough boundary in such river touches the boundary of the parish of Caister-next-Yarmouth, and thence (first in a northerly direction, and then in an easterly direction) following the said borough boundary along the eastern and southern bank of the "Spring Dyke," belonging to the said parish of Caister-next-Yarmouth, to the point where such dyke crosses the Caister-road, thence to the north bank of the said dyke, and following the said dyke to the termination thereof, thence, following the said borough boundary, in an easterly direction along a fence known as the "Caister Rails," across the railway of the Midland and Great Northern Joint Committee, to the north-east point where the said borough boundary turns at right angles to the southward, and becomes coincident with the eastern, or maritime, boundary of the said borough (as fixed by the Great Yarmouth Corporation Act, 1897, sec. 50), thence in a southerly direction, following the said borough boundary to a point thereon opposite the end of the centre of Sandown-road, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction, crossing the beach and continuing along the centre of Sandown-road and Kitchener-road to the junction of the latter road with Northgate-street, thence, turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction, along the centre of Northgate-street to a point opposite the centre of Rampart-road, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction, along the centre of Rampart-road, to a point opposite the centre of the River Bure, thence, along the centre of such river, in a south-westerly direction, to its junction with the centre of the River Yare, forming the navigable stream (from Breydon Water), and thence, in a curved line, first, in a north-westerly, and then in a south-westerly direction, following the centre of the said navigable stream, until it meets the western boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at an acute angle, following the said borough boundary across Breydon Water, to the line of the Great Eastern Railway, thence, continuing to follow the said borough boundary across the said railway, in an easterly direction, in an irregular line to the centre of the River Bure, and thence, in a northerly direction, along the centre of the said river to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 2, otherwise Saint Nicholas Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the Great Eastern Railway Bridge (over the River Bure), and thence, in a northerly direction, along the centre of such river and coincident with a portion of the eastern boundary of North Ward (hereinafter described) to the point where the said boundary turns at a right angle from the said river, thence following, and coincident with, a portion of the boundary of the said North Ward, first, in an easterly direction along the centre of Rampart-road to the centre of Northgate-street, thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Northgate-street to a point opposite the centre of Kitchener-road, thence, in an easterly direction,

along the centre of Kitchener-road and Sandown-road, and crossing the beach, to the eastward or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at a right angle to the southward, along and coincident with the said maritime boundary, to a point opposite the centre of Euston-road, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction, crossing the beach and continuing along the centre of Euston-road and Saint Nicholas-road to the junction of the said Saint Nicholas-road with the Market Place, thence, across the Market Place at an obtuse angle, in a north-westerly direction, to the north-east corner of the foot-pavement at Burroughs' Corner, thence, in a westerly direction, along the north kerb of the footway, at the south end of Brewery Plain to its junction with Howard-street North, thence across the said Howard-street North, in a westerly direction along the centre of Row 19, and across George-street through the centre of a new road recently formed on the south side of Messrs. Lacon's Brewery Store, to the junction of the said new road with the North Quay, thence crossing the North Quay in a south-westerly direction to the centre of the approach of the Great Eastern Railway Bridge, thence turning at a right angle and running in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said approach, to and along the centre of the said bridge to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 3. Market Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 3, otherwise Market Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point at the intersection of the centre lines of the streams of the Rivers Yare and Bure, and thence in a north-easterly direction, along the centre of the River Bure and coincident with a portion of the south-east boundary of North Ward (hereinbefore described) to a point in the centre of the Great Eastern Railway Company's Bridge over the said River Bure, thence turning at a right angle and running in a southerly direction over and along the centre of the said bridge and the approach thereto as far as the North Quay, thence following and coincident with the southern boundary of Saint Nicholas Ward (hereinbefore described) in a north-easterly direction across the North Quay, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the road recently formed on the south of Messrs. Lacon's Brewery Store, across George-street along the centre of Row 19 across Howard-street North along the north kerb of the footpath at the south end of the Brewery Plain across the Market Place in a south-easterly direction, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Saint Nicholas-road and Euston-road and along a line produced through the centre of the said Euston-road across the beach to the eastward or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence turning at a right angle to the southward along and coincident with the said maritime boundary to a point opposite the centre of Princes-road, thence turning at a right angle in a westerly direction across the said beach Beach Gardens and Marine Parade, along the centre of Princes-road and Middle Market-road to a point in the Market Place where the said Middle Market-road joins the said Market Place, thence at an obtuse angle in a north-westerly direction across the Market Place to the eastern entrance of Row 32, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Row 32 across North Howard-street, Row 33, George-street, Row 34 and North Quay, along the centre of Quay Mill-road, to a point in

