WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and

of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth year of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five—duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Cuthbert, Seascale, situate within the parish of Gosforth, in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Gosforth and of the parish of Drigg, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Gosforth and of the said parish of Drigg should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Cuthbert, Seascale, situate as aforesaid.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Wareing, Bishop of Carlisle, as diocesan and with the consent of the Right Honourable James Lowther, of Wilton Castle, Redcar, in the county of York, a Member of the Commons' House of Parliament, as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Gosforth; and

with the consents of Samuel Lindow Burns-Lindow, of Ingwell, near Moor Row, in the said county of Cumberland, Esquire, and of Isaac William Burns-Lindow, of Cleator, in the same county, a Captain of Your Majesty's Eighth Regiment of Hussars, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Drigg (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Gosforth and of the said parish of Drigg which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Cuthbert, Seascale situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert, Seascale.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert, Seascale, comprising:—

"All those two contiguous portions of the parish of Gosforth and of the parish of Drigg both in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle which are comprised within and are co-extensive with the limits of the civil parish of Seascale as enlarged by the Order of the Local Government Board entitled 'The County of Cumberland (Seascale and Drigg-and-Carleton) Confirmation Order 1901' confirming the Order of the County Council of Cumberland dated the seventh day of November in the year one thousand nine hundred for the alteration of the boundaries of the civil parishes of Seascale and Drigg-and-Carleton."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing

date the third day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James, situate at Huncote; in the parish of Narborough, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint James, situate at Huncote as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Edward Carr, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Narborough, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint James, situate at Huncote, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint James, Huncote.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edward Carr, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint James, situate at Huncote as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James, Huncote, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Narborough, in the county of Leicester and in the diocese of Peterborough, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the hamlet and civil parish of Huncote."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the

time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the twenty-fourth day of October one thousand nine hundred and four and known as the British Protectorates Neutrality Order in Council 1904 provision was made for the regulation of the conduct of the inhabitants of British Protectorates and other persons residing therein, during the existence of hostilities between foreign states with which His Majesty is at peace:

And whereas the Bechuanaland Protectorate was not included amongst the Protectorates enumerated in the Schedule to the said Order and the said Order therefore does not extend to the said Protectorate:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order should extend to the said Protectorate; and that the said Schedule should be otherwise amended:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act 1890 or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The British Protectorates Neutrality Order in Council 1904 is hereby amended by the substitution of the following Schedule for the Schedule annexed to the said Order, viz.:—

So much of Tramway No. 1 as extends from a point in Manchester-road within the borough of Accrington (hereinafter referred to as "the borough") opposite to the southerly entrance gates of Oak Hill Park, passing thence in a northerly direction along Manchester-road,

Abbey-street and Whalley-road to a point in that road at the intersection of Lime-street with such road.

This tramway will be situate within the borough.

So much of Tramway No. 6 as extends from a point in Blackburn-road within the borough at the intersection of Church-street with that road, passing thence in a westerly direction along Blackburn-road to a point in such road opposite the westerly side of the intersection of Edgar-street with Blackburn-road.

This tramway will be situate within the borough.

So much of Tramway No. 7 as extends from a point in Blackburn-road within the parish and urban district of Church 1·5 chains west of the intersection of Henry-street with such road, passing thence in a westerly direction along Blackburn-road to a point in that road on the easterly side of the intersection of Market-street with that road.

This tramway will be situate within the parish and urban district of Church.

The following are the tramways proposed to be authorized by the Bill:—

In Burnley-road—

From the point of junction with Tramway No. 1 authorized by the Act of 1882 for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 0·4 chain north-east of the intersection of Addison-street with that road for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 2·7 chains north-east of the intersection of Alice-street with that road for a distance of 1 furlong 2·3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 3·5 chains north-east of the north-easterly boundary of the borough for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 3·7 chains south-west of the southerly corner of Higher Brown Birks Farm-house for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 3·5 chains south-west of the southerly corner of Rockdale House for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

From a point 7·2 chains south-west of the southerly corner of the Griffin Head Inn for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a north-easterly direction.

Tramway No. 2, proposed to be authorized by the Bill :—

In Market-street, Church—

From the intersection of that street with Blackburn-road for a distance of 2·9 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

From a point 0·2 chain south of the intersection of Ainsworth-street with that street for a distance of 1·3 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

On the easterly side only from a point opposite the centre of the Rosebud Inn for a distance of 4 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

In Union-road, Oswaldtwistle—

From a point 0·2 chain south of the intersection of Foxhill Bank Brow with that road for a distance of 1·7 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

From a point 3 chains south of the intersection of Queen-street with that road for a distance of 3 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

From a point 0·7 chain south of the intersection of Haworth-street with that road for a distance of 1·8 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

From a point 0·4 chain south of the inter-

section of Rhyddings-street with that road for a distance of 1 furlong 0·4 chain, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

From the point of intersection of Oak-street with that road for a distance of 7 chains, or thereabouts, in a southerly direction.

The several tramways will consist of rails of the gauge of 4 feet, and it is not intended to run thereon carriages or trucks adapted for use upon railways.

The motive power to be used on the tramways is animal or steam, compressed air, gas, oil and any other mechanical power (applied by means of locomotive engines or by motors in the carriages, or by means of wire or rope cables worked by stationary engines), and electrical energy generated at stations and applied by means of motors in the engines or carriages or communicated by electric lines in or underground or overhead (all which powers other than animal power are herein included in the expression "mechanical power"), and it is intended to apply for power to use mechanical power on all or some of the tramways.

To empower the Corporation to make such alterations of the tramways and any tramways within or without the borough belonging to the Corporation, or which may for the time being be connected with any of the tramways of the Corporation or any part or parts thereof, and to execute all such works on or in connection therewith, and in, over or under the streets or roads in which the same are laid as may be necessary or expedient for adapting the same to be worked by mechanical power; and to empower the Corporation to lay down, construct and maintain on, in, under or over the surface of any street, road or place, and to attach to any house, building, bridge or tree such posts, supports, brackets, fittings, conductors, wires, tubes, mains, plates, cables, ropes and apparatus, and to make and maintain such openings and ways in, on or under any such surface as may be necessary or convenient either for the working of the tramways of the Corporation within or without the borough, or any tramway within or without the borough which may, for the time being, be connected with the tramways or the tramway Undertaking, or for connecting any portions of the said tramways or any tramways within or without the borough with any tramways or light railways within or without the borough which can be worked in connection with the tramway Undertaking, or for providing access to or forming connections with any generating station or stations, engines, machinery or apparatus.

