

9. No one shall bury any horse or part of a horse which has died from glanders or farcy, or remove it from the place in which it died, until it has been visited by the Government Veterinary Surgeon or other person appointed for the purpose, unless the burial be necessary to avoid the spreading of such disease, or a nuisance to the public.

10. No one shall remove from the place in which any horse has died, any straw, hay, or other things without permission from the Government Veterinary Surgeon.

11. If any order given under these regulations by any of the Officers mentioned in Article 2 be not fully carried out by the person to whom it was given, it shall be carried out by the police, who shall institute proceedings against the offender according to law.

12. Any order given by a person authorized under these regulations to give such order with a view to preventing the spreading of the disease referred to in the preamble of this Notice, shall be carried out as if it were given by the Head of the Government, even though the power to give such order be not included in any other provision of these regulations.

13. Any order given by any of the persons mentioned in Article 2 may be altered or revoked by such persons or by the Head of the Government; but no application for the alteration or revocation of any such order, shall suspend the execution of the same.

14. Until further notice, no horse shall be landed in either Gozo or Comino from Malta without a permit from the Chief Government Medical Officer.

The Bankruptcy Acts, 1883 to 1890.

The Companies (Winding-up) Act, 1890.

Whereas by an Order of the Board of Trade, dated 14th April, 1890, made under the provisions of section 66 of the Bankruptcy Act, 1883, it was directed, *inter alia*, that there should be two Official Receivers for the Bankruptcy Districts of the County Courts holden at Brighton, Hastings, and Lewes and Eastbourne.

And whereas by such Order Mr. Alexander Mackintosh and Mr. Arthur Samuel Cully were appointed to be the Official Receivers for the said Bankruptcy Districts.

And whereas Mr. Ernest William Joseph Savill is now one of such Official Receivers attached to the said Bankruptcy Districts in the place of Mr. Arthur Samuel Cully.

And whereas by a further Order, dated 1st January, 1891, made under the provisions of section 4, sub-section 2, of the Companies (Winding-up) Act, 1890, it was, *inter alia*, ordered that Mr. Alexander Mackintosh should be the Official Receiver attached to the said Courts for the purposes of that Act.

And whereas the Board of Trade have determined, with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that there shall in future be one Official Receiver only for the Bankruptcy Districts of the said Courts.

Now therefore the Board of Trade do hereby revoke the said Orders in so far as they direct that there shall be two Official Receivers for the Bankruptcy Districts of the County Courts holden at Brighton, Hastings, and Lewes and Eastbourne, and in so far as they relate to the appointment of Mr. Alexander Mackintosh to be an Official Receiver for the said Districts; but without prejudice to anything done or suffered under the said Orders.

And it is further ordered that the said Mr. Ernest William Joseph Savill shall become and be the Official Receiver attached to the said Courts for all the purposes of the Bankruptcy Acts, 1883 to 1890, and the Companies (Winding-up) Act, 1890.

This Order shall commence and come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1905.