the centre of the River Yare, opposite the centre of Quay Mill-road, and thence turning at an obtuse angle in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said River Yare to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 4. Britannia Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 4, otherwise Britannia Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare opposite the centre of Quay Mill-road, thence in an easterly direction, following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of Market Ward (hereinbefore described), through and along the centre of Quay Mill-road, across North Quay along the centre of Row 34, across George-street, along Row 33, across North Howard-street, along Row 32, crossing the Market Place, at an obtuse angle, in a south-easterly and easterly direction, along the centre of Middle Market-road and Princes-road, and continuing along a line produced through the centre of the said Princes-road, across the beach, Beach Gardens and Marine Parade, to the eastward, or maritime, boundary of the said borough, and thence turning at a right angle to the southward, along and coincident with the said maritime boundary to a point opposite the southernmost edge of the Britannia Pier, thence, in a westerly direction, parallel with the axis of the said pier, across the said beach and Beach Gardens, to a point on the easternmost edge of the eastern footway of the Marine Parade, thence, in a north-westerly direction, across the Marine Parade, to the centre of Regent-road at a point where such road intersects the Marine Parade, thence, in a westerly direction, along the centre of Regent-road, to its intersection with Dene Side, thence, turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, along the centre of the road on the west of Theatre Plain to the northern end of such road, and across the Market Place at an obtuse angle, in a north-westerly direction, to the entrance of Row 49, thence in a westerly direction, along the centre of Row 49, across Howard-street and along the centre of Row 50, across George-street, thence in a westerly direction following the southern edge of the footpath, at the northern end of Hall Quay, across the North Quay and along the northern end of Stone Cutter's Quay, to a point in the centre of the said River Yare, and thence turning at a right angle in a northerly direction along the centre of the said River Yare, to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 5. Regent Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 5 otherwise Regent Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line, commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare, opposite the northern end of Stone Cutter's Quay, and thence proceeding in an easterly direction following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of Britannia Ward (hereinbefore described) along the northern end of Stone Cutter's Quay, across North Quay, along the southern edge of the footway at the north end of Hall Quay, across George-street, along the centre of Row 50, across Howard-street, thence along the centre of Row 49, and crossing in a south-easterly direction, the Market Place to the northern extremity of the road on the west of Theatre Plain, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said road to its junction with Regent-road, and turning at a right angle,