To empower the Corporation to construct any of the proposed tramways, and to reconstruct any of their existing tramways by substituting single or interlacing lines for double lines or double or interlacing lines for single lines.

To empower the Corporation when any road in which a tramway is laid is altered or widened, to reconstruct such tramway in such position as they think fit.

To enable the Corporation for the construction of any tramway to increase the width of the roadway by reducing the width of any footpath.

To provide that so much of section 34 of the Tramways Act, 1870, as limits the extent of any carriages used on any tramway beyond the outer edge of the wheels of such carriages shall not apply to carriages used on the tramways and the tramway Undertaking.

¶ To authorize the Corporation for the purpose of reconstructing or constructing any tramway in any street to take up, remove or dispose of, or (if thought fit), to appropriate and use in the construction of that tramway all or any of the materials now forming the existing tramways.

To empower the Corporation to make from time to time such turnouts, crossings, passing places, sidings, loops, junctions and other works in addition to those specified herein as may be necessary or convenient for the efficient working of all or any of the before-mentioned tramways or light railways, or for affording access to the stables, carriages, engine, boiler and dynamo-houses, buildings, sheds and works of the Corporation or their lessees, or for effecting junctions with the system of any other Corporation, Company or person.

To empower the Corporation from time to time when by reason of the execution of any work in or the alteration of any street, road, highway or thoroughfare in which any tramways or light railway, channel or electric line shall be laid or placed it is necessary or expedient so to do, to alter, remove or discontinue all or any part of such tramway or light railway, channel or electric line, and to make, lay down and place temporarily in the same or any adjacent street, road, highway or thoroughfare a substituted tramway or light railway, channel or electric line, or substituted tramways or light railways, or channels or electric lines.

To confer on and to reserve to the Corporation and their lessees the exclusive right of using on the tramways and the tramway Undertaking, carriages drawn or propelled by any motive power hereinbefore mentioned, and having wheels adapted to run on or in an edged, grooved or other rail on such tramways.

To provide for the repair by the Corporation or their lessees or other persons, bodies or authorities of any streets, roads, highways or thoroughfares in which any tramway or light railway, channel or electric line may for the time being be laid or placed, and for the use or disposition of any materials or things found or displaced in the reconstruction, construction or repair of any of the tramways or light railways, or channels or electric lines.

To empower the Corporation and their lessees to place and run carriages on the tramways and the tramway Undertaking, and on any tramway or light railway within or without the borough which may for the time being be connected with the tramway Undertaking of the Corporation, and to work and demand and take tolls, rates and charges in respect of the use of such tramways, light railways and carriages, and for the conveyance of passengers, animals, goods, minerals, merchandize and other traffic thereon and therein, and to confer exemptions from such tolls, rates and charges, and both within and without the borough to provide stables, buildings, carriages, trucks, horses, harness, engines, motors, machinery, apparatus and steam, electric, cable and other plant (fixed and movable) necessary or convenient for working such tramways or light railways by any motive power hereinbefore mentioned, and to sell, exchange or dispose of such of the before-mentioned articles and things as may not be required, and to apply all or some of the provisions of the Acts and Orders relating to the existing tramways of the Corporation to the proposed tramways.

To empower the Corporation to make in any

streets, roads, footways and thoroughfares all such alterations of levels and width of roadway and footway as may be expedient for or in connection with the construction of the said tramways, and to stop up, alter, divert and interfere with, either permanently or temporarily (and if permanently to appropriate the site and soil of and to extinguish all rights of way over), and to cross over, under or upon all such streets, highways, bridges, thoroughfares, railways, tramways, tramroads, rivers, navigations, canals, streams, brooks, watercourses, sewers, drains, gas and water and other pipes, and telegraphic, telephonic and electric wires, tubes, pipes, boxes and other apparatus as it may be necessary or convenient to stop up, alter, divert, interfere with or cross for any of the purposes of the Bill, and to extinguish all rights of way, manorial, commonable and other rights in, over or upon any lands to be acquired under or by virtue of the powers of the Bill.

To empower the Corporation on the one hand, and any other Corporation, Company, body or person on the other hand, to enter into and fulfil working agreements and agreements for or in relation to the working, running over, management and maintenance of and interchange of traffic on and the supply of rolling-stock or motive power for and the fixing, collection, payment, appropriation and distribution of tolls on their respective Undertakings.

In the event of the Local Authority of any district in which the tramways of the Corporation may be laid purchasing or acquiring the portion of the tramways of the Corporation or any part thereof in such district, to empower the Corporation or any lessees of the Corporation tramways, or any other Corporation, body or person owning or working any tramway or light railway connected with such purchased portion, to run over, compulsorily or otherwise, the tramway so purchased as aforesaid.

To constitute the said tramways and works for all purposes (subject to the provisions of the Bill) part of the tramway Undertaking of the Corporation.

To empower the Corporation to purchase or take on lease any authorized tramways, tramroads or light railways outside the borough which form continuations of the Corporation tramways, and which can be worked in connection therewith, and to constitute the said tramways, tramroads and light railways, if so purchased, part of the tramway Undertaking of the Corporation.

To empower the Corporation to erect and maintain shelters or waiting rooms in connection with their tramway Undertaking, and for that purpose to use portions of the public streets and roads; to provide for the stopping of roads during the execution of works, the lopping of trees overhanging public highways, and the removal of snow and other matters impeding the traffic on the tramways; to enable the Corporation to acquire and exercise patent rights for the purposes of their electrical and tramway Undertakings, and to provide and run omnibuses in connection with the latter Undertaking or in the prolongation or extension thereof.

To empower the Corporation and any District or Local Authority to enter into and carry into effect agreements with respect to all or any of the matters aforesaid, and to confirm and give effect to any such agreement which may have been or may be made prior to the passing of the Bill, and to empower the Corporation and any such

District or Local Authority to apply to any of the purposes aforesaid any of their Corporate funds or other moneys under their control.

The Bill will incorporate some of the provisions of the Act of 1882, and the whole or some of the provisions of the Tramways Act, 1870, with such alterations and amendments as hereinbefore mentioned, or otherwise, as may be deemed expedient, and will enable the Corporation to exercise the powers granted by those Acts as well as the powers hereinbefore mentioned.