in an easterly direction, along the centre of Regent-road to the eastern end thereof, thence in a south-easterly direction across the Marine Parade to the eastern edge of the footway on the east of the said parade, thence in an easterly direction parallel with the axis of the Britannia Pier and on the south thereof, across the Beach Gardens and the beach to the eastward or maritime boundary of the said borough, and thence, turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction, following and coincident with such maritime boundary to a point thereon opposite the end of Trafalgar-road, thence, across the beach in a westerly direction, along the centre of such road to its junction with Dene Side, thence, turning at an obtuse angle, in a northerly direction along the centre of Dene Side to a point therein opposite the centre of Row 86, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction along the centre of the said Row 86 to the centre of King-street, thence, turning at a right angle, in a northerly direction along the centre of King-street to a point opposite the centre of Row 78, thence, turning at a right angle in a westerly direction, along the centre of Row 78, across Howard-street South, along the centre of Row 77, across Middlegate-street along the centre of Row 76, across South Quay to the centre of the River Yare, and thence turning at a right angle and proceeding in a northerly direction along the centre of the said river to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 6. Saint George's Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 6, otherwise Saint George's Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line, commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare, opposite the western end of Row 76, thence, proceeding in an easterly direction, following and coincident with the southern boundary of Regent Ward, across South Quay, along the centre of Row 76, across Middlegate-street, along the centre of Row 77, across Howard-street South, along the centre of Row 78, to the centre of King-street, thence, turning at a right angle, and proceeding in a southerly direction along the centre of King-street, to a point opposite the centre of Row 86, thence, turning at a right angle, in an easterly direction, along the centre of Row 86, to the centre of Dene Side, thence turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction, along the centre of Dene Side to its intersection with Trafalgar-road, thence, turning at an obtuse angle, in an easterly direction, along the centre of Trafalgar-road, across the Marine Parade, thence crossing the beach to the eastward or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction following and coincident with such maritime boundary, to a point thereon opposite the end of York-road, thence, proceeding at a right angle in a westerly direction, across the beach and Marine Parade, and along the centre of York-road to the centre of King-street, and turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, and proceeding along the centre of the said street to a point opposite the centre of Row 113, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction along the centre of Row 113 to the centre of Middlegate-street, and turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, along the centre of Middlegate-street, to a point opposite the centre of Row 111, thence, turning at a right angle in a westerly direction, along the centre of Row 111, across South Quay to the centre of the River Yare, and thence turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, along the

centre of the said river, to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 7. Saint Peter's Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 7, otherwise Saint Peter's Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare, opposite the western end of Row 111, thence, in an easterly direction, following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of Saint George's Ward, across South Quay, along the centre of Row 111, and turning in a southerly direction, at a right angle, along the centre of Middlegate-street, to the entrance of Row 113, thence, in an easterly direction along the centre of Row 113 to King-street, thence, in a southerly direction, along the centre of King-street, to a point opposite the west end of York-road, and turning at a right angle in an easterly direction, along the centre of York-road, across the Marine Parade and beach, to the eastward or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction following and coincident with such maritime boundary to a point therein opposite the end of Devonshire-road, thence, turning at a right angle in a westerly direction, across the beach, Beach Gardens and Marine Parade, along the centre of Devonshire-road and Old Wellington-passage, to the centre of Nelson-road, thence, turning at a right angle in a southerly direction, along the centre of Nelson-road to its intersection with Victoria-road, thence, turning at an acute angle in a north-westerly direction, along the centre of Victoria-road to its junction with Saint Peter's road, thence, turning at an obtuse angle in a westerly direction, along the centre of Saint Peter's-road, across King-street, along the centre of Saint Peter's-row East, across Middlegate-street, along the centre of Saint Peter's-row West, across South Quay, to the centre of the River Yare, and thence, turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, along the centre of the said river to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 8. Nelson Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 8, otherwise Nelson Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare opposite the west end of Saint Peter's-row West, thence, proceeding in an easterly direction following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of the Saint Peter's Ward, across South Quay, along the centre of Saint Peter's-row West, across Middlegate-street, and along the centre of Saint Peter's-row East, across King-street, along the centre of Saint Peter's-road, to its intersection with Victoria-road, turning at an obtuse angle in a south-easterly direction, along the centre of Victoria-road, to its intersection with Nelson-road, thence, turning at an acute angle in a northerly direction, proceeding along the centre of Nelson-road, to a point opposite Old Wellington-passage, turning at a right angle, and proceeding in an easterly direction, along the centre of Old Wellington-passage and Devonshire-road, across the Marine Parade, Beach Gardens and the beach to the eastern or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at a right angle, in a southerly direction following, and coincident with, the said maritime boundary, to a point therein opposite Albert-square, and turning at a right angle in a westerly direction, across the beach, Beach Gardens, through the

centre of the Winter Garden and across the Marine Parade, along the centre of Albert-square to Nelson-road South, thence, at a right angle, in a southerly direction along the centre of Nelson-road South to a point at its intersection with Clarence-road, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction along the centre of Clarence-road to its intersection with Boreham-road, thence at a right angle in a northerly direction along the centre of Boreham-road to its junction with Malakoff-road, thence at an obtuse angle in a westerly direction along the centre of Malakoff-road to its junction with Blackfriars-road, thence at a right angle in a southerly direction across Blackfriars-road to the south side of the south-east tower on the town walls, thence at an obtuse angle in a westerly direction along the centre of Friar's-lane to Southgates-road, thence at a right angle in a northerly direction along the centre of Southgates-road to the southern extremity of the South Quay, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction across the south end of the South Quay to a point in the centre of the River Yare, and thence at a right angle in a northerly direction along the centre of the said river to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 9. South Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 9, otherwise South Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare opposite the southern end of the South Quay, thence in an easterly direction following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of Nelson Ward across South Quay in a southerly direction along Southgates-road, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Friar's-lane to the south side of the south-east tower on the town walls, thence in a north-easterly direction across Blackfriars-road in an easterly direction along the centre of Malakoff-road, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Boreham-road, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Clarence-road, thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Nelson-road South, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Albert-square across the Marine Parade through the centre of the Winter Garden across the Beach Gardens and the beach to the eastward or maritime boundary of the borough, thence at a right angle in a southerly direction following and coincident with the said maritime boundary to a point in the same opposite the centre of the mouth of the River Yare, thence at a right angle in a westerly direction along the centre of the said River Yare, and thence following in a northerly direction the centre of the said River Yare to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 10. Southtown Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 10, otherwise Southtown Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth, as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point in the centre of the River Yare at the extreme western end of the borough boundary, and proceeding in an easterly direction along the centre of the said river to a point where the same joins a portion of the boundary of the North Ward, thence in a curved line first in a north-easterly and then in a south-easterly direction, following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of the North Ward continuing along the centre of the said river to the junction of the

streams of the said Rivers Yare and Bure, thence in a southerly direction, along the centre of the said River Yare, following, and coincident with, portions of the boundaries of Market, Britannia, Regent, Saint George's, Saint Peter's, and Nelson Wards (hereinbefore described) to a point opposite Ferry-road, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction, along the centre of Ferry-road to its junction with Southtown-road, thence, at a right angle in a southerly direction, along the centre of Southtown-road to Gordon-road, thence, at a right angle in a westerly direction, along the centre of Gordon-road, and along a straight line produced through the centre of the said Gordon-road, to the main drainage dyke of the Southtown and Burgh Castle Drainage Board, thence, following the centre of the said dyke in a north-westerly and westerly direction, crossing the Great Eastern Railway Company's main line, to the boundary of the said borough, thence following and coincident with the said borough boundary to the extreme western point thereof, and thence, turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, following the said borough boundary to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 11. Saint Andrew's Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 11, otherwise Saint Andrew's Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at a point where the main drainage dyke of the Southtown and Burgh Castle Drainage Board touches the boundary of the borough, and proceeding in an easterly direction, following and coincident with a portion of the boundary of Southtown Ward (hereinbefore described) along the said main drainage dyke, thence, along the centre of Gordon-road to its eastern end, turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, along the centre of Southtown-road, to a point opposite Ferry-road, thence, turning at a right angle, in an easterly direction, along the centre of the said Ferry-road to a point in the centre of the River Yare, thence, turning at a right angle, along the centre of the said River Yare, in a southerly direction, following and coincident with portions of the boundaries of Saint Peter's and Nelson Wards (hereinbefore described) to a point opposite the centre of Baker-street, and turning at a right angle in a westerly direction, proceeding along the centre of Baker-street, across the southern end of Feathers Plain, along the centres of South Church-lane, Church-lane, and Crab-lane to a point where the boundary of the borough intersects the said Crab-lane, and thence, turning at a right angle in a northerly direction, following and coincident with the said borough boundary to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 12. Gorleston Ward.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 12, otherwise Gorleston Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Great Yarmouth as is contained within an imaginary line commencing at the western point on the borough boundary in Crab-lane, proceeding in an easterly direction along the said Crab-lane until it becomes coincident with a portion of the boundary of Saint Andrew's Ward, along the centre of Crab-lane, Church-lane, and South Church-lane, across the southern end of Feathers Plain, along the centre of Baker-street to a point in the centre of the River Yare, thence, turning at a right angle in a southerly direction and continuing in an easterly direction along the centre of the said river, following and