The Bill will repeal certain provisions of the Act of 1882, and particularly section 20 (Additional crossings, &c., may be made where necessary) and section 64 (For the protection of the Clayton le Moors Local Board, &c.).

Street Works.

To authorize the Corporation to make and maintain the following street works (that is to say) :—

A widening and improvement of Blackburn-road in the urban district of Church, on the southerly side thereof for a distance of 9 yards, or thereabouts, measured in an easterly direction from the north-westerly corner of the post office.

A widening and improvement of Market-street in the urban district of Church, on the easterly side thereof for a distance of 9 yards, or thereabouts, measured in a southerly direction from the north-westerly corner of the post office.

A widening and improvement of Union-road in the urban district of Oswaldtwistle, on the westerly side thereof for a distance of 49½ yards, or thereabouts, measured in a southerly direction from the north-easterly corner of the house and shop No. 16, Union-road.

To authorize the Corporation to deviate in the construction of the said street works, both vertically and laterally, to the extent shown on the deposited plans and sections or to be defined by the Bill or prescribed by Parliament.

To authorize the Corporation in connection with the said street widenings to make such subsidiary works, junctions and communications with, and diversions, widenings or alterations of, the lines or levels of existing streets as may be necessary or expedient, and to alter, stop up, enclose or appropriate any street, square, place, court, alley or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not, as may be necessary or expedient, and to alter any steps, areas, cellars, windows, channels, pipes or spouts, and to remove all obstructions, and to set out and lay out carriage and footways, and to sell, dispose of or utilize materials of houses and buildings purchased or taken by them under the powers of the Bill, and to declare and constitute all houses and lands laid into and appropriated for street widenings part of the public streets and highways of the district in which they may be situate as the case may be and repairable as such.

To authorize the Corporation in connection with the said proposed tramways and street works to make and maintain all necessary approaches, arches, sewers, drains, goids, culverts, excavations and other works and conveniences.

Lands.

To empower the Corporation for the purposes of the tramways, street widenings and other works by the Bill proposed to be authorized, and for other the purposes of the Bill, or the existing Acts of the Corporation, to purchase and take by compulsion or agreement lands, houses,

buildings and other property, and also any rights and easements in or over lands and other property which may be required for such purposes; and to empower the Corporation to appropriate and use for the purposes of the said intended works any lands belonging to or vested in them, and to make exchanges of land with other bodies and persons, and upon any such exchanges to pay or receive money for equality of exchange; and to empower the Corporation to hold and retain any lands acquired by them under the Bill, and not required for the purposes of the said works, and to erect buildings thereon, and to grant leases of such lands and buildings.

To authorize the Corporation to hold any lands which they may acquire under the authority of the intended Act freed from the provisions of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, with respect to superfluous lands.

To enable the Corporation, with the approval of the Local Government Board, notwithstanding anything contained in the Public Health Act, 1875, to retain and use for any other purpose any lands acquired by the Corporation in pursuance of powers in this or any former local Act contained, and not required for the purpose for which they were acquired.

To exempt the Corporation from the operation of section 92 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, so as to enable them to purchase compulsorily part only of certain properties.

To provide that in estimating the amount of compensation or purchase money to be paid to any person for lands or easements acquired for any of the purposes of the Bill the benefits accruing to such person from the widening or improvement of any street under the Bill shall be set off against the said compensation or purchase money.

Public Library.

To provide for the transfer of part of the lands and premises of the Accrington Mechanics' Institution to the Corporation for public library purposes; to confirm the agreement entered into between the Corporation and the Trustees of the said institution relative to such transfer, and to enable the Corporation to erect, fit up, furnish and maintain a public library upon the lands and premises so transferred.

Electricity.

To make further provisions with respect to the electric lighting Undertaking of the Corporation; to authorize the Corporation to attach brackets, posts and wires to houses and buildings, and to supply electricity in bulk to neighbouring authorities, Companies and persons for lighting or traction or other purposes.

To provide that persons having a separate supply of electrical energy shall not be entitled to demand a supply from the Corporation.

To authorize the Corporation to provide, sell and let for hire meters, fittings and apparatus for lighting and motive power.

To enable the Corporation to allow discounts for the prompt payment of accounts; to alter the date of making up the annual accounts of the Corporation with reference to electric lighting; and to exempt from distress or seizure under any process of law electric fittings, motors, engines and apparatus hired from the Corporation.

To authorize the Corporation to accept transfers of electrical Undertakings in districts adjoining or near to the borough.

Streets and Buildings.

To make further provisions either by special

enactment or by bye-laws in regard to streets, buildings and other matters, and especially in the following respects (that is to say) :—

To provide for the retention of plans deposited with the Corporation, and that the approval of such plans shall be void if the works be not executed within certain intervals.

To provide for the construction of intersecting streets, and that dwelling-houses shall not be erected in new streets unless intersecting streets are constructed.

To provide that new buildings shall not be commenced to be erected in a new street until the whole length of the street has been defined and laid out.

To authorize the Corporation to declare where streets shall begin and end, and to provide that the continuation of existing streets shall be deemed new streets.

To prohibit the deposit of building materials and excavations on or in any streets without the consent of the Corporation.

To make provisions as to urgent repairs to private streets and the removal of obstructions therein.

To empower the Corporation to regulate the height of mill, brewery and factory chimneys, and to require yards and open spaces in connection with dwelling-houses to be flagged and paved.

To make provision as to the rounding off or splaying of buildings at the corners of streets.

To make provisions as to temporary and movable buildings.

To empower the Corporation to sell materials of temporary buildings.

To make provision for the prevention of soil and sand being washed into streets, and for the prevention of water flowing on footpaths.

Sanitary Matters.

To make further provisions with respect to sanitary matters (that is to say) :—

To require the construction of water or waste-water closets in new buildings, and for the conversion of existing closet accommodation into water or waste-water closets.

To make bye-laws as to water-closets and waste-water closets.

To make provision as to the cost of conversion and the apportionment of the same.

To make provisions as to urinals and street orderly bins.

To make provisions as to houses without water supply, and as to public conveniences and lavatories.

To make provision as to the reconstruction of drains in certain events.

To make provisions in respect of the improper construction or repair of water-closets or drains.

To provide against wilful damage to water-closets, drains, &c.

To authorize the Corporation to charge for emptying privies of trade refuse.

To provide for fencing of vacant land.

To make further provisions as to nuisances and the appointment of inspectors of nuisances.

To make provisions as to recovery of expenses.

To make provisions for the prohibition of the blowing, inflating or netting of carcasses.

Infectious Disease.

To provide that dairymen shall notify infectious disease existing amongst their servants.

To prohibit infected persons carrying on certain trades or business.

To make compensation to dairymen and persons ceasing employment.

To provide protection from infection by or to books in lending libraries.

To make provisions as to persons engaged in washing, and as to disinfection of clothes and purification of filthy articles.

To empower the Corporation to provide nurses.

To provide that wakes shall not be held over bodies of persons dying of infectious disease.

To enact that children suffering from infectious disease shall not attend schools, and to empower the medical officer of health to examine school children.

To make provisions for regulating the manufacture and sale of ice cream.

To make provisions as to notice of application of part of Bill having reference to infectious disease.

Common Lodging-houses.

To make regulations as to common lodging-house keepers.

To require sanitary conveniences to be provided for inmates of common lodging-houses.

To make provisions as to applications for renewal of registration of common lodging-houses, and as to service of notice on common lodging-house keepers.

To enforce penalties on unregistered common lodging-house keepers, and to authorize the Corporation to refuse registration to common lodging-house keepers.

Town Hall and Recreation Grounds.

To empower the Corporation to grant the use of or let the Town Hall, technical school or other municipal buildings, and in such buildings to provide and maintain an organ and appoint an organist, and to give performances either with or without charge.

To authorize the Corporation to pay or contribute to a public band or bands performing or other musical performance in any public park, garden or recreation ground.

To authorize the Corporation to provide shelters, seats or chairs, and to set apart certain parts of recreation grounds for games.

To provide for the application of moneys received from admission to public recreation grounds and municipal buildings.

Police.

To inflict penalties respecting the exhibiting or publishing of advertisements of an indecent or prurient character, also penalties for betting in any street or open place, and to enable a police constable to take into custody and search without a warrant any person found betting or suspected of betting in such street or place.

To enable the Corporation to make bye-laws with respect to the regulation of markets, market places or fairs, and to regulate the conduct of persons frequenting the same.

Fire Insurance Fund.

To empower the Corporation to establish a fire insurance fund out of the rates and revenues of the Corporation.

Miscellaneous.

To empower the Corporation to create out of their rates and revenues an accident fund to meet claims upon them under the Employers' Liability and Workmen's Compensation Acts, also to enable them to grant gratuities to servants in their employ who may be injured or incapacitated, or to the widow or family of any such servant.

To enable the Corporation to allow discounts on amounts due in respect of rates in consideration of prompt payment, and to provide for the collection of rates by instalments.

To make provisions as to hoardings and other structures used for advertising purposes.

To provide for the disposal of the products of dust destructors.

To impose penalties for spitting in tramcars, or in the Town Hall or any public hall, assembly rooms or other public buildings belonging to the Corporation.

To empower the Corporation to prepare, supply and sell sterilized milk, and to establish, equip and maintain depôts for such purpose.

To extend the amount of the rates to be levied by the Corporation in any one year under the Public Libraries Act, 1892, for public library purposes.

To enable the Corporation to close the public baths and charge for the exclusive use thereof, and to temporarily stop up any street for the purposes of any work proposed to be authorized by the Bill.

To provide that persons acting in contravention of the intended Act under the direction of the Corporation not to be personally liable.

To make provisions as to inquiries by Local Government Board.

For the confirmation of bye-laws, and for the authentication and service of notices.

To prescribe by whom informations are to be laid.

To prescribe how compensation shall be determined.

To provide as to appeal.

To make provision as to the recovery and payment of penalties.

To provide as to settlement of amount to be paid in respect of damages and charges.

To provide that Corporation shall not be liable for damage done in executing works for owner.

To provide that compensation by agreement with the Corporation may be in work, land or money.

To provide for evidence of the appointment and authority of the officers and servants of the Corporation, the qualification of justices, and the audit of accounts.

To empower the Corporation to impose penalties for breach of or non-compliance with all or any of the provisions of the intended Act; to make and enforce bye-laws in respect of all or some of the matters and things mentioned or referred to in this Notice, and to impose penalties for breach of such bye-laws, and to extend the powers of the Corporation in regard to the bye-laws under the Public Health Acts.

Finance.

To vary or extinguish all or any rights and privileges inconsistent with, or which would or might in any way interfere with the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges, and it is intended, so far as may be necessary for any of the purposes of the Bill, to repeal, re-enact, amend, revive or incorporate with the Bill, with or without amendment and alteration, all or some of the provisions of the local and personal Acts relating directly or indirectly to the Corporation or to the borough, or any part thereof, or to any public body having jurisdiction for any purpose in or over any part or parts thereof, or to any of the districts or Local Authorities hereinbefore referred to.

The Bill will or may enable the Corporation to exercise, with or without alteration, all or any of the powers of the Lands Clauses, Municipal Corporations, Public Health, Sanitary, Local Loans, Tramways, Gas, Electric Lighting and other public Acts relating to municipalities and Local Authorities, and will or may incorporate by reference or in extenso any provision deemed expedient of those respective Acts, with such modifications as may be contained in the Bill.

THAMES CONSERVANCY.