coincident with a portion of the boundary of Nelson Ward to the eastern or maritime boundary of the said borough, thence, turning at an acute angle in a south-westerly and a southerly direction, following and coincident with the said maritime boundary to its southern extremity, thence, turning at a right angle, in a westerly direction and following the southern and western boundaries of the said borough to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I, the said Henry Best Hans Hamilton, in further pursuance of the power given to me by the said appointment, and in accordance with the provisions of the thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, do hereby assign and apportion among each of the said twelve wards hereby determined, three Councillors in the order of their rotation of retirement, or in the event of a casual or other vacancy before this my scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette, to the successor of each one of them.

1. The duties of the office of Registrar of His Majesty in Ecclesiastical and Maritime Causes, heretofore held by the said John George Smith, shall hereafter, during His Majesty's pleasure, and subject to such arrangements with respect to the duties of the said office of Registrar of His Majesty in Admiralty and Ecclesiastical Causes, either by abolition thereof, or otherwise, as to His Majesty may seem expedient, be discharged by the Registrar of the Privy Council for the time being.

2. The Registry of the Privy Council shall hereafter, during His Majesty's pleasure, be for all purposes the Registry in Appeals to His Majesty in Ecclesiastical and Maritime Causes.

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, directing the discontinuance of burials in amongst other places, the Parish Church and Churcuyard of Elsenham, in the county of Essex:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that so much of the said Order as relates to the parish of Elsenham be varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that so much of the said Order of the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, as relates to the Parish Church and Churchyard of Elsenham, be varied so that, notwithstanding anything therein, it shall be lawful to bury the body of the late Reverend John Whately, in the parish Churchyard of Elsenham, in the county of Essex, in the grave in which are interred the remains of his wife: Provided that the burial hereby authorized shall be subject to compliance with the requirement that the coffin be entombed in concrete.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered; provided also, that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish.

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Saint Andrew, Heckington, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the civil parish of Heckington without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parish as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the twenty-first day of April last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the said civil parish without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:

HECKINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Andrew, Heckington, in the Parts of Kesteven, and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In that portion of the church known as the Wynkhill Aisle burial may be allowed in any existing vault subject to the following conditions:—

(a.) That the interior of any such vault in preparation for or immediately after any burial therein shall be thoroughly and effectually ventilated by suitable and sufficient means in direct communication with the external air beyond the walls of the church;

(b.) That, as soon as may be after the deposit of a coffin in any such vault, the coffin shall be wholly and permanently enclosed by means of stone flagging properly jointed in cement or brickwork in cement, and otherwise in such manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the interior of the enclosure so formed; and

(c.) That, as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of a coffin in any such vault, the entrance to the vault from the church shall be properly covered, and the covering shall be hermetically sealed by concrete or cement in such a manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the vault into the church.

WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Saint Nicholas, South Ockendon, in the county of Essex; and of the parish of Holy Trinity, Elsworth, in the county of Cambridge, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representations, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial grounds should be opened in the civil parishes of South Ockendon and Elsworth, without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:

SOUTH OCKENDON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Nicholas, and the

Congregational Chapel, South Ockendon, in the county of Essex; and in the churchyard and chapelyard attached to the said church and chapel respectively, except as follows:—

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard or the said chapelyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard or the said chapelyard the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave:

(c.) In the said chapelyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

ELSWORTH—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Holy Trinity, Elsworth, in the county of Cambridge; and in the old portion of the parish churchyard, except as follows:—

In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard the burial may be allowed at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the first day of August next:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representations one month before the said first day of August.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of Magdalen College, Oxford, on the 11th day of May, 1904, amending certain of the Statutes of the College, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTE to amend the existing Statutes of Magdalen College in the University of Oxford, dated the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, duly made at a General Meeting of the President and Fellows especially summoned for this purpose on the eleventh day of May, one thousand nine hundred and four, and passed at such meeting by the

votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted to His Majesty the King in Council.