(Further Powers to the Conservators of the River Thames for the Improvement of the River and for facilitating the Traffic thereon; Extension of the Port of London so as to include the whole of the River to High Water Mark from Teddington Lock in the Counties of Middlesex and Surrey, to an Imaginary Line drawn from Havengore Creek in the County of Essex to Warden Point in the Isle of Sheppey, in the County of Kent, and consequential Repeal of so much of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, as Relates to the Definition of the existing Port; Agreements with Dock Companies; Provision of Deep Water Channel; Powers to Dredge in the Estuary of the Thames and Extension of the Existing Powers of the Conservators as to Dredging and Ballasting; Alteration of Existing Dues and Imposition of New Dues, Tolls, Rates and Charges; Repeal of Exemptions from Existing Dues; Exemptions from Dues; Further Borrowing Powers; Alteration of the Constitution of Conservators; Purchase of Lands by Agreement and erection of Jetties and Accommodation for the Loading and Unloading of Vessels; Granting of Provisional Orders for Compulsory Purchase of Land, &c.; Repeal of the Powers conferred on the Master, Wardens and Commonalty of Watermen and Lightermen of the River Thames as to Licensing and Control of Watermen and Lightermen, and Transfer of the Powers of the said Master, Wardens and Commonalty to the Conservators; Further Provisions as to Sunken Vessels; Entry on Lands and Inspection; Alteration of Point of Measurement of the Flow of the Thames for purposes of Metropolitan Water Board; Agreements with that Board; Licensing of Persons in charge of Launches, &c.; Tolls for Launches; Repeal of Exemptions in favour of the Crown; and other Provisions as to Crown Rights; To require and compel East London Railway Company to Strengthen Thames Tunnel, &c.; Agreements with that Company; Bye-Laws with regard to Inflammable or Dangerous Goods; Incorporation, Repeal and Amendment of Acts, and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session by the Conservators of the River Thames (in this Notice called "the Conservators") for leave to bring in a Bill and to pass an Act to effect the purposes, and to confer the powers, rights and privileges following, or some of them (that is to say):—

To alter or repeal the provisions of section 3 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1894"), and the second schedule to that Act relating to the limits of the Port of London, to extend the said limits, and to provide that the new and extended limits shall be the limits of the Port of London for all purposes, and to provide that the extended area comprised therein shall include the whole of the river and the shores thereof to high-water mark from a point at or near Teddington Lock in the counties of Middlesex and Surrey to an imaginary line drawn from Havengore Creek in the county of Essex to Warden Point in the Isle of Sheppey in the county of Kent. To provide that the new or extended area shall be so defined as to be wholly independent of any existing or future limits of the

port for Customs purposes, and to provide further that no alteration of the limits of the port for Customs purposes shall involve any corresponding necessity for altering or varying the new or extended area of the port as proposed to be defined by the Bill.

To authorize agreements between the Conservators and the London and India Docks Company, the Surrey Commercial Dock Company, and the Millwall Dock Company (hereinafter called "the Dock Companies") or any of them, and the owners of any other dock or docks existing on the Thames, as to the execution and maintenance of such improvements of their respective existing docks and works, and such new works as may be deemed expedient or desirable, and to provide that any difference arising between the Dock Companies or any of them and the Conservators relating to such improvements and works shall be referred to the arbitration of the Board of Trade or the Railway and Canal Commissioners. To empower the Conservators on the one hand and the Dock Companies, or any one or more of them, on the other hand, to enter into agreements in relation to the respective Undertakings of the Dock Companies or any part or parts thereof, or to any such improvements or works as last aforesaid.

To require the Conservators to form a deep water channel from the Nore to the Royal Albert Dock.

To provide that the powers of dredging and ballasting which under the Act of 1894 the Conservators are authorized to exercise within the limits of that Act, may be exercised by them throughout the new or extended limits to be defined by the Bill, and to confer upon the Conservators further or extended powers within and also beyond those limits seaward. To empower the Conservators to dredge, cleanse, and scour the Estuary of the Thames, and to alter, deepen, restrict, enlarge, widen, diminish, lengthen, shorten, straighten and improve the bed and channels of the same, and to reduce or remove any shoals, shelves, banks, or other accumulations in the same, and to abate or remove or cause to be abated or removed all impediments, obstructions, and annoyances, and all nuisances and abuses whatsoever in the same or on the banks or shores thereof.

To authorize and empower the Conservators to levy the following new, additional, or increased dues, charges, fees and other payments:—

- (a) River dues on all goods and minerals, and coal, coke, culm, or cinders brought into or taken out of the port, subject to maxima for different classes, transhipped goods being free.
- (b) River tonnage dues on ships.
- (c) Mooring dues on vessels for the use of moorings in the river for loading or discharging ships.
- (d) Charges for the use of river and moorings by vessels not paying tonnage dues.
- (e) Dues or fees for the use of any public quays or jetties the property of the Conservators, and for the use of cranes or other apparatus or accommodation thereon.
- (f) Annual or other licensing fees on barges, hoppers, steam tugs, and other vessels using the river.

Also to make provision for repealing existing exemptions in favour of the following classes of vessels or some of them, that is to say:—

- (g) Vessels under 45 tons register.

- (h) Vessels with corn coastwise.
- (j) Vessels carrying passengers only.
- (k) Vessels not breaking bulk.

To authorize the Conservators to levy new, additional, or increased tolls, rates, and charges, to alter any existing tolls, rates, and charges, to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from the payment of tolls, rates, and charges, to extend their powers for the collection and recovery of the same, and to authorize the Conservators to compound with persons and bodies for the payment of such tolls, rates, and charges.

To extend and enlarge the powers of the Conservators with regard to borrowing and reborrowing money, to authorize them to borrow further moneys, to prescribe the mode in which money may be borrowed, to authorize them to consolidate their loans, create and issue debenture and other stock, grant mortgages or annuities, perpetual or otherwise, to provide sinking funds or other means for the repayment of moneys borrowed or for the redemption and extinguishment of any stock or annuities, to enable the Conservators to pay off, take up, reduce, compound, redeem, cancel, extinguish, or otherwise deal with all or any portion of moneys borrowed by bonds or debts taken over or contracted by them, and to apply their funds or any moneys which they may become possessed of towards all or any of the purposes of the Bill, and to make all such monetary arrangements as may be necessary or expedient.

To reconstruct, confirm, or alter, the present constitution of the Conservators as constituted under the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894.

To continue, reduce or increase the present number of Conservators, and to abolish or alter the right of any person to be a Conservator or of any body or persons to nominate, appoint or elect Conservators.

To empower any bodies or persons already represented on the Board of Conservators to nominate, appoint or elect members on the Board, and to provide for the representation of such other bodies or persons as may be prescribed in the Bill or be determined by Parliament.

To prescribe, define, alter and regulate the powers, rights, duties, and qualifications, nomination, appointment, election, retirement, and rotation of existing, substituted, additional and future members of the Board, and to provide for and prescribe the qualifications of and scale and mode of voting by any persons or body of persons who elect, nominate or appoint, and who may be authorized by the Bill to appoint, nominate, or elect members of the Board, and to make rules and regulations with reference to the matters aforesaid and other the objects of the Bill, to make all necessary and full provisions for the filling up of vacancies, the preparation and revision of lists of persons entitled to vote at any election of members of the Board, the periodical revision and correction of such lists; the hearing and determining of claims and objections, and the appointment if necessary of revisors; the payment of Conservators and all other incidental matters.

To authorize the Conservators to provide public quays and jetties, and to make charges for the use thereof.

To authorize the Conservators to purchase and acquire by agreement lands and other hereditaments for the provision of public quays or jetties, and accommodation for the loading and unloading of vessels, and all or any other purposes of the Bill.

To authorize the Conservators to apply from time to time to the Board of Trade, the Local

Government Board, or such other Public Department as may be determined by Parliament for Provisional Orders empowering the Conservators to put into force the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts with respect to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement for such purposes as may be deemed expedient, and to confer power on the before-mentioned Public Departments to grant such Orders on such terms and conditions as they think fit, and to introduce Bills into Parliament confirming such Orders.

To repeal, or alter, or to provide for the repeal or alteration of all or some of the Acts relating to the Master, Wardens, and Commonalty of Watermen and Lightermen of the River Thames (herein called the Watermen's Company), and to enact other provisions in lieu, and particularly to transfer to the Conservators the existing powers of the Watermen's Company, to authorize and empower the Conservators to license and control Watermen and Lightermen navigating the River Thames, to regulate lighters and other craft, and to make and enact all proper and incidental provisions in relation to those objects or any of them, and to repeal, alter, or amend any bye-laws made by the Watermen's Company, and to confer on the Conservators power to make bye-laws in relation thereto. To prohibit all persons not licensed by the Conservators from navigating vessels, barges, or other craft on the River Thames, and to impose penalties.

To define the meaning of the word "owner" as used in section 77 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, with respect to sunken vessels.

To repeal, alter, or amend section 92 of the Act of 1894 so as to remove the restriction upon the exercise by the Conservators of their powers of prohibiting the discharge of material into the river.

To amend section 98 of the Act of 1894 and to authorize the Conservators to exercise their powers of inspection of lands and premises for the prevention of pollution at all times of the day and night.

To provide more stringent regulations as to the disposal of mud removed from mill ponds and mill heads and to impose penalties.

To enact that the point of measurement of the flow of the river in connection with the control of the water supplies taken by the Metropolitan Water Board below Penton Hook shall be at Molesey Weir: to prescribe the amount of water which must be allowed to pass the point of measurement, and to enact all incidental provisions.

To authorize the Conservators on the one hand, and the Metropolitan Water Board on the other hand, to enter into and carry into effect agreements in relation to any matter connected with water supply.

To empower the Conservators to grant licences to persons owning and navigating steam, electric, petrol, and other launches and pleasure boats, and to prohibit the letting and navigating of such launches without a properly licensed person being in charge thereof.

To alter and amend section 163 and the fourth schedule of the Act of 1894 so as to provide for an increase and variation of the scale of tolls for steam launches, as defined by the Act of 1894.

To repeal and extinguish all and every existing exemption in favour of the Crown, and to provide that any rates, dues, tolls, fees, or other charges payable by any other person or body shall be payable by the Crown on the same conditions and in

the same manner as they are now payable by such other persons or bodies.

To provide that the payments to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Woods and Forests in respect of grants for accommodations in the river shall cease, or in the alternative that the Commissioners shall bear a proportion of the expenditure incurred by the Conservators preparatory and incidental to the granting of licences for works in the river, and the collection of rents and fines in respect thereof.

To authorize and require the East London Railway Company and the East London Railway Joint Committee, or one of them, at their own respective costs and charges, to execute such works of reconstruction, strengthening, or alteration in regard to the Thames Tunnel as shall be necessary or be prescribed by the Bill; to remove or alter existing restrictions as to the depth to which dredging operations may be carried; and to authorize the Conservators, on the one hand, and the East London Railway Company and the East London Railway Joint Committee, on the other hand, to enter into agreements in connection with the execution of such works.

To empower the Conservators to make bye-laws for regulating the conveyance, loading and unloading of dangerous and inflammable goods within their jurisdiction.

The Bill will vary and extinguish all rights and privileges which may interfere or be inconsistent with any of its objects, and will confer other rights and privileges which may be expedient for carrying those objects into effect or in relation thereto.

So far as may be necessary to effect all or any of the purposes aforesaid or other the objects of the Bill, to amend, repeal or extend and if necessary make applicable all or some of the provisions now in force of all or any of the Acts following (that is to say):—

The Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and any other Act or Acts relating to or affecting the Conservators, 63 and 64 Vic., cap. 111, and any other Act or Acts relating to the London and India Docks Company, 27 and 28 Vic., cap. 31, 57 and 58 Vic., cap. 67, 62 and 63 Vic., cap. 18, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Surrey Commercial Dock Company, 27 and 28 Vic., cap. 255, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Millwall Dock Company, the Watermen's and Lightermen's Amendment Act, 1859, the Thames Watermen's and Lightermen's Act, 1893, and any other Act relating to or affecting that Company, the Metropolis Water Act, 1902, and any other Acts relating to or affecting the Metropolitan Water Board, 45 George III., cap. 117, and any other Act relating to the Thames Tunnel, 28 and 29 Vic., cap. 51, and any other Act relating to the East London Railway Company.

works and works for the conversion, manufacture, utilization and distribution of materials used in and about the manufacture of gas and of residual and manufactured products, matters and things, and to manufacture, produce, store, supply and sell gas, and to manufacture, store, convert, utilize, buy, sell and dispose of coke, coal, patent fuels, tar, lime, pitch, asphaltum, ammoniacal liquor, oil and all other residual and manufactured products, matters and things.

6. The lands now used by the Limited Company for the manufacture and storage of gas, and the manufacture and conversion and storage of residual and manufactured products, are the following (that is to say):—

8. To authorize the Company to maintain, alter and renew or to take up and discontinue any existing mains, pipes, pillars and other works of the Limited Company, and to lay down, make and maintain, and from time to time renew or discontinue new or additional mains, pipes, pillars and other works in, along, through, over and under, and for those purposes and for any other purposes in connection with their Undertaking to open and break up, cross, alter, divert or stop up all roads, footpaths, highways, streets, pipes, sewers, canals, navigations, rivers, streams, bridges, railways and tramways within the limits above defined for the supply of gas.