VI.

Statute for Magdalen College made by the College under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

Preliminary.

This Statute is supplementary to the existing Statutes of the College, that is to say, the Statutes dated the 16th day of June, 1881, made for the College by the University of Oxford Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as the Statutes of 1881) as altered by the Statutes dated the 10th day of August, 1888 (hereinafter referred to as the Statutes of 1888), the Statutes dated the 7th day of March, 1899 (hereinafter referred to as the Statutes of 1899), and the Statute dated the 15th day of September, 1902, made by the College under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

Fellows.

1. The number of Fellows elected or re-elected under clauses 20 and 21 of the Statutes of 1881 as to Fellows shall not be greater than ten and shall not exceed one third of the total number of persons holding Fellowships when such election or re-election shall have taken place, provided that in the computation of the said total number Fellows elected under clause 5 of the Statutes of 1888 and clause 12 of the Statutes of 1899 as to Fellows shall not be reckoned.

Provided that if among the Fellows so elected or re-elected there be already one or more persons holding Fellowships on the condition of performing educational work in the College the number of such persons shall not by any election or re-election be increased so as to exceed one third of the total number of persons holding Fellowships in virtue of an election or re-election under the said clauses 20 and 21 of the Statutes of 1881 as to Fellows when such election shall have taken place.

2. The clause numbered 7 of the Statutes of 1899 as to Fellows is hereby repealed.

3. It shall be lawful for the President and Fellows, at stated general meetings, by a majority of not less than three fourths of the votes of those present, at the request or with the consent of a Fellow elected or re-elected under clauses 20 and 21 of the Statutes of 1881 as to Fellows, to modify or alter the conditions of tenure specified in the Resolution by which such Fellow was elected or re-elected, and the Resolution declaring such modification or alteration shall during the remainder of the term for which such Fellow was elected or re-elected take the place of the Resolution by which he was elected or re-elected.

Provided that in the case of a Fellow elected or re-elected as Professor or Public Reader in the University, or as undertaking to perform any work in the University or under the direction of the University, no Resolution declaring any modification or alteration in the conditions of his tenure shall take effect without the assent of the Hebdomadal Council of the University.

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Balliol College, Oxford, on the 26th day of May, 1904, amending certain of the Statutes of the College, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877" :—

STATUTE to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877" (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), and approved by Her late Majesty in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to Balliol College in the University of Oxford.

In the matter of a Statute concerning "The Fellows" such amending Statute being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and four, and passed by the unanimous vote of those present.

In Statute III clause 19 shall be struck out, and in clause 27 all the words after the words "vacate his Fellowship" shall be struck out, and the following new clause shall be added :—

(a) Upon the vacation of his Fellowship for any cause by any Fellow of the College, the Master and Fellows may, if they think fit, at a Stated General Meeting by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting, continue his Fellowship for a term of five years, and may from time to time so continue it for further like terms with its former precedence.

(b) No stipend shall be attached to a Fellowship so continued.

Statute to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877" (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), and approved by Her late Majesty in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to Balliol College in the University of Oxford.

In the matter of a Statute concerning "The Scholars and Exhibitioners," such amending Statute being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and four, and passed by the unanimous vote of those present.

In Statute IV, clause 9, the words "two years" where they last occur shall be struck out and the words "one year" shall be substituted, and after the words "two years" where they last occur the following words shall be inserted :— "At the end of this period if the Master and Fellows shall by resolution have declared themselves satisfied with the industry and good conduct of the Scholar or Exhibitioner the tenure of his Scholarship or Exhibition shall be renewed for a further term of one year."

In clause 12 of the same Statute after the word "regulations" the words "contained in clauses 9, 10, 11, and 13 of this Statute and also to the regulations" shall be inserted.

In Schedule B, § 4, Greaves Exhibition, the words "The Exhibitioners of the Foundation of John Warner" down to the end of the section shall be struck out.