9. To enable the Company to manufacture, hire, let or sell and deal in, fit up or repair meters, fittings and other apparatus for supplying or measuring gas and engines, dynamos, motors, stoves, pipes and other apparatus for warming, lighting, cooking and for motive power and other purposes, and to provide materials and execute and do any work or services in connection therewith, and to exempt any such fittings and apparatus from distress and make special provision for securing the safety and return thereof to the Company.

10. To authorize the Company to demand and take and recover rates, rents and charges differential or otherwise for the supply of gas and for the sale or hire of gas meters, fittings, stoves, engines and other apparatus, and for services performed by the Company, and to alter the rates, rents and charges now made and taken by the Limited Company, and to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from the payment of any such rates,

rents and charges, and to confer, vary and extinguish other rights and privileges.

11. To authorize the Company to take, purchase, hold and use patent rights or licences or authorities under letters patent for the use of inventions relative to the manufacture, conversion, utilization or distribution of gas, and of such material and residual products as aforesaid.

12. To empower the Company to enter into and carry into effect contracts and arrangements for the supply of gas in bulk or otherwise for any purpose whatsoever with any Corporation, County Council or Sanitary Authority, railway Company or any other Company, body or person within or beyond the limits of supply of the Company, and from time to time to vary, suspend or rescind any such contracts or arrangements and make others in lieu thereof or in addition thereto, and the Bill will confer all necessary powers in that behalf upon all such Corporations, Authorities, Companies, bodies and persons, and will or may enable all parties to any such contracts or arrangements to apply for the purposes thereof any funds or moneys and raise additional funds by rates or otherwise, and the Bill will sanction and confirm any agreements already made or which prior to the passing of the Bill may be made touching the aforesaid matters or any of them.

13. To fix the illuminating power of the gas to be supplied by the Company, and to provide for the testing of gas.

14. To enable the Company to acquire further lands for the general purposes of their Undertaking, to purchase, erect and take on lease dwelling-houses for persons in their employ, and offices, show rooms and other buildings for the purposes of their Undertaking.

15. To make such provisions as may have been or may be agreed upon or as may be prescribed or authorized by the Bill for the protection and benefit of the landowners and any other persons and bodies whose property, rights, powers and interests will or might be affected by the execution of the powers of the Bill, and of their property, rights and interests, and to confirm and give effect to any arrangements or agreements which may have been or may be entered into between the Company and such landowners and other persons and bodies touching any of the matters aforesaid.

16. To make special provision with reference to the following matters:—The supply of gas for power or manufacturing purposes, to notices of a discontinuance of a supply of gas, and for securing the payment of gas rates and for prepayment thereof in certain cases, and with respect to the quality, pressure, registration and measurement of gas and the testing of meters, the refusal to supply gas to persons in debt to the Company and deposits made with the Company and the interest thereon, for exempting the Company in certain cases from penalties for failure to comply with the enactments relating to the Company and for prescribing the period of error in the case of defective meters, the inspection of fittings, service pipes and other apparatus and the prohibition of the use of improper or insufficient fittings, and with respect to the use of anti-fluctuators, and to confer upon the Company the same powers of laying down and maintaining mains, pipes and apparatus in roads not dedicated to the public as are conferred by the Gasworks Clauses Act, 1847, in respect of public roads.

17. To empower the Company to make and enforce regulations as to the sale and price of gas

supplied by means of slot meters, and as to the price, terms and conditions of such meters and the fittings connected therewith.

18. To authorize the Company out of revenue to provide a fund for the renewal and repair of their works, mains and pipes, and to make provision for the creation of reserve and insurance funds.

19. To make provision as to the liability of owners and occupiers of premises which have been let or sub-let as to the payment by them of sums due to the Company in respect of such premises.

20. To provide for the recovery of demands in the County Court.

21. To make provision as to the number, qualification and quorum of directors of the Company, the calling of meetings and the quorum to be present thereat, and to enable directors to hold offices under the Company and to enter into contracts for the supply of goods and otherwise to the Company, and generally to make such provisions as may be deemed expedient with regard to the regulations and management of the affairs and proceedings of the Company.

22. To authorize the Company to generate, store, distribute, sell and supply electric energy for any public or private purposes as defined in the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, within the said borough of Andover.

23. The lands upon which the Company propose to generate and store electricity are those described in paragraphs 4 and 6 of this Notice, which first mentioned lands are also delineated on the deposited plans and described in the deposited book of reference hereinafter referred to.

the railways hereunder specified, will or may be broken up or interfered with (that is to say) :—

(a) Streets.

Millway-road from the railway bridge to Weyhill-road, Weyhill-road from Millway-road to Bridge-street, Bridge-street, High-street, Newbury-street, and New-street to Etwall House, London-street from Bridge-street to East-street, Winchester-street from Bridge-street to Old Winchester-road, Junction-road from Bridge-street to the Junction Hotel.

30. To enable the Company if so agreed between them and the Corporation to accept from the Corporation a transfer of and to empower the Corporation to transfer to the Company the Corporation's powers, rights, duties, liabilities and works under the provisions of a Provisional Order to be obtained by the said Corporation under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, upon such terms and conditions and for such period as may be agreed or as may be required or approved by the Board of Trade or as may be provided by the Bill, and, in the event of such transfer, to confer upon the Company all such powers as may be necessary in that behalf; also to enable the Company to accept the transfer of any authorized electrical Undertakings within their limits of gas supply.

31. To enable the Company, if they think fit, to constitute their electrical Undertaking a separate Undertaking with separate and distinct capital and borrowing powers, and to prescribe the rate of dividend or interest to be paid on such separate capital and the revenues out of which the same shall be paid, and to apportion or empower the

Company to apportion their management and general expenses between the general Undertaking of the Company and such separate Undertaking.

32. To vary or extinguish all or any rights and privileges which would interfere with the purposes of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges, and to incorporate therewith and to extend and apply as well to the mains, pipes and works of the Limited Company laid down or constructed before the passing of the Bill as to all mains, pipes and works which may be laid down or constructed under the authority of the Bill, the powers and provisions of the Gasworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1871, and the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888; also to incorporate all or some of the provisions of the Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; the Companies Clauses Act, 1863; and the Companies Clauses Act, 1869; and the Lands Clauses Acts; and so far as may be necessary or expedient to alter, amend, repeal or extend all or some of the provisions of those Acts or any of them.

To authorize the Council and their lessees, or other the person or persons working the said intended tramway, to levy tolls, rates and charges for the use thereof, by carriages passing along the same, and the conveyance of passengers, goods, minerals, animals, merchandize and other traffic upon the same, and to confer exemptions from tolls, rates and charges.

To enable the Council to prevent the fouling of the watershed and the waters flowing into the Rivers Chwefri and Ithon to fence the banks of those rivers near any intake of the Council, to acquire land for that purpose and to make bye-laws and do all such things as may ensure the purity of the sources of supply.

11. To prescribe a period for the completion of the works authorized by the Bill, and to enable the Local Government Board to enlarge such period from time to time.

12. To authorize the Council to acquire by agreement or lease, lands in the district or its vicinity, and lay out the same as golf links, and to erect a golf-house and other buildings and to charge for the use thereof.

13. To authorize the Council to erect, provide, equip, maintain, furnish and let waiting, refreshment, assembly, concert and other rooms and pavilions for the performance of music and other public entertainments and assemblies, shops and other places and conveniences in the pleasure or recreation grounds belonging to or held by them, and to charge for the admission to and use of any such rooms, buildings, places, conveniences and grounds, and for admission to such entertainments and assemblies, and to provide and let chairs therein and to pay or contribute to a public band of music for the district.

14. To empower the Council to advertise the district as a health resort, and to pay the cost thereof out of any of the revenues or surplus funds of the Council.

15. To prohibit the holding of markets in streets, and the sale of articles and things except in markets or shops, to levy tolls on market produce, goods and baskets, and also on articles

and things sold in the open streets or from door to door.

16. To confer on the Council enlarged powers with reference to buildings and streets, including amongst others, the approval of plans by the Council to be void after certain intervals, the retention of plans deposited with the Council, to prohibit the erection of new buildings until line of street defined, the defining of the further line of existing streets, intersecting streets, to declare the beginning and end of streets, the prevention and removal of projections over streets, to define new buildings, to make bye-laws with regard to building materials, to provide for the recovery of damages caused to footways by excavations, and as to temporary and moveable buildings, the fencing of vacant lands adjoining streets, and the lopping of trees or shrubs overhanging streets and footpaths.

17. To authorize the Council with the consent of the Local Government Board to acquire or construct, hold, furnish, maintain, insure and carry on a town hall, public hall, assembly rooms, and other public buildings with all necessary offices and rooms in connection therewith, and may acquire lands and buildings for the purposes thereof, to enable the Council to let or otherwise charge for the use of the same for any public meetings or entertainments, and to provide for the application of any moneys received therefrom.

18. To confer powers on the Council with regard to the inspection of hackney carriages, the granting of occasional licences for public vehicles, and to apply the provisions of the Town Police Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1889, and the bye-laws made thereunder with respect to hackney carriages at railway stations and the approaches thereto, as if such railway stations were hackney carriage stands or a street, and to make applicable the provisions of those Acts with respect to the regulation of fares for hackney carriages, taking up and setting down passengers within the district, but which go or come from outside the district.

19. To enable any police constable and any member of the Council's fire brigade, or other officer to enter and break open any premises in case of fire, to entrust the control of all operations at any fire in the district to the captain of the fire brigade or other officer, with power to stop and regulate the traffic in any street for all purposes in connection with any fire, and to enable the Council to enter into agreements with Local Authorities for the common use of any fire engines with their appurtenances, and for mutual assistance in case of fire.

20. To empower the Council to borrow money for all or any of the purposes of the intended Act and for such other purposes as may be prescribed or authorized by the intended Act, and to charge the money so borrowed and interest upon the security of the whole or part of the revenues and Undertakings and property for the time being of the Council or some of them, and on any other funds and rates leviable by the Council, and to empower the Council to apply any of their funds to any of the purposes of the intended Act, and to make further provision with reference to the existing debts of the Council and otherwise in relation to the finances, rates and revenue of the Council.

21. To empower the Council to extend the provisions of any existing bye-laws, to make new bye-laws, rules and regulations with reference to all or any of the matters referred to in this Notice, and to enforce the same by penalties or

otherwise, or to vary or rescind the same, and to confer upon them all powers, rights, authorities and privileges which are or may become necessary for carrying the powers granted by the intended Act into execution, to vary or extinguish all existing rights or privileges which would or might in any way prevent or interfere with or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

22. To make provision generally with regard to the health and local government of the district, and to confer upon the Council powers in excess of the general law now usually granted in Improvement Acts.

23. To abandon the waterworks authorized by the Llandrindod Wells Water Act, 1901, and to release the Council from any obligations under that Act in relation to the construction of such waterworks.

24. To incorporate, with alterations and amendments, and to apply, amend, alter or repeal all or some of the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament following, or some of them (that is to say):—The Lands Clauses Acts; the Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847; the Town Police Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1889; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Public Health Acts and all Acts amending the said Acts respectively, or any of them.

25. To alter, amend, extend, enlarge or repeal or re-enact, with or without amendment, all or some of the provisions of the Llandrindod Wells Water Act, 1901, and all other Acts and Orders relating to the Council.

And notice is hereby also given, that on or before the 30th day of November instant, plans and sections of the works intended to be authorized by the Bill showing the lines and levels thereof, and showing the lands intended to be taken compulsorily under the powers of the Bill, with a book of reference to such plans and a copy of this Notice as published in the London Gazette, will be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Brecknock at his office at Brecon, and with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Radnor at his office at Presteign, and with the Clerk to the Urban District Council of Llandrindod Wells at his office at Llandrindod Wells, and that on or before the 30th day of November instant, a copy of so much of the said plans and sections and book of reference as relates to each parish in or through which the intended works or any of them will be made or pass, or in which any lands, houses or other property intended to be taken are situate together with a copy of this Notice will be deposited with the officer respectively hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: In the case of (a) any parish having a Parish Council with the Clerk of the Parish Council at his residence, or, if there is no Clerk, with the Chairman of that Council at his residence; and (b) any parish comprised in a rural district and not having a Parish Council with the Clerk to the Council of the rural district in which such parish is situate.

Printed copies of the intended Act or Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill offices of the Houses of Lords and Commons on or before the 17th day of December next.