In Schedule B, § 5, General, the words from the commencement down to and inclusive of the words "Scholars of the College" shall be struck out; and in the same section the words "in any of these Scholarships or Exhibitions" shall also be struck out and the following words shall be substituted "in the Blundell Scholarships, or in the Newte, Warner, or Greaves Exhibitions."

STATUTE to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, 40 and 41 Vict., cap. 48, and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to New College in the University of Oxford, in the matter of application of Pension Fund, such amending Statute being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the fifteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and four, and passed by the unanimous votes of those present and voting.

For Statute XV to substitute the following :—

1. The Warden and Fellows may set apart out of the general revenues of the College a yearly sum not exceeding £1,000, to form a Pension Fund for the payment of pensions to any persons who may have served the College in the capacity of Tutor, or Lecturer, or Bursar, or in more than one of these capacities, and may add to the Fund such a deduction not exceeding £10 per centum per annum from the Tuition Fund, as they may from time to time determine.

2. The fund so formed shall be applied (subject to the provisions of these Statutes) under By-Laws to be made by the Warden and Fellows.

3. As soon as the sum accumulated in the Pension Fund shall amount to £18,000, such sum shall be permanently appropriated as capital for the Pension Fund. The annual income derived from it shall form part of the income of the Pension Fund, and the principal shall not be expended for any purpose whatever.

4. When the capital of the Pension Fund has reached the sum mentioned in Clause 3, the income of the fund not required for the payment of current pensions shall from year to year be invested as a Pension Reserve. The annual income derived from the Pension Reserve shall form part of the income of the Pension Fund. If in any year the income of the Pension Fund shall not suffice to provide the whole of the pensions payable in that year, a sum sufficient to supply

the deficiency shall be taken from the Pension Reserve, but the capital of that fund shall not be available for any other purpose.

5. The capital accumulated for the Pension Fund, and the Pension Reserve, shall from time to time be invested in securities in which trust funds may legally be invested.

ART. 1°. La Aduana de "Puerto Cristóbal Colón," creada por Decreto Ejecutivo de 7 de diciembre de 1903, comenzará a ejercer sus funciones desde el 1° de junio próximo y su jurisdicción comprenderá desde el Promontorio de Paria hasta la Boca del Rio Grande.

La Aduana de Tucacas, creada por Decreto Ejecutivo de 28 de noviembre de 1903, entrará a ejercer las funciones que tiene señaladas desde el 1° de junio próximo, y su jurisdicción será desde Boca de Aroa hasta Boca de Güeque. Queda, en consecuencia derogada la Resolución del Ministerio de Hacienda y Crédito Público de 28 de noviembre de 1903.

ART. 4°. Se rehabilita para el comercio de importación, de exportación y de cabotaje la Aduana de La Vela, cerrada temporalmente por Decreto Ejecutivo de fecha 27 de mayo de 1903, con las mismas facultades y deberes que tenía antes de ser suprimida.

§ único. La jurisdicción de esta Aduana será desde la Boca de Güeque hasta la Punta de Oribono.

ART. 5°. Dése cuenta de este Decreto al Congreso Nacional en su próxima reunión.

ART. 6°. El Ministro de Hacienda y Crédito Público queda encargado de la ejecución de este Decreto.

I, Cipriano Castro, Provisional President of the United States of Venezuela :

Hereby Decree :—

ARTICLE 1. The Custom House of "Cristóbal Colón" established by an Executive Decree of the 7th of December, 1903, will commence carrying out its duties from the 1st of next June; its jurisdiction shall lie between the Promontory of Paria and the mouth of the Rio Grande.

ARTICLE 2. In fulfilment of the provisions of Article 4 of the said Decree of December 7th, 1903, the Custom House of Ciudad Bolívar is hereby declared open, and it shall enjoy the same powers and have the same duties, with the same jurisdiction, as before its closure.

ARTICLE 3. The Customs at Tucacas, established by Executive Decree of November 28th, 1903, will begin to perform its duties from the 1st of June next, and its jurisdiction shall extend from the mouth of the Aroa to the mouth of the Güeque. The resolution passed by the Ministry of Finance and Public Credit on the 28th of November, 1903, is consequently hereby revoked.

ARTICLE 4. The Customs at La Vela, temporarily closed by Executive Decree of the 27th May, 1903, is hereby opened to the import, export, and coasting trades, and it shall have the same powers and duties as those which it enjoyed prior to its closure.

(a) The jurisdiction of this Custom House shall lie between the mouth of the Güeque and Cape Oribono.

ARTICLE 5. An account is to be duly rendered of this Decree to the National Congress in its next sessions.

ARTICLE 6. The Minister of Finance and Public Credit is entrusted with the execution of this Decree.

RYE UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Rye Union;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by General Orders bearing date the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the Poor Law Board and We, the Local Government Board, made rules and regulations relating, amongst other things, to the appointment and remuneration of certain Officers, therein named Collectors of the Guardians, by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the Rye Union;

And whereas the said Orders contained provisions as to the payment of a salary to any person holding the office of Collector of the Guardians, and it is expedient to amend the said Orders as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Rye Union:

3. If any money be payable to a holder of stock in the Company, being a minor, idiot or lunatic, the receipt of the guardian or committee of his estate shall be a sufficient discharge to the Company.

The provisions of sections 47 to 53 and 59 to 70, all inclusive, of the South Western Railway (Additional Powers) Act, 1862, shall extend to this Certificate with respect to the Company and the stock which, by this Certificate, they are authorized to create and issue, and be read and construed as if in those sections the words "this Certificate" were substituted for the words "this Act."

Further borrowing powers to the Company.

The Company may from time to time (in addition to any sums which they are for the time being authorized to borrow) borrow on mortgage of their undertaking in respect of the additional capital of one million pounds, which they are by this Certificate authorized to raise, any sum or sums not exceeding in the whole three hundred and thirty-three thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds.

Existing mortgages to have priority.

6. All mortgages granted by the Company, in pursuance of any Act passed before the date when this Certificate comes into operation, and subsisting at that time, shall, during the continuance thereof respectively, have priority over any mortgages to be granted by virtue of this Certificate. Provided that this section shall not apply to any mortgage from time to time granted by the Company in accordance with section 21 of the South Western Railway (General) Act, 1865, or section 60 of the South Western Railway (General) Act, 1867.

Appointment of Receiver.

7. The Company's mortgagees may enforce payment of arrears of interest or principal, or principal and interest, due on their mortgages by the appointment of a receiver, and in order to authorize the appointment of a receiver in respect of arrears of principal the amount of principal owing to the mortgagees, by whom the application for a receiver is made, shall not be less in the whole than ten thousand pounds.

Tramways Act, 1870.

NOTICE is hereby given, that at a Special Meeting of the Urban District Council of Hampton Wick, held on the 13th day of June, 1904, the following Bye-laws were made by the Council under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870:—

BYE-LAWS made under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, by the Urban District Council of Hampton Wick for the tramways within their district.

1. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term "car" shall mean any carriage using any tramway laid down within the said district, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the driver and conductor or other person having charge of a car.

2. The driver of every car shall so drive the same that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than 50 yards, except in cases of emergency, when the driver shall comply with the directions given by the authority controlling traffic on the spot.

3. No car shall be stopped within a clear space of 15 yards of another car on a parallel line of rails, nor within a clear space of 15 yards of the intersection or junction of two or more streets or roads.

Provided, nevertheless, that it shall be lawful to stop cars alongside or opposite to the westerly side of the triangular refuge at the foot of Kingston Bridge.

4. No driver or conductor shall needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

5. In cases where by reason of the traffic it becomes necessary for any car to cross over from one set of rails to the other, the car so crossing shall recross the roadway at the next practicable crossing.

6. Every driver, conductor, or other person, offending against any of these Bye-laws and Regulations, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, and not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues.

These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 22nd day of August, 1904.

These Bye-laws were adopted by the Urban District Council of Hampton Wick by resolution on the 13th day of June, 1904, and the Common Seal of the Council was, in pursuance of such resolution, hereunto affixed on the said 13th day of June, 1904, in the presence of
